

Do you have connections with others who are on the trip?


My son David, My cousins Josef Adler, Susan Turnbull, Paul Wolf & Joan Adler

Have you been to this area before? No


All of my grandfather's sisters and brother vanished in the war and we don't have a clue where.

My grandmother lost three sisters who vanished. My father grew up in a poor family, my grandfather was a "balegule". During the war they ran away into Russia arriving in Asian Russia and living through the mercy of workers in "kochozes" agricultural settlements. When they came back to a ruined Bolechov, my grand parents were separated and my grandmother stayed in Bolechov with my eldest aunt. My father and his other sisters moved with their father to Ivano Frankivsk.

In 1956 our family decided to immigrate to Israel, they had the right as ex-polish citizens to do it via Poland. I was born during the two years while they waited for the permit papers. In August 1960 we came to Israel.

I hope I'll find to find my great grandparents graves. I also hope we will be visiting Rozdole.

I strongly suspect that each of my grandparents left siblings behind when they came to the US. My grandfather's family name was Kirschenbaum, but my father later shortened the name to Kirsch in the US. My grandfather's mother's family name was Zirklus. My grandmother's family name was Friedlander. My grandmother's mother's family name was Landmann.

Do you have connections with others who are on the trip?

Have you been to this area before? No.

Yes, Serene Seebol is Margo's cousin. Serene and Margo's grandfathers were brothers.


Have you been to this area before?

My father Marian was his younger son and was born in 1912. He told me a lot about his youth spent in Bolechow, and on my continuous requests he wrote about it over 100 pages.

I have visited Bolechow only once in 1956. I have been living in Warsaw until 1980 when I left for France where I have been teaching Economics at the University Montpellier I. I am retired now and I am interested in the multi-cultural life of Bolechow before the Second World War. Last March I have undertaken an action to search the support to the BJHS Taniava Mass Grave Project among the Polish Bolechovers living in Poland and individuals from the different communities in present Bolechow (during my short visit in May 2009).
