The year 2023 saw a dramatic drop in the number of people looking to adopt animals and an increase in people wanting to surrender their pets (or, unfortunately, dumping their pets) because they lacked the funds to keep them or because landlords in the valley are becoming more strict regarding pets. We saw fewer and fewer people reclaiming their pets, brought to the shelter by residents or animal control officers. And we saw astronomical increases in the cost of doing business. Yet through it all, this small but mighty nonprofit continued to fulfill its mission every day. The lives of pets in the Walla Walla Valley are a little bit brighter because of this team.

Thank you for supporting us even when times get tough, and thank you for helping us save thousands of lives!


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KUMBA'S STORY



VET SERVICES

At Blue Mountain Humane Society, our Veterinary Care program consistently provides hope and healing to hundreds of animals each year. After more than a decade of service, Dr. KenNorris retired at the end of 2023. We were fortunate to welcome local veterinarian Dr. Ashley Rice as our new Medical Director, ensuring continued excellence in our veterinary care program.

Our shelter animals regularly receive check-ups, vaccinations, and other medical treatments including interventions for those facing serious medical conditions. We also provide affordable vaccination and spay/neuter services to qualified low-income members of our community, ensuring that pets have access to this service regardless of their owner's financial situation.

As a leading animal shelter in the region, BMHS is equipped to handle cases that many shelters are unable to treat. This means animals in our care can count on BMHS to give them a second chance at a healthy, happy life. And because BMHS is fortunate enough to have a full-time veterinarian on site, we are able to provide spay and neuter services to many animal welfare organizations in our region.

Our skilled staff treat a wide range of cases every day — from kittens with upper respiratory infections to dogs like Kumba who struggle to walk because of their injuries. Each case brings new challenges but also heartwarming stories of resilience.






YOU KNOW?

BMHS has a full-time staff member and volunteers who provide enrichment for our shelter dogs and cats. This can include everything from running dog playgroups to ensuring animals get time with puzzle feeders and other interactive toys and is a critical way we help our animals combat the stresses of being in a shelter environment. It also helps us get to know the cats and dogs in our care, which in turn allows us to better match them with new families. Our volunteer-run Pawsitive Adventures program is another way that dogs receive enrichment while at BMHS by visiting different destinations, socializing at local businesses, and experiencing life outside the shelter. Our fostering program also plays a crucial role in ensuring our cats and dogs get the individualized care and attention they need to thrive.




COMPASSIONATE CARE

Our skilled and compassionate staff and volunteers work tirelessly to manage a variety of challenging conditions, ensuring every animal has the chance to thrive.

One heartwarming success story is Alfred, a sweet and independent cat who came to us as a stray. Despite his FIV diagnosis, which makes him more vulnerable to everyday illnesses, Alfred's charming personality quickly won over our team. With careful attention and the right home environment, cats like Alfred can lead happy and healthy lives. We're thrilled to share that Alfred has found his forever home, bringing love and curiosity to his new family.

COMMUNITY CAT CHAMPIONS

Our Trap-Neuter-Return, or TNR, program plays a crucial role in preventing cat over-population in our communities. By humanely trapping, fixing, and returning feral and community cats to their original locations, TNR helps control this cat population and improve their quality of life. We have performed hundreds of TNR surgeries over the years, helping between 250-400 cats per year.

Linda Stevens, a dedicated TNR volunteer at Blue Mountain Humane Society since 2015, has been instrumental in managing the feral cat population in our valley. Her exceptional community engagement skills have enabled her to identify feral cat hotspots, distribute traps, and ensure the safe capture and release of countless cats. Over the years, Linda has been a key player in the TNR process for thousands of cats, significantly improving their lives and enhancing the well-being of our community.

"Education about TNR is crucial for the public," said Stevens. "People don't realize just how many feral cats are in Walla Walla city and the county. TNR is a very important program that couldn't succeed without our amazing donors."

Donors can support this essential program directly through our dedicated TNR fund, benefiting not only the cats but also our entire community.





TRANSFORMING LIVES

Our partnership with the Washington State Penitentiary offers a life-changing opportunity for both shelter dogs and incarcerated individuals. Through BMHS's eightweek program, select shelter dogs receive essential training, equipping them with the skills needed to pass the Canine Good Citizen test before finding their forever homes.

This program not only benefits the dogs by preparing them for successful adoption but also provides a unique chance for incarcerated individuals to experience the profound bond between humans and animals. Participants gain valuable skills in dog training and care, supporting their rehabilitation and fostering a positive environment within the prison walls.

The Canine Good Citizen test evaluates dogs on ten key behaviors, including accepting friendly strangers, walking calmly on a leash, and responding to commands. By achieving CGC certification, these dogs showcase their good manners and readiness to become cherished members of loving families.
