

# Plenty to smile about

A night for history . . .

Brilliant South Fremantle ruckman Stephen Michael has won his second consecutive Channel 7-Sandover Medal - and that's a \$20,000 smile the Kid from Kojonup is wearing.

It was a history-making night as Michael polled the highest number of Sandover Medal votes in the 61 years of the award - 37, three more than another Bulldog great, Frank (Scranno) Jenkins when he won the medal in 1937.

This picture, by photographer Richie Hann, captures some more history as well. John Leonard, the oldest surviving Sandover Medal winner (1926) is on the right and Billy Walker, the only man to win three straight medals in on the left. Michael now has the chance to equal Walker's feat if he stays in Perth next year.

# BIG WINNERS

Stephen Michael and Warren Ralph are the two big winners in Westside Football this year.



In the first four games Michael polled 2, 1, none and 2 and then finished the round off with three top votes; a sure indication that he was on his way to a record tally.




Right: Pensive . . . that's Michael as he looks at the vote progress.




Bottom right: All smiles . . . Robin Sandover, the grandson of the medal's donor, Alfred Sandover, places the prestigious medal around Michael's neck.





# AN ERENT HANDBALL.



Paul Vasoli is a classic example of a footballer who never knows when he is beaten.

At the start of the 1979 season officials from a number of Sunday league teams were watching Vasoli as he tried out in the South Fremantle camp after failing to win a permanent league berth at Perth. He had been with the Demons for four years, but managed only 32 senior games. There were many people who felt that he would meet a similar fate at Souths.

However, he wasn't going to give in and though South looked a strong side to break into, he tackled the task with enthusiasm. Bulldogs coach Mal Brown gave Vasoli plenty of chances - and he has taken them.

The move has had its disappointments.

But last week Vasoli had 25 handpasses in South's crushing win over West Perth - ample confirmation that he has made the grade in senior ranks.

Vasoli is a key member of the Bulldogs' mobile brigade and this week football writer Gary Stocks spoke to Vasoli about his football.

Q: Where did you play your early football?

A: I played with Clontarf juniors and when I left school I played for Kelmscott for two years. I then played reserves and colts and a handful of league games for Perth.

Q: When did you move to Souths? A: Start of the 1979 season.

Q: Any regrets about the move?

A: No. It's the best move I have ever made and I am enjoying it, I hope I continue to enjoy it.

Q: How hard was it to break into league ranks at Perth?

A: It was really difficult and I only got a game when other guys were injured. It was particularly hard because i was up against blokes like Gary Gibellini and Wayne Currie and at the time Perth had a top side and were winning grand finals.

Q: How have you settled in to the ruckroving role at Souths?

A: Well it's not easy. No position on the field is easy but it's good to play in a side with top players like Stephen Michael, Maurice Rioli, Noel Carter and Paul Mountain. The whole side is good and it is good playing with them.

Q: Do you think you have developed as a player since moving to South?

A: For sure. I have matured at an older age than most other players.

Brown had on your own game? A: He's always onto me about different

Q: What sort of influence has Mal

things in my game, handball, kicking and the silly things I do. Even now he still gets into me. If it wasn't for Brownie I wouldn't be playing league football. He has slotted me into a position I enjoy and at the same time is good for the team.

Q: Who had the most influence on you in your early days?

A: Before I went to Perth Ray Lawrence was coaching me. At Kelmscott he had a fair bit to do with me and Cam Blakemore was also another guy who coached me in reserves and I enjoyed playing under him.

Q: Can South Fremantle win another premiership this year?

A: This Saturday will be the first time we will have a full side available for selection. When we get them all back and players like Rioli and Barrett start firing and we get our attitude right we will be hard to beat - that's all that's wrong. We are too inconsistent.

Q: How have the young players who have been promoted slotted into the team?

A: The players who have come in have done a good job. But they are not consistent enough over a period of four or five weeks. They play well for a couple of weeks and then fall away and eventually get dropped. Then someone else comes in and we can't settle the side down. The experienced guys should be back for the first semi.

Q: Have you been happy with your own form this season?

A: Early on I was happy with my form

but then for about three or four weeks I couldn't get a kick. I wouldn't get a kick at Chessons, then I was pleased with my game against Swans but the game against Subiaco was disasterous, I was very disappointed with my game.

Q: That loss to Subiaco would have been a bit disheartening for everyone at South - can you overcome that loss?

A: I'm sure we can. Everyone was very disappointed at losing that game. It was a big let down and if we were horses I think -they would have shot us. You can't get beaten by the bottom side, then beat Swans and lose to Subiaco.

Q: One of South Fremantle's biggest problems this year has been maintaining consistency - can you improve on that in time to win three finals on end.?

A: We have been beaten by every team in the competition except East Fremantle. The other seven have beaten us but I am sure we will be a better side in the finals.

Q: You say that East Fremantle are the only side that haven't beaten South this year. Has there been any emphasis placed on the derbies during the season.?

A: Derbies to me are important because the staunch South Fremantle supporters regard them as important. But really it's just another game to win.

Q: Any thoughts of making the move to the VFL?

A: I think everyone would like to play in Victoria. But I am 25 now I think it's a little bit late.

Q: What is the future for Paul Vasoli? A: I would just like to play 150 league games for South Fremantle.

Q: What about South in the future? A: A lot of people seem to think that we have got a lot of guys who are going to give it away because we have blokes like Monteath and Carter who are only 25 or 26, but because they have been around a while everyone thinks they are going to retire. They are only young so we should have a good side for the next four or five years. Then players like John Dorotich, Michael Page and a few other young guys will be ready to take over.

Q: If Maurice Rioli and Stephen Michael leave for Victoria next year it will leave a big whole in the side. Can South offset the problem?

A: Well, we have played without Maurice for most of this season. He will be missed naturally, but we have become accustomed to not playing with him and as far as Stephen Michael is concerned I don't think he will ever go to Victoria.



Wayne Duke on the interchange bench,
if Craig Edwards is unavailable.

He would add experience and always seems to play well against South Fremantle. Even if the injury becomes worse and East Perth win, I would imagine that Craig Edwards would be available for the final.

## HERMAN'S WOES

While on the subject of ruckmen,
Herman van de Beek has strained his
knee and will be having an exploratory
operation to see if anything major has
happened.

Claremont have their fingers crossed as Herman could prove to be valuable to them on the interchange bench even though Barry Beecroft and Baden Harper have taken the pressure off Graham Moss and have proven to be of capable assistance to the Claremont captain-coach.

### MEDAL SHOW

On Sandover Medal night the Claremont players ran their own show at which I was guest panelist, along with John McIntosh and Les Mumme.

# COUNTRY PAY-OFF

Some clubs are starting to take a lot more interest in their country zones with regard to recruiting and John Todd has some interesting thoughts on the subject. He sees one thing in favour of country players - normally at the age Tof 15 or 16 they are usually playing in \* their club's senior side and have had experience against mature and physical men. Whereas players coming from the \*local juniors are not able to obtain this Texperience. If we have a good look through each individual side in league \*and reserves, I would say that there was a great deal more country players than Ithere was five or six years ago.

Which brings me to another point —
I feel that the league directors should
seriously consider a fourths competition
and this should be for players under 18.

Basically, part of the problem at present in most grades is at this age players do not realise the amount of time and dedication required to play league football.

Also, it gives league clubs a chance to train these players at an early age in a manner that is required from them in the future.

# South have what it takes

South Fremantle's formula for success is based on one main strategy - getting the ball out of the centre.

Their inability to win many games this season can be traced back to their failure in this area, which has come about because of two main factors.

They are the number of injuries to centreman Maurice Rioli and a downturn in both form and confidence in captain Noel Carter.

Ruckman Stephen Michael has had to do it all at the centre bounces, with occasional support from ruck-rover Paul Vasoli.

It is no co-incidence that last Saturday South rediscovered the formula that has eluded them and kicked a record WAFL score.

The statistics from this game are staggering. Let's have a look at the main characters. NOEL CARTER: Seven marks, 34 kicks,

12 handballs.

PAUL VASOLI: Four marks, 20 kicks, 25 handballs.

MAURICE RIOLI: Four marks, 16 kicks, 19 handballs.

STEPHEN MICHAEL: Ten marks, 17 kicks, 16 handpasses and 25 effective ruck knocks.

These figures are enough to give any opposing coach nightmares and it's something that East Perth's Grant Dorrington has thought long and hard about this week.

East Perth's climb into the top four this year has been based mainly around a reorganisation in their mobile brigade. There are many clubs that would like to have a first ruck line-up of John Ironmonger, Dean Turner and Wayne Otway.

What the Royals lack is a Maurice Rioli. George Michalczyk is a good player. But he is not in the same class as the flashy left-footer, who reserves his best performance for final round matches.

This is where I expect South Fremantle to take charge in the first semi-final. And, most important now, they have the players in the forward line to capitalise on the wealth of opportunities that come their way.

The key to this area for South is the return of Joe McKay, who has improved his kicking from set shots, and the bite Wayne Henwood has provided as well.

South fell down midway through the year because of their lack of aerial capacity in this area. It has been left to Basil Campbell to carry most of the workload.

East Perth have a balanced defence with the return of John Dimmer to centrehalf-back. It is a neat spread of youth and experience with Mike Christian and Steve Da Rui making their first final round appearances.

Dimmer should have a keen tussle with Bruce Monteath, who has failed to come up with the goods so far this year.

Monteath has looked tops in parts. He was brilliant against East Fremantle in the second round and fired again last Saturday against West Perth with an eight-goal performance.

But his performances over the year have hardly been in the mould of a former captain of Richmond and a player rated as a dynamic ruck-rover in the VFL.

Perhaps injuries have taken their toll but there is too much hit-and-miss about Monteath's football to put too much reliance on him at this stage.

Fortunately, Campbell provides a fairly reliable path to attack for South because there is another problem on the other halfforward flank.

Brad Hardie has been an enormous disappointment this year and on Saturday I expect Neil Randall to play on the flank, with Hardie on the interchange bench.

East Perth have looked tender on the wings this year and will probably go into this match with Dennis Collins and Ross Kerr.





Collins has the pace to be a success but lacks the attitude of Kerr, who has made his mark in football the hard way.

Collins' pace will be needed to cope with the dazzle of Benny Vigona while Kerr will probably line-up on John Begg.

Begg looks much better suited to a halfback flank and doesn't appeal to me as a wingman who will succeed in final round football.

He lacks acceleration and this factor, combined with an inability to go onto the wrong foot, severely restricts him on a wing where breakaway moves are all important.

East Perth's big chance is for Grant Campbell to fire at centre-half-forward. He can lift the side off his own boot.

He will not have matters all his own way because Tony Kelly will be his opponent and this player is sometimes very underrated.

Campbell has class on his side, Kelly has application. Both have the capacity to succeed.

Glyn Williams should line up on one half-forward flank and you can bet that Larry Kickett will be on the interchange bench.

Kickett is a real burst player, who has wreaked havoc against the Bulldogs on a number of occasions. He doesn't work hard enough for many coaches and this is one of the reasons why he has found it difficult to maintain a regular place in the side in recent years.

But coach Grant Dorrington (and Mal Brown) will remember how half-forward flanker Gary Bygraves provided the turning point in the 1972 grand final with four goals in five minutes of football magic against Claremont.

Bygraves sometimes went to sleep for weeks on end but then would turn a match in a few minutes. Kickett has the same capacity and the interchange bench is tailor-made for his style of footbalk.

Souths backline is nothing fancy. Simon Outhwaite still has trouble holding his feet-and some-one like Kickett could cut him to ribbons — particularly when the South defender is tiring.

Full-back Kevin Cornell is slow and lacks recovery and can't go onto his wrong foot but big Wayne Delmenico came back to his best last Saturday.


Delmenico was a fine player at centrehalf-forward in last year's final round, but his recent form has not been convincing. On Saturday he marked with surety and must have gained confidence from the game.

Rod Barrett has been out with an injured hand and didn't look too keen to use this on Saturday against West Perth. Brown used him on the ball for most of the game, partly because of the poor form shown by Hardie and because Barrett needed the run to sharpen him up.

In fact, the South Fremantle defender looked quite sharp when he was given that run. He didn't look so convincing overhead — usually a strong feature of his game.

Overall East Perth have the capacity to cause an upset. They are the only side, apart from Claremont, that have beaten the Bulldogs twice this year.

But if something goes wrong there are not enough alternatives in the Royals line-up. South Fremantle are slightly more versatile — but they have the best centre-bounce line-up in the league and this will win then the first semi-final.

# SOUTH MELBOURNE TAKEOVER BID

There is growing evidence in Victoria that the South Melbourne Football Club is being taken over by big business.

Tooths Brewery and the Murdoch Corporation appear likely to control the future of the troubled South club, which plans to move its headquarters to Sydney next year.

Leading Melbourne sports critic, Bill Collins, claims that the latest list of 600 new members will stack an extraordinary meeting on September 22 with proxy votes from people whose main interest is commercial.

Among the list of new members are several executives of Mr Rupert Murdoch's News Corporation, including the astute Ita Buttrose. .

Other interesting new members include VFL architect, Richard Meldrum and former VFL vice-president and St Kilda life member, Graham Huggins,

Collins asks: "Have all these people developed such a sudden love for the Swans that they are willing to pay \$112.50 each just to vote them to Sydney?"

### BARASSI IN ACTION

Ron Barassi's Melbourne side finished last on the VFL premiership ladder this season, but it's a situation that will not continue. There are already plans afoot to recruit players, but the latest leak from the Demons camp is a story that the club may axe ten of its current players over the coming weeks.

## CARMAN CAPERS

Many members of the Melbourne media were tipping a surprise return to league football by Phil Carman for last Saturday's elimination final . . . a late inclusion to add a little more zip to the Bomber forward line.

However, this wasn't to be. Carman lined up in the reserves and was one of four players to be reported after a heated match against South Melbourne.

However, probably mainly due to the lack of suitable player-coaching positions available in WA, he decided to have another crack with the Lions.

The introduction of the centre bouncedown line was also seen as a hurdle for the former East Perth giant as he is a ruckman who likes to bulk at bouncedowns.

However, he made a determined bid to put in a big season and has spent many hours during the season working on his leap.

This included weight training with his legs and jumping and touching a basketball ring at the school where he teaches.

"I don't know if it has added inches to my leap but it has certainly helped my coordination," he said this week.

# FITZPATRICK DOUBT

There are strong forces working within the Carlton club to retain the services of Mike Fitzpatrick next year. The Blues captain has been hotly tipped to return to Subiaco next year, particularly if Carlton win the premiership. However, forces at work at the moment are intending to keep him in Victoria next year, win, lose or draw.



# STAN IN STRIFE

Stan Magro is at the centre of a heated war of words in Victoria following a behind-the-play incident in last Saturday's qualifying final at the MCG.

Geelong player Terry Bright was felled behind the play and Magro has been accused of being responsible. No report followed the incident, but another Geelong player, Neville Bruns was reported for striking Magro a short time after the initial incident.

Bright was carried from the field by trainers and took no further part in the match.

Every time Magro went near the ball for the remainder of the game he was booed by Geelong supporters.

"I was running up the ground, chasing the ball and then I felt a hit from behind".

Magro said he didn't remember much about the incident involving Bright but he was surprised Bruns had been reported.

The rugged former South Fremantle player is almost certainly playing his last season of VFL football. He said this week

"It's pretty certain that I will return to Western Australia next season and eventually I would like to coach if an opportunity came up".

# PRICES UP

The VFL is currently considering next season's admission charges. The hot tip is that it will cost 25 per cent more to see a match in 1982. The price will probably rise from its current \$4 to \$5.

# ANOTHER RICHARDSON

Stephen was Queensland's best player earlier this year when he represented the State in a match against Victoria. He is in the Army and the Bombers are hoping that he will be transferred to Victoria.

False score sheets, a list of best players and goal kickers, and medal votes were



submitted to the SA Amateur Football League by the umpire.

The SA Amateur Football League suspended the teams captain-coaches until July 2, 1982. Premiership points and percentages were taken away from both teams.

# UNWANTED WOMEN!



# SANDOVER SIDELIGHTS

Few judges would query the result of the 1981 Channel 7-Sandover Medal — but the huge 12-vote margin was the surprise.

In a year when Stephen Michael and Jim Krakouer were considered the two hottest football properties, a tight finish was expected.

'However, once again the umpires have seen it differently to the football media. While Michael has won his share of the individual media awards, the general consensus of media voting had Krakouer a big winner.

A survey of the weekly Sandover Medal guide (full details on page 14) showed that the weekly consensus of opinion gave Jim Krakouer 28 votes and Michael 25, with Phil Narkle on 15. Other big vote-getters were Gerard Neesham (24), Alan Johnson (23), Gary Buckenara (19) and Phil Krakouer (17).

As a comparison, the final Sandover Medal voting for those people went this way: Michael 37; J. Krakouer 19; Narkle 25; Neesham 17; Johnson 15; Phil Krakouer 13 and Buckenara 9.

# VOTING CHANGE

It's a helpful move by the WAFL to count the votes in fixture card order — but did you notice the one subtle change at the end?

After following the fixture card diligently throughout the season, the final two voting slips were switched around in order to make Michael's record-breaking top votes for the South-West Perth match the last vote read out.

# STRANGE VOTE

Talking about that final match - and

certainly not taking anything away from Stephen Michael – it did produce an unbelieveable vote by the umpires concerned.

South rover Noel Carter was in a recordbreaking mood; picking up what is believed to be a record number of possessions in a senior game — 34 kicks and 13 handpasses — and capped it off with 11 goals, the highest ever by a WA rover.

Even Michael freely admitted that the media were correct in assessing Carter a unanimous best-on-ground. In fact, Michael felt that he was lucky to get a third vote, with Paul Vasoli also playing a top game.

However, the umpires saw Michael as the top player... and that's going to be a talking point for quite a while.

# UNANIMOUS CHOICES

There were only six times during the year that all the media agreed on the choice of a best-on-ground in the 84 matches — and the umpires agreed on three occasions.

The media's unanimous choices were:
Buckenara, Subiaco v Claremont, April 18;
Michael, South v West Perth, May 23;
Wayne Simms, Perth v Swans, August 1;
Michael, South v Swans, August 22; Johnson, Perth v Subiaco, September 5; and
Carter, South v West Perth, September 5.
The three times the umpires agreed were:
Michael on May 23; Michael again on August 22 and Johnson on September 5.

# CARDINAL SLUMP

West Perth certainly haven't had a good season . . . and the Sandover Medal voting didn't help their morale.

Stephen Michael, in fact, polled more than the entire West Perth team - 37 compared to West Perth's 33.

# CLEVER HANDLER



He has played his best football at centrehalf-back and he is needed there to counter South's dangerman, Gary Lugg.


But with big ruckman Mick McCutcheon out injured, McNeill may have to line up in the ruck to counter his old team mate, Webster.

# TIME FOR CHANGE

It's about time a new voting system was devised for the Sandover Medal.

Last Monday's count showed that it is becoming something of a joke.

While there is no doubt in my mind that Stephen Michael deserved to win, the number of votes he obtained were completely out of line with other media awards.

It seems ridiculous that Michael should score almost double the votes of the player most media considered likely to vie with him for the award, Jim Krakouer.

Krakouer had every reason to be annoyed with the result. Unlike most other awards, he was never a chance.

It raises the question, do umpires look for certain players?

I think it was justice for Michael on Monday night. In some respects, it compensates for 1979 when, to be kind to the umpires, I don't believe he got the recognition he deserved.

He could easily have collected his third successive medal this year.

But forget Michael and look at other examples. There were occasions this year when umpires awarded the votes to three players in a losing team.

Two that come to mind were the second clash between Swan Districts and Subjaco and the last clash between West Perth and Perth.

While there were only a few points in each result it is strange that umpires

couldn't find a player from the winning side to include in their best three.

This is not meant to be a payout on umpires, merely to show the inadequacies of a system that deserves a more professional touch.

For sometime now I've been an advocate for a number of people casting votes for the Sandover Medal, along the same lines as the Simpson Medal.

Certainly there should be someone outside the arena making an assessment.


As it stands the system is biased towards players who are under the umpire's nose. Past records show that, Since 1951 only three players outside of the following division and centreline have won the medal - half forwards Ian Miller and Alan Quartermaine and centre half back Neville Beard.

One only has to look at the number of votes recorded by full forwards Warren Ralph and Simon Beasley this season, Despite some outstanding performances, both were virtually ignored by umpires.

The medal has become a big money award and it is not good enough to have a system where umpires who have been intent on adjudicating matches, rather than make a critical assessment of them, have to determine straight after a game who to award votes to.



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

# Injuries never worried Garry

Scott

It is difficult for a player to reach the 200 game mark, but Garry Scott achieved even more than that.

He strung together 205 games without missing a single match through injury. That was a record and as far as Scott knows it still stands.

It is indeed a remarkable feat for a man who also tallied up 255 games with South Fremantle.

Scott, a physical education instructor at the Kewdale Senior High School, still plays an active part in the game.

He is the Bulldogs' physical education instructor and recently took the reserves for training when regular coach, Peter Dougan could not make the session.

And coaching is something which is not unfamiliar to the man who once held the record for the number of appearances made for South Fremantle.

He had played the most games until Tom Grljusich reached the 258 milestone.

In 1978, Scott, together with John Todd, went to Swan Districts and Scott looked after the reserves side for two seasons. Many of the players he coached then are now playing a big part in Swans bid to win their first premiership since 1963.

"It is a credit to John in regard to the success he has had at Swans," Scott says. "He got rid of a lot of players in his first season and it started to pay dividends last year.

"They are now a force in the competition and must rate a chance of winning the premiership this year."

Scott, who won South's fairest and best award in 1964 and was runner-up on three other occasions, is justly proud of his string of 205 games on the trot and says that players today could achieve the same result if they were more willing to play.

"I think some players who are on contract are not as keen as they should be to play when only slightly injured," he says. "It doesn't matter to them if they don't

play because they still get their money. "I am not knocking players of today, but I think a lot of them lack the real

desire to play." That 'real desire to play' was the reason

behind Scott's incredible run of games without injury.

He recalls that in one game he ran into the fence and needed 11 stitches in his knee. But he still fronted the next week.

He went through the next game without incident but the following week at training he was involved in a mishap which reopened the wound and he was advised to take a rest the following game.

And as much as he wanted to play he spent that game on the sidelines and that was the last game he missed in his career.

Scott said that although South were not strong during his career there were some champions in the ranks, including John Todd, John Gerovich and Fred Seinor.

In addition to that Brian Ciccotosto and Don Haddow were beginning to make their presence felt in the South Fremantle

ranks. It was ironical, however, that during his long career he never played in a grand final.

In the year before he broke into league ranks South Fremantle were beaten by East Fremantle in 1956 and in 1970, the year after his retirement, South won the premiership when they beat Perth by 43 points.

But that was the only achievement Scott failed to notch in his career, because he represented the State 10 times.

He saw some fine ruckmen during his time, including Graham Farmer, Brian

Foley and Keith Slater, but he rates Stephen Michael as the greatest player he has ever seen.

"He has the ability to win a ruck knock and rove his own knock," Scott says, "And that is something I have never seen before.

"I think he is the best of the lot." And Scott would be one of the few people qualified to make such a statement.

Full marks to South Fremantle over the Tony Morley 200-game milestone.

In a season where controversy and bitterness has erupted more than normally required, it is pleasing to see sheer sportsmanship emerge.

Tony Morley has been one of South Fremantle's outstanding footballers over a decade; a former captain and a much-loved leader on and off the field. When he reached his 199th game and broke down with a serious knee injury, it seemed as though he would miss his double-century.

Morley's team-mates voted to have him in the side as an interchange player, thereby virtually tackling West Perth with just 19 fully-fit footballers.

But Morley still played his part in the game.

When he went on to the ground in the final term of South's goal-scoring orgy he kicked their 36th and 37th goals - the first of which broke the club's previous highest record of 35.18 kicked against Subjacc back in 1953.

# Record book points to Royals

This week's finalists, South Fremantle and East Perth, have metin 17 final round games, with the record favouring the Royals with 12 wins to South's four and one drawn game. DRAWS

The teams that have played each other the most in finals are East Fremantle and East Perth, who have met in 28 finals. By contrast, Claremont and West Perth have never met in a final in open football but they did play off in a wartime underage grand final.

East Perth have played in 20 first semifinals, five in succession from 1935 to 1940.

South Fremantle and East Perth have met in four first semi-finals, the first in 1931 was drawn, the Royals won the replay, in 1932 and 1939 East Perth won too. but in 1975 the Bulldogs were successful.

# PRESENT SYSTEM

The present method of deciding finals, the Page System, was started in 1931 and in those 50 years the team that finished fourth on the premiership list has beaten the third side 28 times in the first semifinal

The first semi-final appears as a \*traditionally lower-scoring game for only five times has the winner kicked 20 goals or more. The highest is Subiaco's 26.23 against Perth in 1959, next highest was South 21.13 v East Perth 1975.

# PREMIERSHIP PROSPECTS

\* \* \*

What are the premiership chances of this week's winners? Only nine times in 50 years have they gone on to take the premiership. Those winners were East Perth (1936), South Fremantle (1954), Perth (1955), East Fremantle (1957), Swan Districts (1963), Claremont (1964), East Fremantle (1965), Perth (1977) and East Fremantle (1979).

Drawn finals are rare (how the league would love one for that extra revenue from the replay). In the last 50 years there has only been three, the first semi in 1931 and again in 1944 and in the grand final of 1938 (between Claremont and East Fremantle).

# NOEL'S FEAT

I very much doubt if Noel Carter's tally of 11.4 has ever been bettered by a rover in WA football.

I recall Robert Wiley kicking 10.2 for Perth against Claremont in 1977 and Swans rover Brian Close scoring the same against East Fremantle in 1975. Kevin Taylor twice kicked nine goals the year he headed the goal-kicking list.

# SATISFIED

Supporters and officials of Subiaco have every reason to feel satisfied with the progress made by coach Ken Armstrong. Compare their nine wins this year with two in 1980, three in 1979, five in 1978, seven in 1977 and four in 1976.

# NOSE DIVE

Last year's V.F.L. premiers Richmond, nosedived to seventh place this year, East Fremantle took a similar tumble last season, after winning the pennant in 1979. The biggest collapse by a premiership side was by Hawthorn, winners in 1963, ninth in 1964.

Subiaco's score last week (26.15) was their highest score ever at Lathlain Park. Their previous best was 18.23 back in 1963.
