

Tigers face toughest test

Will the Tigers roar or the Falcons soar after this Sunday's vital clash at Leederville Oval.

That is the question every football follower in WA is asking as two of the league's best-equipped sides shape up for the battle of the season.

The winner could take a firm grip on second spot, while the loser will be back with the rest of the field battling for the other two places in the four. West Perth celebrated after the first-round match and are keen to make

it two wins over last year's premiers.

But Claremont are just as desperate to turn the tables.

Tigers captain-coach Graham Moss said that his side went down by 10 points in their first clash after playing poorly for two quarters and he thinks they can rebound.

"I think West Perth will play in the finals and it is important that we beat them before taking them on in September," he said. "But, most importantly, we have to continue to improve.

"We have played better week by week since they beat us last time and we must continue to play better.

The last time the two teams met West Perth had 10 players unavailable and coach Dennis Cometti says there will be at least six players in their line-up on Sunday who did not play in the first round.

With Claremont's improvement and West Perth's greater strength, this promises to be a memorable match.

It has all the ingredients to be a real crowd drawer.

Cometti says the Falcons will win if they can beat Claremont across the centre and on the ball.

"I think the game will be decided in those positions," he said. "We are similar teams and our strengths are in the same places.

"Their forward line is reputed to be stronger than ours and if we can win across the centre, in particular, it will cut down their opportunities.

"This is a very important game for us.

"If we win, we will make a bridge between ourselves and the other sides fighting for a place in the four — and the heat will be on who ever loses,"

THE ROYAL RAMSS

EAST Perth coach Grant Dorrington would like to see the club change their nickname to Royal Rams.

Dorrington is keen for the Royals to take on the more marketable name, following West Perth's transition from the Cardinals to the Falcons.

The professionally-minded coach made the suggestion to the board of directors after his trip to the US in 1980.

He saw the Los Angeles Rams grid iron side

play and decided it was far more practicable from a promotional point of view.

"Their logo was a charging ram and because Royal Rams sounds catchy and the ram is an Australian animal, I think it suits East Perth," Dorrington said. "We are way behind the times.

"It would be far easier to promote a game between the Falcons and the Rams than West Perth and East Perth. It just sounds better.

"And let's face it, we are not getting enough people to the football and clubs are in trouble financially.

"I know a few traditionallists knocked the idea of West Perth becoming the Falcons, but I think it has worked for them.

"They got all their logos from another American grid iron team, the Atlanta Falcons.

"I think it would be fantastic to see East Perth become the Rams.

"A picture of a charging ram on a tee shirt looks far more impressive than a crown and the kids would wear them." Dorrington said.

"It is all very well for people to knock progress, but clubs are facing uphill battles to get out of the red and they have to make money.

"Just because a club has been known by

another name for 60 years does not mean it cannot be changed."

When Dorrington returned from his trip he submitted a report to the East Perth directors and nothing has been done about it. He is keen to get things moving on the idea now.

East Fremantle are also considering a change of name.

The club's general manager, Bob Uittenbroek, says that a change of name at the club was likely, but added that it was "a long way away".

A number of names including the Bears and the Flyers, have been linked with East Fremantle.



Vasoli's injury



Coaches comments



RARELY have Eastern States recruits, some who regard WA football as a bit of a giggle, figured so prominently in mid-season Channel 7 Sandover Medal calculations.

But a talented visitor could kick himself into the record books this season.

It's not since 1962 when Haydn Bunton junior won the medal that a player from beyond the Nullarbor has taken out the ultimate honour in WA football.

His father did the same in 1938, '39 and '41.

Season 1982 sees three Eastern starboard players — Gary Shaw, Peter Murnane and Peter Thorne — on the frontline of betting for the Sandover.

Each has a genuine hope of putting WA's glamor football trophy on their mantle piece.

And what's more, two of the players have given rivals a head start because they missed the opening of the season.

Murnane missed the opening few matches because of a jarred knee, while Thorne was out early also with a knee complaint. However, the two former Victorian

players have certainly made up for lost time.

Murnane has been a consistent best-

on-ground perfomer. Though he failed in the WA-SA match, the hard-working ruckrover has excelled in club games.

Ironically, West Perth did very little work in getting Murnane into a Blue and Red jumper.

He virtually recruited them. Around finals time last season the former Hawthorn player put himself on the market and his lawyer telephone a number of WA clubs to gauge interest.

Some said wait till the season ended, others couldn't spare the time.

West Perth jumped at the chance and now have one of the best Victorian recruits to play in WA for several seasons.

The key to Murnane's game is his ability to run. He never stops. His game is built around feeding off other players and using the ball extremely well.

However, for Murnane to be going well, West Perth need to be going well.

Thorne put in three exceptional matches in his debut, faded for a few games, but is now back in match-winning form.

Unlike Murnane, Thorne, who bears a striking resemblance to pop star Sonny Bono, shows a liking for the tough going.

In a recent West Perth-East Perth clash, Thorne showed a willingness to tackle Falcons tough man John Duckworth. The tussle was tame, but it did indicate Thorne's aggression.

East Perth have used Thorne with success at centre and on the ball. His ability to pin-point the ball with either foot is a highlight of his game.

Gary Shaw, the fuzzy haired former Queenslander, has been the best rover in the competition.

The Claremont little man, who arrived unheralded last season, has filled the void left by Jim and Phil Krakouer.

He capped off his debut year last season by tieing with Maurice Rioli for the Simpson Medal in the grand final.

Shaw was one of WA's better players in the State debacle in Adelaide and has been the heartbeat behind Claremont's continued success in 1982.

Unlike last season when several players put in absolute blinders, no player has dominated medal counting in 1982. As a result, a low tally, possibly under

20, could win the medal.

Swans Mike Richardson started the season in sensational fashion and must still be outright favorite. But his game has lacked the early sparkle over the last month.

Bruce Monteath could be the surprise packet at the medal count, after playing some exceptional games over the last round.

Team-mate Stephen Michael is reaching top form and his name will be going into the umpires' book after a sluggish start.

East Fremantle and Subiaco lack genuine contenders for the Sandover, while Perth's Bryan Cousins and Cam Sherpherd will poll votes.

Shaw's most serious club rival appears to be winger Allen Daniels, while Ross Gibbs, Peter Menaglio and Rod Alderton will press Murnane for votes.


Thorne has a relatively free run at East Perth. No Royal looks likely to rob him of a big number of votes. Since his return from the East, Peter Spencer has played a few good games, while John Ironmonger was a consistent performer early in the year.

However, apart from Richardson, the trio from the East have the eye-catching appeal to win a lot of votes from the umpires. It wouldn't surprise me to see one of them take out the honors.

My prediction is Gary Shaw, who has shown that his style of game appeals to the umpires after he won the Simpson Medal last year.

Now it's young Bill's turn in Victoria



THE name Duckworth has been prominent in football circles for many years — right across the nation.

First it was John Duckworth, bigkicking full-back for Fitzroy, later to return to his home State to be a West Perth star and then a Magarey Medalist during a two-year stint in South Australia.

Then along came Billy, the second of the Duckworth kids.

Big John came home from Adelaide just to play alongside younger brother Bill at West Perth where Bill had made a name for himself in his first year by taking off all the best first-year player awards.

But the reunion was short-lived; lasting just one year before Bill joined the Eastern States trek, migrating to Essendon after just 33 games with the Cardinals.

Both players are strong defenders, though, of course, John has played in a variety of roles ranging from the ruck to key forward positions. Bill made his name as a half-back flanker, showing strength and aggression — sometimes too much aggression, as he often admits — and the flair to be an attacking defender.

At the age of just 23 the Kondinin farmer moved to Victoria with a healthy reputation; but not really expecting to set the football world agog with his feats — and not attracting glamour headlines.

That didn't worry the confident Duckworth — football did. And as the season has progressed, so has Duckworth's reputation in the VFL; particularly when it comes to 'stopping' big-name players in opposition sides.

Essendon coach Kevin Sheedy has groomed Duckworth as a key member of their defence, often playing him out of the back pocket to guard the dangerous roaming forwards employed by many VFL sides. He has also fitted in well at full-back or on a half-back flank.

Football writer ALAN EAST caught up with Bill Duckworth for this after-game interview in the Essendon dressing rooms.

Q: Do you feel that the forwards probably tackle a bit quicker and stronger in the VFL?

A: Yes, they put a lot more pressure on you when you are trying to come out of defence.

Q: Obviously you must be fairly satisfied with the way you have settled down in Victoria?

A: Yes, I've settled down allright and I'm happy with my football progress. It's a different sort of game over here; you don't have that much time to get rid of the ball. At home you could take a few steps before you get rid of the ball; but you can't do that here. You've only got one or two steps here at the most.

Q: How did the start of the season go for you? Did you have much trouble getting going?

A: No, I started okay. I've played every game since the season started. I played my first game at full-back, but since then I've played mostly in a back pocket.

Q: Kevin Sheedy seems content to let you be an attacking player as well as a tight defender. Does that suit you?

A: I just try to play my own game and try to stop forwards kicking too many goals. Sheedy has moulded me into their team style of game, but he lets me be an attacking player. He's a fairly hard coach, keeps us on our toes.

Q: Do you train much harder over here?
A: Yes, I train four nights a week, about two hours a time and then I do weights work on top of that. I find the training a lot harder over here than in WA. You have to be running all the time; you don't get a break.

Q: A lot of WA people felt that your decision to come over to Victoria was a surprise one in view of your inexperience. How did you feel about that?

A: It could have affected me early; I used to have a bit of trouble getting into the game. But now that I'm here I'm enjoying it. I always thought I could make it; I just had to apply myself.

Q: What influenced you to come to Essendon in the first place?

A: Simply to try myself out in VFL football.

Q: Have you any thoughts about the future? How long do you think you might stay in Victoria?

A: I don't know really, I'll just play it as I see it.

Q: Have you managed to get a suitable job?

A: Yes, I'm working on a farm actually and it's really good. It's just past the Tullamarine airport, about 20 kms out.

Q: What other things have impressed you about Victorian football?

A: The atmosphere is unbelieveable. The big crowds all the time really make it exciting to play. The people really take their football seriously. The players are a good bunch of blokes; have a few beers after the game and they really take you in.

Q: Do you find it a lot more physical in Victoria than you imagined?

A: It's tough allright. You get tackled harder and put to the ground a lot more.

Q: There's quite a bit of West Australian influence at Essendon, isn't there?

A: Yes, it's been good having Tony Buhagiar and Wayne Otway here. Budgie' has been great both on and off the field. His form is terrific and now Wayne's settling in well and starting to play good footy.

Q: Who are some of the toughest opponents you've come across so far?

A: Probably Mike Fitzpatrick, from Carlton. It was his first game back after injury and he played in the forward pocket and was really hard to handle. He's so strong. Probably my best game was against Richmond early on.

Q: Will you be coming home for the summer?

A: I'll probably come over for a couple of weeks and go back to the farm for a break.

FOR FALCONS

THE moment of truth has arrived for West Perth. They are riding high at the moment, having won seven of their past eight matches.

BUT there are some who still doubt they have the ability to win the premiership.

Tomorrow should provide an indication, even though the game is at Leederville Oval.

Last year's premiers, Claremont, have tended to be overshadowed by West Perth and Swan Districts this season. However, they showed last Saturday that they are back in business.

It needs to be remembered that even in their four losses this season Claremont were very competitive.

West Perth are playing with a lot of confidence and are capitalising on an abundance of small mobile players. The Tigers will need to tag them if they hope to stop the Falcons.

The Tigers tended to give too much latitude to the Swan Districts mobile division last week. It would be fatal against West Perth who find it easy to exploit opponents if they are allowed to link their play together.

A win for either side will put them in the box seat to play off in the second semi final this season and gain a double chance in the finals.

It should be sufficient incentive to make this one of the best matches of the season.



SOUTH Fremantle are in danger of missing the final four for the first time since Mal Brown took over as coach in 1978.

They look set to be downed by league leaders Swan Districts when they meet at Bassendean Oval on Saturday.

A loss would put them a game and percentage behind their main rival for

fourth spot, East Perth. It would take a big effort in the last round to bridge the gap.

South have paid dearly for a big run of injuries to top players this season.

They are not likely to get any reprieve against Swans who will be smarting from their narrow loss to Claremont last week. Swans probably consider themselves unlucky to have lost.

Swans aren't playing as well as when they slaughtered South at Fremantle Oval in the first round, but they should be able to win this match and thrust South right into the hot seat.



EAST Perth are poised to take a firm grip on a place in the top four.


That will be enough for them to add another losing notch to Subiaco's record this season when they meet at Subiaco Oval on Saturday.

Forget about their first round clash when Subiaco almost snatched their first win for the season.


East Perth are now starting to gather momentum in their drive for a place in the four, while Subiaco look as though they have had the stuffing knocked right out of them with 13 successive losses.

INTERSTATE UPDATE

COACHING JOBS DOMINATE NEWS

COACHING positions are still dominating football news in Melbourne with fresh rumours of replacements at Geelong and St Kilda and new tips for successors at Collingwood and Footscray in 1983.

Following their pitiful performance against Melbourne last Saturday, there has been plenty of talk in Victoria this week about the future of Geelong coach Bill Goggin.

Among names mentioned to replace him are current captain and former Sandover Medallist, Brian Peake and South Fremantle coach Mal Brown. Brown has also been linked with the Collingwood job.

Other names being thrown in for the Geelong job include former Collingwood coach Tom Hafey and Richmond coach Tony Jewell... both sacked this season from their old clubs. Former Hawthorn ruckman Don Scott has also been mentioned as a possible candidate.

Although St Kilda is still denying it is dissatisfied with Alex Jesaulenko, rumours are gathering strength that Tom Hafey will be in charge of the Saints next season. One Melbourne commentator said this week that Jezza and his wife, Anne, were considering a transfer to Queensland next year.

Kevin "Cowboy" Neale is the latest name linked with the 1983 coaching post at Footscray. Neale is currently coaching the Ainslie club in Canberra.

One Melbourne critic summed up the financial constraints Footscray had in their bargaining power to attract a top coach when he write this week "... the Bulldogs can't even afford the paint to bring their honours board up to date".

Going West

The handy profit collected by the VFL from the big gate takings in Adelaide for their recent clash with South Australia will be swallowed up with the expenses expected for the July 13 game against WA in Perth.

The WAFL will not cover all the expenses of the 40 strong VFL contingent which is expected to travel to Perth.

CATOGGIO STILL OUT

Former Subiaco and Carlton rover Vin Catoggio is yet to win a reprieve from Melbourne's match committee. He was relegated to the club's supplementary league list in April and is still there.

GLENDINNING FAVOURED

Ross Glendinning is firming in favouritism to take out this year's Brownlow Medal and become only the second West Australian to achieve the feat.

Several unofficial bookmakers have him as outright favourite. He holds a one point lead in the Sunday Observer Footballer of the Year Award and is joint leader with Leigh Matthews in the Sunday Press Footballer of the Year Award.



Great moment for Bulldogs

Stand-in Footscray coach "Bluey"
Hampshire was "King of Footscray"
last Saturday night after the Bulldogs
downed Hawthorn in the upset of the
season.

Wins have been few and far between at Western Oval and chanting fans crammed into the changerooms after the game singing the club's theme song.

However, the day could easily have been marred for Hampshire as he was lucky not to have been reported by the umpires. At the three-quarter time changeover he raced over to the umpires in the centre of the ground and gestured at them.

He said after the match that he wasn't happy with some of their decisions and wanted to let them know.

The win was also one of the brightest moments for president Tony Capes, who has had to survive an election, the sacking of Royce Hart, a string of defeats and talk of the club moving to Queensland.

THE elation in the Footscray camp last week after they had downed VFL giant Hawthorn had to be seen to be believed.

Peter Wilmoth, writing in Melbourne's Age newspaper, was there to capture it . . . and here are some of his quotes:

"There was an electricity in the crowd, a long buzz like an over-worked phone line..."

"There were tears and wild laughter, hugs and kisses."

"A feverish disbelief on the faces of Footscray fans, a small riot outside the rooms when the doorman refused entry."

"The rooms shivered with excitement."

"The victory — when they kicked eight goals to none in the final term — was a triumph for a Footscray stalwart, Bluey Hampshire, the man thrown to the wolves with the coaching job on the sacking of Royce Hart."

"Hampshire is a man's man; a tough no-holds-barred footballer who tells it as he sees it."

Evidence: "The win is an obvious reaction from people that are kicked in the arse so much. Players responded to the fact that we weren't going to accept it any more."


PARKIN ANGRY

Carlton's 1982 premiership coach, David Parkin has hit out at the increasing violence in football.

He said this week "Somehow there is a misguided idea that the marketing of football is dependent on violence".

He is particularly incensed at the growing number of head-high tackles. In the game at VFL Park between Richmond and Essendon last Saturday, statisticians counted 37 head high tackles and only nine were penalised by the umpires.

Parkin said: "Head high tackles should be outlawed immediately and reported and the offending players disqualified".

FORMER West Torrens captain John Cassin could be back at Thebarton before the June 30 deadline.

Cassin, 31, has quit Fitzroy, his third VFL side, and is believed to be coming back to Adelaide for business reasons. Torrens is anxious to get Cassin back

into its colors.

\$15,000 for Tim Rendell and it's believed the Eagles could forget about that debt for a free transfer for Cassin.

Cassin joined Torrens in 1975 from Essendon and captained the side in 1976.

He returned to Melbourne to play for North Melbourne in 1977 and last season was transferred to Fitzroy.



ROBRAN BACK

RODNEY Robran was recalled to the North Adelaide side for the game against West Torrens.

Robran was overlooked for the first four games and got back for three before being dropped for the next three.

Unfortunately he was taken to hospital after suffering a painful injury during the first quarter of the match.

Robran was forced out when the top eyelid of his left eye was split open by an accidental poke by a finger.

It was feared he might have suffered bleeding behind the eye. That was not the case and doctors at the hospital stitched the lid and sent him home.

***** PIES ACTIVE

Collingwood was still trying to woo State centre half-back Greg Phillips, depsite his contract with Port Adelaide.

Collingwood's football manager John Birt and new coach Mick Erwin talked with Phillips after the interstate match at Football Park.

Birt and Erwin were in the WA dressing room immediately the game finished, then went to the SA room.

Later they spoke to Phillips at the aftermatch function for the SA and WA players.



WEST AUSTRALIA'S THREE MUSKETEERS

Nicknamed the 'Three Musketeers' of Western Australian football, Harold Boyd, Jim Craig and Jim Gosnell comprised the West Perth half-back line during the 1920's and no senior Australian Rules club had a better first-line defence than did the Cardinals during this period.

All were great high marks, with perhaps Boyd being the best, all specialised in long clearing kicks, all began at approximately the same time, all were 'dashers' on the field, all were automatic State and Carnival representatives and all won the coveted Sandover Medal - Boyd in 1922, Gosnell in 1924 and Craig in 1927.

Of the three players, Gosnell was the most versatile as he often played in the centre position for Western Australia due to a glut of great half-backs in the West at this time - players of the calibre of Ray Mudie (East Fremantle), Bill Hilton and Reg Brentnall (East Perth) and Arthur Green and Bill Brophy (Subiaco).

Boyd was born at Boulder City in 1900 and was only 18 years of age when he began with West Perth in 1918. At 5ft 11in and close on 12 stone, he more often than not played at centre-half-back, although he occasionally played on the flank as all three players were inter-changeable.

Boyd played until 1926 when he retired with 160 club games to his credit. In 1929-30 he became club non-playing coach.

He was also West Perth captain during 1922 and 1923 and played in two carnivals - the victorious Western Australian side at Perth in 1921 and the other in Hobart in 1924.

Craig, of slighter build and weight than Boyd, played for a longer period - 1918 to 1931 - and was club captain in 1930.

He was a beautifully balanced player and rode many a bump when clearing from the West Perth half-back line with long driving kicks.

He played a total of 216 club games for the Cardinals, the highest of the trio and was chosen for the 1924 Hobart Carnival as well as the 1927 one in Melbourne.

Gosnell was the best wet weather player of the three, a fact that he proved in the mud at Hobart in the 1924 Carnival at halfback and centre.

He was also selected for the 1927 Melbourne Carnival but dislocated his arm some three weeks before the event and had to be replaced.

Gosnell commenced in 1918 and retired in 1929 missing two years when he played in the Goldfields during 1920-21. He was -club vice-captain in 1928 but was not chosen as club captain during his West Perth career of 150 games.

As well as winning the Sandover Medal he was equal second in 1925 with Jack Guhl (East Perth) and Wilf Brophy (Subiaco) and was outright runner-up in 1926 to Johnny Leonard.

Behind this great trio was one of the toughest and best full-backs in the business in Fred Wimbridge, to make the West Perth defence the most difficult to pierce during the 1920's.

Strangely enough, Boyd, Craig and Gosnell never played in a club premiership side as West Perth did not break their 27 year premiership drought until 1932 when all three champions had retired.

INFORMATION SOUGHT ON SANDLAND

SOUTH Australian media man Bernard Whimpress is looking West for help . . .

He is currently doing some football research on the men who have won Magarey Medals for South Australia's best and fairest footballer.

A player named Phil Sandland won the 1901 Magarey Medal when playing for North Adelaide - and the records produce very little information about him.

Apparently he lived in WA for quite a while and survived to the ripe old age of 80 or more.

VIC. RULES



"I was surprised at the decision and I did not think they would change their minds before the June 30 clearance deadline."

"The only reason I can give for their refusal to clear Derek to us is that they

believe he could be of commercial value on the VFL market," Mr Harper said.

Shaw had been determined to make the grade with Collingwood this year, but so far he has struggled to find form.

South Fremantle also spoke to football's Mr Volatile, Mark Jackson, but he was bound to the Melbourne Football Club by contract and decided to remain in Victoria.

Although the Bulldogs have not solved their immediate problem, they did recruit a good young prospect from Tasmania.

Peter Hardman, a 6ft 4in (193cm), 15st. (95 kg) key forward player with the reserves side last week against Subiaco and showed promise.

He is only 19 and played with the Richmond reserves last year.

Hardman is an all round sportsman. He played Linton and Reid Cup tennis for Tasmania.

Each of the eight junior clubs name a member to be a tribunal representative when called on.



Swans effort was weak

SWAN Districts have made a mockery of the Escort Cup by selecting a reserves side.

If they think so little of the competition then they should have allowed another WA side to take their place.

Swans put up a pretty weak argument why they shouldn't send their best side.

Okay, they were entitled to be annoyed, and even react to the change of date for their match against Richmond.

They are not entitled to denigrate WA football by sending only a token side to Victoria. It will do little for the image of WA football.

Swans put the argument that they did not want to play a tough game against Richmond in between two important games at home.

It surprises me. Swans aim is to win the premiership. Surely a match against a side of Richmond's ability would be a good test for them, particularly with the finals looming.

There is little doubt Swans will make the four. While their place at the top of the premiership ladder will be in jeopardy if they lose to South Fremantle they will still be in the box seat to play off in the second semi final.

But if they consider the domestic competition more important than the Escort Cup then they should not take part in it.

TODD'S MOOD

AND while on Swans. Here's a memo to their coach John Todd, which will probably draw the predictable response from him when I next venture into the Swans clubroom.

John, as a coach I respect you. As a footballer I admired you. But I don't like the way you use your clubroom to denigrate media when they venture in for after-match comments.

I've copped a blast from you twice in recent weeks, both on topics that had no relevance to the game.

Quite frankly, like some other media, I've become fed up with it.

You accuse people of lacking courage. . remember last week?

Tell you what John, it takes a lot more courage to venture into your clubrooms after a game knowing you're likely to get a blast than it does launching a tirade against someone when you have all your own people around you.

To react against your comments is to only spark an incident that could be quite ugly.

I was warned not to approach you last week . . . but I did. Another sign of lacking courage I suppose? It amuses me the way you react to the media. You drag up incidents that have no relevance whatsoever to the occasion. You

just look for a target to direct your frustrations.

Let me jog your memory. I ghosted you in a newspaper column the year before you got back into coaching (East Fremantle). You didn't pull any punches then. Remember Alan Joyce?

In fact, you were a very incisive critic. So why criticise other people for the same thing?

I can understand you getting upset after a game. Football is a game that draws emotions.

Football coaching is a very tenuous business. The length of time a coach retains his position is normally dependent on how a side performs. So I know you're playing for high stakes.

But we also have a job. I'm paid to write about football . . . not to please a coach, officials or players. It would be a dull old game if the media became public relations officers for the game.

I don't have to come into the clubrooms to get a coach's comment. But I do. I am certainly not going to allow myself to be intimidated by a coach who displays petulance after a match.

If you don't want to talk to the media . . . or certain members of it . . . then that's your prerogative. But I don't see why they should be an outlet for your frustrations.

You have every right to fire a broadside at media members if you feel they have been unfair, but it shows a lack of character to do it in an environment that only suits you - and where it would be injudicious to retaliate.

And, oh yes, John I expect to be at your game again this week . . . and I WILL be coming into the clubrooms.

I can't be accused of lacking courage again . . . though I will make sure I don't forget my glasses.

He also served as chairman and sat on over 250 cases and was known widely for his fairness. In 1976, Mr Smith was honoured with life membership of the W.A.A.F.L.





Tom Price to host '82 series

Football attention in the Pilbara will focus on Tom Price on the weekend of July 3 and 4 as the North West's top four football leagues compete in the 1982 BP Pilbara football championships.

It will be only the second time in the seven year history of the championships that Tom Price has been the host town.

The Fortescue National Football League which is based in Tom Price has been the most successful team in past championships and will relish the home ground advantage.

Fortescue has won the title on three occasions... their last success being in Karratha in 1979. Prior to that they had wins in the first carnival at Newman in 1976 and at Tom Price in 1978 when they were last hosts for the series. Though suffering a narrow defeat, they showed plenty of class in an interleague match at Newman recently:

The West Pilbara league is the only competing body which has never won the title. They went down by two points to De Grey in last year's grand final. Since then the standard of football in the Karratha area has improved tremendously and 1982 may be the year for West Pilbara to crack the ice.

The De Grey league, which had long been an enigma in the championships. won their first ever championship when the carnival was held in their home base — Port Hedland — last year. It is surprising that De Grey have not figured more prominently in previous carnivals, as their side is drawn from the biggest populated area in the north.

The Newman league won the second ever carnival — when held in Port Hedland in 1977 — and took the title again in 1980 when they hosted the carnival.

Newman showed they would be a force in this year's series when they beat Fortescue by four points in a thrilling interleague "grudge match" in Newman on June 5.

Fortescue National Football League president, Don Pearce, said yesterday that his league was leaving no stone unturned to make this year's carnival a resounding success.

He expressed his appreciation to Adrian Marshall, the main motivator behind the formation of the championships, and league secretary Mrs D. Molnar.

The standard of football and spectator interest in the championships improves year by year and the series is now recognised as one of the biggest annual football attractions outside the metropolitan area.



Historic move for NW football

The annual BP Pilbara football championships were first held in 1976.

However, the history of the annual carnival goes back as far as 1973, when a current life member of the championship committee, Adrian Marshall, started writing to other North West leagues in an effort to get such an event off the ground.

It wasn't until 1975, then mainly through the perseverance of Marshall, that all leagues got together to formally discuss the idea of an annual series. There was an immediate decision reached to stage a carnival and formalities were ironed out at another meeting in the same year.

It was decided that the venue for the carnival would be alternated each year between the home towns of the competing leagues. Newman was chosen as the venue for the inaugural 1976 series.

BP (Aust.) was approached and agreed to sponsor the championships. An initial annual commitment of \$4,500 was later increased to \$5,000.

The inaugural Pilbara national championships president Mr Colin Matheson (from the De Grey) was awarded life membership in 1978 and in 1980 Ray Turner (West Pilbara), Ray Williams (Newman) and

They ran out winners against a dogged Upper Great Southern team in the Agrade final in 1981 and, if anything, their side looks even better equipped this year.



The Tigers are well represented in the leading group as centreman Wayne Blackwell is their nearest rival on 78.








