

DORRO TO MEET MASIE HIS MASTER



He had just been told by doctors that because of head injuries incurred while playing with East Perth, he would be best advised to give the game away.

Dorrington had been knocked out in the third game of the 1972 season for the eighth time in his 47 game career.

Mal Brown, the East Perth coach of the day, could see that Dorrington was depressed and suggested that he should become a schools coach — which meant going to high schools and conducting coaching clinics.

Since then the pair have been close friends — and when Brown told Dorrington that he had the ability to become a league coach, it was the inspiration he needed to tackle the job.

Dorrington has the greatest respect for Brown.

ENEMIES

However, this Saturday the two will be enemies as Dorrington (the pupil) takes on Brown (the master) in the coaching stakes.

Friendships will be forgotten for 2½ hours as both men call on all their football reserves in a bid to sink the other.

They are fighting for a place in the 1982 final round and they will pull no punches in their attempt to win.

Dorrington will coach East Perth, who currently hold fourth spot on the ladder, while Brown will be the inspiration behind the challengers — South Fremantle who are just four premiership points behind in fourth spot.

Brown, a top player in his day, has also made a name for himself as a fine coach and Dorrington is desperate to win the crown from him.

But the pupil knows a lot of things are against him in Saturday's battle.

Firstly, it is on the Bulldogs' home territory and East Perth have not won at Fremantle Oval since 1977. Secondly South Fremantle have not been out

of the four since 1977 and they have played in the last three grand finals.

In their last two pressure matches, the Royals have faded in the last quarter to go down to Swan Districts and West Perth when they had every chance of





STAGE SET FOR GREAT



ROUND FINAL

THE stage is set for some magnificent finalround football now that Swan Districts, Claremont, West and East Perth seem destined to fight out the business end of the season.

Throughout the 1982 season, these clubs have regularly produced a balanced side with the major ingredients for success being six star players, supported by 14 capable, earnest team footballers.

They have top coaches too!

John Todd, Graham Moss, Dennis Cometti and Grant Dorrington are men with intelligence, knowledge and imagination.

They have experimented with positional changes; practised attacking and defensive routines and are tactically geared for the financial part of the season.

But what is needed to win a grand final? Some theorists declare that big men win big matches.

If this is true, Ron Boucher, Allan Sidebottom, Graham Moss, Baden Harper, Ben Jager, John Duckworth, John Ironmonger and Craig Edwards carry a huge responsibility.

Others believe that little men pave the way to victory.

All four clubs are well endowed in this department.

Players of the calibre of Ed Blackaby, Graham Melrose, Phil Narkle, Gary Shaw, Lindsay Kanther, Les Fong, Peter Menaglio, Peter Spencer and Chris Allen are all proven big-game performers.


Goals on the board win matches! Close-checking backmen make winning possible!

Claremont's Warren Ralph and Steve Malaxos edge out West Perth's running scorers in forward supremacy; but Swans and East Perth have tighter defences.

Depth of reserves is a vital factor too. In this department Claremont have the edge. To be able to field 20 fit players in finals is a luxury enjoyed by few teams.

Claremont, too, hold an advantage knowing that their players have proved they know what final-round matches are all about. Gary Shaw, Graham Moss, Warren Ralph and Wayne Blackwell are players who excel under extreme pressure.

Of the four sides, Claremont seem to have a slight edge. But the evenness of the competition will prove to be a box office sell-out for the League.



VIC. DOCTOR

Dr Fraser has been head of the sports injury section of Fitzroy for years.

Victoria's Gary Wilson and W.A.'s Mike Fitzpatrick suffered similar injuries during the game - but Dr Fraser diagnosed Wilson as dazed in contrast to Fitzpatrick who was 'concussed'.

There is no doubt that the word 'dazed' is a gentler way of putting it; and much better for the promotion of football.

Incidentally, after completing his medical course at University John reached the Wimbledon semi-final in doubles with brother Neale.

The idea that goal umpires wear red gloves is a good one. Spectators waiting on the result of a kick cannot always see the umpire's hands, so must wait for the wave of flags.

Parkin's way

Despite a crowded room of jubilant Victorian footballers and officials, coach David Parkin found time to go back to the oval for a post-match interview for Channel 7 news - now that's Victorian know-how! Incidentally, Parkin thought that Stephen McCann was Victoria's best player.

Parkin may have worked out a winning move by exploiting the interchange placement at Subiaco Oval. Positioned between the dugout race of both teams in the forward pocket, Victorian interchange players kicked three goals by simply running straight onto the field to accept a pass.

The winger would run off; his counterpart would run through halfforward down to the pocket and mark uncontested.

They made the move look too easy.

W.A.'s runner, Ken McAullay, was sent out to ask Victorian umpire Glenn James why a kick had gone against W.A.

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TICEEDS

CAREMONT FOOTBALL CLUB

Success comes to those who want it badly enough and that certainly applies to Claremont ruckman Baden Harper.

After making his league debut in 1975 when he played just one game and then played a handful of matches the following year he returned to his home town of Albany because of illness.

However, after playing there for a couple of seasons, he decided to have another crack at the competitive world of league football.

It was a move that Claremont must be overjoyed with. Since returning to the Tigers he has developed into one of the most versatile players in the game.

He can be used in the ruck where his exceptional leap and ball skills make him difficult to counter. He also showed in recent matches that he can also play in key defensive and attacking positions.

Undoubtedly the highlight of his career was making his interstate debut against Victoria last month and following it up with another good effort against South Australia.

He is now being recognised as one of the State's top players and Westside Football's GARY STOCKS spoke to the rising star about his football future and found out many other interesting things about the Claremont big man.

Q: How hard did you have to work to get to the top?

A: Well, I started playing football in Albany in 1974. I didn't play any junior football, while I was at school I played hockey. I played goal-keeper and made the State country team. I had a chance to play in the State schoolboys side, but the State country team was touring Tasmania and the other side was just playing in Perth so I decided to go on the tour.

Q: What about the rise to the stage to where you were selected in the State games against South Australia and Victoria last month – did you enjoy that?

A: Yes, that was one of the highlights of my career. I didn't really think I would play against Victoria, but I thought I had a reasonable chance of making the side for the game against South Australia because I apparently just missed out on selection for the match in Adelaide. Because of the limited restrictions only four players could go and with Graham Moss, Wayne Blackwell, Gary Shaw and Warren Ralph in the team there wasn't any room for me. They could only take four and unfortunately I was number five. I really enjoyed playing on blokes like Barry Round, David O'Halloran and Justin Madden against Victoria.

Q: Do you think your versatility helped you gain selection for both the interstate games?

A: I think so. I started the game against South Australia at centre-half-forward in the first quarter. Then I was moved to a half-forward flank, after that I went to the back pocket and then I played centre-half-back and then I went onto the ball and finished up at full-forward.

Q: You must have enjoyed pulling down a couple of big marks and kicking a couple of goals?

A: Well it was a change anyway. I normally drop those marks.

Q: Did your parents come up from Albany to watch the two games?

A: Mum and Dad came up for the Victorian match and Dad came back up again for the South Australian game.

Unfortunately Mum could not get time off work for the Saturday game.

Baden Harper . . . a late starter going places.

Q: When you came up in 1975 and made your debut what made you go back to the country?

A: I played one league game in 1975 and then I played four or five league games in 1976. The following year I started off in the senior side but came down with gradular fever and that kept me out for over a month and I wasn't really happy with my work and added to that I was feeling a bit crook so I thought I would retire and go back to Albany. The training was too hard when I was able to get back onto the track because I was too far behind the rest of the guys with my fitness. So I went back to Albany and had a rest. I stayed there until 1980. I played for Royals down there in 1979 and captained the team to a premiership. I also played in a premiership with them in 1977. In 1979 I won the Cobber Cook medal for the best man on the ground in the grand final and then I decided to come back to Claremont.

Q: What made you come back to the city?

A: I wanted to have a go before I got too old. Claremont were always asking me to come back every year and it was something I wanted to do.

Q: What about when you were playing hockey, did you follow football at all?

A: I wasn't really interested in it but I did follow it a little bit.

Q: Did you play any other sports with success?

A: I played basketball and volleyball, I was in the State volleyball side. I took up volleyball in 1979 and when I came to Perth I played with Hawks before transferring to Wanneroo but because of football I had to pull out of the State team. I really enjoyed volleyball but I haven't been able to play at all this year. I can't get to training and they play on Sunday morning. Half the time I can't get out of bed on

Sunday morning because of Saturday's game so I just had to give it away.

Q: What about the VFL - any thoughts about going there?

A: I'll just see what happens. I'll go if I get a decent offer and Claremont let me go. I am under contract for another two years but if I am going to play in Victoria I will have to go pretty soon before I get too old. If Claremont kept to my contract I would be 28 before I could go and I think I would be too old to succeed over there. I want to play two seasons over there and then finish my playing days back here.

Q: Apart from playing VFL football, do you have any other ambitions?

A: Only to play more consistently, play in a few more premiership sides and perhaps take out some of the individual awards. It would be a great honour to win a fairest and best and best award at Clarmont. It is always good to be your club's best player.

Q: It must have been hard in your early days when you had to teach yourself all the facets of the game,

A: I didn't find it really hard because I was lucky in that I was probably just a natural sportsman. I always had a good leap and that stood me in good stead for football. When I was at high school I won a State title for high jumping in 1973. I was also reasonably successful at basketball. I never made any State country teams but I was told once that I was considered for selection in the under-20 team. When I came up here I played a couple of games and that was it. I was asked to play for one of the A-grade sides up here but I turned it down.

Q: It must have been difficult to turn your back on all those other sports to tackle league football?

A: Yes. It was not easy. But as much as I wanted to play the other sports when it came down to a decision I realised I enjoyed football more.

SOUTH Fremantle will toast their return to the four after they dispose of East Perth at Fremantle Oval on Saturday.

South will really make those critics who wrote them off two matches ago, choke on their words.

The Royals blew their chance to cement their place in the four last week and it may anchor them out of the finals for only the second time since 1966.

The Royals really struggle against South at Fremantle Oval and now that the Bulldogs have been given a reprieve, they are unlikely to blow the chance.

South will approach this match knowing that they not only have to win, but win well to give themselves a chance of holding fourth spot in a tougher run home than the Royals.

Perhaps it was only a co-incidence, but it is worth noting that South went goal crazy against East Fremantle last week around the same time West Perth took the lead from the Royals.

They know they have been given another chance to make the finals and they are unlikely to squander that opportunity, particularly before a home crowd.


The Falcons will well and truly avenge that first round-loss to Old Easts.

West Perth, though in third spot, appear to be in the most comfortable position of the top three sides.

They have two relatively easy games before their clash with Claremont in the last round.

A win against Old Easts and Perth next week could even put them into second spot before the final game.



SWAN Districts received a savage tongue lashing from coach John Todd at half time last week. It had the desired effect as Swans steamrolled Perth in the second half after trailing at half time.

Todd is unlikely to let his players forget what he had to say against Perth, particularly as Swans have shown signs of faltering over the past two weeks.


The Demons look as though they will again be given a caning when they meet the Tigers at Subiaco Oval on Saturday.

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INTERSTATE UPDATE

HAW SWANS ROWBREWS

Fresh trouble is brewing in The Swans camp.

The club, which was ravaged with internal strife last summer after it announced the move to Sydney and a name change, is facing a new round of infighting.

Kevin Campbell, who retired from the board of management in a blaze of controversy last week, appears set to head a new take-over bid.

Only a matter of days after his resignation he declared "You haven't heard the last of me".

While Swans, under coach Ricky Quade, have acquitted themselves well this season, with the club holding on to sixth spot and making a desperate bid to reach the finals, the shift to Sydney is still simmering.

Mr Campbell says he plans to go ahead with his plans to make The Swans a viable proposition in the Harbour city.

He revealed this week that he planned to move, through his employment, to Sydney to become involved in the financial and marketing side of the club.

He said: "The people who count in Sydney have to know that it is a financially viable club, and that's why I undertook the report".

The report to which he referred was leaked last week and suggested that the club needed a more dynamic coach in the mould of Ron Barassi if they were to project a big image in Sydney.

His report also criticised the marketing section of the club. When general manager Barry Rogers and chairman of selectors Tony Franklin threatened to resign over the report, a special meeting was called and Mr Campbell himself quit.

Mr Campbell said this week he has another two reports on the financial position of the club which he is considering making public.

Jezza wants to meet umpires

Alex Jesaulenko is the latest VFL coach to express concern at the performance of umpires.

Well some weeks ago I saw the controversial chairman in London with a street directory in one hand and scratching his head with the other, he appeared to be well and truly "lost".


Speculation over

Russell Sparks can thank his lucky stars that he didn't end up in the hot water after last Saturday's match at Perth Oval. Shortly after the start of the third quarter he pushed umpire Darryle Gillies after the umpire had awarded a West Perth player a free kick. Most umpires would have reported the player for such an incident, however Gillies simply penalised the incident with a 15 metre penalty. Shortly after, Sparks "rolled" West Perth's Geoff Hendriks in a behind-the-play incident. All this must have been too much for coach Grant Dorrington, who soon after removed Sparks from the ground. I would have liked to hear what he said to the volatile young player when he landed on the bench.



West Perth have certainly been the trend setters with promotion this year, but it appears their efforts and success have not been contagious.

If ever a game cried out for promotion it was the one at Perth Oval last Saturday.

It was the last opportunity the Royals had this season to show that they too could reap the benefits of some promotion. Their only remaining home game is against Subiaco.

West Perth and East Perth matches are traditionally big crowd pullers ... in fact the league record for a qualifying match was at Perth Oval when West Perth met the Royals on May 31, 1969. On that day 26,760 people turned out to see the two teams do battle.

The first two encounters between West Perth and East Perth this season have been classy matches. In fact, the first round match at Perth Oval was one of the best this year.

So with all these factors evident, last Saturday's match had the makings of a promoter's dream.

Apparently football is not the only thing that the Royals can learn from West Perth.

Pathetic surface

The people responsible for the ground at Perth Oval certainly cannot be too proud of their efforts. In parts, it resembles Scarborough Beach. Where the ground isn't covered with sand - a couple of centimetres deep in parts it's brown. There isn't enough green grass on the entire ground to cover an indoor planter.

Scoreboard too

While at Perth Oval, I've also got a brickbat for the scoreboard attendants. At times they were at least 30 minutes behind with changes to scores at other grounds and they had all scores off the board within two minutes of the game finishing, and before the end of some of the other games.

... and what about the coaches?

Still at Perth Oval, the sight of West Perth coach Denis Cometti and his advisors sitting on the disused scoreboard among the crowd on the outer side of the ground certainly amplified the need for coaches boxes. Maybe

when the league (or East Perth) finally enclose the Press box at Perth Oval, a section at one end can be allocated to the visiting coach, but I won't hold my breath.

Todd's tactics

SWAN Districts coach John Todd is certainly working hard to build up team spirit and camaradarie in the Bassendean boys at this stage of the season. The Swans camp feel they would like to be identified as the Collingwood of WA football - united on one front with the rest of the world against them. Todd's attitude to the media of late has been icy, to say the least. He feels that the media have got into him and his selectors unfairly over suggestions that some Swans players were "pulled out" of State team contention so they wouldn't get hurt. Actually, John you're blaming the wrong people - the only person who has really had a go at you over that situation is your fellow-6PR panellist and coaching counterpart, Mal Brown.

- Surprise, surprise

Brother Hood tells me that field umpire Ross Graffin was casually jogging backwards towards the Swan Districts goal in the game against Perth at Subiaco Oval when he happened to glance over his shoulder. In fact, he had two glances just to make sure he was seeing right. There, right near the goalsquare, two of the game's biggest players were having a wrestle - and no-one was paying any attention to them. Graffin had to break up the little affair between Perth's Rhett Baynes and big Swans ruckman Ron Boucher.

South Adelaide have commenced an Australia-wide search for a coach to replace Haydn Bunton. Club chairman Malcolm Whitford was busy in Perth last week making a few preliminary enquiries.

It must have been disappointing for Swan Districts ruckrover JON FOGARTY to have been injured and unavailable for the recent interstate clashes against Victoria and South Australia. But last week he proved he was capable of being a valuable player for WA as well as his club when he was outstanding in the match against Perth.

Fogarty was converted from a half-back to a ruck-rover this year and was a dominant player around the ground. It was his ability to gather kicks all over the field which enabled Swans to eventually shake off the Demons.



LES FONG . . .



West Perth's LES FONG played a real captain's game when the Falcons needed a top performance against East Perth last week. The diminutive rover dominated the small man department and proved that he is at his best in pressure games something which should hold him in good stead in the finals. With him in top form, West Perth can expect to throw out their first really serious challenge for a flag since 1975.

Fong's absence from several games early in the season handicapped West Perth's on-the-ball play - and when the pressure has gone on, he is usually one of the instigators.

COMETTI DOES A TOP JOB

LAST week I paid out a few brickbats on West Perth. Now for the bouquets.

Coach Dennis Cometti has done a great job in his first season as a league coach.

Anyone who has seen the Falcons in the past two weeks will notice the return of something that has been missing from West Perth since the days of Graham Farmer aggression.

In the past couple of seasons West Perth were considered suspect under pressure. They have certainly dispelled that belief in recent weeks.

Swans and East Perth are renowned for their tough approach to football, so it was a measure of how tough West Perth have become this season when they came out in front in the physical clashes and caused some players from both rival teams to be tentative.

That, in my opinion, has been the most noticeable aspect of Cometti's coaching.

West Perth have normally shown an aptitude for team football, but in recent years, particularly last season, they did not have their customary runners on the ball.

They have them in abundance this season. Peter Murnane has lived up to the big reputation he enjoyed before coming to WA.

But one player who has had a big impact on the team this season is captain, Les Fong.

Fong, who missed a big part of last season through injury, is one of the most effective rovers in the competition and has given West Perth the bite around the packs that enable them to capitalise on runners such as Murnane and David Palm.

One aspect of West Perth's performance this season that has pleased Cometti has been their competitiveness, which is substantiated in their results.

They have only been caned once this season - against Swans in the first round and showed against South Fremantle and Claremont in the second round they were not prepared to chuck in the towel after

being badly beaten early. In both matches they fought back to attain a respectable score after looking likely to be thrashed.

Cometti is fortunate to have a good

reservoir of players at his disposal, which has been lacking in recent seasons. But there is no escaping the fact he has moulded the team into a very determined and positive unit.

He has shown that you don't have to rant and rave to get the best out of players. He has been able to get results because he has an astute football brain and has the ability to get his message across to players.

Time for a change

It's about time the format was changed for the country football championships.

The finals are drawing paltry crowds. One way of overcoming that - and also give the players a big lift - would be to play the finals on a Sunday before a league match.

Imagine the effect it would have had on country players if they had played the Agrade final prior to a match such as the one West Perth and Swan Districts.

The sponsors, Wesfarmers, are disappointed with the response the championships are receiving in the city. If they want to get a better response then they should consider staging them in different country towns each year or try and get the finals played before a league game.

The championships certainly deserve more attention from the public than they are currently getting.

E.F. CARNIVALS

In the last few weeks East Fremantle have held two junior carnivals.

The high school carnival held on July 20 was won by the Rossmoyne Senior High School from seven other schools.

The primary schools carnival which was held on July 27 saw a record 36 schools participate, including Moora.


The teams were divided into four divisions with Willetton winning red division, Seaforth winning blue division, East Fremantle taking the honours in green division and Bicton in gold division.

Alexander to rely on youngsters

East Fremantle captain-coach Ron Alexander will rely on young players for the remainder of 1982.

Already a handful of youngsters have been "blooded" into league football and they have done the job well. The most impressive of these was Darren Bennett.

Alexander says he really does not have any alternative.

The senior players were given their

The senior players were given their chance and they have failed since the State team left for Adelaide for the interstate clash against South Australia on June 12.

Big Ron left town with the WA team and at that stage of the season Old Easts were just one game out of the four. However, since then they have won just one game.

They beat Perth on June 26 but since then have suffered defeats at the hands of Swan Districts, Claremont, Subiaco and South Fremantle.

When they beat Swan Districts in the opening game of 1982 at Bassendean Oval East Fremantle looked capable of playing in this year's final round.

But they have not shown the same sort of football since.

A fortnight ago they gained the dubious honour of being the first side beaten by Subiaco in 16 weeks of football and last week, after playing well for 3½ quarters,

meekly surrendered to South Fremantle.

A number of the club's senior players including 1982 State representatives Ken Judge and Jim Sewell and former State wingman Rod Lester-Smith have been criticised by the media for their lack of effort this year.

However, Alexander said it was not his policy to publicly criticise his own players.

"I have my say behind closed doors", he says. "Publicly slating your players does nothing for them.

"Our major problems this year have been the number of players we have out with injury or through suspension.

"We have averaged about six senior players unavailable for selection every week and on top of that at one stage we had five players suspended," he said.

Naturally Alexander is aiming to win all three matches and if he achieves that objective he could halt West Perth's run at second place and the following week could put East Perth out of the finals race.






TALENTED ROOKIE

He desperately wants to be a part of Subiaco's successful era, which many people believe is just around the corner.


In his early days Valli always wanted to be a professional footballer but as time rolled on he realised he must secure a future in his profession.

Valli has done many things in football, including representing the State on about 10 occasions but he still has one ambition remaining. He would like to coach.





South West re-affirm their top rating

If nothing else, last week's Wesfarmers Country Football Championships confirmed the South West National Football League's ranking as the top country league in WA.

Aside from winning the A Section for a record fifth consecutive time, the South West's second team made the final of the B Section.

Although beaten in the final the South West must have been happy with the performance of their second team, which was made up entirely of players under 23 years of age.

On the opening day of the carnival they came up against Great Southern Carnival victors Southern Districts and ran out easy winners.

The Southern Districts team were in the A Section not so long ago and that was a meritorious performance which held them in good stead for their encounter with Central Great Southern on the second day.

They thrashed Central Great Southern and looked capable of going on with the job.

They had been even more impressive than the top side on their way to reaching the final.

The South West's top side struggled to beat Eastern Districts on the opening day of the championships when a man called Basil Little almost single-handedly wiped out the South West's chances of breaking the record.

Little played at full-forward and kicked nine goals after treating the crowd to a great display of his football wares.

He marked everything that came his way and all Eastern Districts needed to do to win was to have a couple of other players up forward capable of giving Little some assistance.

With 10 minutes to go in the match Little had done so much work from the key forward position that he went off with cramp and at the same time took his side's chances with him.

At the time South West trailed by about four goals and they gradually began to take charge in positions around the ground that they had received little from during the afternoon.

When the siren sounded South West were just one point in front but a goal on the bell gave them victory by seven points.

However, the South West could not have been happy with the win.

In 1981 they had doubled Eastern Districts' score and they were really lucky to get out of the trouble they were in. A more experienced side would have rammed home the advantage.

But Eastern Districts' could have been well satisfied with their effort — although the disappointment on the players' faces as they left the ground indicated they knew they had blown their chance of playing in an A Section final.

South West had a good win over Mortlock the next day to move through to the final.

Their eventual rivals Great Northern played Mortlock on the opening day and were impressive winners.

The following day they played last year's runners-up Upper Great Southern at Fremantle Oval and they were again impressive victors.

Their line-up included former league players like Robbie Cocks, Alan Casserley, Gary MacDonald and Ron Bentley and they looked capable of breaking the South West dominance.

However, the grand final was virtually decided by half-time when the South West held a six goal lead and if it was not over at the long break it was certainly a one horse race after three quarter time.

The South West just had too much fire power and experience for their opponents and Max George sealed the issue with a couple of towering goals in the third term.

Alwyn Coyne and former Perth rover John Doyle did well around the packs while Peter Old worked hard all day and won the Wesfarmers Medal for being best on the ground in the final.

The South West were also expected to put up a bold showing in the B Section final.

But that was not to be the case. It was evident early in the match that Central Midlands were keen to take the honours

In a big step for country football they televised last week's final for the first time when South West played Great Northern.


