EAST Perth's senior players have gambled heavily in their bold bid to qualify for this year's finals.

The Royals have adopted a 'pay-as-you-play' plan - and so far it has paid off with two consecutive wins.

This week East Perth face Claremont in a crucial battle for fourth spot, with just one more chance remaining after this set of fixtures.

The Royals players are naturally tight-lipped about their internal payments incentive - but it's common knowledge that the players did not get paid for their losing effort against Perth three weeks ago.

A behind-closed-doors meeting after that disappointing Perth setback saw the players come up with the suggestion that the club should not have to pay out money when the team performed so poorly.

Subsequently, the Royals have notched two impressive victories - over South Fremantle, who are still in danger of slipping out of the four, and Subiaco, whose \$100,000 incentive went up in smoke with last week's loss.

PAYMENTS

The East Perth players are not prepared to elaborate on the payments scheme, but they insist that the money is not being used as a motivating factor.


"It's simply that we don't think we should be paid if we don't perform," one senior player said.

"It's a private arrangement; a pay-on-merit scheme."


The players have already accepted pay cuts at East Perth this season in view of the club's financial burden.

Now their decision to be paid on how they perform is yet another example of the tremendous spirit and loyalty in the camp.

Coach Greg Brehaut, determined not to be tagged as the coach who missed the finals two years in a row, has done wonders with an inexperienced team of rookies this year.

Tragedy for Falcons

WEST Perth stars Rod Alderton and Brian Adamson have lost their courageous battles to get back into league football.

Alderton faces major surgery on his left knee and Adamson has been forced back into retirement after a knee injury in a reserves game two weeks

After 126 games with the Falcons, Alderton now faces premature retirement and will undergo a complete knee reconstruction this weekend.

The brilliant forward said: "If it were a case of the knee operation to play football again I would not have it.

"But my specialist has advised that to be able to take part in any activity at all in later years I must undergo the reconstruction as soon as possible."

Few footballers have come back to their true potential after such a big operation.

Alderton is fully aware of that fact and will not attempt a comeback to competitive football. "If I was an energetic 20-year-old it might be

worth the 18 months of toil to get back into the ' game.

"But by the time I would be ready to play again I'd be approaching 27 or 28.

KNEE BRACE

The brilliant forward had been out of football since April 25 but returned with the aid of a knee brace against Subiaco two weeks ago.

At the end of a season that promised so much for the Falcons, their injured list reads like a 'lost-inaction' roll.

Alderton and Adamson had hoped to play a part in lifting West Perth's finals chances and had worked hard at regaining fitness and strength.

The 32-year-old Adamson's 148-game career has been plagued with injury.


To add salt to the deep wounds at Leederville, crack forward Doug Simms will not play again this year. Simms has tendonitis behind his knee.

Injuries have played a big part in the Falcons' endof-season fade out and last Saturday was the final chapter.

HOLIDAY BONUS



BOUCHER BACK

SWAN Districts confirmed their potential to win a third successive premiership with their powerful display against East Fremantle last Saturday. But before that brilliant performance was further proof of the player-depth coach John Todd has at his disposal. Big Ron Boucher turned in a useful display in the reserves to suggest that he could be on hand during the finals should Todd feel the need to use his bulk and experience. Boucher's form was nothing to suggest he is automatically going to force Mick Johns, Shane Bogunovich or Peter Sartori to step aside but his presence is an enormous boost to the confidence of any side he is in. With both Johns and Bogunovich carrying slight injuries, Boucher's return could not have come at a better time for Swans.





PEAKE HURT

GEELONG star Brian Peake was admitted to hospital after the clash with the Sydney Swans last week.

Peake was in a lot of pain and kept passing out and having fits of vomiting.

He was hurt in a first quarter collison with Bill Picken and had a badly bruised thigh. Spasms of pain from the injury caused him to faint.

Geelong's head trainer George Clarke said that it was the worst thigh injury he could remember for 20 years.

Peake had been playing well when he left the ground and he seems certain to be out till well into the finals series.

CORNES ACHIEVEMENT

SOUTH Adelaide coach Graham Cornes has manged to do what no other Panther coach has done for 18 seasons get the club into successive finals.

South finished fifth last season and can't miss the five this year.

The last coach to have South in successive finals was Neil Kerley, who took the club to its last premiership in 1964 and led the side into the finals in 1965 and 1966.

South didn't make the finals again until 1977, under Haydn Bunton, and then took part in 1979 (second to Port) and 1981 (fourth).

BENNETT READY

EAST Fremantle's plight in deciding where to play brilliant Clint Browning was compounded against Swans when he filled a three-way role throughout the afternoon. Browning started as a key forward for the Sharks where coach Ron Alexander wants his strong marking and aggressive attitude to bolster a flagging forward line. But whenever the Sharks find themselves in trouble they shift Browning to fill the gap. He spent time in defence when Swans' forwards were on top and then he ran on the ball in an effort to provide 'legs' in the mid-field. Perhaps the simplest thing for Alexander, and assistant Murray Ward, would be to keep 19-year-old Darren Bennett at full-forward allowing Browning to play in his more accustomed defensive role. Bennett booted seven goals in the reserves game at Bassendean to remind Sharks selectors he is ready for a league return.

FOOTBALL'S big night of the year, the Channel 7-Sandover Medal count, is to be held in the Perth Entertainment Centre next Monday week.


ST GRAEME

Players like Fred Castledine, Mal Atwell, Mal Brown, Bradley Smith, Dobbie Graham, Ray Lucev, Keith Slater, Big Bob Johnson, Frank Coulson, Trizzie Lawrence (what there was of him), the Regans, John Duckworth and Stan Nowotny.

Today the two players who do have an effect are Ron Boucher (good to see him in reserves last week) and Stephen Michael. But that is where it starts and finishes.

Some people say that because the game has quickened up so much there is no room for the tough and physical players - but Mal Atwell had both toughness and pace. His style led Perth to three consecutive premierships in the 60s.

With that mountain of a man Ron Boucher back for the finals, what a psychological asset for Swans it will be.

Then we attempted to promote Australian football with exhibition games in England, United States and Rumania. There was an unusual occurrence in Bucharest, the capital city of Rumania, when we

attempted to kick souvenir Australian footballs into the crowd - they kicked them back to us on the oval. Imagine that happening here.

Also we put on an exhibition of boomerang throwing which thrilled the crowd and,

of course, the expert was Syd Jackson from Carlton.

Unfortunately for the Lions they have not got the versatility and reliable team work that is a hallmark of successful Swans teams.

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
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Three go down for the count



Two losses in games that really mattered over the past fortnight has been the difference between cementing a place in the four and again finishing near the bottom.





He does not agree with mid-season reappointments of coaches.

"I want to see how we go this year before thinking about coaching Glenelg again next year," he said. "That is the logical way to do it."

However, it is one of the most finely balanced tables in the history of the game. The top three clubs (which include Port and Central District) all have 28 points and are separated by less than one half of one per cent. COACHING JOBS

Sturt coach John Halbert is in a precarious position with his side having lost 11 of its past 12 games.

Neil Balme has signed a contract binding him to Norwood for the 1985 and 1986 seasons.

But he is still considered a prospect for the coaching position at VFL club Richmond and VFL sources believe Richmond could entice Balme out of his agreement with Norwood.

And the reappointment of North Adelaide coach Mike Nunan is also regarded as a tenuous agreement.

FAULTY AND DANGEROUS **PRACTICES**

The following list of don'ts contain practices which are wrong or dangerous and should not be undertaken by a coach or trainer.

- 1. Never massage a "corked" thigh or other badly bruised region in the first week. This will only increase the bleeding.
- 2. Never apply heat to any acute injury in the first 48 hours. Increases haemorrhage.
- 3. Do not "pump" the legs of a player who is "winded". When winded a person has a temporary inability of the diaphragm to move and hence the difficulty to breathe. This follows a blow to the lower chest or upper abdomen. The condition ceases spontaneously within a minute or two. Pumping the legs may cause further damage if any associated condition such as fractured ribs were present.
- 4. Do not allow any player who has been knocked unconscious or concussed to play on or to play or train for a least a week. A second head injury has magnified effects when the interval between such injuries is very short.
- 5. Never lift a player into the sitting or standing position after he has injured his back or neck. He may have a fractured spine and such action could cause irreparable damage to his spinal cord.
 - 6. Don't give fluids or food to any player who is:
 - a. Unconscious;
 - b. Dazed and drowsy;
 - c. May require an anaesthetic, e.g. has a fracture or dislocation.
- 7. Never assume the responsibilities of a doctor. Insist on medical opinion for all head injuries, possible fractures and any condition about which you have doubts.
- 8. Do no permit injured players to aggravate injuries by continuing to play. This is false economy as well as bad practice. The eventual period out of football will be greater.
- 9. Never ask a player to seek or a doctor to perform a local anaesthetic injection prior to a game to allow an injured footballer to play. This is medically and morally wrong.
- 10. Do not permit a footballer to resume playing until he has fully recovered from an injury. The risk of recurrence will be much increased.
- 11. Do not permit those feverish or sick to train or play. It will only aggravate the illness and it will encourage spread of the ailment to other team members.
- 12. Do not allow any player to gain excessive publicity or sympathy becuase of minor injuries.

WHERE HAVE ALL THE STARS GON

THE 'good old days', where sportsmen had dual sporting roles, have all but passed us by.

It seems that the pressure of being a top player in more than one sport is too much for the younger generation of athletes to endure.

A comparison of the elite group of performers who managed to reach heights in Australian Rules and cricket reveals a staggering decline.

Since the fiercely competitive days of the 1960's and 70's, when players like Keith Slater, Derek Chadwick and Neil Hawke would do battle all winter and then through the summer as well, there is now less than a handful of players who play two sports.

Of current league footballers, only Perth's Earl Spalding and Darrin Ramshaw, South Fremantle's Richard Lynch and Swan's Tom Mullooly are in the category of first-grade cricketer also.

But during the 'golden days' when sporting clubs placed less emphasis on the individual for a pre-season commitment, the number was far more.

Apart from Slater, Chadwick, Hawke Des Hoare and Mick Malone - who all represented Australia in international cricket - WA cricket also gained great service from league footballers.

FOOTBALLERS

Ken McAullay, George Young, Paul Nicholls, Bruce Duperouzel, Ian Brayshaw, Ron Bowe, John Inverarity and Dennis Baker were all league footballers outside their interstate cricket commitments.

To add to the list, many State and regular league players spent their summer months engaged in first grade cricket circles.

All-Australian footballers who turned their hand successfully to cricket were Alan Watling, Allan Preen, Mike Fitzpatrick and Alan Stiles.

Then there was Subiaco and State wingman Wally Martin, who played for




Former Lions full-back Colin Williams.

the Subiaco and Scarborough cricket club, as did Colin Williams. Dashing West Perth winger Peter Panegyres and team-mate David Dyson were more than useful grade players, while East Fremantle were never affected by the summer activities of Peter Stephens and Ashley August.

Other 'dual' sportsmen were Graham John (East Perth State player who played cricket with the Mt Lawley club), Peter Medhurst (West Perth cricket and football), Graham Scott (South and Mt Lawley), Max Clements (Swans and Bayswater-Morley). However, there is no doubt that it was possible and had little or no effect on players' performances throughout either of their pressure-packed seasons.

A variety of training and sporting backgrounds can only assist with a player's overall development.

With technology creeping into modern sport, it is only a matter of time before current coaching trends become aware of the need for the wide variety of preparation of skilled athletes.

In the search for sporting perfection, it is hoped that the best athletes are allowed an opportunity to explore their complete sporting potential, regardless of how many sports they need to explore.



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

AND A WINNER



STARS OF THE DAY


KEVIN CATON (Swan Districts): 3

The Royals were written off by most critics this year as they took the field week after week with an underrated side of rookies.


But they are still in there, fresh from successive victories over South Fremantle and Subiaco and now challenging Claremont in a game that has fourth spot at stake.



Players have to run to assist, shepherd, block, tackle, commit their bodies and believe in their team-mates.


Many of these men have found it hard to

SPORTING LESSON

LIKE most people in Western Australia I spent countless hours watching the Olympic Games.

Whether you are a sporting fanatic like myself or just watched it for something to do, you cannot help but admire the effort put in by every competitor, no matter what sport they competed in.

These men and women have the one common attribute that unites all sports people — self sacrifice.

The stories that unfolded during the two weeks about how different competitors got to the Olympics and then went on to win, should have motivated every one watching to do the best they can at what ever sport they choose.

I wonder how many of our footballers and other young players have been able to obtain a message from the Olympics.

When you consider that Torvill and Dean train eight hours a day, every day of the week and Carlos Lopez, the marathon winner runs hundreds of kilometres a week all year, the sacrifice to training that, Australian footballers are asked to put in is minimal.

DISTRACTIONS

Unfortunately, modern times produce too many distractions for young footballers to achieve their best. Cars, night life and a general lack of emphasis on sport by families, has resulted in many youngsters looking for the easy road to the top. When they can't find it, they quit.

Junior football coaches have to spend more time teaching youngsters not only the skills, but more importantly the necessary attitude for them to get to the top.

It emphasises the need for a total investigation of our junior football age setup. I firmly believe that competitive, or highly organised sport, should not start till the players are at least ten years old, so that by the time they are 16 they will be keen to 'go on' not be 'burnt out' due to commitments to training that start when they are six or seven years of age.

TUNNEL VISION

ONE aspect of last Saturday's do-or-die clash between the Falcons and the Tigers that, in my opinion, contributed greatly to the Falcons' loss was 'tunnel vision'.

Too many West Perth players kicked or handballed to the first obvious lead instead of opening up their vision and giving the ball to the player in the best position.

Repeatedly players had fought for the ball only to give the Tigers an equal chance with poor delivery. The first leading player was given the ball, resulting in indirect play that contributed to the Falcons' losing any control they could have had on the game.

The old term "kick for grass" does not seem to be known. A long, well directed kick to open spaces can, in many cases, be more advantageous to developing patterns of play.

Unfortunately for the Falcons, they now have all summer to think about where and when their 1984 finals chances disappeared.

A HARD DECISION

IT was great to see Barry Cable's side, North Melbourne thrash premiership favourites Hawthorn Last Saturday.

Cable has had his share of problems throughout this season, but has shown great strengh in rebuilding the Kangaroos.

I speak to Barry every week and can't help admire his positive approach to North Melbourne regaining power. He has mentioned the number of young players who he believes have great ability and, most importantly, 'team desire'.

Cable must be in an awkward situation not knowing whether to carry on as coach of the Kangaroos or return West.

Although he has achieved great amicability in the VFL, his heart still lies in the West, something that he won't take lightly when making his decision for 1985.
