THE West Coast Eagles might have their share of youngsters, but it's time the players were stopped being treated as schoolboys.

Already the Victorian media and fans are treating the Eagles as laughing stocks.

Now more fuel has been added to the fire with such puerile actions as fining every player after several had a drink, and calling for essays from the team vanquished by the Sydney Swans last Sunday.

Those kind of actions don't foster respect and discipline. They breed resentment and ultimately the catalogue of gimmicks reaches the final page.

Included in the ranks of Eagles players are investment consultants, marketing co-ordinators, an airline sales executive, school teachers, accountants, a research officer, an engineer and a pharmacy student.

DESPERATE

In other words, they aren't dummies, but the present strategy seems pitched more at 15-year-olds.

The moves underline the desperate plight facing the Eagles at present.

But nothing can change the fact that they are simply undermanned, a situation brought about by the ludicrous VFL system of 'handicapping' and a debilitating crop of injuries.

Even watching on television last week, it was plain to see just how much the Eagles missed the middle of the ground organisation that can be provided by Steve Malaxos and Murray Wrensted.

Had either of those players been on board, the result could have been different.

Had both been available, the result would have been very different.

MIDFIELD

One message that emerged from the game is that the man to throw into the midfield on a permanent basis to help the hard-working John Worsfold is Chris Waterman.

He will blossom into one of the stars of the VFL in the not-too-distant future.

The most amazing part of the current situation is that, given continued favourable results in other matches, the Eagles could be back in the five this weekend should they defeat Fitzroy.

On current form they will merely be making up the numbers. But the whole system may well click any day, and that fifth spot can become permanent.

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What they said...

"It was ridiculous for the WAFL to carry a loss of \$250,000 last year; it should have been passed down to the clubs." WAFL Commissioner Mal Brown on football's finances.

"I was very disappointed at being dropped, but I still get a weekly cheque as if I was playing." Deposed West Coast Eagle Sean King.

"The way football is changing it's a young man's game." Field umpire Ron Buckey, 46, on reports that umpires over 30 will be dropped from the WAFL panel.

"There is an enormous difference in salary, but there are some things in life which are more important than money." Swan Districts coach Ed Blackaby, quitting his job to concentrate full-time on his coaching role.

"He's 30 and we believe there are players with quicker legs." Victorian selector Ted Whitten on the dropping of senior players such as Robert DiPierdomenico from the State squad.

"Claremont took a stranglehold on top spot on the WAFL ladder by choking the life out of South Fremantle." Eagles star Steve Malaxos, in his new role as a football writer with The Sunday Times.

"I'm just happy to play where the coach wants me to." Perth ruckman Dempsey Narkle after a matchwinning six goals from a forward pocket against East Perth.

"The concept of State-of-Origin football may be falling by the wayside." Umpires coach Bob Phillips.

"If they don't succeed this week they can write off'88 and look forward to a cold winter." Loyal West Perth tipster Rod Brown on 6PR.

WESTSIDE

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TOSSED OUT!

FITZROY captain Paul Roos could find himself being overlooked for his main duty each week - tossing the coin.

Lions coach David Parkin has revealed that Roos has lost the toss for choice of ends 11 times out of 12 this season.

Winning the toss in last week's diabolical wintery conditions seemed an important start to the game, but once again Roos called wrongly.

However, Fitzroy overcame that setback to down Essendon, despite conceding them a 4.6 to three points start.

TOUGH SKIPPER

THE incredible run of East Perth players being stitched up, literally, each week continued last Saturday when captain Glen Bartlett was the victim. Bartlett had started well opposed to Perth's big goalsneak Mick Rea, but was a noticeable absentee when the second term started. However, the mystery was solved a few minutes into the term when Bartlett sprinted down the race from the southern stand changerooms, ran hurriedly around the boundary line to the interchange on the opposite side and was quickly ushered back into action. He had fallen on a boot (a team-mate's apparently) in the opening minutes, and needed a gash on his forehead stitched up before resum-

BIG DIFFERENCE

CHANNEL Seven commentators remarked on the coaching contrast between Tom Hafey and John Todd during last Sunday's Swans-Eagles clash. It was Hafey's 513th VFL game as a coach and Todd's 12th - a difference of 501. Hafey's feat last Sunday put him into second place on the VFL coaches' ladder, one ahead of Hawthorn's Allan Jeans, who is out of action this year with illness. For the record, Hafey's 513 matches have resulted in 330 wins, 179 losses and four draws at four clubs -Richmond, Collingwood, Geelong and now Sydney.

BRISBANE BOUND

PROMINENT football personality Peter Evans will be a familiar face missing from the arena as from July. The much-travelled Evans will move to Brisbane to take up a new post as head of the newly-formed Australian Major League Baseball. Mr Evans has held several posts in local football - he started as general manager at Swan Districts, moved to the WAFL as football manager and is now back at Swans as a director. While working in his current position as general manager of the WA Baseball League, he turned his talents to radio, being an around-thegrounds commentator with 6PR.

OFFSIDE DRAW

THE introduction of double-headers this year was an interesting innovation by the WAFL - but the choice of teams to take part has been a little out of balance. There are plenty of pros and cons about the double-headers, especially if you're unlucky enough to draw the early game. But that doesn't worry Swan Districts - they didn't get a guernsey in the four double-headers! East Perth managed only one place in the four fixtures, but Subiaco, Claremont and South Fremantle figured in three of the four. West Perth, Perth and East Fremantle had two appearances in the four fixtures.

TELEVISION'S VIEW

IT'S always been a contentious issue in sport, the question of TV ratings. And it seems as though the footy fan is always missing out. Channel 10's sporting director Ian Brayshaw told listeners to 6PR's Football Forum last week that the "days of replays and panel shows are a thing of the past". That didn't go down too well at the live footy show and "Sticks" had to do some backtracking. Fellow panelists Mal Brown, Percy Johnson and John K. Watts all howled him down, of course. Brayshaw admitted that 10 was keen to get involved in football, so hopefully some change of thinking could eventuate in our TV coverage.

PARKIN'S TOPIC

THE Australian Football Coaches' Association has arranged for Fitzroy coach David Parkin to be the guest speaker at a seminar this Sunday. Parkin's topic will be teaching football skills, strategy, demonstration, practise and feedback. The session involves a brief presentation, followed by an open discussion relating to senior and junior players. The AFCA seminar will be held at Subiaco Oval after the Eagles match.

ALWAYS HOPE

RADIO 6WF commentator Ken Armstrong, previewing the Perth-East Perth game last week, was looking at the issue of the Royals still believing they could make the finals despite only two wins from 11 games. "While the team is alive, the chance is alive," said Armstrong, recalling East Perth's dramatic finish to the 1978 season when they won their last seven qualifying games to improve from sixth to second. Armstrong well remembers that year - East Perth went on to beat Perth, who he was coaching, in a tense grand final and thus prevent a Demons hat-trick of flags.

Todd's player hopes will be costly

THE West Coast Eagles will need to dig deep into their pockets if they hope to recruit playing personnel capable of winning big games in the tough VFL.

The Eagles hierarchy are kidding themselves if they think they can entice top players to Perth on the sort of money they are presently paying their troops.

Eagles boss John Todd offered the lack of tough and experienced Victorian footballers as another excuse after last Sunday's 43-point loss to Sydney.

Following cries of "our squad is too small" and "we're a young developing side," Todd and the Eagles are now wanting big names to bolster their flagging stocks.

It will take big bikkies to entice the nation's best footballers to Perth.

Todd mentioned Gerard Healy, Greg Williams and Dennis Carroll as players he would like to have in his side.

Significantly, the Eagles boss failed to mention Wayne Henwood, who was not only a key figure with his big game in the demise of the Eagles on Sunday, but was on the Eagles recruitment hitlist early this year.

Whatever the excuses for not getting the versatile big man, he slipped through the Eagles fingers and he is now settled back in the harbour city.

The Eagles need a strong marking half-back who can double at centrehalf-forward, a class rover, a goal-

kicking full-forward and a high possession-gaining follower.

The rover Todd would like to have is Richmond's Dale Weightman. Experienced and still one of the best ballgetters around, he would get more than 30 possessions a game and form a classic combination with an in-form and aggressive Alex Ishchenko.

The big marking, versatile key position player Todd needs is Fitzroy's Paul Roos.

EXPERIENCE

He has a few years of top football left and his strength and experience would be an invaluable support to Ross Glendinning.

A gifted full-forward would be the most difficult man for the Eagles to find.

Tony Lockett could be finished, but he's tied on a three-year contract to St Kilda; Jason Dunstall would probably never leave Hawthorn while Brian Taylor, Warwick Capper and Gary Ablett are locked in on lengthy contracts.

The Eagles must be prepared to spend big money if they are to get the type of player they need.

And with some of the wasted monies

already spent on local players who are just not up to VFL football, some tough decisions must be made.

The ferociousness of VFL football is exposing that some Eagles are not good enough to survive in the long term.

Michael O'Connell, Dean Laidley, John Gastev, Brent Hutton, Troy Ugle, Mark Zanotti, Laurie Keene and Joe Cormack have all shown inadequacies in their VFL football this sea-

They are just not up to VFL standard.

But while criticising some of the players in the current squad and supporting Todd's call for Victorian imports, I am sympathetic to the most important ingredient in the immediate hopes of the Perth team's survival in the VFL.

The Eagles must have a reserves team.

And that team must be in the VFL, not the local competition, creating even further financial strain on the Eagles money-makers and spenders.

Not to mention the further decimation it will cause on the WA football.

Blackaby shoots from the hip

SWAN Districts coach Ed Blackaby is almost a Jekyll and Hyde character.

He's one of the most unassuming men off the field, yet a passionate being in the coach's box.

No coach is more vocal than Ed, who has made the telephone connection between box and bench irrelevant.

What needs to be remembered is that Blackaby is not asking any player to do what he hasn't done himself, probably under much more difficult circumstances.

Blackaby is a Tasmanian by birth, having been raised in the north-west coastal town of Burnie.

TRANSFER

He played for a team with the unlikely name of Cooee, a settlement not far from Burnie.

At 17 he moved to Queensland where he played for Sandgate before transferring to Canberra to start a 10-year association with the powerful Manuka club.

He played in five premiership teams and was captain-coach when they won the 1977 flag.

He was his club's best and fairest five times, and won Canberra's equivalent of the Sandover Medal, the Mulrooney Medal in '77, after having been runner-up in 1974.

GROUNDWORK LAID FOR A SWANS' REVIVAL

and it's easy to see why former Swan Districts director Rod Sergeant persuaded him to join the Black and Whites in 1980.

Blackaby played only 54 games in his five years on the field for Swans.

FEVER

It's not that he wasn't good. Fever and hepatitis entered the scene in his first year at Swans.

That should have spelt the end of his career, but not so.

Ed bounced back in typical fashion to win a regular place in the team.

It is therefore important to show some understanding when Blackaby becomes white-hot with rage during a match.

He can't bear to see players exhibiting less than 100 per cent commitment.

Those who do pull their weight rarely seem to feel the barb of his tongue. Those who don't can expect a verbal lashing.

Anyone who doubted Blackaby's singular approach to his job would have Throw in 25 State games for the ACT had those doubts removed last week

when he decided to quit his job as Total West's manager for night rate express.

"I had no alternative if I wanted to remain as coach of Swans," said Blackaby.

"Some nights my job would keep me back until 10 o'clock, and I'd have to miss training."

The soft option would have been to quit Swans and concentrate on his career.

However, Blackaby had made a commitment to Swan Districts, and for him that commitment had to be fulfilled.

GROUNDWORK

Blackaby has wasted no time in laying the groundwork for a Swan Districts revival.

On Monday he was at McGillivray Oval watching teams from areas such as Bunbury, Newman and Karratha.

His keen eye spotted about eight youngsters, all aged about 15, who have the makings of becoming League

Swan Districts way in 1988, and while not seeking excuses, Blackaby has identified a major problem.

"We've as many players in the Eagles squad as any other club, and more than most, and I inherited several players who trained at Bunbury during the week," he said.

"There were some Monday nights when we had no more than nine senior players at Bassendean. That makes it impossible to discuss team tactics."

BASICS

Blackaby is a shoot-from-the-hip coach, who doesn't place much weight on statistics or what some may call the academic approach to the game.

"I have some old fashioned ideas about footy," said Blackaby.

"It's a basic game and we just have to keep working on the basics."

Swans have him under contract until the end of next season.

At this stage Blackaby would be looking to extend that contract to 1990 and beyond.

He is not secretive about having an ambition to coach in the VFL sometime in the future.

"I guess that's just a case of being in the right place at the right time," said Blackaby.

As far as Swans are concerned, Ed Blackaby is the right man at the right time for the club's future.

Eagles can still grab fifth spot

THE Eagles still have every chance of making the five.





It's amazing that the Victorians want to pinch all our players but are reluctant to take our umpires.



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



Lee Walker - A tall Carine High School player who can handle roles as a ruckman, defender or key forward. Still eligible for the State schoolboys.


Jason Walker - A skilful ruck rover with great stamina. Attends Warwick Senior High School and plays with the Subiaco under-19s.

"I saw one between Guildford and Girrawheen yesterday," he said enthusiastically. "And it was a beauty.

If West Perth are to continue in winning form they will need some repeat performances from Mifka and Co.



One would have thought positions on the premiership league ladder were reversed.


A key factor was that the Falcons' experienced brigade really did perform.

1300 UP FOR THE TIGERS

LAST Saturday's game at Claremont was a milestone for the Tigers.

It was their 1300th League game since being admitted to the WAFL in 1926.

Their first win that year came after 14 successive losses when they beat South Fremantle 7.11 to 7.10 at Fremantle Oval.

Currently the Tigers' record stands at 558 wins, 734 losses and eight draws.

'EXTRA' GAME

STRANGE but true section. In 1946 Perth and West Perth played each other in FOUR of the 19 qualifying games.

Both clubs went on a mid-season Eastern States tour, so they played an 'extra' game one Monday to make up for a fixture they would miss.

The previous time clubs met four times in the one season was in 1904 when four Derbies were played.

In view of attendances at Derbies this year, perhaps it wouldn't be a bad idea to repeat that format.

QUARTER SLAUGHTER

I WONDER how many Perth and Subiaco supporters at the WACA this Saturday remember the day 29 years ago when the Lions established the record score of 16 goals, 8 behinds for a quarter of football.

It was in the third quarter of the first semi-final when they kicked 104 points (the only 100-point quarter in WAFL history) to one. Opposing coaches were Charlie Tyson (Subiaco) and Ern Henfry (Perth).

Funny side of footy

DURING my research of football in WA from the beginning I came across a lot of humorous happenings and some that were quite serious.

Some might say nothing's changed.

Here are some quotes that I think are worth repeating.

1885: "A somewhat awkward accident happened at this stage to Haussen of Rovers which necessitated his playing in an overcoat for some time."

1885: "The first goal should have been disallowed but the umpires didn't sufficiently understand the rules."

1888: "The Fremantle team journeyed by road to the ground and then went through the ordeal of having to sit for the photographer."

1891: "In one regrettable incident, the Fremantle timekeeper made a mistake of seven minutes and rang the bell without the assent of the West Perth timekeeper. Great indignation was manifested at such a stupid blunder."

1900: "There has been a delightful absence of professionalism."

1904: "The game was too fast for umpire Chadwick. Consequently some very tough things passed unnoticed."

1914: "Unless the offence of striking a rival player is severely dealt with by the league, it will quickly spread."

1938: "One nuisance is the widespread habit among players of talking loudly on the field."

DOUBLE TROUBLE

A 1971 match report described a Subiaco win as a 'hoodoo breaker' — they had won two games straight, it said.

Last week they lost their second successive qualifying game — the first time this has happened to the Lions since 1986.

A big number of dedicated workers can be seen every training session and on match days ready to help out League coach Stan Magro and his players.


South Fremantle can boast one of the most experienced and efficient medical teams in WAFL ranks.

Head trainer Tom Bottrell is ably assisted by Alan Shaw and between them, there is 71 years of experience.


Other trainers and doctors in the medical team are - Joe Gauci, Merv Lockhart, Sylvani Satti, Darryl Foster, Craig Allen, Chips Rafferty, Dr Dick Reid, Dr Greg Lumsden and chiropractor Chris Martinovich.

Bottrell has been with the Bulldogs training staff for 39 years, starting as a trainee in 1949 when his running coach and head trainer at the time, Don Gibnan, asked him to come down and help out.

After six years Bottrell was promoted to the role of head trainer and the

year after South Fremantle achieved their treble of 1952, '53 and '54 with such greats as Bernie Naylor, Steve Marsh and Cliff Hillier in action.

Bottrell's vast experience was never needed more when he had to deal with Ray Stewart, who badly broke his ankle, the worst injury he has to deal with.

The most recurring injury Bottrell handles are hamstrings. He says that ankles used to be a serious problem but with all the preventative strapping that ankles now have, there is little room for injury.

Shaw is a well-respected member at the club after spending 30 years with Claremont, before changing camps two years ago.

Ice is an important part of any injury treatment and this is where Darryl Foster has become a vital member in South's medical team. Foster has invented a number of ice packages that the players can simply strap on with velcro tabs, instead of using metres of bandages.

The League team manager at South Fremantle is Santo Pasqua; with reserves manager Kim Davey and Brian Heathcote looks after the Under 19s.

Pasqua is well respected among all the players at South Fremantle, taking on the league job last year after serving as reserves manager from 1985. The Souths reserves side achieved back-to-

back premierships in 1985 and '86 while he was involved.

Administration plays a big part in the life of a team manager and Pasqua is no different, filling out team sheets, training attendances and players interchange. He believes, however, that his main role is to be the coach's liaison medium with all the players.

Another prominent figure who works closely with Pasqua is league runner Ross Sweetman, who also serves as the club's injury rehabilitation officer.

Sweetman is in his third year as runner after playing with the Bulldogs for nine years between 1974 to '83.


He takes care of all the injuries, with the view of taking the worries away from the coach. Sweetman also monitors the injuries of all the players.

Head propertyman at South is Jim Dornan, with assistants Jack Riddell and Sandy Cuccovia.

Riddell is in his second year with the club after being a loyal member for over 20 years. He hopes to be with the club for many years to come.

Being responsible for all the property is the main job, but minor tasks such as pumping up the footballs, freezing the ice and issuing the gear go towards the weekly duties.

Dornen describes John Todd as the best player he has seen at the club and admits that the grand final win of 1970 was the best he has been involved with.

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

And, in addition, Footscray and North Melbourne handed out moralecrushing upset defeats on top-order sides — and the Eagles bit the dust again.

It was undoubtedly the VFL's most amazing round of fixtures for 1988 and the reactions from coaches were varied.

Take these examples:

Kevin Sheedy (Essendon): "It was a terribly disappointing performance."

John Kennedy (North Melbourne): "Sure it was an important win; last week was important and next week is even more important."

The different approaches of the coaches just confirms how taut the tightrope is in the VFL ranks, with the top four Hawthorn, Carlton, Collingwood and Melbourne — fairly secure.

But behind them, six teams still rate themselves a finals chance, given a bonus win or two in the next few weeks.

Geelong, in fifth place, are three games behind fourth-placed Melbourne and just ahead on percentage of Essendon.

But them come the Eagles, Footscray, the Swans and the Bears just a game behind - with percentage playing a big role in the next few weeks.


Sweet revenge

Trainers wary on AIDS scare

VFL trainers and water-carriers have started wearing plastic gloves because of concern over AIDS.

One club tried out a special brand of plastic gloves last weekend and other clubs are sure to follow.

The trainers have expressed concern about contracting AIDS by handling bloody towels or dealing with injured and bleeding players.

Graeme Teesdale, president of the VFL Trainers Association, said that it came to a head recently when one trainers' wife refused to wash a set of towels with blood on them.

"His wife had just attended a lecture on AIDS and was concerned about some of the facts presented," he said.

"The risk is that a player's blood could come into contact with any small cut on a trainer's hand.

"You don't have to be a homosexual to spread AIDS and you can't be too careful."

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Lester-Smith fights back

in fine style

ONE of the most heart-warming comeback stories of the season surrounds new Brisbane Bear Rodney Lester-Smith, known throughout VFL ranks as "Snuffy" because he's invariably in everything.

The former East Fremantle wingman hit the hard times when he missed Hawthorn's 1986 premiership because of injury and failed to make the top 20 in last year's grand final side.

Persistent leg injuries which had affected him in Perth again appeared after he had enjoyed notable success in his opening three seasons.

Restricted to just 11 games last year, Hawthorn reluctantly allowed Brisbane to interview Lester-Smith, believing his injuries had so dramatically cut his appearances, that he may become a liability, especially with the club worried by salary cap restrictions.

Lester-Smith and Rodney Eade joined Brisbane and while Eade has been one of his team's top four players, Lester-Smith did not become registered until a fortnight ago after starting late because of knee problems.

TOP EFFORT

The likeable half-back was sensational in his first match against Richmond and again last Saturday against his old side Hawthorn, proving that he still has what it takes.


While he was not suited to Melbourne's wet and windy Saturday - the worst football weather for '88 - he will become a more important player with the Bears outside the five by just one match.

"It was terrific to see 'Snuff' back in League football," said his former Hawk teammate Dermott Brereton.

"He was a mighty player with us, even though injuries took their toll and he could not always get himself fit enough."

The 28-year-old Lester Smith played 70 games in four seasons with the Hawks and along with other former Hawks "Rocket" Eade and Michael McCarthy, enjoyed reminiscing about old times after Saturday's game.

Hawthorn retained top of the ladder rating after stopping Brisbane from kicking a goal in three of the four quar-

ters. Boom forward Warwick Capper was held goal-less by likely State fullback Chris Langford.

The Hawks took on four point break on other top sides, Carlton and Melbourne, with the wild conditions leading to upsets. The Blues lost to bottom side Richmond on Friday night, while Melbourne fought back only to lose to North Melbourne on Saturday.

Richmond's Sandover Medallist Michael Mitchell kicked one of the sealing goals in the last quarter, and he retains his place at the top of the VFL's "most tackles" chart. He has laid 33 in 12 games, just ahead of Geelong's new State squad rovers, Robert Scott and Sean Denham.

Footscray have shown big improvement recently and it's all to do with ruckman Richard Cousins, in his second season at the club.

Bulldogs coach Michael Malthouse initially preferred Melbourne import David Allday in the ruck, but since opting for Cousins, Footscray have won their last two games.

"Since Andrew Purser left, we've needed somebody to take over the rucking mantle," Malthouse said. "Cousins is the most skilful of all our

big men and he did very well for us on Saturday."

The former Central District big man had 25 possessions and took nine marks against Geelong to earn best-afield votes from most commentators.

Cousins was particularly brilliant in the first quarter when Footscray kicked against the wind and established a three-point break. The Bulldogs were never headed, and with five wins for the season, have a genuine chance of slipping ahead of keen rivals, the Eagles, Essendon and Sydney in the next few weeks.

The VFL's 12th round, played over three days, was notable for low scoring.

Conditions on Saturday were diabolical with rain and strong winds ruining the matches as a spectacle.

However, some of the attendances were excellent, especially at Moorabbin where almost 24,000 fans saw Collingwood edge clear of hard-working St Kilda to win by 21 points.

Among the leading West Australians to excel on a difficult day were Hawthorn's Gary Buckenara, who was bestafield against Brisbane, Saint Nicky Winmar, who is having a fine season in a poor team and Geelong's Mark Bairstow, returning after injury for 31 possessions,

PROMINENT

Buckenara had 31 possessions, again playing in his favourite centre position, while Winmar had 17 in a losing team.

Another interstater, Hawthorn's Brownlow Medallist John Platten (from SA) was also prominent last weekend against Brisbane in his second comeback match.

The previous Monday against Essendon he had started kicking left foot so as to not re-strain his leg before completely warming up. But against the Bears, he fired on both legs, kicking 2.3 in a 25 possession performance.

Hawthorn's boom full-forward Jason Dunstall kicked 3.5 on the rainy day, and leads the goalkicking charts with 67 goals after 12 games.

This Saturday, Dunstall and fellow leading full-forward, Geelong's Gary Ablett (60 goals), will battle for honours when the two sides face each other.

The other "big one" is at VFL Park where Melbourne (fourth) meet Carlton (second).

The Demons have struggled on the heavier grounds in recent times, while Carlton lost for the second time this year at night to Richmond, following their opening pre-season competition loss in mid-February.

Carlton's strong SA contingent, led by Craig Bradley and Mark Naley, were among the best players afield. Bradley, one of the mid-season Brownlow Medal favourites, had 24 possessions and Naley 20.

CLOKE'S EFFECT

THE stunning effect big Collingwood big man David Cloke had on St Kilda last week confirms that there's plenty of life left in the old fellow yet.

The 33-year-old Cloke played as a ruckman and finished with eight marks, five handballs, 15 kicks and a matchwinning 26 hit-outs.

Cloke, never one of the game's prettiest players, used his bulk and aggression to steamroll the St Kilda big men and his 271st league game must rank as one of his best.

"I've never considered myself a walk-up start to get a game in the side," says Cloke.

"Personally, I like it when the grounds are a bit harder, but it wasn't bad out there - all you could do was slog."

The muddy conditions certainly brought the field back to Cloke, who revelled in the heavy going.

Bears score joins the records list

THE Brisbane Bears score of 2.5 against Hawthorn at Princes Park last Saturday equalled the lowest VFL score since 1964.

The Bears' 17 points equalled Carlton's total against Essendon in round three of 1968, also at Princes Park.

Both sides were kept goal-less in the first half of that game, which Essendon won by 33 points. Carlton's only goal for the game was scored in the third quarter.

A total score of 17 points is the lowest since South Melbourne scored 1.9 against Geelong at Kardinia Park in round 16 of 1964.

The West Coast Eagles' lowest score in 34 VFL matches is 6.13, against St Kilda at Moorabbin on May 16 last year.

WINNING RUN

HAWTHORN'S victory over the Bears on Saturday completed their second run of five straight wins for the season.

They have won 49 of the 63 games that they have played since the start of 1986. All but one of those 49 victories have been part of a run of at least four consecutive wins.

Hawthorn have recorded 10 sequences of four or more wins in that time, yet they have not won more than six games consecutively.

Over the same period, Carlton have won 46 out of their 61 games, with six sequences of four or more wins on end. However, they have recorded a winning sequence of 12 games in that time.

FOUR STRAIGHT

SYDNEY became the seventh side this season to win four or more games on end, with their victory over the West Coast Eagles on Sunday.

Only three teams - Collingwood, Hawthorn and Melbourne - have been able to win five games in a row this year.

TUCK'S DAY

HAWTHORN captain Michael Tuck is set to play his 350th VFL game this Saturday, the day after his 35th birthday.

Tuck will join Kevin Bartlett (403 games), Bernie Quinlan (367), and Bruce Doull (359) as the only players to reach 350 games.

Tuck, who made his league debut in 1972, has been Hawthorn's captain since 1986. He was played in eight grand finals and been a member of four Hawthorn premiership teams.

HAFEY SECOND

SYDNEY Swans coach Tom Hafey became the second most experienced VFL coach last Sunday.


He passed Allan Jeans' tally of 512 league games, but still trails the legendary Jock McHale, who coached Collingwood, by 239 games.





Claremont duo Don Pyke and Ben Allan are at 6/1.



So effective was Hasler, that Georgiades didn't get a chance to add to that tally against the Falcons and only had a handful of possessions.


Hasler was a very effective player with his 20-odd possessions.

The second slip-up is one I've been waiting to happen all season.

The case came when a clean mark was taken and paid and a slight skirmish followed - which may have distracted the umpire's attention. The player handballed to a team-mate running past and the umpire blew the whistle and brought the ball back for a bounce, thinking that he had paid a free kick.

East Fremantle players remonstrated with the umpire, but no amount of arguing was going to do any good. It had to happen sooner or later.

Clinics show how FDT spreads message

THE future of football in Australia relies heavily on our younger generation and finding this talent is one of the major tasks of the Football Development Trust.

One way the FDT achieves this is through football clinics for junior and senior players in both city and country areas.

FDT co-ordinator Grant Dorrington excels at such clinics, as a recent trip to the little wheatbelt town of Wyalkatchem confirmed.

Mark Hudson, a teacher at the local district high school, set the scene for Dorrington to stage the clinic for local schoolchildren and the town's junior team.

The Year eight, nine and 10 students used the clinic in prepareation for their winter carnival against Cunderdin, Kellerberrin and Quairading, while the local junior team were aiming to win a few more games in their local competition.

Wyalkatchem is in the Perth zone, so Demons Development Manager Steve Woodhouse joir ed Dorrington for the clinic.

The clinics not only help the players, but offer valuable advice to coaches on how to organise training sessions.

The session teaches the basics of football through various drills and practice games and all involved gained valuable experience, with a better quality of football obvious by the end of the clinic.

The main emphasis was placed on basic skills through hand-eye coordination. Dorrington was adamant that footballers must concentrate on skill before fitness and he used many drills to enforce these basic skills.

One drill the juniors enjoyed was

when Dorrington used a number of actions to represent a particular skill. For instance, if the whistle was heard once, they had to do a right foot kick. If the whistle was heard twice in succession, they had to use a left foot kick; three times meant a right handball and four times, a left handball.

In this way, the budding young footballers have to listen and make their decisions quickly. Such is football, where the player has to evaluate the 'situation, make a decision as to what he must do and carry it out in the best way possible.

The clinic had a number of players, varying in age and size and this is where coloured markers came into use - a teaching aid that Dorrington says is vit-

In a skill exercise where the players are paired off to practise their kicking accuracy, the markers are spaced to correspond with the strength and skill of each participant.

The bigger and better players had their markers spaced further apart and, likewise, the smaller players were closer together.

The art of talking during the game was also emphasised, with the players using loud and clear calls.

Dorrington's advice to coaches was also helpful.

He emphasised the basics of carrying a whistle, markers and extra footballs. Various drills and practice games were used to show the coach how to obtain the best from his players.

The clinic was a great success, with all the players enjoying their session with Dorrington and Woodhouse.

With such events, the game of football can only improve and it is no doubt that the FDT is doing an excellent job of maintaining the game as Australia's most popular sport.

All 28 students watched the East Fremantle-South Fremantle game and assessed league umpires Trevor Rees and Ken O'Driscoll as part of their training.


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

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
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Leave Sunday football alone

WHILE most correspondents who are only concerned with tiers one and two of football are putting their cases for a different structure in Western Australia, perhaps it is time for somebody who is connected with the third tier of football in this State to have a say.

Currently the VFL already has \$4 million of football monies from this State and, in the future, more monies and players will no doubt filter East.

Maybe it's time to pull out completely from the VFL competition and devise a State-of-Origin concept on the successful Sheffield Shield cricket series.

States could compete during the week (Tuesday afternoons) on a home and away basis with the two top States playing off for the title of Australian premiers.

This would allow current Eagles players to return to WAFL clubs, Sunday League footballers on the fringe of WAFL selection to return to Sunday Football League clubs which would make for stronger competitions at both levels.

All the current talk of teams being based in Geraldton, Bunbury and possibly a combined Sunday Football League team competing in the WAFL competition would only do to those areas what the Eagles have done to the WAFL, i.e. less crowds, less sponsorship monies, less newspaper coverage, less players, lesser grade of football.

The Sunday Football League has emerged in recent years as a viable alternative to the WAFL because of a number of reasons.

They include a more district flavour, where people can align themselves with a club within the district that they reside in; the stringent drinking laws of the WA Government in that people stay closer to home, sensible admission prices, club atmosphere as a meeting place for football supporters and lower club bar prices in extremely good surroundings. To support this, at least six of the Sunday Football League clubs have greater bar turnovers per annum than WAFL clubs.

With the introduction of the Metropolitan Football League in 1988, this has also given clubs of a less competitive nature the chance to play in a well-administered and viable football competition.

To suggest that Sunday Football League clubs would be able to compete at WAFL level is ludicrous.

Most WAFL clubs have several fully-paid employees, whereas in Sunday football, country football and amateur football, club personnel are mostly all voluntary, which has been the way for over 90 years in some cases.


All Sunday Football League (WA) Inc. clubs control their own gates and pay the football expenses of the day. Clubs also do their own promotions of functions and home games when there is district rivalry.

So before the pundits start talking changes for the sake of change to division football, larger competitions or amalgamations, get your own houses in order as Sunday football has done over the past years.

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Kicking football into the future

SCRIPT SAYS '88 SHOULD BEEASIER ...

HERE'S a game the West Coast Eagles should win!

Let's have the 1987 Eagles take on the 1988 variety.

At this time last year the Eagles had a record of six wins and six losses as opposed to the current 5/7.

More to the point, those dastardly Victorians were saying last season that our team couldn't handle Victorian conditions. Now they're saying we can't play Victorian football.


Come to think of it, last year we were saying "We can't handle Victorian conditions," and now we're saying "We can't play Victorian football".

Mutiny excluded) have so many excuses been manoeuvred into position in readiness for failure.

Mind you, it's not the players who are running for cover.

With the person closest to them constantly saying they're not up to standard, that they're too soft, that

they don't hurt enough, that they need to be bolstered by Victorians, that they can't win a premiership for at least 10 years, that they can't handle pressure, Sunday's collection of Eagles will have to dig deep.

IT'S walking a crumbling cliffface to criticise our State selectors, because you can't win whichever way the team goes.

But there are a few puzzling anomolies about the 35-man squad currently preparing to do battle with the Victorian Football Association (for the first time since 1966) at Subiaco Oval on that special Tuesday in July.

It's natural, in fact almost traditional, that the reigning State coach will look to his own players for moral and physical strength when it comes to graduating to the interstate arena.

John Todd set some fairly successful precedents back in the early 1980s when he drew heavily on his Swan Districts side for the interstate team.

IMBALANCE


While not wishing to question the judgment of current WAFL State coach Gerard Neesham - whose talents are certainly not in doubt - it seems an imbalance when 14 of the 39 players in the squad come from his Tigers camp.

And, further, it seems unusual for four of the clubs - Subiaco, West Perth, East Perth and Swan Districts to provide a total of only eight players out of the 39.

The object of this interstate exercise is to give our younger WAFL rookies the chance to earn a black-and-gold guernsey and appear on the same stage as their illustrious VFL counterparts, who will do battle in the traditional State-of-Origin clash with Victoria.

WA wants this hit-out with the VFA to bolster the mood and competitive experience of our younger players; to reward them for loyalty to the local competition and to prepare them for further interstate appearances.

The whole point in naming a squad is for players from the WAFL teams to come together and work under a different coach; to learn and share new ideas and to generally benefit from the taste of higher-level football.



Naturally, only the best 22 or so players will ultimately wear the State guernsey on July 5, so almost half of the group are there for the experience alone; to prepare them for the future.

Therefore, one must ask why isn't the squad more balanced.

Surely Subiaco, in third position, deserve more than three players out of 39 even if they are going through a rebuilding process at present while astute coach Haydn Bunton tests his depth before finals time.

Surely, also, West Perth (with just three in the squad) must have two or three young stars of the future even though they are a bit hit-and-miss this season.

And certainly bottom sides Swan Districts and East Perth are entitled to have more than one players each in the squad - if only to encourage their emerging players and give them some incentive to strive for higher rewards in their future careers.

ELEVATION

Young and enthusiastic players who come to mind who would benefit from an elevation to State squad training, albeit for just a couple of sessions, would be rookies like Mal Williams, Paul Hasler, Brad Gwilliam, Neil Jackson (West Perth), Andrew Embry, Eric Maroni, George Giannakis, David Bain (East Perth), Andrew Brice and John Sullivan (Subiaco), Andy Holmes, Steve Bazzo and Geoff Passeri (Swans).

State coaches are never going to please everyone when they opt for the playing talent to help uphold their own career reputation and the pride of the State.

But if we're looking ahead to give our younger players a taste of what it's all about, the squad is out of balance.
