



Sad sideliner

BRENDAN Krummel was an interested spectator at the preliminary final between East Fremantle and West Perth.

A member of the Sharks 1992 premiership side, Krummel had any hope of adding another medal to his trophy cabinet dashed when he broke his right leg against Claremont in the second semi-final.

At half-time, when East Fremantle trailed by 36 points, the exciting utility looked like the world had caved in on his shoulders.

But with the Sharks comeback came a much happier Krummel and when the final siren sounded, he was absolutely delighted.

Tough guys needed

THE challenge ahead for the Fremantle Dockers is looming larger than life with a few big name possible recruits turning down lucrative offers.

But, needless to say, they'll finish up with a competitive bunch — but don't expect too much in the first season as they learn the art of playing AFL football.

As Geoff Christian said on 6WF during last week's WAFL preliminary final, the players stepping up from the Pepsi Cup competition will simply not be physically strong enough.

Time has proved that WAFL players seldom succeed in their first year in the AFL; they need time to develop their legs and upper-body strength for the higher level.

Christian was comparing a couple of man-on-man battles between Eagles star Craig Turley and young Shark Chris Pobjoy, a Fremantle candidate.

"Turley is simply too strong for Pobjoy," he said.

"Most of the WAFL players are physically underprepared for AFL ranks."

Sheahan certain

RESPECTED Melbourne columnist Mike Sheahan says the next few days should determine the coaching future of Geelong's Malcolm Blight.

Even though the Cats coach is obviously well in favour down in Catsville, Sheahan says he could step down from the job this year — but not to take the vacancy at Adelaide.

"Robert Shaw is expected to sign on for that job early this week," Sheahan said on Channel 7 on Sunday. "But even if Blight wins the grand final, he could well go out while he's on top."

THE sensitive topic of football betting and whether teams could 'run dead' was aired on 6WF's Saturday show last week.

Much-respected player and coach, albeit it briefly, Gary Buckenara doubted if a team ever tried to deliberately lose, but conceded under questioning from George Grijusich that there were ways of 'lying down.'

Grljusich was on a favourite topic, football betting and suggested that there was a lot at stake in today's games and wondered what options there were for a team or players to run dead.

"If you're a backman, you just don't go as hard at the ball or at your opponent," said Buckenara. "Or if you're a forward, you just miss shots for goal.

"But I don't think any professional sportsman today would ever go out there and not try his best to win."

High ratings

Widely-regarded as a hard-nosed mentor during his time at Hawthorn, Joyce is a changed man since becoming coach of Footscray earlier this year.

For most of the season, Joyce described the Bulldogs as a 'quality club'.

LET'S get rid of the shirt-front.

The heroes of yesterday are already shouting and screaming about it being a man's game, but when you talk about the shirt-front, it's rubbish.

The only people who reckon it's okay, are those whohaven't been on the end of one.

There shouldn't be a legitimate bump in a game where the object is to physically injure an opponent and get him out of the contest.

That's what the shirt-front does.

We worry about violence turning parents away from wanting their kids to play the game and yet we leave this potential aspect intact where serious physical injury can

I use the words 'serious physical injury' because, believe me, someday somebody will be badly hurt.

They may even be killed by it.

Let's face it, a bloke copping the bump has no chance to protect himself and invariably gets hit with the shoulder in the head and usually whacks his head again on the ground when he falls.

It's not only the head that gets hit, but other vital areas are exposed right down the front.

Let's ban the shirt-front

In the last three weeks, we've seen two very nasty incidents involving Brett Heady and Chris Grant and, on each occasion, it was the man, not the ball, that was the object.

And in each case the man who was hit had no hope of doing anything to save himself and if he did try and avoid the incident, he would have been branded a 'squib'.

The people looking at the rules have to name this for what it is - and that's a charge and should be reportable.

It's crazy when an innocent trip is reportable, yet these sorts of bumps are applauded and usually rewarded with their opponent being stretchered off the ground.

Look, you're not allowed to charge into a man's back, so why should an opponent be allowed to do it front on where the body is more vulnerable?

There are some so-called heroes who specialise in this bump.

They look for the opportunity to physically hurt opposing players and put them out of the contest by injuring

deliberately hurting people shouldn't be on and the player dishing it out must be dealt with.

You have to allow front-on tackles, but that's what it should be - a normal wrap-up tackle or a front-on body shepherd in the true sense.

However, a barging and deliberate charge has got to go. Just imagine mothers looking at the Melbourne and Footscray game last Sunday.

You could have seen them turning sons away from the match every time the stretcher comes out.

Okay, the David Schwarz incident couldn't be avoided, but if the front-on shirt-front was ruled illegal, the Grant-David Neitz clash would have been avoided.

Let's face it, with so many options for young men to play different sports, it's time to direct parents towards Australian Football - and not frighten them away from it.

THE list of field umpires to officiate in this year's Pepsi Cup grand final between Claremont and East Fremantle on Sunday is down to four.

Greg Scroop, Trevor Garrett, Sam Kronja and Cameron Dawe are all in with a chance, although Dawe is the outsider.

Garrett controlled the preliminary final last weekend after doing 20 AFL matches in 1994.

He umpired the 1991 and 1992 grand finals, the second with Scroop.

If Scroop gets the nod, he will become the first man in white since Ross Capes in 1977-79, to umpire three successive grand finals.

Capes, in fact, officiated every WAFL grand final from 1973-79.

Sam Kronja, who had last weekend off, is popular among players and appears to be a likely starter after earning a state berth in June and winning umpire of the round honours in the first and third series.

Edgles reddy for WEST Coast plan to erase the 44-point round 11 win over Mel-

bourne from their memories. Eagles coach Mick Malthouse believes the Demons have improved immeasurably since the mid-season boilover.

"I don't think there is any relevance between round 11 and the finals," he said.

"It's a long time ago ... 15 weeks perhaps."

The Demons have re-emerged as premiership contenders after a mid-season form slump.

Coach Neil Balme has assembled arguably the best forward line in the competition, coupled with a running division that compares favourably to the Eagles.

"They've kicked 27, 18 and 21 goals in the past three weeks," Malthouse said.

FANTASTIC

He described their 79-point win over Footscray in last Sunday's first semifinal as "fantastic".

"They've held their opposition to nine goals and kicked 21 themselves ... they've dominated the midfield," he said.

"Anyone who is left in the competition is a danger side."

Balme said the Demons would not be concerned by playing Saturday's preliminary final in Perth.

"They know it's just a game against 21 other blokes and the ground, while it's in another part of Australia, is certainly no different.

"The game's the same and there are no different rules.

"I think it's just a matter of how strong you are mentally as to how you deal with it."

Malthouse said the home final would provide "no great advantage either way".

"The expectations have always been high. You play a home final and people come along to see you win," he said.

"That's no different to the members at the MCG expecting Melbourne to win."

The Demons will fly into Perth on Thursday and train at the WACA Ground at 2.45pm on Friday.

A win over the Eagles would elevate Melbourne to their first grand final since 1988.

They have not won a premiership since 1965.



THE adage that coaches are hired and fired simultaneously was underlined by the departure of Adelaide's Graham Cornes.

The only unknown after the hiring is the date of the firing.

It happens to all coaches at some stage.

West Coast's Mick Malthouse has some empathy with Cornes, particularly in relation to the one-team town syndrome.

The expectations of an entire State weigh heavily on the shoulders of the man at the helm of such an outfit.

Predictably, Malthouse supported his colleague, suggesting that the officials who appointed Cornes should be answerable.

Under the traditional club system where the directors are elected by members, those officials are accountable and can be voted out at the annual elections.

While the Eagles and Crows do not yet have elected directors, the officials should take notice of the supporter base.

Reports from Adelaide during the season suggested that the Cornes message was not getting through to the players and it can be safely assumed that the board acted in what they presumed to be the best interests of the club.

They would also have considered the record of the Eagles under Malthouse, where the coach's knowledge of the AFL system and its players is the key to West Coast's success.

DECISIONS

New Adelaide coach Robert Shaw is certain to make tough decisions.

One will be the future of captain Chris McDermott.

Despite being an outstanding ball-getter, McDermott tends to slow the play down, allowing the defenders to pick up their men.

McDermott may well be put on the outer with Andrew Jarman, Scott Lee and Simon Tregenza.

Tony McGuinness also started to feel the pinch as a permanent on-baller and his role needs modification if the Crows

Time for coaches to face up to failure

are to be successful.

Carlton coach David Parkin and West Perth's Jeff Gieschen showed common sense approaches when they both blamed themselves for their clubs' demise.

Parkin, ever the realist, doubted that his message had hit home sufficiently to improve Carlton's finals record.

Gieschen, who has been playing and coaching non-stop for 16 seasons, feels the need to rest and recharge his batteries.

A coach of his ability and intensity must not be lost to the game and he has been linked to AFL jobs.

Tony Solin's departure from Subiaco was predictable in the light of his ordinary placings of third and fourth when his squad was considered the equal of any in the Pepsi Cup.

It is doubtful Solin would have kept his job if they had finished fourth and coming repetitive and boring. then third to show improvement.

Unfortunately, administrators are edgy for success and the Fremantle Dockers board will need to have the patience of Job in their formative years.

In the coaching arena, it is surprising that Kevin Sheedy has lasted so long at Essendon.

Tim Watson made the comment that when he returned to Windy Hill after a year out of the game, nothing had changed from 10 years earlier, when Sheedy was appointed.

This comment points to the coach's dilemma of how to ensure his message

Allan Jeans varied his themes, but gave the same message: "It's still a simple game."

Alan Joyce is regarded as a short-term coach because of his intensity, also a trait of Malthouse.

Progressive clubs like the Eagles and Essendon have moved more to the American system of head coach in charge on match day and specialists helping during the week.

Assistant coaches like Robert Wiley and Neale Daniher take training sessions in a bid to keep the voices of Malthouse and Sheedy fresh.

All Australian dilemma over Schwarz

THE emergence of Melbourne's David Schwarz as one of the AFL's leading forwards will have posed an interesting problem for the All Australian selectors.

The All Australian side will be announced this Friday and Schwarz deserves to make his first appearance in the line-up.

He has developed into the Demons trump card up forward, often stealing the show from match-winner Garry Lyon.

If finals football was included in the All-Australian selection criteria, Schwarz's strong performance against Footscray in Sunday's first semi-final should have just about clinched his spot.

But Schwarz's problem is that he plays at centre-half-forward, a position dominated by last year's All Australian skipper Wayne Carey.

Carey's performance has been no less outstanding than last season, although it has been tainted by two suspensions.


INELIGIBLE

Unlike the Brownlow Medal count, suspension does not rule a player ineligible for a spot on the All Australian team.

So who gets the nod at centre-half-forward? Probably Carey because of the quality of the games he has played, rather than the ones he has missed.

West Coast coach Mick Malthouse is impressed with Schwarz and paid him a compliment this week when he rated the 22-yearold Demons marking power and strength as being "Wayne Carey-like".

Perhaps that comment was to rev up Eagles defender Glen Jakovich, who will no doubt get the job on Schwarz after being a proven match for Carey.



SO-CALLED medal leaks are always a hot topic, but there was no such whisper before Ian Dargie claimed his second Sandover Medal on Monday night.

A few of those in the audience, however, had noticed an interesting "coincidence" about the winner's seating arrangements.

The Subiaco table was prominent in the centre of the showroom floor, in a near identical spot to the place where the West Perth players had been strategically placed at the previous two counts. The Falcons produced the winners those nights - Robbie

West in 1992 and Neil Mildenhall last season. Dargie, Matt Connell and Matthew Burton were all sitting in

prime spots that led to pre-count speculation. Dargie proved a popular winner yet again and plays football the way the men in white like it - hard, but fair.

Former Subiaco coach Tony Solin chose not to attend the count and Dargie was disappointed when he realised that he had overlooked thanking his coach of two seasons during his acceptance speech.

Dargie was spotted searching for loose change soon after the count and went to the nearest payphone to ring Solin.

Leadership suits Ablett

GARY ABLETT may be the most feted footballer in the game today, but until the weekend, he had never captained a senior football team.

The footballing superman kicked six match-winning goals as injury-strapped Geelong defied the odds and knocked Carlton out of the premiership race.

He clearly enjoyed his new leadership responsibilities — his three-goal burst in 11 minutes in the third term virtually ending Carlton's revival attempts.

The champion 32-year-old said later that he had rarely been more satisfied with a team performance.

Geelong, with five champions sidelined — including its entire "engine room" of Mark Bairstow, Paul Couch and Garry Hocking — seemingly faced a mission impossible.

Everyone expected the hot-and-cold Cats to go missing at some stage, but they didn't and Carlton, the premiership favourites a month ago, were humiliated.

Ablett lifted his season tally to 125 goals in 23 games, continuing his remarkable form burst which has brought him more than 300 goals in the past three years.

COMMANDING

For the second consecutive year, Ablett has won the John Coleman Medal and is retaining the commanding form which many believe can lift Geelong to their first premiershp since 1963.

Having just missed the finals last year and with injuries to key players, including Barry Stoneham, many doubted that Geelong had the necessary manpower and experience to produce consistently enough to go through to the top four.

They face North Melbourne on Saturday as virtual equal favourites to go into another grand final, especially after having beaten North twice this season.



Coach Malcolm Blight said the football world was showing Geelong new respect and acknowledging its depth, which on Saturday saw Aaron Lord, in his first full game, make a fairytale start to his league career.

Blight said the club had overcome adversity to make the finals this year and two fighting wins had given everyone great confidence.

"Our win last week against Footscray reminded us how great they (finals) are when you get involved in it and win one," he said.

"It was a nice bubbler for the whole club. And it flowed on against Carlton."

Old-timers had to think hard to remember a more meritorious Geelong win.

Three of the team's sidelined stars are likely to return on Saturday, giving the Cats fresh impetus coming into Saturday's cut-throat final.

Veteran Tim Darcy said Geelong's best was at least equal to any team in the league.

On Saturday, they produced a special performance, little known players like Liam Pickering, Grant Tanner (until injured), Shane Breuer and Adrian Hickmott being magnificent performers.

The slick, high-quality handball was reminiscent of the best Hawthorn teams of the late 1980s, while Blight's coaching was simply superb.

Club chief executive Greg Durham said Blight's pre-match speech was the most inspirational he had heard.





North Melbourne coach Denis Pagan described the Cats as "awesome".



"When they are kicking the ball like they were it makes it a lot easier for a full-forward."

Lyon earlier joked about his move to full-forward, prompted by a back injury suffered by regular spearhead Allen Jakovich.

He said the effort against Footscray erased the memory of a quiet afternoon the previous week when the Demons toppled Carlton.

Malaxos pointed out the victory could have a positive influence on the East Fremantle players.

After losing badly in the second semifinal with Claremont, the Sharks were forced to make the grand final the hard way.

Malaxos debuted for Claremont as a 17-year-old in 1979 and is one of the finest footballers WA has produced.

He was a member of the Tigers 1981 premiership team, won the Sandover Medal in 1984, was All-Australian captain the same year, took out Claremont's best and fairest award in 1983-84, won West Coast's 1987 club champion award on the way to playing 66 matches with the WA-based club, collected the Lynn Medal (East Fremantle's fairest and best) in 1991 and captained the Sharks 1992 premiership team.

At 33, many people have tipped this year will be Malaxos' last.

He is not so sure.

"It's a possibility, but there is more likelihood of me playing again next year," he said.

"It was good to stop them after halftime, but there were other guys in defence and the smaller blokes ran the ball out well," he said.

CRAIG Turley left the Eagles selectors with a fair bit of head-scratching to do before this Saturday's preliminary final against Melbourne.

Against East Fremantle, the 1991 Brownlow Medal runner-up had little trouble finding his feet in his first match since incurring a two-game suspension for striking Carlton's Greg Williams.

Turley was always going to be tagged and it came as no surprise when Chris Pobjoy opposed him at the start.

He quickly disposed of Pobjoy and gathered six handpasses and six kicks in a dominant first term.

But Sharks coach Ken Judge shifted Clayton Anderson on to the gifted midfielder and shut him down.




North Melbourne pair Corey McKernan and Wayne Carey are expected to poll well, but are ineligible through suspension.

Thinking aloud

THERE is nothing quite so stimulating as seeing the underdogs achieve victory and that's why last weekend's AFL football had that touch of magic about it.

Presents . . .

To hear that Geelong, one of the most unpredictable sides in the competition, had lost their three key play-makers — Mark Bairstow, Paul Couch and Garry Hocking — on the day of the game would have made them 'no-hope' in all quarters.

The fact that the club had kept a lid on their injuries — Hocking was probably out, Bairstow was in doubt, but likely to play and Couch wasn't even mentioned — showed something of the team spirit being stoked behind-closed-doors.

The Cats trio were crucial to Geelong's

hopes.


Between them they have had 887 kicks, 580 handpasses and taken 176 marks; they have only kicked 56 goals—but then they've got Gary Ablett, haven't they?

That represents an average of 72 possessions per game between them and with the tallies of most winning teams around 320 kicks and handballs, that's a big slice out of the side.

Few critics gave them any hope on the day of the game when their losses were discovered. Only Peter (Crackers) Keenan tipped them in the ABC commentary box — and that's not because of his nickname, but because he admires the spirit of the underdog. When he tipped them, co-commentator Tim Lane added: "As long as they've got Ablett, they've got hope."

How true he was and with Ablett kicking six goals — for a total of 125 — the Cats blitzed a lack-lustre Carlton, sending the one-time red-hot premiership favourites to early mothballs at the half-way mark of September.

It's victories like Geelong's that make Aussie Rules great.

The sense of the unpredictable keeps the fans alive; even those supporters of the lowly clubs in all leagues live in hope that one day they'll all click together and roll the top side.

Safety first

RECENT studies show that Australian Football is a relatively safe game for children to play.

A Melbourne hospital study showed that overall injury rates were low, but the risk of injury increased with age.

The study recorded football exposure and injuries for 1253 players during a full season, divided between 54 teams.

It was found that more than 16-percent of the children recorded an injury, but most were minor sprains, bruisings and inflammations not needing professional consultation.

The study identified that over the length of the football season, a player in 15s would average an injury resulting in medical attention every 4.2 seasons, while under 10s needed attention every 8.8 seasons.

The study also showed that rule modifications were successful as an injury control measure.

These modified rules include no ruckmen or rovers, reduced team numbers, smaller playing fields and no tackling.


The study recommended that modified rules be continued, mouthguards be compulsory and the grounds prepared with softer surfaces.

Similar studies for other sports such as rugby, soccer, basketball, cricket and hockey found higher injury rates among children taking part.

The study confirms the long-held belief by officials that football is a safe game when one considers the huge numbers playing and the modifications which have been made to make it attractive for younger children. Three big wins up for grabs on the footy!

My Melbourne football education spanned three coaches.

His successor Alan Joyce showed faith in me and provided the opportunity to play in a premiership team and win a club championship trophy.

Then came Peter Knights, who was full of modern ideas.

As for Gerard Neesham, it's fair to say he had a pull in my decision to join the Dockers.

With his record and reputation for developing young talent, he thoroughly deserves his chance to coach at AFL level.

After having debuted under Neesham in 1987 — and having the privilege of winning a Simpson Medal in a Tigers premiership side — it's obvious that I'm looking forward to playing with my original mentor.

Gieschen takes loss to heart

BEADS of sweat glistened on his forehead, the tie was loose around his neck and just above the Falcons logo on the pocket of his shirt a patch of moisture seeped through the cloth.

It was evidence that Jeff Gieschen had been through the wringer and within a moment or two, the mental anguish began to unfold.

The West Perth coach had just been through the most agonising hour of his life as coach of the Falcons and took it as a personal affront that his players let slip a match-winning lead against East Fremantle in the Pepsi Cup preliminary final.

The contingent of media personnel who spoke to Gieschen after the loss knew he would be disappointed, even devastated. But none of us was prepared for the line that Gieschen needed to examine where he was heading with his football.

From the outside looking in, Gieschen should have been satisfied with his work, but he was not about to accept mediocrity.

West Perth had had the chance to earn successive grand final berths and failure to cement that position caused him to question his preachings and whether the effort was worth it. TAKING STOCK STOCKS with GARY STOCKS of The West Australian

Gieschen had good reason to feel let down by his players, but let's hope that in the cold light of day, when he re-lives the agonising second half, he can salvage something from the wreck.

In the three years he has been at West Perth, he has helped to transform a club which finished at the foot of the premiership table and was going nowhere, into one that commands respect and is in a healthy position.

In that time, Gieschen has not only made several players, he has also instilled in them an infectious belief in each other and a preparedness to die for the man playing alongside.

FEELING

To create that team feeling among a bunch of players assembled from farflung parts of the country has been outstanding and perhaps for that reason Gieschen felt cheated last Saturday.

West Perth have usually been the team which refuses to yield despite overwhelming odds. It has generally been the Falcons who would keep chipping away when a cause was lost and occasionally notch an unexpected win.

This time, however, the boot was squarely on the other foot and the result was soul-destroying.

It forced an unexpected re-think on Gieschen's behalf and West Perth would do everything possible to persuade him to continue. That decision should be reached in the next few weeks.

Gieschen has had trouble juggling all his commitments — work, football and family, to find the correct balance mainly because the game demands so much of his time.

Success does not just happen, it is earned and Gieschen has devoted thousands of hours to the West Perth revival.

He has been criticised in some circles because such a big slice of the talent has come from Victoria, but he has been forced into that solution because of a dearth of young players filtering through in WA.

That should change now that the club is in one of the fastest growing urban pockets in the country.

It will take time, but the Falcons future in Joondalup seems assured and let's hope Gieschen is there to see it through to the day they break their premierhsip drought.

Lyon joins double-figure heroes

MELBOURNE'S Garry Lyon became the first player in 43 years to kick 10 goals or more in an AFL final, in Sunday's first semi against Footscray at the MCG.


Lyon is the fourth player to kick a double-figure tally of goals in a final, joining Carlton's Harry "Soapy" Vallence, Collingwood's Ron Todd and Geelong's George Goninon.

Vallence and Todd each kicked 11 goals in finals twice during the 1930s and Goninon was the last to achieve the feat, kicking 11 in the second semi-final against Collingwood in 1951.

Each double-figure tally has been recorded at the MCG.

The record for a final at Waverley Park is Tony Lockett's 9.4 in the second elimination final between St Kilda and Geelong in 1991.

The record for a final in Perth is Jason Dunstall's six goals at Subiaco Oval in the first elimination final in 1992.



MELBOURNE became the first team for five years to kick 10 goals in a quarter of a final with their thirdquarter 10.4 against the Bulldogs.

Geelong was the last team to kick double figures with 10.10 in the final quarter of the first semi-final against the Demons in 1989.

Essendon kicked 11.3 in the final quarter of the 1985 grand final against Hawthorn.

The record for one quarter of a final is Essendon's 11.8 against Melbourne in the third term of the 1946 grand final, which the Bombers won by 63 points.

THE four teams to have fallen by the wayside in September share the common link of being coached by former Hawthorn mentor John Kennedy.

Kennedy coached Hawthorn for 14 seasons and was tutor to Carlton's David Parkin (211 games between 1961-74), Footscray's Alan Joyce (49, 1961-65), Collingwood's Leigh Matthews (340, 1969-85) and Hawk Peter Knights (267, 1969-85).

CARLTON'S fall from grace at the end of the season was rapid after being premiership favourites a month ago.

The Blues dominated games at their home ground, Princes Park, winning all nine matches there — but won only six of their 15 games at other grounds.

The Blues won four of their six games at the MCG — and only two of nine. matches at other grounds.

The only other teams to be unbeaten at a home ground this season were Collingwood — with three wins at Victoria Park — and the Eagles — with four wins in the qualifying rounds at the WACA Ground.

Failure... or future?

WEST Perth's gripping first semi-final win over Subiaco may have cost them a crack at this year's WAFL Pepsi Cup, according to coach Jeff Gieschen.

The Falcons mentor said as much in the wake of last Saturday's meek second-half capitulation to East Fremantle at Subiaco Oval.

The Falcons led by 36-points at the long-interval, but were overrun by a rampant East Fremantle in the second-half to ultimately suffer a 23-point loss.

"It indicated that our performance last week took a lot out of us both mentally and physically," Gieschen said.

"Subiaco are a fantastic side. The preparation put into last week was just extraordinary to get a result.

We got that and maybe it took its toll in the second half."

Gieschen conceded that the Falcons inaccurate tally of

Gieschen conceded that the Falcons inaccurate tally of 4.10 in the opening term was costly.

"Our preparation was superb. The way we played the first half in terms of getting numbers to the ball and dominating play showed that we were very well prepared, but unfortunately we just couldn't put them away.

"Inadequacies come back to haunt you."

He was taking nothing away from the Sharks persistence.

"East Fremantle were wonderful," Gieschen said.

"They just kept boxing on. They did in the second half what we have done in the past.

"Full credit to them for that."

Apart from Darren Harris, who had 31 possessions, West Perth's key playmakers had no impact in the second half.

Craig Treleven worked his way on top of Darren O'Brien, Clayton Anderson out-tagged Craig Turley and winger Shaun McManus beat Paul Symmons.

"We went the whole second half with our so called jets contributing very, very little," Gieschen said. "It is a loss that will haunt us for some time."

Gieschen, a school teacher, is one of the most astute and affable coaches in the WAFL, but could be tempted to return to his native Victoria.

"You give as much as you can give and when you are not getting results you have to question how far do you want to go in this caper," he said, despite lifting the Falcons from last to second and third.

"We have given all we can give.

"It just depends where I'm at now and where the club's at."

The Falcons will not win a WAFL premiership until they recruit goalkicking talent, a fact Giecshen acknowledged after the loss.

"We definitely need some finishers up front. We need men who know how to play in the forward line," he said. "You can have blokes who can take big marks and

blokes who are quick.

"But if they don't know how to play forward play

and they not goal scorers or goal opportunists they may as well not be there.

"We don't have too many blokes in a forward line with a history of kicking a lot of goals."

A knee injury to Ian Downsborough and the retirement of Basil Zempilas due to work commitments robbed the Falcons of goalkicking depth this season.

"We haven't got anyone who can consistently kick goals" he said.

"We have got be on the lookout for one or two who can catch the ball and turn around and kick a goal."

Gieschen guides the Falcons to brighter pastures

Gieschen said West Perth improved on last year's grand final effort, despite a mass exodus of players over the summer.

"Apart from 60 minutes or two quarters on the weekend and a blowout against Subiaco near the end of the year, the rest of the season was quite magnificent," Gieschen said.

"We won more games than last year and we lost 27 of our 52 players over the summer and to regroup and be within an ace of going to another grand final, we are pretty proud of it."

The Falcons lost Robbie West (Footscray), Mark Merenda (Richmond), Todd Curley (Collingwood), Troy West (Williamstown), Wayne Dayman, Paul Hasler and Zempilas (all retired).

Gieschen said losing players was a problem all WAFL coaches faced.

"The continuity factor is the hardest that coaches have to come to grips with in the WAFL," he said.

"The clubs and the coaches that are able to group together and make them strive together for the one goal are the ones who have success at the end of the year.

"When you look at clubs like Claremont and even East Fremantle they have done that very well. "We were fortunate this year that we regrouped

Gieschen said his job was made easier through the groundwork laid down by his predecessor George Michalczyk.

"I owe a lot to George . . . he was at the club at a time when we were really struggling for personnel and he moulded a few young players," Gieschen said.

"Obviously Derek Hall, Darren O'Brien and Paul Mifka developed under George.

"After that what we endeavoured to do was develop a code of ethics that would help us become a consistent club.

"Then we set about improving our skill level, discipline and pattern of play and we have achieved that to the point where people would regard us as one of the most powerful clubs at this point in time.

"I'm not saying we are the most powerful club, but we are right there among them."



MARK Riley had a torrid introduction to WAFL coaching ranks.



Norwich Rising Star award

Scott's journey well worth it



IT WOULD be hard to face a more daunting prospect than the one that confronted Chris Scott this season.

The talented youngster was forced to leave his family in Melbourne and move to Brisbane to play with the Bears.

On top of that, he was forced to juggle his school commitments around his AFL duties.

So, if Scott, who turned 18 in May, didn't win the prestigious Norwich Rising Star award on pure ability, he deserved it for effort.

Scott's win in the second year of the award gave the Bears a 100 percent strike-rate after Nathan Buckley was a worthy winner last year.

To be eligible for the Norwich Rising Star Award, players must have been under 21 years of age, not have played more than 10 games before the start of 1994 and not found guilty of an offence by the AFL's judiciary during the season.

CASH PRIZE

The latter almost certainly cost North Melbourne youngster Corey McKernan the \$10,000 prize - and maybe even ruled out WA's Footscray star, Danny Southern.

McKernan, who is a key to the Kangaroos premiership chances, was found guilty of tripping against West Coast and suspended for one week.

And while the Roo's indiscretion re-

ceived a lot of negative media publicity, there was no-one arguing with Scott's win.

He was nominated for the award after starring for Brisbane against Footscray in round seven.

An aggressive half-back, not unlike a young John Worsfold, Scott's physical attributes belied his tender age.

Though he stands 178 centimetres and weighs only 76 kilograms, he is solidlybuilt and, like Worsfold, has a body that will be receptive to an extensive weights programme.

It wasn't uncommon to see Scott committ himself to a contest like a seasoned veteran and he refused to be over-awed by playing against players more than 10 years his senior.

Bears coach Robert Walls holds the youngster in high regard - something that was obvious when lined him up against Melbourne full-forward Allen Jakovich at the MCG on a Friday night in just his fifth senior game.

Scott was the 12th choice overall in last year's national draft after starring for the Eastern Rangers in the VSFL Under-18 competition.

Scott won a trip for two to Bali, flying business class and staying six nights in luxury accommodation at the Grant Hyatt Bali.

To his credit, Riley doesn't want to win the grand final to prove he is a worthy choice or to 'stick it up his critics'.

"It doesn't matter that we lost five games, or that we struggled to produce our best in some matches," Riley said.

"The fact is that we are in the grand final and the boys have a chance to win a premiership for the club.

Although Brian Beresford, Kevin Mitchell and Mark Hann (all retired), Daniel Southern (Footscray), Dale Kickett (Essendon), David Muir (North Melbourne) and Rob Malone, Chris Gerreyn and Glen Symonds (reserves) are missing from last year's premiership team, the Tigers still have a side with plenty of finals experience.

Claremont's dominance of all three grades since 1987 has been stunning and the youngsters emerging through the ranks at Tigerland are exciting.

"At the end of the day, it's the league side everyone looks at.'

Down by six goals and seemingly out of contention, the Sharks reeled in the Falcons with one of the boldest comebacks in WAFL history.

And if East Fremantle are successful against Claremont this Sunday, a lot of credit must go the way of coach Ken Judge.

Tigers must beat

IF Claremont coach Mark Riley was superstitious, he would have much to be concerned about in the lead-up to Sunday's Pepsi Cup grand final against East Fremantle.

Since 1988, four teams that have won the second semi-final have faltered two weeks later in losing the grand final when they were favourites.

In 1988 and '90, Claremont were the victims, while East Fremantle were basking in premiership glory in 1992 after being forced to play off in the preliminary final.

South Fremantle suffered the same sinking feelings as the Tigers in both 1989 and '92.

The Tigers also squandered opportunities to win successive pennants for the first time since 1939-40 in 1982, '88 and '90.

And to make matters worse for the worrying type, this year when Claremont held a gala weekend to celebrate the 30th anniversary of their 1964 premiership triumph over East Fremantle, they were beaten.

Perhaps Riley could argue that their luck is about to turn.

INTERESTED

The Tigers were interested spectators at East Fremantle's amazing come-frombehind win over West Perth in the preliminary final, watching proceedings from the two-tier stand.

And Riley was impressed with what he saw, particularly after half-time.

"They were very good and showed tremendous spirit," he said.

"To come from six goals behind and get up going away was a fantastic effort."

Riley paid special attention to the Sharks third quarter, when they kicked five goals to reduce the margin to just 13 points.

They then had the momentum and in the last quarter always looked like winning.

In East Fremantle's two comfortable home-and-away wins over Claremont, the Tigers were also victims of the Sharks aggression after the long interval.

In round 12, Ken Judge's men blew the game apart with an eight-goal burst, while in round 19, five goals in the third term extinguished any hopes of a Claremont win.

CHALLENGE

"Against us in the second semi-final, they came out hard, but we were able to answer their challenge," Riley said.


"In the other games, they were excellent after half-time and we were unable to stop them."

Judge was disappointed with his side's woeful effort against Claremont in the second semi-final, losing by 47 points.


They were outplayed from the outset and must produce a remarkable form reversal if they are to win on Sunday.

"I'd like to think we're better against Claremont this week than we were the other week," he said.

But after East Fremantle's great fightback, it is unlikely Judge would have it any other way.

MOMENTUM

The momentum must rest with the Sharks and the team spirit and camaraderie is encouraging.

"There is certainly no complacency at the club, in fact, there is a sense of urgency." Riley said.

He produced a master-stroke in the second semi when he used teenage defender Anthony Jones at centre-halfback.

coached by Riley, formed a half-back line with Quenton Leach and Brad Wira that had pace to burn.

Their rebound caught the Sharks offguard and with little pressure applied to them from the East Fremantle forwards, delivered the ball into their team's attacking half.

Judge used Paul Abbott at centre-halfforward against the Falcons and the twotime Hawthorn premiership player responded in grand fashion, pulling down nine marks and having 24 possessions.

OUTCOME

His strength was a problem for the Falcons defenders and whether Jones is strong enough to contain him on Sunday could have a big bearing on the outcome.

The decision on where East Fremantle big man Paul Harding lines up will also be crucial.

He is a fine tap ruckman and uses his agility and mobility to great advantage.

But last weekend, Judge started him in a forward pocket before swinging him to full-back to close down Ryan Smith.

Harding did everything his coach asked - and more - and after Tigers full-forward Paul Morgan bagged 8.2 in the second semi-final, the Sharks realise they must quell his firepower.

Claremont coach Mark Riley said there had been a sense of urgency at training a trait that was evident at the start of the year.


"We had a fabulous start to the year because we had no Eagles players coming in and out of training," Brayshaw said.




MARK Riley had every reason to rejoice after Claremont thumped East Fremantle by 47 points in the second semi-final.

He has endured a tough time from the media and football critics after taking over the Tigers midway through the year and many expected a finals win an unlikely result.


However, Riley didn't get carried away in the post-match press conference, instead declaring Claremont had one more win to notch before the 'job' was done.

THE MIDFIELDERS


THE injection of pace has been the major difference to Claremont's midfield.

Kelvin Holmes has his share of speed and with Brendan Green always busy, gave the Sharks taggers plenty to think about.


A positive sign in Claremont's success in the finals was that it was achieved without a huge input from established stars Scott Edwards and Andrew McGovern.

THE DEFENDERS



THE MIDFIELDERS


SHAUN McManus showed why he is regarded as an automatic selection for the Fremantle Dockers with a polished display against the Falcons.



The dashing teenager started on a wing opposed to West Coast squad member Paul Symmons and gradually wore him down to take the honours in a highly entertaining contest.


His effort in the first quarter when he rose high above a pack in the goalsquare, pulled down the ball and intelligently got it onto his boot for a goal, was brilliant.

Stagg makes the most of short stint

EAST Fremantle's Jon Stagg will have two special reasons to remember this season.

The promising wingman is a certain starter in this Sunday's Pepsi Cup grand final against Claremont and no matter what the result, the memory of playing in the season's most important game will linger as long as he lives.

But his feat in the Prendergast Medal was nothing short of stunning.

Stagg (22) played just six games in the reserves, but polled votes in five to rack up a winning total of 21.

Stagg didn't expect to figure so prominently in his limited time at that level.

"I got a fair bit of the ball, but you don't really know if you are going to get votes or not," he said.

"It's up to the umpires and different people see it different ways."

Runner-up was South Fremantle rover Andrew Krakouer, who received 19 votes — one ahead of Swan Districts Michael Young and Claremont's Anthony Shields, who tied for third.

Stagg has been tipped as a likely Fremantle Dockers recruit, but he is having nothing of it.

"I haven't even thought about it -I'm only looking to Sunday," he said.

TODD Burgess failed to achieve his individual goal this season, but he is not complaining.

Entering this year, the gifted on-baller was aiming at a league berth.

He felt that after a season with the Swan Districts colts and a top-five finish in the club best and fairest, a senior debut was not out of reach.

But that did not happen and the Donnybrook 19-year-old stayed in the underage competition.

Burgess was a stand-out performer at that level, polling 40 votes to win the Medallists Medal, from South Fremantle's Karl Gundersen (37) and Troy Johnson (35).

Subiaco's George Constantine finished fourth with 34.

"I thought I played well without starring," Burgess said.

"It was my goal to play league this year, so I'll be trying to break through next season."

Burgess polled in 10 games and received best afield honours in four.

The courageous little ball-getter is the son of former Perth (29 games) and Subiaco (31 games) player Barry Burgess and spent 1992 playing league football with Donnybrook in the South West Football League.

He was a member of the 1992 Teal Cup side.



With the Dockers arriving next season, Fremantle people will be keen to show their football loyalty and Sharks fans will be out in force this Sunday.


We believe there is a traditional hardcore band of grand final supporters who are always prepared to support their team.

Many see the WAFL Pepsi Cup grand final as a traditional event with the AFL preliminary final on Saturday drawing the maximum number of Eagles fans which should leave plenty of supporters over for Sunday's Pepsi Cup clash.

There are some interesting figures in this year's tally of crowds at the different WAFL grounds.

The introduction of the new Arena at Joondalup has totalled 40,109 for their 10 games — a figure boosted, of course, by their official opening crowd of over 15,000 fans.

Fremantle Oval, venue for this year's 100 years of football Foundation Day derby, attracted 37,142 fans to 10 games, with East Fremantle Oval, the venue for the other two derbies, drawing 28,920 people to 10 games.

The other grounds in order, all for 10 games, were: Bassendean 27,274; Subiaco 26,965; Perth Oval 24,780; Claremont Oval 23,226, Lathlain Park 21,959 with the neutral WACA Ground attracting 10,934.

Towns flag in Fortescue


TOWNS became the 1994 premiers in the Fortescue League after beating Tigers by 17 points.

Donnybrook went into the match as favourites after three wins over Augusta-Margaret River throughout the season, but were never allowed to find their


ADVANTAGE





Darren Hammond provided drive from the centre, while Clinton Atkinson and Travis Underwood were cool under pressure in defence.


For Osborne Park, half-back flankers Wade Tassef and Alex Casella battled hard and back-pocket Mike Bartlett saw plenty of the ball.






