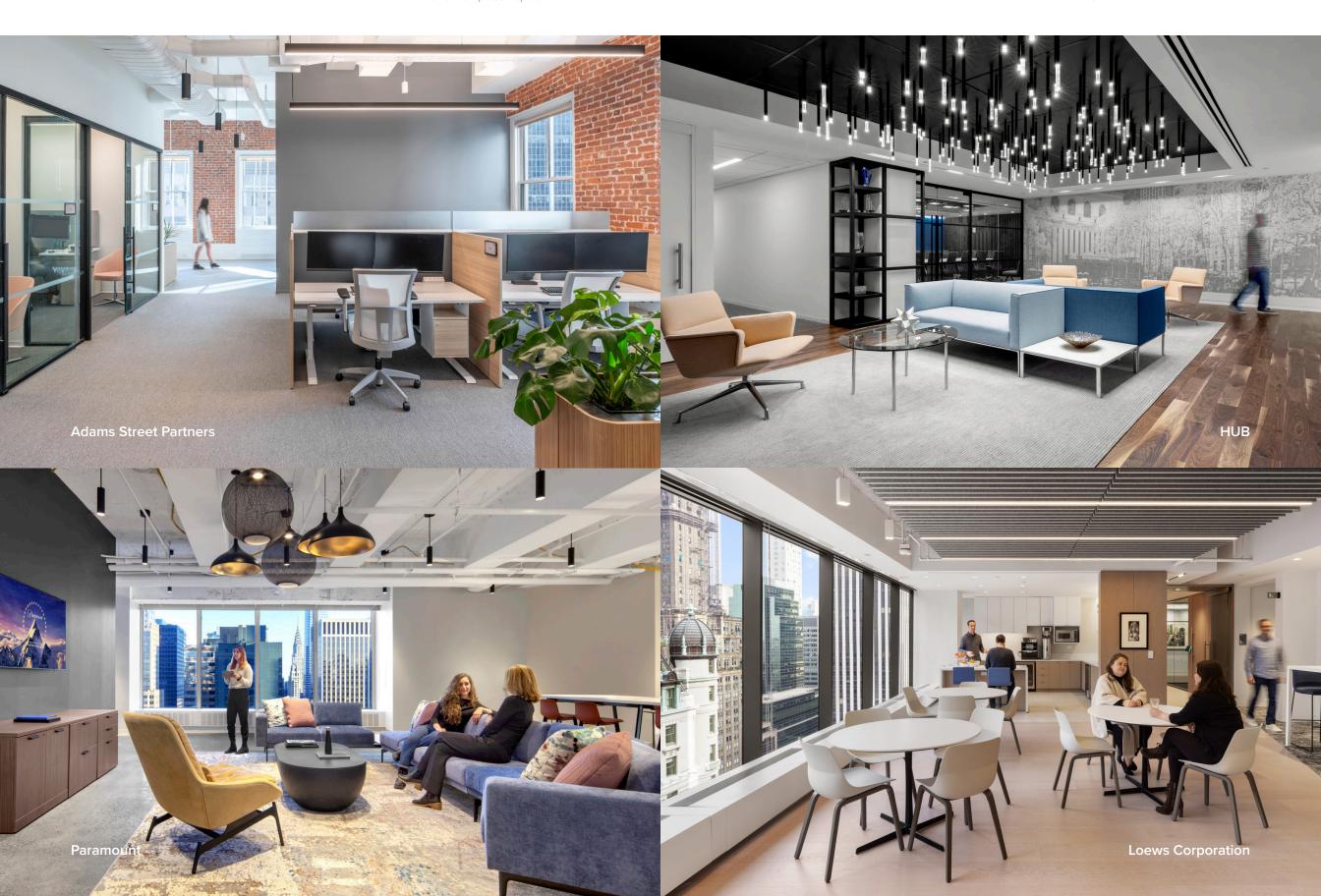


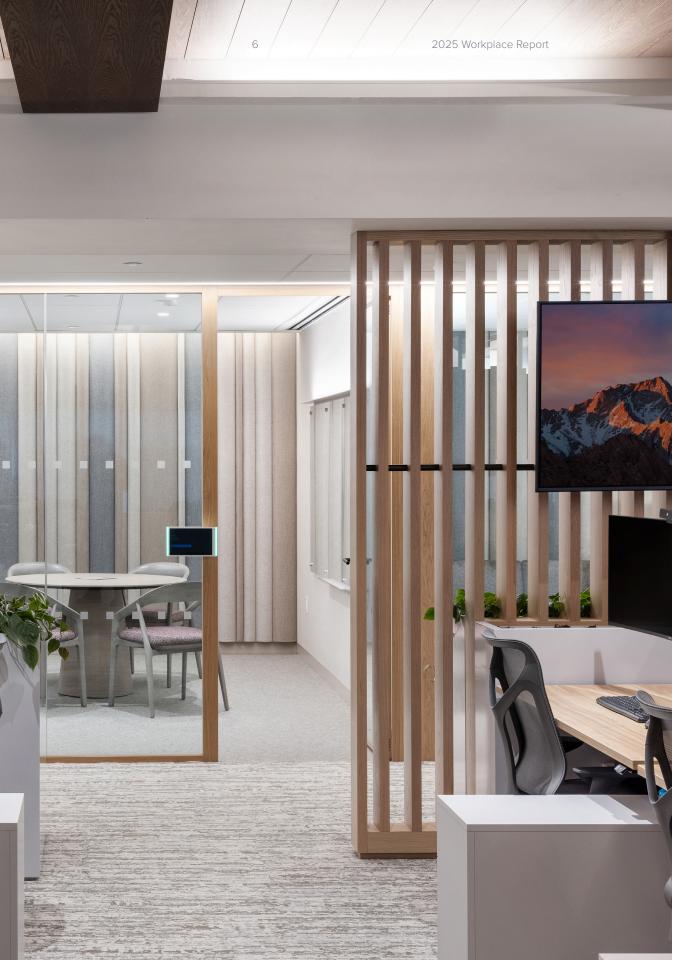

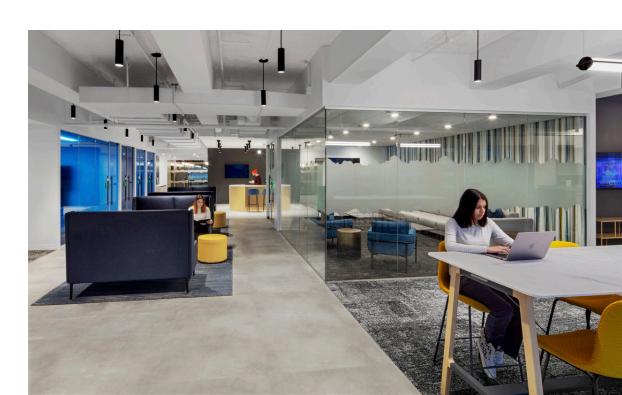


The Human Side

The ability to choose work spaces that foster creativity and innovation allows individuals to feel more engaged and in control of their work experience. By breaking away from static office layouts, employees experience greater satisfaction, which enhances their sense of ownership and belonging.

Modern workplaces prioritize agility, integrating modular furniture, multi-functional zones, and adaptable layouts. Organizations allocate 45%-60% of their seating to alternative workspaces, including touchdown seats, focus pods, and team-based collaboration areas.

In an era where remote work has proven effective, the office must provide unique value to be an asset for the organization-it must be a place employees want to be and are drawn to. Organizations are recognizing that the in-office experience should go beyond task execution, transforming the office into a place of well-being, engagement, and community that adds something unique to the workday. Beyond tasks, offices are designed to provide unique value, including elements that prioritize physical and mental well being.

Among the most common amenity spaces we see in modern workplaces are: wellness-focused amenities designed for relaxation and mental health breaks, hospitality-inspired cafe spaces and quality food and beverage options, nature-inspired design elements including biophilic design features to improve mood and productivity, and dedicated innovative zones designed for teamwork and brainstorming.



The Human Side

Enhanced features create environments that promote collaboration, well-being, and trust. These spaces foster meaningful connections, enabling employees to work comfortably and productively while feeling a strong sense of belonging and purpose.

The Data Side

Our data shows that 86% of employees believe that wellness-focused workplace strategies contribute to their overall job satisfaction and productivity. Design elements play a crucial role, all of our projects are incorporating wellness amenities into their spaces including biophilia, active design, and sustainable strategies.

The connections we build with colleagues are key to workplace happiness and success. The physical office fosters the tangible connections that virtual spaces can't replicate, such as casual conversations over coffee or in-person meetings where ideas are exchanged. Offices are now designed not just for individual tasks but also informal collaboration zones driving socialization and connection.

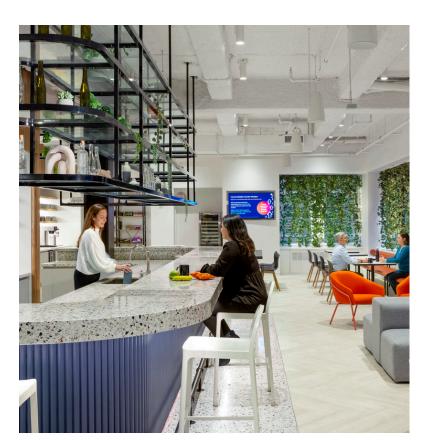
However, it is equally important to offer privacy when needed. While connection is a major reason for coming to the office, privacy is essential for productivity. Offering spaces with visual and acoustic privacy allows employees to work, attend virtual meetings, or take personal calls without distraction. These areas also support mental and emotional well-being by providing a place to recharge. Privacy doesn't always mean enclosed spaces; thoughtful office layouts, such as desks placed away from high-traffic areas, can also provide comfort and a sense of privacy.

The Human Side

Employees are more engaged when they have positive relationships with their colleagues. However, offering opportunities for privacy and reflection are also necessary to support employee needs and productivity. Striking the right balance can enhance overall employee satisfaction.

The Data Side

Top concerns we have found for productivity include lack of space to reset/recharge, lack of privacy, and difficulty to concentrate due to acoustics. Offices that incorporate dedicated focus spaces are typically doing so at a ratio of 1 per 25 employees to accommodate the current demand of virtual calls.

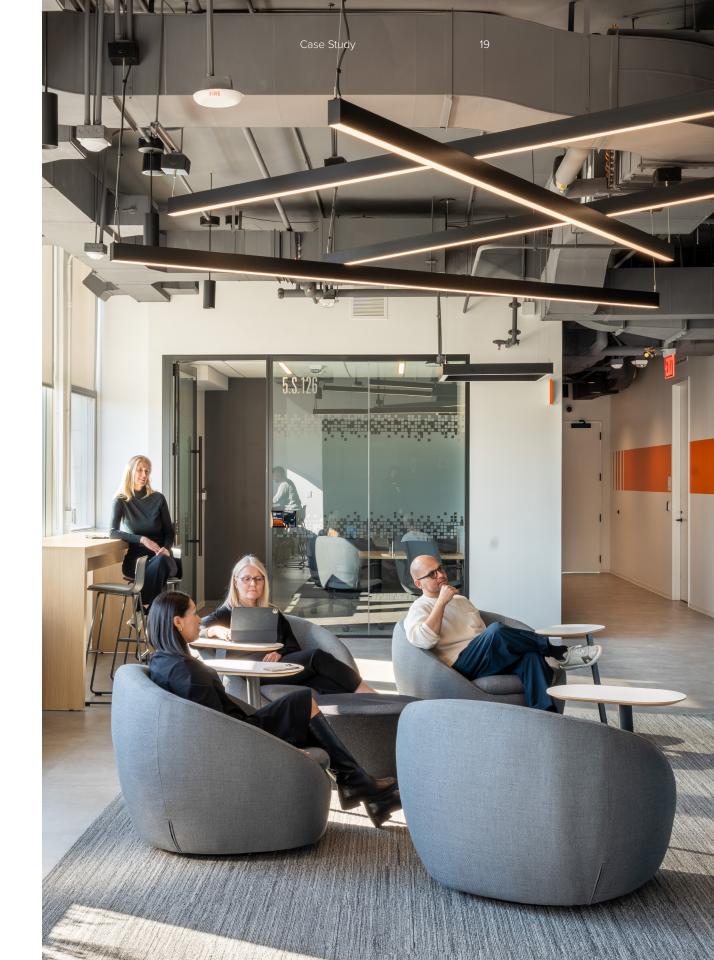




Fiserv Case Study

Over the past 5 years, TMA has completed three major office projects for Fiserv--their Tech Innovation Center in Berkeley Heights, NJ, their New York office in a historic lower Manhattan building, and their US Headquarters in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

These projects display Fiserv's commitment to providing world-class workspaces that foster collaboration, innovation, and environmental responsibility.

Workspaces

Although the groups occupying these projects vary from corporate functions to tech staff and software developers, at the core of the workspace design for all locations was the goal of providing a bespoke balance of spaces to support the teams working there, including workstations, private offices, phone rooms, huddle rooms, lounges, and open collaboration spaces.

The sustainability stories for each location vary as well--the NJ Tech Center is certified LEED Platinum, whereas Milwaukee was an adaptive reuse of a historic and abandoned department store building. Many existing features, such as cream-city brick walls, were maintained.

At the NJ Tech center, unique flexible workstations facilitate the teams' collaborative work style by allowing end-users to select which way their desk faces. If they are working collaboratively or seeking privacy, they can rotate their desk to accommodate their needs.

Amenity Spaces

At the heart of each of Fiserv's office is a unique amenity that not only supports collaboration, connection, and well-being, but also speaks to the workplace culture of each location.

In the NJ Tech Center, a central atrium is highlighted with transparent multimedia screens used for branding display and can be programmed to support campus town hall gatherings. Surrounding this atrium are amenities such as Barista bar, Tech bar, and cafe areas.

In Milwaukee, the central stadium stair acts as a similar central artery, promoting connection among all floors and access to surrounding amenity and support spaces.







The NY office boasts an expansive penthouse event space with full cooking kitchen and private dining rooms, along with an outdoor terrace.

Another floor houses the Innovator's Lounge, a staff amenity space that features the main cafeteria, alternative workspaces, and flexible furniture for town-halls.

In developing each workplace report, we use USF in order to compare projects consistently across regions and varying building types. It is measured as the area of the building from the finished face of the building's interior to the centerline of demising walls, not including any vertical penetrations. In other words, it's the space you can use!

Transformation and **Optimization**

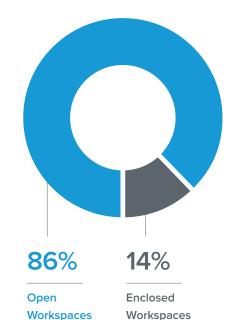
Workplaces are experiencing a significant transformation in design, primarily driven by the successful implementation of hybrid workplaces these past several years. This shift is creating more flexible, resilient, and user-friendly workplaces.

Our clients are optimizing their workplace environments to improve employee satisfaction and productivity.

Before 2020, we were seeing a consistent decrease in enclosed workspaces and USF/work seat. However, a successful hybrid work environment requires privacy and a variety of alternative workspaces. Therefore, in the past five years, we have seen an increase in both the percentage of enclosed work seats and in USF/work seat.

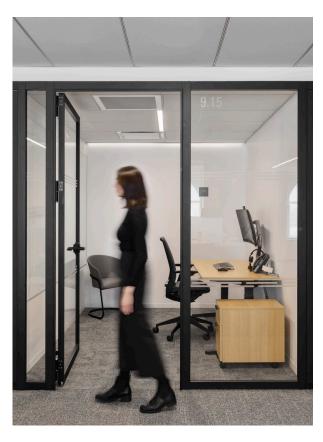

2.2

Full Occupancy Planning

Many clients are planning their workspaces for full occupancy, ensuring one work seat for every employee to accommodate the possibility that all staff may be present simultaneously. The definition of a work seat, however, has expanded to include any location that can support the user both ergonomically and technologically. This approach supports readiness for any scenario, from typical to peak occupancy.



In scenarios where unassigned seating is implemented, we are still seeing space planned in "neighborhoods." These neighborhoods accommodate specific business needs while maintaining flexibility, and provide end users with convenient access to amenities, support, and collaboration spaces.

Assigned Seating

Most clients use an assigned seating strategy, although it is still essential to offer a few additional seating options, such as hoteling seats, for visitors and traveling employees. This ensures that non-resident staff and external partners have adequate workspace when they are on-site.

Occupancy Rates



Average daily occupancy rates remain around 60-65%, echoing pre-pandemic levels. This consistency in occupancy rates highlights that even with strategic planning for full

capacity, actual office attendance often reflects a hybrid model where a significant portion of the workforce continues to work remotely or in a hybrid capacity.

Open Workspaces

Open workspaces continue to be a dominant trend, with 86% of modern work environments adopting open-plan layouts. This preference reflects a shift towards fostering collaboration, accessibility, and flexibility in the workplace. Within these open spaces,

benching systems have become particularly popular, however, we have seen the desire to add personalization and modern storage solutions. As a result, the minimum overall width of benching desks is growing to be 5'-6" to 6'-0" as a new standard.

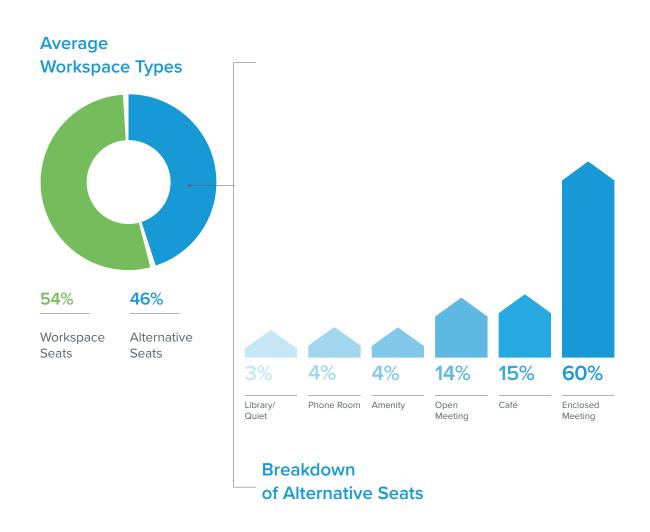
Alternative Spaces

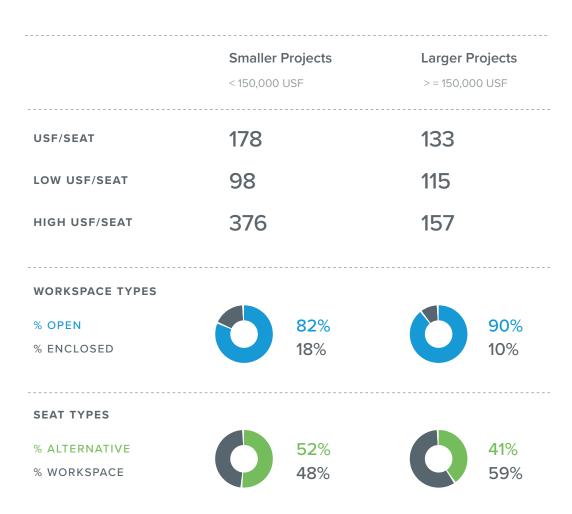
Where and how people work and collaborate drives creativity, productivity, and the quality of work an organization produces. Providing people choice in spaces for various activities directly ties to their productivity, and the physical workplace emulates this through what we call "alternative spaces."

While the number of these shared spaces dropped over the past 5 years, there are still nearly half of all the seats available for employees to use. This drop correlates with an increase in enclosed workspaces and an in the footprint of open workspaces, due to an increased desire for individual privacy.

Work Environments

It is not one size fits all which is why we also filter our benchmarked projects to distinguish between smaller and larger projects. This provides further insight when benchmarking a current or future workplace, specific to a company's strategic direction.

Industry Breakdown

The data below helps to illuminate the differences across specific industries. It is of note that many companies are now becoming a blend of industries, and may choose to identify themselves outside their prior branded industry. The variation in distribution of enclosed to open workspaces along with percentage of alternative seats demonstrates how work environments can differ as a reflection on the type of service or product delivered.

Technology and Digital Media

- Focus on innovation and collaboration, prioritize communication through open, flexible spaces.
- Incorporate advanced tech tools and creative zones, including brainstorming areas and team hubs.

Professional Services

- Design includes flexible meeting rooms, acoustically isolated areas
- Increasing investment in hybrid work technology to support remote and in-person collaboration.

Financial Services

- Primarily enclosed spaces to ensure privacy and confidentiality.
- Open layouts are gradually introduced, balanced with quiet zones and secure meeting rooms.

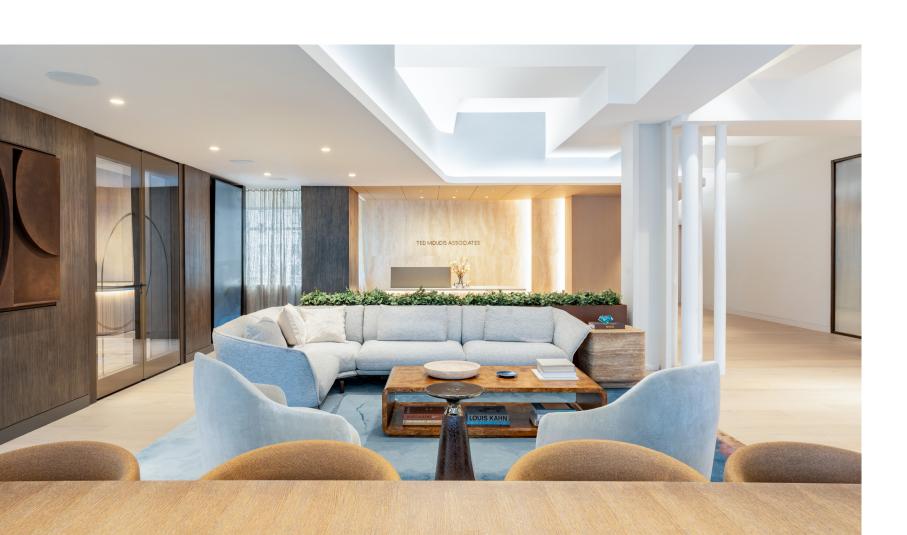

not only need to be, but want to be--a true destination in itself?

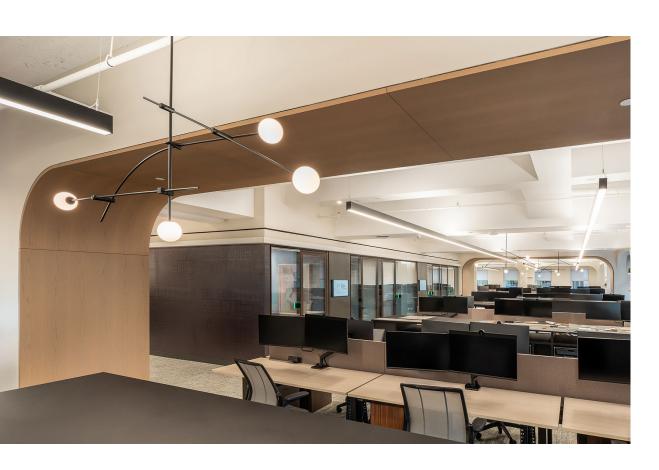
After much consideration, we determined that the space had to be experiential above all else.

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TMA Case Study

The open workspace is lined with phone rooms and huddle rooms, providing opportunities for privacy which is necessary in modern workspaces.

Experiential branding can be found throughout the office, from the TMA blue books in the cafe, to a custom Art Deco inspired pattern on the glass fronts, referencing our historic home in the Chrysler Building.





The main cafe space is the heart of our office, and was designed with the main circulation path running through it, encouraging staff to engage with the space, even if only in passing.

Our new office space embodies our perspective of what an office should be, and is a true reflection of our passion, expertise, and workplace culture.

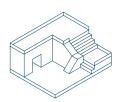
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Design with Purpose

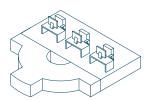

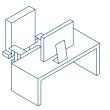
