Adult Ministry

Adult Education Hour has resumed in full, following over a year of minimal meeting. Throughout the year, the Colbert Presbyterian Book group met regularly after most Sunday morning services with usually ten to twenty people participating. Both fiction and non-fiction books were discussed and often a meal would be shared for the final discussion of the book. As of Jan 15, a full plate of options once again exists, including the resumption of fellowship groups, which include a reflection/processing of the day's message and scripture, as well as a second book group that is an extension of our recent *Loving Across Our Differences* congregation-wide conversation. They are discussing Karen Keen's *Scripture, Ethics, and the Possibility of Same-Sex Relationships*.

Women's Bible Study meets weekly on Thursdays from 9:30-11:30. Weekly leadership often rotates, with various individuals contributing devotionals, discussion leading, and/or refreshments.

CPC Men's Fellowship Group continues to meet at 9:00 Saturday mornings in the CPC library.

A six-week evening course on **Contemplative Prayer** was held last year during Lent. Each week the group explored a different form of prayer - breath prayer, lectio divina, centering prayer, etc. There were 40 participants, the majority of whom were from CPC, but there were a few outside of our congregation who joined us as well. The group was led by Elizabeth Peterson. Each week was a combination of small groups, large group conversation, right-brain engagement and teaching. In addition to trying each form of prayer at home for the week, the group was offered optional "homework" for further reading and exploration.

Children's Ministry

Children from birth through 5th grade are under the umbrella of CPC children's ministry. Our program was still in the rebuilding phase as we were dealing with a staff shortage and the fallout from COVID. Some real positive rebirth was seen in some of our programs this year with hopes to continue for a full resurrection of all children's ministry programs in the fall of 2023.

- We had an unfilled position for Director of Children's Ministry although it had been posted since late 2020. We were able to interview and hire Heather Mikelson this summer. Unfortunately, she was unable to move from overseas to start the position in a timely manner due to familial circumstances. In the meantime, Eliza Griffith, a new regular attender, was able to step in mid fall as the interim Director. She has been an absolute godsend for CPC's children. The intention and care she brings to all the program is refreshing and so helpful. We are looking to the future with a permanent Director, either Heather or Eliza, and continued growth of programs under the more stable leadership.
- 2) During worship we continued to provide nursery care for children 3 and under. Older children were excused for Children's Worship during the sermon where all of the children are brought together to limit the volunteers we need. During children's church, Cindy Boldrick, was kind enough to volunteer to coordinate Bible lessons and activities for the summer and fall. She was an intentional and creative blessing for our children's ministry team. Eliza has now taken over planning lessons and activities. Starting this winter, a Sunday School children's program began in collaboration with the adult education hour. A more robust program began January 15th 2023.
- 3) This summer and fall we reinstated a modified "Lighthouse Kids" activities. We held monthly drop-off events for the children of CPC. The events varied and in the summer they were more casual. This fall they all included a meal, a lesson, and an activity. We had pretty good turnout for all of the events.
- 4) MOPS, Colbert Presbyterian Coop Preschool, and Mini VBS continued to be on hiatus after the COVID shutdown. There is real movement to get the preschool opened back up for fall 2023.
- 5) Volunteers have been wonderful to help us run all of these ministries. However, looking forward we will need even more support of these ministries to provide the robust children's spiritual development our kids deserve.

Youth Ministry

Students in grades 6-12 come under the care of CPC's Youth Ministry. In 2022, this has remained a steady and loving space for students due largely to the continued guidance and leadership of the Director of Youth Ministries, Christ's partner in this ministry, Marissa Kuuskvere.

Youth Ministry Highlights 2022:

- The continuation of "Big Sunday Fun" events held once a month after services during the school year.
- The continuation and transformation of Monday Night Bible Study. This has evolved somewhat in 2022 due to growth in attendance; the group having become too large and their discussions too varied in maturity level, Marissa had to break the group in two. The natural split was between Middle School and High School. It is now an every-other-week model; the Middle School students meet with Marissa one week and the High School students meet with her the next.
- The first re-instatement of Youth Sunday since 2019. Members of the Youth Ministry Program enthusiastically served Colbert's congregation by organizing and facilitating Sunday morning Worship in April. Huge thanks to Bob Perry in the sound booth and Chris Morgan, Elder for Worship for helping to get that going and to keep it moving.
- The successful conclusion of the first Student Leadership Team under Marissa's tenure:
 - Total of 9 high school student participants who served their peers on a weekly basis by helping to facilitate Wednesday Night Youth Group through greeting fellow students coming into the space, thoughtful games, and heartfelt worship.
- Summer Trips:
 - Backpacking near Priest Lake
 - o Priest Lake Cabin Overnight
 - White Water Rafting in Montana
- Our students attended Camp Spalding's Summer and Fall Retreats; diving deep into the joy that is re-creation and experiencing the closeness of God in the stillness of nature.
- Blessings Under the Bridge Service Night. We were able to serve the population of Spokane struggling with homelessness this Fall thanks to Blessings Under the Bridge an experience finally realized by the persistent urging of Kyle Smith, Elder for Missions. It was a reality many of the students had not seen before. Blessings Under the Bridge helped our students take a step toward understanding the deep love Christ has for their fellow humans experiencing homelessness and the closeness of God in the noise of the urban sprawl. It's an experience they have brought up many times since. Thank you for the nudge, Kyle!
- Volunteer Leadership growth in 2022. We've added a new volunteer leader! We now number four, in all:
 - Elyse Herrera-Bumpus
 - o Katie Mann
 - o Dwight Spotts
 - o Josiah Hunter
- Refresh Committee. Marissa is working with a group of students to update the Youth House this school year, they have been and will continue to be hard at work planning and implementing changes or updates that will help bolster the mission of the Youth Ministry. Working alongside Bob Olson, Dwight Spotts, and Tim Groe, Elder for Buildings and Grounds, they will create a space that will help their peers feel welcomed and at home.

- The second Student Leadership Team has begun its work. They are a smaller group, focusing their energies on our time of worship. By the time this is read, they will have planned and executed an hour-long worship night, leading their peers in making a joyful (if not perfectly in tune) noise for the Lord. The goal of that worship night is for students to participate in collective and individual contemplation and prayer. The remainder of their year as Student Leaders will be spent in intentional mentorship meetings and in thoughtful planning for Wednesday night Youth Groups where they'll serve their peers by continuing to lead them in worship and prayer as a team.
- Annual Budget Update. This is still in process. Marissa spoke to me in November about proposing a Youth Ministry budget increase I hope to finally have that increase fully presented and passed by the Stewardship and Finance Committee soon, thanks to Rich Stevens, Elder for Finance and Stewardship, for your assistance in understanding that process!
- Student Attendance in 2022. Our list of "regular attenders" grew upon inviting 6th grade students to join us for Wednesday night Youth Groups, and that number has stayed steady in 2022. But attendance numbers do spike depending on the week. In all, we have about 25 students we consider regular attenders and there are 29 students who attend programming at least once a month, but we have seen as many as 37 students in one night. The following are approximate attendance numbers for the year given a typical Wednesday night Youth Group:
 - 6-8 grade "Regular Attenders": approximately 15
 - 6-8 grade "Casual Attenders": approximately 5
 - 9-12 grade "Regular Attenders": approximately 10 depending on the month.
 - 9-12 grade "Casual Attenders": approximately 5

While numbers have grown some, as evidenced above, the true growth is found in the caring relationships, the supportive community, and the many and varied hearts of the young people who are blessed by and who bless CPC. In this past year we have been privileged to walk alongside and watch students grow in their faith, encouraging them to voice their doubts and their hard questions and to wrestle with those questions in the context of a loving and Christ-centered community. Their eagerness for depth of relationship with Christ and with others is infectious. We have celebrated with them in their joyous moments and have wept with them and for them in their moments of deep sorrow. These moments have been lived out in in the Youth House, and in meaningful conversations around campfires, in brief encouraging messages, over cups of coffee, in birthday cards, in attending a sporting or theater event - in the ordinary parts of life. The true flourishing of the Youth Ministry at Colbert is in the Christ-like love we strive to extend to students. As the Youth Ministry continues to lean into intentional and consistent relationships and faith, steadily and richly cultivated by and through God's servant Marissa, may we continue to connect with and show the love of God to each student who passes through the Youth House.

Care Giving

"Colbert deacons will strive to serve people with Christ-like love and creativity, always inviting others within our church community to come and serve with us in ministry."

The ministry of the office of Deacon is to provide members and regular attendees of the congregation with opportunities for confidential, prayerful help when it is needed. Through compassionate and gentle service, it is our desire to keep in close touch with church members and attendees so that we may anticipate needs, offer comfort, and provide help and healing care whenever possible.

To accomplish those goals, your deacons work very hard to stay in touch with you. Each deacon ministers to 13-15 households which are referred to as "flocks." We have always tried to stay current with our congregation through attendance records. Covid halted the use of "friendship pads" and the deacons had to get creative. We've managed to stay in contact with each of our flock members via phone calls, letters, personal visits, or a greeting on Sunday morning at church. A deacon's main responsibility is to stay in touch with their flock so that they may respond in times of crisis, illness or other periods of need. Paramount to caring for a flock is prayer. You are prayed for regularly. Every month the entries on the prayer chain are updated and reviewed. Some may recall a "follow-up" call after sharing with the prayer chain. Each deacon is encouraged to keep that updated prayer list accessible and use it daily. Your deacon is only as effective as he or she is informed. It's not an empty promise when you receive an introductory letter stating, "I'm here for you. Call me if you need assistance, prayer, or support." We meet once a month to share needs, pray together and plan ways to better serve our "flocks."

And most importantly, praying for our people. Colbert Presbyterian Church has been bathed in prayer, from our newborns to our eldest. From the casual attendee to those in leadership. From our PNC to the people, they were seeking/examining/interviewing.

Our Deacons are a dedicated group and are supported by others in the congregation who, while not formally recognized as a deacon, serve others within the body. A heartfelt thank you to you all.

A brief footnote or post script here: Please do not hesitate to contact your deacon or me for any needs you might have. I repeat: We are only as effective as we are informed. And if you feel led to be involved in this incredible ministry, we'd love to hear from you.

In 2021 Fellowship, in one of their brainstorming sessions, asked Session to approve a bazaar to be held in November 2022. We received their blessing. Once again in December we were able to make gift baskets for some of the senior clients at New Hope. Each basket included a gift card to Walmart, gloves, a hat, blanket, sweets, a candle, and other special treats. 14 baskets were distributed in time for Christmas.

Committee member Liz Todd worked on creating a general information pamphlet to be available in the narthex for newcomers. This pamphlet includes the ministries and activities offered through the church. Coming soon!

Stewardship and Finance

Stewardship.

CPC is able to carry out a wide scope of mission because of good stewardship practices. Thank you for letting CPC be an avenue for these acts of sharing in God's name and service!

The bulk of this report is financial ... easy enough for accountants to tally and report. But it's much more difficult to measure adequately all the time and abilities that are graciously and joyfully shared. Other areas in this annual report provide examples of involvement. Another attempt here to recap would fall woefully short.

Summary of Operating Income

Income and expenses for church operations in 2022 are summarized here. For reference, the 2022 budget included expenses of \$493,000, estimated income of \$450,000 and a projected net loss of \$43,000. Actual 2022 net income was \$9,000 positive because expenses were further below budget than the income shortfall. The primary reason that expenses were below budget was continued staff vacancies.

Debt. CPC had no mortgage and no long-term debt outstanding at any time during 2022. There was no interest expense. In September 2021, the congregation approved authority to borrow for the proposed building expansion. A borrowing arrangement was put into place in May 2022 for up to \$2 million. Construction expenditures were slower than anticipated, so nothing was borrowed in 2022.

Building Expansion. To accomplish the proposed Gathering Place building expansion plan, CPC initiated the "Come to the Table" capital campaign in 2021. Commitments were tallied in February 2022, reaching \$1.9 million. Come to the Table commitments cover three years, with donations anticipated through 2024⁵. Many thanks to everyone involved in the campaign, especially to those who have shared resources toward the project.

After reviewing updated cost estimates, coupled with authority to borrow during construction, the Session approved commencing construction and entering into a financing agreement. Ceremonial groundbreaking was in May. And then ... we waited. When permits were finally issued, major construction got underway in the fall. Progress was impacted by winter and temporarily suspended to avoid excess costs of working in harsh conditions.

The "Come to the Table" response is impressive. Donations received in 2022 were quite strong and since the start of the campaign (late 2021 through 2022), donations reached half of the committed amount with two years to go.

The ability to borrow up to \$2 million allows construction to proceed ahead of donations arriving. The construction delay has allowed more donations to accumulate ahead of spending, which is expected to reduce the amount borrowed and its related interest cost.
