Longtime Franklinville Event Celebrates Huge Milestone





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
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#### GOLF OUTING TO BENEFIT 11 DAY POWER PLAY

Included in their list of beneficiaries are Roswell Park, Camp Good Days, Roswell Park Oishei Children's Cancer and Blood Disorders Program, and Make-A-Wish WNY.

The actual game kicks off Thursday, June 20th when community ice shifts open up. Registered teams are allotted three hours of playtime on the ice, and the game is open to players 11 and up. However, the festivities start off the ice as well, with the opening celebration running from 7:00-9:00pm at the LECOM Harborcenter.

Racers take your mark! Multiple events are making their way to Cattaraugus County to challenge your endurance while adding a few fun surprises along the way. So sprint, jog or power walk your way to the starting line and get ready to take on the adventures that await you at the EVGV 5k De Mayo, the Little Valley Ole 5k, and the Happy Half marathon, which also offers a 5k and a Beer Mile.

#### **EVGV 5K DE MAYO**

Our mountain terrain sees it all - between the mud, snow and green grass - and each season brings something new to enjoy. Springing into action, let's get ready to run the EVGV Cinco De Mayo 5k happening at HoliMont on Sunday, May 5th.

Local residents are well aware of the efforts of the EVGV Trail organization, so now is your chance to run some trails to make some trails! HoliMont, America's largest private ski club, has grown into a four-season destination over the years with the perfect amenities to partner up for a few miles of fun.

Runners will be greeted at registration and whisked up to the top of the mountain. The course will wind along Saddle Pond, through the hiking trials, down Greer Hill and then bring runners to the last sprint toward the finish line by the HoliMont Chalet. Runners make note, while enjoying the scenic paths, you may want to keep an eye out for something else worth seeing... Trailsquatch. Hiding among the racers, the creature peers through the trees waiting for its chance to take the lead. Share your stories and sightings of the legendary Trailsquatch at the after-party back at the HoliMont Chalet with a Cinco De Mayo spread complete with tacos and music!

Participants of the EVGV 5k De Mayo can expect to receive a complimentary scenic ride on the Expo chairlift to the top of HoliMont, a competitor's race shirt, medal, and of course entry to the post-race taco party. Kristen Sciara, EVGV Trail committee member commented on what she looks most forward to as they wrap up their final preparations. "I love that we are already getting messages from competitors signing up who are different levels of runner. Many are excited to have a race where walking is welcome, so their kids and family members feel comfortable to participate, too! This is the foundational idea of the EVGV Trail. A place where everyone can get outside, enjoy nature and a bit of exercise."

Registration for the event starts at 10:00am on Sunday, May 5th and is priced at \$35 for adults and \$25 for students. All proceeds from the event will go directly to the EVGV Trail.

The EVGV Trail has been a long rooted for community project, formed back in 2011 by residents who saw the need for a walkable and safe multi-use trail system to connect locals and visitors alike to the area. And with some major updates in the planning process,

The Friends of the Valley have been eager to create an event that brings family, friends and visitors together for a day to brush off the winter blues and celebrate some much-needed springtime sunshine. Gathering that community spirit, the event aims to promote an active and enjoyable environment connecting runners, walkers and anyone in between to join in the fun - whether it's on the trail or at the after-party!

Speaking with Cedric Manganiello from the Friends of the Valley organization, he shared with us how the event came to be. "We were inspired to create this event in hopes of establishing a new annual tradition that stands out in the community. By organizing a unique and lively 5k walk/run with a fun theme, we aim to not only raise funds for charity but also generate resources for future events. We believe that bringing the community together for a good cause, while having a great time, will leave a lasting impact and create memorable experiences for all participants."

Through the efforts of the community, a portion of the event proceeds will go directly to the Saving Grace Outreach of Cattaraugus, NY which offers food programs, shelter services, education, advocacy and more to those experiencing hardship. It proves to be a special event for our community to grow and explore, paired with the opportunity to give back. A big thanks to the hard work of our local organizations and the vision they make possible with this new 5k event.

So, what better way to celebrate what is sure to be a success than with some of our favorite refreshments! EBC little Valley will be hosting the after-party for the event as the fun goes on with drinks and lawn games to continue through the evening. Cedric Manganiello went on to give us a glimpse of what's to come once you cross that finish line. "After the 5k, EBC has generously donated a free beer for each patron to enjoy as they celebrate their accomplishment. In addition, there will be corn hole set up for some friendly competition, and special food offerings to refuel after the race. While we are still finalizing the post-race activities, we guarantee a fun and lively atmosphere for all

they continue to push on, but funding is still crucial to achieve the end goal.

Kate O'Stricker of the committee let us know some of the current progress in the works. "The EVGV Trail committee has completed the detailed design for the Elk Creek portion of the trail with a \$50,000 grant from the Ralph Wilson Foundation. This portion of the trail will run between the Nannen Arboretum/Ellicottville Town Center, through the Ellicottville Village Park to Elizabeth Street. The Tim Hortons portion of the trail has been roughed in and the EVGV Trail committee and the Town of Ellicottville are in the process of getting signed easements with the seven landowners who have already approved grading rights for the trail."

This race isn't just about the finish line; its about the community. With hopes to add funding to the EVGV Trail, all proceeds will be added to the organization's efforts in constructing a walkable network that runs throughout the Ellicottville and Great Valley area.

Kristen expressed her excitement of the newly created 5k trail run/walk and gave us some insight on what participants can expect. "This is the first year; our intention is to make this an annual event. May is an excellent time to enjoy springtime in Ellicottville. Our registration is open, and competitors are signing up every day! We have reached out to running and hiking groups in our region, and thanks to a grant we were awarded from the Department of Economic Development, Planning, & Tourism, we have been advertising to our neighbors from Toronto to Pittsburgh! We hope this will bring tourism into the Village of Ellicottville as well! The trail continues on each day and with the help of engaging and exciting events like the 5K De Mayo, we get one step closer to the final goal!"

Ski Club of Lockport Present Donation to Roswell Park Alliance Foundation

LOCKPORT, NY - The second annual Ski 4 a Cure, presented by SCOL (Ski Club of Lockport) and hosted by HoliMont on February 16, 2024, was a fun and memorable experience that benefited Roswell Park's Comprehensive Cancer Center's most pressing needs. Through HoliMont event ticket sales, online, offline donations, basket and 50/50 sales, SCOL and HoliMont raised \$10,500, which SCOL presented to the Roswell Park Alliance Foundation on March 21, 2024.

Every dollar raised for research leads to \$23 in external grant funding, which would equal \$241,500 to help support 20 donor-funded research initiatives, 50 plus donor-funded quality of life programs and so much more for Roswell Park's 49,000 patients.

Skiing conditions were tremendous, courtesy of the awesome job of HoliMont's trail grooming. The weather was mostly overcast with snow and colder temperatures, which all made for fantastic skiing! The fun-filled day of events included a free demo day provided by The City Garage. Technicians quickly fit participants from a wide selection of skis to try. Their tent was conveniently located just below the Expo chair. Thanks go out to Trey Clauss and Sean Lowes.

The cancer survivor parade - the signature event - snaked down Expo slope to honor survivors and their families. This year participants wore a variety of color beads to represent the different types of cancers. A grab bag prize was awarded for the best parade costume. For the scavenger hunt, participants took selfies with the selected items from a list that was provided by HoliMont. Grab bags were awarded to 6 winners. For the Most Consistent Timed race, each racer took two separate runs through the gates on the Fall Line course. We had winners from four categories: men and women over 60 and men and women under 60. Grab bags were awarded to the winners. For the Bombardier game, skiers purchased numbered tennis balls to benefit Ski 4 a Cure funds. As they rode up Expo lift, each skier tried to drop his or her ball so that it would land and stay inside of a large trash can on the slope below. Grab bags were awarded to 5 winners.



Allegany State Park is the largest state park in New York, divided into two sections - the Red House and the Quaker area. ### 60TH ANNUAL MAPLE FESTIVAL

Longtime Event Celebrates Huge Milestone

Picture this: You're young, it's a spring Saturday and there's a cool breeze in the air. You walk the crowded rows of vendor tents in front of the Franklinville Elementary School (32 South Main Street) with some friends and you consider if you want to spend the \$10 allowance you were given on a candy apple and fries or on a must-have mood ring. That, my friends, is a memory full of nostalgia - an event that's been around since I was a kid.

That event is the Annual Maple Festival held in Franklinville, NY, and this year it is celebrating its 60th anniversary April 27th and 28th. ellicottvilleNOW took the opportunity to speak with event organizer, Ashely Schumaker, about the festival, how it kept going, and all the details of this year's festivities.

**eNOW:** Six decades is a huge milestone for any event. What has fueld the WNY Maple Festival all these years?

**SCHUMAKER:** Franklinville has so much history and the WNY Maple Festival is something our community is very proud of. Coordinators and committee members change but there is always someone else interested in carrying on the tradition. Many families have lived here for years so it is not uncommon for the torch to be passed. People are invested and want to see this event continue.

**eNOW:** What's new for this year's festival? The area has expanded into Park Square; what will be happening there?

**SCHUMAKER:** There are a few new things going on. The parade route will be changing to cover more of Route 16 and to streamline the lineup process as the parade has grown substantially. Anyone is welcome to fill out a parade application and dress up to walk through the parade. We have had many people sign up to walk through in their favorite costume with friends/family. The Hinsdale Color Guard will be participating in the parade. Parade and Float contest info can be found at wnymaplefestival.com/parade/.

To address the need for seating throughout the event, there will be a large tent with tables and chairs in the food court area this year.

There will also be signs attached to the ceiling directing visitors to where vendors are. We encourage everyone to at least check out the classrooms and look at the interactive festival map (this will be available online via our website no later than one week before the festival.)

We expanded the festival in 2023 to Park Square to diversify the event to attract a wider variety of interests and draw attention to our village's downtown. Many of these buildings have changed ownership and businesses have been popping up. Park Square is designed to have a relaxing, family friendly vibe where people can enjoy each other's company along with farmer's market style vendors, wineries, breweries, distilleries, and live music. There are several new vendors in this space including Merritt Wineries' "Slush Bus" and KSW Photography setting up a 360 degree video platform. #### Breakaway Classic Adventures: A Wild Turkey Hunter

I was first introduced to wild turkey hunting in the spring of 1998 by my wife's grandfather, a great outdoorsman, trapper, deer hunter and of course an exceptional turkey hunter. Ralph Foster was his name and there was nothing pretentious about him, as down to earth as a fellow could be! Ralph and his buddies owned a hunting camp in the little hamlet of Rexville beside the fire hall in Steuben County. When a hunting season wasn't on the calendar, one would hear the sounds of banjos, fiddles and steel guitars as a bluegrass festival was in full swing. In fact, as you're about to step onto the porch which doubled as a stage, chiseled into the stepping stone was a greeting... "Welcome Bluegrass Lovers."

Somehow everything fit together perfectly at the old camp - the music, the camaraderie, tall tales and of course the food. If by chance you were offered an opportunity to be a guest, you'd wake up at 4:00am to the smells of breakfast wisping into the loft where you bunked... squirrel stew as always on the menu!

The camp never held more than a few acres of land but had a babbling brook running through it. Back then you didn't need to own your own land; neighbors always let you hunt on theirs! Ralph was a natural at making friends and had such an easy-going personality that his many neighbors and friends always looked forward to his visits. He was not only welcomed for his storytelling and quick wit but also because he was another set of eyes safe guarding their property from trespassers and evil doers like litter bugs and joyriders on ATVs.

Spring turkey hunting starts May 1st and runs to the end of the month. Unlike fall hunting hours from sunrise to sunset, the spring hunt is just half a day, starting a half hour before sunrise and ending at noon. The bag limit is also different; in the fall you are allowed to take one bird of either sex for the season, while in the spring you are allowed two bearded birds. Also, in the fall you can hunt with the use of dogs much like in traditional upland game hunting, whereas in the spring you are not.

Ralph, in his quiet way, made sure everyone was up at 4:00am with the coffee pot percolating like a freight train about to go off its tracks, and the sizzling of his cherished cast iron skillets frying up home fries in one and strips of bacon in another. By 4:30am the troops are out the door and on our way to our designated hunting positions as determined the night before. Everyone has their favorite posts and it's important to get all set up and comfortable well before the turkeys come down from the roost. Another part of the evening war planning was to drive around the countryside, stopping frequently and pulling out an owl call to scout out locations where the turkeys are roosting for the night. Hearing the hooting of an owl, they can't help themselves from gobbling back and giving away their locations.

The edge of a field along an old fence row of gathered stones was Ralph's favorite waiting spot located to an adjacent raven sprouting a hillside of tall hemlocks. Turkeys like to roost in the tall evergreens about halfway up their trunks, as it's easier for them to fly from hilltop to treetop horizontally than flying straight up.

Ralph's number one lesson that we all learned from time spent with him, was to be patient, remain absolutely still until it hurt, and above all, be extremely quiet. His signature saying, remembered by all the generations that hunted with him right down to his great grandson, was that "a turkey can hear a mosquito from a hundred yards away." Thus, he used his turkey call sparingly with the precision of a surgeon, knowing when to cut the silence, for how long



and with what strokes. You can't undo what you shouldn't have said once it leaves your lips!

The box call was his call of choice and his most cherished possession, handcrafted for him by one of his longtime hunting partners. Not that he had anything against the numerous other types of calls out on the market today, but holding a well-designed wooden box call in his hands was like a violinist holding their Stradivarius. The cords resonating from that call were music to a turkey's ears! His weapon wasn't nearly as important as his box call but nonetheless, without it, few if any turkeys would have been harvested. The Remington 870 Wingmaster that he used was more of a hunting companion than just a shotgun. In his later years, he never loaded till he was comfortably sitting down; it served as a cane to climb some steep slopes and a shoulder to lean on to catch his breath once nearing the top.

Ralph always looked the part of a well-seasoned hunter and not a model from a Cabela's or L.L. Bean catalogue. Like a cowboy, if Ralph would have had his way, he would have died with his boots on. And although they were the famous Bean's duck boots, they were never laced up, making them quicker to slip on in the morning and easier to kick off for his afternoon nap on the living room couch. Ralph was born on May 31, 1921 and passed away on June 1, 2013. You could say that he was born and died a true turkey hunter with 92 seasons under his belt and as many turkeys!



"The entire community is invited to be part of this fun-filled night. We celebrate our top fundraisers who play in a special hockey game, celebrity guest appearances, indoor fireworks, food and beverage to purchase along with the 2024 11 Day Power Play merchandise," said Amy.

At first, I'll admit it seemed crazy to me that an organization would pull off such a laborious event year after year all for a fundraising effort, but after speaking with Amy, I understand that this isn't just a hockey game. The Lesakowski family's annual event makes perfect sense. They certainly have eleven days or 250 hours' worth of love, motivation and nerve to feed the effort against cancer that so many fight in Western New York and beyond each and every day.

#### THE BACKSTORY

Amy Lesakowski, along with her husband and three children have enjoyed Western New York as their home for many years. "We spend a lot of time in Ellicottville enjoying all four seasons," said Amy. She was diagnosed with a rather aggressive form of breast cancer in 2009. She battled her cancer with the support of her three children and husband, Mike Lesakowski. Luckily, Amy had access to resources that saved her life, like an innovative new drug woven into a long-term chemical treatment plan.

It's no secret that we Western New Yorkers are fortunate to have such phenomenal treatment hubs like Roswell Park. The Lesakowskis noticed a problem years later with some of these resources; clinical trials that made the difference between life and death for Amy were not available to Mike's mother, Evelyn, who unfortunately lost her hard-fought battle at age 62. That was in 2016; a year prior to the first 11 Day Power Play.

There is nothing else in this world like the feeling of watching a loved one fight the long and hard battle that is cancer. It's truly taxing on the mind, body and spirit. After two battles and a crushing loss, the Lesakowskis decided that something must be done; everybody should have access to these life-saving resources, no matter what. They set out to break the world record for the longest hockey game... and they did, raising \$1.2 million in their first year!

"A clinical trial at Roswell saved my life, but to date, there needs to be more available," said Amy. Obviously, the goal is a cure, but Amy told me about another aspect of treatment that makes a huge difference. It's called immunotherapy... "treatment that helps your immune system fight cancer," mentioned Amy. The goal is to lessen the significant and ever-recognizable impact that other treatments can have on the human body. "It's giving patients less harsh treatments and hope. Roswell Park is working hard right in our backyard to bring immunotherapy to the forefront of cancer care," Amy added.

an increased number of businesses showcasing their services.

**eNOW:** Could you give us more details on some of the festival events? The Maple King and Queen contest, kiddie rides, petting zoo, etc.

**SCHUMAKER:** The King and Queen contest for this year is going to be particularly special. Program Coordinator, Amy Burton, has a great event already in the works! Class of 2024 Seniors will show off their talents and compete for the crown of Queen & King. They will also be recognizing winners from each of the previous years. Their goal is to have as many winners as possible from previous years in attendance and they need your help tracking everyone down! A list of former winners can be found in the event posts on their Facebook page. Tag someone or private message them with their contact information so they can reach out if they are not on Facebook. All previous winners will be invited to the group "WNY Maple Festival-Past King & Queens". This group will be used to coordinate 2024 plans with previous winners and track who may be able to attend.

As far as entertainment outside of the Music in the Park, there will be small carnival rides and games in the front yard of the elementary school. I-Got bingo will have a tent set up for people to play in. Gellyball arena will be set up for the 2nd year (this is a softer alternative to paintball, utilizing hydrated gel balls with lower impact for play). You can test your dexterity and stamina on the Mechanical Bull Rides by Buckin' Bull Rides in the high school front yard. Small kiddies can visit the Petting Zoo (FFA building off South Academy) run by Franklinville FFA, and you can't forget the annual Car Show & Chicken BBQ at the fire hall on Sunday. The traditional All-U-Can-Eat Pancake & Sausage Breakfast remains a huge hit each festival. Sessions both Saturday and Sunday run from 7:30am-2:00pm. Cost is \$9 for ages 13 and up, ages 4-12 or those over 60 are \$7 and kids 3 and under are free. Proceeds go to WNY Maple Festival Inc. (non-profit organization). Syrup from Wright's Maple Farm is used. New this year, \$1 from each breakfast will be donated to the Franklinville Central School Spanish Club. Spanish Club members and advisors are planning a trip to Peru in a couple of years and have been working hard to secure volunteers and will be volunteering themselves during the festival weekend.

eNOW: Anything else you would like to share with the community?


