GAZEBO STATUE INSTALLATION

Ellicottville to Host Public Reception June 27th Prior to Gazebo Series Performance

One of the most prominent women in the United States Space Agency, NASA, will grace Ellicottville with her presence this summer. Tracy Caldwell Dyson is an American chemist and astronaut recognized for her groundbreaking research into molecular level surface reactivity. Thanks to a partnership between the Ellicottville Chamber of Commerce and Griffis Sculpture Park, a 10-foot-tall bronze statue of Dyson will be installed on the lawn of the Ellicottville Gazebo next Thursday, June 27th. It will remain on display for all to enjoy until the fall.

"We've worked with Griffis Sculpture Park the past few years to bring an inspirational statue to the four corners of Ellicottville," said Brian McFadden, Executive Director of the Ellicottville Chamber of Commerce. "With the majority of Ellicottville's business owners or co-owners being women, we wanted to keep with the theme of showcasing a female role model. The Tracy Dyson sculpture is a fitting tribute to the accomplishments that women have made."

In 2021, Griffis Sculpture Park received four bronze statues of inspirational women created by Australian collaborative artists Gillie and Marc Schattner. The 10-foot-tall bronze sculptures of Gabby Douglas (Olympic gymnast), Tracy Dyson (astronaut), Janet Mock (actress/producer) and Cheryl Strayed (author) were donated to the Ashford Hollow Foundation/Griffis Sculpture Park by the artists. Ellicottville has thus far featured two of the four - the Cheryl Strayed and Gabby Douglas sculptures, and will soon feature a third, Tracy Dyson.

Gillie and Marc have been called "the most successful and prolific creators of public art in New York's History" by The New York Times. Creating some of the world's most innovative public sculptures, Gillie and Marc have redefined what public art should be, spreading messages of love, equality, and conservation around the world. Their highly coveted sculptures and paintings can be seen in art galleries and public sites in over 250

A special reception celebrating the installation of the Tracy Dyson statue in Ellicottville is being planned for next Thursday, June 27th on the Gazebo lawn. Members of the Chamber and Griffis Sculpture Park will be in attendance, and the public is encouraged to attend and share in such a special moment. The reception will begin promptly at 6:00pm and will be followed by the kickoff of the 2024 Gazebo Series at 7:00pm featuring a live performance by crowd favorites, Tory & Joe Acoustic Duo.



EA2EVL FONDO

Charity Bike Ride Continues Its Mission to Support the Erie Cattaraugus Rail Trail



EAST AURORA - Registration is now open for Western New York's premier fall bike ride, the EA2EVL Fondo, to be held on Saturday, October 5. This 42-mile non-competitive charity bike ride kicks off at 10:00am in East Aurora, winds south through rolling hills and fall foliage and ends in Ellicottville with a finish line party at Holiday Valley. All proceeds from EA2EVL support the Erie Cattaraugus Rail Trail (ECRT), a 27-mile trail that runs along a former rail line from Orchard Park to Ashford, NY. Register at www.ea2evlfondo.com.

"This point-to-point ride continues to surpass all expectations in terms of attendance and support for the trail," said event sponsor John Cimperman, Founder of 42 North Brewery. "With a challenging but gorgeous course, EA2EVL is now considered the most epic ride of the fall season - open to any level of rider."

The bike event starts in East Aurora at 42 North Brewery and travels south down scenic Route 240, riding on the road parallel to the ECRT trail from West Falls into Concord. The course continues to Route 242 into the town of Ellicottville. The event ends at a finish line party at Holiday Valley, which is open to the public, with food, drinks, and live music. Transportation will be offered to bring riders back to East Aurora, or riders can get special rates for lodging at Holiday Valley.

In addition to the registration fee, riders who fundraise an additional \$100 for ECRT will receive a commemorative shirt and tickets for food and drinks at the post-event party. Participants who raise \$500 or more receive an EA2EVL bike jersey, with a special "yellow jersey" and a \$500 gift certificate from Tom's Pro Bikes to the top fundraiser.

"Following three sold out events, we're inviting riders to join us for our fourth annual ride this October," announced Mary Brummer, ECRT Board President. "Thanks to our supporters, the first 1.5 miles of the ECRT trail in Orchard Park is complete—it's our model for success. With the funds raised from EA2EVL 2024, our goal is to extend that same surface all the way to the West Falls Depot, a total of 6 miles."







FROM SKI RACER TO BEEKEEPER

Suiting Up with Dr. Genene Jarosz Crofut for a Spoonful of Sweet Honey

Some of the old-time skiers in the Ellicottville community may remember Joey and Terry Jarosz from the Ellicottville Ski Club, back in "the day." Their daughters, Genene and Gretchen, were avid skiers and members of the Holiday Valley Ski Team when Tom Torge taught young athletes the fine art of ski racing. Genene followed her dreams and left ECS to attend boarding high school at The Mountain House School (National Sports Academy) in Lake Placid and finish at Stratton Mountain School in Vermont. Moving on to the University of Colorado, she then relocated to the University of Buffalo to finish her degree in Physical Therapy in 1992, working in acute care and geriatric rehabilitation for ten years. Then Dental School beckoned.

Genene married her husband, Peter Crofut, had three children and went on to establish a successful general dentistry practice in Amherst, NY. Peter will be retiring as Detective Sergeant for the Amherst Police Department within the next few months. Living in East Amherst, they commute to Little Valley regularly to tend to their hobbies – Peter enjoys maple sugaring, and Genene has her Italian bees. Starting with one hive three years ago, she now manages five, only to give away the honey to family and friends.

My husband and I had the opportunity to visit with Genene and Peter this past Sunday. Even though I have a compromised back and use a cane, Genene was able to suit me up to observe her, head to head, as she showed me her hives and her very busy bees. I had the opportunity to spot and meet the venerated queen, around whom the whole hive activity is focused. She handed me a tool and a bowl and spoon. I never did use the tool but she used hers to pry open the lid of the super and catch the edges of the hanging frames (there were ten of them) onto which the bees build the wax. She pulled out several, looking for the queen.





In the process, Genene was able to show me fresh eggs in the bottom of several of those wax cells which indicated the queen had been recently on that frame. Within a couple of pulls, we found her and plenty of worker bees in attendance. Although the queen does not rule or dictate the activities of the hive, the bees could not survive without her and they instinctively know what to do. The workers surrounding the queen will feed her and groom her, predigesting her food and carrying away her waste. Without their constant care, the queen could also die.

The boys (drones) have the job of mating with the queen. They leave the hive and gather into a congregation site. The queen will fly out and mate in the air with many drones. The drones will die shortly after mating. She mates only this one time throughout her lifespan which can be 3 to 6 years. Most queens lay well for at least three years which keeps the colony thriving for that time. Once she has fulfilled her usefulness, she will be replaced by the bees themselves or by the beekeeper.

Why the bowl and spoon, you wonder? Our second goal was to scrape up some fresh honey for me to take home. Genene pulled up a nice, full looking frame and handed me the spoon and bowl. She held the frame while I deftly scraped over the thin waxy covering and was surprised to discover a thick layer of gorgeous golden honey beneath the wax. A couple of scrapes from top to bottom and the bowl held a pint of aromatic, clear liquid gold. We rescued a few bees I scraped up in the process and Genene laid them near the entrance of the hive. She assured me the workers will clean up these bees and they will be as good as new before long. Our work finished, the hives were put back in order and we went to the cabin to assess our haul and chat.

Genene and Peter spoke lovingly about their three adult children, Hannah, Peter, and Tucker, who are building their own lives and living near ski areas. After 20-plus-years of ski racing and two years in the U.S. National Championships, Genene still keeps her poles

TREETOP ADVENTURES

An Insider's Guide to Navigating Sky High Adventure Park at Holiday Valley

When I think of summer in Ellicottville, one very specific thing comes to mind: Sky High Adventure Park! I'm not a golfer, I prefer my bike wheels to remain on the pavement, and I can only withstand so many family hikes. Therefore, when heading down to Ellicottville from Buffalo for a beautiful summer weekend, my head is filled with swinging through the trees, zip lining at the speed of light, and bobbing and weaving through tangles of pine on the Sky Flyer Mountain Coaster. I've done Sky High with my friends and family for years and consider myself quite a fanatic. In planning my adventure for summer 2024, I was very excited to speak with Sky High Director Brian Halloran, and Coordinator Jaimie Woodarek. They told me some awesome behind-the-scenes fast facts and equipped me with everything you and I are going to need to know for this summer at Sky High!

PATRICK: How did Sky High Adventure Park come about?

BRIAN: Sky High was established in 2011. It was discovered by Bonnie Kochir, who was our VP of Operations at the time. We were looking for some outdoor activities, and we knew zip lining was an up-and-coming thing. She went to the IAAPA Convention, which is kind of the music amusement park industry showcase, and she met up with a gentleman who had just started these adventure parks in the U.S. Holiday Valley was the third park that was built in the U.S. at the time. We are now in our 14th season!

PATRICK: What's changed about Sky High in the past 14 years?

BRIAN: Well, we certainly have increased our park in size in general. We started with eight courses, and we found it a little bit too crowded for the amount of individuals that we were coming to visit. We added some yellow courses and a green course, which are easier, to help with the flow on that end. We also found that we needed to add a few more to the mix of our harder courses. We added a blue and a black as well as Grand Rapids one and two, which are six zip lines, two ladders, and a bridge that brings you back to the base. We also added a lot of different features to keep the customers who weren't necessarily doing the Adventure Park busy doing other things. We have the mountain coaster, we added gem mining for the kids, and a climbing forest, which is like rock wall climbing but on trees! We also have recently added mountain bikes and E-bikes with chair lift carriers.

PATRICK: What kind of person would have the most fun at Sky High?

BRIAN: Really, it's all walks of life, depending on what they want to partake in up here. But we really try to generate a family atmosphere, as our whole resort does, and just enjoying the outdoor activities and putting the cell phone down for a little while!

PATRICK: What's your favorite part about being able to operate Sky High?

BRIAN: I would say my staff that I work with, but watching groups unfold, whether it be a group of teenagers, a family, or a bridal party that's going through is awesome. Watching everything unfold, and the enjoyment that comes out of utilizing the things that we have to offer up here is tons of fun! Especially in the Aerial Park when they're coaching each other through the course and getting good laughs out of one another.

PATRICK: If my friends and I are up in the courses and one of us gets stuck, what is the protocol to help them?

BRIAN: Well right away, we try to tell everybody to yell out "STAFF"! We have staff throughout the park in different areas. Staff will come to them and give them direction on how to assist themselves, to get off the element or the zip line that they're on. Sometimes staff will go up and assist them via several different rescue types that we use.

PATRICK: Jaimie, what is your most memorable guest experience?

JAIMIE: Well there have been lots over the years... I guess I would have to say that I generally really enjoy working with a lot of the school groups that come, and I love seeing kids that maybe wouldn't necessarily have the opportunity to do this, come and have a really good time. They work together, and they're really happy when they're done most of the time. It's really cool to see kids from all over come with their school and do the park and get challenged like that. The kids get a chance to get outdoors and see their classmates in a different way.

PATRICK: What are this summer's operating hours like?

JAIMIE: We started on May 10th, and are currently operating the Aerial Park and Climbing Forest Fridays through Sundays from 9:00am until 4:30pm. The coaster is open from 11:00am until 5:00pm. Our daily schedule starts on June 24th when the Aerial Park and Climbing Forest will be open from 10:00am-5:00pm Monday through Thursday and from 9:00am-6:00pm Friday through Sunday. The mountain coaster will be open all week long from 11:00am until 6:00pm. We'll have this schedule until September 1st.

A Conversation with Fernanda

HULICK: How long have you been with the orchestra? **LASTRA**: I have been with the BPO since August 2022, for two seasons.

HULICK: Did you join as the Assistant Conductor, or we you appointed after you were with the orchestra for a period of time? **LASTRA:** Back in 2022, I joined the orchestra as the Conductor Diversity Fel-

low. After one year in that role, I was promoted to Assistant Conductor, Diver-

HULICK: Can you talk a little bit about the process of becoming a member of the orchestra... Is there an audition, once a member are you in that position permanently or do you have to audition every so often?

LASTRA: Čertainly. Every musician in the orchestra went through an audition process, and my case was no different. There was a national search for the position of Conductor Diversity Fellow, and I had the opportunity to come to Buffalo and participate in a live audition with the orchestra, along with other candidates. Since this is a fellowship, the position is not permanent, although the contract can be extended.

HULICK: We are excited to have you as part of the Ellicottville Summer Music Festival again this year. You've performed at some of the most iconic settings in WNY such as Holiday Valley slope side, Central Terminal, Artpark, Outer Harbor, Sahlen's Field and Chautauqua Institution. Do you have a favorite out

LASTRA: Not really. I believe that each stage holds its own unique way of connecting with people and making a profound impact on the audience. Attending live music concerts remains an experience that cannot be replicated online, and I am constantly amazed by the opportunity we have to create something special in real-time and connect with people immediately through music.

HULICK: Of course, your home base is Kleinhans Music Hall. The history when you play there is palpable, considering the BPO's history and the significance of the venue. I would imagine that you and all the members can't take the stage without having that in the forefront of your minds. What are your

LASTRA: Absolutely. Kleinhans Music Hall is not only a national architectural landmark but is also renowned as one of the best acoustically designed concert halls in the country. This is evident in the exceptional sound quality experienced by both the audience throughout the entire hall and us performers on stage. The way sound travels and blends in Kleinhans creates a unique and special experience. I believe our audiences enjoy a sound quality that is comparable to listening to a recording. We are truly fortunate to have such a worldclass concert hall in Western New York. Moreover, the history of Kleinhans' stage is remarkable, having hosted incredible artists throughout the years. The very essence of the building is infused with artistic excellence. It's a privilege to work surrounded by that rich history.

HULICK: Talking about history, we need to talk about JoAnn Falletta. Her appointment as music director, in 1998, set a precedent that can never be broken or achieved by anyone else when she became the first female appointed music director of a major U.S. Symphony Orchestra. What an exciting moment

that was and something this area is so proud of. **LASTRA:** As we celebrate JoAnn's remarkable tenure this year, it is essential to recognize the lasting impact she has had on the orchestra and the community. Throughout the past 25 years, JoAnn's artistic vision and unwavering dedication have propelled the BPO to new heights. Her ability to inspire and lead has fostered a culture of excellence and innovation within the orchestra.

Personally, I consider it an immense honor to work alongside JoAnn. Her passion for music and her ability to bring out the best in every musician have been a constant source of inspiration for me. Even before joining the BPO, I admired her work and admired the way she broke barriers and shattered glass ceilings. Working with JoAnn is not only an honor, but it is also a tremendous opportunity to learn from one of the most respected and accomplished conductors in our field. Her guidance and mentorship have been invaluable to me, and I am grateful to be part of her artistic journey.

HULICK: Who picks what tribute performance you will feature, like the Led Zeppelin tribute you will be performing at the festival on July 7th?

LASTRA: The selection of tribute performances at Ellicottville is a collaborative effort between the BPO Artistic Team and Brian McFadden, the director of the Ellicottville Chamber of Commerce. The BPO Artistic Team assists Brian in selecting the guest artists and the repertoire for the concert. Additionally, the program includes pieces that the BPO traditionally performs at Ellicottville's summer concerts, such as the 1812 Overture, for example. We are incredibly excited about this concert and hope that everyone can join us on July 7th for a truly special summer evening together.

HULICK: Is there a body of work from a particular singer or band you haven't done that you would like to?

LASTRA: Not really, I am always open to collaborating with new artists, and discovering new music.

HULICK: How long does it take to perfect a new show?

LASTRA: Typically we allocate around four rehearsals to prepare for a new show, although this time frame can vary. The duration of the rehearsal process depends on factors such as the complexity of the repertoire and the length of the show itself.

HULICK: What would you consider is the most "out of the box" tribute you've ever done?

LASTRA: As a conductor, I have the privilege of leading a diverse array of concerts, encompassing various genres and styles. While it is challenging to



Breakaway Classic Adventures: Fellowship of the Fly

The sheer definition of an adventure is that it is predictably unpredictable. Otherwise it wouldn't be called an adventure, rather simply a plan - now how dull is that!

This adventure that I'm about to narrate had its quest to travel deep into the wilderness of Canada in search of the holy grail of trout, the Mighty Nipigon River Brook Trout, commonly referred to in Ontario as a speckled trout. Like any good adventure it started off with a plan that quickly ran into adversity, got scrapped, thrown under the bus, out the window, rewritten so many times that we ended up flying by the seat of our pants! In the end, like any good story, our adventure ended with our quest being achieved!

As in the Lord of the Rings, our quest included the crossing of numerous borders, actually just one but several times (four to be exact), traversing large bodies of waters, the Niagara (twice), the straits of Tobermory and Sault Saint Marie and the Blue Water of Sarnia. The countless beautiful and inviting lesser rivers, creeks and streams that we encountered along our route included the Jack Pine, the White, the Aquasabon Falls and the Old Woman River that called out to us like the Sirens in The Odyssey to abandon our quest, stop, rest, and fish. Our Fellowship consisted of three carefully selected seasoned fly fishermen, individuals with unique sets of skills, abilities and personalities that would ensure that we achieved our goal. There was the Chef, adventurers can't travel on hungry stomachs, but to his disdain we were forced to frequent road side fast food and beverage merchants like Subway, Tim Hortons and even Denny's along the way. It wasn't until we neared our final destinations and set up our camp that his prowess was on full display. He was able to turn simple white rice into French Rice Pilaf and pasta into Rigatoni al Segreto. I, acting as the sous-chef was put in charge of dicing onions and grilling meats, seasoning them with his secret herbs and spices! Our chef was a retired culinary professor and I never seemed to satisfy the school master, never earning more than an F- for my efforts.

The third person in our troop was an engineer by trade, a leader of Boy Scouts, and even serving a stint in the US Coast Guard. Needless to say, our group benefited from a rigorous schedule, precisely calculated rest stops and dead reckoning navigation. When I wasn't the sous-chef, my duties were at the helm on the road and on the water. Fortunately, my skills in these departments earned me a passing grade.

Our route took us over the International Peace Bridge and the first ominous omen reared its nasty head, not that we were superstitious, it's just that border crossings either go well or not so well - and in this case, it went too well! The guard frowning, I think because my diesel truck was too loud, took our IDs in silence and proceeded in shutting the door of his guard house for several minutes. While we sweated, not from heat, without a single word or question he handed back our documents and waved us on our way! Upon that curious experience we decided not to risk lady luck and opted out of plan A, which was to cut through southern Ontario to Michigan, Instead, we decided to cross with the ferry at the end of the Bruce Peninsula at Tobermory. Of course, that in hindsight, was not such a great move.

I had called ahead to make reservations for the ferry crossing of the North Shore Channel between Georgian Bay and Lake Huron, unbeknownst to us, not explained while making the reservations, traveling with a truck and trailer, there were certain rules that we were about to infract that almost ended our trip! They had conveniently collected the passage fees and then abruptly denied us boarding rights. Apparently, we had too many auxiliary gas canisters aboard our trailered vessel. One would have to realize, which none of these not so kind boarding agents did, that traveling into remote regions of the Canadian wilderness, the access to fuel is limited to what you can carry in with you. They didn't seem to care and simply demanded us to leave them behind or stay behind (ironically even if they were empty). Fortunately for us we found some very kind good Samaritans who generously for no fee offered to transport our full fuel Jerry Cans while on board and return them to us after the crossing. Our faith in human nature was restored!

Our ferry travel took us past the Cove Island Light House, Flower Pot Island and unto Manitoulin Island, the largest lake island in the world! Once on the Trans-Canada Highway 17 ,we traveled west through Sault Ste. Marie, Wawa (where we spent the night in a quaint



little motel called the High Falls Cabins), Marathon and Terrace Bay before arriving at the Nipigon River some 1,000 miles after leaving home. Along the way we were amazed by the beautiful and colorful fauna, Lupine and Rock Harlequin that lined the roadway and wildlife that included Moose, Black Bear, Bald Eagles and Ruffed Grouse. Traveling along the Lake Superior North Shore the vistas were out of this world, very much on par with what Tolkien imagined for his Middle Earth!

Once the road journey was complete, we took to the waters of the Upper Nipigon River launching our boat at Pine Portage, with our final destination bring Virgin Falls. The World Record Brook Trout, a whopping 14.5 pounds, was landed there! To get to Virgin Falls we had to cross Forgan Lake! Both Poseidon and Neptune had other plans for us and joined forces, summoning up wind and wave to thwart our plans. We were once again forced to abandon our plans and ended up marooned just 30 minutes into the cruise. Our normally dependable motor failed (Murphy's Law number one) and we were at Mother Nature's mercy. We drifted upon a suitable camping spot we quickly named Gilligan's Island, a hunk of rock in a sheltered bay that we had to call home for the rest of the week (Murphy's Law number two, you can't stake a tent peg into solid rock)!

Thankfully our quest was finally achieved, after some quick outboard engine repairs, on our very first day of fly fishing at Virgin Falls! In quick suggestion one of our fellowship landed several wonderful and large Brook Trout, the largest topping an impressive 24 inches and several pounds in weight - not a world record but it did make our eyes bugle!

The ordeal of the winds that we experienced all week long, playing havoc to boating and casting, had a silver lining though. The hordes of black flies and mosquitoes, bugs that we had dreaded and had prepared for with every conceivable insect repellent, never materialized, thank goodness! We deemed our trip a huge success even though those infamous winds of the Nipigon collapsed one of our tents one night we arrived safely home with no further adieu, till next time!

Core Performance: Should I Use Ice or Heat?

It's hard to get through life without straining a muscle, spraining a ligament, suffering a headache or wrenching your back. And the longer you're on the planet, the more suson are to arthritis. But w thing hurts, what will make it feel better - ice or heat? And when does it make sense to use both? These are such common questions I hear almost daily so I decided it was time to clear up the confusion.

Arthritis: The inflammation of joints or pain caused by worn-away cartilage in joints can cause pain and stiffness in places like your elbows, knees, shoulders and fingers, just to name a few. For these instances, moist heat, like a soak in a tub or shower of warm-but-not-hot water (92-100°) helps.

Who hasn't experienced a headache of some degree? Some are lighter, easily treated with OTC pain relievers while others require some extra steps for relief. Ice can help soothe throbbing pain in your head. Cold masks or wraps over the forehead, eyes and temples help the throbbing pain of a migraine. While ice is usually preferred for headaches, moist heat or a heat wrap can relax neck spasms that contribute to headaches.

Muscle strains and sprains usually benefit from a combo of both ice and heat when they occur. Whether you've pulled a muscle in your calf or back doing yard work or sprained your ankle playing basketball, it's best to start either off with ice to ease inflammation (including swelling, redness or tenderness of the injury) and numb the pain. Only after the inflammation resolves is it a good idea to switch to heat. This can help relieve any muscle stiffness at the injury site.

Tendinitis is a painful inflammation issue that affects the tendons, the connective tissues between your muscles and bones. A common cause is repetitive activities so tendons in your elbow, knee, shoulder, hip and even your Achilles tendon are common sites. Besides the usual measures to alleviate the pain — rest, pausing of activities that cause pains, OTC pain relievers — ice is the preferred method here as it can ease the inflammation and help numb the pain. While similar to tendinitis in that there's tendon pain, tendinosis is distinct because of the a chronic long-term condition caused by a degenerating tendon. Because this condition involves irritation and stiffness in tendons attached to joints, heat is best for relieving stiffness in the joints, but only after the inflammation resolves.

You can apply ice and heat in lots of ways. Experts generally recommend up to 20 minutes on and 20 minutes off:

- Ice packs: Frozen peas or corn, ice cubes in a baggie or frozen gel pack. You can ice beyond 48 hours, until swelling, tenderness or inflammation are gone.
- Ice massage: Freeze water in a Dixie cup, peel back the top, and massage the tender area until it's numb. (Best for targeted icing after injury or for areas too awkward for ice packs, like the elbow or heel).
- Cold masks: Place a cold mask, available at drugstores, over your eyes or lay a towel soaked in cold water over your forehead and temples.
- Moist heat: Enjoy a bath, shower, hot tub or whirlpool using warm, not hot, water (92-100°). Heat wraps: Drape a heat wrap, available at drugstores, around your neck like a scarf (great
- for work or travel).
- Heating pads: To avoid burns, remove heating pads if the area becomes uncomfortably warm.


