HAPPY INDEPENDENCE DAY!

July 4, 1776 or June 19, 1865? Celebrating Juneteenth in Olean This Saturday

An interesting fact about the July 4th Independence Day celebration, which may be difficult to imagine now, is that enslaved black people were not granted that same freedom until June 19, 1865, after the end of the Civil War. It didn't happen for them for another 89 years, readers. A lifetime! Can you put yourself in their shoes? Most Americans were free of tyranny; they were not. True, the Emancipation Proclamation was issued by President Lincoln on January 1, 1863, but that still did not apply to those enslaved people in the Confederate States. Fact from Statista.com: There were almost 700,000 slaves in the U.S. in 1790, which equated to approximately 18 percent of the total population, or roughly one in every six people.

Lacking today's social media information express, word of the Emancipation Proclamation took another two-and-a-half years to reach Texas, where 250,000 slaves were still held in slavery in what was known as the last bastion for slavery through the final days of the Civil War. Imagine how this day unfolded. (Oh, to have been a fly on the wall.) In June of 1865, more than two thousand Federal soldiers of the 13th Army Corps arrived in Galveston to deliver and enforce the news. 250,000 human beings were released from bondage to their former "masters."

More information from Statista: "Of the 4.4 million African Americans in the U.S. before the war, almost four million of these people were held as slaves; meaning that for all African Americans living in the U.S. in 1860, there was an 89 percent chance that they lived in slavery."

It would seem that an event as momentous and life-changing for American citizens would be immediately celebrated, as was the American Independence in 1777. Indeed, it was a day of celebration by the black community for many years, but it took the likes of one feisty elderly Texas woman named Opal Lee to bring Juneteenth to national recognition. Here's what Wikipedia tells us what happened to her as a child: "In June 1939, her parents bought a house in the 900 block of East Annie Street, then a mostly white area. On June 19, 1939, 500 white rioters vandalized and burned down their home. Lee was twelveyears-old at the time. Recalling it years later, she said, "The fact that it happened on the 19th day of June has spurred me to make people understand that Juneteenth is not just a festival."



Let me introduce you to this tenacious lady: Opal Lee holds a bachelor's degree in elementary education, a master's degree in counseling and guidance from North Texas University, served on countless community and business boards, is a member of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Inc., and in May 2023, Lee received an honorary doctorate degree from the University of North Texas and, on May 2024, received another honorary doctorate degree from Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas.

After she retired from a very active life, Lee did not sit and knit on the porch. She became an activist. She fought for many causes, but her main goal was to make June 19th a national holiday. Like Forrest Gump, she walked instead of running - 2.5 miles every year representing the 2.5 years it took for the freedom news to reach Texas. Then, at age 89 (September 2016) she walked from Fort Worth, TX arriving at Washington D.C. in January 2017 with the goal to speak to President Barack Obama. It's unclear to this writer if she met with him but a bill to make Juneteenth a federal holiday was indeed signed into law by President Joe Biden in June 2021. She was 89 - he was ten years younger. Never underestimate the power and tenacity of an octogenarian!

Here's the irony - in 2021, Lee was named "Texan of the Year," this, in the last bastion of slavery after the Civil War. We are certain there may still be more accolades for this amazing woman, but none will surpass the Presidential Medal of Freedom she received



The Ellicottville Memorial Library is putting that power to good use this summer. With a line-up of fun activities and programs, it's an excellent way to spend a summer day. Library Director Laura Flanagan took the time to share with us what the library has in store.

eNOW: Summer is a busy time for the library. You have a lot of classes during the week, could you give us some details about them?

LAUKA: During the summer, we mainly focus on children's programs, although we continue with some of the adult programs as well. For adults, we have a knitting group that is open for all levels – for beginners we even have yarn and needles to get you started. The weekly adult craft class takes a break during July and August, but it will be back again on Tuesday afternoons starting in September. There are also various exercise classes such as Yoga and Tai Chi, just contact the library for details on dates and times.

For kids we have story time every Wednesday from 9:30-10:00am. Come hear a few stories with Dr. Kate followed by movement activities to help promote hand-eye coordination and finish with a craft. Next week's theme is wind and we will be making pinwheels! Also, on Wednesday afternoons from 3:00-4:30pm, we have a Maker Space available in the Community Room of the library. This is free time to explore our fun activities such as cubelet robot blocks, airblock programmable drones, magna tiles and more.

eNOW: The children's summer reading program starts soon. When are sign-ups and what does the program entail?

LAURA: The Summer Reading Program is a five-week program (July 8th-August 11th) filled with lots of activities, games and challenges. We even have our own high school age summer intern thanks to the Bob McCarthy Foundation available on weekdays to help keep the kids busy and engaged. The theme this year is "Adventure Begins at Your Library" and sign-ups begin starting on July 1st. At that time, kids will get their activity booklet to log their reading and a special book bag. New this year – every time a child brings the book bag to the library, they will receive a coupon to win a special prize!

Each week will be a mini theme such as adventure in the woods, adventure in the ocean, etc. For every week that a child reads (or is read to) for at least 15 minutes a day, they receive a prize. The first week is a free ice cream cone from Watson's! In addition, the more you read, the more chances you get to win the bigger prizes... think tent, fishing pole, outdoor games – you get the idea. eNOW: Anything else you would like to add?





CHANGES COMING TO ELLICOTTVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Town Board Supervisor Announces the Appointment of Jim Bouchard as Officer in Charge; Additional Funding Available for NYS STOP DWI Campaign

The Town Board gathered on Wednesday, June 19, 2024, to discuss the evenings current agenda. As the summer is in full swing, Town Board members and Town Supervisor Matt McAndrew had plenty to review and projects to approve.

Brief discussions were made concerning Financial Reports and Audits of Claims, which all aligned with the needs of the Town. Approved by the Board without issue, they moved on with the reminder to fellow Members that on June 22, 2024, the Water Project Informational Meeting will be held with further information will follow. The written Department Reports were also presented at this time for the Clerk, Police, Town Planner, Justice, and Building Inspector, all of which were accepted without objections.

Within these reports, announcements were made as needed to the Town Board. Concerning the Police Department, there will now be additional funding for NYS STOP DWI. The mission of NYS STOP DWI is to "reduce the number of persons killed or injured in alcohol and other drug-related traffic crashes, to promote DWI prevention as a public priority, [and] coordinate local efforts in Law Enforcement, Prosecution, Probation, Rehabilitation, Public Information, Education, and Administration." The funding that becomes available does not come from taxpayers' dollars but is a cause we can all agree is worthy of our community's support while adding to its safety.

Continuing from the Police Department's report, Supervisor McAndrew announced beginning July 1, 2024, Jim Bouchard (pictured left) becomes the Officer in Charge with Don Auge (pictured right) as Deputy in a mutual agreement by the Town Board and all other necessary parties.

The Highway Department updated the Board Members on the Holiday Valley Road projects in place and that the drainage and grinding of the road has been completed. Springs Road has also been black topped as well as the shoulders, and Horn Hill has been oiled and chipped. Talks are in the works on the possibility of a weight limit to be made for Jackman Hill Road, with options to be reviewed with the Town Attorney after damage had been caused from heavy equipment hauls.

Town Planner, Greg Keyser, informed the Board on some of the changes to be made regarding projects that are currently in place throughout the town. The most noticeable of these changes were discussed and approved starting with the Water System Improvement. It was brought to the attention of the appropriate project managers that several dying trees needed removal. If not addressed, the trees could potentially damage newly constructed facilities at the tank site.

Another water-related issue that was approved was that of the HoliMont Drive Water Main. Caught while the project is still ongoing, it was determined that a ductile iron pipe has been corroding on the exterior for what appears to be some time now. Matt Zarbo, Square Engineering DPC, had reported that in his opinion the Town of Ellicottville could expect the mains to continue to break if no action is taken. The suggestion is to replace the mains with HDPE (high-density polyethylene) piping that is not susceptible to corrosion. It was agreed by the Town Board to move forward with the suggested replacements.



After most topics throughout the Departments were addressed, the Town Board moved along to New Business. The Rural Outreach Center Community Development Hub has informed the Board that they are working to build a collaborative transportation system for Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, and Wyoming counties, which would also have access to and from Buffalo. In this stage they are asking the Town of Ellicottville for their support in the form of a letter to back their efforts as they seek funding through available grants. It was agreed that Town Supervisor Matt McAndrew will sign his support on behalf of the Board for the ROC's mission.

Finally wrapping up in New Business, discussions were around the rezoning of North Park Innovations. While previously discussed by the Board, it is now being finalized that the County Planning Board has approved the rezoning of the existing business. The 10.9-acre parcel will shift from High Density Residential District (HD) to General Commercial (GC) zoning to allow for the coming expansion. The construction of a 10,800 sqft addition will be under a special permit allowing for modifications and has been noted that it will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment.

With all discussions coming to an end, Supervisor Matt McAndrew called the Town of Ellicottville Board Meeting to adjourn. The Board will reconvene on the third Wednesday of July to address new and old happenings of the town.

COMPLAINTS RECEIVED SURROUNDING SHORT TERM RENTALS

Over a Dozen Village Property Owners Approach Village Board at June Meeting with Concerns of Noise, Over-Capacity

On Tuesday, June 18, 2024, the Village Board Meeting began as Mayor John Burrell called the evening to order. Various Village topics covered the agenda as the Board Members began their discussions to be had.

To start the evening off strong, the Village of Ellicottville had plenty of good news to share. Multiple conferences recently took place for Village officials with plenty of useful information being shared. Starting with the conferences, the Village of Ellicottville and Mayor John Burrell hosted a Planning and Zoning Seminar on June 5, 2024, with guest speaker Wade Beltramo, General Counsel for NYCOM. Plenty of prominent NYS officials joined the evening's event, including William Aiello, the Mayor of the City of Olean who was recently named second vice president of NYCOM. Over 35 representatives that expanded from Depew, Dunkirk, East Aurora, Little Valley, Allegheny, Olean, and more, allowed for the opportunity to engage in different practices and learning points. The two-hour seminar allowed for connections to be built between our local communities as well as open channels for collaboration between our area municipalities.

The following day, the Southern Tier 29th Annual Local Government Conference was held at Houghton University on June 6, 2024. Located in Allegany County, the Christian Liberal Arts Institute hosted the event to hundreds of New York State officials. Building off the momentum of the previous evening's event, Village officials from Ellicottville joined the large attendance to strengthen their knowledge, presence, and understanding in the Southern Tier community.

Another topic to recognize surrounding good news in the Village was that of the media coverage on the EVC & National Grid Partnership. A day surrounding Ellicottville's initiative to support the presence and future of electric vehicles. On May 31st, National Grid showcased the village's commitment to four Level 2 EV charging plugs in the new Mill Street parking lot. A collection of officials joined together from including the mayor, Chamber of Commerce, Cattaraugus County Legislators, Board Members, and National Grid project managers to celebrate this welcomed addition to the area. Ellicottville will become the National Grid Electric Vehicle Make Ready Program's shining example noting the success of the collaboration.

Moving onto Business of the Floor, it was brought to the Board's attention that there have been concerns within the village among property owners. Discussions were made by fifteen full-time village residents who represented a voice for the issues at hand. The problems they have seen arise were among short term rental laws, noise ordinance, and outdoor lighting. It has been noted that an increase in over-capacity in Airbnb and housing rentals. These properties display large crowds seemingly over the maximum rental

amount, with cars parked on front lawns and parties being held. This adds to the concern of underage drinking, violation of the Village Noise Ordinance, and disrupting the quality of life among full time community members. The Board recognizes and is sympathetic to these concerns and is looking into ways to best address the matters.

Another point that was made apparent to the Board while Business of the Floor was open, a mother who resides on Mill Street voiced an issue with continued speeding on the street. Many local children live on the street, and it poses a threat to their safety. The Village will be installing "Children at Play" street signage and will increases the presence of law enforcement

Another topic involving Mill Street, the current state of a property has been brought to the attention of the code enforcement officer. They are aware of the issues being voiced and are continuing to investigate the matter.

The mayor's report along with the previous meeting minutes for the month of May were addressed and accepted by the Village Board without issue. Within these reports, the Mayor made note that the Village will be partnering with Green County Commercial Bank who have purchased available bonds that benefit three major projects. This funding will go toward the Elizabeth Street Renovation, the Streetlight Project, and costs that accumulated from the Mill Street parking lot. For project updates, especially those of the Elizabeth Street Renovation, you can find the most up to date information posted on the Village of Ellicottville's Facebook page at www.facebook.com/villageofellicottville/.

Other reports that were presented and accepted were those of the Planning Board, Engineering, DPW, Code Enforcement, Clerk, Special Events. The 2024 Summer Music Festival is quickly approaching with the Village Board showing their support. The weekend-long event takes place throughout the Village and Town and is a highlight of the summer season, kicking off on July 5th at the Village Gazebo at 7:00pm. With a full schedule to fill each day, guests can expect fine arts and crafts markets, a pet parade, and headlining musical acts. This year, the Village is proud to offer the additional parking at the newly opened Mill Street lot to assist with traffic and transportation. Tickets are still available, with children ages 12 and under free to attend. For more information check out the Ellicottville Chamber of Commerce event page at www.ellicottvilleny.com.

ONE VISION OF QUEEN TO HEADLINE ELLICOTTVILLE'S SUMMER MUSIC FESTIVAL



JULY 6 · 7:00PM ON THE SLOPES OF HOLIDAY VALLEY

The music of Queen will fill the air, slope side, on Saturday, July 6th as "One Vision of Queen" takes the stage at this year's Ellicottville Summer Music Festival.

Canadian vocalist, Marc Martel, was born in Montreal and formed his own band, Downhere, in 1999, having success for 13 years, winning five Juno Awards the highest music award in his native Canada. Since then, Martel has become the lead singer for the critically acclaimed Queen Tribute Band, One Vision of Queen, and tours the globe selling out venues full of die hard Queen and Freddie Mercury fans.

His association with the legendary band seemed like his destiny, as people everywhere said he sounded so much like Freddie Mercury that a friend in the industry and his wife prompted him to audition for The Queen Extravaganza, a tribute band formed by the surviving members. Handpicked by Roger Taylor and Brian May after seeing his audition video singing "Somebody To Love", finally convinced the singer there was something there that everyone else had been saying for years.

The difference with Martel is he doesn't need to rely on the "staging" of Freddie Mercury to be convincing as the lead singer. "I won't wear Mercury's trademark yellow jacket, grow a full mustache or go onstage wielding his favored half microphone stand," said Martel.

Honestly he doesn't need any of the obvious props of the late singer to work the audience into a frenzy - he has the voice. Not an imitation of Mercury's unique, automatically known voice, but his own voice, backed by the words of fans and

I caught up with Martel while he was on tour in the Netherlands and we talked about what we can expect from his show, singing for Celine Dion, performing with the surviving members of Queen on American Idol and recording at the famed Abbey Road Studios in London.

Asking if he has a message for those coming out to see the show, Martel replied, "It's an incredible night of rock and roll with a little bit of a twist. People come out of the show having told themselves over and over again throughout the evening they didn't know that was a Queen song. You know, my mom thought that "Crazy Little Thing Called Love" was an Elvis song until I started performing Queen. Everyone will have a great time!"

A Conversation with Marc Martel

HULICK: Your music career actually started with your band Downhere, which you had for 13 years and was critically acclaimed all over the world. You went on to win five Juno awards in your native country Canada. That had to be an

MARTEL: Yeah, it was really cool to be recognized as Canadian artists in the highest way possible in our country. I remember the second time we got a Juno award, Bryan Adams made an appearance on stage and it was just really cool. It was the only time I'd ever seen him live, and just to be in the same room with him and part of the same event was super awesome! I really cherish my Juno awards.

HULICK: You've been compared to Freddie Mercury of Queen. A friend emailed you about a contest spearheaded by the original surviving members of Queen, looking for someone to be the front man of a tribute band called The Queen Extravaganza. After submitting your audition tape you were hand picked by the members. What were the emotions you were feeling when you

got the news?

MARTEL: When the decision was posted, I went from around 150 views to like 50,000! By the end of the day, it was like a million or something. It was just absolutely nuts - confirmation that all the people that had been telling me that I sounded like Freddie Mercury for about 10 years. At that point, they were onto something. I never thought that it was anything terribly unique or special, but I was absolutely proven wrong.

HULICK: Were you a fan of Queen before all of this?

MARTEL: Actually, not at all growing up. I didn't even know who they were. It's not because I heard their music and didn't like it... I literally didn't know that there was a band called Queen until probably in my late teens, maybe 20 years old. I do remember hearing "Bohemian Rhapsody" in the movie Wayne's World in the early 90s, which would have been probably less than a year after Freddie Mercury passed away. I do remember that song making a huge impression on me because I'd never heard anything like it before. It was before the internet, so it's not like I went home and googled who that was. I just kind of heard the song and thought, 'Wow, I didn't know you could do that with music' - jam a bunch of different genres of music really into one piece. It was really mind blowing, and obviously the singer made an impression on me. Not for the obvious reasons. I mean I couldn't even tell if it was a man or a woman at first because it was such a light, airy voice and I realized 'hey I can woman at first because it was such a light, airy voice and I realized 'hey I can sort of do that with my voice' and so kind of momentarily, I guess you could say, it opened my understanding of what a man can do with his voice.

HULICK: I want to mention a few of the achievements you've had and if you could please give me your thoughts. You've performed for multiple sports

events and professional teams.

MARTEL: It's always a blast performing for professional teams. The music of Queen just lends itself to stadiums and arenas. It really is the epitome of arena rock, so when I get to play for the occasional NFL game, it's a pretty wild feeling being in the middle of a huge field that is usually occupied by like 30 large dudes. It's just me by myself on the piano and people are singing along. It's pretty crazy.

HULICK: In 2016 you performed for Celine Dion.

MARTEL: Yeah, so I got to play at a TV show taping honoring the career of Celine Dion with her present. The way they put the show together is they gave Celine a questionnaire to fill out, like for example, what is your favorite song that you sing, what is your first hit, what is the first song you remember your mom singing to you... it's kind of like a Quebec version of *This Is Your Life*. The last question on the questionnaire was 'ls there anyone in this questionnaire that you haven't mentioned that you would like to see perform at the night that you haven't mentioned that you would like to see perform at the night honoring you and who would it be?' and she put down my name, which I'm still kind of in shock over. So I got to get up there and be a surprise guest. I don't think she knew I was gonna be there. She may have suspected it, but I got to sing "Somebody to Love" for her. Before I performed, there was an artist that got up on stage and performed her and her late husband's favorite song. So she was already in tears when I stepped onto the stage and I think my performance only augmented and amplified the emotions she was already feeling.

HULICK: Recording at Abbey Road Studios in London. **MARTEL:** Yeah, I mean obviously as a musician there's really no higher pedigree of a recording studio that you can possibly imagine. Abbey Road is it. The Beatles and everyone after them, who's worth anything, recorded at Abbey Road. I got to spend a couple weeks there doing my favorite thing, which is singles and doing my work heat to exceed a graph like. Freeddig Manuscript is singing, and doing my very best to sound as much like Freddie Mercury as I possibly can. It was a blast, and I hope that I get the chance to do something like that again. I mean, that was, for me, my highest calling as a musician.

HULICK: You performed with the surviving members of Queen on *American*

MARTEL: Yeah, the *American Idol* performance in 2012 was the first time that The Queen Extravaganza, the official Queen tribute band, ever performed together. We never performed in front of anyone. So they decided to throw us into the deep end by putting us on the most highly viewed show in America at the time, *American Idol.* I think the viewership that night was about 20 million. So really high pressure, not to mention that I was singing right in front of one of my other favorite singers of all time, Steven Tyler, who was sitting there as a judge. Obviously we weren't competing on the show, we were guest artists, but that was an absolutely mind blowing experience to do that and share the stage with Brian and Roger as well. I think we knocked it out of the park that night, that was my introduction to performing Queen and it's going to be a hard one to top.

HULICK: You were involved in the amazing award winning biopic *Bohemian Rhapsody* starring Rami Malek.



from President Joe Biden in 2024.

So, even though Juneteenth has an informal, perhaps light-hearted name that could signify only festivities, cookouts, parades and fun-filled activities, its meaning is historically somber, deep, and life-changingly profound, very much like the 4th of July Independence Day all Americans commemorate. Core Performance: Can You Eat Too Much Fruit?

Fruit is a key part of a healthy eating plan. Fruits contains many nutrients that your body needs. In fact, a healthy diet that includes fruit has been found to reduce your risk of several chronic diseases. But fruit contains natural sugars, and some types are fairly high in calories. So some people may wonder whether they're eating too much of it.

You can eat too much of anything. But the truth is that it's hard to get too much fruit. In fact, most Americans don't eat enough of it. Adults should eat at least $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups of fruit every day. However, a "fruitarian" diet, in which you eat almost nothing but fruit, can keep you from getting enough nutrients from other foods. Experts recommend that 25%-30% of your diet be made up of fruit.

And what about the sugar in fruit? The sugar you should worry about, experts say, is the added type you find in sodas, desserts, and many other products. Since fruit contains fiber, your body reacts differently to its natural sugars.

Fruits are low in fat and sodium, and don't contain cholesterol. They do have plenty of healthy nutrients that most people don't get enough of, including:

- -Potassium which helps to regulate your blood pressure.
- Dietary fiber to help reduce cholesterol levels, lower your risk of heart disease and promotes good digestion.
- Vitamin C. This vitamin supports the growth and repair of your body's tissues, heals injuries, promotes oral health, and helps your body absorb iron.

If you're not sure where to begin, start with color. The more colorful your meal is, the more nutrients it has. A fruit's color can tell you what nutrients it contains.

RED FRUITS: These contain plenty of vitamins A and C, potassium, and antioxidants. Red fruits include cherries, cranberries, pomegranates, raspberries, red grapes, strawberries, red apples and watermelon.

YELLOW & ORANGE FRUITS: These are packed with vitamin A, vitamin C, and potassium. Some yellow and orange fruits are apricots, grapefruit, mangoes, oranges, papaya, peaches, pears, pineapple and yellow apples.

WHITE FRUITS: White fruits contain potassium, which promotes heart health. White fruits include bananas, pears, white nectarines and white peaches.

GREEN FRUITS: Green fruits contain lots of potassium and vitamin K, which are good for blood clotting, vision health, and strong bones. Some green fruits are avocados, green apples, green grapes, kiwis and limes.

BLUE & PURPLE FRUITS: The nutrients found in these fruits not only help to prevent cancer, heart disease, and stroke, but also promote memory, healthy aging, digestion, and urinary health. Blue and purple fruits include blackberries, blueberries, figs, plums and purple grapes.

Fruit juices, on the other hand, you can definitely drink too much of. You may be surprised



to learn that even if your juice says "100% fruit juice" can contain as much sugar as soda pop. And unlike fruit, it's low in fiber, so your body will process it the same way as added sugar.

The sugar and calories in juice are more concentrated than those in whole or cut-up fruit. Without skin and pulp, fruit juices lack the fiber that helps slow down your digestion, prevents spikes in blood sugar, and makes you feel full. It also takes longer for you to eat whole fruit.

What about juicers? A popular alternative to eating whole fruits is to juice them. But most juicers remove the fruit's fiber. And juicing doesn't help your body absorb more nutrients than just eating the fruit. If you don't like fruit, use your blender to make it into a smoothie. This makes a delicious drink that still contains fiber.

What is important to point out is that while eating fruit is essentially only good for you, watching your caloric intake is also important. Plus, eating a balanced diet that includes proteins, fats and carbohydrates will help you to maintain metabolic health. If your metabolic machinery functions well, you feel and operate at your best.

MARTEL: Yes. I think everyone knew that it was a long awaited movie. There's millions and millions of Queen fans all over the world, so I had a feeling it was already going to be a success from the get-go, but I don't think anyone could have predicted just how big and how important of a movie it was gonna be. It once again reignited the world's absolute obsession with Queen and Freddie Mercury, and the enigma that he was and the legacy that he left the world. That's obviously gonna far outlive the members of Queen and it's gonna outlive me but that's really what the best music in the world does.



HULICK: What can you expect from your show?

MARTEL: My show is a different type of tribute show than people typically think of when they think of tribute shows... especially a Queen tribute show, because those tend to be really dress-up shows. You know someone's gonna be up on stage with a yellow jacket at some point, maybe even a fake mustache - you know the drill. That's not what I do, that's not what my band does at all, we come on stage as ourselves. For us, it's really all about the music and making sure that we sound more like Queen than anyone alive today. The fact that I come as myself gives me a chance to tell my real story about how my life intersected with the music of Queen, with Freddie Mercury, and what that means to me as an artist. It's really a bizarre story that I could have never predicted and it's a heck of a lot of fun to tell. So it's a blast. It's all the rock and roll you could wish for.




