

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

One of the best things about living in western New York is the abundance of farmers markets throughout the region. Few things are better than sitting down to enjoy a dinner made up of locally grown or homemade foods that came from a vendor who lives right in the community. Find out all there is to discover at one of the many incredible farmers markets located in the tri-county area.

CATTARAUGUS ARTISAN & FARMERS MARKET

2024 marks the inaugural year of the Cattaraugus Artisan & Farmers Market, which is located on North Main Street in the empty lot near the railroad tracks in the village of Cattaraugus. Market Manager Rebecca Ellis, who also owns a salon in the village, realized there was definitely a need – and a desire – for a farmers market. After many conversations with clients, residents, and other Cattaraugus business owners, she realized the idea was feasible – someone just needed to get it started, so she stepped up to the plate.

The market is held on the second and fourth Fridays in July, August, and September from 2:00-6:00pm and new vendors are joining each time. "We're offering honey, salt scrubs, homemade soaps and crafts, fruits and vegetables, frozen meats, and we have different businesses and nonprofits here... We've had a petting zoo and pony rides that are here. We have the Pig Out Place offering food and RocketCup Coffee offering drinks." Additionally, the market features card making and will soon offer baked goods for purchase. Ellis said new vendors are always welcome, and their first time setting up at the market is free!

For the discerning shopper, there is a special incentive to pay attention to each vendor's items. During every market, Ellis hides a small stuffed cow somewhere in a vendor's booth. "I'm collecting pieces from each vendor to make a gift basket," she explained. "People have a chance to win it if they put their name in and where they saw the cow."

Now in its third year, the Gowanda Farmers Market has grown significantly, and Market Manager Becky Moore couldn't be happier with the community's response and area vendors' enthusiasm for this relatively new market. Check it out for yourself on Thursdays from 2:00-6:00pm at 53 W. Main Street. "We're getting a lot of new people coming in with differ-

ent things," Moore said. "Even since last year, I've had a lot more interest as far as this year goes. Just last week, I had a vendor call - they have coffee, home-baked goods, and a home processor permit. I have the Lotus Nutrition drinks coming, and a woman who does flowers, more specifically lavender, and those were all things that came in over the last week."

One of the market's most unique vendors is a vendor who sells organic worm castings. Moore explained, "There were quite a few people that were excited to hear about this. It is fertilizer for homegrown goods and house plants."

A unique feature of the Gowanda Farmers Market is the monthly themes. "Our first market of the year was a luau, and we offered free Hawaiian punch along with free cookie decorating, and then we're going to do a fair theme at the market," she said. "We did a Fall Fest last year with pumpkin painting. This brought more people in, and it's made it a family outing that's affordable versus just adults coming to buy the produce and look around."

Moore said that the weekly market will continue through September and hopefully the first two weekends in October, weather permitting. OLEAN AREA FARMERS MARKET





On Saturdays from 8:00am-1:00pm the Olean Area Farmers Market takes over Lincoln Park Pavilion on South Street in Olean. Market Manager Becca Stayer is thrilled to share the wide variety of local vendors participating in this year's market. "We have several bakers who provide local baked goods for us," she said. "We have Ellicottville Bake Shop, who recently joined our market. We have Country at Heart, which is another baked good provider right here in Allegany. We have Rolling Scones, which is gluten free, egg free, and dairy free. We have Quench & Dough, which is another baker that's refined sugar free and gluten free, and we have the Baking Witch, which is new this year as well, and she does a lot of cupcakes, cookies - the sweet treats."


Visitors to the market can also shop local meat vendors. "It's great because it's so nice to have some reliable, ethically raised meat options available, especially in our region, where we're in a little bit of a food desert, especially for local meats," she noted. The market's three meat vendors include Faulkner's Prosser Pastures, Flannigan Hill Farm, and Mascho Homestead Farm. Stayer added that there is a nice balance between the fresh produce, meats, and artisan products offered at the Olean Area Farmers Market. "Pamela Putt – she is a sweet corn vendor – this year is offering some of her soap products, which is exciting because you wouldn't expect to have that at a sweet corn booth," said Stayer. "We've got Our Twisted Tree, and they bring such a wide variety of vegan bath and body products. They made Pride soaps last month that sold out every market." Other vendors include Essentially Darling, which sells essential oils, aromatherapy products, handmade jewelry and more, and Mindfully Holistic with different tea blends and jewelry.

Stayer highlighted another unique presence at the market: Taste of the Region. "Taste of the Region is really cool because it has things that we might not have other vendors supplying at our market," she explained. "For example, we don't have a milk vendor, so what Taste of the Region does is it will find local milk within the western New York area and will bring it here to sell."

ELLICOTTVILLE RESIDENTS VOICE CONCERNS OVER QUALITY OF LIFE

Village Board Members Recap Special Meeting Held Re: Short-Term Rentals and Noise Disturbances; Chamber Submits Request to Add Alcohol to Taste of Ellicottville

The Village Board of Ellicottville came together on July 16th to discuss the latest developments within the area. Gathering at the Village Hall, discussions began at 6:00pm as Major John Burrell called the meeting to order.

Starting at the top of the agenda with good news, the Board began talks on the approval of the Department of Transportation (DOT) permit that was issued for the necessary work involved in the Street Light Project. The most up-to-date information on the project shared that the streetlight poles are in, and work will continue in early August to complete the project.

The village was happy to announce that while the current accountant, Mary Villa, has left Bridges & Horning, she will continue out her year in her current position. Once the year comes to an end, Mary will continue as the Village Accountant but excitingly under her own company, Backwoods Accountant. Congratulations were made to her new business endeavor.

SHORT-TERM RENTALS

Approved by the Board were the minutes of a Special Meeting that involved both the Town and Village of Ellicottville. The evening which took place on July 9th surrounded discussions on the combined arrangement of coverage, policy, and procedures regarding local law enforcement. With the agenda surrounding local law enforcement, added attendance beyond the Board included Jim Bouchard, Officer in Charge, Don Auge, Deputy Officer in Charge, and Deputy Lott, Cattaraugus County Deputy Sheriff.

Some of the main talking points of concern involved complaints about short-term rentals and noise violations. The community feels these issues have disrupted their quality of life as residents and are voicing for changes to be addressed. Both Mayor John Burrell and Town Supervisor Matthew McAndrew, along with fellow Board members expressed that they take these concerns very seriously and shared information on how to direct these difficulties. Major Burrell shared that the village has now secured Village Prosecutor, Mark Byrne, who will be able to prosecute those in violation of local and state law. Supervisor McAndrew shared financial information on previous years' costs and revenue among the Police and Court of Ellicottville to best inform those gathered. As a way to address the challenges of the situation, some strategies were presented to explore.

Resource allocation is a focus to explore within the Police Department. With over 53 miles to cover, "our force is doing their absolute best to attend to each issue at hand," but it was expressed that more is needed in terms of coverage, whether that be added staffing or planning.

The Village and Town will be looking into the possibility of increasing permit costs for short-term rentals alongside extra enforcement to non-compliance from noise ordinances and occupancy violations. Both Town and Village attorneys will be working together to revisit the short-term rental laws for each municipality.

Added training will be made available for officers to stay current on local and state law regarding noise ordinance, short-term rentals, and code enforcements as well as working with Cattaraugus County DA.

Lastly recommended were for residents to reach out to local law enforcement - not local officials - to utilize the resources of the police department. Calls made directly to law enforcement are logged and provide the needed documentation for legal action to be made.

The Town and Village are committed to working together to address all concerns of their residents' safety and well-being. It is with this information they hope to grow and provide

the necessary means to enforce the highest standards. For those in need of ways to further their contact regarding these issues, the Town and Village have stared the Short-Term Rental Violation Complaint form under the Village Forms & Permits section at www.ellicottvillegov.com, as well as the non-emergency Police & Sheriff dispatch line at 716-938-9191.

IN OTHER MATTERS...

Moving on in the Regular Meeting's agenda, reports were presented and approved without issue throughout the Departments. The Financial Report and Audit of Claims were accepted by the Village Board and the End-of-the-Year report is in the process of being released to the public within the next few weeks.

The Mayor's report went on to acknowledge and discuss a few matters among the current state of bonds and banking. BAN (Bond Anticipation Note) money has been received by the village and will stay local in the capital account at Five Star Bank. The funds will be used for necessary investments and improvements to future projects.

Within the developments of Special Events, a request came from the Chamber of Commerce to add alcohol tasting at the Taste of Ellicottville. The intention was for four vendors to serve various tasting samples throughout the event, but the request was denied by the Village Board. Taking into consideration the time needed to review the necessary information, insurance, and all other aspects, they did not feel they could approve the appeal but would like to revisit the idea for future years.

The Engineering Department welcomes the continued work of Mark Burr, PE, who will remain on an individual contract to assist the interim until the end of the year. To update the Board on some of the recent progress within the area, Mr. Burr shared that the com-

ADDITIONAL LAW ENFORCEMENT COMING TO ELLICOTTVILLE

Town Board Approves Hiring of Special Police Officer; Land Trust Alliance Requests Conservation Preservation Easement

Ellicottville Town Supervisor Matthew McAndrew welcomed Board members to its monthly Town Board meeting on July 17th. With the current agenda to be addressed, discussions revolved around numerous topics including project amendments and completion, pledge support, and the Special Meeting that took place with the Village.

Getting right into business the Town Board recapped the previous Minutes that were approved for the June 19th Regular Meeting as well as the Special Meeting on July 9th. As reviewed by the Board, the Special Meeting was an important gathering between the Town and the Village of Ellicottville on current law enforcement and the challenges faced by short-term rentals and noise ordinances.

In hopes to tackle this issue as a joint force, the Village and Town have strategized ways to improve the resources presently available while adding to that list. Providing extra training, continuous code enforcement, and the possibility of larger penalties than currently in place, they intend to ease the complaints by residents. Both municipalities will keep to their efforts in providing a quality of life uninterrupted by the over occupancy and noise disturbances caused by short-term rentals.

The Police Department presented their report to the Board in which Officer in Charge, Jim Bouchard, made a request for the hiring of a special police officer, upon completion of their exam in September. This request was approved by the Board and will welcome the new member of the force once all necessary conditions are complete. The expected addition to the department may add a hand in the efforts of the ongoing short-term rental conflicts addressed by residents. The Board commended the Police Department for their ongoing efforts in patrolling and providing safety to both the Town and Village.

On the topic of the law, Distract Attorney Lori Rieman plans to retire by the end of the year. With this news, Attorney Preston Marshall made an appearance to the Board to introduce himself and his candidacy once the position becomes available. Sharing with the

Board his qualifications, experience, and a bit about himself, we are sure to learn more in the months to come.

The Town of Ellicottville has yet to receive a serious bid for the Town Hall Front Door and will now push the project to the fall season in hopes of a reputable offer. Credible contractors interested in the project should look to the official government website of the Town at www.ellicottvillegov.com under Town Announcements to the Town Hall Front Door Bid.

In other news within the town, the up-and-coming Pour Taproom has put in a request to expedite their application to the State Liquor Authority (SLA) so they can move along in their planning to serve liquor on the premises. The Town of Ellicottville agreed to waive the 30-day notification in the licensing process. "We are excited to see the establishment come together as time progresses."

The Land Trust Alliance made a request to the Town of Ellicottville that asked for the support to permanently preserve the Ellicottville Scenic Forest with a conversation easement. In agreement, the Board and Supervisor McAndrew voiced their support. Supervisor McAndrew has written a letter to advocate for the Alliance's outreach for funding. The project makes for a positive enhancement to the environment, one which Ellicottville relies on for its hub of outdoor recreation and tourism year-round. "Maintaining the resources of our expansive hillsides, streams, and forest will continue to benefit the rural nature of the Town and local ecosystems alike." An easy cause to back, support came without question.

As discussions came to an end, the Town Board Meeting was adjourned by Supervisor McAndrew. Following the evening's talking points, the Town Board will continue to address the happenings of the area in next month's meeting, taking place on the third Wednesday of the month. 

Core Performance: High Protein Food for Every Eater

Are you getting enough protein in your diet? While you may watch your calories, sugar and salt intake, you should also make sure you are ingesting enough protein. It plays a crucial role in the creation and maintenance of every cell in our bodies.

Proteins are digested into amino acids. Without the proper amino acids, your body cannot create enzymes and hormones. It is also considered a "macronutrient," meaning that you need relatively large amounts of it to stay healthy. Macros include carbs like fruits, vegetables and grain (45-65% of daily calories) plus protein (10-35% of daily calories) and fats (20-35% of daily calories). Both proteins and fats are essential nutrients which means you have to get these from your diet.

Here are five compelling reasons why you should make sure you are getting enough protein every day:

- 1. BUILD. Protein is an important building block of bones, muscles, cartilage and skin. In fact, your hair and nails are comprised mostly of protein.
- 2. REPAIR. Your body uses it to build and repair tissue.
- 3. OXYGENATE. Red blood cells contain a protein compound that carries oxygen through out the body. This helps supply your entire body with the nutrients it needs.
- 4. DIGEST. About half the dietary protein that you consume each day goes into making enzymes, which aids in digesting food and making new cells and body chemicals.
- 5. REGULATE. Protein plays an important role in hormone regulation, especially during the transformation and development of cells during puberty.

DID YOU KNOW: Protein helps you lose weight! Diet and exercise are always the most reliable and consistent ways to reach your fitness goals including weight loss. Ensuring that your diet includes lots of protein can be helpful if you're trying to lose weight because protein takes longer to digest than carbohydrates and can help you feel fuller longer, which can make reducing your calorie intake easier to achieve. In addition, consuming enough protein helps to ensure that the weight you lose is fat, not muscle.

PLUS: Protein helps you gain muscle! A common myth is that eating more protein will make your muscles huge and bulky. This is not true unless you push your body with heavy exercises and significant dietary adjustments designed to achieve a bodybuilder physique. Instead, adding more protein to your diet PLUS some type of weight or resistance training can help change your body composition to one that is characterized by more lean muscle and less fat. As a bonus, increased muscle mass may also increase your metabolism and help you shed fat, leading to a more toned appearance. You should always consult with your doctor before beginning any exercise program.

The protein you eat is most helpful to your body when eaten consistently at each meal to keep your energy levels up. In particular, protein intake is very beneficial at the following times:

- MORNING: When you wake up in the morning, your body has already used up most of
 the nutrients you ate during your previous meal. Consuming protein first thing in the
 morning is a great way to get your energy back and get your day started on the right foot.
 Try adding eggs, milk, yogurt or cheese to your breakfast for an easy protein boost.
- SNACKS: If you find yourself getting hungry between meals, a protein-dense snack might be just what you need to tide yourself over. Try a handful of almonds or a serving of Greek yourst
- AFTER A WORKOUT: Eating protein within 30 minutes of completing your workout helps your muscles heal and build strength.

You may think that it will be difficult to consume enough protein each day to meet your body's needs, especially if you are a vegetarian or want to avoid eating too much meat for health reasons. Actually, there are many readily available sources of meat and non-meat protein (some of which may surprise you) that you can build into your diet. These include:

- Boneless, skinless chicken breast, lean beef or fish
- Seafood
- Low-fat milk, yogurt and cheese
- Whole grains like quinoa and millet
- Beans and legumes (kidney beans, navy beans, peas, lentils and chickpeas)



- Firm tofu (soybean curds)
- Edamame (immature soybeans)
- Egg whites
- Nuts and seeds (especially peanuts and almonds)
- Avocados, leafy greens and cherries

Eating a combination of these foods daily can help you meet your protein requirements and keep meals interesting. Even vegetarians have plenty of protein-rich foods to choose from.

What about protein supplements? Overall, it is best to get your protein from a variety of fresh, unprocessed foods such as those listed above. Protein powders and pre-blended protein drinks/shakes are considered dietary supplements and, as such, are not regulated by the FDA and may contain ingredients (even toxins) not listed on the label. In addition to causing digestive upset in some people, some protein supplements may also be high in added sugar and calories. There is no data to support the idea that taking in high amounts of protein through supplements will increase muscle mass or speed weight loss. And, they are expensive. Experts recommend sticking to natural protein sources for the best health benefits

Even though a higher protein intake can have health benefits for many people, it is not necessary for everyone. Most people already eat around 15% of their calories from protein, which is more than enough to prevent deficiencies. However, in certain cases, people can benefit from eating much more than that - up to 25–30% of calories.

If you need to lose weight, improve your metabolic health, or gain muscle mass and strength, make sure you're eating enough protein.


