



#### BEHIND THE PINE

Ellicottville Playground Committee to Host Pinewood Derby Fundraiser this Sunday



The design for the new Ellicottville Playground will welcome all ages and abilities and will also cater to children with cognitive and sensory processing disorders.

Ready, Steady, Go! This weekend, the first Behind the Pine (Wood Derby) event will be racing upstairs at Madigan's on Washington Street, Ellicottville. The event is this Sunday, August 18th and will go from 3:00-6:00pm. There will be car kits available for purchase at Madigan's for those interested in participating, but in a very limited amount. You can find a pinewood derby kit on Amazon for about \$12, or head to the Niagara Frontier Scout Shop in Cheektowaga. As a Pinewood Derby alum myself, I can say there is nothing more rewarding than bragging rights if you happen to win! But, if that's not enticing enough, there will be some epic prizes, a 50/50, and giveaways, along with live entertainment.

If you don't know what Pinewood Derby is, you either aren't, weren't, or didn't raise a Cub Scout. In these developmental years before Boy Scouts, before your level of merit is defined by badges and meaningful contributions to the community, you're a Cub Scout. And when you're a Cub Scout, none of that matters as long as you win the Pinewood Derby!

On a shelf in my childhood bedroom I have all five of my Pinewood Derby cars from the five years I was a Cub Scout, all with their respective placement ribbons bound to the wheel. Those cars are some of my favorite pieces of memorabilia. They represent hours of quality time with my dad and brother and showcase my creative skills over the years.

Now, thanks to the folks at the nonprofit Ellicottville Playground, you don't have to be a scout to race in the Pinewood Derby! The Behind the Pine (Wood Derby) event directly benefits the construction of a new and more inclusive playground. I spoke with Molly Timkey, head of the Ellicottville Playground organization, to learn more about the new inclusive playground.

"Our goal is to tear down our old playground at the Village Park and build a new, more modern, and inclusive playground for all children no matter their ability," she said. Other than the obvious reasons, being that the current playground with its wood chips and dated equipment isn't ideal for wheelchair-bound or otherwise physically disabled children to play on, Molly brought up a very interesting point about the kind of foot traffic Ellicottville gets. "We have two adaptive snowsports programs in Ellicottville - one at Holiday Valley and one at HoliMont. So these families can come and ski in the wintertime, and this playground would be a great opportunity for those same families to come back and visit in the summer as well," said Molly.

Having a robust and inclusive selection of winter activities is only effective if those summertime counterparts are equally as robust and inclusive. And Molly isn't just stopping at physical ability. "We're also adding an area that caters to children with cognitive and sensory processing disorders that is designed to help them calm down and regulate," added Molly.

Molly was approached by Pat Morgan, a master event planner and the brains behind the derby fundraiser. "How he landed on pinewood derby, I don't know," chuckled Molly, "but I'm so grateful he did because this is such a unique event and it should really draw people in."

Pat also told me it felt like a no-brainer to help out with events on projects that bring the community together. Whether that's raising money for a project that promotes inclusivity or just playing a part in something that orchestrates community engagement. "It's so mission critical to this community and I'd be remiss to not insert myself into trying to make a difference," he said.

Fundraising for the playground is expected to wrap up by the end of 2025, with Molly hoping to break ground on it beginning in 2026. That means we have some more awesome playground events to look forward to and many more ways to support such an wonderful cause. 





And it all started with a horse trailer...

Keating was initially inspired by mobile bar ideas she found on Pinterest. "I just thought it was something really neat and different that I haven't seen," said Keating. The trailer was purchased in April of this year, and by mid-July, it was fully converted to a beautiful mobile bar! #### THE WANDERER HUT

Get a Taste of Poland at HoliMont Bike Park

If you know me, you know that I love food, and you know that I enjoy trying foods from every culture. One of the most comforting homestyle cuisines has got to be Polish food. From cabbage rolls to potato pancakes, it's all stick-to-your-ribs, satisfying eats - something that's been missing in our local area, until now. Enter The Wanderer Hut, a polish food truck out of Salamanca, NY, that's been setting up shop at HoliMont Resort on the weekends. Let's learn more about them...

**eNOW:** How did The Wanderer Hut Truck get started?

NATALIA: Wanderer Hut is a family-owned business run by Mariusz and myself, the owners. The food truck started in Salamanca as Mariusz's American dream. Ever since he was a young boy in Poland, Mariusz had a special bond with his mom and loved to cook with her while she prepared food for her catering business. As he aged, he went into the priesthood but always had fond memories and his love of cooking with his mom. When he got to Salamanca, he saw an opportunity to open a food truck as a form of outreach for the church and combine his two passions. He approached the church council and they were supportive of his ideas.



Mariusz did not feel he could do it alone. He asked me, his longtime friend from Poland, for help. I was working as an engineer and also had the same passion, but leaned towards baking. With my help, he was able to open Wandererhut on July 3rd, 2020 in the parking lot of Our Lady of Peace Parish in Salamanca where Mariusz served as the priest.

With Covid having taken over the country and people not being able to eat inside restaurants, food trucks became more popular and Wanderer Hut was no exception. In addition to the parishioners of the church who frequented Wanderer Hut, people who had never been to the church started coming to the truck where they were able to enjoy a good meal while sitting outside with others. Additionally, some people who got to know Mariusz started to come to the church. After a little over a year and a half, the diocese started to make changes to priest assignments, and Mariusz was moved to a different church. Mariusz and I had fallen in love with Salamanca and wanted to keep the truck there. Members of the Salamanca Rail Museum welcomed us to set up in their parking lot where they have been serving his mom's authentic Polish recipes and her European sweets since. Now it is a family-owned place.

**eNOW:** That's a very nice origin story, but I know that the food industry is a lot of work. What is an average day in the food truck life like?

**MARIUSZ:** Running a food truck is not a regular 9-5 job. Even when we are not open, we are still working. We spend our day either at the food truck or getting supplies, and our evenings preparing food for the next day. We enjoy what we are doing and our food is truly made with love.

**eNOW:** You seem to have a semi-regular schedule. Can you share that with us please? **NATALIA:** We are open Tuesday through Thursday, 11:00am-2:00pm at the Salamanca Rail Museum; Fridays 11:00am-4:00pm at the Tractor Supply in Olean; and Saturdays and Sundays, 11:00am-4:00pm at HoliMont in Ellicottville. There are always some exceptions based on other events. The best way to know where we are is to follow us on Facebook.

eNOW: What type of foods do you order and can you give us some details on them? MARIUSZ: Most of the recipes are based on traditional Polish and European cuisine with a modern innovative twist. We make them just like at home, everything is made by hand from scratch. When we can't make it, we always try to source it from some of the best local businesses. We are proud of our food and make the pierogi (a dumpling like dough full of mashed potatoes and farmer's cheese), bread, potato salad, desserts (like their decadent Wanderer Cake, which is a chocolate lover's dream), and dressings fresh everyday. We want to give everyone an amazing Polish food experience.

**eNOW:** You also offer catering. What type of jobs and what are those menus like? **MARIUSZ:** We are open to all types of jobs. We have done anniversaries, graduations,



Sometimes you'll hear someone say, "I was in the Arctic yesterday and I rolled in at 5:00am this morning."

Hearing something like that has always made me wonder how many of us have secret identities. It's as if almost everyone around you is a Clark Kent. They look just like you on the outside, they sit in a chair in a coffee shop just like you, but behind that normality hides a super human adventurer, someone who was thousands of miles away one minute and in a blink of an eye is seated at a table in your hometown café!

That seemingly instantaneous travel from points A to B has always intrigued me. One minute we are there, the next minute we are here in the café! Everything we've seen in a sci-fi show, like the original 60s *Star Trek*, eventually becomes reality, like the cell phone communicator or way back in time in the 30s cartoon strip Dick Tracy with his Facetime watch! All that's left is for us to say, "Beam me up Scottie" when we want to travel. Thankfully we haven't reached that stage yet as it would ruin the thrill, the excitement, and the anticipation in the journey home!

There is a point in every adventure when it's time to go home, you're tired physically and mentally, and you just want to sleep in your own bed. Sometimes the sadness of leaving something behind can be powerful but when 'push comes to shove' going home is the stronger of the two emotions and most often prevails.

Going home is like a dry erase white board. One minute, the board is covered with writings, drawings or formulas, and in a swipe of the eraser it is blank again. The journey home isn't always smooth, there can be many unexpected events that weren't anticipated like flight cancellations, lost luggage or someone forgets to pick you up at the airport. Once you are finally home, all the inconveniences however major they seemed at the time are erased just like the scribblings on the white board. It's almost as if they never happened!

My journey home last week was just like that! One minute it was I that was in the Arctic witnessing life in another culture, another time zone, far removed from fast food take out windows, to walking around with a loaded rifle to protect my group and myself from being fast food for bears.

24 hours ago, from the time I write this, our final day, I was sitting on a boat that was sitting on the rocks of a river bottom because we had missed the outgoing tide by mere minutes. As we waited for 8 hours for the new tide to roll in and float us out of our predicament, we had time to reflect on the situation and how we could have avoided this mishap. As our guide kept telling us, "There isn't a problem, only a solution".

Eight hours is a long time and it seem like an endless abyss. The only way to get through it was not to think of it in terms of minutes but rather opportunities! Without any kind of cell phone service, there was no way to call for help and notify anyone of our predicament. Help was not going to come anyway as there was no way for help to reach us, and quite frankly, we weren't in any danger.

A river bottom isn't something someone sees every day, I mean not just a dried-up drought type river bed but a living ecosystem that a tidal change exposes twice a day. At first, I started looking for some sort of treasure, an ancient artifact exposed after thousands of years buried beneath silt and sand. Not finding anything that exciting, I wished I had my very own Wilson to kick around just like Tom Hanks! As I returned to my seat in our



marooned boat I resorted to reorganizing my 1,500 pictures on my cell phone. Eventually the tide came flowing in and lifted up the boat and our spirits.

Upon returning to camp around midnight, we were tired and hungry after what seemed like forever being stranded. After a hot cup of coffee and a slice of buttered toast, all was if it never even happened! To further erase our harrowing marooning, we focused on breaking camp and packing for our flight home.

Air travel never bothers me but there are some flights that you somehow wish you were never on. Our Canada North flight ran into remnants of Debby, a tropical storm, that ran up the east coast to greet us in Montreal on our approach to Trudeau International.

There was nothing but gray to see out of the windows of the Boeing 737, normally a very safe aircraft until recently with Boeing making all sorts of news headlines, not in the most favorable way, one felt less assured! Without the sense of sight, one relies on sound. We were scheduled to land at 18:40, and at 18:40 the pitch of the airplane changed just before we hit the first bump in the road and the engines revved up again! For the next 40 minutes it felt like riding a horse that didn't want to be ridden. The plane bucked and jolted us side to side and up and down, all the while the engine hum slowing down before sudden screaming accelerations. When you hear complete strangers asking one another to hold hands and you see the stewardesses doing the same you start thinking about the worst-case scenarios. Finally, the words we all wanted to hear over the intercom, "We are now on our final approach." Being a positive person, I took the word final in a positive way! Upon landing as hoped the cheering and clapping took over and we departed the plane!

It's tough to recall everything that you just experienced on your journey once you arrive safely home and the recent past becomes so distant that its only a memory, but a good journey just the same! Now off to Part One of the next adventure!!!

He could be found standing at the small podium ready to greet and seat patrons. He exuded hospitality and made sure everyone was satisfied and content when they left. All 4 of his children worked with him and treasured those memories. When Butch died in 1976, he and his brother Danny shared the responsibilities of the businesses until Danny's untimely death in 1985. Jerry died suddenly just a year later October 11, 1986 at the age of 48.




