

Off she went, and as she drove around the back of the library to park, she had a WOW! moment when she spotted beautiful paintings on the library fence. She took photos and came back to the Ellicottville Library Board, pitching the idea to do something similar here on our library campus.

And that's how wonderful things started to happen, folks: an inspiration, a consensus, a plan, a goal. Enter local artists Barbara Fox and Cathy Lacy who, like a book spine, serve with others as the backbone of the library. They put their heads together and came up with a gorgeous representation of the life-changing, fun, and powerful stories housed inside the walls of our library building by painting the fence around the recycling bin outside with the spines of said amazing works of literature.

Fox created the design and painted the first layers on the structure, taped pages and pages of transfer paper together and then stenciled the designs on the walls. Fox and Lacy brought in 20-year-old Sydney Feldbauer, her sister, 13-year-old Kelsey Feldbauer, and Kelsey's 14-year-old friend, Collin Weber, to do the actual painting of the book spines. I tell you their ages because it is impressionable that these young people would be interested in helping in this project and that they would have the patience and diligence to work with others to complete it. We have this image of kids buried in their iPads and forget that there are kids out there equally willing to contribute to the community. Kudos!




Who doesn't love Margaret Wise Brown's Goodnight Moon with those bright, happy illustrations by Clement Hurd? It's on the wall along with forty or more book titles chosen by the community prior to the beginning of the development of the project. A call was put out by Flanagan for readers to submit their votes for their favorite books. Those that received the most votes will be found on the wall. Yes, Harry Potter will be there. A special spot was reserved for Ellicottville's beloved Edna Northrup's book, For the Love of Skiing, and another for Little Valley educator, Amy Bedell's book, She Will. This wonderful children's book about compassion and kindness is dedicated to her cousin, Julie Mendell, who was her inspiration. Bedell said her cousin was born with a major disability and passed away at age 48 about two years ago.

Brenda Hughey (originally from Springville), who oversees the foundation named for her sister, the Elisa B. Hughey Foundation for the Arts, stepped to the plate, ready to paint and to pay for the expenses for this project. (Elisa, who died in 2016, was married to Inigo DeOrbe and mom to two sons, Adrian and Ignacio, graduates of ECS, where she taught Art before starting her business of Interior Design in Ellicottville.)

Painting the six-foot-tall wall is a bit of a challenge. An artist is either standing on tippy toe, sitting, or kneeling/hunched down to do the bottom. Approximately two-thirds done, the wall thus far has taken Fox about 50-60 hours for planning and layout, and about a combined volunteer effort of 35 hours of painting. Stay tuned and watch the entire artwork unfold. It's going to be inspiring!

The Ellicottville Memorial Library is located at 6499 Maple Road and is open Monday through Saturday, closed Sunday. On display until the end of September are fourteen original photographs taken by Barbara Arnstein from Springville, NY. Arnstein specializes in landscapes, flowers, water, nature and seems especially fond of clouds. 



ECS CREATES STEM PROGRAM

Elementary School Students to Benefit From Hands-On Collaboration

Former US Secretary of Education Richard Riley once said that schools are preparing students for jobs that don't yet exist to use as-of-yet undiscovered technology to solve problems we've never faced. So how can teachers prepare students for an unknown future? Embracing STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) education is key, and Ellicottville Central School is pleased to announce the addition of an elementary school STEM teacher beginning this school year!

Leah Farnum, who has been teaching second and third grade at ECS for the past 10 years, is excited to step into this new role. Farnum is often asked what exactly "STEM" is and how it differs from familiar subjects. "STEM stands for science, technology, engineering, and mathematics, and it emphasizes an integrated approach to learning all of those subjects," she explained. "A highly effective program really aims to develop the skills and knowledge that we're finding are crucial in today's technology-driven world."

Toward that end, Farnum will be working with all elementary students (pre-kindergarten through fifth grade) at least once a week through hands-on projects that encourage collaboration, creativity, and student-driven learning. Farnum noted that STEM lab work will involve students taking learning into their own hands with some directions from her but the freedom to test their ideas with one another. "Research shows that that's how kids retain information best - if they've learned it hands-on themselves," she explained. "As much as people don't want to hear it, we learn more through our failures sometimes than we do when things are just given to us and the right answer is just fed to us from the teacher."





Elementary Principal and Director of Curriculum Katie Mendell is enthusiastic about the new STEM position and how the project-based, hands-on approach to learning will invigorate students' learning and prepare them for the future. "As educators, we are lifelong learners, living in an ever-changing world that we are tasked with preparing our children for," she said. "This task has felt daunting over the past couple of years with the mandates, state education regulations, and added expectations on districts; however, STEM education gives us hope and a way forward. We are able to witness students fall in love with learning and have fun doing so."

Farnum will also be working with students in their main classroom or other specials to deepen their understanding of STEM-related topics. Farnum pointed out that STEM is not brand-new at ECS, as many teachers have been incorporating STEM-based learning into their curriculum. However, this is the first year that there is designated time in a student's week for STEM in a lab specially designed for hands-on learning. "It's not something that the classroom teacher has to worry about fitting into their schedule," said Farnum. "STEM is time they know is designated for hands-on exploration, especially engineering. Engineering isn't something that's easily integrated into a general curriculum and takes extra thought. It's not something that is a standard at this point, but it's something that we know works really well with kids to help them understand how the world works and to solve problems. We're going to need kids to solve problems!"

Farnum has been busily preparing the STEM lab all summer, and it's stocked with science tools, robotics kits, building materials, measurement tools, and more. She is grateful for the support of the school board in the creation of this position and thankful for the generosity of the parent teacher organization (PTO) and the community who







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
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
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
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












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

A LOVING LLAMA SHOWCASE

LlamaFest Invites the Public to Learn, Participate & Appreciate All Things Llama

Summer might be closing out, but there is still plenty of fun left to be had, and you can still find some unique events to attend. One of those should be the WNY LlamaFest (I said what I said!). That's right - LlamaFest! It's a two-day event with a myriad of activities, shows and demonstrations you don't want to miss. EllicottvilleNOW had a chance to speak with Scott Dyke of Buffalo Creek Llamas, who is hosting the festival. Let's get into all the details...

eNOW: WNY LlamaFest sounds very interesting, can you tell us how it all got started and came to be what it is now?

SCOTT: Buffalo Creek Llamas got its start back in 1999 after visiting a llama open barn at a llama farm in Orchard Park. As the family grew, we wanted to do something similar to expose the public to these magnificent animals. So in 2013, we started WNY LlamaFest. In 2017, we added the WNY LlamaFest Youth show for area llama-loving youth to showcase their talents.

eNOW: What can you tell us about the event? Is there a cost of admission? Is it family friendly? What are the dates and times? And what should guests make sure to bring with them?

SCOTT: Admission is FREE. That includes all the demonstrations, youth show, walka-llama, obstacle course, meeting the world famous llama "J," baby naming contest, Llama's Got Talent™, visiting with all the llamas, and selfies with llamas. There are some activities for which there is a fee. We will be offering llama cart rides for \$5 per person. The proceeds go toward supporting WNY LlamaFest and WNY Special Olympics. We will have concessions for purchase, and I think we'll have the return of the llama kissing booth. We also have a feed vending machine for visitors to purchase feed to feed the llamas.

WNY LlamaFest is very much family-friendly. There is no smoking or alcohol allowed on the premises. We have a special kids zone with activities just for the kiddos - puzzles, coloring activities, etc. Children also love feeding and walking llamas, and the llama obstacle course. Dates and times are: Saturday, September 7th, 10:00am-3:30pm, and Sunday, September 8th, 11:00am-4:00pm.

There is more what guests should not bring versus what they should. For safety and health concerns we cannot allow pets on the grounds. Please leave the four-legged friends at home. There are plenty of furry friends to visit with at WNY LlamaFest. Otherwise guests should just bring their curiosity and some spending money for the extra activities and vendor shopping. Great opportunity to get some Christmas shopping done!

eNOW: What types of activities can be expected?

SCOTT: Saturday, September 7th we'll be mostly focused on the youth show where area youth will be participating in showmanship, pack, obstacle, and public relations (PR) classes, and possibly costume class. This is a great opportunity for visitors to see llamas in action performing with their young handlers. Time and personnel permitting, we may include some other activities (cart rides, walk-a-llama, demonstrations, etc) but the main event is the youth show. Sunday, September 8th will be focused on demonstrations, such as spinning (yarn), felting, packing, driving, llama vs. alpaca, etc., as well as walk-a-llama, llama obstacle course, llama cart rides. Vendors, concessions, baby naming contest, feeding the llamas will be available both days.

eNOW: You mentioned you will have a vendor market. Can you tell us who is participating and what they will be offering?

SCOTT: Yes, there will be vendors there. Our Llama Adventures gift shop will be open with a variety of llama related items. Other vendors include: Breezing Hill Alpacas with alpaca fiber clothing. WbDreamer with mainly llamas related gifts and goodies. Blissful Acres Soap with hand made soap products. And there may be a few others, you'll just have to come out and see.

eNOW: What type of food and beverages will be on offer?

SCOTT: Concessions will be provided by the Tonawanda Timberwolves Boys Varsity Swim Team. They will be offering hot dogs, snacks and beverages like water, for very reasonable prices.

eNOW: Do you have any other events planned for this year?

SCOTT: We don't have any other public events planned for on the farm, but Llama Adventures operates year-round so guests can choose an adventure and visit at a date



ELLICOTTVILLE VILLAGE BOARD

Mayor John Burrell Reports Great Use of New Parking Lot; Board Discusses Upcoming Festival Schedule and Road Closures, Among Other Things

On Tuesday, August 20, 2024, the Village Board came together to review and talk through the evening's agenda. Mayor John Burrell started discussions by calling the meeting to order and sharing some good news within the Village of Ellicottville.

First to be announced, the Taste of Ellicottville was a success and welcomed locals and tourists alike to sample the fine culinary offerings of the area. The festival brought in an estimated 4,000 visitors, with that Saturday being the highest attendance on record to date. The village was also happy to see that the new addition of the Mill Street parking lot was utilized and had reached its maximum capacity. Organizers and vendors did a fantastic job, and congratulations are in order for this year's category winners: The Silver Fox, West Rose Restaurant, Cupcaked Bakery, EBC Tap + Bottle & Taqueria, and The Gin Mill!

Coming back to the Mill Street parking lot, the electrical vehicle chargers are starting to show positive earnings which are now up to 8%. These chargers have been recognized as an impactful addition to the area and "we hope to continue to see their popularity grow."

The Village Board opened Privilege of the Floor. Two topics were addressed, starting with Robert Flemming, a representative of Collier Engineering, who was joined by two Department of Transportation (DOT) representatives, Mario D'Alfonso and Brian Dankert, to talk about any future work for the culvert on Washington Street. A preliminary plan was presented for the spring of 2026 with details including an 8-week project time and detours to be made for street alternatives.

Neighborhood representatives were in attendance to follow up on their concerns regarding short-term rentals. They expressed a concern regarding a local bed & breakfast and an incident that involved a response from Ellicottville Police and local sheriff, who addressed the noise after the property manager was said to have done nothing. Residents took a moment to thank the Board and the Mayor in what they have noticed as positive change being made. It was also noted during the meeting that several short-term rentals operating without a permit were fined \$1,000 each and resulted in removed listings on VRBO and Airbnb. Local real estate and rental agencies will be made aware by letter from the Village government to remind them of the current policies in place and the penalties that will be strictly enforced. For those looking for credible, properly permitted rentals, they can look to the village's website which now lists approved short-term rentals and will be updated as needed.

The Mayor's report came with some topics to be addressed. The New York Conference of Mayors (NYCOM) has an upcoming event to be held on September 16-20, 2024. These dates conflict with the monthly Village Board meeting and for Mayor Burrell to be in attendance. It was agreed that Trustee Doug Bush will sit in for Mayor Burrell during his leave so that the Board meeting can stay as scheduled, however, the October meeting will be rescheduled to the 8th of the month.

In other news addressed by the Mayor, there will be a grant meeting held September 21st with HoliMont, Iskalo Development, and other necessary personnel. Within these talks they hope to pursue grant funding from the NY Forward to benefit the Village of Ellicottville.

Other department reports were presented and approved without issue. Engineering and Planning were brought to attention by Greg Keyser who discussed the recent needs and projects of the village. An update was made that the Elizabeth Street project continues to move along as scheduled, but with one conflicting matter being addressed. During the

weekend of the Rock n' Roll Festival, Elizabeth Street will have to remain closed. The Board approved for the official closure of Elizabeth Street during the festival.

Special events had some updates to be made to the Village Board, including the Annual Ellicottville Fall Festival request as well as the EVL Half Marathon & 5K. Both of these events come with plenty of preparation and draw thousands to the area to join in on the fun.

The Fall Festival, which will be held October 12-13, 2024, stays true to its yearly application with little change beyond a request from the Ratchet Hatchet. They have asked for the approval of a 40'x30' tent similar to those used by other businesses. The Board granted the request.

The EVL Half Marathon & 5K will be celebrating their 10th year running. With an estimated 2,500 runners returning for the event, organizers have prepared year-round to welcome a safe and successful event. The Board approved the event without issue.

Another event request was made that had been previously brought to the attention of the Board. The Farmers Market, which has been a wonderful weekend addition each summer, will now extend this year for three additional dates. Mark your calendars for 9/13, 9/20, and 9/27 to enjoy some of the last offerings of the Farmers Market for the year.

Concluding talks, Mayor Burrell called the evenings meeting to adjourn. The Village Board will reconvene on September 17, 2024 at 6:00pm at the Village Hall. Stay up-to-date at ellicottvillegov.com.

Nannen Arboretum Requests Allotment of Funds for Electrical Costs for Future Pond Fountain; Highway Department Shares Update on Holiday Valley Road

The Town Board of Ellicottville took to their monthly meeting on Wednesday, August 21st to discuss the latest happenings within the Town of Ellicottville as Supervisor McAndrews called the meeting to order. The first topic of the evening addressed the public hearing for Local Law No. 3. This law focuses on the override of tax levy limits for fiscal year 2025. There were no members of the public present to give their opinions on the matter, and as a result, Board members reviewed the material at hand and agreed to close the public hearing.

Moving on, the Board opened Privilege of the Floor, which was met with Eric Butler's attendance. He is the current acting Cattaraugus County Sheriff and plans to run for Sheriff this coming election. Upon his introduction, he shared a bit about his history as Sheriff and the qualifications he holds through his knowledge and experience.

Discussions continued as the Board addressed current funding, financial reports, and audits in place. The Nannen Arboretum Board made a request to the Town Board for an allotment of funds that would be included in next year's budget. In this proposal, they are asking for electrical costs to be covered so that a fountain addition can be made to the pond already in place. The Town Board agreed to further conversations on this topic at a soon-to-be-scheduled meeting.

Continuing talks on funding, it was noted that all department heads must have their budget requests prepared by September 13, 2024. Updates will become available when these reports are submitted and approved. In the meantime, the Board has approved a budget workshop to be held on September 24th at 4:00pm.

The Town Board shifted conversation to the approvals of the Annual Financial Reports (AFR) and Audit ending on December 31, 2023. The AFR reports and audit were conducted by Tronconi Segarra and Associates. A resolution was agreed that the information found within the reports align with the original findings and in so complies with the guidelines of New York State.

Department reports by the Police, Clerk, Highway, and Planning were presented and approved by Town Board Members. Starting with some of the highlights of these, the Town and Village will now have a monthly activity report regarding police matters shared be-

tween both parties to continue their efforts for open communication and transparency. The Police Department also shared their plans for a meeting to be held on September 13th to discuss and plan the traffic flow to come from the Fall Festival.

The Highway Department has an update on the roadwork recently completed at Holiday Valley Road. After the highway superintendent met with contractors and engineers, they were able to find some issues that needed correcting. The contractor of the project has addressed the documented concerns and will begin the necessary work during the second week of September.

New information has been shared by Greg Keyser, head of the Town Planning Department, that addressed the lead pipe inventory project. With the use of MDA Consulting Engineers, the Town Water District had ordered a lead service line inventory. Required by the NYS Department of Health, MDA Consulting Engineers was able to identify 1,716 service lines, none of which showed any lead present. Certain property owners who may have not completed their surveys can expect to be contacted by the Water Department for continued lead and material testing.

A slight change will be made within the Water Department in terms of their billing methods. They will be switching to postcard-style mail for their billings to save time and costs compared to traditional stuffed envelopes. If a notice needs to be made, paper billing is still possible, but the Town Board has agreed to accept the new change.

The EVGV Trail was brought up in discussions surrounding Old Business. It has been shared that the committee is working on an interactive trail map to engage viewers and will be offered through their social media channels. It will surely be a great opportunity to connect those in and around the area to their mission. They also hope to work with the Southern Tier Trail and are in talks for corporate sponsorships. Their next meeting will be held on September 9th.

Wrapping up the evening's agenda, the Town of Ellicottville Board meeting was called to adjourn. They will continue their meetings on the third Wednesday of the month, next of which will be September 18, 2024 at 6:00pm at the Town Hall. Breakaway Classic Adventures: Campfire Coffee

Coffee is a morning ritual for most people. No matter where we are, we need to start the day off by sipping a hot cup of java. It used to be quite simple, but in today's modern society it's much more complicated with hot or cold choices, espressos, lattes, cappuccinos, mochas - the list goes on! Whatever happened to the good old-fashioned instant coffee that I grew up on? Believe it or not one acquires a taste for instant and can readily distinguish the different subtleties of the various brands offered, just like fine wines! Brands such as Maxwell House, Nescafé, or my favorite - Folgers Freeze Dried!


Once you go off the grid, all of those fancy coffees go with it, and if you want your morning coffee you'd best know how to make it and drink it. Maybe that's why people don't like camping so much! You don't have to be MacGyver to come up with an ingenious plan to make a pot or a cup without electricity, unless you cheat and bring along a generator! Good coffee makes for happy campers, especially if your wife is among them, and that makes for a happy life!

Let's start with the simplest and fastest way to make campfire coffee, the afore mentioned instant coffee! All you need to do is boil water - how simple is that? I know some of you are already cringing at the though of drinking instant, but the trick is don't make it too strong. A ¾ teaspoon in a regular sized coffee cup is all that one needs and with a few swirls of your spoon or a twig it's ready too drink, black as I normally do! If you need to add sugar and creamer like Coffee-Mate, God forbid, maybe you can disguise it enough to fool yourself into believing that you are back home! Somehow drinking coffee other than black is just not right, but heck, who am I to judge!

The next best way to make coffee has its roots in the old west! I am talking about Cowboy Coffee. You know, the type that ramrod Rowdy Yates, aka Clint Eastwood, drank in Rawhide. Wishbone always had a pot brewing for the weary wranglers. There is a trick to making cowboy coffee and if you don't know it, your cowboy will be on the chewy side, just like shallowing trail dust. Cowboy coffee is made in a pot, nothing fancy but one best suited to pouring! You begin by boiling some water over your campfire. Once it's boiling you measure out some coffee beans that in the absence of a coffee grinder you crushed with the butt of your pistol. A pot usually requires a cup's worth of coarsely ground beans. Take the cup of the coarse grind and pour it into the pot directly. Let it boil some more the time it takes to roll yourself a cigarette and smoke it! The longer it boils, the stronger it gets. The trick that I referred to is, don't pour yourself a cup until you doused the pot with a cup of cold water. The cold water will sink the grounds to the bottom of the pot, pour gently, and don't be last in line!

As humans evolved so did their methods of brewing the perfect cup of coffee. Coffee has its roots in Ethiopia around 800 AD. Interesting enough, it was a goat that led man to harvest coffee beans! A goat herder noticed his flocks acting more energized than usual and noticed them eating berries from a bush. The herder took the berries to a Monk who immediately condemned them as the work of the Devil and threw them into the fire! The rest is history and we all know the sinful benefits and pit falls of too much caffeine!

Next on the list of making good campfire coffee is with the use of a percolator. Coffee percolators were only invented around 1810, until then it was either cowboy style coffee or no coffee! Percolators really do make for a great cup of coffee, but as usual, there is a trick to using them as well! Don't over fill with water, otherwise your cup will be full of grounds, and always percolate for a specific length of time. Since the water is at 212 degrees Fahrenheit for a lengthy bit of time, it allows for the flavor from the coarsely ground beans to be fully extracted. Percolators are still considered the best for making that perfect cup of coffee, smooth and creamy!



In the 1970s, percolators lost favor to automated drip coffee machines making life at home so much easier, but because the water never gets as hot, the full flavor of the bean isn't extricated as with a percolator.

During the time percolators were in wide use, another coffee maker called a French Press was invented in 1852, by who else but the French. While the French were busy pressing more grapes than coffee, it was the Italians that eventually patented their French Press in 1929.

The French press is an ideal campfire coffee maker as it's back to just boiling water to make a delicious favorable cup! The French press allows the grind to steep in boiling hot water for several minutes before you push the plunger down to separate the grounds from the coffee. As always, the secret here is to have a coarser grind and allow enough time between steeping and plunging.

All these techniques for making great campfire coffee have something important in common: they are environmentally friendly and that's what camping is all about, being one with nature!

Make a cup on your next camping trip, sit back, throw your feet up, watch the sunrise and listen to some loony tunes, then you'll know you are in paradise!

He spent a couple of years with the Grange Group working at the Grange and West Rose, then was part of the opening team for Wayland Brewing. Now he's happy to be running Edna's at the Tamarack Club, where he plans to continue inspiring New American/ Global Comfort cuisine with a few "kind of fancy" specials, but still retaining many dishes of warm and satisfying food for skiers, golfers, and local residents.

At this writing, the actual Edna's menu is much the same, aside from the wonderful home-made pizza dough that James introduced. But until the fall menu comes out, pay attention to the specials. James is particularly proud of the homemade hummus and the Spaghetti alla Puttanesca which will both be featured on the upcoming specials menu. Edna's focus will be on fresh, delicious, satisfying food without abandoning things that people expect at Edna's, like the Roasted Half Chicken, Steak Frites, more seafood options, sandwiches, beautiful salads, and of course pizza from the amazing hearth oven.

When asked about what makes Edna's stand out, James said, "I think we can fit right into the EVL food scene by offering just damn good food. Imagine spending the day on the slopes and then unwinding by diving into some Stout Braised Short Ribs or Spicy Shrimp & Grits. As a chef, I'm a product of all the environments I've put myself into and I want to bring a little bit of all those places here, with my own pizazz, of course. We get to make people happy every day, as long as guests are here, enjoying themselves and our food, I can't ask for anything more."

So many good things are happening in the Holiday Valley Food and Beverage department. Insider's tip: be sure to enjoy Edna's at the Tamarack before ski season arrives for delicious food and the best view in town. There's plenty of parking nearby and it's open daily.



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


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



Saying Goodbye to a Beloved Community Icon; Past Owner of The Barn

Mary Jane Fox, 81, of Ellicottville passed away peacefully on Sunday, August 18, 2024 at her son, Tim Murphy's home, in Great Valley, NY.

Born July 25, 1943, Mary grew up in Orchard Park under the loving guidance of her parents, Fred and Tessie Noeller, who predeceased her. She is survived by her two brothers, Al (Carol) and Harold (Marty) Noeller. On Oct. 4, 1980, Mary married Leslie B. Fox, Jr., who predeceased her on Oct. 12, 2022 after 42 years of a marriage which brought great joy to her life. She would often say, "He was the love of my life," aside from her two sons, Tim (Jennifer) Murphy of Florida, and Jim (Amy) Murphy, who reside in Texas. Mary is also survived by

children Sarah and Dennis Ravenscraft, David Fox, Tim and Carolyn Fox, Kate Fox and grandchildren Conner Murphy, Faith, Samantha, Tyler and Jake Murphy, Paul Livingston, and Max and Flannery Fox, and several nieces and nephews.

Mary attended Fredonia State University, earning a teaching degree in elementary education in 1964. She taught 6th grade at Kenmore/North Tonawanda and West Seneca for five years. In those years, she married Bill Walsh who died one-and-a-half years after they were married. In 1969 she met Jack Murphy and together they purchased Bernie's Barn on Monroe Street in Ellicottville. They married and ran the restaurant, renamed the restaurant The Barn, and had two sons, Tim and Jim. In 1976, Mary found herself running the restaurant and raising her boys on her own. One day, Les Fox walked into the restaurant and in 1980 they wed, blending their families and running The Barn Restaurant together.

Mary handled the bulk of the work running the restaurant while Les worked the bar and the front room. But Mary had some ideas for her adopted community which included working with Ellicottville Central School to promote academic achievement, eventually being elected president of the community committee. She took great pride in the work the ABC (Academic Boosters Club) did, especially with the students who showed great progress, along with the more frequently recognized high achievers.

Mary was on the team and highly instrumental in the organization of the Annual Taste of Ellicottville. She continually held fundraisers for people in need, Holiday Valley, and many Ellicottville events. Although not one to toot her own horn, Mary was pleased to be chosen as a New York State Woman of Distinction in May 1998 and awarded the honor by Senator Jess Present in Albany, NY. Upon returning to Ellicottville from Florida several years ago, Mary became involved with the Ellicottville Rotary, becoming a board member and secretary. Her steadiness and organizational skills (and wry humor) will be missed.

Finally retiring from all the work and obligations, Mary and Les moved to Florida to be near son Tim and brothers, Harold and Al, and their families, only to return in 2022 for Les, who was very ill, to come home to his hometown to die. Mary then moved into her home on Sommerville Valley Road in Ellicottville, but again The Farm beckoned and she went to her eternal home from the one place she also truly called "home."

A memorial service, jointly officiated by family friends, Pastor Josh Bower of Ellicottville, and Rev. Pam Guyatt, a priest in the Episcopalian Church in Canada, was held Tuesday, August 20th at St. Paul's Lutheran Church with many friends and family in attendance. We all rejoiced with her because that was what she wanted. We all felt sadness because she will be sorely missed. Her ashes were buried this past week with her beloved husband, Les, at The Jefferson Street Cemetery. Mary, the generous, big-hearted, fun-loving lady with multiple community projects on her plate at any given time, is now at eternal rest with her husband in the arms of her dear Lord.

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




