





A yellowwood, red maple, black gum, and sycamore will be providing beautiful shapes, colors, and textures as they mature. Four wisteria vines have new homes on beautifully designed and structurally sound fences. The equipment shed has been repaired and repainted barn red. The Pollinator Garden grows in front of the shed and provides nectar and homes for our area butterflies, bees, and other pollinating creatures.

Oversized wings painted on exterior walls in Nashville, Tennessee provided inspiration for a public art piece. It is located on the red shed. Monarch wings, bees, and plants have been painted as a mural. Children can easily stand in front of the wings and become a butterfly. What a perfect photo opportunity!

Education has always been a top priority at the Arboretum. At the Pollinator Garden, visitors will see the plants that provide nectar for butterflies. Many milkweed plants can also be found there. It is the ONLY plant on which monarchs will lay their eggs, and the developing caterpillars will eat! Their black, white, and yellow striped caterpillars then form a chrysalis. Finally, a beautiful monarch is born.

Please visit the Nannen Arboretum daily dawn to dusk, all free of charge. A quarter mile paved path provides easy access to the trees and specialized areas. Enjoy!

ERIE CATTARAUGUS RAIL TRAIL

Community Engagement Requested to Help Building Plans for the Future

ORCHARD PARK - Erie Cattaraugus Rail Trail (ECRT) plans to bring a multi-use recreational trail to the Southtowns and is specifically targeting input from residents in Orchard Park and Colden for their viewpoints on trail development. "It has been some years since we sat down with residents and formally collected their thoughts on the project. As we consider developing the next sections of trail, we will be guided by the visions of each community," said ECRT President Mary Brummer.

State University of New York at Buffalo School of Architecture and Planning has structured a fall semester graduate course around the process of community engagement. Two free workshop-style meetings will be facilitated by the UB Planning graduate students to gather ideas, dreams, visions, and concerns from residents. UB faculty, Dr. Kelly Gregg, advised, "Engaging community stakeholders will be a critical part of the design process and project development for the ECRT. The students are looking forward to meeting with residents and helping to understand all viewpoints and ultimately assist the ECRT in project development."

Meetings will be held in two locations and will build on each other, so interested residents are asked to attend both sessions for the full duration. The first meeting will take place at the Orchard Park Community Activity Center on September 25th from 6:30–8:30pm. The second meeting will take place at the Colden Fire Company on October 30th from 6:30–8:30pm. Pre-registration is required and may be found at www.ecattrail.org. Following the two engagement meetings, the UB students will synthesize the community feedback into future visions for building the trail. These visions will be presented at a summary meeting and public celebration held on December 10th at 6:30pm at the Orchard Park Community Activity Center.





Griffis Sculpture Park Blends Creative Lighting with Nature

NIGHT LIGHTS at Griffis Sculpture Park continues to be an annual autumn tradition in Western New York since 2013. The outdoor light experience will return for 15 select nights from mid-September to mid-October, beginning on Friday, September 20th.

Located just outside of Ellicottville, NIGHT LIGHTS blends creative lighting, sculpture, sound, and nature to deliver an unforgettable outdoor experience at one of the United States' largest sculpture parks. At NIGHT LIGHTS, guests are able to venture on an unguided walk through a portion of the Mill Valley Road site of the sculpture park, where the trails and sculptures will interact with creative lighting - creating a truly unique experience.

To get an inside look at the workings of NIGHT LIGHTS, we asked creator Doug Sitler numerical questions about 12 years of lighting up the sculpture park.

eNOW: So, 12 years of NIGHT LIGHTS!

SITLER: We have been lighting up Griffis Sculpture Park for 12 consecutive autumns. It has been wildly successful and has brought a lot of new faces, attention and fundraising to the park. During our first year in 2013, we didn't set up the lights until the last week of October. We kept it open into the middle of November, where it actually snowed a few nights.

eNOW: How many people have attended a NIGHT LIGHTS event at Griffis Sculpture

SITLER: In the dozen years of installing NIGHT LIGHTS, we have attracted 35,000 paid guests to the park. The event has raised over \$150,000 for the park.

eNOW:What does it take to light up a part of the sculpture park? **SITLER:** To pull off NIGHT LIGHTS, it requires over 1.5 miles of power lines and cords, to provide electric to roughly 150 lights. All our lights are LED. There is a crew of three or four people that take about three weeks to set it all up.

eNOW:Do some nights sell out of tickets?

SITLER: One of the main reason why we went to internet ticketing is so that we have a good handle on how many people are going to show up on any particular evening. We limit each night to 450 tickets sold. Guests can still purchase tickets at the gate too. However, we do sell out a few times a year, so purchasing the tickets in advance is the safe bet.

eNOW: Speaking of tickets, how much do they cost?

SITLER: Tickets are \$14 adults and \$11 for kids. They can be purchased online at Eventbrite.

eNOW: Anything new added to NIGHT LIGHTS this year?

SITLER: We are featuring local artists and performers each evening of NIGHT LIGHTS. Over the course of five weeks, we will have hired 30 artists from our community. The hiring of the artists was made possible through a grant by the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation. We have also added some new lighting schemes on the trail.

Griffis Sculpture Park is located at 6902 Mill Valley Rd, East Otto, NY. The park features over 250 large scale sculptures dispersed through miles of hiking trails. Each sculpture was placed with the natural setting in mind, creating a truly unique experience between art and nature. Bigfoot Park Golf is in its first season of operation and will continue to welcome golfers through October, weather permitting. "We're hoping to get some leaf lookers playing as the scenery here is amazing," said Chad. "My first season has been great. Word of mouth always helps in our bubble of awesomeness! I am full of ideas and I know Bigfoot Park Golf will only get better and better!"





ARTIST PROFILE: FILEVE TLALOC

Meet One of Olean's First National Bank Art Studios & Lobby Gallery's Artists

If the walls of First National Bank in Olean, NY (circa 1914) could tell tales, one can only imagine the stories we would hear. One hundred and ten years is a long time for a building to absorb stories, even when it lay empty for twenty years. The good news is, thanks to the tenacity of the Urban Renewal Agency of the City of Olean, funds were found to at least keep the building standing by repairing damaged terra-cotta cornices of the seven-story building while seeking a developer to invest in this Olean landmark. Samuel Savarino came in to develop the building into 22 market-rate apartments and commercial space. Had it not been for these actions, the building may have been razed. Imagine that important corner in Olean with a big empty space, or a modern condominium or mall.

Today, thanks to the combined efforts of the Tri-County Arts Council, New York based Cha-ShaMa (it provides free and subsidized space for artists to live, work, and present, partnering with developers and property owners to transform their vacant buildings into centers of creativity with the added benefit of increasing local foot traffic and supporting area businesses) and Savarino Properties, things are happening on that intersection in Olean.

One day, Paula Bernstein from TCAC, Luke Cusack, VP, Savarino and ChaShaMa shared an email, and as so many of these miraculous things that happen, this partnership co-created the First National Bank Art Studios and Lobby Gallery which provides five local artists studio and gallery space until the end of this year. The first one-person exhibit will feature the work of resident artist Theresa Heinz of Cuba beginning Friday, September 13th (6:00-8:00pm) through October 5th. You are invited to attend the opening of her show, named "Expansion. How a Space Alters the Creative Process." Her bio can be found in last week's issue of ellicottvilleNOW. (Editor's note: Last week's article gave the incorrect date for the opening of Theresa's show. The correct date is confirmed for Friday, September 13th.)

From October 12th through November 9th (mark your calendars) three artists will be sharing a display of their work. They are Fileve Tlaloc, Eva Potter and Tara Walker. This week, let me introduce you to Fileve Tlaloc and her work. Tlaloc, from Great Valley, holds a day job with Southern Tier West as Project Program Coordinator for Appalachian Regional Commission Area Development grant which helps the Cattaraugus/Allegany region develop economically. An example of that work is a grant for St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Olean to create more office space for counselors, thereby creating more opportunities for access to mental health services in the area.

A multi-generational, creole South African American artist born and raised in NYC, Tlaloc has lived and worked in China, South Africa, and Latin America. Throughout her artistic journey, she has studied photography, painting, and ceramics, enjoying experimenting and engaging in new media. She earned a doctorate in anthropology from Indiana University-Bloomington while continuing to create art. Inspired by a visit to the Wanamaker archive on Native American photographs, she and her partner were inspired to reunite those images with their living descendants at the Tuscarora Nation in the Niagara Falls region. The resulting exhibition, "Stirring the Pot" is a series of 25 photographs (displayed throughout Indiana and NYS) depicting the original image with their descendant(s) in sites of their choosing. In the Olean studio, you will find several pieces of this thought-provoking collection which unpacks race and government policy as related to her family histories.



Moving back to NYS, Tlaloc discovered that "new places force people to redefine and find themselves." Tlaloc has had the privilege of displaying her work in Art Centers across the U.S., the latest of which was at the Burchfield Penney Art Center in Buffalo this past year. She states that she was delighted to learn that three of her works were purchased by Burchfield to rotate in their permanent collection. Kudos!

Tlaloc is delighted to be part of this First National Bank Art Studios and Lobby Gallery project. Said she, "Last week, I visited and worked in the studio 3 times and one time on Sunday (the ambiguous day that can be considered part of either week). The point is though that I am going, I am working, and I am channeling my energy in positive and creative ways."

Aside from the scheduled showings, the studios are open to the public Tuesday 10:00am-4:00pm, Thursday 3:00-7:00pm, and Saturday 10:00am-4:00pm. They are located on the first floor of the First National Bank Building, 108 N. Union St. in Olean, NY. Be sure to visit his delightful addition to the Olean Arts scene!
