

Businesses Team Up to Make a Difference for 125 First Graders





BIKE DONATION DRIVE

Businesses Team Up to Make a Difference for 125 First Grades

An inspiring opportunity is pedaling its way to the Southern Tier! Two wheels on the trails and ready to ride, multiple organizations are coming together to campaign for a bicycle donation drive that benefits first grade children in Chautauqua County. These communities have come together to raise some serious funds with the goal of handing out 125 new and fitted bicycles with helmets to pair. So, let's break down who's involved and how we can all get involved and make this happen.

Let's start with Can'dAid. Founded in 2013, this nonprofit platform provides people-powered programs and resources which aim to promote healthy, active, and creative lives for all. Their campaigns vary by mission and have stretched to some pretty creative events. They've hosted ukulele decorating which are then donated to school music programs, mural beautifications, community clean-up events, building a skateboard to donate, and of course, bicycle drives. They have happily welcomed over 33,000 volunteers who have helped in their mission which has led to 73 million cans being recycled, 20,500 bikes and skateboards being built, and 3,950 instruments being donated. Music, arts, and outdoors have become the organization's focus and I think that's one we can all get behind.

Now of course, we have our local businesses and organizations to recognize which have been collaborating with the success of the current bicycle donation drive. Headed by the Friends of the Chautauqua County Greenways, they have also partnered with the Western New York Mountain Bicycling Association (WNYMBA), Northern Allegheny Mountain Bicycling, and LOUD Performance/LOUD Underground. Together they aim to raise \$35,750 and are hoping for our help to achieve it.


It's with no surprise the benefits bicycling gives to our area's youth. With beautiful trails to explore and enjoy, how can we deny this chance to provide safe equipment to children who, from this event, may very well be receiving their very first bike? On average, children now spend over 7 hours a day on screen time, leaving less time spent learning physical, emotional, and social skills that all come from the adventures outdoors. Six-year-olds missing the thrills of finding their balance for the first time on a bike, cruising over to a friend's house, racing siblings down the block, or even an evening well spent pedaling alongside their family on the trails. These are just some of the few joys your donation can bring to our smallest future bicyclist.

Each organization involved encourages any donation you can make to provide a lifelong experience to these soon-to-be first-grade riders. Even just a few dollars is still one step closer to the goal.

Most excitingly, when the grand total is complete, a school celebration will be held to present all bicycles and helmets to the firstgrade students. This is where local bike shop, LOUD Performance, was happy to offer some added support along the campaign. Coming in, with the help of volunteers, they will assemble, assist, and deliver the brand-new bikes to the special presentation with plenty of cheering to follow. An added bonus to the mix, Jeff Lenosky, professional mountain biker and world trails champion, will also be present to jump in on the celebration. He'll engage in the day's adventure, sharing his skills and stories as a top-tier mountain biker, and eagerly encouraging children to get out and ride!

So, let's make this happen, let's give kids something to be excited about - the experience of youth and being present outdoors on two wheels, a gift of memories to be made, a gift you can be part of giving. This event was created to help promote shop local, buy local, made local, just in time for the holiday season. Although free to the public, businesses pay a minimal registration fee that is then used towards door prizes in the form of WILMA bucks which can be used at any of our participating vendors. All those attending the event receive a reusable shopping bag. Event hours are Saturday 10:00-4:00pm and Sunday 11:00am-3:00pm.

eNOW: Are there other features of the event other than art and craft vendors? **MILLER:** Last year, we added a Job Fair and a small business resource showcase leading up to the weekend, which we will be doing again this year. The Job Fair will be held on Thursday, October 17th from 1:00-4:00pm and the CCEDPT Team's Small Business Resource Event showcasing the resources available to businesses in Cattaraugus County will be held on Friday, October 18th from 9:00-10:30am. Both events will be held in the Corporate Building of the Little Valley Fairgrounds.





eNOW: Can you give us a sneak-peek at what some of the vendors will be offering? **MILLER:** We have over 50 vendors signed up, which are all from Cattaraugus County. Items range from baked goods, to jewelry, to crocheted items, to woodworking and so much more. There is such a wide variety of items that there is sure to be something for everyone attending!

eNOW: Will there be refreshments available on-site?

MILLER: Donuts, coffee and cider are always a draw of this event. We offer South Dayton Super Duper Donuts and Pumpkinville Cider free of charge to all attendees, as well as coffee. The Pig-Out Place will also be selling items such as pulled pork, hot dogs, burgers, nachos and more. Prices range from \$3.00-\$12.00.

Do something fun and different with them this fall by taking them to Audubon Community Nature Center's First Sunday Story Time. Nature Center doors open at 12:20pm for the 12:30-1:00pm event on Sunday, October 6th before doors open to the public at 1:00pm.

Children's books are powerful tools to connect children to nature and establish a strong foundation for their educational journey. You and that special child can take this journey, going on a literary adventure with animals through habitats and seasons and discovering new things with every page. You can visit the nearly 600-acre nature preserve, check in on the live birds of prey, enjoy the native tree arboretum, gardens, and hike the more than five miles of trails dawn until dusk daily for free.

The three-story Nature Center building houses interactive displays, a collection of live animals including the Hellbender exhibit, and the Blue Heron Gift Shop. Visitors are welcome Mondays through Saturdays, 10:00am-4:30pm, and Sundays, 1:00-4:30pm. Nature Center members and SNAP/EBT cardholders have free building admission daily. Building admission is also free every Sunday for non-Nature Center members.



After graduating, he worked as a maintenance electrician for Lidestri Foods in Rochester before moving back home to work as an electrician for the City of Olean. Tommy's charismatic personality, confidence and willingness to help others are just some of the highlights of what made him a remarkable young man.

STAR BUDS OPENING NEXT WEEK

Ellicottville Native and Entrepreneur Part of New Buffalo Dispensary

Kenmore Avenue in Buffalo is about to get higher with the upcoming unveiling of Star Buds Cannabis Dispensary. Part of the Star Buds network of dispensaries spanning across five other states, the Buffalo store will be the first in New York upon its licensing and final inspection.

Offering a wide variety of cannabis products and accessories, many of which are from locally sourced and female-owned businesses, Star Buds aims to open its doors on October 10, 2024 upon final approval. A grand opening celebration will be scheduled for a later date.

Co-owners Nick Pitillo and Ed Gurbacki, from the fan-favorite Italian restaurants Osteria 166 in Buffalo and Ellicottville's own Villaggio, are the licensees and masterminds behind the launch. ellicottvilleNOW caught up with Pitillo, an Ellicottville native, to discuss what's on the menu.

"It's kind of ironic - I have been advocating for cannabis virtually my entire life," he said in a phone interview. "I feel very strongly about its medicinal benefits, pain reduction, things of that nature - it's not the cannabis of old, if you will - you know, the stigma that's behind it - it has clearly been something that's been stigmatized and campaigned against for many of the wrong reasons, frankly."

Twenty-three years ago, the now-entrepreneur had a brief encounter with the law outside of an Allman Brothers concert in New York City that landed him in handcuffs. That incident would later be the foundation of a new business venture, as he decided to dive into a topic that he was passionate about.

"Once I realized that I was eligible [to open a dispensary], then it became, why wouldn't I want to be involved in something that I'm passionate about?"

Three years in the making, Buffalo's own Star Buds is one step closer to becoming a reality. "We have to provide one last series of documentation for the Office of Cannabis Management, then we will have a virtual walk-through with the inspector - at that point, we're expecting to get the final licensing to be able to receive product."

The 1,600-square-foot store will entail about 800-900 square feet of retail space. Products will range the gamut of fine cannabis offerings and accessories, from various flower strains, to edibles, topicals, oils and waxes, and even vapes and cartridges, according to its opening press release.

"We have a bunch of female-based brands that we're using, and one of them in particular is Her Highness; another one would be Jenny," said Pitillo. Additionally, Pitillo said that he is working with Pothead Parent, owned by two parents, one of whom is a veteran. "They're not cannabis products, but they are tremendous accessory products that we will carry as well."

In terms of staff, a job fair was held last month to fill all of the store positions. "I am shocked at the quality of the candidates we got at the job fair... pleasantly surprised, I should say."

Staff training will be an almost daily occurrence according to Pitillo. "Right now, we've got it at four days of training but at the end of the day, training is a journey, not a destination," he said. "We hope to provide as much product and hospitality training as possible between now and the opening; we will have daily pre-shifts, weekly trainings, and ongoing cannabis trainings in perpetuity."

When asked of the similarities to the restaurant industry, Pitillo noted that it's very similar, just with less perishable products. "Product knowledge is imperative to be able to describe and drive a customer to what they want; it's never been ["truer"] than in the cannabis industry - we feel like a lot of people are going to come in that aren't really sure what they want to do, and maybe they haven't tried it in years, or things of that nature, and want to learn about a gummy, or an edible, or what are the different strains, or what are the cannabinoids going to do to me, and we can be able to speak on that intelligibly."

Ellicottville native Kim Pitillo, Nick's sister, will take the helm as general manager, with 25 years of experience in retail. "[It is] perfect timing [for her] to join us in this



We knew Ellicottville would be a great location because of how popular golf is here, and it kinda just went from there," Baker said.

You'd think he was a golf pro after venturing into this new business opportunity, but Baker has only been into the sport for a couple of summers after spending time working on a local course and learning about the game. "I was always into sports growing up. I played three every year of high school football, basketball, and baseball. I went to SUNY Brockport for sports management so I've always been into sports."

Baker is looking forward to what this will mean for the golf community as a whole, past just a cool new spot for the community to hang out at and watch sports. "I think it's going to give everyone the opportunity to play all year long, not just in the spring and summer, so that means the community will get way more practice. Overall, everyone's just going to get better at the game," said Baker.







First National Bank Art Studios & Lobby Gallery Welcomes Tara Walker

EllicottvilleNOW has been sharing with you spotlights about local artists whose works have been chosen to be on display in Olean at the restored First National Bank through the combined efforts of Tri-County Arts Council, New York-based ChaShaMa (it provides free and subsidized space for artists to live, work, and present, partnering with developers and property owners to transform their vacant buildings into centers of creativity with the added benefit of increasing local foot traffic and supporting area businesses) and developers, Savarino Properties. This program provides work and display space for five artists through the end of the year while bringing the work and the artists into the city, offering an unusual opportunity for interaction and a chance to watch them working at their art. It also provides an opportunity for the public to see the newly renovated bank building that Samuel Savarino came in to develop into 22 market-rate apartments and commercial space. The metamorphosis of the building will take your breath away!

Tara Walker, this week's featured artist, could have made the building one of her subjects in its down-trodden days. She says she particularly likes to show in her work the potential of nature to overtake environments like crumbling barns and houses. The bank had not perhaps reached that point, but she would not have known, regardless, since she and her husband came to Olean from Colorado in January 2000 to accept positions as professors at St. Bonaventure University, she as an Assistant Professor of Communications. Timing was not good with the pandemic hitting in March. Isolating for the first year, she finally wandered into the Arts Council, met Sean Huntington, joined, and became involved.

Like many artists, Walker was exposed to art at an early age. Her grandmother was a painter, so like many observant kids, she learned a lot from her and the other artists she was exposed to through that environment. Walker received degrees from the University of Colorado (PhD) and MFA from the School of Art Institute in Chicago. Having spent most of her life around both words and art, her artistic bent first took Walker to writing when she put out the book of poetry and drawings, *EXQUI-SITE DISGUST*, after which she turned to the art of painting ... and got hooked.

Walker's style might be considered eclectic. She says she goes back and forth and loves using unique materials, recycled things. Subjects can be barns, birds, bugs and even pet portraits. Yes, she would be delighted to have you commission her to paint your precious furbaby. On her Facebook page (Tara Walker) you will find a painting called Museum. Here is where you are introduced to her quirkiness



and sense of humor. She uses it to suddenly take the observer on an unexpected deeper dive into what first appears to be light-hearted and "un-serious." Looking much like a grid or a map, the work catches the observer off-guard with things like "wing of stupid feelings," "special collections: wing of personal mythologies," etc. Unlike some abstract art, this piece gives you hints and clues and before you know it, you may have spent twenty minutes perusing a piece you might have otherwise given a cursory glance. Walker likes the abstract because it "says things that words cannot say." She calls it "wordless wonder."

When asked about her experience of shared space at the Bank facility, Walker admitted, "I've always been careful when I first show my work to people. This experience has been good for me. It's all about learning – to be a bit more public and less defensive. It has helped me to be much more comfortable. We learn from each other and I'm enjoying the serendipity of things."

Opening Friday, November 15th (mark your calendars) three artists including Tara Walker, Eve Potter and Fileve Tialoc will be sharing a display of their work. This opening will coincide with the Tri-County Arts Council Small Works Show at the Peg Bothner Gallery inside TCAC.

Aside from the scheduled showings, the studios are open to the public Tuesday 10:00am-4:00pm, Thursday 3:00-7:00pm, and Saturday 10:00am-4:00pm. They are located on the first floor of the First National Bank Building, 108 N. Union Street in Olen, NY. Be sure to visit this delightful addition to the Olean Arts scene.

RIDING BICYCLES WITH POPS

Localy Known Artist and Outdoor Enthusiast Illustrates Children's Book

Known fondly as "the sticker guy," Springville artist and graphic designer Greg Culver can now add "children's book illustrator" to his list of artistic achievements! *Riding Bicycles with Pops* by Joaunna Bixby shares the story of Lenny and Ezra, who love when their grandpa ("Pops") comes to visit because they get to enjoy their favorite activity, bike riding, with him. The book is close to Culver's heart, as he was an avid mountain biker before kidney cancer affected his ability to ride.

"He has been a mountain biker for a number of years," said Jen Culver, Greg's wife. "His friend, Scott Bixby, has been one of his partners in crime, and his wife, Joaunna, decided to write a book about her grandchildren riding bikes with their grandpa. She recognized Greg as an illustrator, and so she asked him to do the pictures for the book." The two collaborated on the project: Greg drew all the illustrations and Joaunna Bixby worked with Dorrance Publishing Co. to publish it. Available on Amazon, *Riding Bicycles with Pops* is perfect for young children and is available in hardcover, paperback, and e-book form.

While book illustrations are a new venture for Culver, he's hardly new to the art world. He attended college at the Art Institute of Pittsburgh and has been a graphic designer for most of his career. "He's just very, very naturally talented artistically," said Jen. "He's kind of got a cartoonish style, but he's most known for his stickers. In fact, they call him 'the sticker guy'!" Indeed, Culver's Hot Wing Designs vinyl stickers can be seen all over the area. Whether one is a Buffalo Bills fan, a music enthusiast, a cancer fighter, or a hot wing lover, Culver has a sticker design that's absolutely perfect, whatever the occasion. In fact, making, designing ,and creating stickers was part of the way Culver reinvented his career in the wake of his cancer diagnosis and the Covid-19 pandemic.



Jen explained that Greg was diagnosed with kidney cancer on September 19, 2019, two days after they were married. "They took his kidney out with the hopes that they had gotten everything," she explained. "About six months later, in February, he started having balance issues and headaches, and we went to the doctor, and they found his first brain tumor, the first of many, many, many. He had gamma knife surgery eight times and countless MRIs and scans."

Shortly after the Covid-19 lockdown in spring of 2020, Culver was let go from his job and continued to battle cancer. During this time, he began drawing and creating the cartoon characters and caricatures that became a sticker business with a national presence. Culver, an avid outdoor enthusiast who loves snowboarding and mountain biking, adapted so that he could enjoy his passions in whatever way he could amid the cancer treatments. Culver said, "I traded in my good mountain bike for a motor-assisted bicycle, so I can cruise the roads and all of that. It was nice because I could still get out and get around!"

Culver's cancer has since spread to his lymph nodes and his bones, and he is now home enjoying his family and his many visitors. "He's been doing really well," said Jen. "He has fought a very strong fight, but he wishes to stay home here where his family is... He has good moments and hard moments, so we just roll with what we have."

Culver's courageous fight is an inspiration to all who know him, including his wife. "He's my best friend and my rock," she said. The couple has been together for most of their lives; in fact, they dated on and off since the age of 13, when they met roller skating. Though life took them in different directions for a time, they've been together for the past 16 years and share a daughter, Piper Grace, who is currently in college and makes frequent trips home to spend time with her dad.

Culver's family is now managing his website, www.gregculver.com, which houses all three of his businesses: Hot Wing Designs, Buffalo League Hats, and Greg Culver Designs. Stickers and hats are available for purchase, and Culver's extensive graphic design portfolio can be viewed there.

Core Performance: Strength Training vs. Hypertrophy Training

When it comes to working out, most folks often have varying goals that go far beyond just aesthetics or strength. It's about feeling good, taking care of your mental health and getting stronger along the way. Understanding the many different methods of training that exist can be confusing to beginners and strength training veterans alike, but it's essential for building a routine that's aligned with your personal goals.

Strength training, for example is all about increasing the amount of force your muscles can move (How much you can lift), while **hypertrophy** focuses on growing the physical size of your muscle. Strength training helps build functional strength for everyday activities like lifting your kids/grandkids in and out of car seats, climbing stairs and carrying groceries.

However, when my clients tell me they want to "look more toned," what they really mean is that they would like to have enough lean mass so that their muscles appear more defined, regardless of whether they need to lose body fat. That's where hypertrophy - derived from the Greek words "hyper" meaning "excessive" and "trophy" meaning "growth" comes in. Growing your muscles through hypertrophy training can help create that sculpted look, whether or not fat loss is part of your goal.

While both strength training and hypertrophy training involve lifting weights, the main difference is the primary goal: strength training focuses on maximizing the amount of weight you lift, while hypertrophy training focuses on increasing muscle size by prioritizing higher volume with moderate weights and repetitions. Strength training often has longer rest periods between sets to recover for heavier lifts, while hypertrophy training may have shorter rest periods to maintain muscle tension. Incorporating both styles of training in your routine is a great way to maintain lean muscle mass and manage your body fat for overall health. And, as we get older, we naturally lose more muscle mass.

Whether you're after stronger muscles or more defined one, knowing the difference between strength training vs. hypertrophy can help you tailor your workouts to reach your goals.

TIPS FOR CHOOSING YOUR COSTUME

One of the most important things you'll want to think about is chafing - think about how your costume is going to wear over 13 miles. You should also not wear any items that may be a danger to your or other runners. Please don't wear items that will make you feel colder. Metal pieces such as bracelets and earrings may feel especially cold at freezing temperatures. You are allowed to have hats, masks, and carried items, but your race number bib must be placed on the front of your costume and be worn at all times.

Shoes are the most important part of running gear - particularly when running a half marathon! Different types of shoes are designed to fit different types of feet and running styles. Visit your local running shoe specialty store for proper fitting. Remember, most often your running shoes will be a half size to a full size larger than your other shoes.

Last but not least, please remember it can be cold at the end of October! Try to avoid cotton fabrics, including cotton socks. Layering in Polyester-based materials is an excellent idea as this allows your body to sweat without your clothes retaining moisture. There are several companies that make specialty socks for running. These socks can help with blister prevention. You will want to dress for weather about 10 degrees warmer than actual temperature when you start the race, because you're body will warm up while running. Dress appropriately so you can have fun!

So, if you love running, wearing costumes, meeting other people, and having a great time, the EVL Half is for you! Grab your friends, your family, or just yourself and get ready to run! This will be one of the most fun half marathons you will ever participate in. Visit evlhalf.com to register now!


