# **DISCUSSION QUESTIONS**

- Look carefully at the cover illustration of the book. What clues can you find about the main character, Beulah, in the illustration?
- Compare the reasons that cause Beulah and her parents to feel frustrated at the beginning of the story.
- How does Beulah's mother expect her to behave when the family sits on the porch at the end of the day?
- What is hyperphantasia and how does it help Beulah when she wants other people to understand her "hunches?"
- Beulah is fascinated by how things work. Give an example of how Beulah investigates how something in her home works.
- How does Beulah's experience in school differ from what she really wants to learn?
- Beulah has synesthesia which she calls "color-hearing." How does synesthesia affect the way Beulah experiences the world?
- \* What does Beulah notice about the women who walk with their parasols past her porch in the evenings? What does Beulah do with her observation?
- Beulah's hunches are unique, and she doesn't want another inventor to copy her inventions. What does Beulah have to do to protect her one-of-kind inventions?
- Not everyone believes in Beulah and her parasol invention. How does Beulah respond when manufacturers turn her away and refuse to help her make the parasol?
- How does Beulah know that her parasol invention is a success with women?
- After Beulah's success with her parasol, she starts two manufacturing companies to make her inventions. What two inventions does she create that kids would love?
- \* Why does the patent office call Beulah "Lady Edison?"
- Beulah has special talents and a unique way of seeing the world around her. What lessons can someone learn from the way that Beulah lives her life?

# **ACTIVITIES FOR STUDENTS**

### **COLOR-HEARING**

Beulah saw a color for each note when she listened to music. This phenomenon is called synesthesia. Gather crayons, colored pencils, markers, and three sheets of white paper to experiment with what Beulah calls "color-hearing." Label your art paper with three different types of music: jazz, classical, and rock. Listen to each type of music and imagine what colors would represent each musical selection. Share and compare your finished color-hearing drawings with a partner.

### **INTERVIEWING BEULAH**

Beulah invited reporters from women's magazines and scientific journals to her hotel suite for interviews. Pretend that you are a reporter from a magazine or journal that has been invited to interview Beulah. What questions would you ask of her? Imagine her responses to your questions based on the information in the story. Write an article about Beulah and her accomplishments that has a headline, a strong beginning, and imagined quotes from Beulah.

### **BUY THIS!**

Beulah's first invention became a success in part because of the display of her parasols in department store windows. Advertising helps to sell items to people. Pick one of Beulah's inventions and create an advertisement that would appear in a magazine or newspaper for the invention. Think of a slogan and an illustration that would make people want to buy the invention you chose.

### LET BEULAH SOLVE IT!

If Beulah were still living and working today, what current problems would she try to solve with her inventions? In your opinion, what would Beulah invent to help people in our modern world? Write an opinion piece that states which problem you feel is most important for Beulah to address. Give reasons and examples to support your opinion.


