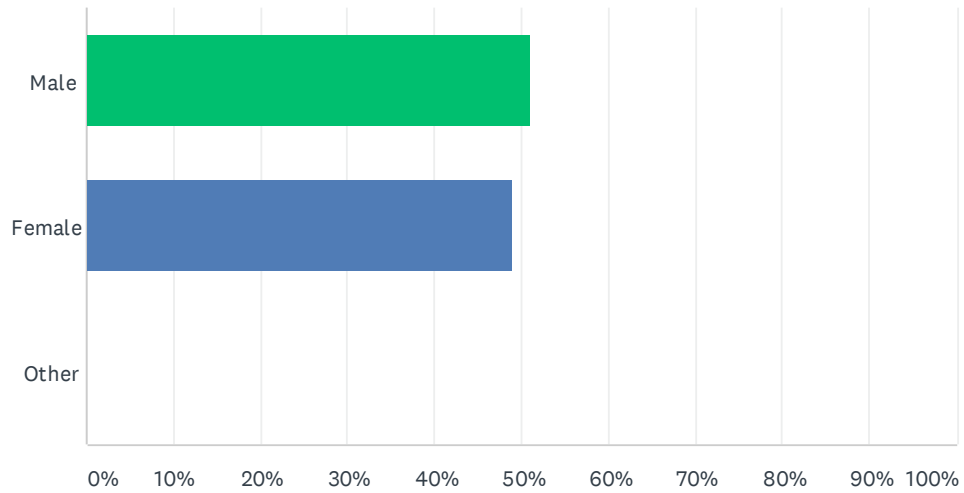

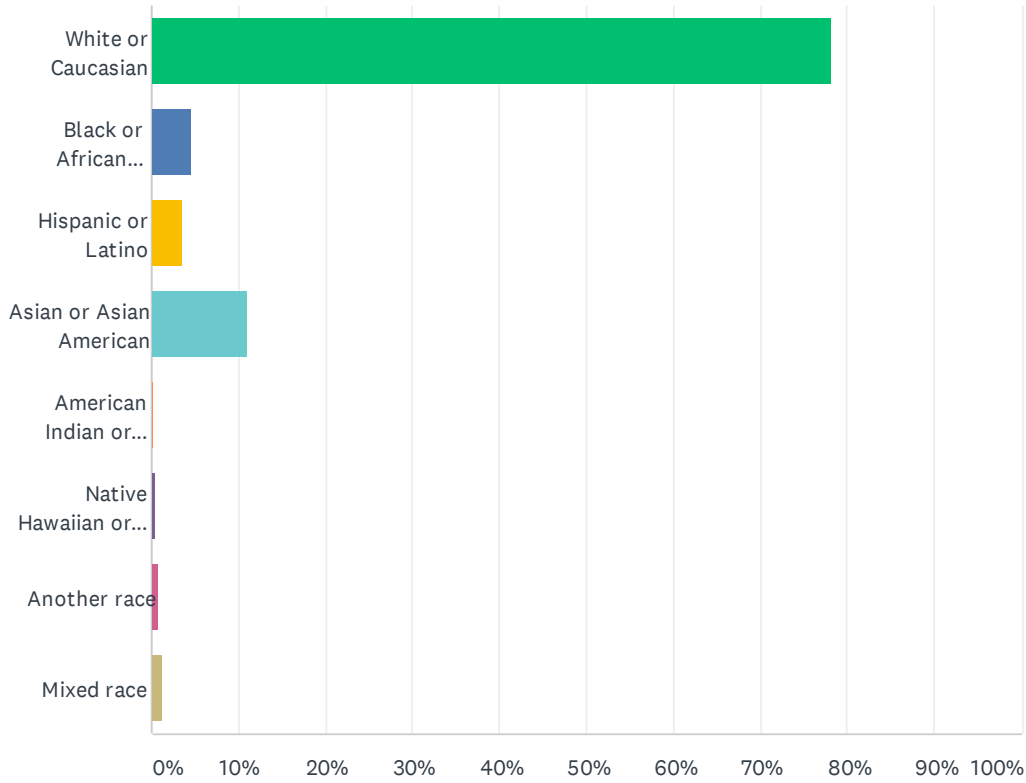

### Q3 Select the race with which you most identify

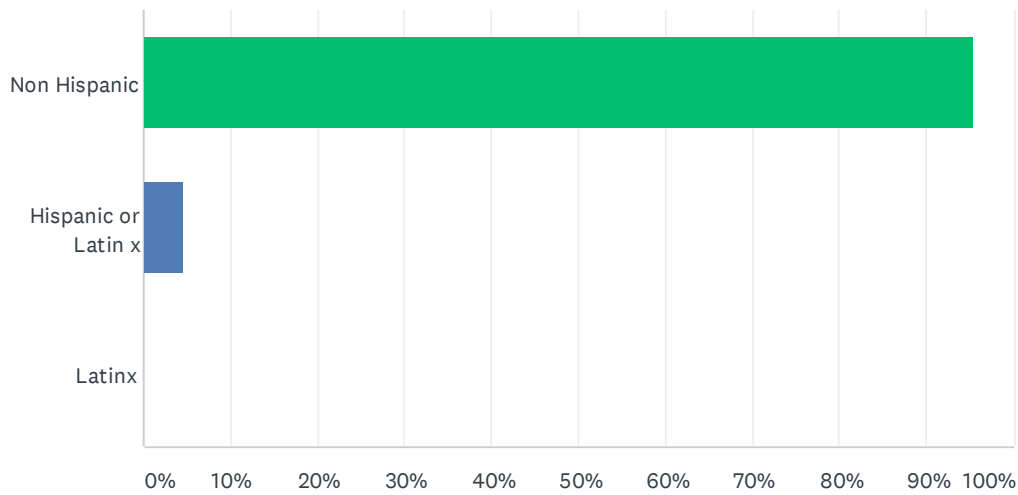

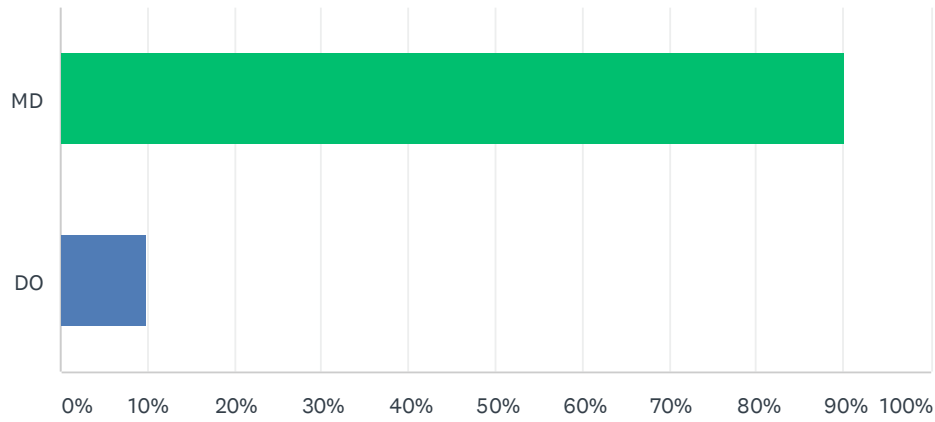

## Q6 What medical degree do you have?

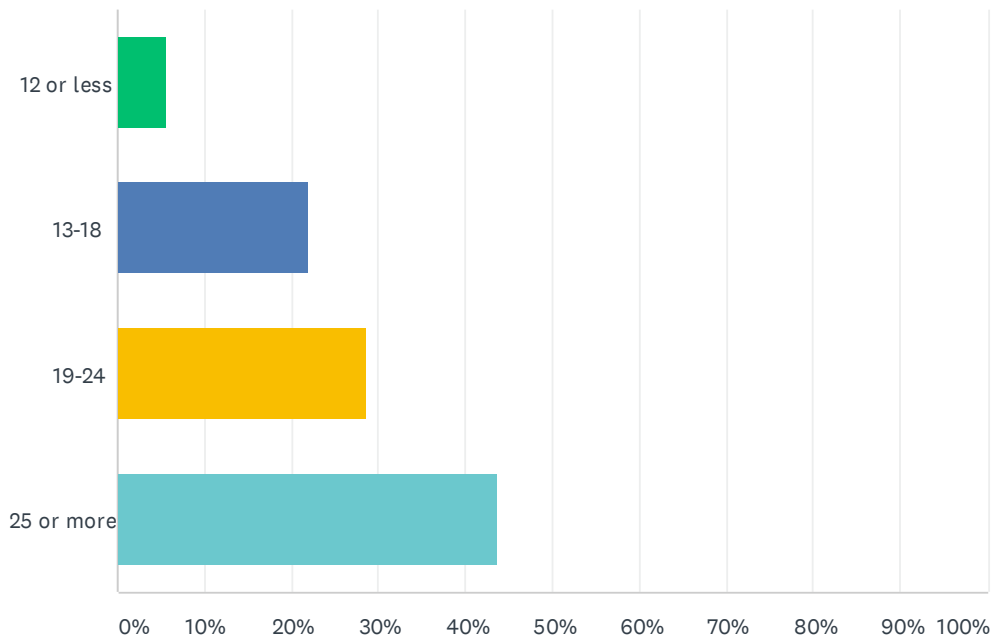

## Q7 Size of residency are you teaching in

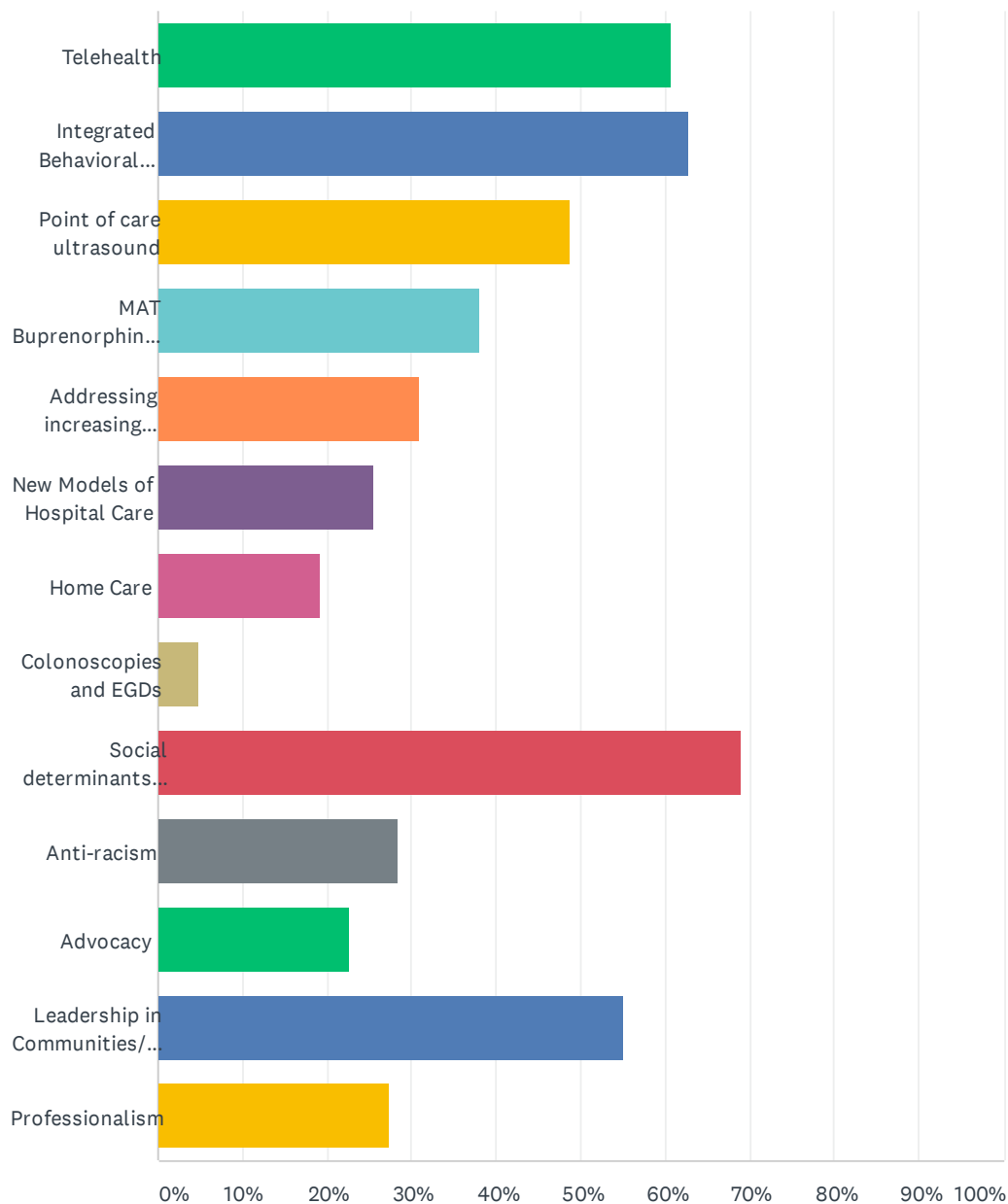

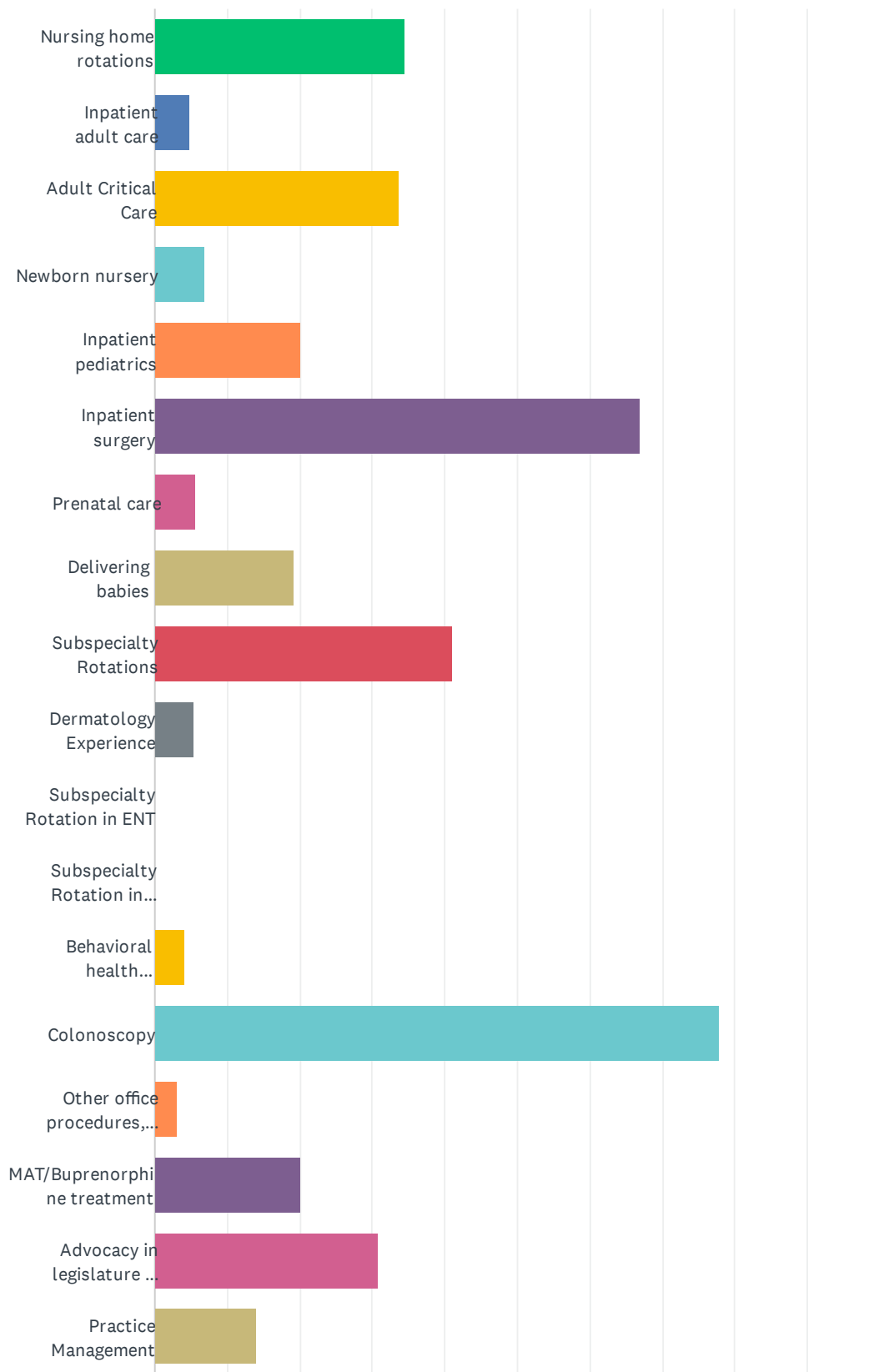

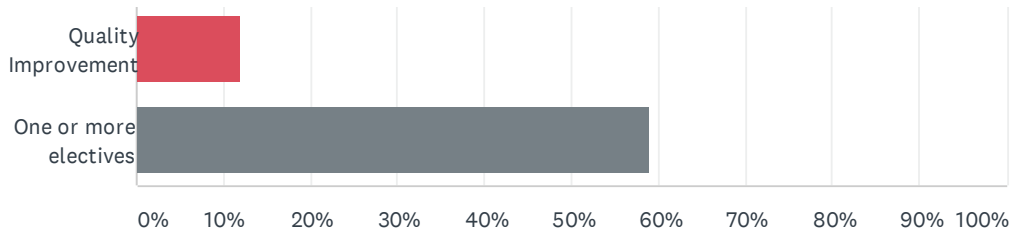
### Q9 To make time for new curricula, what should all family medicine in the US residencies give up? Please choose five of the below.

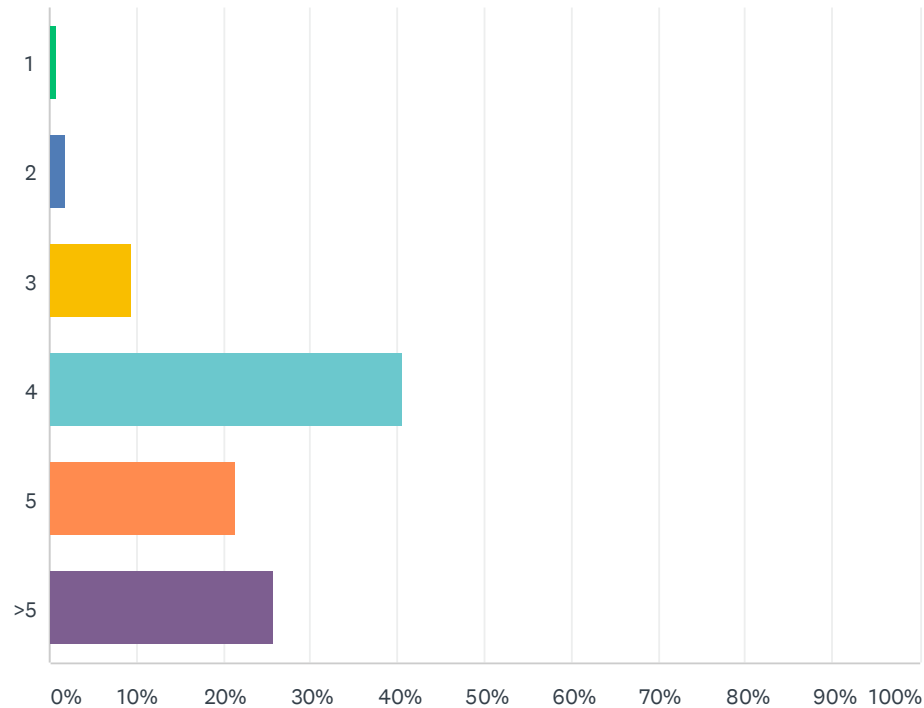

### Q10 Since July, how many hours of didactic sessions are offered in a typical week in your residency? (choose the most appropriate number of hours)

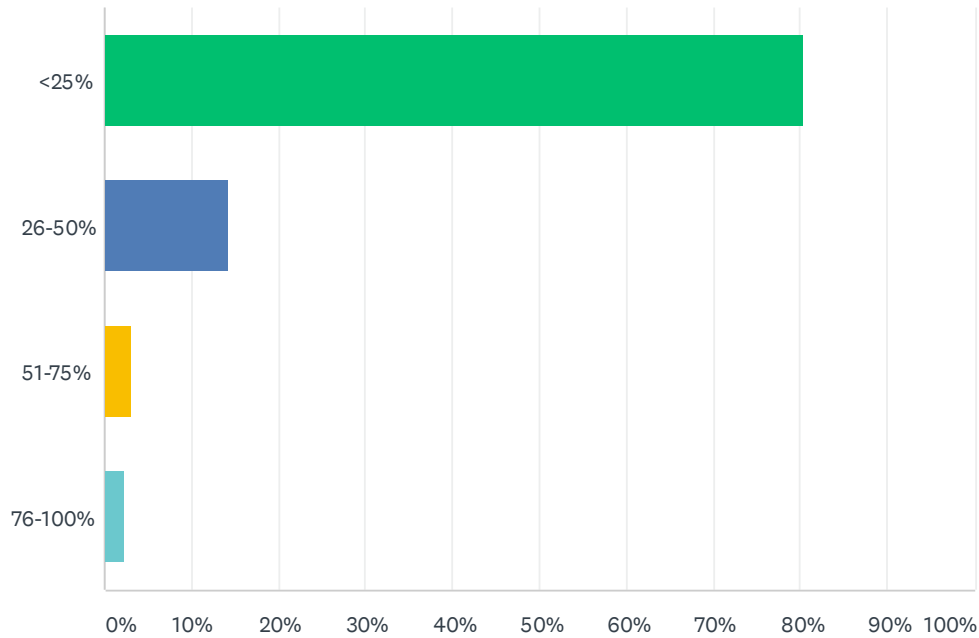

Q11 We are interested in how didactic sessions are taught. Considering the didactic sessions in your residency since July, approximately how often was pre-reading or preparation expected?

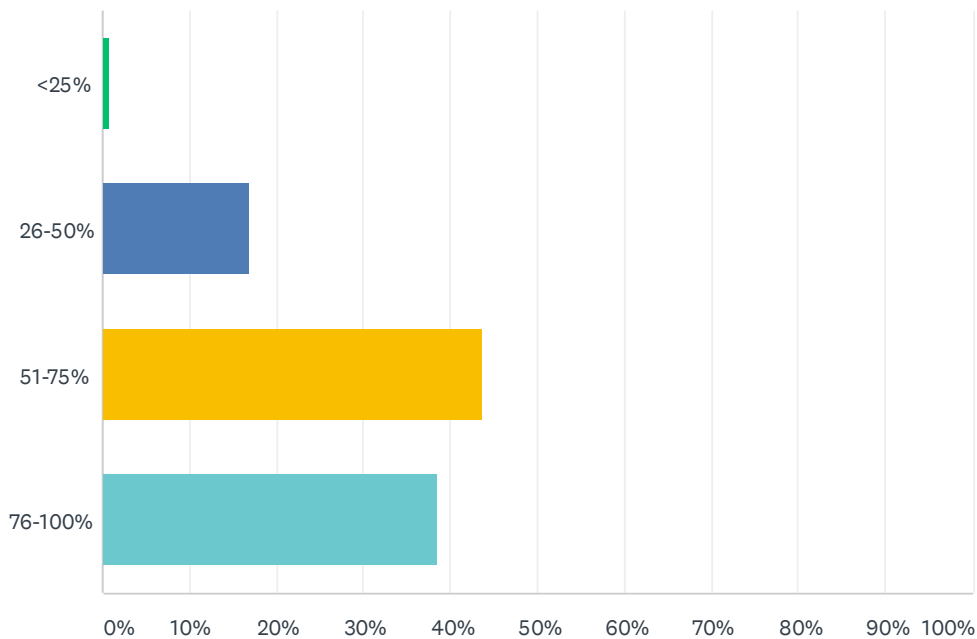

### Q12 Considering all scheduled didactic sessions since July, approximately what percentage were residents actually able to attend?

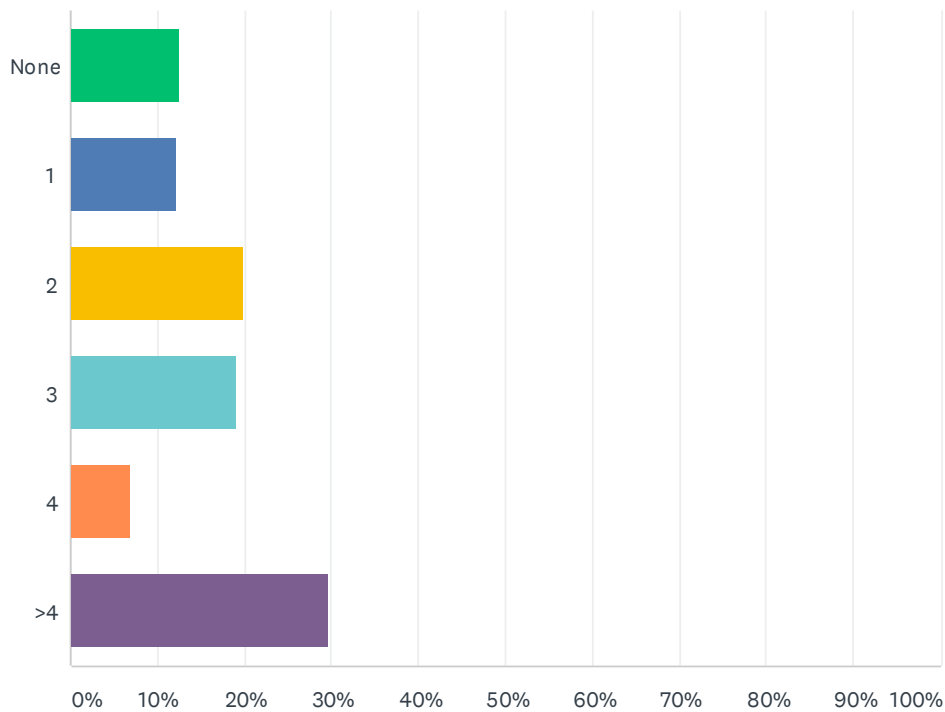

### Q13 In the last three months, how often have you personally taught didactic sessions to medical students or residents?

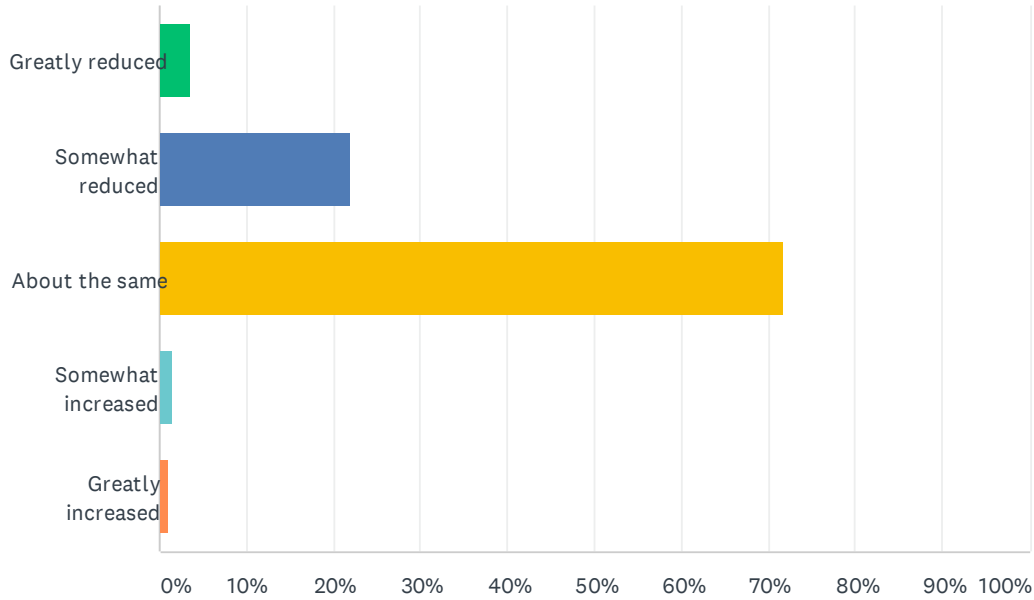

### Q14 What has been the impact of the COVID pandemic on the total number of scheduled didactic sessions in your residency since July (including virtual)?

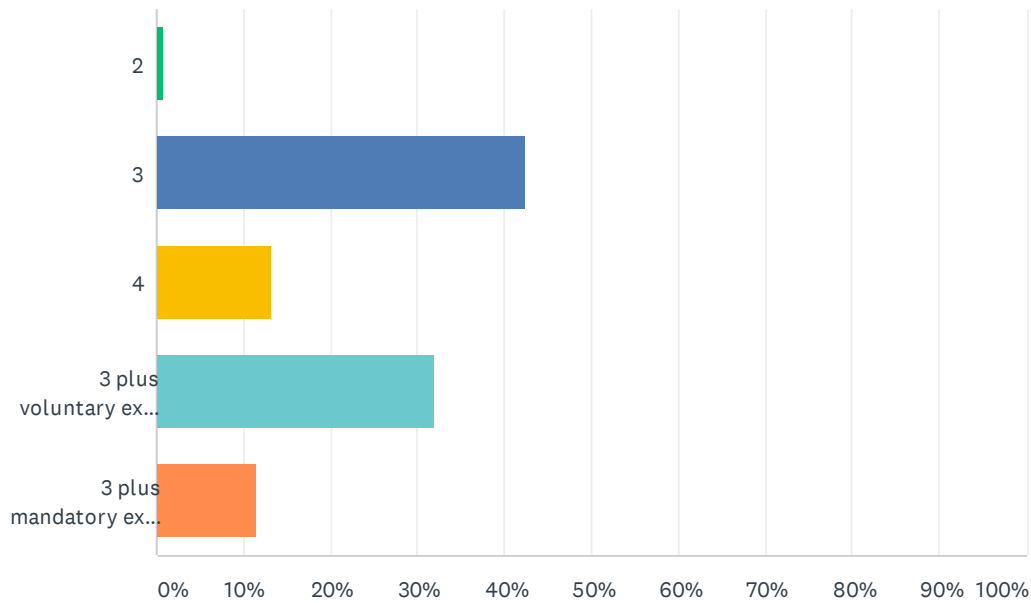

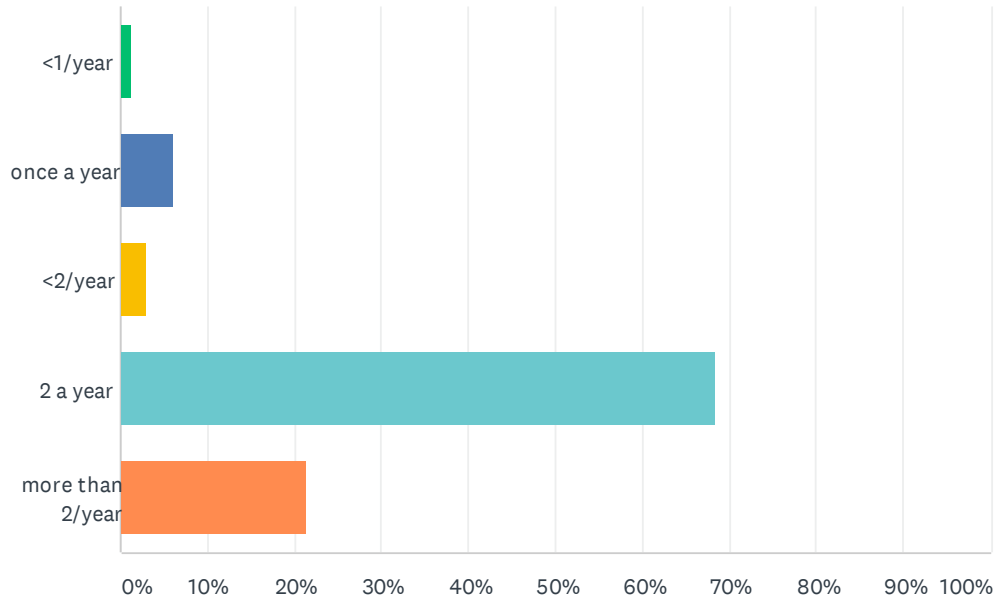

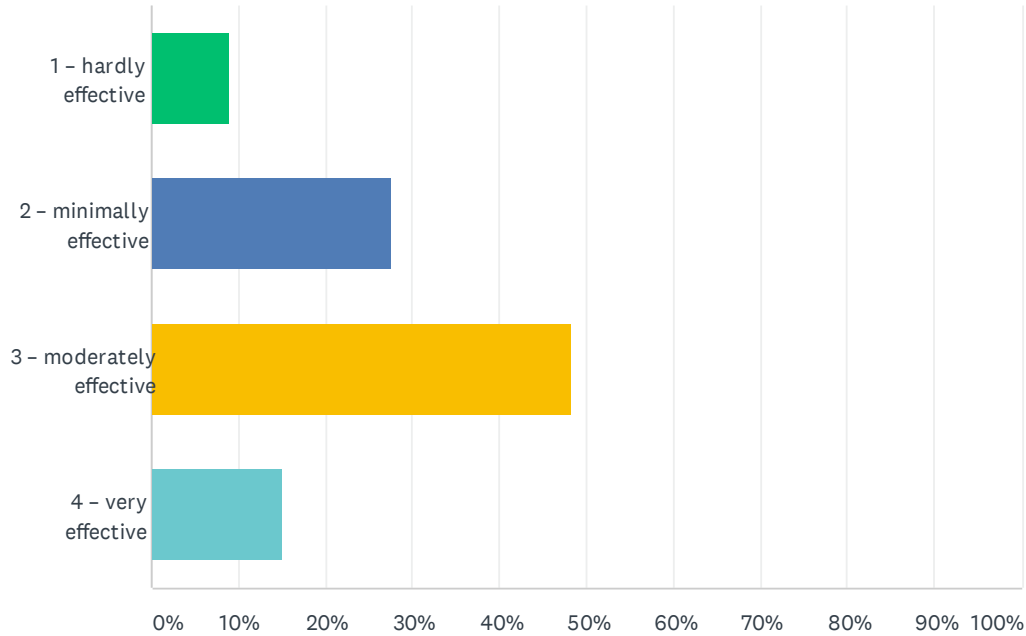

### Q17 In your opinion, in the last year, how effective overall has review of resident clinical performance by the CCC been for the development of the resident?

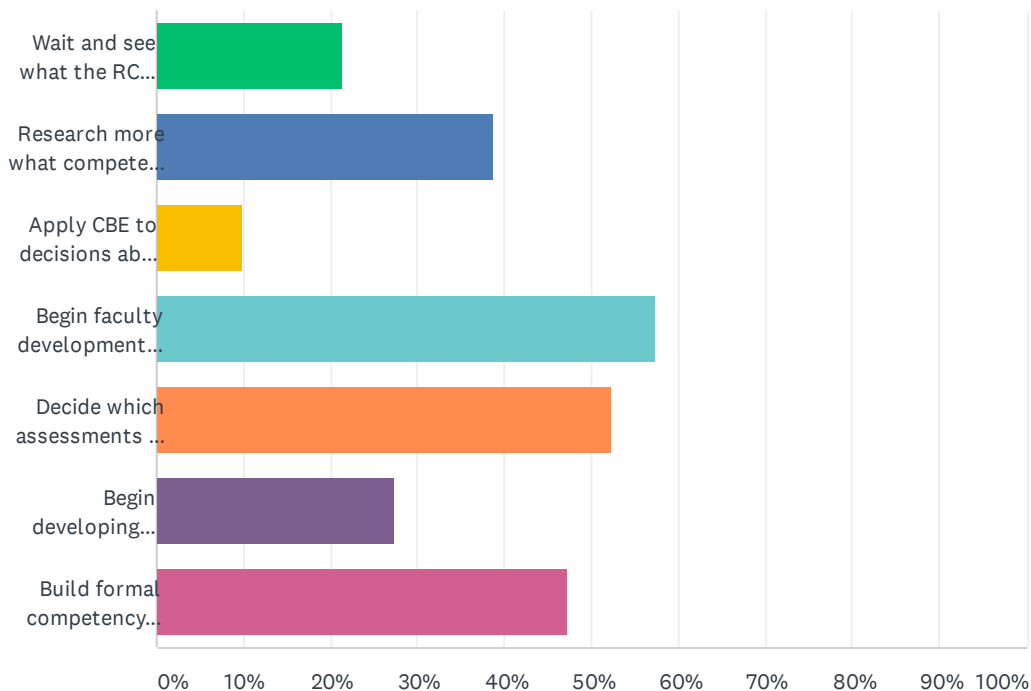

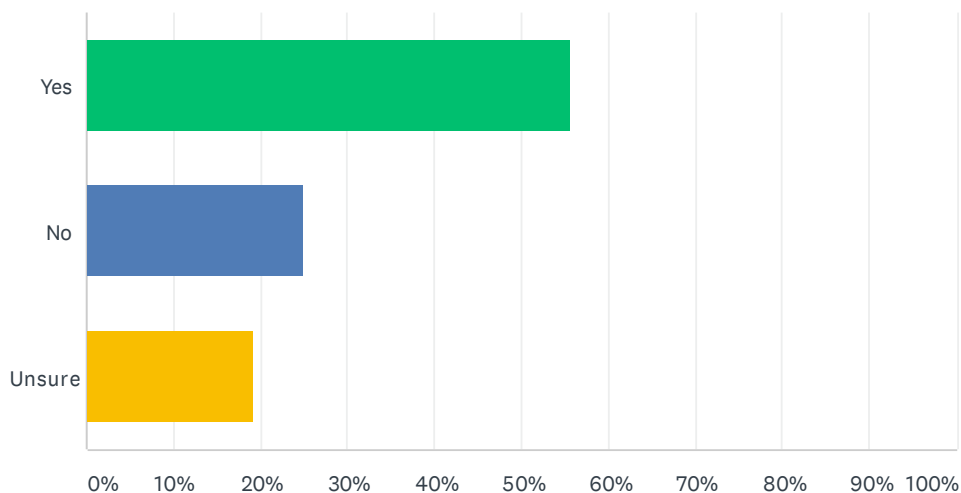

## Q19 Are residents informed each year about the size of their patient panel?

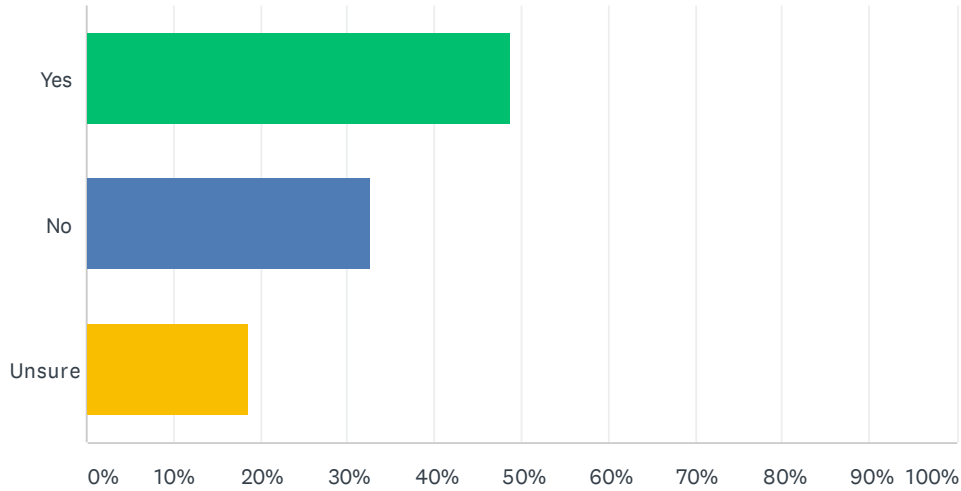

### Q20 Are residents routinely given a formal opportunity to learn about their panel of patients, in terms of demographics, clinical conditions and/or access to care and/or quality of care?

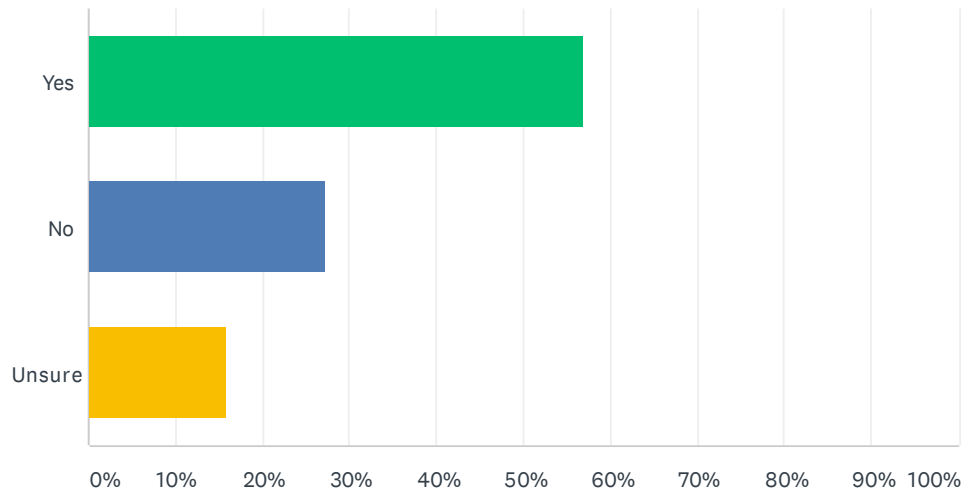

## Q21 Do residents routinely receive individual feedback on access to care and/or quality of care for their panel of patients?

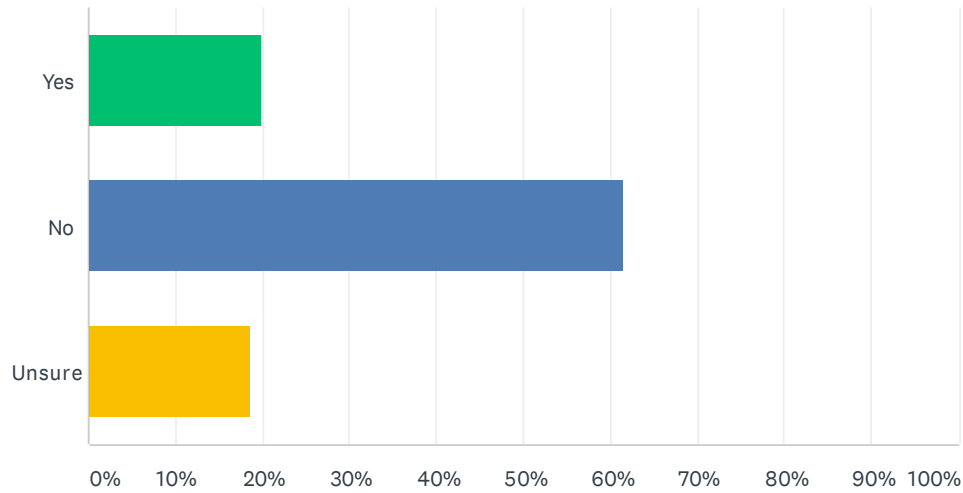

### Q22 Do residents routine review data on disparities of care for race, ethnicity, rurality or other variables for their patientsnd/or for the practice as a whole?

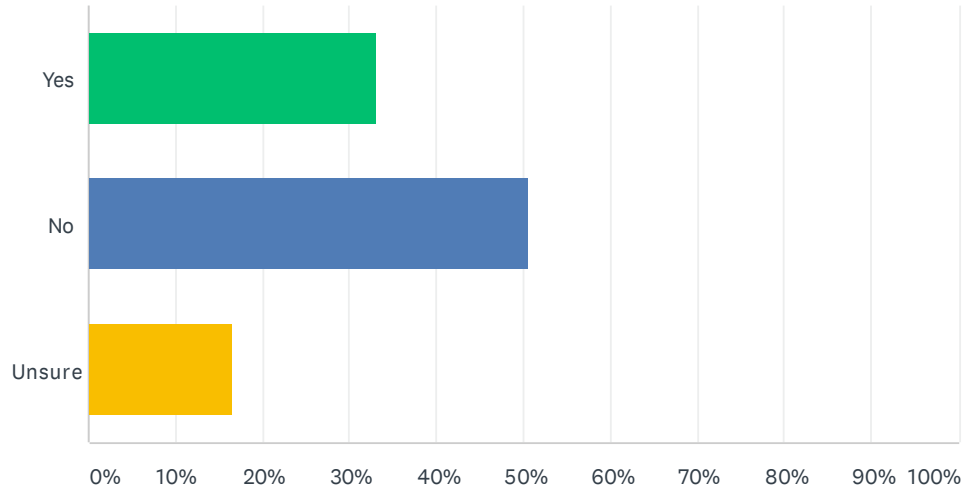

## Q23 Does your residency have a Patient Advisory Committee or similar group?

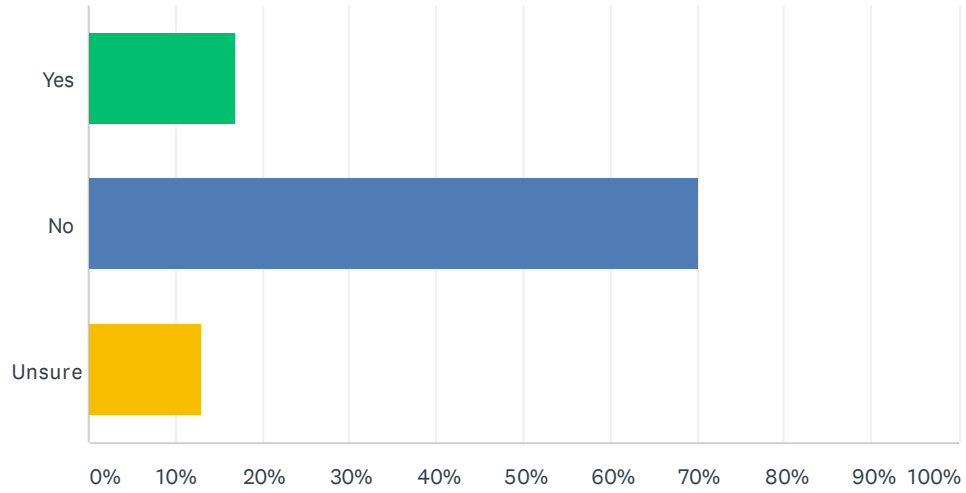

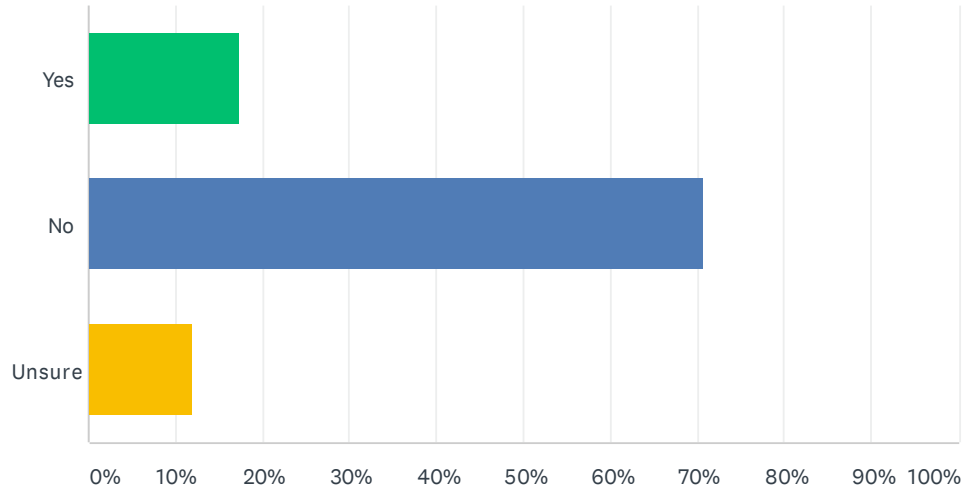

## Q25 Do residents routinely receive feedback about the overall cost/utilization of care for their panels of patients?

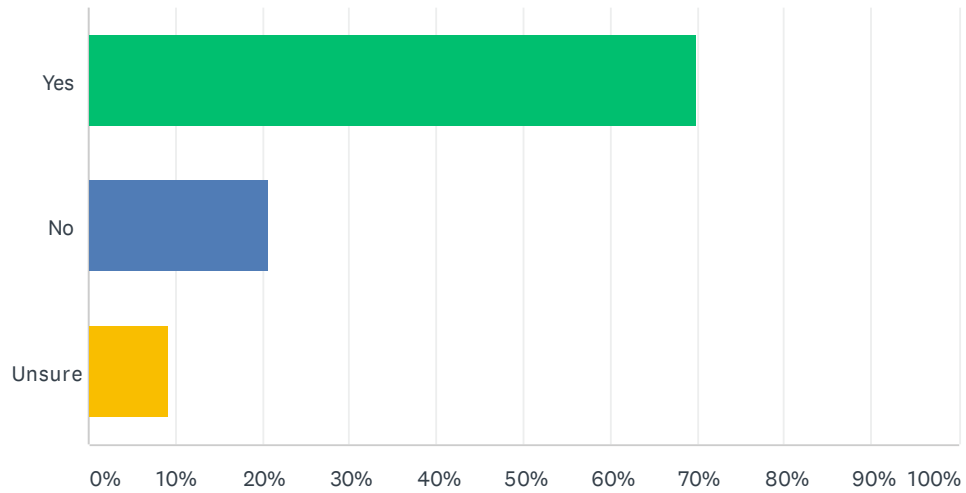

## Q26 Does your residency provide formal education in professionalism?

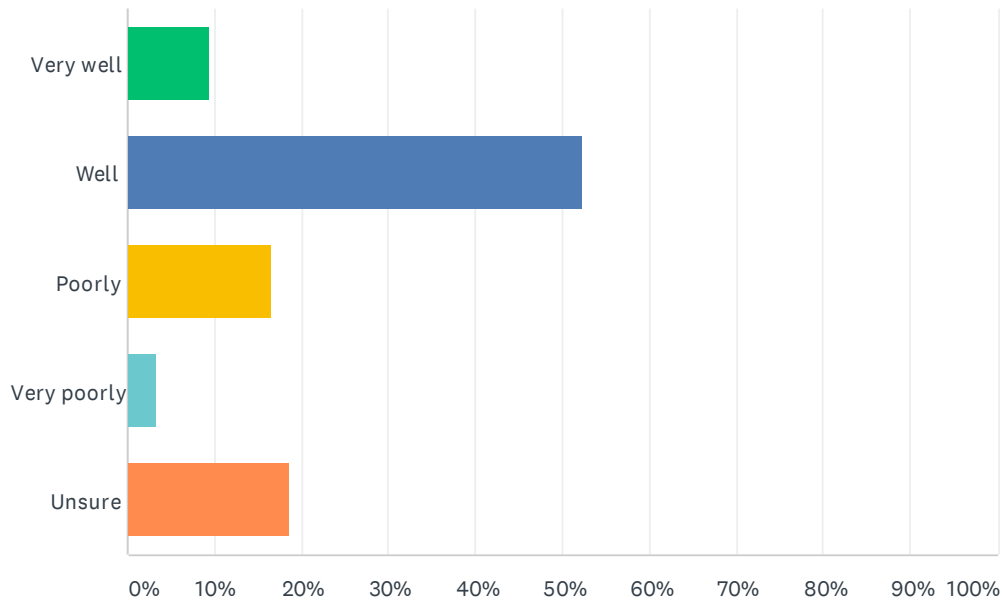

## Q27 Overall, how well has your residency provided education in professionalism?

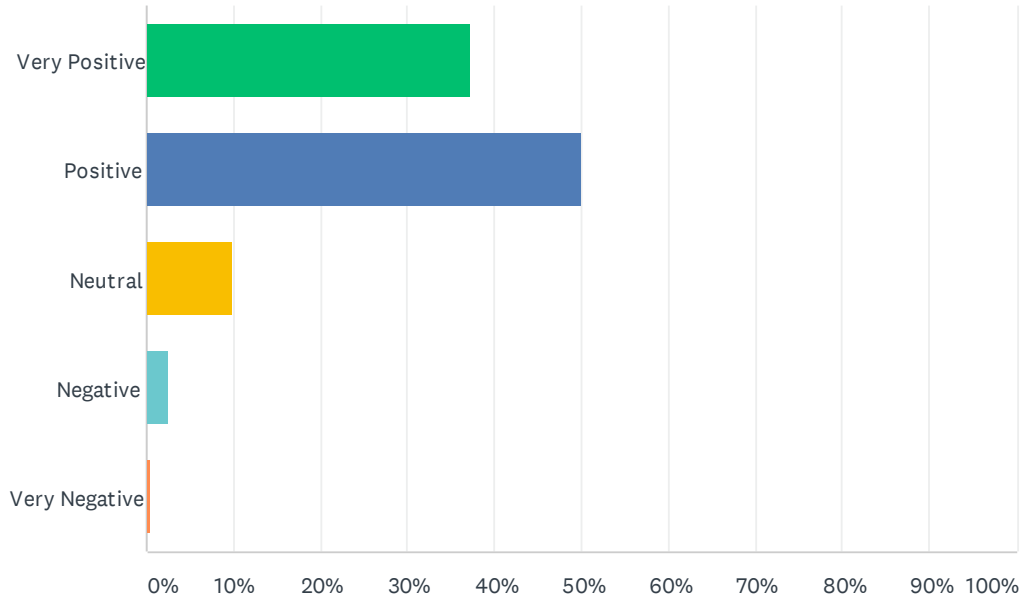

## Q28 Overall, how would you characterize the residency faculty's role-modeling of professionalism?

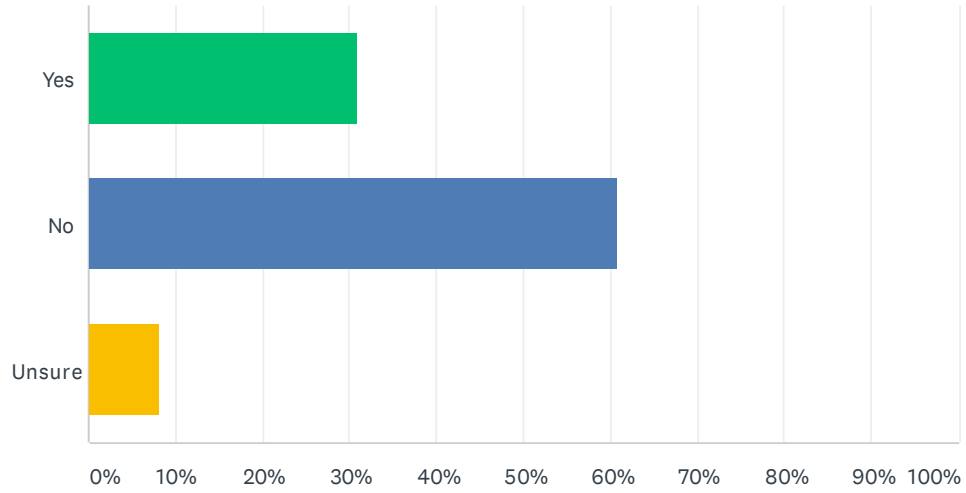

## Q29 Does your residency have formal education in legislative or other advocacy

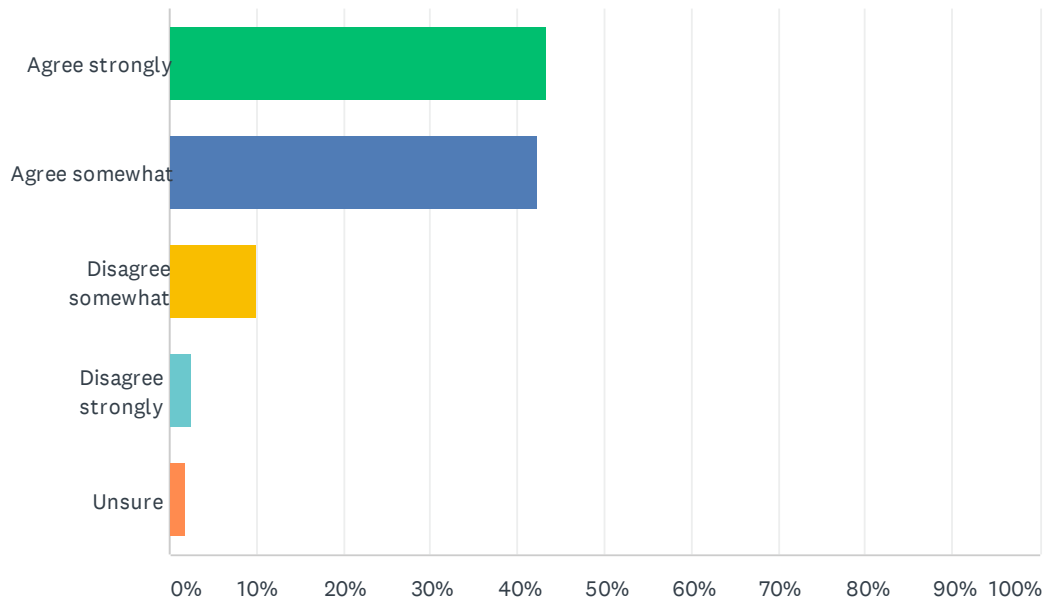

### Q30 My practice/health system makes it easy for me to be a professional (Choose best answer)

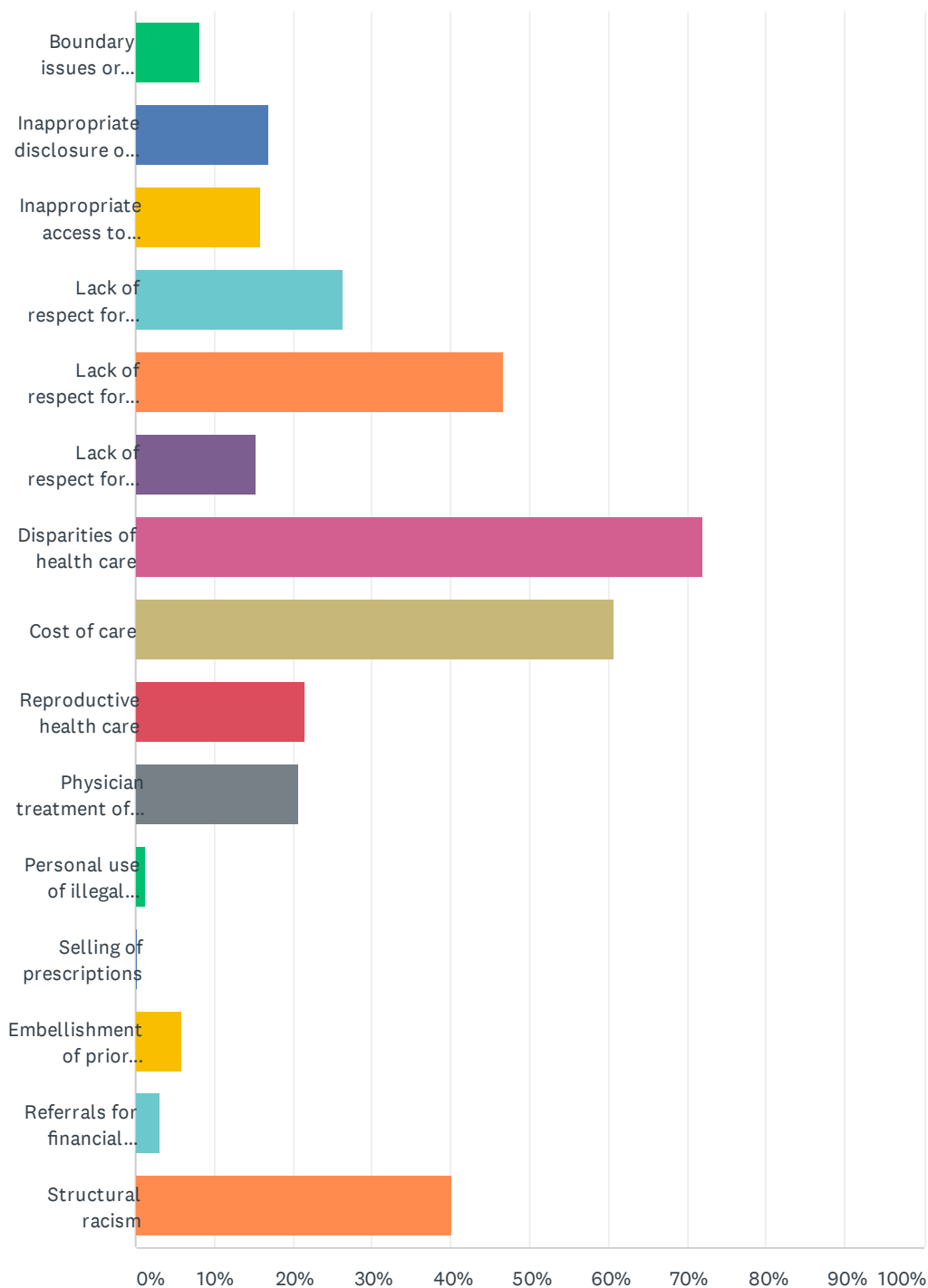

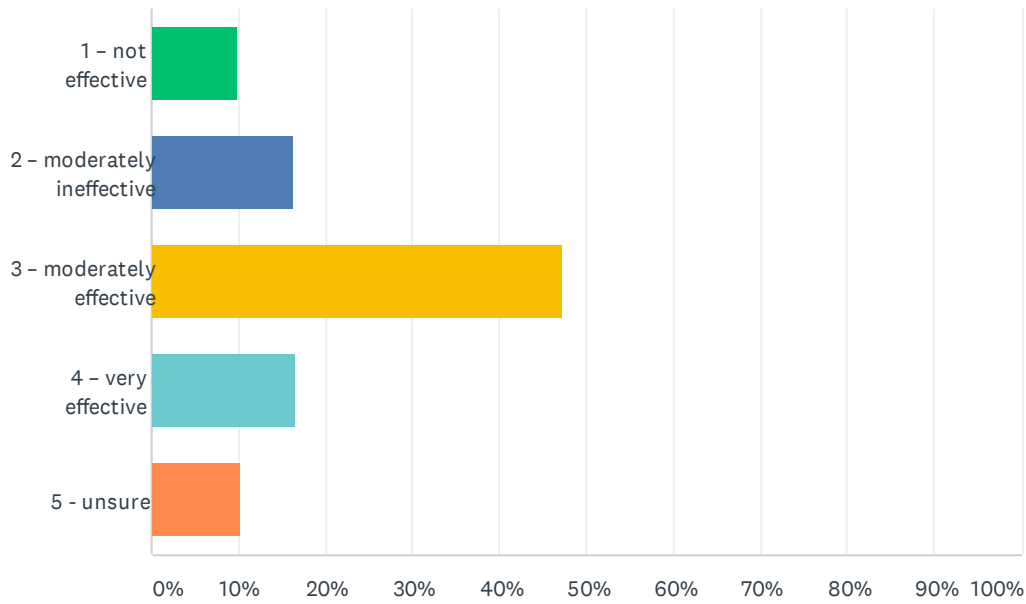

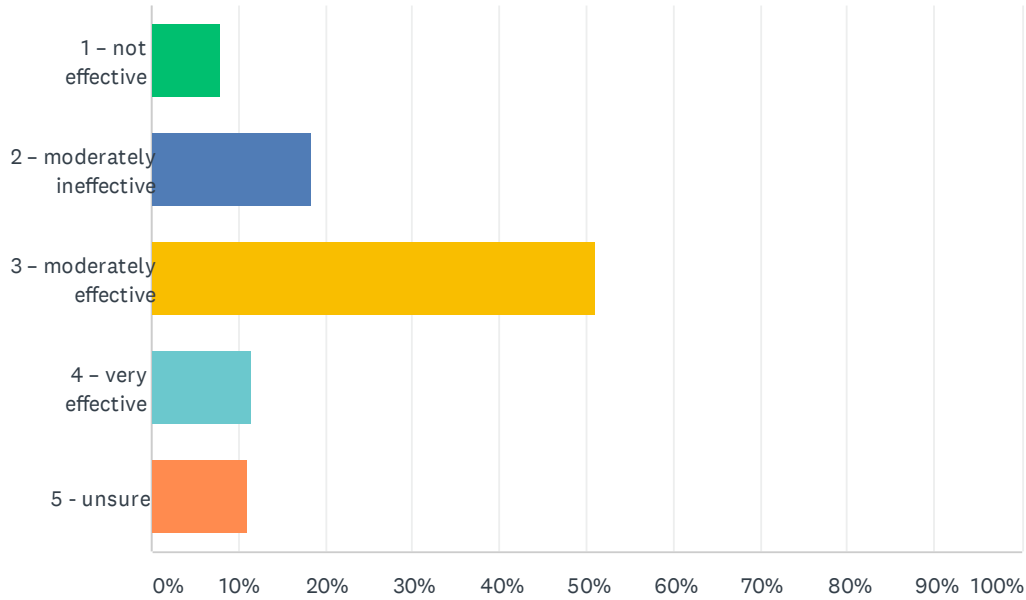

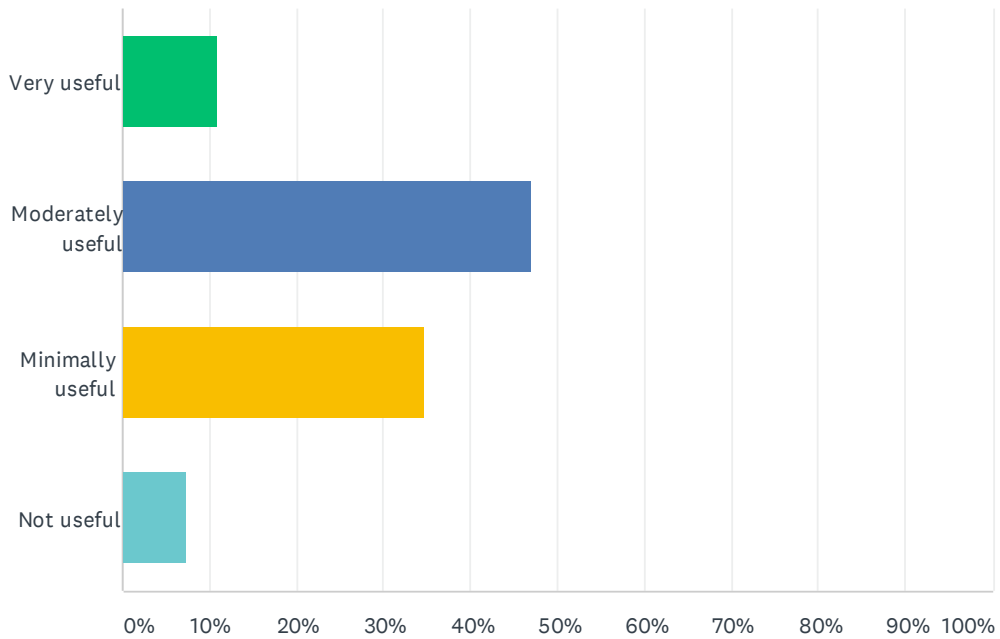

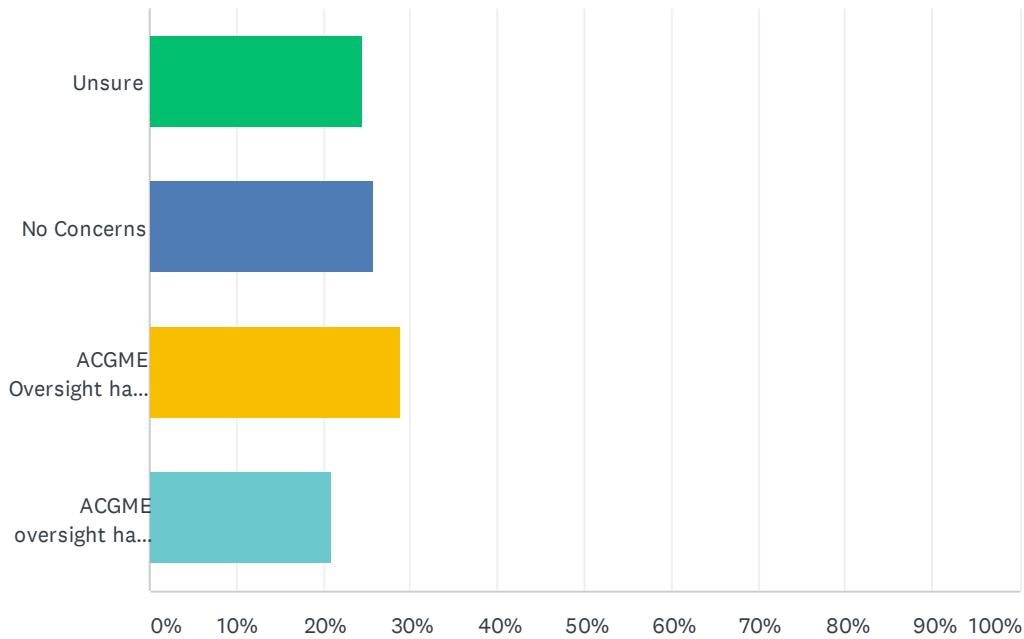

### Q35 Which of the following best describes your assessment of the effectiveness of ACGME oversight of your hospital/sponsoring institution?

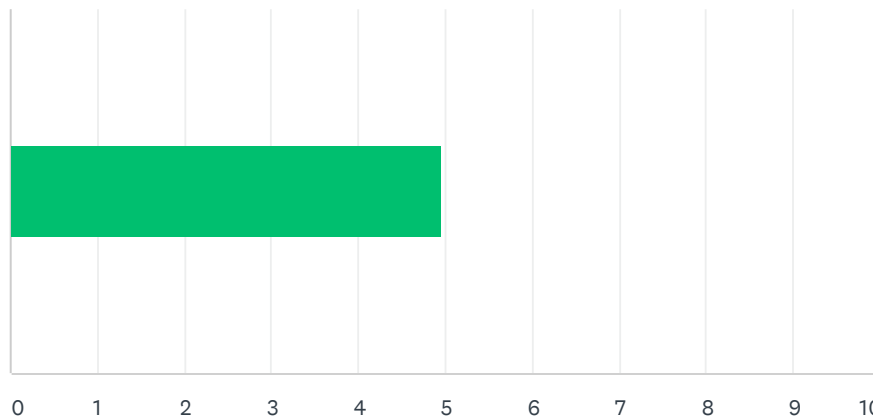
