## C H A P. I.

The Autbor gives Some Account of bimSelf and Family, bis firft Inducements to travel. He is fipipwrecked, and fwims for bis Life, gets fafe on Shoar in the Country of Lilliput, is made a Prifoner, and carryed up the Country.


Y Father had a fmall Eftate in Nottingbambhire; I was the Third of Five Sons. He fent me to Emanuel College in Ciambridge, at Fourteen Yearsold, where I refided three Years, and applyed my felf PARTI. clofe

clofe to my Studies; But the Charge of maintaining me (although I had a very fcanty Allowance) being too great for a narrow Fortune, I was bound Apprentice to Mr. Fames Bates, an eminent Surgeon in London, with whom I continued four Years; and my Father now and then fending me fmall Sums of Money, I laid them out in learning Navigation, and other Parts of the Mathematicks, ufeful to thofe who intend to travel, as I always. believed it would be fome time or other my fortune to do. When I left Mr. Bates, 1 went down to my Father; where by the Affiftance of Him and my Uncle 7obn, and fome other Relations, I got Forty Pounds, and a Promife of Thirty Pounds a Yeār to maintain me at Leyden: There I ftudied Phyfick two Years and feven Months, knowing it would be ufeful in long Voyages.

So o'n after my Return from Leyden, I was recommended by my good Mafter Mr. Bates, to be Surgeon to the Swallowe,

libw, Captain Abrabam Pannell Commander; with whom I continued three Years and a half, making a Voyage or twointo the Levant, and fome other Parts. When I came back, I refolved to fettle in London, to which Mr. Bates, my Mafter, encouraged me, and by him I was recommended to feveral Patients. I took Part of a fmall Houfe in the Old Fury; and being advifed to alter my Condition, I married Mrs. Mary Burton, fecond Daughter to Mr. Edmond Burton Hofier in Nerwgate-Street, with whom I received four Hundred Pounds for a Portion.

But, my good Mafter Bates dying in two Years after, and I having few Friends, my Bufinefs began to fail; for my Confcience would not fuffer me to imitate the bad Practice of two many among my Brethren. Having therefore confulted with my Wife, and fome of my Acquaintance, I determined to go again to Sea. I was Surgeon fucceffively in two Ships, and made feveral Voyages, for fix Years,
to the Faft and Weft-Indies, by which I got fome Addition to my Fortune. My Hours of Leifure I fpent in reading the beft Authors antient and modern, being always provided with a good Number of Books; and when I was afhore, in obferving the Manners and Difpofitions of the People, as well as learning their Language, wherein I had a great Facility by, the Strength of my Memory,

The laft of thefe Voyages not proving very fortunate, I grew weary of the Sea, and intended to flay at home with my Wife and Family. I removed from the Old Fury to Fetter-Lane, and from thence to Wapping, hoping to get Bufinefs among the Sailors; but it would not turn to account. After three Years Expectation that things would mend, I accepted an advantageous Offer from Captain William Pricbard, Mafter of the Antelope, who was making a Voyage to the South-Sea. We fet fail from Briftot May $4^{\text {th, }}$ 1699, and our Voyage at firlt Was veryprofperous.

## to L I L L I P U T. ;

- I t would not be proper; for fome Reàfons, to trouble the Reader with the Particulars of our Adventures in thofe Seas: Let it fuffice to inform him, that in our Paffage from thence to the Eaft Indies, we were driven by a violent Storm to the Northwert of Van Diemen's Land. By an Obfervation, twe found ourfelves in the Latitude of 30 Degrees $2 \mathrm{Mi}-$ nutes South. Twelve of our Crew weré dead by immoderate Labour; and ill Food, the reft were in a very weak Condition. On the fifth of Novernber, which was the Beginning of Summer in thofe Parts; the Weather being vety hazy, the Seamen fpied a Rock, within half a Cable's Length of the Ship; but the Wind was fo ftrong, that we were driven directly upon it, and immediately fplit. Six of the Crew; of whom I was one, having let down the Boat into the Sea, made a fhift to get clear of the Skip, and the Rock. We rowed by my Computation about three Leagues, till we were able to work no Part I. B longer
longer, being already fpent with Labour while we were in the Ship. We therefore trufted ourfelves to the Mercy of the Waves, and in about half an Hour the Boat was overfet by a fudden Flurry from the North. What became of my Companions in the Boat, as well as of thofe who efcaped on the Rock, or were left in the Veffel, I cannot tell; but conclude they were all loft. For my own part, I fwam as Fortune directed me, and was pufhed forward by Wind and Tide. I often let my Legs drop, and could feel no Bottom: But when I was almoft gone, - and able to ftruggle no longer, I found myfelf within my Depth; and by this time the Storm was much abated. The Declivity was fo fmall, that I walked near a Mile before I got to the Shore, which I conjectur'd was about eight a-clock in the Evening. I then advanced forward near half a Mile, but could not difcover any fign of Houfes or Inhabitants; at leaft I was in fo weak a Condition, that I did not obferve them. I was extreamly. tired

tired, and with that, and the Heat of the Weather, and about half a Pint of Brindy that I drank as I left the Ship, I found myfelf much inclined to fleep. I lay down on the Grafs; which was very fhort and foft, where I flept founder than ever I remember to have done in my Life, and as I reckoned, above nine Hours; for when I awaked, it was juft Day-light. I attempted to rife, but was not able to ftir: For as I happen'd to lye on my Back, I found my Arms and Legs were frongly faftened on each fide to the Ground; and my Hair, which was long and thick, tied down in the fame manner. I likewife felt feveral flender Li gatures acrofs my Body, from my Armpits to my Thighs. I could only look upwards, the Sun began to grow hot, and the Light offended mine Eyes. I heard a confufed Noife about me, but in the Pofture I lay, could fee nothing except the Sky. In a little Time I felt fomething alive moving on my left Leg, which advancing gently forward over my Breaft,

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came almoft up to my Chin; when bending mine Eyes downwards as much as I could, I perceived it to be a human Creature not fix Inches high, with a Bow and Arrow in his Hands, and a Quiver at his Back. In the mean time; I felt at lealt forty more of the fame kind (as I conjectured) following the firt. I was in the utmoft Aftonifhment, and roared fo loud, that they all ran back in a Fright; and fome of them, as I was afterwards told, were hurt with the Falls they got by leaping from my Sides upon the Ground. However, they foon returned, and one of them, who ventured fo far as to get a full fight of my Face, lifting up his Hands and Eyes by Way of Admiration, cryed out in a fhrill, but diftinct Voice, Hekinab Degoit: The others repeated the fame Words feveral times, but I then knew not what they meant. I lay all this while, as the Reader may believe, in great Uneafinefs: at length, ftruggling to get loofe, I had the fortune to break the Strings, and wrench out the Pegs that faftened my
left
left Arm to the Ground; for, by lifting. it up to my Face, I difcover'd the Methods they had taken to bind me, and, at the fame Time, with a violent Pull; which gave me exceffive Pain, I a little loofened the Strings that tied down my Hair on the left Side, fo that I was juft able to turn my Head about two Inches. But the Creatures ran off a fecond time, before I could feize them; whereupon there was a great Shout in a very fhrill Accent,", and after it ceafed, I heard one of them cry aloud, Tolgo Pbonac; when in an inftant I felt above an hundred Arrows difcharged on my left Hand, which pricked me like fo many Needles; and befides they thot another Flight into the Air, as we do Bombs in Europe, whereof many, I fuppofe, fell on my Body, (though I felt them not) and fome on my Face, which I immediately covered with my left Hand. When this Shower of Arrows was over, I fell a groaning with Grief and Pain, and then ftriving again to get loofe, they difcharged an-
other Volly larger than the firf, and fome of them attempted with Spears to ftick me in the Sides; but, by good luck, I' had on me a Buff Jerkin, which they could not pierce. I thought it the moft prudent Method to lie fill, and my defign was to continue fo till Night, when my left Hand being already loofe, I could eafily free myfelf: And as for the Inhabitants, I had reafon to believe I might be a match for the greatert Armies they could bring againft me, if they were all of the fame Size with him that I faw. But Fortune difpofed otherwife of me. When the People obferved I was quiet, they difcharged no more Arrows: But by the Noife I heard, I knew their Numbers encreafed; and about four Yards from me, over-againft my right Ear, I heard a knocking for aboye an Hour, like that of People at work; when turning my Head that Way as well as the Pegs and Strings would permit me, I faw a Stage erected about a foot and a half from the Ground, capable of hold-
ing four of the Inhabitants, with two or three Ladders to mount it: From whence one of them, who feemed to be a Perfon of Quality, made me a long Speech, whereof I underfood not one Syllable. But I fhould have mentioned, that before the principal Perfon began his Oration, he cryed out three times Langro Debul fan: (thefe Words and the former were afterwards repeated and explained to me. ) Whereupon immediately about fifty of the Inhabitants, came and cat the Strings that faftened the left Side of my Head, which gave me the Liberty of turning it to the right, and of obferving the Perfon and Gefture of him that was to fpeak. He appeared to be of a middle Age, and taller than any of the other three who attended him, whereof one was a Page that held up his Train, and feemed to be fomewhat longer than my middle Finger ; the other two ftood one on each fide to fupport him. He acted every part of an Orator, and I could obferve many Periods of Threatnings, B 4 and
and others of Promifes, Pity and Kind; nefs. I anfwered in a few Words, but in the moft fubmiffive Manner, lifting up my Left Hand and both mine Eyes to the Sun, as calling him for a Witnefs; and being almoft famifhed with Hunger; having not eaten a Morfel for fome Hours before I left the Ship, I found the Demands of Nature fo ftrong upon mé, that I could not forbear fhewing my Impatience (perhaps againft the ftrict Ruies of Decency) by putting my Finger frequently on my Mouth, to fignify that I wanted Food. The Hurgo (for fo they call a great Lord, as I afterwards learnt) underftood me very well. He defcended from the Stage, and commanded that feveral Ladders fhould be applyed to my Sides, on which above an hundred of the Inhabitants mounted, and walked towards my Mouth, laden with Baskets full of Meat, which had been provided, and fent thither by the King's Orders upon the firt Ințelligence he received of me. I obferved there was the Fleth of feveral Animals, but
but could not diftinguifh them by the Tafte. There were Shoulders, Legs and Loins fhaped like thofe of Mutton, and very well dreffed, but fmaller than the Wings of a Lark. I eat them by two or three at a mouthful, and took three Loaves at a time, about the Bignels of Musket Bullets. They fupplyed me as they could, fhewing a thoufand Marks of wonder and aftonifhment at my Bulk and Appetite. I then made another Sign that I wanted Drink. They found by my, eating that a fmall Quantity would not fuffice me, and being a moft ingenious People, they flung up with great Dexterity, one of their largeft Hogiheads, then rolled it towards my Hand, and beat out the Top; I drank it off at a Draught, which I might well do, for it did not hold half a Pint, and talted like a fmall Wine of Burgundy, but much more delicious. They brought me a fẹcond Hoghead, which I drank in the fame manner, and made Signs for more, but they had none to give me. When I had performed thefe

Wonders,

Wonders; they fhouted for Joy; and danced upon my Breaft, repeating feveral times as they did at firt, Hekinab Degul. They made me a Sign that I hould throw down the two Hogheads, but firf warning the People below to fland out of the way, crying aloud, Borach Mivola, and when they faw the Veffels in the Air, there was an univerfal fhout of Hekinab Degul. I confefs I was often tempted, while they were paffing backwards and forwards on my Body, to feize Forty or Fifty of the firt that came in my reach, and dafh them againft the Ground. But the Remembrance of what I had felt, which probably might not be the worft they could do, and the Promife of Honour I made them, for fo I interpreted my fubmiffive Behavour, foun drove out thefe Imaginations. Befides, I now confider'd my felf as bound by the Laws of Hofpitality to a People who had treated me with fo much Expence and Magnificence. However, in my Thoughts I could not fufficiently wonder at the Intrepidity
trepidity of thefe diminutive Mortals, who durft venture to mount and walk upon my Body, while one of my Hands was at liberty, without trembling at the very fight of fo prodigious a Creature as I muft appear to them. After fome time, when they obferv'd that I made no more Demands for Meat, there appegred before me a Perfon of high Rank from his Imperial Majefty. His excellency having mounted on the fmall of my right Leg, advanced forwards up to my Face, with about a Dozen of his Retinue. And producing his Credentials under the Signet Royal, which he applyed clofe to mine Eyes, lpoke about ten Minutes, without any Signs of Anger, but with a kind of determinate Refolution; often pointing forwards, which as I afterwards found, was towards the Capital City, about half a Mile diftant, whither it was agreed by his Majefty in Council that I muft be conveyed. I anfwered in few words, but to no purpofe, and made a Sign with my Hand that was loofe, putting it to the
other (but over his Excellency's Head, for fear of hurting him or his Train) and then to my own Head and Body, to fignify that I defired my Liberty. It appeared that he underftook me well enough, for he fhook his Head by way of Difapprobation, and held his Hand in a Pofture to thew that I mult be carried as a Prifoner: However, he made other Signs to let me underftand that I fhould have Meat and' Drink enough, and very good Treatment. Whereupon I once more thought of attempting to break my Bonds, but again, when I felt the Smart of their Arrows, upon my Face and Hands, which were all in Blifters, and many of the Darts ftilk fticking in them, and obferving likewifethat the Number of my Enemies encreafed, I gave Tokens to let them know that they might do with me what they pleafed. Upon this the Hurgo and his Train withdrew with much Civility and chearful Countenances. . Soon after I heard a general Shout, with frequent repetitions of the Words, Peplom Selan, and

I felt great Numbers of the People on my Left Side relaxing the Cords to fuch a degree, that I was able to turn upon my Right, and to eafe myfelf with making Water; which I very plentifully did, to the great Aftonifhment of the People, who conjecturing by my Motions what I was going to do, immediately opened to the right and left on that fide to avoid the Torrent which fell with fuch noife and violence from me. But before this, they had dawbed my Face and both my Hands with a fort of Ointment very pleafant to the Smell, which in a few Minutes removed all the Smart of their Arrows. Thefe Circumftances added to the Refrefhment I had received by their Vietuals and Drink, which were very nourifhing, difpofed me to fleep. I flept about eight Hours, as I was afterwards affured; and it was no wonder, for the Phyficians, by the Emperor's Order, had mingled a fleepy Potion in the Hoghtads of Wine.

## 18 $\boldsymbol{A} \mathrm{VOXAGE}$.

Ir feems that upon the firft Moment I was difcovered fleeping on the Ground after my Landing, the Emperor had early Notice of it by an Exprefs, and determined in Council that I fhould be tyed in the Manner I have related (which was done in the Night while I flept) that Plenty of Meat and Drink fhould be fent to me, and a Machine prepared to carry me to the Capital City.

This Refolution perhaps may appear very bold and dangerous, and I am confident would not be immitated by any Prince in Europe on the like Occafion; however, in my Opinion it was extreamly Prudent as well as generous. For fuppofing thefe People had endeavour'd to kill me with their Spears and Arrows while I was afleep, I fhould certainly have awaked with the firft fenfe of Smart, which might fo far have rouzed my Rage and Strength, as to have enabled me to break the Strings wherewith I was tied; after which, as
they were not able to make Refiftance, fo they could expect no Mercy.

These People are moft excellent Mathematicians, and arriv'd to a great Perfection in Mechanicks by the Countenance and Encouragement of the Emperor, who is a renowned Patron of Learning. This Prince hath feveral Machines fixed on Wheels for the Carriage of Trees and other great Weights. He often builds his largeft Men of War, whereof fome are nine Foot long, in the Woods where the Timber grows, and has them carried on thefe Engines three or four hundred Yards to the Sea. Five Hundred Carpen-. ters and Engineers were immediately fet at work to prepare the greateft Engine they had. It was a Frame of Wood raifed three Inches from the Ground, about feven Foot long and four wide, moving upon twenty two Wheels. The Shout I heard was upon the Arrival of this Engine, which it feems fet out in four Hours after my Janding. It was brought parallel
parallel to me as I lay. But the principal Difficulty was to raife and place me in this Vehicle. Eighty Poles, each of one Foot high, were erected for this purpofe, and very ftrong Cords of the bignefs of Packthread were faftned by Hooks to many Bandages, which the Workmen had girt round my Neck, my Hands, my Body, and my Legs. Nine hundred of the ftrongeft Men were employed to draw up thefe Cords by many Pulleys faftned on the Poles, and thus in lefs than three Hours, I was raifed and flung into the Engine, and there tyed faft. All this I was told; for while the whole Operation was performing, 'I lay in a profound fleep, by the force of that foporiferous Medicine infufed into my Liquor. Fifteen Hundred of the Emperor's largeft Horfes, each about four Inches and an half high, were employed to draw me towards the Metropolis, which, as I faid, was half a Mile diftant.

About

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About fout Hours after we begán our Journey, I awaked by a very ridiculous Accident ; for the Carriage beirg ffopt a while to adjut fomething that was out of order, two or three of the young Natives had the Curiofity to fee how I looked when I was afleep; they climbed up into the Engine, and advancing very, foftly to my Face, orte of them; an Of ficer in the Guards; put the flarp end of his Half-pike a good way up into my left Nofril, "which tickled my Nofe like a Straw, and made me fneeze violently: whereupon they ftole off unperceived; and it was three Weéles before I knew the caufe of my atwaking fo fuddenly: We made a long March the remaining part of that Day; and refted at Night with five hundred Guards on each fide of me, half with Torches, and half with Bows and Arrows, ready to thoot me if I fholld offer to ftir. The next Morning at Sun-rife we continued bur March, and arrived within two Hundred Yaids of the
Parti: City

City-Gates about Noon. The Emperor, and all his Court came out to meet us, but his gerat Officers would by no mean's tuffer his Majetty to endanger his Perfon by mounting on my Body.

A $t$ the Place where the Carriage ftopt, there food an antient Temple efteemed to be the largeft in the whole Kingdom, which having been polluted fome Years before by an unnatural Murder, was, according to the Zeal of thofe People, : looked on as Prophane ${ }_{2}$ and therefore had been applied to common Ufe, and all the Ornaments and Furniture carried away, In this Edifice it was determined I fhould lodge. The great Gate fronting to the North; was about four Foot bigh; and almoft two Foot wide, through which I noutd eafily: creep. On esch Side of the : Gate 咕As"a fingll Window not above fix -Inches from the Ground ' into that on the Left Side ${ }_{2}$ the King's Smiths conveyed foupfcore and eleven Chains, like thofe that hang to a I.ady's Watch in Europe, and

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and almoft as large, which were locked to my left Leg with fix and thirty Padlocks. Overagainf this Temple, on tother fide of the greatHighway, at twenty Foot difange, there was a Turret at leapt five Foot high. Here the Emperor afcended with many principal Lords of his Court, to have an opportunity of viewing me, as I was told, for I could not fee them. It was reckoned that above an hundred thoufand Inhabitants came out of the Town upon the fame Errand; and in fpight of my Guards, I believe there could not be fewer than ten thoufand, at feveral times, who mounted upon my Body by the help of Ladders. But a Proclamation was foon iffued to forbid it upon pain of Death. When the Workmen found it was impoffible for me to break loofe, they cut all the Strings that bound me; whereupon 1 rofe up with as melancholy a Difpofition as ever I had in my Life. But the noife and aftonifhment of the People at feeing me rife and walk are not to be expreffed. The Chains that held my C 2

The Fxpperor of Lilliput; attended by Several of tbe Nobility, come to Sec tbe Author in bis Confinement. Tba, Emperor's Perfon apd Habit deforib'd. Learuged Men appointed to teach the Autbep their Language. He gains. Favour lyj bis mild Pijpoftion. His: Pockets are fearcbed, and bis Swerd: - and Piftols taken from bim.
ore HEN I found myfelf on my \$ W Feet, I looked about me, and muft confers $I$ never beheld a more entertaining Profpect. The Country round appeared like a continued Garderf, and the inclofed Fields, which were generally forty Foot fquare, refembled fo many Beds of Flowers, Thefe Fields were intermingled with

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Woods of half a Stang, and the talleft Trees, as I could judge, appeared to bere feven Foot high. I viewed the Town ona my left hand, which looked like tho painted Scene bf a City in a Theatre.

I had beerr for fome Hours extremely prefled by the Neceffities of Nature; which was no worider, it being almoft two Days fince $I$ had laft disburthened myfelf. I was under great Difficulties. between Urgency and Shame: The beft Expedient I could think on, was to creep into my Houfe, which I accordingly did ; and fhutting the Gate afterme; I went as far as the lengțh of my Chain would fuffer, and difcharged my Body of that uneafy, Load, But this was the only time I was ever guilty of fo ${ }^{1}$ uncleanly an Action; for which I cainot but hope the candid Reader will give fome Allowance, after he hath maturely and inpartially confi? dered my Cafe, and the Diftrefs I was in. From this time my conftant Practice Was as foon as I rofe, to perform that Bufi-

Buripeff in open Air, at the full Extent. of my Chain, and due Care was taken every Morning pefore Company came, that. the offendive Matter ihould be carried off in Wheet bagrows by two Servants appointed for that Purpofe. I would not haye dwelt fo long upon a Circumfance; that perbaps at firf fight may ap. pear not very momentuous, if I had not thought it neceflary to juftify my Chareoer in point of Cleanlinefs to the World; which I am told fome of my Maligners have beem pleafed, upon this and other Occafious, to call in queftion.

When this Adventure was at an end, I came back out of my Houfe, having occafion for frefh Aira The Emperor was already defcended from the Tower, and advancing on Horfe-back towards me, which had like to have coft him dear; for the Beaft, though very well trained, yet wholly unufed to fuch a Sight, which appeared: as if a Mountain moved before him, reared up on his hinder Feet: But $\mathrm{C}_{4} \quad$ that
that Prince, who is an excellent Horfe-; Man, kept his Seat, till his Attendants' ran in; and held the Bridle; while his Majefty had time to difmount. When ho alighted, he furveyed me round with great Admiration, but kept without the length of my Chain. He ordered his Cooks and Butlers, who were already prepared to give me Victuals and Drink, which they puthed forward in a fort of Vehiches "upon Wheels' till I could reach them. I took thefe Vehicles, and foon enptied them all; twenty of them were filled with Meat, and ten with Liquor, each of the former afforded me two or three good Mouthfuls, and I emptied the Liquor of ten Veffels, which was contained in earthen Vials, into one Vehicle, drinking it off at a Draught, and foI did with the reft. The Emprefs, and young Princes of the Blood, of both Sexes, attended by many Ladies, fat at fome diftance in their Chairs, but upon the Accident that happened to the Emperor's Horfe, they alighted, and came near his

Rerfon, which I am now going to defcribe. He is taller by almoft the breadth of my Nail, than any of his Court, which: alone is enough to frike an : Awe into: the Beholders. His Features are ftrong: and mafculine, with an Auftrian Lip and: arched Nofe, his Complexion olive, his Countenance erect, his Body and Limbs well proportioned, all his Motions graceful, and his Deportment majeftick. He was then paft his Prime; being twentyeight Years and three Quarters old, of which he had reigned abont feven, in great Felicity, and generally victorious. For the better corvenience of beholding. him; I lay on my Side, fo that my Face was parallel to his, and he ftood but three Yards off: However, I have had him fince many times in my Hand, and therefore cannot be deceived in the Defcription. His Drefs was very plain and fimple, and the Fafhion of it between the Afiatick and the European: but he had on his Head a light Helmet of Gold, 'adorned with Jewels; and a Plume on the Cref.

He held his Sword drewninit his Hand, to: defend bimfelfy if 1 fhould happen to break loofe;: it was almoft three Inches long, the Hittratd Seabbard were Gold enriched with Diamonds His Voice was flarill: but very cleariand articulate, andily could diftinctly' heary it when I food up. The: Ladies and Courtiers were all moft mag:nificently clad, fo that the Spot they ftood, upon feemed ta refemble a Petticoat feread on the Ground, embroidered with Figures, of Golde and Silver. His Imperial Majefty, fpoke: often to me, and I returned Anfwers, but neither of us: could underfand a. Syllable. There were feveral of his Priefts and Lawyers prefent. (as I cons jectured by their Habits) who where comf manded to addrefs themfelves to med and I fouke to them in as unany Languages as I had the Itaif fmatteting of, whicb were Figh and Lowe Daitch, Latin, Exandk Spanij), Italian, and Livgua Franca; but all to no purpofe, After about twe Hours the Court retired; and I wasdeft with a ffrong Guard, ta prevent the $\mathrm{Im}_{7}$ pertinence
pertinence, and probably the Malice of the Rabble, who were very impatient to: croud about me as near as they durft, and fome of them had the Inepudence to fhoot their Arrows at me as I fate on the Ground by the Daor of my Houfe, whereof one very narrowly miffed my left Eye. Buit the Colonel ordered fix of the Ring-leaders to be feized, and thought no Punifhment 'fo proper as to detiver them: bound into my Hands, which fome of: his Soldiers accondingly did, puinhing them: forwardsiwith the But-Encks of their Pikes. into my teach; I took them all in my right Hand, put five of them into my Coat-Pocket, arid as to the firch, I made a Countenance as if I would eat him alive. Thee poor Man fqualled terribly and the Colonel and his Officers were in much Pain, efpecially when they faw me take out my Penknife: But I foon put them out of fear; for, looking mildly and immediately cutting the Strings he was bound with, I fet him gently on the Ground, and away he ran; I treated the

roft in thé fame manner, taking them one: by: one out of nay: Pocket; and I obferved" both the Sioldiers and Peopke were high $=1$ ly obliged at this Mark of my Clemency; which was: reprefented very much to my' Advantage: at Court.

- Towards Night I got with fome diffioulty inta my Houfe, whene I lay on the? Ground, and continued to do fo about i a Fortnight; during which time the $\mathrm{Em}-1$ peror gavid:Orders to have a Bed prepared: for me. Six, huridred Beds of the com-: mon Alenfuros ivere broughtt in Carriages: and wrorked up in my Houfe, an huni: dted and :fify of their Bedstrawn together made up the Breadth and Length, and theere wererfour double, which how:ever kept me but very indifferently from: the Hardnefs of the Floor; that was of fonoth Stone. By the fame Computa: tion they provided me writh Sheets, Blan-: kets, and Coverlets; tolerable enaurgh for. one who had bee fo long bnured to Hardhips as I.

As the News of my Arrival fpread through the Kingdom, it brought prodigious Numbers of rich, idle, and curious People to fee me; fo that the Villages were almoft emptied, and great Neglect of Tillage and Houfhold Affairs mult have enfued, if his Imperial Majefty had not provided by feveral Proclamations and Orders of State againit this Inconveniency. He directed that thofe, who had already beheld me, fhould return Home, and not prefume to come within fifty Yards of my Houfe, without Licence from Court ; whereby the Secretarys of State got confiderable Fees.

In the mean time, the Emperor held frequent Councils to debate what Courfe fhould be taken with me; and I was afterwards affured by a particular Friend, 2 Perfon of great Quality, who was looked upon to be as much in the Secret as any, that the Court was under many. Difficulties concerning me. They apprehended

prehended my breaking loofe, that my Diet would be very expenifive, and might caufe a Faminie.' Sometimes they determined to ftarve me, or at leaft to fhoot me in the Face and Hands with poifoned Arrows, which would foon difpatch me: But again they confider'd, that the Stench of fo large a Carcafe might produce a Plague in the Metropolis, and probably fpread through the whole Kingdom. In the midif of thefe Confultations, feveral Officers of the Army went to the Door of the great Council Chamber; and two of them being admitted, gave an account of my Behaviour to the fix Criminals a-bove-mentioned, which made fo favourable an Impreffion in the Brealt of his Majefty and the whole Board in my behalf, that an Imperial Commifion was iffued out, obliging all the Villages nine hundred Yards round the City, to deliver in every Morniing fix Beeves, forty Sheep, and other Victuals for my Suftenance; to'gether with a proportionable Quantity of Bread, and Wine, and other Liquors:

for the due Payment of which, his Majefty gave Affignments upon his Treafury. For this Prince lives chiefly upon his own Demefnes, feldom except upon great Occafions raifing any Subfidues upon "his Subjects, who are bound to attend him in his Wars at their own Expence. "An Eftablifhment "was alfo" made of fix hundred Perfons to be my Domefticks, who had Boàrd-wages allowed for their Maintenance, and Tents buitt for them very conveniently on each fide of my Door. It-was likewife ordered, that three hundred Taýlors 'fhould make me a Suit of Cloaths, after the Falhion of the Country: That fix of his Majéty's greateft Scholars fhould be employ'd to inftr:ct me in their Language: And, laftly, that the Emperor's Horfes, and thofe of the Nobility, and Troops of Guards, thould be frequently exercifed in my fight, to accuftom themfelves to me. All thefe Orders were duly put in Execution, and in about three Weeks I made a great Progrefs in learning their Language; during which
which time, the Emperor frequently hos noured me with his Vifits, and was pleafed to affift my Mafters in teaching meWe began already to converfe together in fome fort $;$ and the firft Words 1 learnt were to exprefs my Defire that he would pleafe to give me my Liberty, which I every day repeated on my Knees. His Anfwer, as I could apprehend it, was, that this munt be a Work of Time, not to be thought on without the Advice of Council, and that firft I muft Lumas Kelmin peffo defmar lon Empofo; that is, fwear a Peace with him and his Kingdom. However, that I hould be ufed with all Kindnefs, and he advifed me to acquire by my Patience, and difcreet Behaviour, the good Opiñion of himfelf and his Subjects. He defired I would not take it ill if he gave Orders to certain proper Officers to féarch me; for probably I might carry about me feveral Weapons, which muift needs be dangerous things, if they anfwered the Bulk of fo prodigious a Perfon. I faid, his Majefty fhould

thould be fatisfied, for I was ready to frip myfelf, and turn up my Pockets before him. This I delivered part in Words, and part in Signs. He replied, that by the Laws of the Kingdom I muft be fearched by two of his Officers; that he knew this could not be done without my Confent and Affiftance; that he had fo good an Opinion of my Generofity, and Juftice, as to truft their Perfons in my Hands: That whatever they took from me fhould be refurned when 1 left the Country, or paid for at the Rate which I would fet upon them. I took up the two Officers' in my Hands, put them firft into my Coat-Pockets, and then into every other Pocket about me, except my two Fobs, and another fes cret Pocket I had no mind fhould be fearched, wherein I had fome little Neceffaries that were of no confequence to any but myfelf. In one of my Fobs there was a filver Watch, and in the other a fmall Quantity of Gold in a Purfe: Thefe Gentlemen, having Pen Ink and

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Paper

Paper about them, made an exact Inventory of every thing they faw ; and when they had done, delired I would fet them down, that they might deliver it to the Emperor. This Inventory I afterwards. tranflated into Englifh, and is word for word as follows.

Imprimis, In the right Coat-Pocket of the Great Man Mountain (for fo I interpret the Words Quinbus Fleftrin) after the ftricteft fearch, we found only. one great Piece of coarfe Cloath, large enough to be a Foot-Cloth for your Majefty's chief Room of State In the left

- Pocket, we faw a huge Silver Cheff with a Cover of the fame Metal, which we the Searchers were not able to lift: We defired it fhould be opened; and one of us ftepping into it, found himfelf up to the mid Leg in a fort of Duft, fome part whereof flying up to our Faces, fet us buth a fneezing for feveral times together. In his right Waiftcoat-Pocket, we found a prodigious Bundle of white thin Sub-

Subiftances, folded one over another, about the Bignef's of throe Men; tied with a frong Cable, and marked with black Figures; which we humbly conceive to be Writings, every Letter almoft half as large as the Palm of our Hands. In the left there was a fort of Engine, from the Back of which were extended twenty: long Poles, refembling the Pallifado's bèfore your Majefty's Court; wherewith we conjecture the Man Mountain combs his Head, for we did not always trouble him with Queftions, becaufe we found it a great Difficulty to make him underfand us. In the large Pocket on the right fide of his middle Cover, (fo I tranीlate the Word Ranfu-Lo, by which they meant my Breeches) we faw a hollow Pillar of Iron, about the length of a Man, faftened to a frong piece of Timber, larger than the Pillar ; and upon one fide of the Pillar were huge Pieces of Iron flicking out, cut into frange Figures, which we know not what to make of. In the left Pocket $_{2}$ another Engine

of the fame kind. In the fmaller Pocket on the right fide, were. feveral round flat Pieces of white and red Metal ${ }_{2}$ of different Bulk; forme of the white, which feemed to be Silyer, were fo large and heavy, that my Comrade and I could hardly, lift them. In the left Pocket were two black Pillars irregularly fhaped: we could not; without Difficulty reach the Top of them as we ftood at the Bottom of his Pocket. One of them was covered, and feemed all of a Piece: But at the upper End of the other, there appeared a white round Subftance, about twice the bignefs. of our Heads. Within each of thefe was inclofed a prodigious Plate of Steel; which, by our Orders, we obliged him to thew us, becaufe we apprehended they might be dangerous Engines. He took them out of their Cafes, and told us, that in his own Country his Practice was to thave his Beard with one of thefe, and to cut his Meat with the other. There were two Pockets which we could not enter: Thefe he called

called his Fobs; they were two large Slits cut into the top of his middle Cover, but fqueez'd clofe by the preflure of his Belly: Out of the right Fob hung a great filver Chain, with a wonderful kind of Engine at the bottom. We directed him to draw out whatever was faftened to that Chain; which appeared to be a Globe, half Silver, and half of fome tranfparent Metal : For on the tranfparent fide we faw certain frange Figures circularly drawn, and thought we could touch them, till we found our Fingers ftopped by that lucid Subftance. He put this Engine to our Ears, which made an inceffant Noife like that of a WaterMill. And we conjecture it is either fome unknown Animal, or the God that he worfhips: But we are more inclined to the latter Opinion, becaufe he affured $\mu s$, (if we undertood him right, for he expreffed himfelf very imperfectly) that he feldom did any thing without confulting it. He called it his Oracle, and faid it pointed out the Time for every AcD3. . tion

tion of his Life. From the left Fob he took out a Net almoft large enough for a Fifherman, but contrived to open and fhut like a Purfe, and ferved him for the fame ufe: We found therein feveral mafly Pieces of yellow Metal, which if they be real Gold, mutt be of immenfe Value.

Having thus, in obedience to your Majefty's Commands, diligently fearched all his Pockets, we obferyed a Girdle about his Waint made of the Hide of fome prodigious Animal; from which, on the left Side, hung a Sword of the length of five Men; and on the right, a Bag of Pouch divided into two Cells, each Cell capable of holding three of your Majefty's Subjects. In one of thefe Cells were fe: veral Globes or Balls of a moft ponderous Metal, about the bignefs of our Heads, and required a ftrong Hand to lift them: The other Cell contained a Heap of certhin black Grains, but of no great Bulk

or Weight, for we could hold above fifty of them in the Palms of our Hands.
$T_{\text {His }}$ is an exact Inventory of what we found about the Body of the MarrMountain, who ufed us with great $\mathrm{Ci}_{\mathrm{i}}$ vility, and due Refpect to your Majety's Comminfion. Signed and Sealed on the fourth Day of the eighty ninth Moon of your Majefty's aufpicious Reign.

## Clefren Frelock, Marf Frelock.

When this Inventory was read over to the Emperor, he directed me, although in very gentle, Terms', to deliver up the feveral Particulars. He firf called for my Scymiter, which I took out, Scabbard and all. In the mean time he ordered three thoufand of his choicett Troops (who then attended him) to furround me at a diftance, with their Bows and Arrows juft ready to difcharge: but I did not obferve it, for mine Eyes were wholly fixed upon his Majefty. He then defired me to draw my Scymiter, which, D 4 al-

although it had got fome Ruft by the SeaWater, was in moft parts exceeding bright. I did fo, and immediately all the Troops gave a Shout between Terror and Surprize; for the Sun flone clear, and the Reflexion dazled their Eyes as I waved the Scymiter two and fro in my Hand. His Majefty, who is a moft magnanimous Prince, was lefs danted than I could expect; he ordered me to return it into the Scabbard, and caft in on the Ground as gently as I could, about fix Foot from the end of my Chain. The next thing he demanded, was one of the hollow Iron Pillars, by which he meant my Pocketpiftols. I drew it out, and at his defire, as well as I could, expreffed to him the Ufe of it; and charging it only with Powder, which by the clofenefs of my Pouch happened to efcape wetting in the Sea, (an Inconvenience againft which all prudent Mariners take fpecial care to provide) I firft cautioned the Emperor not to he afraid, and then I let it off in the Air. The Aftonifhment here was much greater than

than at the fight of my Scymiter. Hundreds fell down aṣ if they had been ftruck dead; and even the Emperor, although he ftood his Ground, could not recover himfelf in fome time. I delivered up both my Piftols in the fame Manner, as I had done my Scymiter, and then my Pouch of Powder and Bullets; begging him that the former might be kept from the Fire, for it would kindle with the fmalleft Spark, and blow up his Imperial Palace into the Air. I likewife delivered up my Watch, which the Emperor was very curious to fee, and commanded two of his talleft Yeomen of the Guards to bear it on a Pole upon their fhoulders, as Dray-Men in England do a Barrel of Ale. He was amazed at the continual Noife it made, and the Motion of the Minute-Hand, which he could eafily difcern; for their Sight is much more acute than ours: and asked the Opinions of his learned Men about him, which were various and remote, as the Reader may well imagine without my repeating; although indeed

I could not very perfectly underfand them.
I then gave up my Silver and Coppor Money, my Purfe with nine large Pieces of Gold, and fome fmaller ones; my Knife and Razor, my Comb and Silver Snuff-Box, my Handkerchief and Journal Book. My Scymiter, Piftols, and Pouch, were conveyed in Carriages to his Majefty's Stores; but the reft of my Goods were returned me.

I had, as I before obferved, one private Pocket which efcaped their Search, wherein there was a pair of Spectacles (which I fometimes ufe for the Weaknefs of mine Eyes) a Pocket Perfpective, and feveral other little Conveniences; which being of no confequence to the Emperor, 1 did not think my felf bound in Honour to difcover, and I apprehended they might be loft or fpoiled if I ventured them out of my Poffeffion.

CHAP.

## CHAP III.

The Autbor diverts the Emperor and bis Nobility of both Sexes in a very uncommon Manner. The Diverfions of the Court of Lilliput defcribed. The Autbor bas bis Liberty granted bim upon cortain Conditions.
 Y Gentlenefs and good Behaviour had gained fo far on the Emperor and his Court, and indeed upon the Army and People in general, that I began to conceive Hopes of getting my Liberty in a fhort time. I took all pofible Methods to cultivate this favourable Difpofition. The Natives came by degrees to be lefs apprehenfive of any Danger from me. I would fometimes lie down, and let five or fix.
fix of them dance on my Hand. And at laft the Boys and Girls would venture to come and play at Hide and Seek in my Hair. I had now made a good Progrefs in underftanding and fpeaking their Language. The Emperor had a mind one day to entertain me with feveral of the Country Shows, wherein they exceed all Nations I have known, both for Dexterity and Magnificence. I was diverted with none fo much as that of the RopeDancers, performed upon a flender white Thread, extended about two Foot, and twelve Inches from the Ground. Upon which I fhall defire liberty, with the Reader's Patience, to enlarge a little.

THIS $_{\text {Diverfion is only practifed by }}$ thofe Perfons who are Candidates for great Employments, and high Favour, at Court. They are trained in this Art from their Youth, and are not always of noble Birth, or liberal Education. When a great Office is yacant either by Death or Difgrace (which often happens) five
or fix of thofe Candidates petition the Emperor to entertain his Majefty and the Court with a Dance on the Rope, and whoever jumps the higheft without falling, fucceeds in the Office. Very often the Chief Minifters themfelves are commanded to fhew their Skill, and to convince the Emperor that they have not loft their Faculty. Fitimapa, the Treafurer, is allowed to cut a Caper on the frait Rope, at leaft an Inch higher than any other Lord in the whole Empire. I have feen him do the Summerfet feveral times together upon a Trencher fixed on the Rope, which is no thicker than a common Packthread in England. My Friend ReldireSal , principal Secretary for private Affairs, is, in my Opinion, if I am not partial, the fecond after the Treafurer; the reft of the great Officers are much upon a Par.

These Diverfions are often attended with fatal Accidents, whereof great Numbers are on Record. I my felf have feen two or three Candidates break a Limb. But

But the Danger is much greater when the Minifters themfelves are commanded to fhew their Dexterity; for by contending to excel themfelves and their Fellows, they fraim fo far, that there is hardly one of them who hath not received a Fall, and fome of them two or three. I was affured thata Year or two before my Arrival, Flimuap would have infallibly broke his Neck, if one of the King's Cufhions, that accidentally lay on the Ground, had not weakened the Force of his Fall.

There is likewife another Diverion which is only fhewn before the Emperor and Emprefs, and firt Minifter, upon particular Occafions. The Emperor lays on a Table three fine filken Threads of fix Inches long. One is Purple, the other Yellow, and the third White. Thefe Threads are propofed as Prizes for thofe Perfons whom the Emperor hath a mind to diftinguifh by a peculiar Mark of his Fayour. The Ceremony is performed in his Majefty's great Chamber of State, where
where the Candidates are to undergo a Tryal of Dexterity very different from the former, and fuch as I have not obferved the leaft Refemblance of in any other Country of the old or the new World. The Emperor holds a Stick in his Hands, both ends parallel to the Horizon, while the Candidates advancing one by one, fometimes leap over the Stick, fometimes creep under it backwards and forwards feveral times, according as the Stick is advanced or depreffed. Sometimes the Emperor holds one end of the Stick, and hiș firl Miniter the other ; fometimes the Minifter has it entirely to himfelf. Whoever performs his Part with moft Agility; and holds out the longeft in leaping and creeping, ; is rewarded with the Purple coloured Silk; the Yellow is given to the next, and the White to the third; which they all were girt twice round about the middle; and you fee few great Perfons about this Court, who are not adorned with one of thefe Girdles.

"The Horfes of the Army, and thofe of the royal Stables, having been daily led before me, where no longer fhy, but would come up to my very Feet without flarting. The Riders would leap them over my Hanid as I held it on the Ground, and one of the Emperor's'Huntfmen, upon a large Courler, took my Foot, Shoe and all; which was indeed a prodigious Leap. I had the good fortune to divert the Emperor one Dày after a very extraorditary manner. I defired he would order feveral Sticks of twơ Foot high, and the thicknefs of an ordinary Cane, to be brought me; whereupon his Majefty commanded the Mafter of his Woods to give Directions accordingly, and the next Morning fix Wbodemen artived with as many Carriages," drawn by eight Horfes to each. I took nine of thefe Sticks, and fixing them firmly in the Ground in a Quadrangular Figure, two foot and a half Square. I took four other Sticks, and tied them parallel at each Corner, about two

two foot from the Ground; then I faftned my Handkerchief to the nine Sticks that ftood erect, and extended it on all fides till it was as tight as the top of a Drum ; and the four parallel Sticks rifing about five Inches higher than the Handkerchief, ferved as Ledges on each fide. When I had finifhed my Work, I defired the Emperor to let a Troop of his beft Horfe, twenty four in number, come and exercife upon this Plain. His, Majefty approved of the Propofal, and I took them up one by one in my hands, ready mounted and armed, with the proper Officers to exercife them. As foon as they got into order, they divided into two Parties, performed mock Skirmifhes, difcharged blunt Arrows, drew their Swords, fled and purfued, attacked and retired, and in fhort difcovered the beft Military Dicipline I ever beheld. The parallel Sticks fecured them and their Horfes from falling over the Stage ; and the Emperor was fo much delighted, thathe ordered this Entertainment to be rePart I. E peated

peated feveral days, and once was pleafed to be lifted up, and give the word of Command; and, with great difficulty, perfuaded even the Emprefs her felf to let me hold her in her clofe Chair within two Yards of the Stage, from whence fhe was able to take a full View of the whole Performance. It was my good fortune that no ill Accident happened in thefe Entertainments, only once a fiery Horfe that belonged to one of the Captains pawing with his Hoof fruck a Hole in my Handkerchief, and his Foot flipping, he overthrew his Rider and himfelf; but I immediately relieved them both, and covering the Hole with one Hand, I fet down the Troop with the other, in the fame manner as I took them up. The Horfe that fell was ftrained in the left Shoulder, but the Rider got no hurt, and I repaired my Handkerchief as well as I could; however, I would not truft to the Strength of it any more in fuch dangerous Enterprizes.

About two or three days before I was let at liberty, as. I was entertaining the Court with thefe kind of Feats, there arrived an Exprefs to inform his Majefty, that fome of his Subjects riding near the Place where I was firf taken up, had feen a great black Subftance lying on the Ground very oddly fhaped, extending its Edges round as wide as his Majefty's Eedchamber, and rifing up in the middle as high as a Man; that it was no living Creature, as they at firft apprehended, for it lay on the Grafs without Motion, and fome of them had walked round it feveral times: That by mounting upon each other's Shoulders, they had got to the top, which was flat and even, and ftamping upon it they found it was hollow within ; that they humbly conceived it might be fomething belonging to the ManMountain, and if his Majefty pleafed, they would undertake to bring it with only five Horfes. I prefently knew what they meant, and was glad at heart to reE 2

ceive this Intelligence. It feems upon my firft reaching the Shore after our Shipwreck, I was in fuch confufion, that before I came to the Place where I went to fleep, my Hat which I had faftned with a String to my Head while I was rowing, and had ftuck on all the time I was fwimming, fell off after I came to Land; the String, as I conjecture, breaking by fome Accident which I never obferved, but thought my Hat had been loft at Sea. I intreated his Impcrial Majefty to give Orders it might be brought to me as foon as poffible, defrribing to him the Ufe and the Nature of it: And the next Day the Waggoners arrived with it, but not in a very good condition; they had bored two Holes in the Brim, within an Inch and half of the Edge, and faftned two Hooks in the Holes; thefe Hooks were tyed by a long. Cord to the Harnefs, and thus my Hat was dragged along for above half an Englijh Mile: but the Ground in that Country being extremely fmooth and levcl, it recciv'd lefs Damage than I expected.

T wo Days after this Adventure, the Emperor having ordered that Part of his Army which quarters in and about his Metropolis to be in a readinefs, took a fancy of diverting himfelf in a very fingularmanner. He defired I would ftand like a Coloffus, with my Legs as far afunder as I conveniently could. He then commanded his General, (who was an old experienced Leader, and a great Patron of mine) to draw up the Troops in clofe Order, and march them under me, the Foot by Twenty-four in a Breaft, and the Horfe by Sixteen, with Drums beating, Colours flying, and Pikes advanced. This Body confifted of three thoufand Foot, and a thoufand Horfe. His Majefty gave Orders, upon pain of Death, that every Soldier in his March fhould obferve the ftricteft Decency, with regard to my Perfon; which, however, could not prevent fome of the younger Officers from turning up their Eyes as they paffed under me. And, to confefs the Truth,

my Breeches were at that time in fo ill a Condition, that they afforded fome Opportunities for Laughter and Admiration.

I had fent fo many Memorials and Peitions for my Liberty, that his Majefty it length mentioned the Matter firf in the Cabinet, and then in a full Council; where it was oppofed by none, except Skyrefb Bolgolam, who was pleafed, withput any Provocation, to be my mortal Enemy: But it was carried againit him by the whole Board, and confirmed by the Emperor. That Minifter was Galbet, or Admiral of the Realm, very much in his Mafter's Confidence, and a Perfon well verfed in Affairs, but of a morofe and four Compleation. However, he was at length perfuaded to comply; but prevailed that the Articles and Conditions upon which I fhould be fet free, and to which I muft fwear, fhould be drawn up by himfelf. Thefe Articles were brought to me by Skyrefb Bolgolars in Perfon, attended by two Under-Secre-

tarys, and feveral Perfons of Diftinction. After they were read, I was demanded to fwear to the Performance of them ; firt in the manner of my own Country, and afterwards in the method prefcribed by their Laws: which was to hold my right Foot in my left Hand, to place the middle Finger of my right Hand on the Crown of my Head, and my Thumb on the Tip of my right Ear. But becaufe the Reader may perhaps be curious to have fome Idea of the Style and Manner of Expreffion peculiar to that People, as well as to know the Articles upon which I recovered my Liberty, I have made a Tranflation of the whole Inftrument word for word, as near as I was able, which I here offer to the Publick.

Golbasto Momaren Evlame Gurdilo Shefin Mully Ully Gue, moft Mighty Emperor of Lilliput, Delight and Terror of the Univerfe, whofe Dominions extend five thoufand Bluftrugs, (about twelve Miles in Circumference) to

the Extremitys of the Globe ; Monarch of all Monarchs, taller than the Sons of Men; whofe Feet prefs down to the Center, and whofe Head ftrikes againht the Sun: At whofe Nod the Princes of the Earth fhake their Knecs; pleafant as the Spring, comfortable as the Summer, fruitful as Autumn, dreadful as Winter.^ His moft fublime Majefty propofeth to the Man-Mountain, lately arrived to our Celeftial Dominions, the following Articles, which by a folemn Oath he fhall be obliged to perform.

First, The Man-Mountain fhall not depart from our Dominions, without our Licence under our Great Seal.
$2^{\text {d }}$, He fhall not prefume to come into our Metropolis, without our exprefs Order; at which time the Inhabitants fhall have two hours warning to keep within their doors.

${ }^{3}{ }^{\text {d }}$, The faid Man-Mountain fhall confine his Walks to our principal High Roads, and not offer to walk or lie down in a Meadow or Field of Corn.
$4^{\text {th, }}$ A $s$ he walks the faid Roads, he fhall take the utmoft care not to trample upon the Bodies of any of our loving Subjects, their Horfes, or Carriages, nor take any of our Caid Subjects into his hands, without their own Confent.
. $5^{\text {th, }} \mathrm{IF}_{\mathrm{F}}$ an Exprefs requires extraordinary Difpatch, the Man-Mountain fhall be obliged to carry in his Pocket the Meffenger and Horre a Six Days Journey once in every Moon, and return the faid Meffenger back (if fo required) fafe to our Impcrial Prefence.
$6^{\text {th, }} \mathrm{He}$ fhall be our Ally againft ouz Enemies in the Inland of Blefu/cu, and do his utmoft to deftroy their Fleet, which is now preparing to invade Us.

$7^{\text {th, }}$ That the faid Man-Mountain fhall, at his times of leifure, be aiding and affifting to our Workmen, in helping to raife certain great Stones, towards covering the Wall of the principal Park, and other our Royal Buildings.
$8^{\text {th, }}$ That the faid Man-Mountain fhall, in two Moons time, deliver in an exact Survey of the Circumference of our Dominions by a Computation of his own Paces round the Coaft.

Lastey, That upon his folemn Oath to obferve all the above Articles, the faid Man-Mountain fhall have a daily Allowance of Meat and Drink fufficient for the Support of 1724 of our Subjects, with free Accefs to our Royal Perfon, and other Marks of our Favour, Given at our Rakace at Belfaborac the twelfth Day of the Ninety-firft Moon of our Reiga.

I fwore and fubfrribed to thefe Arties with great Chearfulnefs and Content, although fome of them were not fo ,honourable as I could have wifhed; which proceeded wholly from the Malice of Skyrefb Bolgolam the High Admiral: whereupon my Chains were immediately unlocked, and I was at full liberty; the Emperor himfelf in Perfon did me the Honour to be by at the whole Ceremony, I made my Acknowledgments by proftrating myfelf at his Majefty's Feet: But he commanded me to rife; and after many gracious Expreffions, which, to avoid the Cenfure of Vanity, I fhall not repeat, he added, that he hoped I fhould prove a ufeful Servant, and well deferve all the Favours he had already conferred upon me, or might do for the future.

The Reader may pleafe to obferve, that in the laft Article for the Recovery of my Liberty, the Emperor Atipulates

to allow me a Quantity of Meat and Drink fufficient for the Support of 1724 Lilliputians. Some time after, asking a Friend at Court how they came to fix on: that determinate Number; he told me, that his Majefty's Mathematicians, having taken the Height of my Body by the help of a Quadrant, and finding it to ex $^{\text {a }}$ ceed theirs in the Proportion of Twelve to One, they concluded from the Similarity of their Bodies, that mine muft contain at leaft 1724 of theirs, and confequently would require as much Food as was necefflary to fupport that : number of Lilliputians. By which, the Reader may conccive an Idea of the Ingenuity of that People, as well as the prudent and exact Oeconomy of fo great a Prince.

C H A P. IV.
Mildendo, the Metropolis of Lilliput, defcribed, together with the Emperor's Palace. A Converfation between the Author and a Principal Secretary, concerning the Affairs of that Empire: The Author's Offers to ferve the Emperorin his Wars.


HE firt Requeft I made after I had obtained my Liberty, was, that I might have licence to fee Mildendo, the Metropolis; which the Emperor eafily granted me, but with a fpecial Charge to do no hurt, either to the Inhabitants, or their Houfes. The People had notice by Proclamation of my defign to vifit the Town. The Wall which encompaffed it, is two foot and an half high,

high, and at leaft eleven Inches broad, fo that a Coach and Horfes may be driven very fafely round it ; and it is flanked with frong Towers at ten foot diftance. I ftept over the great Weftern Gate, and paffed very gently, and fideling through the two principal Streets, only in my fhort Waiftcoat, for fear of damaging the Roofs and Eves of the Houfes with the Skirts of my Coat. - I walked with the utmof Circumfpetion, to avoid treading on any Stragglers, that might remain in the Streets, although the Orders were very frict, that all People fhould keep in their Houfes, at their own peril. The Garret-windows and Tops of Houles were fo crowded with Spectators, that I thought in all my Travels I had not feen a more' populous Place. The City is an exact Square, each fide of the Wall being five hundred foot long. The two great Streets which run crots and ditide it into four. Quarters, are five foot wide. The Lanes and Alleys which I could not enter, but only viewed them as I pafficd, are from

twelve to eighteen Inches. The Town is capable of holding five hundred thoufand Souls. The Houres are from three to five Stories. The Shops and Markets well provided.

The Emperor's Palace is in the Center of the City, where the two great Streets meet. It is inclofed by a Wall of two foot high, and twenty foot diftant from the Buildings. I had his Majefty's Permiffion to ftep over this Wall; and the Space being fo wide between that and the Palace, I could eafily view it on every fide. The outward Court is a Square of forty foot, and includes two other Courts: In the inmoft are the Royal Apartments, which I was very defirous to fee, but found it extremely difficult; for the great Gates, from one Square into another, were but eightcen Inches high, and feven Inches wide. Now the Buildidgs of the outer Court were at leaft five foot high, and it was impoffible for me to ftride over them, with-

 A Vorageout infinite Damage to the Pile, though the Walls were ftrongly built of hewn Stone, and four Inches thick. At the fame time the Emperor had a great defire that I fhould fee the Magnificence of his Palace; but this I was not able to do till three Days after, which I fpent in cutting down with my Knife fome of the largeft Trees in the Royal Park, about an hundred Yards diftant from the City. Of thefe Trees I made two Stools, each about three foot high, and ftrong enough to bear my Weight. The People having received notice a fecond time, I went again through the City to the Pa lace, with my two Stools in my Hands. When I came to the fide of the outer Court, I food upon one Stool, and took the other in my hand: This I lifted over the Roof, and gently fet it down on the Space between the firft and fecond Court, which was eight foot wide. I then ftept over the Buildings very conveniently from one Stool to the other, and drew up the firf after me with a hooked Stick.

By this Contrivance I got into the inmoft Court ; and lying down upon my Side, I applied my Face to the Windows of the middle Stories, which were left open on purpofe, and difcovered the moft fplendid Apartments that can be imagined. There I faw the Emprefs, and the young Princes in their Ceveral Lodgings, with their chief Attendants about them. Her Imperial Majefty was pleafed to fmile very gracioully upon me, and gave me out of the Window her Hand to kifs.

B UT I fhall not anticipate the Reader with farther Defcriptions of this kind, becaufe I referve them for a greaterWork, which is now almoft ready for the Prefs, containing a general Defcription of this Empire, from its firt Erection, through a long Series of Princes, with a particular Account of their Wars and Politicks, Laws, Learning, and Religion : their Plants and Animals, their peculiar Manners and Cuftoms, with other Matters very curious and ufeful; my chief defign

[^0]70 ctyotage at prefent being only to relate fuch $E$ yents and Tranfactiơns as happened to the Publick, or to myfelf, during a Refidence of about nine Months in that Empirẹ.
$\therefore$ One Morning, about a Fortnight ${ }^{\text {aff }}$ ter I had obtain'd my Liberty, Keldrefal, Priñipal Secretary (as they ffyle him) of private Affairs, came to my Houfe, attended only by one Servant. He orderea his Coach to wait at a diftance, and defired I would give him an Hour's Audience, ; which I readily confented to, on account of his Quality, and Perfonal Mefits, as well as the many good Offices he had done me during my Sollicitations at Court. I offered to tie down, that he might the more conveniently reach my Ear ; but he chofe rather to let me hold him in my hand during our Converfation: He began with Compliments on my Liberty, faid he might pretend to fome Merit in it : but, however, added, that if it had not been for the prefent Situ-

Situation of things at Court, perhaps $I$ might not have obtained it fo foon. For, faid be, as flourifhing a Condition as we may appear to be in to Foreigners, we tabour:under two nighty Evils; a viotent Faction at home, and the Danger of an Invafion by a mod potent Enemy from abroad. As to 'the firft, you are to underfand, that for above feventy Moons palt; there have been tewo fruggling Parriuss in this Empire, under the Names of Trameckfan; and Sldimeckfan, frons the high and low Hecls on thcir Shoes, by which they diftinguiflt themfelves: It is alledged indeed, that the high Heels are moft agreeable to our ancient Conftitution : But howeyer this be, his Majefly hath determined to make ufe of only low Heels in the Adminiftration of the Government, and all Offices in the Gift of the Crown, as you cannot but obferve ; and particularly, that his Maiefty's lmperial Heels are lower at lealt by a Drurr than any of his Court; (Drurr is a Meafure about the fourteenth Part

of an Inch.) The Animofitys between thefe two Partys run fo high, that they will neither eat nor drink, nor talk with each other. We compute the Trameckfan, or High Heels, to exceed us in number; - but the Power is wholly on our fide. We apprehend his Imperial Highnels, the Heir to the Crown, to have fome Tendency towards the High-Heels 3 at leaft, we can plainly difcover one of his Hecls higher than the other, which gives him a Hobble in his Gait. Now, in the midft of thefe inteftine Difquiets, we are threatned with an Invafion from the Inand of Blefufcu, which is the other great Empire of the Univerfe, almoft as large and powerful as this of his Majefty. For as to what we have heard you affirm, that there are other Kingdoms and States in the World, inhabited by human Creatures as large as yourfelf, our Philofophers are in much doubt, and would rather conjecture that you dropt from the Moon, or one of the Stars; becaufe it is certain, that an hundred Mor-

tals of your Bulk would, in a fhort time, deftroy all the Fruits and Cattle of his Majefty's Dominions. Befides, our Hiforys of fix thoufand Moons make no mention of any other Regions, than the two great Empires of Lilliput and Blefufcu. Which two mighty Powers have, as I was going to tell you, been engaged in a moft obftrinte War for fix and thirty Moons paft. It began upon the following Occafion. It is allowed on all hands, that the primitive way of breaking Eggs before we eat them, was upon the larger End: But his prefent Majefty's Grandfather, while he was a Boy, going to eat an Egg, and breaking it according to the ancient Practice, happened to cut one of his Fingers. Whereupon the Emperor his Father publifhed an Edict, commanding all his Subjects, upon great Penaltys, to break the fmaller End of their Eggs. The People fo highly refented this Law, that our Hiftorys tell us there have been fix Rebellions raifed on that account; whesein one Emperor loft his Life, and

another his Crown: Thefe civil Commotions were conflanity fomented by the Monarchs of Blefufcu.; and when they

## wore quelled, the Exiles atways fled for

 Refuge to that Empire. It is computed; that eleven thoufand Perfons have, "at" feveral times,' fuffered Death, rather than fubmit to break their:Eggs at the fmaller End. Many hundred latge Volumes have becn pablifhed upon this Controverfy': But the Books of thic Big-Endiants hatye been long forbidelen, and: the whole Party rendred incapable by Law of hollde: ing Employments. : Daring the Courfe of thefe. Troubles, the Emperots of $\boldsymbol{B}$ te: fufcu did frequently expoftulate by thent Hmbafladors, accufing us of mating a Schifm in Religion, by.offending againit a fundamental Docarime of our great Prophet Luftrog;: in the fifty foitrth Chapter of the Blundecrat (which is thicir At coran.) This, howevers; is thought to be a mecr Strain upon the Fext: For the Words are thefe, That all true Belieivers Shall break their Eggs at the conwienientEnd:

End: and which is the convenient End, feems, in my humble Opinion, to be left to every Man's Confcience, or at leärt in the power of the Chief Magiffrate to determine. Now, the Big-Endian Exiles have found $f$ much Credit in the Emperor of Blefy fru's Court, and fo much private Affiftance and Encoutragement from their Party here at home, that a bloody War hath been carried on between the two Empires for fix and thirty Moons with various Succefs; during which time we have loft forty Capital Ships, and a much greater number of fmaller Veffels, together with thirty thoufand of our beft Seamen and Soldiers; and the Damage received by the Eneriny is reckon'd to be fomewhat greater than Ours. However, they have now equipped a numerous Fleet, and are juft preparing to make a Defcent upon us; and his Imperial Majefty placing great Confidence in your Valour and Strength, hath commanded Me to lay this Account of his Affairs before You.

I defired the Secretary to prefent my humble Duty to the Emperor, and to let him know, that I thought it would not become Me , who was a Foreigner, to interfere with Partics ; but I was ready, with the hazard of my Life, to defend his Perron and State againft all Invaders.

## C H A P. V.

The Author by an extraordinary Stratagem prevents an Invafion. A bigh Title of Honour is conferred upon bim. Embalfadors arrive from the Emperor of Blefulcu, and fue for Peace. The Emprefs's Apartment on fire by an Accident; the Author inftrumental in - aving the reft of the Palace.


HE Empire of Blefufcu is an Inland, fituated to the North North-Eaft fide of Lilliput, from whence it is parted only by a Channel of eight hundred Yards wide. I had not yet feen it, and upon this Notice of an intended Invafion, I avoided appearing on that fide of the Coaft, for fear of being difcovered by fome of the Enemy's Ships, who

who had received no Intelligence of me, all Intercourfe between the two Empires having been frictly forbidden during the War, upon pain of Death, and an Embargo laid by our Emperor upon all Veffels whatfoever; I communicated to his Majefty : a Project I had formed of feizing the Enemy's whole Fleet: which, as our Scouts affured us, lay at Anchor in the Harbour ready to fail with the firf fair Wind. I confulted the moft experienced Seamen, upon the Depth of the Channel, which they had often plummed, who told me, that in the middle at Highwater it was feventy Glumgluffs deep, which is about fix Foor of Europeidn Meafure; and the reff of itfifty Glumg tufs at moft. I walked towards the North-Eaft Coaft over agraint Blefuficuz and lying down behind a' Hillock, took out myn fmalk 'Pocket Perfpetive=Glafs, and viewed the:Enemy's. Flect at Anchor, con:i fifting of about :iffty Men of :War, 'and at great Number of Tranfports: I then came back to my Houfe, and gave Order (for

(for which I had a Warrant) for a great Qtantity of the ftrongeft Cable and Bars of Irön. The Cable was about as thick as Packthread, and the Bars of the length and fite of a Knitting-Needle: 1 trebled the Cable to make it fronget, and for the fame reafon 1 twifted three of the Itơn Bars togethicr, binding the Extrëmitys Into a Hook. Having thus fixed fifty Hobks to ás many Cables, I went back to the North-Eant Coant, and putting off míy Coat, "Shooes, and Stockińs, walked intothe Sea th my Leathern Jerkin, about Hatf ant hour before high Water. "I wadet with what hafte I could, and fwam in' thic middle atbout thirty Yards till 1 felt grodind; itarived to the Fleet in léfs than Half an hour. The Enemy was fo frighted when they faw me, that they leaped otut of thefr Ships, añ fwam to fiore, where there could not be fewér than thirty thoufand Souls. İ then took my Fackling, and faftning a Hook to the hole at the Prow of each, I tyed all the Cords together at the End. While I was thus

employed, the Enemy difcharged feveral thoufand Arrows, many of which ftuck in my Hands and Face; and befides the exceffive fmart, gave me much difturbance in my Work. My greateft Apprehenfion was for mine Eyes, which I fhould have infallibly loft, if I had not fuddenly thought of an Expedient. I kept among other little Neceffarys a pair of Spectacles in a private Pocket, which, as I obferved be-fore, had fcaped the Emperor's Searchers. Thefe I took out and faftned as ftrongly as I could upon my Nofe, and thus armed went on boldly with my Work in fpight of the Enemy's Arrows, many of which ftruck againft the Glaffes of my Spectacles, but without any other Effect, further than a little to difcompofe them. I had now faftned all the Hooks, and taking the Knot in my hand, began to pull; but not a Ship would flir, for they were all too fatt held by their Anchors, fo that the bold part of my Enterprize remained. I therefore let go the Cord, and leaving the Hooks fixed to the Ships, I refolutely

cut with my Knife the Cables that faftned the Anchors, receiving above two hundred Shots in my Face and Hands; then I took up the knotted End of the Cables to which my Hooks were tyed, and with great eafe drew fifty of the Enemy's largeft Men of War after me.

The Blefufcudians, who had not the leaft Imagination of what I intended, were at firft confounded with Aftonifhment. They had feen me cut the Cables, and thought my Defign was only to let the Ships run a-drift, or fall foul on each other : but when they perceived the whole Fleet moving in Order, and faw me pulling at the End, they fet up fuch a fream of Grief and Defpair, that it is almoft impoffible to deferibe or conceive, When I had got out of danger, I ftopt a while to pick out the Arrows that ftuck in my Hands and Face, and rubbed on fome of the fame Ointment that was given me at my firf arrival, as I have formerly mentioned. I then took off my Specta-

cles, and waiting about an hpur till the Tide was a little fallen, I waded through the middle with my Cargo, and arrived fafe at the Rayal fort of :Gillinyt.

The Emperor and his whole Cghrt ftood on the Shore expegtipg the Iflue of this great Adventure. They faw the Ships move forward in a large Half-Moon; but could not dircern me, who was up to my Breaft in Wator.: When I advanced to the middle of the Chapnel; they were yet, more in pain becaufe if was under Water to my Neck.: The Emp peror concluded me ta be drowned, and that the Enemy's Fleet was, approaching in a hoftile manner: But he,was foon eafed of his Fears, for the Channel growing Thallower every ftep I made, I came in in Thort time within hearing, and holding up the end of the Cable by which the Flect was faftned, I cryed in a loud Voice, Long live the moft puiffant Experor of Lilliput! This great Prince received me at my Landing with all poffible Encomiums,

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miums, and created me a Nardac upon the fpot, which is the highen Title of Honour among them.

His Majefty defired I would take fome other Opportunity of bringing all the reft of his Enemy's Ships into his Ports. And founmeafurable is the Ambition of Princes, that he feemed to think of nothing lefs than reducing the whole Empire of Blefurcu into a Province, and poverning it by a Vice-Roy; of deftroyIng the Big-Epdian Exiles, and compelling that People to break the fmaller end of their Eggs, by which he would remain the fole Monarch of the whole World. But I endeavour'd to divert him from this Defign, by many Arguments drawn from the Topicks of Policy as well as Juftice: And I plainly protefted, that I would never be an Inftrument of bringing a Free and Brave People into Slavery. And when the Matter was debated in Council, the wifeft part of the Miniftry were of my Opinion.

This open bold Declaration of mine, was fo oppofite to the Schemes and Politicks of his Imperial Majefty, that he could never forgive it ; he mentioned it in a vcry artful manner at Council, where I was told that fome of the wifeft appeared, at leaft, by their Silence, to be of my Opinion; but others, who were my fecret Enemies, could not forbear fome Expreflions, which by a fide-wind reflected on me. And from this time began an Intriguc between his Majefty, and a Junto of Minifters malicioully bent againft me, which broke out in lefs than two Months, and had like to have ended in my utter Deftruction. Of fo little weight are the greateft Services to Princes, when put into the Ballance with a Refufal to gratify their Paffions.

About three Weeks after this Ex. ploit, there arrived a folemn Embaffy from Blefufcu, with humble Offers of a Peace; which was foon concluded upon Condi-
tions

tions very advantageous to our Emperor; wherewith I fhall not trouble the:Reader: There were fix Ambaffadors, with a/Train bf:about five hundred Perfons, and their Entry was very magnificent, fuitable to the Grandeur of their Mafter, and the Importance of their Bufinefs. When their Treaty was finifhed; wherein I did them feveral.good Offices by the Credit I now had, or at leaft appeared to have at Courts their Excellencies, who were privately iqlet haw muich I had been their Friend, criadempe a Vifit in Form. They began wish hiany Compliments upion my Valour and Geherofity, invited me to that Kingdom in the Emperor their Mafter's Name, and defired me to fhew them fome Proofs :of my prodigious Strength, of which they had heard fo many Wonders; wherein I readily obliged them, but fhall not trouble the Reader with the Particulars.

When I had for fome time entertained their Excellencies to their infinite Satisfaction and Surprize, I defired they parti. G

 A Voragiwould do me the Honour to prefent my moft humble Refpects to the Emperor their Mafter, the Renown of whofe Virtues had fo juftly filled the whole World with Admiration, and whofe Rayal Perfon I refolved to attend before I returned to my own Country : accordingly, the next time I had the honour to fee out Emperor, I defired his general Licence to wait on the Blefufcudian Monarch, which he was pheas'd to grant me, as I could plainly, perceive, in a very cold manner; but could not guefs the Reafon, till I had a Whifper: from a certain Perfon, that Flimesto and Bolgolam had reprefented my Intercourfe with thofe Ambaffadors as 2 mark, of Difaffection, from which I am fure my Heart was wholly free. And this was the frift time I began to conceive fomp imperfect Idea of Courts and Minifters. I

I t is to be obferved, that there Ambaffadors fpoke to me by an Interpreter, the Languages of both Empires differing as much from each other as any two in

Europe,

Ekrope, and each Nation priding itfelf upon the Antiquity, Beaury, and Energy of their own Tongues, with an avowed Contempt for that of their Neighbour ${ }^{3}$ yet our Emperor ftanding upon the advantage he had got by the feifure of their Wleet, obliged them to deliver their Credentials, and make their Speech in the Litliputian Tongue. And it muft be conteffed, that from the great Intercourfe of Trade and Commerce between both Realms, from the continual Reception of Exiles, which is mutual among them, and from the Cuftom in each Empire to fend their young Nobility and richer Gentry to the other, in order to polifh themfelves by feeing the World, and underftanding Men and Manners; there are few Perfons of DiftinCtion, or Merchants, or Seamen, who dwell in the Maritime Parts, but what can hold Converfation in both Tangues; as I found fome Wecks after, when I went to pay my refpects to the Emperor of Blefufcu, which in the midtt of great Misfortunes, through theMalice of

my Encmies, proved a very happy Adventure to me, as I fhall relate in its proper place.

The Reader may remember, that when I figned thofe Articles upon which I recovered my Liberty, there were fome which 1 difliked upon account of their being too fervile, neither could any thing but an extrcme Neceffity have forced me to fubmit. But being now a Nardac, of the higheft Rank in that Empire, fuch Offices were looked upon as below my Dignity, and the Emperor (to do him Juftice) never once mentioned them to me. However, it was not long before I had an Op portunity of doing his Majefty, at leaft, as I then thought, a moft fignal Service. I was alarmed at Midnight with the Cries of many hundred People at my Door ; by which being fuddenly awaked, I was in fome kind of Terror. I heard the word Burglum repeated inceflantly: feveral of the Emperor's Court making thcir Way through the Croud, intreated me

me to come immediately to the Palace, where her Imperial Majefty's Apartment was on fire, by the careleffnefs of a Maid of Honour, who fell afleep while fhe was reading a Romance. I got up in an inftant; and Orders being given to clear the way before me, and it being likewife a Moon-fhine Night, I made a fhift to get to the Palace without trampling on any of the People. I found they had already applied Ladders to the Walls of the Apartment, and were well provided with Buckets, but the Water was at fome diftance. Thefe Buckets were about the fize of a large Thimble, and the poor People fupplied me with them as faft as they could; but the Flame was fo violent, that they did little good. I might eafily have ftifled it with my Coat, which I unfortunately left behind me for hafte, and came away only in my Leathern Jerkin. The Cafe feemed wholly defperate and deplorable, and this magnificent

- Palace would have infallibly been burnt down to the ground, if, by a Prefence

of Mind, unufual to me, I had not fuddenly thought of an Expedient. I had the Evening before drank plentifully of a moft dclicious Wine, called Glimigrim, (the Blefufcudians call it Flunec, but ours is efteemed the better fort). which is very diuretick. By the luckieft Chance in the World, I had not difcharged myfelf of any part of it. The Heat I had contracted by coming very near the Flames, and by my labouring to quench them, made the Wine begin to operate by Urine ; which I voided in fuch a Quantity, and applied fo well to the proper Places, that in three Minutes the Fire was wholly extinguifhed, and the reft of that noble Pile, which had coft fo many Ages in erecting, preferved from Defruction.

It was now Day-light, and I returned to my Houfe, without waiting to congratulate with the Emperor ; becaure, although I had done a very eminent piece of Service, yet I could not tell how his Ma-

jefty might refent the manner by which I had performed it : For, by the fundamental Laws of the Realm, it is Capital in any Perfon, of what Quality foever, to make water within the Precinets of the Palace. But I was a little comforted by a Meffage from his Majefty, that he would give Orders to the Grand Jufticiary for paffing my Pardon in form ; which, however, I could not obtain. And I was privately affured, the Emprefs conceiving the greateft Abhorrence of what I had done, removed to the moft diffant fide of the Court, firmly refolved that thofe Buildings fhould ncver be repaired for her Ufe; and, in the prefence of her chief Confidents, could not forbear yow:ing Revenge.

C HA P. VI.

Of the Inhabitants of Lilliput; their Learning, Laws, and Cuftoms, the Manner of Educating their Children. The Author's way of living in that Country. His. Vindication of a great Lady.


Lthough 1 intend to leave the Defcription of this Empire to a particular Treatife, yet in the mean time I am content to gratify the curious Reader with forme generail Ideas. As the common Size of the Natives is fomewhat under fix Inches high, fo there is an exact Proportion in all other Animals, ass well as Plants and Trees: For inftance, the tallest Hordes and Oxen are between four and five Inshes

ches in height, the Sheep an Inch and a half, more or lefs; their Geefe about the bignefs of a Sparrow, and fo the feveral Gradations downwards, till you come to: the fmalleft, which, to my fight, were almoft invifible; but Nature hath adapted the Eyes of the Lilliputians to 'all Objects proper for their view : They fee with great exactnefs, but at no great diftance. And to fhow the fharpnefs of their Sight toward Objects that are near, I have been much pleafed obferving a Cook pulling a Lark; which was not fo large as a common Fly; and a young Girl threading an invifible Needle with invifible Silk. Their talleft Trees are about feven foot high: Imean fome of thofe in the great Royal Park, the Tops whereof I could but juft reach with my Fift clenched. The other Vegetables are in the fame Proportion ; but this I leave to the Reader's Imagination.

I thall fay but little at prefent of their Learning, which.for many Ages hath flourifhed

flourifhed in all its Branches among them : But their manner of Writing is very peculiar, being neither from the Left to the: Right, like the Europeaws ; nor from the Right to the Left, like the Arabians; nor from up to down, like the Cbinefe; nor flom down to up, like the Cafcagians: but allant from one Corner of the Pa per to the other, like Ladies in England.

They bury their Dead with their Heads directly downwards, becaufe they hold an Opinion, that in eleven thous. fand Moons they are all to rife againg in which Period the Earth (which they conceive to be flat) will turn upfide down, and by this means they thall, ats their Refurrection, be found ready ftanding on their Feet. The Learned among them confefs the Abfurdity of this Dactrine, but the Practice fill continues, in compliance to the Vulgar.

There are fome Laws and Cuftoms in this Empire very peculiar ; and ifthey
were

were not fo direaty contrary to thofe of my own dear Country, I fhould be rempted to fay a little in their juftification. It is only to be wifhed, that they were as well executed. The firt I thall mention, relates to Informers. All Crimes againft the State are punifhed here with the utmoft feverity; but if the Perfon accufed maketh his Innocence plainly to appear apon his Tryal, the Accufer is immediately put to an ignominious Death; and out of his Goods or Lands, the innocent Per. fon is quadruply recompenfed for the Lofs of his Time, for the Danger he underwent, for the Hardfhip of his Imprifonment, and for all the Charges he hath been at in making his Defence. Or, if that Fund be deficient, it is largely fupplyed by the Crown. The Emperor does alfọ confer on him fome publick Mark of his Favour, and Proclamation is made of his Innocence through the whole City.

fail to punifh it with Death; for they alledge, that Care and Vigilance, with a vory common Underftanding, may preferve a Man's Goods from Thieves, but Honefty has no fence againft fuperior Cunning: and fince it is neceffary that there fhould be a perpetual Intercourle of Buying and Selling, and dealing upon Credit, where Fraud is permitted or connived at, or hath no Law to punifh it, the honeft Dealer is always undone, and the Knave gets the advantage. I remember when I was once in. tercceding with the King for a Criminal who had wronged his Mafter of a great Sum of Money, which he had feceived by Order, and ran away with; and happening to tell his Majefty, by way of Extenuation, that it was only a Breach of Truft; the Emperor thought it monftrous in me to offer, as a Defence, the greateft Aggravation of the Crime: and truly I had little to fay in return, farther than the common Anfwer, that different Nations had different Cuftoms ${ }_{\text {s }}$ : for, I confefs; I was heartily afhamed.

Although we ufually call Reward and Punifhment the two Hinges upon which all Government turns, yet I could never obferve this, Maxim to be put in practice by any Nation except that of Lilliput. Whoever can there bring fufficient Proof that he hath ftrictly obferved the Laws of his Country for feventy three Moons, hath a claim to certain Privileges, according to his Quality and Con-' dition of Life, with a proportionable Sum of Money out of a Fund appropriated for that Ufe : He likewife acquires the Title of Snilpall, or Legal, which is added to his Name, but does not defcend to his Pofterity. And thefe People thought it a prodigious Defect of Policy among us, when I told them that our Laws were enforced only by Penalties without any mention of Reward. It is upon this account that the Image of Juftice, in their Courts of Judicature, is formed with fix Eyes, two before, as many behind, and on each fide one, to fignify Circum-

fpection ; with a Bag of Gold open in her Right Hand, and a Sword fleathed in her Left, to thew fhe is more difpofed to Reward than to Punilh.

In chufing Perfons for all Employments, they have more regard to good Morals than to great Abilities; for, fince Government is neceffary to Mankind, they believe that the common Size of Hu man Underflandings, is fitted to fome Station or other, and that Providence never intended to make the Management of publick Affairs a Myftery, to be comprehended only by a few Perfons of fublime Genius, of which there feldom are three born in an Age : but they fuppofe Truth, Juftice, Temperance, and the like, to be in every Man's power ; the Practice of which Virtues, affited by Experieace and a good Intention, would gualify any Man for the fervice of his Country, except where a Courfe of Study is required. But they thought the want of Moral Virtues was fo far from being fupplyed by fuperior

- perior Endowments of the Mind, that Employments could never be put into fuch dangerous Hands as thofe of Perfons fo qualify'd ; and at leaft, that the Miftakes committed by Ignorance in a virtuous Difpofition, would never be of fuch fatal Confequence to the Publick Weal, as the Practices of a Man whore Inclinations led him to be corrupt, and had great Abilities to manage and multiply, and defend his Corruptions.
. $:$ In like manner, the Disbeliof of a Divine Providence renders a Man uncapable of holding any Publick Station; for fynce Kings avow themfelves to be the Deputies of Providence, the Lilliputians think nothing can be more abfurd than for a Prince to employ fuch Men as difown the Authority under which he acts.

In relating thefe and the following Laws, I would only be undertood to mean the original Infitutions, and not the moft fcandalous Corruptions into
which

which thefe People are fallen by the degenerate Nature of Man. For as to that infamous Practice of acquiring great Employments by dancing on the Ropes, or Badges of Favour and Diftinction by leaping over Sticks, and creeping under them, the Reader is to obferve, that they were firt introduced by the Grand-father of the Emperor now reigning, and grew to the prefent height, by the gradual increafe of Party and Faction.

INGRATITUDE is among thema. capital Crime, as we read it to have been in fome other Countries; for they realon thus, that whoever makes ill Returns to. his Benefactor, mult needs be a common Enemy to the reft of Mankind, from whom he hath received no Obligation, and therefore fuch a Man is not fit to live.

Their Notions relating to the Duties of Parents and Children differ extremely from ours. For, fince the Conjunction of Male and Female is founded

upon the great Law of Nature, in order to propagate and continue the Species, the Lilliputians will needs have it, ${ }^{\text {i }}$ that Men and Women are joined together like other Animals, by the Motives of Concupifcence; and that their Tendernefs towards their Young proceeds from the like natural Principle: : for which reafon they will never allow, that a Child is under any Obligation to his Father for begetting him, or his Mother for bringing him into the World; which, confidering the Miferies of human Life; was neither a Benefit in it felf, or intended fo by his Parents, whofe Thoughts in their Love-Encounters were otherwife employ'd: Upon thefe,- and the like Reafonings, their Opinion is, that Parents are the laft of all others to be trufted with the Education of their own Children : and therefore they have in every Town publick Nurferies, where all Parents, except Cottagers and Labourers, are obliged to fend their Infants of both Sexes to be reared and educated when they come to the Age of PartI. H twenty.

twenty Moons, at which time, they are fuppofed to have fome Rudiments of Docility. Thefe Schools are of feveral kinds, fuited to different Qualities, and to both Sexes. They have certain Profeffors well skilled in preparing Children for fuch a condition of Life as befits the Rank of their Parents, and their own Capacities as well as Inclinations. I fhall firt fay fomething of the Male Nurferies, and then of the Female.

The Nurferies for Males of Noble or Eminent Birth, are provided with Grave and Learned Profeflors, and their feveral Deputies. The Clothes and Focd of the Children are plain and fimple. They are bred up in the Principles of Honour, Juftice, Courage, Modefty, Clemency, Religion, and Love of their Country; they are always employed in fome Bufinefs, except in the times of Eating and Sleeping, which are very fhort, and two Hours for Diverfions, confifting of bodily Exercifes. They are dreffed by Men

till four Years of Age, and then are obliged to drefs themfelves, although their Quality be ever fo great; and the Women Attendants, who are aged proportionably to ours at fifty, perform only the moft menial Qffices. They are neverf fuffered to converfe with Servants, but gotogether in fmall or greater numbefs to take their Diverfions, and always in the prefence of a Profeffor, or one of his Depuriess whereby they avoid thofs early: Impteflions of Folly and Vice. $t 9$ which our Chiddren are fubjoct. Their Parents are fuffered to fee thema only twice a Year ; the Vifit is to laft but an houst: They areallowed to kifs the Child atMecting and Parting; but a Profeffor, who always fands by on thofe accafions, will not fuffer them to whifper, or $u$ le any fondling Expreffions, or bring any Prefents of Toys, Sweet-meats, and the like.

The Penfion from each Family for the Education and Entertainment of a $\mathrm{H}_{2}$ Child

Child upon failure of due payment, 'is levyed by the Emperor's Officers.

The Nurferics for Children of ordinary Gentlemen, Merchants, Traders, and Handicrafts, are managed proportionably after the fame manner; only thofe defigned for Trades, are put out Apprentices at Eleven years old, wliereas thofe of Perfons of Quality continue in their Nurferies till Fifteen', which anfwers to One and Twenty with us : but the Gonfinement is gradually leffened for the falf three Years.
$\because$ I $n$ the Femate Nurferies, the young Girls of Quality are educated much like the Males, only they are dreffed by orderly Servants of their own Sex, but always in the prefence of a Profeffior or Deputy, till they come to drefs themfelves, which is at five Years old. And if it be found that thefe Nurfes ever preFume to entertain the Girls with frightful or foolifh Stories, or the common Follies practifed

- practifed by Chamber-Maids among us, they are publickly whipped thrice about the City, imprifoned for a Year, and banifhed for Life to the moft defolate Part of the Country. Thus the young Ladies there are as much afhamed of being Cowards and Fools, as the Men; and defpife all perfonal Ornaments beyond Decency and Cleanlinefs: Neither did I perceive any Difference in their Edu: cation; made by their Difference of Sex, only that the Exercifes of the Females were not altogether fo robuft; and that fome Rules were given them relating to domertick Life, and a fmaller Compafs of Learning was enjoined them : For the Maxim is, that among People of Quality, a Wife fhould be always a reafonable and agreeable Companion, becaufe fhe cannot always be young. When the Girls are twelve Years old, which among them is the marriageable Age, their Pa rents or Guardians take them home, with great Expreffions of Gratitude to the Profeffors, and feldom without Tears

of the young Lady and her Companions.

In the Nurferies of Females of the meaner fort, the Children are inftructed in all kinds of Works proper for their Sex, and their feveral degrees: Thofe intended for Apprentices, are difiniffed at nineYears old; the reft are kept to thirteen.

The meaner Families, who have Children at thefe Nurferies, are obliged, ber fides their annual Penfion, which is as low as poffible, to return to the Steward of the Nurfery a imall month. ly Share of their Gettings, to be a Portion for the Child; and therefore all Parents are limited in their Expences by the Law. For the Lilliputians think nothing can be more unjuft, than for People, in fubfervience to their own Ap. petites, to bring Children into the World, and leave the Burthen of fupporting them on the Publick. As to Perfons of Qua; lity, they give Security to appropriate a

certain Sum for each Child, fuitable to their Condition ; and thefe Funds are always managed with good Husbandry, and the moft exact Juftice.

The Cottagers and Labourers keep their Children at home, their Bufinefs being only to till and cultivate the Earth, and therefore their Education is of little confequence to the Publick; but the Old and Difeafed among them are fupported by Hofpitals : for Begging is a Trade unknown in this Kingdom.

- And here it may perhaps divert the curious Reader, to give fome account of my Domeftick, and my manner of living in this Country, during a Refidence of nine Months and thirteen Days, Having a Head mechanically turned, and being likewife forced by neceffity, I had made for myfelf a Table and Chair convenient enough, out of the largeft Trees in the Royal Park. Two hundred Sempfreffes were employed to make me Shirts,
$\mathrm{H}_{4}$ and

and Linnen for my Bed and Table, all of the ftrongeft and coarfeft kind they could get ; which; however, they were forced to quilt together in feveral Folds, for the thickeft was fome degrees finer than Lawn: Their Linnen is ufually three Inches wide, and three Foot make a Piece. The Sempitreffes took my Meafure as I lay on the ground, one ftanding at my Neck, and another at my Mid-Leg, with a ftrong Cord extended, that each held by the end, while the third meafured the length of the Cord with a Rule of an Inch long. Then they meafured my right Thumb and defired no more; for by a mathematical Computation, that twice round the Thumb is once round the Wrift, and fo on to the Neck and the Waift, and by the help of my old Shitt, which I difplayed on the Ground before them for a Pattern, they fitted me exactly. Three hundred Taylors were employed in the fame manner to make me Clothes; but they had another Contrivance for taking my Meafure. I knceled down,

down, and they raifed a Ladder from the Ground to my Neck ; upon this Ladder one of them mounted, and let falla PlumLine from my Collar to the Floor, which juft anfwered the length of my Coat ; but my Waift and Arms I meafured myrelf. When my Clothes were finifhed, which was done in my Houfe, (for the largeft of theirs would not be able to hold them) they looked like the PatchWork made by the Ladies in England, only that mine were all of a Colour.

I had threc hundred Cooks to drefs my Victuals, in little convenient Huts built about my Houfe, where they and their Families lived, and prepared me two Difhes a-piece. I took up twenty Waiters in my Hand, and placed them on the Table, an hundred more attended below on the Ground, fome with Difhes of Meat, and fome with Barrels of Wine, and other Liquors, flung on their Shoulacrs; all which the Waiters above drew up as I wanted, in a very ingenious manner,

ner, by certain Cords, as we draw the Bucket up a Well in Europe. A Difh of their Meat was a good Mouthful, and a Barrel of their Liquor a reafonable Draught. Their Mutton yields to ours, but their Beef is excellent. I have had a Sirloin fo large, that I have been forced to make three Bits of it ; but this is rare, My Servants were aftonifhed to fee me eat it Bones and all, as in our Coun. try we do the Leg of a Lark. Their Geefe and Turkeys I ufually eat at a Mouthful, and I mult confefs they far exceed ours. Of their fmaller Fowl I could take up twenty or thirty at the end of my Knife.

One day his Imperial Majefty being informed of my way of living, defired that himfelf, and his Royal Confort, with the young Princes of the Blood of both Sexes, might have the Happinefs (as he was pleared to call it) of dining with me, They came accordingly, and I placed 'em upon Chairs of State on my Table, juft over

owet-againf me, with their Guards about them. Flimnap the Lord High Treafurer attended there likewife, with his white Staff; and I obretved he often lookedion me with a four Countenance; which I would not feem to regard, but eat more than ufual, in horiour to my dear Courtry, as well as to fill the WCoutt with Admitation. I have fome private Reafons to believe, thay this Vifit from his Majefty gave Flimmap an opportunity of doing me ill Offices to his Mafter. That Minifter had always been my fecret Enemy, though he outwardly careffed the more than was ufual to the Morofenefs of his Nature. He reprefented to the Emperor the low Condition of his Treafury; that he was forced to take up Money at great Difcount ; that Exchequet Bills would not circulate under nine per. Cent. below. Par ; that in fhort I had coft his Majelty above a Million and a half of Sprugs, (their greatelt Gold Coin, about the bignefs of a Spangle 3) and upon the whole, that it would be advifeable in the

## II2 RAVOYAGE <br> Emperor to take the firf fair Occafion of difmiffing me.

I am here obliged to vindicate the Reputation of an excellent Lady, who was an innocent Sufferer upon my account. The Treafurer took a fancy to be jea; lous of his Wife, from the Malice of fome Evil Tongues, who informed him that her Grace had taken a violent Affection for my Perfon, and the CourtScandal ran for fome time, that fhe once came privately to my Ladging. This I folemnly declare to be a moft infamous Falfhood, without any Grounds, farther than that her Grace was pleafed to treat me with all innocent Marks of Freedom and Friendfhip. I own the came often to my Houfe, but always públickly, nor ever without three more in the Coach, who were ufually her Sifter and young Daughter, and fome particular Acquaintance; but this was common to many other Ladies of the Court. And I ftill appeal to my Servants round, whether they

they at any time faw a Coach at my Door without knowing what Perfons were in it. On thofe Occafions, when a Servant had given me notice, my Cuftom wasto ga immediately to the Door: and, after paying my Refpects, to take up the Coach and two Horfes very carefailly in my Hands, (for if there were fix Horfes, the Poftillion always unharneffed four) and place them on a Table, where I had fixed a moveable Rim quite round, of five Inches high, to prevent Accidents. And I have often had four Coaches and Horfes at once on my Table full of Company, while I fate in my Chair, leaning my Face towards them; and when I was engaged with one Sett, the Coachmen would gently drive the others round my Table. I have paffed many an Afternoon very agreeably in thefe Converfations. But I defy the Treafurer, or his two Informers, (I will name them, and let 'em' make their beft of it) Cluftril and $\mathcal{D r u n l o}$; to prove that any Perfon ever came to me incognito, except the Secretary Rel. drefal,

drefal, who was fent by exprefs Conimand of his Imperial Majefty, as I have before related. I fhould not have dwelt folong uponthis Particular, if it had not been a Point wherein the Reputation of a. great Lady is fo nearly concerned, to fay nothing of my own; though I had then the Honour to be a Nardac, which the Treafurer himfelf is pot; for all the World knous he is only a Glumglum, a Title inferiout by one Degree, as that of a Marguifs is to a Duke in England, ato though $I$ allow he preceded, me in right of his Pooft. Thefe falfe Informationfi which I aftetwards came to the know? ledge of, by an Accident not proper to mention, made Flimmap, the Treafurct, fhew his Lady for fome time an ill Countenance, and me a worfs; and although he were at laft undecsived and reconciled to her, yet. I loft all Credit with him, and fopund my Intereft decline very faft with the Emperor himfelf, who was indeed too much governed by that Favquitce.

EFORE I proceed to give an account of my leaving this Kingdom, it may be proper to inform the Reader of a private Intrigue which had been for two Months forming againft me.

I had been hitherto all my Life a Stranger to Courts, for which I was unqualified by the Meannefs of my CoMdition. I had indeed heard and read-cnough of the Difpofitions of great Princes and Minifers; but never expected to have

have found fuch terrible Effects of them in fo remote a Country, governed, as I thought, by very different Maxims from thofe in Ewrope.

When I: was'juft preparing to pay my Attendance on the Emperor of Ble$f u f c u$, a confiderable Perfon at Court (to whom I had been very ferviceable at a time when he lay under the higheft Difpleafure of his Imperial Majefty) came to my Houfe very privately at Night in a clofe Chair, and, without fending his Name, defired admittance : . The ChairMen were difmiffed; I put the Chair, with his Lordfhip in it, into my CoatPocket ; and giving Orders to a trufty Servant to fay I was indifpofed and gone to fleep, I faftened the Door of my Houfe, placed the Chair on the Table, according to my ufual Cuftom, and fate down by it. After the common Salutations were over, oblerving his Lordfhip's Countenance full of Concern; and enquiring into the reafon, he defired I would hear him

him with patience in a Matter that highly concerned my Honour and my Life. His Speech was to the following effec, for I took Notes of it as foon as he left me.

- You are to know, faid he, that feveral Committees of Council have been lately called in the moft private manner on your account : And it is but two days fince his Majeity came to a full Refolution.

Y o ul are very fenfible that Skyris Bolgolam (Galbet, or High Admiral) hath been your mortal Enemy almoft ever fince your Arrival: His original Reafons I know not; but his Hatred is much encreafed fince your great Succefs againft Blefufcu, by which his Glory, as Admiral, is obfcur'd. This Lord, in conjunction with Flimnap the High Treafurer, whore Enmity againf you is notorious on account of his Lady, Limtoc the General, Lalcon the Chamberlain, and Balmuff the grand Jufticiary, have prepared Arparti.

ticles of Impeachment againf your, for Treafon and other capital Crimes.

This Preface made me fo impatient, being confcious of my own Merits and Innocence, that I was going to interrupt ; when he entreated me, to be filent, and thus proceeded.

Out of Gratitude for the Eavours you have done me, I procured Information of the whole Proceedings, and a Copy of the Articles, wherein I vemure my Head for your Service.

THA T the faid Quinbuis Fleftrin hay ing brought the Imperial Fleet of Blefufcu, into the Royal Port, and being after Wards commanded by his Imperial Majefty to ceize all the other Ships of the faid Empire of Bbefuscu; and reduce that Empire to a Province, to be governed by a Vice-Roy from hence, and to deftroy and put to death not only all the BigEndian Exiles, but likewife all the People of that Empire, who would not im. I 2 mediately

mediately forfake the Big-Endian Herefy: He the faid Fleftrin, like a falle Traitor againft his moft Aufpicious, Serene, Imperial Majefty, did petition to be excufed from the faid Service upon pretence of unwillingnefs to force the Confciences, or deftroy the Liberties and Lives of an innocent People.

## ARTICLE III.

That, whereas certain Embaffadors arrived from the Court of Blefufcu, to fue for Peace in his Majefty's Court: He the faid Fleftrin did, like a falleTraitor, aid, abet, comfort, and divert the faid Embaffadors, although he knew them to be Servants to a Prince who was lately an open Enemy to his Imperial Majefty, and in open War againft his faid Majefty.

## ARTICLEIV.

That the faid Quinbus Fleftrin, contrary to the Duty of a faithful Subject. is now preparing to make a Voyage to the Court and Empire of Blefufcu, for which he

he hath received only verbal Licence from his Imperial Majefty; and under colour of the faid Licence doth fallly and traitoroully intend to take the faid Voyage, and thereby to aid, comfort, and abet the Emperor of Blefufcu, fo late an Enemy, and in open War with his Imperial Majefty aforefaid.

There are fome othér Articles,' but: thefe are the moft important, of which I have read you an Abftract.

In the feveral Debates upon this Impeachment, it muft beconfeffed that his Majefty gave many marks of his great Lenity, often urging the Services you had done him, and endeavouring to extenuate your Crimes. The Treafurer and Admiral infifted that you fhould be put to the moft painful and ignominious Death, by Cetting fire on your Houre at Night, and the General was to attend with twenty thoufand Men armed with poifoned Arrows to thoot you on the Face and Hands.

Some

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Some of your Servants were to hawe private Orders to ftrew a poifonous. Juice on. your Shirts, which would foop make, you tear your own Flech, and die, in the the. moft Torture. The General came into the fame Opinion; fo that for a long time there was a Majority againf you: But his Majefty refolving, if poflible, to fpare your Life, at laft brought off the Chamberlain.

Uponthis Incident, Reldrefal, Principal Secretary for private Affairs, who always approved bimifulf your truc Friend, was commanded by the Emperor to dolivet his Opinion, which he accordingly did: and therein juftify'd the good 'Thoughts you have of him. He' allowed your Crimes to be great; but that fill there was room for Mercy, the noft commendable Virtue in a Prince, and for which his Majefty was fo juftly celebrated. He faid, the Friendlhip between you and hinn was fo well known to the World, that perhaps the mof honourable Board might -

might think him partial : However, in obedience to the Command he had Ireceived, he would freely offer hisfiSentiments. That if his Majefty, in confideration of your Servicos, and purfuant to his-own meneiful tiofpofition, would pleafe to Ppare your Life, and only give order to put out both your Eyes; : heihumbly conceived, that by this Expedient, Jutice might ind fome meafure be fatiffied, and all the World would applaud the Lenity of the Emperor, as well as the fair and generous Proceedings of thofe who have the Honour to be his. Counfellors. That the lofs of your Eyes would be no Impediment to your bodily Strength, by which you might fill be ufeful to his Majefty. That Blindnefs is an addition to Courage, by concealing Dangers from 'us; that the Fear you had for your Eyes, was the greatef Difficulty in bringing over the Enemy's Fleet, and it would be fufficient for you to'ree by the Eyes of the Mininters, fince the thededt Prinçes do no more.

This. Proporal was received with the utmoit Difapprobation by the whole Board. Bolgolim, the Admiral, could not preferve his Temper; but rifing up in Fury, faid, he wondered how the Secretary durft prefume to give his Opinion for preferving the Life of a Traytor : That the Services you had performed, were, by all true Reafons of State, the great Aggravation of your Crimes; that you, who were able to extinguifh the Fire, by difcharge of Urine in her Majefty's Apartment, (which he mentioned with horror) might, at another time, raife an Inundation by the fame means, to drown the whole Palace; and the fame Strength which enabled you to bring over the Enemy's Fleet, might ferve, upon the firt Difcontent to carry it back: That he had good Reafons to think you were a BigEndian in your Heart; and as Treafon begins in the Heart before it appears in Overt-Acts, fo he accufed you as a Traytor on that account, and therefore infifted you Chould be put to death.

The Treafurer was of the fame Opinion; he fhewed to what ftreights his Majefty's Revenue was reduced by the charge of maintaining you, which would foon grow infupportable: That the Secretary's Expedient of putting out your Eyes was fo far from being a Remedy againft this Evil, it would probably increafe it, as it is manifeft from the common prattice of blinding fome kind of Fowl, after which they fed the fafter, and grew fooner fat: That his facred Majefty, and the Council, who are your Judges, were in their own Confciences fully convinced of your Guilt, which was a fufficient Argument to condemn you to Death, without the formal Proofs required by the frtiat Letter. of the Law.

But his Imperial Majefty fully determined again!t capital Punifhment, was gracioully pleafed to fay, that fince the Council thought the lofs of your Eyes too cafy a Cenfure, fome other may be in-

inflicted hereafter. And your Friend the Secretary hambly defiring to be heard again, in anfwer to what the Treafurer had objectedooncerning the great Charge his Majefty was at in maintaining you, faid, that his Excellency, who had the fole difpofal of the Emperor's Revenue, might cafly provide againft that Evil, by gradually lefeningyour Eftablifhment; by which; for wane of fufficient Food, you would grow weak and faint, and lofe your Appes cite, qnd confequently decay and confume in a few Months' ; neither: wotid the Stench of your Carchas be then fo dangerous, when it fhould become more than haff dininifhed \& and immediately upon your Death, five or fix Thoufand of his Majefty's. Subjects might, in two or three days, cut your Flefh from your Bones, take it away by Cart-loads, and bury it in diftant parts to prevene In. fection, leaving the skeleton as a Monu: ment of iAdmiration to Póterity.

Thus by, the great Friendflip of the Secretary, the whole Affair 'was compromifed. It was ftrictly enjoin'd, that the Project of flarving you by degrees fhould be kept a Secret, but the Sentence of putting out your Eyes was entered on the Books; none diffenting except Bolgolam the Admiral, who being a Creature of the Emprefs, was perpetually inftigated by her Majefty to infift upon your Death, The having born perpetual Malice again!t you, on account of that infamous and illegal Method you took to. extinguifh the Fire in her Apartment.

In three days four Friend the Secretary will be directed to come to your Houfe, and read before you the Articles of. Impeachment ; and them to fignify the great Lenity and Favour of his Majelty asd Council, whereby you are only condemned to the lofs of your Eyes, whick his Majefty doth not quection you will gratefully and humbly fubmit to ; and twenty

twenty of his Majefty's Surgeons will attend, in order to fee the Operation well performed, by difcharging very fharppointed Arrows into the Balls of your Eyes, as you lie on the Ground.

I leave to your Prudence what Meafares you will take; and to avoid Sufpicion, I muft immediately return in as private a manner as I came.

His Lordfhip did fo, and I remained elone, under many Doubts and Perplexities of Mind.

Ir was a Cuftom introduced by this Prince and his Miniftry, (very different, as I have been affured, from the Practices of former Times) that after the Court had decreed any cruel Execution, either to gratify the Monarch's Refentment, or the Malice of a Favourite, the Emperor made 2 Speech to his whole Council, expreffing his greatiLenity and Tendernefs, as Qualities known and confeffed by all the World.

World. This Speech was immediately publifhed through the Kingdom ; nor did any thing terrify the People fo much as thofe Encomiums on his Majefty's Mercy; becaure it was obferved, that the more thefe Praifes were enlarged and infifted on, the more inhuman was the Pu nifhment, and the Sufferer more innocent. And as to myfelf, I muft confers, having never been defigned for a Courtier either by my Birth or Education, I was fo ill a Judge of Things, that I could not difcover the Lenity and Favour of this Sentence, but conceived it (perhaps er: roneoully) rather to be rigorous than gentle. I fometimes thought of flanding my Tryal, for although I could not deny the Facts alledged in the feveral Articles, yet I hoped they would admit of fome Extenuations. But having in my Life perufed many State-Tryals, which I ever obferved to terminate as the Judges thought fit to direA, I durf not rely on fo dangerous 2 Decifion, in fo critical a Juncture, and againt fuch powerful Enemies. Once I

was ftrongly bent upón Refiftance, for while I had Liberty, the whole Strength of that Empire could hardly fubdue me; and I might eafily with Stones pelt the Metropolis to pieces ; but I foon rejefted that Project with Horror, by remembring the Oath I had made to the Emperor, the Favours I received from him, and the high Title of Nardac he conferred upon mie: Neither fiad I. fo foon learned the Gratitude of Courtiers, to perfirade myfeff that his Majeffy's prefent Severities acquitted me of all paft Obligations. :

A $\mathbf{r}$ Iaff Tfixed upon a Refolution, fot which it is probable I may incar fome Cenfure, and not unjuftly; for I confefs lowe the preferving mine Eyes, and confequently my Liberty, to my own great Rafhnefs and want of Experience: be caufe if 1 had then known the Nature of Princes and Minifters, which I have fince obferved in many other Courts, and their Methods of treating Criminals lefs obnoxious than myfelf, I fhould with great

atascriny and readincfs have fetbmieted to fo eafly wa Punifhment.! But hurrt'd on by tha Rretipitancy of Youth, and having his Jmperial Majefty's Licence to pay my Attendance uponathe Emperor of Blefufcup: I took this Opportionity, Before the .three Days were elapfed, to fend a Letter to my Friend the Secretary, fignifying my Refolution of fetting out that Morning for Blefufoui purfuant to the leave I had got ; and without waiting for atiAnfwet, I went: to that fide of the Inland where out Fliedr lay. I feized' a letege Man of War; ty'd a Cable to the Prów, and lifting:up the Anchors, I ftript myfelf, put my Cloaths (together with my Coverlet, which I brought uAder my Arm) into the Veffel, and drawing it after me between wading and fwimming, artived at the Royal Pori Gf Blefufcu, where the Feople had long expected the'; they lent metwo Guides io dreet me to the Capital City, which is of the fame Name: I held thesh in my Hands till I came within two hundeed Yards of the Gate, and defired them to

fignify my Arrival to one of the Sectetarys, and let him know, I there waited his Majefty's Command. I had an Anfwer in about an Hour, that his Majefty, attended by the RoyabFamily, and great Officers of the Court, was coming out to receive me. I advanced a Hundred Yards. The Emperor, and his Train, alighted from their Hores, the Emprefs and Ladies from their Coaches, and I did not perceive they were in any Fright or Concern. I lay on the Ground to kifs his Majefty's and the Emprefs's Hand. I told his Majefty that I was come according to my Promife, and with the Licence of the Emperor my Mafter, to have the Honour of feeing fo Mighty a Monarch, and to offer him any Service in my power, confiftent with my Duty to my own Prince; not mentioning a Word of my Difgrace, becaure I had hitherto no regular Information of it, and might fuppofe myfelf wholly ignorant of any fuch Defign ; neither could I reafonably conceive that the Emperor would difcover the Secret

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while I was out of his power : wherein, however; it foon appeared I was deceived;

I fhall not trouble the Reader with the particuiar Account of my Reception at this Court, which was Gutable to the Gancrofity of fo geat a Prince: nor of the Dificulties T was in for want of a Houfe and Bed, being forced to lie on the Ground, wrapt up inmy Cgverlet.

The Author, by a lucky Accident, finds means to leave Blefurcu; and, after fome Difficulties, returns fafe to his Native Country.


HREE Days after my Arrival, walking out of Curiofity to the North-Eaft Coaft of the Illand, I obferved, about half a League off, in the Sea, fomewhat that looked like a Boat overturned. I pulled off my. Shoes and Stockings, and wading two or three Hundred Yards, I found the Object to approach nearer by force of the Tide; and then plainly faw it to be a real Boat, which I fuppofed might, by fome Tempef, have been driven from a Ship: whereupon I returned immediately towards the City, and defired

defired his Imperial Majéty to lend me twenty:of the talleft Veffels he had left afrtert the' Leqs of his Fleet, and three thoufand Seamen under the Command of the Vice-Admizah This Fleet failed round, while I went back, the fhorteft way to the Coaft where I firft difcovered the Boat; I found the Tide had driven it ftill nearer. The Seamen were all provided with Cordage, whichil had beforehand twifted to a fufficient ftrength. When the Ships came up, Iftript my felf, and waded till I came within an hundred Yards of the Boat, after which I was forced to fwim till I got up to it. The Seamen threw me the end of the Cord, which I faftned to a Hole in the fore-part of the Boat, and the other end to a Man of War: But I found all my Labour to little purpofe; for being out of my depth, I was not able to work. In this Neceflity, I was forced to fwim behind, and pufh the Boat forwards as often as I could, with one of my Hands; and the Tide favouring me, I advanced $\mathfrak{O}$ far, that I could juft hold up my Chin and feel the

Ground. I refted two or three Minutes, and then gave the Boat another Shove, and fo on till the Sea was no higher than my Arm-pits 5 and now the mof laborious part being over, I took out my other Cables which were flowed in one' of the Ships, and faftening them firf to the Boat, and then to nine of the Veffels which attended me; the Wind being favourable the Sea-men towed, and I fhoved till we arrived within forty Yards of the Shore, and waiting till the Tide was out, I got -dry to the Boat, and by the affiffance of two thoufand Men, with Ropes and Engince, $I$ made a fhift to turn it on its Bottom, and found it was but little da: maged.

I fhall not trouble the Reader with the Difficulties I was under by the help of cerrain Paddles, which coft me ten days making; to get my Boat to the Royal Port of Blefufcu, where a mighty concourfe of Pcople appeared upon my arrival, full of Wonder at the fight of fo

prodigious a Veffel. It told the Emperor, that my good Fortune had thrown this Boat in my: way, to carry me to fome place from whence I might return inta my native Country, and begged his Majefty's Orders for getting Materials to fit it, up, together with his Licence to depart 3 which, after fome kind Expoftulationns, he was pleafed togrant.

I did very much wonder, in all this time, not to have heard of any Exprefs relating ta me from our Eniperor to the Court of Blefufcu.: Buat I was afterwards given privately to underftand, that his Imperial Majefty, never imagining I had the leaft notice of his Defigns, believed I was only gone to Blefufou in performance of my Bromife, according to the Licence he had given me, which was well known at our Court, and would return in a few days when that Ceremony was ended. But he was at lart in pain at my long abfence s and, after confulting with the Treafurer, and the reft of that

Cabal, a Perfon of Quality was difpatched with the Copy of the Articles againft me. This Envoy had Inftructions to reprefent to the Monarch of Blefufiu, the great Lenity of his Mafter, who was content to punifh me no further than with the lofs of mine Eyes; that I had fled from Juftice,: and if I did not return in two Hours, I fhould be deprived of my Title of Nardac, and declared a Traitor. The Envoy further added, that in order to maintain the Peace and Amity between both Empires, his Mafter expected, that his Brother of Blefufcu would give Orders. to have me fent back to Lilliput, bound Hand and Foot, to be punifhed as a Traitor.

The Emperor of Blefufou having taken three Days to confult, returned an Anfwcr, confifting of many Civilities and Excufes. He faid, that as for fending ine bound, his Brother knew it was impoffible; that although I had deprived him of his Fleet, yet he owed great Obligations to me for many good Offices. I

had done him in making the Peace. That however both their Majefties would foon be made eafy ; for I had found a prodigious Veffel on the Shore, able to carry me on the Sea, which he had given order to fit up with my own Affiftance and Direction; and he hoped in a few Weeks both Empires would be freed from fo infupportable an Incumbrance,

With this Anfwer the Envoy returned to Lilliput, and the Monarch of Blefuciu related to me all that had paft; offering me at the fame time (but under the ftrictert Confidence) his gracious Protection, if I would continue in his Service; wherein although I believed him fincere, yet I refolved never more to put any Confidence in Princes or Minifterṣ, where I could poffibly avoid it; and therefore, with all due Acknowledgments for his favourable Intentions, I humbly begged to be excured. I told him, that fince Fortune, whether good or evil, had flfrown a Veffel in my way, I was re. K . folved

folyed to yeaturf mydelf in the Ocean, rather than be, an occafion of Difference betwen two fych mighty Monarchs. Neither did $I$ Gid the Emperor at all difpleafed s and I' difcover'd by a certain Acfident, that ha was very glad of my Begolution, and iq were nol of his Minifters :

These Confiderations moved me to haften my Departure fomewhat fooner than timended on which the Court, impatieqt to hay me mone, very readily contribyed. Five Fundred Worknten were employed to make two Sails to my Boat' accotdint to my Directions, by quiltite thitteen fold of their flrongeft Linnen together., Gas at the pains of making Bopss and Cables, by twifting ten, twenty or thirty of the thicket and frongeft of theirs: A great Stone that Ihappen'd tofind, after a long Search by the Sea-fhore, ferved me for an Anchor. I hid the Tallow of three hundred Cows for greafing hy botr and other Ufes. 1

I was at incredible pains in cutting down fome of the largeft Timber-Trees for Oars and Mafts, wherein I was, however, much affifted by his Majefty's Ship-Carpenters, who helped me in froothing them, after Ibad done the rough Work.

In about a Month, when all was prepared, I fent to reccive his Majefty's Commands, and to take my leave. The Emperor and Royal Family came out of the Palace; I lay down on my Face to kifs his Hand, which he very gracioully gave me; fo, did the Emprefs, and young Princes of the Blood. His Majefty prefented me with fifty Purfes of two hundred Sprugs a-piece, together with his Pifture at full length, which I put inmediately into one of my Gloves, to keep it from being hurt. The Ceremonies at my Departure were too many to trouble the Reader with at this time.

I ftored the Boat with the Carcaffes of an hundred $\mathrm{Oxen}_{2}$ and three hundredSheep,

Shecp, with Bread and Drink proportionable, and as much Meat ready dreffed as four hundred Cooks could provide. I took with me fix Cows and two Bulls ative, with as many Ewes and Rams, intending to carry them into my own Country, and propagate the Breed. And to feed them on board, I had a good Bundie of Hay, and a Bag of Corn. I would gladly have taken a Dozen of the Natives, but this was a thing the Emperor would by no means permit ; and befides a diligent Search into my Pockets, his Majefty engaged my Honour not to carry away any of his Subjets'; although with their own Confent and Defire,

Haying thus prepared all things as well as I was able, I fet fail on the twentyfourth Day of September 1701, at fix in the Morning; and when I had gone about four Leagues to the Northward, the Wind being at South-Eaft, at fix in the Evening, I defcryed a fmall Inand about half a League to the North-Weft. I ad-
vanced

vanced forward, and caft Anchor on the Lee-fide of the Ifland, which feemed to be uninhabited, I then took fome Refrefh: ment, and went to my reft. I llept well; and I conjeđture at leaft fix Hours, for I found the Day broke in two Hours after I awaked. It was a clear Night. I eat my Breakfaft before the Sun was up; and heaving Anchor, the Wind being favourable, I fteered the fame Courfe that I had done the Day. before, wherein I was directed by my Pocket-Compais. My Intention was to reach, if poffible, one of thofe Illands, which I had reafon to believe lay to the North-Ealt of Van Diemen's Land. I difcovered nothing all that Day; but upon the next, about three in the Afternoon, when I had by my Computation made twenty-four Leagues from Blefu $c u ;$ I defcryed a Sail fteering to the South-Eaft; my Courfe was due Eaft. I hailed her, but could get no Anfwer; yet I found I gained upon her, for the Wind nackned. I made all the fail I could, and in half an hour the fpyed me, then hung

hung out her Antient, and dircharged a Gun. It is not eafy to exptefs ,the Joy 1 was in upon the unexpected hope of once more fecing my beloved Country, and the dear Pledges I left, in it. The Ship. flackned her Sails, and I came up witb her between five and fix in the Evening. September 26:3 but my Heart leapt within me to fee her Englift Colours. I put my Cows and Sheep into my CoatPockets, and got on boatd with all my little Cargo of Provifions. .The Veffel was an Englifh Merchant-Man, returring from Japan by the North and South: Seas ; the Captian, Mr. Fobn: Biddel of Deptfor $_{5}$ : 2 vefy civil Man, and an excellent Sailot. We were now in the Latitude of 30 Degrees South, there were about fifty Men in the Ship; sad here I met an old Comrade of minc, one Peter Williams, who gave me a good Cha: pater to the Captain. This Gentleman treated me: with Kindnefs, and defired I would let him know what place I came from laft, and whither I was bound; which

which I did' in few. Words, but he thought I wivas ravingf: and that the Tangers I underwent had diflurbed my Head's whereupon I took my black Cattle' and Shecp ont of my Pecket, which, after great viAhonintmient, clearly convînced him of eny Veracity. I then fhewed him the Gold given me by the Empetor of Lit--liput, todether with his Majefty's Piaure Fite full Ierigth, and fome other Rarities of thatecountry: I gave him tro Purfos -of two hundred Sprug's cach; and prochifed, when we arrived in England, to :make himana: ;refent of alcow and a Sheepp big:with Young.
: I Thall rot triouble the Reader with 2 particular Acconat of this Voyage, which :was very profperous for the moft part. We:arrived in the Downs on the 13th of April 1702 . I had only one Misfortune, that the Rats on board carried away one of my Sheep; I found her Bones in a Hole, picked clean from the Fleh.

Flefh. The reft of my Cattle I got fafe on Thore, and fet them a grazing in a Bowling-Green at Greenwich, where the Finenels of the Grafs made them feed very heartily; though I had always feared the contrary : neither could I poffibly have preferved them in fo long a Voyage, if the Captain had not allowed me fome of his belt Bisket; which rubbed to Powder, and mingled with Water, was their conftant Food. The fhort time I con--tinued in England, I made a confiderable Profit by fhewing my Cattle to :many Perfons of Quality, amd others : and before I began my fecond Voyage, I fold them for fix hundred Pounds. Since my lat return, I find the Breed is confiderably increafed, efpecially the Sheep ; which I hope witl prove much to the Advantage of the Woollen Manufacture, by the Finenefs of the Flecces.

I fayed but two Months with my Wife and Family; for my infatiable Defire of fecing foreign Countries would fuffer me to continue no longer. I left fifteen hundred Pounds with my Wife, and fixed her in a good Houle at Redriff. My remaining Stock I carried with me, part in Money, and part in Goods, in hopes to improve my Fortunes. My eldeft Uncle 70 ohn had left me an Eftate in Land, near Epping, of about Thirty Pounds a Year ; and I had a long Leafe of the Black-Bull in Fet-ter-Lane, which yielded me as much more: fo that I was not in any danger of leaving my Family upon the Parifh. My \$on 70 binny, named to after his Unole, was at the Grammar School, and 2 towardly Child. My Daughter Betty (who is now well married, and has Children) was then at her Needle-Work. I took leave of my Wife, and Boy and Girl, with Tears on both fides, and went

on board the Adventure, a Merchant: Ship of three hurdred Tons, bound for Surat, Gaptain Fobn Nickolas of Leverpool Commander. But my Account of this Voyage muft be referred to the Sccond Part of my Travels.

## Сhap. I.

A great Storm defcribed, the Long-Boat fent to fetch Water, the Author goes with it to difcover the Country. He is left on Shore, is feized by one of the Natives, and carried to a Farmer's Houfe. His Reception there, with Several Accidents that happened there. A Defrription of the Inbabitants.


AVIN G been condemned by Nature and Fortune to an active and reftlefs Life, in ten Months after my Retuirn, I again left my native Country, and took Shipping Part II. B
in

2, $A$ Vovage to
in the Dozers on the 20th Day of fune 1702. in the Adventure, Capt. Fabn Nicholas, a Cornifb Man, Commander, bound for Surat. We had a sery proferous Gale till we arrived at' the Cape of Good-bopes, where we landed for frefh Water, but difcovering a Leak we unfhipped our Goods, and winter'd there; for the Captain falling fick of an Ague, we coutd not leave the Cape till the end of March. We then fet fail, and had a good Voyage till we paffed the Streights of Madagafcar; but having; got Northward of that 以land, and, to about five Degrees South Latitude, the Winds, which in thofe Seas are obferved to blow a conftant equal Gale between the North and Weft from the beginning of December to the beginning of May, on the 19th of April began to blow with much greater Violence, and more Weiterly than ufual, continuing fo for twenty Days together, daring which time we were driven a little to the Eaft of the Molucca Iflands, and about three

Degrees Northward of whe Line, as our Captain found by an Obfervation he tooke the $2 d$ of May, at which time the Wind ceafed, and it was a perfect Calm, whereat I:was not a little refoyced. But he being a Man well experienc'd in the Na vigation of thofe Seas, bid us all prepare zgainft a Storm, which accordingly happened the Day following : For a South etn Wind, called the Southert Monfoon, began to fet in.

Finding it was like to overblow; we took in our Sprit-fail, and food by to hand the Fore-fail; but making foul Weather, we lookid freisuns were all falt, and handed the Nigith. The Ship lay very broad off, fo we thought it better fpooning before the'sed than tiying or hulling. We reeft the Fore-fail and let him, we hawl'd aft the Forefheet $;$ the Helm was hard a Weatlier. 'The Ship wore bravely. We belay'd the Fores down-hall; but the Sail was fplit, and we hawl'd down the Yard, and got the Sail

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into the Ship, and unbound all the things clear of it. It was a very fierce Storm; the Sea broke ftrange and dangerous. We hawl'd off upon the Lanniard of the Whipftaff, and helped the Man at Helm. We would not get down our Top-maft, but let all ftand, becaufe the fcudded before the Sea very well, and we knew that the Top-maft being aloft, the Ship was the wholefomer, and made better way thro' the Sea, feeing we had Searoom. When the Storm was over, we fet Fore-fail and Main-fail, and brought the Ship to. Then we fet the Miffen, Main-top-fąil and the Foretop-fail. Our Courfe was Eaft Nogthreaft, the Wind was at South-weft. Wregot the Star-board Tacks aboard, we caft off our Wcather-braces and Lifts; we get in the Lee-braces, and hawl'd forward by the Weather-bowlings, and hawl'd them tight, and belayed them, and hawl'd over the Miffen Tack to Windward, and kept her full and by as near as the could lye.

During

During this Storm, which was followed by a ftrong Wind Weft South-weft, we were carried, by my Computation, about five hundred Leagues to the Eaft, fo that the oldeft Sailor on Board could not tell' in what part of the World we were. Our Provifions held out well, our Ship was ftaunch, and our Crew all in good Health; but we lay in the utmof Diftrefs for Water. We thought it beft to hold on the fame Courfe, rather than turn more Northerly, which might have brought us to the North-weft parts of Great Tartary, and into the frozen Sea.

On the 16th Day of fune 1703. a Boy on the Top-maft difcovered Land. On the 17 th we came in full View of 2 great Illand or Continent (for we knew not whether, on the South-fide whereof was a fmall Neck of Land jutting out into the Sea, and a Creek too fhallow to hold a Ship of above one hundred Tuns. We caft Anchor within a League of this Creek; and our Captain

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fent
fent a dozen of his Men well armed in the Long Boat, with Veffels for Water, if any could be found. I defired his leave to go with them, that I might fee the Country, and make what Difcoveries. I could When we came to Land we faw norirver or Spring, nor any fign of Inhabitants. Our Men therefore wander'd on the Shore to find put fome frefh Water near the Sea and I walked alone about a mile on the other Side, where I obferved the Country all barren and rocky. Inow began to be weary, and feeing nothing to entertain my Curiofity, I returned gently down towards the Creek; and the. Sea being full in my View, I faw our Men already got into the Boat, and qowing for Life to the Ship. I was going to hollow aftor them, although it had been to little purpofe, when $I$ obferved a huge Creature walking after them in the Sea, as faft as he could: He waded not much deeper than his Knees, and took prodigious ftrides: But our Men had the ftart of him half a League, and the

Sea thereabouts being full of fharp-pointed Racks, the Moniter was not able to overtake the Boat. This I was afterwards stold, for I durft not ftayoto fee the Iffue of that Adventure; but ran as faft as $L$ could the way I firtt went ; and then climbed up afteep Hill, which gave me fome Profpect of the Country. I found it fully cultivated; but that which firf furprized me was the Length of the Grafs, which in thofe Grounds that feemed to be kept for Hay, was above twenty Foot high.

I fell into a high Road, for fol took it to be, though it ferved to the Inhabi. tants ohly as a foot Path through a Field of Barley. Here I walked on for fome time, but could fee little on either Side, it boing now near Harvelt, and the Corn rifing at leaft forty Foot. I was an Hour walking to the end of this Field, which was fenced in with a Hedge of at leaft one hundred. and twenty Foot high, and the Trees folofty that I could make no Coms
putation of their Altitude. There was a Stile to pars from this Field into the next. It had four Steps, and a Stone to crofs over when you came to the uppermof. It was impoffible for me to climb this Stile, becaufe every Step was fix Foot high, and the upper Stone above twenty. I was endeavouring to find fome Gap in the Hedge, when 1 difcovered one of the Inhabitants in the next Field, advancing towards the Stile, of the fame Size with him whom I faw in the Sea, purfuing our Boat. He appearcd as tall as an ordinary Spire-ftecple, and took about ten Yards at every Stride, as near as I could guefs. I was ftruck with the utmoft Fear and Atonifhment, and ran to hide my felf in the Corn, from whence I faw him at the top of the Stile, looking back into the next Field on the right hand, and heard him call in a Voice many degrees louder than a fpeaking Trumpet ; but the Noife was fo high in the Air, that at firf I- certainly thought it was Thunder. Whereupon feven Monfters

fters like himfelf came towards him with Reaping-hooks in their Hands, each Hook about the largenefs of fix Scythes. Thefe People were not fo well clad as the firft, whofe Servants or Labourers they feemed to be: For upon fome Words he fpoke, they went to reap the Corn in the Field where I lay. I kept from them at as great a diftance as I could, but was forced to move with extreme Difficulty, for the Stalks of the Corn were fometimes not above a. Foot diftant, fo that I could hardly fqueeze my Body betwixt them. I made a fhift to go forward till I came to a part of the Field where the Corn had been laid by the Rain and Wind. Here it was impoffible for me to advance a ftep; for the Stalks were fo interwoven that I could not creep thorough, and the Beards of the fallen Ears fo ftrong and pointed that they pierced through my Cloaths into my Flefh. At the fame time I heard the Reapers not above an hundred Yards behind me. Being quite difpirited with Toil, and wholly overcome

come by Grief and Defpair, 1 lay down between two Ridges, and heartily wifhad. I might there end my Days. I bemanod my defolate Widow, and FatherJefs Children. I lamentad my own-FolIy and Wilfulacrs in attempting a fecond Voyage againft the Advice af all my Friends and Relations. In this terrible Agitation of Mind I could not forbear thinking of Lilliput, whare Inhabitants loaked upon me as the greatent Prodigy that ever appeared in the World: Where I. was able to draw an Imperial Fleet in my Hand, and perform thofe other Actons which will be recosded for ever in the Chronicles of that Empire, while Pofterity fhall hardly believe them, alt though attefted by Millions. . I reflected. what a Mortification is muft prove to me to appear as inconfiderable in this Nation as one fingle Lilliputian would be among uis. But this I conceived was to be the reaft of my Misfortunes: For; as human Creatures are obferved to be zowe favage and crucl in Proportion to their

their Bulk, what could I expoct but to be a Morfel in the Mouth of the firf 2mong thele enormous Barbarians that fhould happento feizeme? Undoubtedby Philofophers are in the right when they tell us, that nothing is great or little ptherwife than by Comparifon. It might have pleafed Fortune to ter the Lillipmtiapos find fome Nation, where the Peo ple were as diminutive with refpect to them, as they were to me. tand who knows but that eyen this prodigious Race of Mortals might be equally overmatched in fome diffant part of the World, whereof we have yet no Difcovery?

Scared and confounded as I was, I could not forbear geing on with thefe Reffections, when one of the Reapers approaching within ten Yards of the Ridge where I lay, made me apprehead that with the next: Step I thould be fquathed to Death under his Foot, or cut in two with his Reaping-hook. And therefore when he .was again about to move, I fcreamed

fcreamed as loud as Fear coald make me. Whereupon the huge Creature trod fhort, and looking round about under him for fome time, at laft efpied me as I lay on the Ground. He confidered a while with the Caution of one who endeavours to lay hold on a fmall dangerous Animal in fuch a manner that it may not be able either to fcratch or to bite him, as I myfelf have fometimes done with a Weafel in Eng. land. At length he ventured to take me up behind by the Middle between his fore Finger and Thumb, and brought me with ${ }^{2}$ in three Yards of his Eyes, that he might behold my Shape more perfectly. I gueffed his Meaning, and my good Fortune gave me fo much Prefence of Mind, that I refolved not to Atruggle in the leaft as he held me in the Air, about fixty Foot from the Ground, although he grievouńy pinched my Sides, for fear I fhould flip through his Fingers. All I ventured was to raife mine Eyes towards the Sun, and place my Hands together in a fupplicating Pofture, and to fpeak fome Words in.

in an humble melancholy Tone, fuitable to the Condition I then was in. For I apprehended every Moment that he would dafh me againf the Ground, as we ufually do any little hateful Animal which we have a mind to deftroy. But my good Star would have it, that he appeared pleafed with my Voice and Geftures, and began to look upon me as a Curiofity, much wondering to hear me pronounce articulate Words, although he could not underftand them. In the mean time I was not able to forbear groaning and fhedding Tears, and turning my Head towards my Sides; letting him know, as well as I could, how cruelly I was hurt by the Preffure of his Thumb and Finger. He feemed to apprehend my Meaning; for, lifting up the Lappet of his Coat, he put me gently into it, and immediately ran along with me to his Mafter, who was a fubftantial Farmer, and the fame Perfon I had firft feen in the Field.

The

The Farmer having (as I fuppofed by their Talk) received fuch an Account of me as his Servant could give him, took a piece of a fmall Straw, about the fize of a walking Staff, and therewith lifted up the Lappets of my Coat; which it feems he thought to be fome kind of Covers ing that. Nature had given me. He blew my Hairs afide to take a better View of my Face. He called his Hinds about him, and asked them (as I afterwards learned) whether they had ever feen in the Fields any little Creature that refembled me? He then placed me foftly on the Ground upon all: four, but I got immediately up, and walked flowly backwards and forwards, to let thofe People fee I had no Intent to run away. They all fate down in a Circle about me, the better to obLerve my Motions. I pulled off my Hat, and made a tow Bow towards the Farmer. I fell on my Knees, and lifted up my Hands and Eyes, and fpoke feveral Words as loud as I could, : I took a Purfe of Gold out of my Pocket, and humbly. prefented

prefented it to him. He rectived it on the Palm of his Hand, then applied it clofe to his Eye, to fee what it was, and afterwards turned it feveral times with the Point of a Pin, (which he took out of his Slecve,) but could make nothing of it. Whereupon I made a Sign that he fhould place his Hand on the Ground. I took the Purfe;' and opening it, poured all the Gold into his Palm. There were fix Spanifb Pieces of four Piftoles each, befides twenty or thirty fmaller Coins. I faw him wet the Tip of his little Finger upon this Tongut, and take up one of my larget Pieces, and then another, but he feemed to be wholly ignorant what they were. He made me a Sign to pat them again into my Purfe, and the Purfe again into my Pocket, which after offering to him feveral times, I thought it beft to do.
$\therefore$ The Farmer by this tirne was conyinced I muaf be a rational Creature. He fpoke often to me, but the Sound of his

his Voice pierced my Ears like that of a Water:Mill, yet his Words were articulate enough. I anfwered as loudb as I could, in feveral Languages, and he often laid his Ear within two Yards of me; but all in vain, for we were wholly unintelligible to each other. He then fent his Servants to their Work, and taking his Handkerchief out of his Pocket, he doubled and fpread it on his left Hand, which he placed flat on the Ground, with the Palm upwards, making me a Sign to ftep into it, as I could eafily do, for it was not above a Foot in thicknefs. I thought it my part to obey, and for fear of falling, laid my felf at Length upon the Handkerchief, with the Remainder of which he lapped me up to the Head for further Security, and in this manner carried me home to his Houfe. There he called his Wife, and fhewed me to her; but fhe fereamed and ran back, as Women in England do at the fight of a Toad or a Spider. However, when the had a while feen my Behaviour

Viour, and how well I obferved the Signs her Husband made, fhe was foon reconciled, and by degrees grew extremely tender of me.

It was about twelve at Noon, and a Servant brought in Dinner. It was onky one fubftantial Difh of Meat (fit for the plaip Condition of an :Husbandman) in a Difh of about four and twenty Foot Diameter. The Company were the Farmer and his.Wife, three Children, and an old Gramednother: When they were fat down, the Farmer placed me at fome Diftance from him on the Table, which was thirty Foot high from the Floor. I was in a terrible Fright, and kept as far as I could from the Edge for fear of falling. The Wife minced a Bit of Meat, then crumbled fome Bread on a Trencher, and placed it before me. I made her a low. Bow, took out my Knife and Fork, and fell to eat, which gave them exceeding Delight. : The Miftrefs fent her Maid Part II.

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for a fmall Dram-cup, which hekd about three Gallons, and filled it with Drink, I took up the Veffel with march difficulty in both Hands, and in a moft refpedful manner drank to her Ladyfhip's Health, expreffing the Words as loud as $I$ could in Englijh, which made the Company laugh fo heartily, that I was almoft deafned with the Noife. This Liquor tafted like a fmall Cyder, and was not unpleafant. Then the Mafter made me a Sign to come to his Trencher-fide; but as I walked on the Table, being in great Surprize all the Time, as the indulgent Reader will eafily conceive: and excufe, I happened to fumble againgt a. Cruft, and fell flat on my Face, but received no Hurt. 1 got up immediately, and oblerving bloe good People to be in much Concern, I took my Hat (which I held under my Arno oute of good Mane. ners) : and waving it over my Head, made three Huzza's, to flat I had got no Mifchief by my Fall. But advancing forwards toward my Mafter: (as I thall benceforth

forth call himy his yourtigeft Son who fate next him, an arch Boy of about ten Fears efd, took me up by the Legs, and held' me fo' high in the Air, that I trembled evicty Limb; but his Father fratched me frotin him, and at the fame time gave him futh a Box on the left Ear, as would have felled an European Troop of Horfe to the Earth, ordering him to be taken from the Table. But being aftaid 'the Boy might owe me a Spight, and well remembring how mifchievous all Childrén among us naturally are to Sparrows, Rabbits, young Kittens, and Puppy Dogs, I fell on my Knees, and pointing to the Boy, made my Mafter to underftand, as well as I could, that Idefired his Son might be pardoned. The Father complied, and the Lad took his Seat again; whereupon I went to him and kiffed his Hand, which my Mafter took, and made him froak me gently with it.

In the midft of Dinner, my Miftrefs's favourite Cat leapt into her Lap, I C. 2 heard

heard a Noife bebind me like that of $a$ dozen Stocking-Weavers at Work; and turning my Head, I found it proceeded from the purring of this Animal, who feemed to be three times larger than an Ox, as I computed by the View of her Head, and one of her Paws, while her Miftrefs was feeding and froaking her. The Fiercenefs of this Creature's Coun-, tenance altogether difcompofed the; though I ftood at the further End of the Table, above fifty Foot off, and altho ${ }^{\circ}$ my Miftrefs held her faft for fear fhe might give a Spring, and reize me in her Talons. But it happened there was no Danger; for the Cat took not the leaft Notice of me when my Mafter placed me within three Yards of her. And as I have been always told, and found true by Experience in my Travels, that flying, or difcovering Fear before a fierce Animal, is a certain Way to make it purfue or attack you, fo I refolved in this dangerous Juncture to thew no manmer of Concern. I walked with Intre2

Although I muft beg leave to fay for my felf, that I am as fair as moft of my Sex and Country, and very little fun-burnt by mry Travels. On the other Side, difcourfing of the Ladies in that Emperor's Court, he ufed to tell me, one had Freckies, another too wide a Mouth, a third too large a Nofe, nothing of which, I was able to dirtinguifh. I confers this Reflection was obvious enaugh; which however I could not forbear, left the Reader might think thofe valt Creatures were actually deformed : For I muft do them Juftice to fay they are a comely Race of People ; and particularly the Features of my Mafter's Countenance, although he were but a Farmer, when I bcheld him from the Height of fixty Foot, appeared very well proportioned.

When Dinner was done, my Mafter went out to his Labourers, and as I could difcover by his Voice and Gefture, gave his Wife a ftridt Charge to take care of mice. I was very much tired and difpofed

He fell down at miy Feet, and the other feeing the Fate of his Comrade, made his Efcape, but not without one good Wound on the Back, which I gave him as he fled, and made the Blood ran trickling from him. After this Exploit, I walked gently, to and fro on the Bed, to recover my Breath and Lofs of Spirits. Thefe Creatures were of the Size of a large Martiff; but infi: nitely more nimble and fierce, fo that if I had zaken off my Belt before I went to flecp, I muft have infallibly been tom to pieces and devoured. I: was preffed to do more than one thing, which another could not do for me, and therefore endeavoured to make my Mif trefs underftand that I defired to be' ret down on the Floor; which after fhe had done, my Bathfilnefs would not fuffer me to exprefs my felf farther than by pointing to the Door, and bowing feve-

ADefcription of the Farmer's Daughtet: The Author carried' to 'd MarketTown, and then to the Metropolis. The Particulars of his fourney.


Y Miftrefs had a Daughter of nine Years old, a Child of toward Parts for her Age, very dextrous at her Needle, and skilful in dreffing her Baby. Her Mother and fhe contrived to fit up the Baby's Cradle for me againft Night: The Cradle' was put into a fmall Drawer of a Cabinet, and the Drawer placed upon a Hanging-fhelf, for fear of the Rats. This was my Bed all the time I fay'd with thofe People, though made more convenient by degrees, as I began to learn their Language, and make my Wants known. This young Girl was fo handy, that after I had

had once or twice palled off my Cloaths before her, the was able to drefs and un. drefs me, though I never gave her that Trouble when the would let me do either my felf. She made me feven Shirts, and fome other Linen, of as fine Cloth as could be gót, which indeed was coarfer than Sackeloth; and thefe the comftantly wafhed for me with her own Hands. She was likewife my SchoolMiftrefs to :teach me the Language: When I pointed to any thing, fhe told me the Name of it in her own Tongue, fo that in a few Days I was able to call for whatever I had a mind to. She was very good-naturd, and not above forty. Foot high, being little for her Age. She gave me the Name of Grildrig, which the Family took up, and afterwards the whole Kingdom. The Word imports what the Latins call Nanunculus, the Italians Honmuriceletind, and the Euglift. Mannikin. To her I chiefly owe my' Prefervation in that Country: We never parted while I was there; I called her

my Glumdalclitch, or little Nurfe: And I fhould be guilty of great Ingratitude if I omitted this honourable Mention of her Care and Affection towards me, which I heartily wifh it lay in my Power to requite as fhe deferves, inftead of being the innocent but unhappy Inftument of her Difgrace, as. I have too much Reafon to fear.

It now: began to be known and talked of in the Neighbourhood, that my Mafter had found a ftrange Animal in the Field about the bignefs of a Splacknuck; but/ exactly fhaped in every part like a human Creature'; which it likewife imitated in all its Actions; feemed to feeak. in a little Language of its own, had already learned reveral Words of theirs, went erect upon two Legs, was tame and geintle, would come' when it was called, do whatever it was bid, had the fineft Limbs in the World, and a Complexion fairer than a Nobleman's Daughter of three Years old. Another Farmer who lived

lived hard by, and was a particular Friend. of my Mafter, came on a Vifit on purpofe to eaquire into the Truth of this Story. I was immediately produced, and placed upon a Table, where I walked as I was commanded, drew my Hanger, put it up again, made my Reverence to my. Mafter's Gueft, asked him in his own Language how he did, and told him he was welcome, juft as my little Nurfe had inftructed me. This Man who was old and dim fighted, put on his Spectacles to behold me better, at which I could not forbear laughing very heartily, for his Eyes appeared like the Full-Moon Min. ing into a Chamber at two Windows. Our People, who difcovered the caufe of my Mirth, bore me company in Laughing, at which the old Fellow was Fool enough to be angry and out of Countenance. He had the Character of a great Mirer, and to my Misfortune he well deferved it by the curfed Advice he gave my Mafter to thew me as a Sight upon 2 Market-Day in the next Town, which Part II.

was half an hour's riding, about two and twenty Miles from our Houre. 'I gueff ed there was föme Mifchief contriving, when I obferved my Mafter and his Friend whifpering long together, fometimes pointing at me; and my Fears made me fancy that I overheard and undeffood fome of their: Words. But, the next Morning Gumidalelitcb my little Nurfe told me the whole Matter, which the had cunningly picked out from her Mother. The poor 'Girl' laid me' on her Bofom, and fell a weeping with Shame and Grief. She apprehended fome Mifchief would happen to me from tude vulgar. Folks, who might fqueéze me to Death or break one of my Limbs by taking me in their Hands. She had alfo obferved how modeff I was in my Nature, how nicely I regarded my:Horiour, and what an Indignity I hould conceive'it to be expofed for Money as a publick SpeCtacle to the meaneft of the People: She faid;' her Papa and Mammia had promifed that Gildrig fhould be hers, but now fhe found they meant

to ferve her as they did laft Year, when they pretended to give her a Lamb, and yet, as foon as it was fat, fold it to a Butcher. For my own part, I may truly affirm that I was lefs concerned than my Nurfe. I had a ftrong Hope which never left me, that I hould one Day recover my Liberty; and as to the Ignominy of being carried about for a Mon. fter, I confidered my felf to be a perfect Stranger in the Country, and that fuch a Misfortune could never be charged upon me as a Reproach if ever I thould return to England; fince the King of Great Britain himfelf, in my Condition, muft have undergone the fame Diftrefs.

My Mafter, purfuant to the Advice of his Friend, carried me in a Box the next Market day to the neighbouring Town, and took along with him his $\|$ little Daugh. ter my Nurfe upon a Pillion behind him. The Box was clofe on every fide, with a little Door for me to go in and out, and a few Gimlet-holes to let in

Air. The Girl had been fo careful to put the Quilt of her Baby's Bed into it, for me to lye down on. However, I was terribly fhaken and difcompofed in this Journey, though it were but of half an Hour. For the Horre went about forty Foot at every Step, and trotted fo high, that the Agitation was equal to the rifing and falling of a Ship in a great Storm, but much more frequent: Our Journey was fomewhat further than from London to St. Albans. My Mafter alighted $2 t$ an Inn which he ufed to frequent ${ }_{3}$ and after confulting a while with the Innkeeper, and making fome neceffary Preparations, he hired the Grultrud, or Cryer to give notice through the Town of a frange Creature to be feen at the Sign of the Green Eagle not fo big as a Splacmuck (an Animal in that Country very finely (haped, about fix Foot long) and in every part of the Body refembling an human Creature, could fpeak feveral Words, and perform an hundred diverting Tricks,

Itwas placed upon a Table in the larget Room of the Inn, which might be near three hundred Foot Square. My little Nurfe food on a low Stool clofe to the Table, to take care of me, and dired what I hhould do. My Mafter, to avoid a Croud, would fuffer only thirty People at a time to fee me. I walked about on the Table as the Girl commanded : The asked me Queftions as far as the knew my Underftanding of the Language reached, and I anfwered then as loud as I could. I turned about feveral times to the Company, paid my humble Respects, faid they were welcome, and ufed fome other Speeches I had been taught. I took up a Thimble filled with Liquor, which Glumdalclitch had given me for a Cup, and drank their Health. I drew out my Hanger, and flourifhed with it after the manner of Fencers in England. My Nurfe gave me part of a Straw, which I exercifed as a Pike, having learn. ed the Art in my Youth. I was that day Thewn to twelve Sets of Company,
and as often forced to go over again with the fame Fopperies, till I was half dead with Wearinefs and Vexation. For, thofe who had feen me made fuch wonderful Reports, that the People were ready to break down the Doors to come in. My Mafter for his own Intereft would not fuffer any one to touch me except my Nurfe; and, to prevent dan: ger, Benches were fet round the Table at fuch a diftance as put me out of every body's resh. However, an unlucky School-Boy aimed a hazel Nut directly at my Head, which very narrowly miffed me ; otherwife, it came with fo much violence that it would have infallibly knocked out my Brains, for it was almoft as large as a fmall Pumpion: But I had the Satisfaction to fee the young Rogue well beaten, and turned out of the Room.

M y Mafter gave publick notice, that he would thew me again the next Mar-ket-day, and in the mean time he pre. pared a more convenient Vehicle for me which he had reafon enough to do; for

I was fo tired with my firt Journey, and with entertaining Company for eight Hours together, that I could hardly ftand upon my Legs, or fpeak a Word. It was at leaft three Days before I recovered my Strength; and that I might have no reft at home, all the neighbouring Gentlemen from an hundred Miles round, hearing of my Fame, came to fee me at my Mafter's own Houfe. There could not be fewer than thirty Perfons with their Wives and Children (for the Country was very populous; ) and my Mafter de. manded the rate of a full Room whenever he fhewed me at home; although it were only to a fingle Family : So that for fome time I had but little eafe every Day of the Week (except Wednefday; which is their Sabbath) although I were not carried to the Town.

My Mafter finding how profitable I was like to be, refolved to carry me to the moft confiderable Cities of the Kingdom. Having therefore provided himfelf $\mathrm{D}_{4}$ with

with all things neceffary for a longJourney, and fettled his affairs at Home, he took leave of his Wife, and upon the 17th. of Auguft 1703. about two Months after my Arrival, we fet out for the Metropolis, fituated near the middle of that Empire, and about three thoufand Miles diftance from our Houfe: My Mafter made his Daughter Glumdalclitch ride behind him. She carried me on her Lap in a Box tyed about her waft. The Girl had lined it on all fides with the foftef Cloth fhe could get, well quilted underneath, furnifhed it with her Baby's Bed, provided me with Linen and other Neceffaries, and made every thing as convenient as fhe could. We had noother Company but a Boy of the Houre, who rode after us with the Luggage.

My Mafter's Defign was to thew me in all the Towns by the way, and to ftep out of the Road for fifty or an hundred Miles, to any Village or Perfon of Quality's Houre where he might expeet Cufom.

We made eafy Journies of not above feven or eightfcore Miles a Day : For Glumdalclitch, on purpofe to fpare me, complained the was tired with the trotting of the Horfe. She often took me out of my Box at my own Defire, togive me Air, and thew me the Country, but always held me faft by a Leading-Itring. We paffed over five or fix Rivers many degrees broader and deeper than the Nile or the Ganges; and there was hardly 2 Rivulet fo fmall as the Tbames at Low-don-Bridge. We were ten Weeks in our Journey, and I was fhewn in eighteen large Towns befides many Villages and private Families.

On the 26 th Day of October, we arrived at the Metropolis, called in their Language Lorbruilgrud, or Pride of the Univerfe. My Mafter took a Lodging in the principal Street of the City, not far from the Royal Palace, and put out Bills in the ufual Form, containing an exact Defcription of my Perfon and Parts.

He hired a large Room between three andfour hundred Foot wide. He provided a Table fixty Foot in diameter, upon which I was to act my Part, and palifadoed it round three Foot from the edge, and as many high, to prevent my falling over. I was fhewn ten times a Day to the Wonder and Satisfaction of all People. I could now fpeak the Language tolerably well, and perfectly underfood every Word that was fpoken to me. Befides, I had learned their Alphabet, and could make a fhift to explain a Sentence here and there; for Glumdalclitch had been my Inftructer while we were at home, and at leifure Hours during our Journey. She carried a little Book in her Pocket, not much larger than a Sanfon's Atlas; it was a common Treatife for the ufe of young Girls, giving a Chort Account of their Religion; out of this the taught me my Letters, and interpreted the Words.

Chap. III.
The Author fent for to Court. The Queen buys him of his Mafter the Farmer, and prefents him to the King. He difputes with his Majefty's great Scholars. An Apartment at Court provided for the Author. [HE frequent Labours I underwent every Day made in a few Weeks a .very confiderable change in my Health : The more my Mafter got by me, the more unfatiable he grew. I had quite loft my Stomach, and was almoft reduced to a Skeleton. The Farmer obferved it, and concluding I foon muft dye, refolved to make as good a Hand of me as he could. While he was thus reafoning

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reafoning and refolving with himfelf, a Slardral, or Gentleman UTher came from Court, commanding my Mafter to'carry me immediately thither for the Diverfion of the Queen and her Ladies. Some of the latter had already been to fee me, and reported Atrange Things of my Beauty, Behaviour, and good Senfe: Her Majefty and thofe who attended her were beyond Meafure delighted with my Demeanor. I fell on my Knees, and begged the Honour of kiffing her Imperial Foot; but this Gracious Princefs held out her little Finger towards me (after I was fet on a Table) which I embraced in both my Arms, and put the tip of it, with the utmoft refpect, to my Lip. She made me fome general Queftions .about my Country and my Travels, which Ianfwer'd as diftinctly and in as few Words as I could. She asked whether I would be content to live at Court. I bowed down to the board of the Table, and humbly anfwered that I was my Mafter's Slave, but if I were at my own Difpofal, I fhould

fhould be proud to devote my Life to her Majefty's Service. She then asked my Mafter whether he were willing to fell me at a good Price. He who apprehended I could not live a Month, was ready enough to part with me, and demanded a thoufand pieces of Gold, which were ordered him on the fpot, each piece being about the bignefs of eight hundred Moydores; but, allowing for the proportion of all Things between that Country and Europe, and the high price of Gold among them, was hardly fo great a fum as a thoufand Guineas would be in 'England. Mafter had not thought my Life in danger, her Majefty would not have got fo cheap a Bargain.: But as I was out of all fear of being ill treated under the Protection of fo great and good an Emprefs, the Ornament of Nature, the Darling of the World, the Delight of her Subjects, the Phoenix of the Creation; fo, I hoped my late Mafter's Apprehenfions would appear to be groundiefs, for I already found my Spirits to revive by the Influence of her moft Auguft Prefence.

This was the fum of my Speech, delivered with great Improprieties and Hefitation; the latter part was altogether framed in the Style peculiar to that People, whereof I learned fome Phrafes from Glumdalclitch, while the was carrying me to Court.

The Queen giving great Allowance for my Defectivenefs in fpeaking, was however furprifed at fo much Wit and good Senfe in fo diminutive an Animal. She

to think that I might be an Embrio, or dbottive BItth: But this Opinion' das rejected by the other two, who obrerved my Limbs to be perfeet and finifhedj and that I had lived feveral Years, as it was manifeft fromi my Beard, the Stumps whereof they plainly difcovered through a Magnifying-Glafs. They wouldwer allow me to be a Dwaff, becaure my Eittleners ${ }^{\circ}$ was beyond ${ }^{\prime}$ all Degrees of Compatifon ; for the Queen's favourrice Dwarf, the fmalleft ever known in that Kingedom, was near thity Foot high: Aftep mueh Debate, they coricluded uffarintfonifly that I was only Reppaim Scalcath;" which is interpeted literaths, Lutfits' Naztufie; a Determinination exactly agreeable to the modern Philofophy of Europe, whofe Profeflots, difdaining the old Evafion of bccult Caufes, whereby the Followers' of Ariftotle endeavour in valn to difgtiffe their Ignorance, have invented thils wonderfin Solution of all Difficulties, to the unfpeakable Advancement of human Knowledge.

After this: decifive Coprclufion, I entreated to be heard a Word or two I applied my: felf to the King; and affured His Majefty that I came from a Copuntry which abounded with feveral Millions of both Sexes, and of my own Stature; whan the Animals, Trees and Houfes were all in Proportion, and where by confequence I might be as able to defend my felf, and to find Suftenance, 26 any of his Majefty's Subjects could do here; which I took for a full Anfwer to thofe Gentlemens Arguments. To this they only replied with a Smile of Cons tempt, faying, That the Farmer had inftrueted me very well in my Lefion. The Room was quileat pan all Sides, as well as ithe: Floor and the Cieling, to prevent :any Accidpppt from the Carelefriefs of thofe who xat ried-me, and to break the Forcen of folt when I went in a Coach. Ido. fired a Lock for my Door, to provant Rats and Mice from: coming int: The Smich, after feverati Atrenipts, made the fratlen that over whs feom among them, for 1 h hawe known a larger at the Cate of 'z Gentleman's Houft in Exglaxd! 1 -made a fift to ketp the key in a Focket of my own, fidaning Guinsduteltch minghtlofe it: The queen like-

wife ordered the thinnet: Staks that colid be gotten, to make me Cloaths, not much thicker than an Englifh Blanket, very cumberfome till H was accuftomed to them. They were after the Fafhion of the Kingdom, partly refembling the Perfian, and partly the Cbinefe, and are a very grave and decent Habit.
"The Queen' became ré fond of my Company; that fhe could not dine withoit me. I had a Table placed upon the fame af which her Majefty eat, juft at her Heft Etbow; and a Chair to fie ons Glundaleliteb ftood upon: a Stool on the Floor, near my Table, te aflit and fake care of me. I had an entize Set of fit ver Difhes and Plates, and otherinecef. faries, Whích in Proportion to thafe of the Queen, were not much bfgger thah what I have feen of the fante kind iaria Lomdon Toy-fhop, for the Furnitute of a Baby-houft: Thefe mytittle:Nonfe kept in lier Focket, in a filver Box, and gave 'tre at Meals as'I wanted them, ali E 4

staxs gleaning them par felf. No Per fon dinied with the Rucen but the two Princeffes: Royal, theq elder fixteen Yeaps old, and the youngenfat that time thirtecp godia Month. Hes, Majefty ufed to put 2. Bit of Meat upon one of my Difhes, gut! of which I capved for my felf; and her Diverfion was tg, fee me fat in Miniature. For the Queen (who had indeed
 Mouthful, as much as a dozen Englis Farmers could eatatia Meal, which to za, was for fome time a very naufeous fight.? She would craunch the Wing of 9i: Lask, Bones and all, between her. Zhaath, although it were nine times as lage as that of a fyll grown Turkey; ayso put a Bit, Rf , Byend in her Mouth,

$\therefore$ IT is the Cuftom that every Wednefday, (which, as I have before obferved, was their Sabbath) the King and Queen, , with the Royal :Iffue of both Sexes, dine together in the Apartment of his Majefty, to:whom I was now become:a great Favourite;; and at there times my , little Chair and Table were placed at his left Hand, before one of the Saltfellers. This Prince took a Pleafure in converfing with me, enquiring into the Manners, Religion, Laws, Government, and Learning of Europe; , wherein I gave him the beft Acsount I was able. His Apprehenfion was fo clear, and his Judgment fo exact, that he made very wife Reflexions and Obfervations upon all I faid.- But ${ }_{2}$ I confefs, that: after I 4

had been a bittle too copious in. talking of my mwn beloved Connafy, of our "Trade, and Wars by Sea and Land; of our Schifms in Religion, and Parties in the State; the Prejudices of his Education prevailed fo far, that he could net forbear taking me up in his RightHand, and Nioaking me gently with the other, after an hearty Fit of laughing, asked me whether I were a Whig or a Tory. Then turning to his firft Minifter, who waited behind him with a white Staff near as tall as the Main-maft of the Royal Soveraigh, fie obferved how contemptible a lthing was human Grandeur, which could be mimicked by fich diminutive Infects as I : And yet, faid he, I dare engage, thefe Cteatures: have their Titles and Diftinations of Honour, they contrive little Nefts and Burrows, that they call Houfes and Cities; they make a Figure in Drefs and Equipage; they love, they fight, they difpute, they cheat, they batray. For, after having been accuftomed foreral Months to the Sight and Converfe of this People, and obferved every Objeat upon which I caft mine Eyes, to be of propoitionable Magnitude; the Horror 1 bad firt conceived from their Bulk and Afpeet, was fo far worn off, that ifithad then beheld a Company of Englith Lords and Ladies in their Finery add Birth-day Cloaths, afting their feverat Parts in the mof courtly mainer, of frutting, and bowing, and prating ; to ray the Truth, I hould have been fronglytempted to laugh as much
at them as the King and, his, Grandeos did at me. Neither indeod could 1 forbear fmiling at my ,felf, is when the Queen ufed to place mie upon'her. Hand towards a Looking-glafey bj iwhich both our Perfons appeared before me in full View together; and there could nothing be more ridiculous than the Comparifon: So that I really began to imagine my felf dwindled many Degrees below.my ufual Size.

Nothing angred and mortified me fo much as the Queen's Dwarf, who being of the loweft Stature that was ever. in that Country (for I verily think he was not full thirty Foot high) became infolent at feeing a Creature fo much beneath him, that he would always affect. to fwagger and look big as he paffed by me in the Queen's Anti-chamber, while I was ftanding on fome Table talking with the Lords or Ladies of the Court, and he feldom failed of a fmall. Word or two upon my Littlenefs; againft which

which I cojld only revenge my felf by calling him Brother, challenging him to wreftle, and fuch Repartees as are ufual in the Mouths of Court Pages. One Day at Dinner this malicious little Cubb was fo nettled with fomething I had faid to him, that raifing himfelf upon the Frame of her Majefty's Chair, he took me up by the Middle, as I was fitting down, not thinking any harm, and let me drop into a large filver Bowl of Cream, and then ran away as faft as he could. I fell over Head and Ears, and if 1 had not been a good Swimmer, it might have gone very hard with me; for Glumdalclitch in that Infant happened to be at the other End of the Room, and the Queen was in fuch, al Fright that fhe wanted Prefence of Mind to affift me. But my little Narfe ran to, my Relief, andtook me out, after I had fyqullowed above a Quart of Cream. Inemember one Morning whenGlusisdaleliteh had fet me in my Box up-: on 2 Window, as the ufually did in fair Days to give me Air (for I durft not venture to let the Box be hung on a Nail out. of the Window, as we do with Cages in England) after I had lifted up one of my Safhes, and fat down at my Table to eat a piece of Sweet Cake for my Breakfaft, above twenty Wafps, allured by the fmell, came flying into the Room, humming louder than the Drones of as many Bagpipes. Some of them feized my Cake, and carried it piece-meal aways, others flew about my Head and Face, confounding me with the Noife, and putting me in the utmoft terror of their Stings. However I had the Courage to rife and draw my Hanger, and attack them in the Air. I difpatched four of them, but the reft got away, and I prefently fhut my Window. Thefe Creatures were as large as Partridges, I took out thẹir. Stings, found them an Inch and a half long, and as Part II. F $\quad$ fharp

 Chap. IV.

The Country defcribed. A Propofal for correcting modern Maps. The King's Palace, and fome Account of the 'Metropolis. The Author's way of tra. velling. The chief Temple defcribed.


NOW intend to give the Reader a fhort Defcription ofthis Country, as far as I travelled in it, which was not above two thoufand Miles round Lorbrulgrud the Metropolis. For, the Queen, whom I always attended, never went further when the accompanied the King in his Progreffes, and there flaid till his Majefty returned from viewing his Frontiers. : The whole Extent of this Prince's Dominions reacheth about fix thoufand Miles in Length, and from three to five in Breadth. From whence I cannot but conclude that our Geographers of Europe are in a great Error, by fuppofing F 2 nothing

nothing but Sea between fapan and California; for it was ever my Opinion, that there muft be a Balance of Earth to counterpoife the great Continent of Tartaxy $;$ and therefore they ought to corred their Maps and Charts, by joining this vaft Trach of Land to the North weft Parts of America, wherein I hall be ready to lend them my Affiftance: :

Thé Kingdom is a Peninfula, terminated to the North-eaft by a Ridge of Mountains thirty Miles high, which are altogether impaffable by reafon of the Volcanoes upon the Tops. Neither do the moft Learned know what fort of Mortals inhabit beyond thofe Mountains, or whether they be inhabited at all. On the three other Sides it is bounded by the Ocean. There is not one Seaport in the whole Kingdom, and thore Parts of the Coafts into which the Rivers iffuc are fo full of pointed Rocks, and the Sea generally fo rough, that there is no venturing with the imalleft of their

Boats,

Boats; fo that thefe Beople are wholly excluded from any Commerce with the reft of the World. But the large Rivers are fall of Veffels, and abound with excellent Fifh; for they feldom get any from the Sea, becaufe the Sea-fin are of the fame Size with thofe in Europe, and confequently not worth catching : whereby it is manifeft, that Nature in the Production of Plants and Animals of for extraordinary a Bulk is wholly confined to this Continent, of which 1 leave the Realons to be determined by Philofo? phers. However, now and then they take a Whale that happens to be daffed againft the Rocks, which the common Pcople feed on heartily. There Whales I have known fo large that a Man could hardly carry one upon his Shoulders;; and fometimes for Curiofity they are brought in Hampers to Lorbrulgrid: I law one of them in a Difh at the King's Table, which paffed for a Rarity, tut I did not obferve he was fond of it ; for I think indeed we Bignefs difgaifted him, alF 3 though
though I have feen one fomewhat larger in Greenland.

The Country is well inhabited, for it contains fifty one Cities, near an hundred walled Towns, and a great num. ber of Villages. To fatisfy my curious Reader, it may be fufficient to defcribe Lorbrulgrud. This City ftands upon almoft two equal Parts on each fide the River that paffes through. It contains above eighty thoufand Houfes, and about fix hundred thoufand Inhabitants. It is in Length three Glonglungs (which make aboat fifty four Englifh Miles) and two and a half in Breadth, as I meafured it my felf in the Royal Map made by the King's Order, which was laid on the Ground on purpore for me, and extended an hundred Feet; I paced the Diameter and Circumference feveral times barefoot, and computing by the Scale, meafured it pretty exactly.

The King's Palace is no regular Edifice,

fice, but an heap of Buildings about feven Miles round: The chief Rooms aro generally two hundred and forty Foot high, and broad and long in Proportion. A Coach was allowed to Glumdalclitch and .me, wherein her Governefs frequently took her out to fee the Town, or go among the Shops; and I was always of the Party, carried in my Box ; although the Girl at my own Defire would often take me out, and hold me in her Hand, that I might more conveniently. view the Houfes and the People, as we paffed along the Streets. I reckoned our Coach to be about a Square of Weftminfter.Hall, but not altogether fo high ; however. I cannot be very exact. One Day the Governefs ordered our Coach. man to fop at feveral Shops, where the Beggars watching their Opportunity, crouded to the fides of the Coach, and gave me the moft horrible Spectacles that ever an Englifh Eye beheld. There was a Woman with a Cancer in her Breaft, fwelled to a monftrous fize, full of Holes, $\mathrm{F}_{4}$ in

in two or three of which I could have eafily crept, and covered my whole Body. There was a Fellow with a Wen in his Neck, targer than five Woolpacks, and another with a couple of wooden Legs, each about twenty Foot high. But, the moft hateful Sight of all was the Lice crawling on their Cloaths. I could fee diftinctly the Limbs of thefe Vermin with - my naked Eye, much better than thofe of an Earopean Loufe through a Microfcope, and their Snouts with which they rooted like Swine. They were the firt I had ever beheld, and I hhould have been curious enough to deffect one of them, if I had proper Inftruments (which I unluckily left behind me in the Ship) although indeed the Sight was fo naufeous, that it perfectly turned my Stomach.

BESIDE the large Box in which I was ufually carried, the Queen ordered a fmaller one to be made for me, of about twelve Foot fquare, and ten high, for the Convenience of Travelling, becpufe the other

other was fomewhat too large for Glumdalclitcth's Lap, and camberfom in the Coach; it was made by the fame Artift, whom I directed in the whole Contrivance. This travelling Clofet was an exatt Square with a Window in the middie of three of the Squares, and eacli Window was latticed with Iron Wire on the outfide, to prevent Accidents in long Journeys. On the fourth fide, which had no Window, two fttong Staples were fixed, through which the Perfon that carried me, when I had a mind to be on Horfeback, put in a Leatherr Belt, and buckled itabout his Wafte. This was always the Office of fome grave trufty Servant in whom I could confide, whether I attended the King and Queen in their Progreffes, or were difpored to fee the Gardens, or pay a wifit to fome great Lady or Minitter of State in the Court, when Glumdalclitch happened to be out of Order: For I foon began to be known and efteemed among the greatef Officers, $\ddagger$ fuppore more upon Account of their Majefty's

Majefty's Favour than any Merit of my own. In Journeys, when I was weary of the Coach, a Servant on Horfeback would buckle my Box, and place it on 2 Culhion before him; and there I had a full Profpeat of the Country on three Sides from my three Windows. I had in this Clofet a Field-Bed and a Hammock hung from the Cieling, two Chairs and a Table, neatly frewed to the Floor, to prevent being toffed about by the Agitation of the Horfe or the Coach. And having been long ufed to Sea-Voyages, thofe Motions, although fometimes very violent, did not much difcompofe me.

Whenever Ihad a mind to fee the Town, it was always in my TravellingClofet, which Glumdalclitch held in her Lap in a kind of open Sedan, after the Fathion of the Country, born by four Men, and attended by two others in the Queen's Livery. The People who had often heard of me, were very curious to croud about the Sedan, and the Girl was complaifant

plaifant enough to make the Bearers ftop, and to take me in her Hand that I might be more conveniently feen.

I was very defirous to fee the chief Temple, and particularly the Tower belonging to 'it, which is reckoned the higheft in the Kingdom. Accordingly one Day my Nurfe carried me thither, but I may truly fay I came back difappointed; for, the height is not above three thoufand Foot, and reckoning from the Ground to the higheft Pinnacle top; which allowing for the difference between the fize of thofe People, and us in Europe, is no great matter for Admiration, nor at all equal in Proportion, (if I rightly remember) to Salisbury Steeple. But, not to detract from a Nation to which during my Life I fhall acknowledge my felf extremely obliged, it muft be allowed that whatever this famous Tower wants in Height is amply made up in Beauty and Strength. For the Walls are near an hundred Foot thick, built of hewn Stone, whereof

whereof each is about forty Foot fquare, and adorned on all fides with Statues of Gods and Emperors cut in Marble larger than the Life, placed in their feveral Nich. es. I meafured a little Finger which had fallen down from one of there Statues, and lay unperceived among fome Rubbifh, and found it exactly four Foot and an lach in length. Glumdalclitch wrapped it up in an Handkerchief, and carricd it home in her Pocket to keep among other Trinkets, of which the Girl was very fond, as Children at her Age ufuadly are.

The King's Kitchen is indeed a noble Building, vaulted at top, and about fix bundred Foot high. The great Oven is not to wide by ten Paces as the Cupola at St . Paul's : For I meafured the latter on purpofe after my Rerurn. But if I thould defcribe the Kitchen-grate, the prodigious Pots and Kettles, the joints of Meat turning on the Spits, with many other Particulars, perhaps I hoould be
hardly

hardly believed; at leaft a fevere Critick would be apt to think I enlarged a little, as Travellers ate often fufpected to do. To avoid which cenfure, I fear I have run too much into the other extream ; and that iffethis Treatife fhould happen to be tranflated into the Language of Brabdingmag, (which is the general name of that Kingdom) and tranfmitted thither, the King and his People would have reafon to complain that I had done them in In: jury by a falfe and diminutive Reprefentation.

His Majefty feldom keeps above fix hun: dred Horres in his Stables: They are generally from fifty four to fixty Foot high. But when he goes absoad on folemn Days, he is attended for State by a Militia Guard of five hundred Horfe; which indeed I thought was the moll fplendid Sight that could be ever beheld, till I faw part of his Army in Battalia; whereof I thall find another occafion to fpeak.

Several Adventures that bappened to the Author. The Execution of a Criminal. The Autbor Sbews bis Skill in Navigation.
 Should have lived happy enough in that Country, if my Littlenefs had not expofed me to reveral ridiculous and troublefome Accidents: fome of which I hall ventire to relate. Glumdalclitch often carried me into the Gardens of the Court in my fmaller Box, and would fometimes take me out of it and hold me in her Hand, or fet me down to walk. I remember, before the Dwarf left the Queen, he followed us one Day into thofe Gardens, and my Nurfe having fet me down, he and I being clofe together, near fome Dwarf Apple trees, I mult need thew my Wit

by a filly Allufion between him and the Trees, which happens to hold in their Language as it doth in ours. Whereupon, the malicious Rogue watching his Opportunity, when I was walking under one of them, fhook it directly over my Head, by which a dozen Apples, each of them near as large as a Briftol Barrel, came tumbling about my Ears; one of them hit me on the Back as I chanced to floop, and knocked me down flat on my Face, but I received no other hurt, and the Dwarf was pardoned at my $\mathrm{D}_{\mathrm{e}}$ fire, becaufe I had given the Provocation.

Anoterer day Glumdalclitch left me on a fmooth Grafs-plot to divert my felf while the walked at fome diftance with her Governefs. In the mean time there fuddenly fell fuch a violent Thower of Hail, that I was immediately by the force of it fruck to the Ground : And when I was down, the Hail-fones gave me fuch cruel Bangs all over the Body

Body, as if I had been pelted with Tennis balls; however I made a hift to creep on all four, and thelter my relf by lying flat on my Face on the Leefide of a Border of Lemon Thyme, but fo bruifed from Head to Foot that I could not go abroad in ten Days. Neither is this at all to be wondered at, becaufe Nature in that Country oblesving the fame Proportion thro' all her Operations, a Hail-ftone is near cighteen hundred times as large as one in Europe, which I can affert upon Experience, having been fo curious to weigh and meafure them.

But, a more dangerous Aecident happened to me in the famre Garden, when my little Nurfe believing the had put me in a fecure Place, which I often entreated her to do, that I might enjoy my own Thoughts, and having left my Box at home to avoid the Trouble of carrying it, went to another part of the Gardens with her Governefs and fome Ladies

of her Acquaintance. While fhe was abfent, and out of hearing, a fmall white Spaniel belonging to one of the chief Gardeners, having got by Accident into the Garden, happened to range near the Place where I lay: The Dog following the Scent, came directly up, and taking me in his Mouth, ran ftrait to his Mafter, wagging his Tail, and fet me gently on the Ground. ${ }^{\text {By }}$ good Fortune he had been fo well taught, that I was carried between his Teeth without the leaft Hurt, or even tearing my Clothes. But the poor Gardener, who knew me well; and had a great Kindnefs for me, was in a terrible Fright: He gently took me up in both his Hands, and asked me how I did; but I was fo amazed, and out of Breath, that I could not fipeak a Word. In a few Minutes I came to my felf, and he carried me fafe to my little Nurfe, who by this Time had returned to the Place where fhe lett me, and was in cruel Agonies when I did not appear, nor anfwer when fhe called: She feverely repriPart II. G manded

manded the Gardiner on Account of his Dog. But the Thing was hulhed up, and never known at Court, for the Girl was afraid of the Queen's Anger, and truly as to my felf, I thought it would not be for my Reputation that fuch a Story fhould go about.

This Äccident abfolutely determi: ned Glumdalclitcchnever to truit me abroad for the future out of her Sight. I had been long afraid of this Refolution, and therefore conocaled from her fome little unlucky. Adventures that happened in thofe Times when I was left by my felf. Once a Kite hovering over the Garden made a Sțoop at me, and if I had not refolutely drawn my Hanger, and run under a thick Efpalier, he would have certainly carried me away in his Talons. Another Time walking to the Top of a frefh Mole-hill, I fell to my Neck in the Hole, through which that Animal had caft up the Earth, and coined fome Lie, not worth remembring, to excufe my

felf for fpoiling my Clothes. I likewife' broke my right Shin againft the Shell of a Snail, which I happened to ftumble. over, as I was walking alone, and thinking on poor England.

I cannot tell whether I were more pleafed or mortified, to obferve in thofe folitary Walks, that the fmaller Birds did not appear to be at all afraid of me, but would hop about within a Yard diftance, Fooking for Worms, and other Food, with. as much Indifference and Security, as if no Creature at all were near them. $\mathbf{I}$ remember, a Thrufh had the Confidence. . to fnatch out of my Hand, with his Bill, a Piece of Cake that Glumdalclitch had juft given me for my Breakfaft. When I attempted to catch any of thefe Birds, they would boldly turn againft me, endeavouring to pick my Fingers, which I durft not venture within their Reach; and then they would turn back unconcerned, to hunt for Worms or Snails, as they did before. But one Day I took G 2
a thick

 'AVoxice: toa thick Cudgel, and threw it with all my Strength fo luckily at a Linnet, that I $k_{\text {nocked }}$ him down, and feizing him by ${ }^{\boldsymbol{t}}$ he Neck with borh my Hands, ran with him in Triumph to my Nurfe. However, the Bird, who had only been ftunned, recovering himfelf, gave me fo many Boxes with his Wings on both Sides of my Head and Body, though I held him at Arms length, and was out of the Reach of his Claws, that I was twenty Times thinking to let him go. But I was foon relieved by one of our Servants, who wrung off the Bird's Neck, and I had him next Day for Dinner, by the Queen's Command. This Linnet, as near as I can remember, feemed to be fomewhat larger than an Englijb Swan.

The Maids of Honour often invited Glumdalclitch to their Apartments, and defired fhe would bring me along with her, on purpofe to have the Pleafure of feeing and touching me. They would often ftrip me naked from Top to Toe, and

and lay me at full length in their Bofoms; wherewith I was much difgufted; becaufe, to fay the Truth, a very offenfive Smell came from their Skins; which I do not mention or intend to the Difadvantage of thofe excellent Ladies, for whom I have all manner of Refpect; but, I conceive that my Senfe was more acute in Proportion to my Littlenefs, and that thofe illuftrious Perfon's were no more difagreeable to their Lovers, or to each other, than People of the fome Quality are with us in England. And, after all, I found their natural Smell was much more fupportable than when they ufed Perfumes, under which I immediately fwooned away. I cannot forget that an intimate Friend of mine in Lilliput. took the Freedom in a warm Day, when I had ufed a good deal of Exercife, to complain of a ftrong Smell about me, although I am as little faulty that way as moft of my Sex: But I fuppofe his Faculty of Smelling was as nice with regard to me, as mine was to that of this People. Upr

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on this Point, I cannot forbear doing Juftice to the Queen my Miftrefs, and Glumdalclitch my Nurfe, whofe Perfons were as fwest as thofe of any Lady in England.

That which gave me moft Uneafie nefs among thefe Maids of Honour, when my Nurfe carried me to vifit them; was to fee them ufe me without any manner of Ceremony, like a Creature who had no fort of Confequence. For, they would ftrip themfelves to the Skin, and put on their Smocks in my Prefence, while I was placed on their Toylet directly before their naked Bodies, which; I am fure, to me was very far from being a tempting Sight, or from giving me any other Emotions than thofe of Horror and Difguft. Their Skins appeared fo coarle and uneven, fo varioully coloured, when I faw them near, with a Mole here and there as broad as a Trencher, and Hairs hanging frobat it thicker than Pack-threads, to
fay

fay nothing further concerning the reft of their Perfons. Neither did they at all fcruple while I was by to difcharge what they had drunk, to the Quantity of at leaft two Hogheads, in a Veffel that held above three Tuns. The handfomeft among thefe Maids of Honoun, 2 pleafant frolickfome Girl of Sixteen, would fometimes fet me aftride upon one of her Nipples, with many other Tricks, wherein the Reader will excufe me for not being over particular. But I was fo much difpleafeds that I intreated Glumdalclitch to contrive fome Excufe for not fecing that young Lady any more.

One Day, a young Gentleman, who was Nephew to my Nurfe's Governefs, came and preffed them both to fee an Execution. It was of a Man who had murdered one of that Gentleman's intimate Acquaintance. Glumdalclitch was prevailed on to be of the Company, very much againt her Inclination, for fhe was

 $A \mathrm{Vofaceto}$naturally tender-hearted: And, as for my felf, athough I abhorred fuch kind of Spectacles, yet my Curiofity tempted me to fee fomething that I thought muft be extraordinary. The Malefactor was fixed in a Chair upon a Scaffold erected for the Purpofe, and his Head cut off at a Blow with 2 Sword of about forty Foot long. The Veins and Arteries fpouted up fuch a prodigious Quantity of Blood, and fo high in the Air, that the great 7 fett d'eau at Verfailles was not equal, for the Time it lafted; and the Head, when it fell on the Scaffold-Floor, gave fuch a Bounce, as made me ftart, although I were at leaft half an Englifb Mile diftant.

The Queen, who often ufed to hear me talk of my Sea-Voyages, and took all Occafions to divert me when I was melancholy, asked me whether I underftood how to handle a Sail, or an Oar, and whether a little Exercife of Rowing might not be convenient for my Healch. I anfwered

anfwered, that I underfood both very well: For although my proper Employment had been to be Surgeon or Doctor to the Ship, yet often, upon a Pinch, I was forced to work like a common Mariner But I could not fee how this could be done in their Country, where the fmalleft Wherry was equal to a Firt-rate Man of War among us, and fuch a Boat as I could manage would never live in any of their Rivers. Her Majefty faid, if I would contrive a Boat, her own Joiner fhould make it, and fhe would provide a Place for me to fail in. The Fellow was an ingenious Workman, and, by my Inftructions, in ten Days finifhed a Pleafure-Boat, with all its Tackling, able conveniently to hold eight Europeans. When it was finifhed, the Queen was fo delighted, that fhe ran with it in her Lap to the King, who ordered it to be put in a Ciftern full of Water, with me in it, by Way of Tryal; where I could not managemy two Sculls, pr little Oars, for want of Room, But the

the Queer had before contrived anothar Project. She ordered the Joiner to make a wooden Trough of three hun: dred Foot long, fifty broad, and eight deep; which being well pitched to prevent leaking was placed on the Floor along the Wall, in an onter Room of the Palacer: It had a Cock near the Bottom to tet out the Water when it began to grow ftale, and two Servants could eafily fill it in half an Hour. Here I ofven ufed to row for my own Diverfion, as well as that of the Queen and her Ladies', who thoughat themfelves well entertained with my Skill and Agility. Somotimes I would put up my Sail, and then my Bufinefs was only to fteer, while the Ladies gave me a Gale with their Fans; and when they were weary, fome of the Pages would blow my Sail forward with their Breath, while I fhewed my Art by fteering Starboard or Larboard, as I pleafed. When I had done, Glumdalelittb always carried back my Boat into her Clofet, and hung it on a Nail to dry.

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I $N$ this Exercife I once met an $A C$. cident which had like to bave coft me my Life: For, one of the Pages having put my Boat into the Trough, the Governefs, who attended Gbwondalclitch, very officioully lifted me up to place me in the Boat, but I happened to flip through her Fingers, and fhould have infallibly fallen down forty Foot upon the Floor, if by the luckieft Chance in the World, I had not been ftopp'd by a Corking-pia that ftuck in the good Gentlewoman's * Stomacher ; the Head of the: Pin paffed between my Shirt and the Waift-band of my Breeches, and thus I was held by the Middle in the Air till Glumdalclitch ran to my Relief.

Another. Time, one of the Sert vants, whofe Office it was to fill my Trough every third Day with frefh Wa. ter, was fo carelefs to let a huge Frog (not perceiving it) flip out of his Pail. The, Frog lay concealed till I was put into

into my Boat, but then feeing a refting Place, climbed up, and made it lean fo much on one Side, that I was forced to balance it with all my Weight on the other, to prevent overturning. When the Frog was got in, it hopped at once half the Length of the Boat, and then over my Head, backwards and forwards, dawbing my Face and Clothos with its odious Slime. The Largenefs of its Features made it appear the molt deformed Animal that can be conceived. However, I defired Glumdalclitch to let me deal with it alone. I banged it a good while with one of my Sculls, and at laft forced it to leap out of the Boat.

But, the greateft Danger I ever underwent in that Kingdom, was from a Monkey, who belonged to one of the Clerks of the Kitchen. Glumdalclitch had locked me up in her Clofet, while fhe went fomewhere upon Bulinefs, or a Vifit. The Weather being very warm, the Clofet-Window was left open, as well

well as the Windows and the Door of my bigger Box, in. which I ufually lived, becaufe of its Largenefs and Conveniency. A s I fat quietly meditating at my Table, I heard fomething bounce in at the Clofet-Window, and skip about from one Side to the other; whereat, although I were much alarmed, yet I ventured to look out, but not ftirring from my. Seat; and then 1 faw this this frolickfome Animal, frisking and leaping up and down, till at laft he came to my Box, which he feemed to view with great Pleafure and Curiofity, peeping in at the Door and every Window. I retreated to the farther Corner of my Room, or Box, but the Monkey looking in at every Side, put me into fuch a Fright, that I wanted Prefence of Mind to conceal my felf under the Bed, as I might eafily have done. After fome Time fpent in peeping, grinning, and chattering, he at laft efpied me, and reaching one of his Paws in at the Door, as a Cat does when fhe plays with

a Moure, although I ofven ifhifted Place to avoid him, he at Length caught hold of the Lappor of my Coat, (which being made of that Countfy Cloth, was very thick and ftrong,) and dragged me out. He took me up in his right Fore-foot, and held me as a Nuife does a Child fhe is going to fuckle, juft as I have feen the fame fort of Creature do with a Kitten in : Exrope: And when I offered to ftruggle, he fqueezed me fo hard; that I thought it more prudent to fubmit. I have good Reafon to believe that hetook me for a young one of his own Species, by his often ftomaking my Face very gently with his ocher Paw'. In thefe Diverfiens he was intertupted .by a Noife at the: Clofet Door, as 'if fome Body were opening it; whereupon he fuddenly leaped up to the Window; at which he had come in, and thence upon the Leads and Gutters; walking upon three Legs, and holding me in the fourth, till he clamber'di up tóa Roof that was next to ours. \I heard Glumdalciltch givea Shreek

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at the Monent he was carrying me out, The poorGirl was almoft diftracted: That Quarter of the Palace was all in-an uproar, the Servants ran for Ladders ; the Monkey was feen by hundrods in the Court, fitting upon: the Ridge of a Building holding me like a Baby in one of his Fore-paws, and feeding me with the other, by cramming; into my Mouth dome Victuals he had fqueezed out of the Rag on one Side of his Chaps, rand patting me when I would not eat; whereat many of the Rabtlle below could not forbear laughing; neither do I think they jutdy ought to the blamed, for without Queftion the Sight was ridiculous enough to every Body'but my felf. Some of the People threvv iup Stoines, hoping to drive dre:Monkey'down; but this was frrietly forbidden, or elfe very probably my Brains had beer dafhed out.

The Ladders were now applied, and mounted by feveral. Men, which the Monkey obferving, and finding himfelf almoft

moft encompaffed; not being able to make Speed enough with his three Legs, let me drop on a Ridge-Tyle, and made his Eicape. Herel fat for fome Time three hundred Yards from the Ground, expecting every Moment to be blown down by the Wind, or to fall by my own Giddinefs, and come tumbling over and over from the Ridge to the Eves: But an honeft Lad, one of my Nurfe's Foormen, climbed up, and, putting me into his Breeches-Pocket, brought me down fafe.

I was almoft choaked with the filthy Stuff the Monkey had crammed down my Throat; but my dear little Nurfe picked it out of my Mouth with a friall Needle, and then I fell a vomiting, which gave me great Relief. Yet I was fo weak, and bruifed in the Sides, with the Squeezes given me by this odious Animal, that I was forced to keep my Bed a Fortnight. The King, Queen, and all the Court, fent every Day to enquire after my Healch, and her Majefty made

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made me feveral Vifits during my Sicknefs. The Monkey was killed, and an Order made that no fuch Animal fhould be kept about the Palace.
~- When I attended the King after my Recover, to return him Thanks for his Favours, he was pleafed to rally me a good deal upon this Adventure. He asked me what my Thoughts and Speculations were while I lay in the Monkey's Paw; how I liked the Vituuals he gave the $;:$ his manner of Feeding; and :whether the frefh Air on the Roof had - fharpen'd my Stomach. He defired to know what I would have done upon fuch an Occafion in my own Country. I told his Majefty, that in Europe we had no .Monkeys, except fuch as were brought for Curiofities from other Places, and fo fmall, that I could deal with a Dozen of them together, if they prefumed to attack me. And as for that monftrous Animal with whom I was fo lately engaged, (it was indeed large

[^3] ping my Hand upon the Hilt as I fpoke,) when he poked his Paw into my Chamber, perhaps I fhould have given him fuch a Wound, as would have, made him glad to withdraw it with more hafte than he put it in. This I delivered in a firm Tone, like a Perfon who was jealous left his Honour fhould be called in queftion. However, my Speech produced nothing elfe befides a loud Laughter, which all the Reipect due to his Majefty from thofe about him could not make them contain. This made me rellect how vain an Attempt it is for a Man to endeavour doing himfelf Honour among thote who are out of 'all Degree of Equality or Comparifon with him. And yet I have fien the Moral of my own Behaviour very frequent in England fince my Return, where a little contemptible Varlet, without the leaft Title to Birth, Perfon, Wit, or common Senfe, fhall prefume

fume to look with Importance, and pur himfelf upon a Foot with the greateft Perfons of the Kingdom.

I was every Day furnihing the Court with fome ridiculous Story; and Glumdalclitch, alchough the loved me to Excefs, yet was arch enough to inform the Queen, whenever I committed any Folly that fhe thought would be diverting to her Majefty. The Girl who had been out of Order, was carried by hier Governefs to take the Air about an Hour's Diftance, or thirty Miles from Town. They alighted out of the Coach near a frall Foot-path in a Field, and Glumdalclitch fetting down my travelling Box, I went out of it to walk. There was a Cow-Dung in the Rath, and I muit needs try my Artivity by attempting to leap over ir. I took a Run, but unfortunately jumped fhort, and iound my felf jult in the Middle up to my Knees. I waded through with fome-Difficulty, and one of the Footmen wiped me as clean H 2 confined me to my Box till we returned home; where the Queen was foon informed of what had paffed, and the Footmen fpread it about the Court; fo that all the Mirth, for fome Days; was at my Expence.

Several.Contrivances of the Autbor to pleafe the King and Queen. He fbews bis Skill in Mufick. The King enquires into the State of Europe, which the Autbar relates to bim. The King's Obfervations thereon.


USED to attend the King's Levee once or twice a Week, and hạd often feen him under the Barber's Hand, which indeed was at firft very terrible to behold : For the Razor was almof twice as long as an ordinary Scythe. His Majefty, according to the Cuftom of the Country, was only fhaved twice a Week. I once prevailed on the Barber to give me fome of the Suds or Lather, out of which I picked forty or fifty of the ftrongef Stumps of Hair. I then took a Piece of fine H3 Wood,

Wood, and cut it like the Back of a Comb, making feveral Holes in it at equal Diftance with as fmall a Needle as I could get from Glumdalelitch. I fixed in the Stumps fo artificially, fcraping and floping them with my Knife towards the Points, that I made a very tolerable Comb; which was a feafonable Supply, my own being fo much broken in the Teeth, that it was almoft uffelefs: Neither did I know any Artift in that Country fo nice and exact, as would under. take to make me another.

And this puts me in Mind of an Amufement whereitr I feent many of my, leifure Hours. I defired the Queen's Woman to fave for me the Combings of her Majefty's Hath, whetrof in Time I got a good Quantity,' and econfulting with my Friend the Cabliet-Mater, who had received generial Orders to do little Jobbs for me, I directed him to make two Chair-Frames, no larger than thofe I had in my-Box, and then to bore lit-

tle Holes with a fine Awl round thofe Parts where I defigned the Backs and Seats; through thefe Holes I wove the ftrongeft Hairs I could pick out, juft af. ter the manner of Cane-Chairs in England. When they were finifhed, I made a Prefent of them to her Majefty, who kept them in her Cabinet, and ufed to fhew them for Curiofities, as indeed they were the Wonder of every one that beheld them. The Queen would have had me fit upon one of thefe Chairs, but I abfolutely ${ }^{\text {' refufed to }}$ obey her, protefting I would rather die a thoufand Deaths than place a difhonourable Part of my Body on thofe precious Hairs that once adorned her Majefty's Head. Of thefe Hairs (as I had always a mechanical Genius) I likewife made a neat little Purfe about five Foot long, with her Majefty's Name decyphered in Gold Letters, which I gave to Glumdalclitch, by the Queen's Confent. To fay the Truth, it was more for Shew than Ufe, being not of frength to bear the Weight $\mathrm{H}_{4}$ of

of the larger Coins, and therefore the kept nothing in it, but fome little Toys that Girls are fond of.

Tне King, who delighted in Mufick, had frequent Conforts at Court, to which I was fometimes carried, and fet in my Box on a Table to hear them : But, the Noife was fo great, that I could hardly diftinguifh the Tunes. Iam confident that all the Drums and Trumpets of a Royal Army, beating and fcunding together juft at your Earss could not equal it. My Practice was to have my Box removed from the Places where the Performers fat, as far as I could, then to thut the Doors and Windows of it, and draw the Window-Cuitains; after which I found their Mufick not difagreeable.
Imad learned in my Youth to play a little upon the Spinet. Glamdáalitch kept one in her Chamber, and a Matter attended twice a Week to teach her: I call it a Spinet, becaufe it fomewhat refembled that Inftrument, and was play'd. upọ

upon in the fame Manner. - A fancy: came into my Head that I would entertain the King and Queen with an $E n-$ : glijb Tune upon this Inftrument. But. this appeared extremely difficult: For, the Spinet was near fixty Foot long, each Key being almoft a Foot wide for that, with my Arms extended, I could not reach to above five Keys, and to prefs them down required a good fmart Stroak with my Fift, which would be too great a Labour, and to no, Purpafe. The Method I contrived was this. I prepared two round Sticks about the Bignefs of common Cudgels; they were thicker at one End than the other, and I covered the thicker Ends with a Piece of a Moufe's Skin, that by rapping on them, I might neither damage the Tops of the Keys, nor interrupt the Sound. Before the Spinet a Bench was placed about four Foot below the Keys, and I was put upon the Bench. I ran fideling upon it that Way and this, as faft as I could, banging the proper Keys with

my two Sticks, and made a Shift to play a Jigg, to the great Satisfaetion of boththeir Majefties: But it was the moft viotent Exercife I ever underwent, and yet I coutd not ftrike above fixteen Keys, nor, confequently, play the Bals and Treble rogether, as other Artifs do; which was a great Difadvantage to my Performance.

Tha King, who, as I before obferved, was a Prince of excellent Underftanding, would frequently order thawI hould be brought in my Box, and fet upon the Table in his Clofet: He would then command me to bring one of my Chairs out of the Box, and fit down within three Yards Diftance upon the Top of the Cabinet, which brought me almoft to a level with his Face. In this Manner I had feveral Converfations with him. I one Day took the Freedom to tell his Majefty, that the Contempt he difcovered towards Europe, and the reft of the World, did not feem anfwerable to thofe excellent

 excellent Quatities of the Mind he was Mafter of. That Reafon did not extend it felf with the Bulk of the Body: On the contrary, we obferved in our Country, that the talleft Perfons were ufually leaft provided with it. That among other Animals, Bees and Ants had the Reputation of more Induftry, Art, and Sagacity, than many of the larger Kinds; and that, as inconfiderable as he to k me to be, I hoped I might live to do his Majefty fome fignal Service. The King heard me with Attention, and began to conceive a much better Opinion of me than he had ever before. He defired I would give him as exact and Account of the Government of Engyand, as I poffibly could; becaure, as fond as Princes commonly are of their own Cuftoms, (for fo he conjectured of other Monarchs by my former Difeourfes,) he fhould be glad to hear of any Thing that might deferve Imitation.Imagine iththy felf, eourteous Reader,

Reader, how often I then wihhed for the Tongue of Demofthenes or Cicero, that might have enabled me to celebrate the Praile of my own dear native Country in a Stile equal to its Merits and $\mathrm{Fe}-$ licity.

I beigan my Difcourfe by informing his Majefty that our Dominions confifted of two Illands, which compofed three mighyy Kingdoms under one Sovercign, befides our Plantations in Ame: vica. I dwelt long upon the Fertility of our Soil, and the Temperature of our Climate.: I then fpoke at large upon the Conftitution of an Englijb Parliament, partly made up of an illuftrious Body called the Houfe of Peers, Perfons of the nobleft Blood, and of the moft ánciènt and ample Patrimonies. I defreribed that extraordinary Care alMays taken of their Education in Arts and Arms to qualify them for being Counfellors born to the King and Kingdom; to have a Sharein the Legillature;

to be Members of the higheft Court of Judicature, from whence there could be no Appeal ; and to be Champions always ready for the Defence of their Prince and Country, by their Valour, Conduct and Fidelity. . That thefe were the Ornament and Bulwark of the Kingdom, worthy Followers of their moft renowned Anceftors, whofe Honour had been the Reward of their Virtue, from which their Pofterity were never once known to degenerate. To thefe were joined feveral holy Perfons, as part of that Affembly, under the Title of Bihops, - whofe peculiar Bufinefs it is to take care of Religion, and of thofe who inftruct the People therein. Thefe were fearched, and fought out, through the whole Nation, by the Prince and his wifeft Counfellors, among fuch of the Priefthood as were moft defervedly diftinguifhed by the Sanctity of their Lives, and the Depth of their Erudition, who were indeed the fpiritual Fathers of the Clergy and the People.

That

That, the other Part of the Parliament confilted of an Affembly called the Houfe of Commons, who were all principal Gentlemen, freely pickod and culled out by the People themfelves, for their great Abilities and Love of their Country, to reprefent the Wifdom of the whole Nation. And thefe two Bodies make up the moft augult Affembly in Europe, to whom, in Conjunction with the Prince, the whole Legillature is committed.

Ithen defcended to the Courts of Juftice, over which the Judges, thofe venerable Sages and Interpreters of the Law prefided, for determining the difputed Rights and Properties of Men, as well as for the Punifhment of Vice, and Protection of Innocence. I mentioned the prudent Management of our Treafury, the Valour and Atchievements of our Forces by Sea and Land. I computed the Number of our People, by reckoning how

how many Millions there might be of each religious Sect, or political Party among us. I did not omit even our Sports and Paftimes, or any other Particular which I thought might redound to the Honour of my Country. And I finifhed all with a brief hiftorical Account of Affairs and Events in England for about an hundred Years paft.

This Converfation was not ended under five Audiences, each of feveral Hours, and the King heard the whole with great Attention, frequently taking Notes of what I fpoke, as well as Memorandums of all Queftions he intended to ask me.

When I had put an End to thefe long Difcourfes, his Majefty in a fixth Audience confulting his Notes, propofed many Doubts, Queries, and Objections, upon every Article. He asked what Methods were ufed to cultivate the Minds and Bodies of our young No-
bility,

bility, and in what kind of Bufinefs they commonly fpent the firf and teachable Paft of their Lives. What Courfe was taken to fupply that Affembly when any noble Family became extinct. What Qualifications were neceffary in thofe who are to be created new Lords: Whether the Humour of the Prince; a Sum of Money to a Court-Lady, or a Prime Minifter, or a Defign of ffrengthening a Party oppofite to the publick Intereft, ever happened to be Motives in thofe Advancements. What Share of Knowledge thefe Lords hadin the Laws of their Country, and how they came by it, fo as to enable them to decide the Properties of their Fellow -Subjects in the lait Refort. Whether they were always fo free from Avarice, Partialities, or Want, that a Bribe, or fome other finifter View, could have no Place among them. Whether thofe holy Lords I fpoke of were always promoted to that Rank upon account of their Knowledge in religious Matters, and the Sanctity of their Lives, had

had never been Compliers with the Times while they were common Priefts, or flàvifh proftitute Chaplains to fome Nobleman, whofe Opinions they continued fervilely to follow after they were admitted into that Affembly.

He:then defired to know what Arts were practifed in electing thofe whom I called Commoners: Whether a Stranger with a ftrong Purfe might not influence the vulgar Voters to chufe him before their own Landlord, or the mof confiderable Gentleman in the Neigh-: bourhood. How it came to pafs, that People were fo violently bent upongetting into this Affembly, which I allowed to be a great Trouble and Expence, often to the Ruin of their Families, without any Salary or Penfion : Becaufe this appeared fuch an exalted Strain of Virtue and publick Spirit, that his Majefty feemed to doubt it might poffibly not be always fincere: And he defired to know whether fuch zealous Gentlemen

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could

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could have any Views of refunding themfelves for the Charges and Trouble they were at, by facrificing the publick Good to the Defigns of a weate and vicious Prince in Conjunction with a corrupted Miniftry. He multiplied his Queftions, and fifted me thoroughly upon every Part. of this Head, propofing numberlefs Enquiries and Objections, which I think it not prudent or convenient to repeat.
U. pon what I faid in relation to our Courts of Juftice, his Majefty defired to be fatisfied in feveral Points: And, this I was the better able to do, having boen formerly almoft ruined by a long Suit in the Chancery, which was decreed for me with Cofts. He asked, what Time was ufially fpent in determining between Right and Wrong, and what Degree of Expence. Whether Advocates and Orators had Liberty to plead in Caufes manifeftly known to be unjuft, vexatious, or oppreffive. Whether Party' in

in Religion ot Politicks were obferved to be of any Weight in the Scale of Juftice. Whether thole ploading Orators were Petfons educated in the general Knowledge of Equity, or only in provincial, national, and other local Cuftoms. Whether they or their Judges had any Part in penning thofe Laws which they affiumed the Liberty of interpreting and gloffing upon at their Pleafure. Whether they had ever at different Times pleaded for and againft the fame Caufe; and cited Precedents to prove contrary Opinions. Whether they were a rich or a poor Corporation. Whether they received any pecuniary Reward for pleading or delivering their Opinions. And particularly, whether they were ever admitted as Members in the lower Senate:

He fell next upon the Management of our Treafury, and faid, he thought my Memory had failed me, becaufe I computed our Taxes at about five or fix Millions a Year, and when I came to mention the

Iflues, he found they fometimes amounted to more than double; for the Notes he had taken were very particular in this Point, becaufe he hoped, as he told me, that the Knowledge of our Conduct might be ufeful to him, and he could not be deceived in his Calculations. But, it . what I told him were true, he was ftill at a Lofshow a Kingdom could rin out of its Eftate like a private Perfon. He ask-" ed me, who were our Creditors; and where we fhould find Money to pay them. He wonder'd to hear me talk of fuch chargeable and extenfivie, Wars; that certainly we mult be a quatrelfome Peo-' ple, or live among very bád Něighbonts, and that our Generals mut ne neds be richer than our Kings. He asked what Bufinefs we had out of our own Illands, unlefs upon the Score of Trade or Treaty, or to defend the Coafts with our Fleet. Above all, he was amazed to hear me talk of a mercenary ftanding Army in the midft of Peace, and among a free People. He faid, if we were governed by,

by our own Confent in the Perfons of our Reprefentatives, he could not imagine of whom we were afraid, or againft whom we were to fight, and would hear my Opinion, whether a private Man's Houfe might not better bo defended by himfelf, his Children, and Family, thian by half a dozen Rafceals picked up at a venture in the Stree'ts, for frall Wages; who miglt get an hundred times more by clitting their Throats.

He laughed at my odd Kind of Arithmetick (as he was pleafed to call it) in reckoning the Numbers of our People by a Computation drawn from the feveral Seits among us in Religion and Politicks. He faid, he knew no Reáfon, why thore who entertain Opinions prejudicial to the Publick, fhould be obliged to change, or fhould not $b_{c}$ obliged to conceal them. And as it was Tyranny in any Government to require the firt, fo it was Weaknefs 'not

to enforce the' fecond: For a Man may be allowed to keep Poifons in his Clofer, but not to vend them about for Cordials.
$\mathrm{H}_{\mathrm{E}}$ obferved, that among the Diverfions of our Nobility and Gentry, I had mêntioned Gaming. He defired to know at what Age this Entertainment was ufually taken up, and wher it was laid down ; how much of their Time it employed; whether it ever went fo high as to affect their Fortunes: Whether mean viciouṣ People, by their Dexterity in that Art, might not arrive at great Riches, and fometimes keep out very Nobles in Dependance, as well as habituate them to vile Companions, wholly take them from the Improve: ment of their Minds, and force them, by the Loffes they have weceived, to learn and practife that infampus Derterity upon others.

He was perfectly aftonifhed with the hiftorica!

hiftorical Account I gave him of otr Affairs during the laft Century, protefting it was only an Heap of Confpiracies, Rebellions, Murders, Maffacres, Revolutions, Banifhments, the very worf Effects that Avarice, Faction, Hypocrify, Perfidioufnefs, Cruelty, Rage, Madnefs, Hatred, Envy, Luft, Malice, or Ambition, could produce.

Hhs Majefty in another Audience was at the Pains to recapitulate the Sum of all I had fpoken, compared the Queftions he made with the Anfwers I had given; then taking meinto his Hands, and ftroaking me gently, delivered himifelf in thele Words, which I fhall never forget, nor the Manner he fpoke them in : My little Friend Grildrig, you have made a moft admirable Panegyrick upon your Country: You have clearly proved that Ignorance, Idenefs and Vice may be fometimes the only Ingredients for qualifying a Legillator: That Laws are beft explained, interpreted, and applied
by thofe whofe Intereft and Abilities lic in perverting, confounding, and eluding them. I obferve among you fome Lines of an Inftitution, which in its .Original might have been tolerable, but theie half erazed, and the reft wholly blurred and blotted by Corruptions It doth not appear from all you have faid, how any one Virtue is required towards the Procurement of any one Station among you, much lefs that Men were ennobled on - Account of their Yirtue, that Priefts were advanced for their Piety or Learning, Soldiers for their Conduct or Valour, Judges for their Integrity, Senators for the Love of their Country, or Counfellors for their Wifdom. As for yourfelf, (continued the King,) who have Spent the greateft Part of your Life in Travelling, I am well difpofed to hope you may hitherto have efcaped many Vices of your Country. But by what I have gathered from your own Relation, and the Anfwers I have with much Pains wringed and extorted from. you, I cannat but

but conclude the Bulk of your Natives to be the moft pernicious Race of little odious Vermin that Nature ever fuffered to crawl upon the Surface of the Earth.

The Autbor's Love of bis Country. He makes a Propofal of much Advantage to the King, robich is rejected. The King's great Ignorance in Politicks. The Learning of that Country very imperfect and confined. Their Lawes, and military Affairs, and Parties in the State.

Othing but ancextreme Love of Truth could have hinder'd me from concealing this Part of my Story. It was in vain to difcover my Refentments, which were always turn-ed into Ridicule; and I was forced to reft with Patience while my noble and moft beloved Country was fo injurioully treated. I am heartily forry as any of my Readers can poffibly be; that fuch an Occafion was given: But this Prince happen-

happened to be fo curious and inquifitive upon every Particular, that it could not confift either with Gratitude orgood Manners to refufe giving him what Satisfaction I was able. Yet thus much I may be allowed to fay in my own Vindication, that I artfully eluded many of his Queftions, and gave to every Point a more favourable Turn by many Degrees than the Strictnefs of Truth would allow. For I have always borne that laudable Partiality to my own Country, which Dionysus Halicarnafenfis with fo much Juftice recommends to an Hiftorian: I would hide the Frailties and Deformities of my Political Mother, and place her Virtues and Beauties in the moft advantageous Light. This was my fincere Endeavour in thofe many Difcourfes I had with that Monarch, although it $\mu$ nfortunately failed of Succefs,

But great Allowances fhould be giyen to a King who lives wholly fecluded from the reft of the World, and mult there:

therefore be altogether unacquainted with the Manners and Cuftoms that moft prevail in other Nations: The want of which Knowledge will ever produce many Prejudices, and a certain Narrownefs of Thinking; from which we and the politer Countries of Europe are wholly exempted. And it would be hard, in--deed, if fo remote a Prince's Notions : of Virtue and Vice were to be offered -as a Standard for all Mankind.

To confirm what I have now faid, and further, to fhew the miferable Effects of a confined Education, I fhall here in'fert a Paffage which will hardly obtain Belief. In hopes to ingratiate my felf farther into his Majeft's Favour, I told him of an Invention difiovered between three and four hundred Years ago, to make a certain Powder, into an Heap of which the fmalleft Spark of Fire falling, would kindle the whote in a Moment, although it were as big as a Mountain, and make it all fly up in the Air together,

together, with a Noife and Agitation. greater than Thunder. . That a proper: Quantity of this Powder rammed into an hollow Tube of Brafs or Iron, accor-: ding to its Bignefs, would drive a Ball of Iron or Lead with fuch Violence and, Spéed, as nothing was able to fuftain its. Force. That the largeft Balls thus difcharged, would not only deftroy whole Ranks of an Army atonce, but batter the ftrongeft Walls to the Ground, fink down Ships, with a Thoufand Men in each, to the Bottom of the Sea; and, when linked together by a Chain, would cut through Mâts and Rigging, divide hundreds of Bodies in the Middle, and lay: all wafte before them. That we often put this Powder into large hollow Balls of Iron, and difcharged them by an Engine iato fome City we were befieging, which would rip up the Pavements, tear the Houfes to pieces, burft and throw Splinters on every Side, da!hing out the Brains of all who came near. That I knew the Ingredients very well, which

were cheap, and common; I underitood the Manner of compounding them, and could direat his Workmen how to malte thofe Tubes of a Size proportionable to all other Things in his Majefty's King. dom, and the largeft need net be above an hundred Foot long; twenty or thirty of which Tubes, charged with the proper Quantity of Powder and Balls, would bat= ter down the Walls of the ftrongeft Town in his Dominions in a few Hours, or defroy the whole Metropolis, if ever it hould pretend to difpute his abfolute Commands. This I humbly offered to his Majefty as a fmall Tribute of Acknowledg: mentin Return of fo many Marks that 1 had received of his Royal Favour and Protection.

The King was ftruck with Horror at the Defcription I had given of thofe terrible Engines, and the Propofal I had made. He was amazed how fo impotent and groveling an Infeet as I thefe were his Expreffions) could entertain fuch inhuman Ideas, and in fo familiar a man:

a manner as to appear wholly unmoved at all the Scenes of Blood and Defolation, wfich I had painted as the common Effects of thofe deftructive Machines, whereof he faid, fome evil Genius, Enemy to Mankind, muft have been the firf Contriver. As for himfelf, he protefted, that although few Things delighted him fo much as new Difcoveries in Art or in Nature, yet he would rather lofe half his Kingdom than be privy to fuch a Secret, which he commanded me, as I valued my Liff, never to mention any more.

A strange Effect of narrow Principles and Jort Views! that a Prince poffeffed of every Quality which procures Veneration, Love, and Efteem; of ftrong Parts, great Wifdom, and profound Learning, endued with admirable Talents for Government, and almoft adored by his Subjects, fhould from a nice unneceffary Scruple, whereof in Europe we can have no Conception, let lip an Opportunity put

put intohis Hands, that would havemade him abfolute Mafter of the Lives, the Liberties, and the Fortunes of his People. Neither do I fay this with the leaft Intention to detract from the many Virtues of that excellent King, whofe Character I am fenfible, will, on this Account, be very much leffened in the Opinion of an Englifh Reader: But I take this Defect among them to have rifen from their Ignorance, they not having hitherto reduced Politicks into a Science, as the more acute Wits of Europe have done. For I remember very well, in a Difcourfe one Day with the King, when I happened to fay there were feveral thoufand Books among us written upon the Art of Government, it gave him (directly contrary to my Intention) a very mean Opinion of our Underftandings. He profeffed both to abominate and defpife all Myflery, Refinement, and Intrigue, either in a Prince or a Minifter. He could not tell what I meant by Se erets of State, where an Enemy or fome

rival Nation were not in the Cafe. He confined the Knowledge of Governint within very narrowe Bounds, to common Senfe and Reafon, to Juftice and Lenity, to the fpeedy Determination of civil and criminal Caufes; with' Some other obyious Tópicks which are hot worth conflidering. And, he gave it for his Opinion, that whoever could make two Ears of Corn, or two Blades of Graifs, to grow upon a Spot of Ground where only one grew before, would deferve: better of Mankind, and do more effential Service to his Country than the whole Race of Politicians put together.

The Learning of this People is very. defective, cońfifting only in Morality, Hiftory, Poetry, and Mathematicks; wherein they muft be allowed to excel. But, the laft of there is wholly applied to what may be ufferl in' Life, to the' Improvetrent of Agricultare and all mechanical Arts; fo that aftiong us it would be fittle effeemed, And as to Ideas, Entities, Ab"PRTII. K fractions
fraction and Tranfcendentals; I could never drive the deaft Conception into their Heads.

No Law of that Country muft exceed in Words the Number of Letters in their Alphabet, which confilts only in two and twenty; But, indeed, few of them extend even to that Length. They are expreffed in the molt plain and fimple Terms, wherein thofe People are not mercurial enough to difcover above one Interpretation: And to write a Comment upon any Law is a capital Crime. As to the Decifion of civil Caufes, or Proceedings againit Criminals, their Precedents are fo few, that they have lietle Reafon to boat of any extfaordinary Skill in either.

Tн е: have bad the Art of Printing, 2s well as the CbinefQ, Time qut of mind: But their Libraries iarennot verv large'; for that of the Kings which is reckoned the biggefts doth not amount f 9

 above a thoufand Volumes, placed in a Gallery of twelve hundred Foot long, from whence I had Liberty to borrow what Books I pleafed. The Queen's Joiner had contrived in one of Glumdalclitch's Rooms a kind of wooden Machine five and twenty Foot high, formed like a ftanding Ladder, the Steps were each fifty Foot long: It was indeed a moveable Pair of Stairs, the loweft End placed at ten Foot Diftance from the Wall of the Chamber. The Book I had a mind to read was put up leaning againft the Wall: I firt mounted to the upper Step of the Ladder, and turning my Face towards the Book, began at the Top of the Page, and fo walking to the Right and Leftabouteightorten Paces, according to the Length of the Lines, till I had gotten a little below the Level of mine Eyes, and then defcending gradually till I came to the Bottom: After which I mounted again, and began the other Page in the fame manner, and fo turned over the Leaf, which I couldK ${ }^{2}$
eafily

eafily do with both my Hands, for it was as thick and ftiff as a Pafte-board, and in the largeft Folio's not above eighteen or twenty Foot long.

Therr Stile is clear, mâculine, and fmooth, but not florid, for they avoid niothing more than multiplying unneceffary Words, or ufing vatious Expreffions. I have perufed many of their Books, efpecially thofe in Hiftory atid Morality. Among the refl I was much diverted with a little old Treatife, which always lay in Glumdalclitch's Bed-Chamber, and belonged to her Góvernêf, a grave elderly Gentlewoman, who dealt in Writings of Morality and Devotion. The Book treats of the Weaknefs of Human Kind, and is in little Efteem, except among the Women and the Vulgar. However, I was curious to fee what an Author of that Country could fay upon fuch a Sobject. This Writer went through all the ufual Topicks of European Moralifts, fhewing how diminutive,

 nutive, contemptible, and helplefs an Animal was Man in his own Nature; how unable to defend himelf from Inclemencies of the Air, or the Fury of wild Beafts: How much he was excels led by one Creature in Strength, by another in Speed, by a third in Forefight, by a fourth in Induftry $y_{t i}$ He added, that Nature was degenerated in thefe latter declining Ages of the world, and could now produce only fmall abortive Bitths in comparion of thole, in ancient Times. He faid, it was very reafonable to think, not only that the Species of Man were originally much larger, but alfo, that there mult hàve been Giants in former Ages, which, as it is afferted by Hiftory and Tradition, fo it hath been confirmed by huge Boass-and Skulls cafually dug up in feveral Parts of the Kingdom, far exceeding the common dwindled Race of Man in our Daỳs. Hè argued, that the very Laws of Nature abfolutely required we fhould haye been made in the Beginning, of a Size more K 3 large

 large and robuff, not fo liable to Deftruction from every little Accident of a Tile falling from an Houre, or a Stone caft from the Hand of a Boy, or of being drowned in a little Brook. From this way of Reafoning, the Author drew feveral moral Applications ufeful in the Conduct of Life, but needlefs here to repeat. For my own part, I could not avoid reflecting how univerfally this Ta lent was fread, of drawing Lectures in Morality, or, indeed, rather Matter of Difcontent and Repining, from the Quarrels we raife with Nature. And, I believe, upon a ffrict Enquiry, thofe Quarrels might be fhewn as ill-grounded among us, as they are among that People.-As to their Military Affairs, they boaft that the King's Army confifts of an hundred and feventy fix thoufand Foot, and thirty two thouland Hore: If that may be called an Army which is made up of Tradefmen in the feveral Cities, and Farmers in the Country, whofe Commanders

manders are only the Nobility and Gentry, without Pay or Reward. They are, indeed, perfect enough in their Exercifes, and under very good Difcipline, wherein I faw no great Merit; for how fhould it be otherwife, where every Farmer is under the Command of his own Landlord, and every Citizen under that of the principal Men in his own City, chofen after the Manner of Verice by Ballot?

Ifaveoffen feen the Militia of Lorbriulgrud drawn out to exercife in a great Field near the City, of $t$ wenty Miles fquare. They were, in all, not above twenty five thoufand Foot, and fix thoufand Horfe; but it was impoffible for me to compute their Number, confidering the fpace of Ground they took up. A Cavalier mounted on a large Steed might be about an hundred Foot high. I havefeen this whole Body of Horfe, upon a Word of Command, draw their K 4 Swords

Swords at once, and brandifh them in the Air. Imagination can figure nothing To grand, fo furprifing, and fo aftonihing: It looked as if ten thouland Flafhes of Lightning were darting at the fame Time from every Quarter of the Sky.

I was curious to know how this Prince, to whofe Dominions there is no Accefs from any other Country; came to think of Armies, or to teach his People the Practice of military Difcipline. But I was foon informed, both by Converfation, and reading their Hiftories: For, in the Courle of many Ages they have been troubled with the fame Difeafe to which fo many other Governments are fubjet: ; the Nubility often con"tending for Power, the People for Liberty, and the King for abfolute Dominion. All which, however happily tempered by the Laws of the Kingdom, have been fometimes yiolated by each of the three Parties, and have once or more occafioned

$$ occafioned Civil Wars; the laft whereof was happily putan End to by this Prince's Grandfather by a general Compofition; and the Militia, then fettled with common Confent, hath been ever fince kept in the ftricteft Duty.

HAD always a ffrong Impulfe that I fhould fome Time recover my Liberty, though it was impoffible to conjecture by what Means, or to form any Project with the leaft Hope of fucceeding. The Ship in which I failed was the firft ever known to be driven within Sight of that Coaft, and the King had given ftrict Orders, that if at any time another appeared, it fhould be taken afhore, and, with all its Crew and Paffengers, brought in a Tumbril to Lorbrulgrud. He was ftrongly bent to get me a Woman of my own Size,

by whom 1 might propagate the Breed But, 1 think, I fhould rather have died than undergone the Difgrace of leaving ${ }^{2}$ Pofterity to be kept in. Cages like tame Canary Birds, and perlaps, in Time, foll about the Kinddom to Perfons of Quality for Curiofities. I was, indeed, treated with much Kindnefs: 1 was the Favourite of a great King and Queen, and the Delight of the whole Court, but it was upon fuch ${ }^{2}$ Foot as ill became the Dignity of Human Kind. Icould never forget thofe domeftick Pledges 1 had left behind me. I wanted to be among People with whom I could converfe upon even Térms, and walk about the Streets and Fields without Fear of being trod to Death like a Frog or a young Puppy. But my Deliverance came fooner than I expected, and, in a Manner, not very common: The whole Story and Circumftances of which, I fhall faithfully relate.

# Ihad now been two Years in this Country;

Country; and, about the Beginning of the third, Glumdalclitch and I attended the King and Queen in a Progrefs to the South Coaft of the Kingdom. I was carried, as ufual, in my Travelling-Box, which, as Ihave already defcribed, was a very convenient Clofet of twelve Foot wide, And I had ordered a Hammock to be fixed, by filken Ropes, from the four Corners at the Top, to break the Jolss, when a Servant carried me before him on Horfeback, as I fometimes ${ }^{\circ} \mathrm{d}$ fired, and wquld often neep in my hian. mock while we were upan the Road On the Roof of my Clofer, not direct ly over the Middle of the Hammock T ordered the Joyner to cut out a Hole of a Foot fquare, to give me Air in hof Weather, as'I flept; which Hole I hut, at Pleafure, with a Boatd that drew back wards and forwards through a Groovés.

- WHEN we came to our Journey's Enai' the King thought proper to pafs a few Days at a Palace he hath near Flanfaffic, a City

a City within eighteen Englifb Miles of the Sea-fide. Glumdalclitctb and I were much fatigued; I had gotten a fmall Cold, but the poor Girl, was fo. ill as to be confined to her Chamber. I longed to fee the Ocean, which muft be: the only Scene of my Efcape, if ever it: Thould happen. I pretended to be worle: than I really was, and defired Leave.to take the frefh Air of the Sea, with a Page whom I was very fond of, and who had fometimes been trufted with me. I Shall never forget with what Unwillingnefs, Glumdalclitch confented, nor the Atrict Charge fhe gave the Page to be careful of me, burfting at the fame Time into a Flood of Tears, as if the had fome Foreboding of what was to happen. The Boy took me out in my Box about half an Hours Walk from the Palace towards the Rocks on the Sea-fhore. I ordered him to fet me down, and lifting up one of my Salhes, caft many a witful melancholy Look towards the Sea. I found my ferf not very well, and told the Page that

that $I$ had a Mind to take a Nap in my
Hammock, which I hoped would do me good. I got in, and the poy thut the Window clofe down to keep out the cold. I foon fell afleep, and all I caf conjecture is, that white I flept, the Page thinking no Danger could happen, went among the Rocks to look for Bird's Eggs, having before obferved him fith my Window fearching about, and picking up one or two in the Clefts. Be that as it will, I found" my"felf fuddenty awaked with a violent Pull upon the Ring which was faftned at the Top of my Box for the Conveniency of Carriage. "I L d my Box raifed very high in the Air, and then born forward with prodigipus Speed. The firft Jolt had like to have fhake me out of my Hammock, but afterwards the Motion was eafy enough. 1 called out feveral Times, as loud as I could raite my Voice, but all to no Purpofe. I look ed towards my Windows, and could fee nothing but the Clouds and Sky. I heard a. Noife juft over my Head like the clap ping

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ping of Wings, and then began to perceive the woful Condition I was in, that fome Eagle had got the Ring of my Box in his Beak, with an Intent to let it fall on a Rock like a Tortoife in a Shell, and then pick out my Body, and devour it. For the Sagacity and Smell of this Bird enable him to difcover his Quarry at a great Diftance, though better concealed than I could be within a TwoInch Board.

In a litte Time I oblerved the Noire and Flatter of Wings to increafe very faft $_{\text {; }}$ and my Box was toffed upand dowh like a Sign-paft ina windy Day. I heard feveral, Bange or Buffets as I thought, given to the Eagle, (for fuch I am certain it mupu have beenthat held the Ring of my Box in hhis Beak, and then all on a fudden felt my felf falling perpendiculandy down for above a Minute, but with fuch incredibleS wiftnés that I almoft loft my Breath. My Fall was ftopped by 2 terrible Squafh, that founded louder to miné

mine Ears than the Cataratt of Niagara a; after which I was quite in the dark fot: anöther Minute, and then my Box began to rife fo high that I could fee Light from the Tops of my Windows. I now. perceived that I was fallen into the Sea: My Box, by the Weight of my Body, the Goods that were in, and the broad Plates, of Iron fixed for Strength at the four' Corners of the Top and Bottom, Hoated about five Foot deep in Water. I did then, and do now fuppofe that the Eagle which flew away with my Box was porfued by two or three others, and forced to let me drop while he was defending himfelf againft the reff, who hoped to thare in the Prey. The Plates of Iron faften'd at the Bottom of the Box, (for thofe were the ftrongeft,) preferved the Balance while it fell; and hinder'd it from being broken on the Surface of the Water. Every Joint of it was well grooved;' and the Door did not move on Hinges, but up and down like a Saft, which kept my Clofet to tight ethat verry little

Fittle Water came in. I got with much Difficulty out of my Hammock, having firft ventured to draw back the Slipboard on the Roof already mentioned; contrived on Purpofe to let in Air, for want of which I found my felf almoft ftifled.

How often did I then wihh my felf with my dear Glumdalcititch, from whom one fingle Hour had fo far divided me! And I may fay, with Truth, that in the midft of my own Misfortunes I could not forbear lamenting my poor Nurfe, the Grief fhe would fuffer for my Lofs, the Difpleafure of the Queen, and the Ruin of her Fortune. Perhaps many Travellers have not been under greater Difficulties and Diftrefs than I was at this Juncture, expecting every Moment to fee my Box dafhed in Pieces, or at leaft overfet by the firft violent Blaft, or a rifing Wave. A Breach in one fingle Pane of Glafs would have been immediate Death: Nor could any Thing have preferved the Partil. L Windows

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Windows but the frong Lettice-Wires placed on the out-fide againf Accidents in Travelling. I faw the Water ooze in at feveral Crannies, although the Leaks were not confiderable, and I endeavoured to ftop them as well as I could. I was not able to lift up the Roof of my Clofet, which otherwife I certainly fhould have done, and fate on the Top of it, where I might, at leaft, preferve my felf fome Hours longer than by being fhut up, as I may call it, in the Hold. Or if I efcaped thefe Dangers for a Day or two, what could I expect but a miferable Death of Cold and Hunger! I was four Hours under thefe Circumftances, expecting, and indeed wifhing, every Moment to be my laft.

I have already told the Reader, that there were two ftrong Staples fixed upon that Side of my Box which had no Window, and into which the Servant who ufed to carry me on horfeback would put a leathern Belt, and buckle it about his Wafte:

Being

Being in this difionfolate State, $I$ heard, $\&$ or at leaft thought, I heard fome kind of grating Noife on that Side of my Box where the Staples were fixed, and foon after I began to fancy that the Box was pulled, or towed along in the Sea; for I now and then felt a fort of tugging which made the Waves rife near the Tops of my Windows, leaving me almoft in the dark. This gave me fome faint Hopes of Relief, although I was not able to imagine how it could be brought about. I ventured to unfrew one of my Chairs, which were always faftned to the Floor; and having made a hard Shift to fcrew it down again directly under the flipping Board that I had lately opened, I mounted on the Chair, and, putting my Mouth as near as I could to the Hole, I called for Help in a loud Voice, and in all the Languages I underftood. I then faftned my Handkerchief to a Stick I ufually carried, and thrufting it up the Hole, waved it feveral Times in the Air, that if any Boat or Ship were near, the

Seamen might conjecture fome unhappy Mortal to be fhut up in this Box.

I found no Effect from all I could dod, but plainly perceived my Clofet to be moved along; and in the Space of an Hour, or better, that Side of the Box where the Staples were, and had no Window, ftruck againft fomething that was hard. I apprehended it to be a Rock, and found my felf tofled more than ever. I plainly heard a Noife upon the Cover of my Clofet, like that of a Cable, and the grating of it as it paffed through the Ring. I then found my felf hoilted up by Degrees, at leaft three Foot higher than I was before. Whereupon, I again thrult up my Stick and Handkerchief, calling for Help till I was aimoft hoarfe. In return to which, I heard a great Shout repeated three Times, giving me fuch Tranfports of Joy, as are not to be conceived but by thofe who feel them. I now heard a Trampling over my Head, and fomebody cal-

ling through the Hole with a loud Voice in the Englifb Tongue, If there be any Body below, let them fpeak. I anfwered, I was an Englijbman, drawn by ill Fortune into the greatef Calamity that ever any Creature underwent, and begged, by all that was moving, to be delivered out of the Dungeon I was in. The Voice replied, I was fafe, for my Box was faften'd to their Ship; and the Carpenter fhould immediately come, and faw an Hole in the Cover large enough to pull me out. I anfwered, that was needlefs, and would take up too much Time, for there was no more to be done, but let one of the Crew put his Finger into the Ring, and take the Box out of the Sea into the Ship, and fo into the Captain's Cabbin. Some of them upon hearing me talk fo wildly, thought I was mad ; others laughed; for indeed it never came into my Head that I was now got among People of my own Stature and Strength. The Carpenter came, and in a few Minutes fawL 3 ed

ed a Paffage about four Foot fquare, then let down 2 fmall Ladder, upon which I mounted, and from thence was taken into the Ship in a very weak Condition.

The Sailors were all in Amazement, and asked me a thoufand Queftions, which I had no Inclination to anfwer. I was equally confounded at the Sight of fo many Pigmies, for fuch I took them to be, after having fo long accuftomed mine Eyes to the monftrous Objects I had left. But the Captain, Mr. Thomas Wilcocks, an honeft worthy Sbropßire Man, obferving I was ready to faint, took me into his Cabbin, gave me a Cordial to comfort me, and made me turn in upon his own Bed, advifing me to take a little Reft, of which I had great Need. Before I went to fleep I gave him to underftand that I had fome valuable Furniture in my Box too good to be loft; a fine Hammock, an handfome FieldBed, two Cliairs, a Table, and a Cabinet:

That

That my Clofet was hung on all Sides, or rather quilted with Silk and Cotton: That if he would let one of the Crew bring my Clofet into his Cabbin, I would open it there before him, and fhew him my Goods. The Captain hearing me utter thefe Abfurdities, concluded I was raving: However, (I fuppofe to pacify me,) he promifed to give Order as I defired, and going upon Deck fent fome of his Men down into my Clofet, from whence (as I afterwards found) they drew up all my Goods, and ftripped off the Quilting ; but the Chairs, Cabinet and Bed-fted being fcrewed to the Floor, were much damaged by the Ignorance of the Seamen, who tore them up by Force. Then they knocked off fome of the Boards for the Ufe of the Ship, and when they had got all they had a mind for, let the Hulk drop.into the Sea, which by Reafon of many Breaches made in the Bottom and Sides, funk to righits. And indeed I was glad not to have been: a Spectator of the Havock they made; be-

caufe I am confident it would have fen, fibly touched me, by bringing former Paffages into my Mind, which I had rather forget.

I slept fome Hours, but perpetually difturbed with Dreams of the Place I had left, and the Dangers I had efcaped. However, upon waking I found my felf much recovered. It was now about eight a-Clock at Night, and the Captain ordered Supper immediately, thinking I bad already fafted too long. He entertained me with great Kindnefs, obferving me not to look wildly, or talk inconfiftently; and when we were left alone, defired I would give him a Relation of my Travels, and by what Accident I came to be fet adrift in that monftrous wooden Cheft. He faid, that about twelve a Clock at Noon, as he was looking through his Glafs, he fpied it at a Diftance, and thought it was a Sail, which he had a mind to make, being not much out of his Courfe, in

hopes of buying fome Bifcuit, his own beginning to fall fhort. That upon coming nearer, and finding his Error, he fent out his Long-Boat to difcover what I was; that his Men came back in a Fright, fwearing they had feen a fwimming Houfe. That he laughed at their Folly, and went himfelf in the Boat, ordering his Men to take a ftrong Cable along with them. That the Weather being calm, he rowed round me feveral times, obferved my Windows, and the Wire-Lattices that defended them. That he difcovered two Staples upon one Side, which was all of Boards, without any Paffage for Light. He then commanded his Men to row up to that Side, and faftening a Cable to one of the Staples, ordered them to tow my Cheft (as they called it) towards the Ship.? When it was there, he gave Directions to faften another Cable to the Ring fixed in the Cover, and to raife up my Cheft with Pullies, which all the Sailors were not able to do above two or three Foot. He faid,

faid, they faw my Stick and Handkerchief thruft out of the Hole, and concluded that fome unhappy Men muft be Shut up in the Cavity. I asked whether he or the Crew had feen any prodigious Birds in the Air about the Time he firft difcovered me. To which he anfwered, that difoourfing this Matter with the Sailors while I was alleep, one of them faid he had obferved three Eagles flying towards the North, but remarked nothing of their being larger than the ufual Size, which I fuppofe mult be imputed to the great Height they were at; and he could not guefs the Reafon of my Queftion. I then asked the Captain how far he reckoned we might be from Land; he faid, by the beft Computation he could make, we were at leaft an hundred Leagues. I affured him, that he muft be miftaken by almoft half, for 1 had not left the Country from whence I came above two Hours before I dropt into the Sea. Whereupon he began again to think that my Brain was difturb-

ed, of which he gave me a Hint, and advifed me to go to Bed in a Cabbin he had provided. I affured him I was well refrefhed with his good Entertainment and Company, and as much in my Senfes as ever I was in my Life. He then grew ferious, and defired to ask me freely whether I were not troubled in Mind by the Confcioufnefs of fome enormous Crime, for which I was punifhed at the Command of fome Prince, by expofing me in that Cheft, as great Criminals in other Countries have been forced to Sea in a leaky Veffel without Provifions: For although he fhould be forry to have taken fo ill a Man into his Ship, yet he would engage his Word to fet me fafe on Shore in the firft Port where we arrived. He added, that his Sufpicions were much increafed by fome very abfurd Speeches I had delivered at firft to the Sailors, and afterwards to himfelf, in Relation to my Clofet or Cheft, as well as by my odd Looks and Behaviour while I was at Supper.

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I begged his Patience to hear me tell my Story, which I faithfully did from the laft time I left England to the Moment he firft difoovered me. And as Truth always forceth its Way into rational Minds, fo this honeft worthy Gentleman, who had fome Tincture of Learning, and very good Senfe, was immediately convinced of my Candour and V eracity. But further to confirm all I had faid, I entreated him to give Order that my Cabinet fhould be brought, of which I had the Key in my Pocket, (for he had already informed me how the Seamen difpofed of my Clofet.) I opened it in his own Prefence, and fhewed him the fmall Collection of Rarities I made in the Country from whence I had been fo ftrangely delivered. There was the Comb I had contrived out of the Stumps of the King's Beard, and another of the fame Materials, but fixed into a Paring of her Majefty's Thumb-nail, which ferved for the Back. There was a Collection of Needles and Pins from a Foot

to half a Yard long: Four Wafp Stings, like Joiners Tacks: Some Combings of the Queen's Hair: A gold Ring which one Day fhe made me a Prefent of in a moft obliging Manner, taking it from her little Finger, and throwing it over my Head like a Collar. I defired the Captain would pleafe to accept this Ring, in Return of his Civilities, which he abfolutely refufed. I fhewed him a Corn that I had cut off with my own Hand, from a Maid of Honour's Toe, it was about the Bignefs of a Kentifh Pippin, and grown fo hard, that when I returned to England, I got it hollowed into a Cup, and fet in Silver. Laftly, I defired him to fee the Breeches I had then on, which were made of a Moufe's Skin.

I could force nothing on him but a Footman's Tooth, which I obferved him to examine with great Curiofity, and found he had a Fancy for it. He received it with Abundance of Thanks, more

more than fuch a Trifle could deferve.
It was drawn by an unskilful Surgeon in a Miftake from one of Glumdalclitch's Men, who was afflited with the Tooth-ach, but it was as found as any in his Head. I got it cleaned, and put it into my Cabinet. It was about a Foot long, and four Inches in Diameter.

The Captain was very well fatisfied with this plain Relation I had given him, and faid, he hoped when we returned to England, I would oblige the World by putting it in Paper, and making it publick. My Anfwer was, That I thought we were already over-ftocked with Books of Travels: That nothing could now pafs which was not extraordinary, wherein I doubted fome Authors lefs confulted Truth than their own Vanity, or Intereft, or the Diverfion of ignorant Readers. 'That my Story could contain little befides common Events, without thofe ornamental Defcriptions

of frrange Plants, Trees, Birds, and other Anlmals, or of the barbarous Cuftoms and Idolatry of favage People, with which moft Writers abound. Hewever, I thanked him for his good Opinion, and promifed to take the Matter into my Thoughts.

Hefaid, he wondered at one Thing very much, which was, to hear me fpeak fo loud, asking me whether the King or Queen of that Country were thick of Hearing. I told him, it was what I had been ufed to for above two Years paft; and that I admired as much at the Voices of him and his Men, who feemed to me only to whifper, and yet I could hear them well enough. But when I fpoke in that Country, it was like a Man talking in the Street to another looking out from the Top of a Steeple, unlefs when I was placed on a Table, or held in any Perfon's Hand. I told him, I had likewife obferved another Thing, that when I firf got into

160 $A \mathrm{Votace}$ tó into the Ship, and the Sailors frood all, abcut me, I thought they were the moft little contemptible Creatures I had ever beheld. For, indeed, while I was in that Prince's Country, I could never endure to look in a Glafs after mine Eyes had been accuftomed to fuch prodigious Objects, becaufe the Comparifon gave me fo defpicable a Conceit of my felf. The Captain faid, that while we were at Supper, he obferved me to look at every Thing with a fort of Wonder, and that I often feemed hardly able to contain my Laughter, which he knew not well how to take, but imputed it to fome Diforder in my Brain. I anfwered, it was very true; and I wondered how I could forbear, when I faw his Difhes of the Size of a filver Threepence, a Leg of Pork hardly a Mouthful, a Cup not fo big as a Nuthell; and fo I went on, defcribing the reft of his Houfhold-ftuff and Provifions after the fame Manner. For although the Queen had ordered a little Equipage of

all things neceffary while I was in her Service, yet my Ideas were wholly taken up with what I faw on every fide of me, and I winked at my own Littlenefs as People do at their own Faults. The Captain underftood my Raillery very well, and merrily replied with the old Englijh Proverb, that he doubted mine Eyes were bigger than my Belly, for he did not obferve my Stomach fo good, although I had fafted all Day ; and continuing in his Mirth, protefted he would have gladly given an hundred Pounds to have feen my Clofet in the Eagle's Bill, and afterwards in its fall from fo great an height into the Sea; which would certainly have been a moft aftonifhing Object, worthy to have the Defcription of it tranfmitted to future Ages: And the Comparifon of Phaeton was fo obvious, that he could not forbear applying it, although I did not much admire the Conceit.

> The Captain having been at Tonquin Partil. M
was in his return to England driven North eaftward to the Latitude of 44 Degrees, and of Longitude 143 . Bue meeting a Trade Wind two Days after I came on board him, we failed Southward a long time, and coanting Nere-Holland kept our Courfe Weft-fouth weft, and then South-fouth-weft till we doubled the Cape of Good-hope. Our Voyage was very profperous, but I hall not trouble the Reader with a Journal of it. The Captain called in at one or two Ports and fent in his Long-boat for Provifions and frelh Water, but I never went out of the Ship till we came into the Downs, which was on the 3d. Day of Fune 1706, about nine Months after my Efcape. I offered to leave my Goods in Security for Payment of my Freight; but the Captain protefted he would not receive one Farthing. We took kind leave of each other, anid I made him promife he would come to fee me at my Houle in Redriff. I hired a Horfe and Guide for five Shillings, which I borrowed of the Captain.

As I was on the Road, obferving the Littlenefs of the Houres, the Trees, the Cattle and the People, I began to think my-felf in Lilliput. I was afraid of trampling on every Traveller I met, and often called aloud to have them ftand out of the way, fo that I had like to have gotten one or two broken Heads for my Impertinence.

When I came to my own Houre, for which I was forced to enquire, one of the Servants opening the Door, I bent down to go in (like a Goofs under a Gate) for fear of Ariking my Head. My Wife ran out so embrace me, but I flooped lower than her Knees, thinking the could otherwife never be able to reach my Mouth. My Daughter kneeled to ask me Bleffing, but I could not fee her till fhe arofe, having been fo long ured to ftand with my Head and Eyes erect to above fixty Foot; and then I went to take her up with one Hand, by the Wafte. I
looked

looked down upon the Servants and one or two Friends who were in the Houfe, as if they had been Pigmies, and 1 a Giant. I told my Wife fhe had been too thrifty, for I found the had farved herfelf and her Daughter to nothing. In. fhort, I behaved my felf fo unaccountably, that they were all of the Captain's Opinion when he firt faw me, and concluded I had loft my Wits. This I mention as an Inftance of the great Power of Habit and Prejudice.

In a fittle time Iand my Family and Friends came to a right Underftanding: But my Wife protefted I hould never go to Sea any more ; although my evil Deftiny fo ordered that the had not Power to hinder me, as the Reader may know hereafter. In the mean time I here conclude the Second Part of my unfortunate Voyages.
