HOW INTERFAITH'S FAMILY PROMISE CHANGES LIVES

The young mother who came to Family Promise was highly motivated to achieve a better life for herself and her middle-school child. She and her child had been homeless for many weeks, couch-surfing here and there, landing wherever they could.

She came seeking what her old support systems had not been able provide: healthy community, positive connections, meals, mentorship. shelter, was seeking a path out of Interfaith poverty. and Family Promise of Whatcom County volunteers and donors provided it.

Today Ashley*, who was born and raised in Whatcom County, and her child are

at home in their own apartment. They have options and a future because of the stepping-stones that were offered to her while she was in Interfaith's Family Promise program.

How does Interfaith and Family Promise transform lives? Fifteen hundred volunteers and more than 600 donors make it possible. "We have a unique, dedicated volunteer base," said Carolyn Roy, program director of Family Promise of Whatcom County and Family Housing. "We reach out and ask, or volunteers tell us what they have to offer, and we match that with someone in need."

When a family enters Family Promise, they work with Case Manager Marikka Matheny to draft a plan, identifying steps toward independent living and goal setting. Weekly, they meet with Marikka, addressing accomplishments, roadblocks, and strategies. "Most stay until they achieve secure housing," Carolyn said. "With Covid, it's harder to get into housing. There's



not much available, and people aren't moving."

Carolyn and Marikka advocate for the families with landlords, employers, state agencies, the schools' homeless liaisons, Opportunity Council, Brigid Collins Family Support Center, and legal advocates. When it became clear Ashley needed transportation, Marikka helped her get a driver's license, and Carolyn rustled up a car: a volunteer's neighbor, Lennie Hawley, had a car to donate, and longtime Interfaith volunteer Rick Congdon detailed it, no charge.

All Family Promise families take the Whatcom Dream's 8-week course on financial literacy, and access Unity Care NW for health needs and parenting classes through Brigid Collins.

"For Ashley, we were able to identify an

apartment for her," Carolyn said. "We knew the landlord and learned an apartment

would soon be available, so she got her application in quickly." Family Promise's wrap-around care includes vouchers for furniture at Habitat for Humanity in Whatcom County, movein help, and household necessities via First Congregational Church of Bellingham's Fresh Start program.

"When people donate, when they provide time or a hot meal or

groceries or a car, it all adds up," Carolyn said. "When volunteers put together groceries or craft supplies, or they read stories and do songs via Zoom for the little ones, that's creating community for people who are isolated or estranged from their own families.

"If our families lack relationships, our volunteers can provide that."



GIVING FOR THE FUTURE

Interfaith Coalition helps homeless families in Whatcom County get out of poverty and into homes – and stay there. Our niche is keeping families together, children with their parents, which often isn't the case with other shelter models. We provide homes for families in Ferndale and Blaine, where options for families experiencing homeslessness are scarce. Additionally, we provide emergency shelter through our Family Promise program.

Throughout the years, donors have used planned giving to provide Interfaith with stable funding in the future.
