GRANTMAKING

The Korean American Community Foundation of San Francisco was founded by 13 Korean women as one of the only community foundations of its kind to build linguistically-specific and culturally- sensitive services for Korean and AAPI communities. In its eight years, KACF-SF has made \$2.7 million in grants to 40 nonprofits and community-based organizations to address our most pressing needs including mental health, senior care, domestic violence, civic engagement and youth empowerment.



MENTAL HEALTH

The pandemic has taken a significant toll on our collective mental health, and many are struggling to access the resources they need to cope with ongoing challenges. By providing funding for initiatives that prioritize access, we can break down barriers and ensure that everyone has the support they need to thrive.



AACI Korean Information and Wellness Initiative (KIWI)

AACI's KIWI program addresses the behavioral health needs of the Korean community through outreach and education to decrease stigma, as well as providing an innovative model of affordable behavioral health treatment.



KCCEB Mental Health Asian Pipeline Program (MHAP)

MHAP seeks to increase access to mental health support for our Korean population with limited English proficiency by increasing the pool of culturally competent mental health professionals.



NAMI Santa Clara FaithNet

FaithNet creates a supportive environment for mental health patients and their families within the faith community. By providing faith leaders an understanding of mental health issues, the program reduces social stigma and encourages advocacy.

SENIOR CARE & WELLBEING

"We must open the senior center no matter what because without socialization, our seniors are so isolated particularly in language and they can easily become depressed."

Due to the language barrier and limited access to community resources, Korean seniors are vulnerable to poverty, depression and isolation. This year, KACF-SF is proud to support two senior centers in Santa Clara and Oakland with their general operations, as well as various programs providing essential services.

A new grantee partner this year, GYOPO, continued their intergenerational community program called SSI YA GI where Korean-American seniors tell their stories by harnessing their memory of food. The project manifested in gardens using traditional techniques to grow and ferment Korean vegetables and herbs, which were then served at a meal featuring the food from the seniors' stories, in partnership with other communities, including the Ohlone tribe in Berkeley, CA.



BUILDING OUR COMMUNITY

COMMUNITY GRANTS COMMITTEE

Our participatory grantmaking process builds a network of engaged community members who better understand the work of KACF-SF and our grantee partners. CGC teams review grant applications, attend site visits alongside staff, and provide input on our community investments: the dollars that fund programs and services for underserved Korean Americans.

BAY AREA K-COALITION

Coming out of a difficult past few years, the Bay Area K-Coalition came together to strengthen our collaborations to address the needs of the Korean American community. In March, a nationwide rally was held in SF to remember and honor the victims, survivors and families of Atlanta Spa Shooting. It was a remarkable moment to break silence, voice stories, and show solidarity. In October, nearly 50 leaders representing 24 Korean American organizations came together for a Town Hall. The Town Hall featured speakers who spoke about their work in public service.



INVESTING IN OUR FUTURE

KAREN HA SCHOLARSHIP

Since 2019, the Karen Ha Scholarship program has provided financial assistance and mentorship opportunities to talented and under-resourced Korean American students. This year, the recipients of the scholarship were Jake Kim (UC Davis, 2016) and Timothy Jung (UC Berkeley, 2026).

EVENT SPONSORSHIP

KACF-SF believes in building partnerships across Korean and AAPI organizations to work together around priority issues. By investing in their community gatherings, we help to address current issues affecting our community. In 2022, we were proud to support events such as the annual Bay Area Chuseok Festival, a film screening and Q&A with the director of the documentary *Chosen*, and a hate-crime workshop held in LA, which educated Korean seniors on their rights and how to speak up if they fall victim to a crime.
