## 2004 IN REVIEW

2004 was an extremely successful year for the Islamic Society. The ISoc held a series of high-profile events (most notably our successful Islam and Palestine Awareness Weeks, and our large-scale conference in Ramadan, all of which featured internationally recognised speakers, stalls, exhibitions, and multimedia presentations, and attracted audiences of over one hundred people each). We have also held events to raise awareness of pertinent issues as they have arisen such as the Hijab Ban in France and the massacre in Fallujah. Our events have featured speakers from a wide variety of organisations and backgrounds, including leading pressure groups, embassies, political parties, Islamic groups and academic institutions. On a smaller scale, we have regularly hosted well-attended lectures with Islamic scholars, as well as weekly study circles, tajweed, and Arabic classes (which have brought us more than one hundred students, both Muslim and non-Muslim).

Our tri-termly newsletter, consisting of articles written by students on a variety of issues, has proved extremely popular and successful since its launch in October, as has the new website. Our programme of social events has served to build friendships and foster a great sense of community. As

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well as large scale social events such as Eid Dinners, quizzes and fundraising bazaars, the ISoc has organised (amongst other activities) weekly brother's football (and a brother's football team which competes with other societies) and sister's netball. We have also established an Oxford Alumni system with the aim of working together post-Oxford for important Islamic issues.

The ISoc has also made significant progress in its campaign for the establishment of a Muslim prayer room on campus, with the university committed to providing the facility. During the month of Ramadan, we have provided more than eighty students with iftaar free-of-charge on a daily basis. Our charity campaigns have included, as an example, raising over £1100 in one day for the building of a school in Baluchistan.

The Oxford University Islamic Society is an open, multi-dimensional society, which has over the last year become the most active society in Oxford. A collective effort between our committee and the membership has resulted in this success and fostered an atmosphere of inclusion, understanding and unity. We hope to further build on this progress next term.

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
