Happy International Women's Day!

On this day in 2016, the Asherah Foundation was brought into existence. Seeing the barriers preventing women around the world accessing the education they needed, we wondered "Who is helping them?". That question became "Why isn't anyone helping them?" which finally became: "Maybe we can help them?". 1,826 days later, that has turned into "We are helping them!" with the "We" including hundreds of individuals from over 40 different countries – including many who are reading this report!

- Some have helped by donating US \$10.
- Some have helped by "liking" and sharing our social media posts.
- Some have helped by giving their time to review scholarship applications or by providing guidance on strategic global operations...the list goes on and on!

Those helping are also the very women we created this organization to serve:

- Mrs. Amani Jebril, Scholarship Recipient, has both inspired us and, after her graduation, provided significant support in our work in the Arab world through serving on our Advisory Board.
- 2018-2020 Scholarship Recipient Maryline Jabar continues to inspire us as well. As she has been working on her baccalaureate degree, she has created her own NGO to support local women in her hometown. This is on top of her job, her school, and taking care of her family!
- 2019-2020 Scholarship Recipient (and graduate!) Abeer Ghamdhan has already published academic research to further support educational access for underserved women.

Letter from the Asherah Foundation Executive Director, Heather MacCleoud, PhD.

COVID-19 disrupted the work of our scholarship recipients, our donors, our interns, our board members, and everyone reading this letter. While the socio-economic-political situation for women around the world accessing higher education has been bleak, the COVID-19 pandemic has made it far worse. For our resilient scholarship recipients, the shutting down of higher education institutions has been one of the more directly felt impacts. However, economic burdens (financial instability, uncompensated labor), access to healthcare, and safety from gender-based violence also remain concerns to these women, and to billions of other women around the world.

While we cannot solve all these problems for all affected women, we can solve some of these problems for some women. These women in turn will help solve more problems for even more women.

The individuals profiled in this report represent thousands of individuals around the work who are "doing something" to make a change. We have heard stories of incredible resilience from our scholarship applicants from almost 40 countries. Our board members and interns come from almost 30 countries. Each individual act- whether it be liking a post on Facebook or donating \$10 monthly-contributes to addressing these horrendous global issues.

While each individual action may be a "drop in the bucket", these drops build into waves that are capable of crashing over barriers, or rivers that carve canyons out of seemingly impenetrable rock.

Thank you to each of you for the many contributions you have made over the past five years that are building these waves. Although COVID-19 may have disrupted progress, it has also helped raise awareness of the issues that women around the world have been facing for centuries.

Thank you for all that you do to support women around the world!

5 Years with Asherah Feature Story: Dr. Maklin Al-Ahmadi



Dr. Maklin Al-Ahmadi has been our scholarship recipient since 2018. In November 2020 she has successfully received her doctorate degree in Economics, from the Institute for Arab Research and Studies, in Egypt.

"I spent today preparing my daughter for her exams, and it was the bedtime but I couldn't sleep. I spent three hours after midnight thinking about you, all you have done for me was bursting in my head. Today I can tell you to open your memorial album and post my photo there with pride, I have gotten a PhD with FIRST Class HONOR. I defended my thesis on November 25th, but during this week I was tired and dazed, the announcement of the result was echoing in my ears all the time. I was wondering how could a shattered woman, a single mother coming from a raging country, get such thing. I am sure you bet on me and defended me many times. I watched your tireless efforts in every occasion to help other woman around the world, all I can say is I admire you. Thank you can not be enough."

5 Years with Asherah Feature Story: Ms. Amani Jebril

Ms. Amani Jebril was one of our first scholarship recipients, receiving support during 2016 and 2017. She successfully completed her master's degree in Water and Environmental Science, from Birzeit University, in Palestine, and is now a consultant in water and renewable energy.

Ms. Amani Jebril started her journey by becoming a science teacher in Palestine, where she inspired her students to take science education to a different level, mentoring them to take part in local and even in national competitions. In addition to changing the way students viewed the scientific world, Ms. Jebril helped develop scientific initiatives at the school, such as using alternative energy sources in order to address larger issues in the community. While her accomplishments as an educator were impressive, she saw the larger problems faced by those living in Palestine, namely environmental pollution and water shortages. She realized that women and children were the most affected by these conditions. She also realized that women were not well-represented in science – especially in environmental studies critical to addressing these issues. With the support of the Asherah Foundation, she returned to school and began researching ways to improve these environmental conditions that so terribly impacted women and children in her community.

As a result of her research, Ms. Jebril published the book "Bio-energy in Palestine between Reality and Potential" – a comprehensive study regarding bio-energy potential in Palestine,

which can be found on Lambert Publishing's official website.

"And I noticed a problem documented by many feminist studies in the areas of environment and water, is that women and children are the most affected by water scarcity and pollution of the environment."

"In Palestine the majority of specialists in environmental and water issues are men. There may not be enough awareness of gender considerations. There is a serious need to strengthening gender in this sector, as well as for my occupational evolution, reflected in my character and my family and kids towards a better future."



5 Years With Asherah: Looking Forward

Consider: The amazing women we have supported so far have already raised the educational levels of their families and communities. They have developed research, informed policies, and trained other women to support access to education for women in the Middle East, in West Africa, in Latin America, and in Sub-Saharan Africa as well. The work of the Asherah Foundation has informed the work of the UN around data collection and analysis for SDGs 4 and 5 concerning access to education and gender equity around the world.

With all of our support, these 100 women will create resources, develop research, and change policies so that thousands, and then millions of women will have greater access to education. We hope that you will join us in this endeavor and help us provide second chance scholarships for women around the world!

2020 at a glance: COVID-19

Impact 1: Colleges and universities around the world shut down

- Two (2) of our scholarship recipients for Academic Year (AY) 2019-2020 are only now (in Spring 2021) finishing the exams from that previous academic year.
- Two (2) of our AY 2019-2020 recipients delayed completion of their final degree requirements until late in Fall 2020.

Impact 2: Shift to Online Learning

- One (1) of our scholarship recipients from AY 2019-2020 has been only able to access her coursework via her mobile phone. She did not own a laptop or computer. For context, in her region (Sub-Saharan Africa):
 - 89% of learners (216 million individuals) do not have a household computer
 - 82% do not have household internet, and 11% (26 million) are not covered by mobile networks (UNESCO)
- For those who do have internet access, they may not have sufficient internet speed. For example, university students in Malaysia were worried that their Internet connection couldn't support online learning. Fortunately, our recipient attending the University of Malaysia, Perlais was able to successfully complete her studies after significant delay.

Impact 3: Ongoing Global Challenges Worsened by COVID-19

- "Across the globe...women spend more than six (6) hours per day in domestic tasks and family care activities." This has increased due to school closures, quarantine, family members falling ill, etc. -WorldBank
- "researchers estimate that women's unpaid contributions to health care equal 2.35% of global GDP almost USD\$1.5 trillion." -UN ("Nearly 70% of community health workers in Sub-Saharan Africa are women, but most receive little or no compensation for their care duties." -UN)
- "[W]omen earn less, save less, hold less secure jobs, are more likely to be employed in the informal sector, and are more likely to lose their sources of income due to impacts of COVID-19." -UN

Impact 4: Health & Safety

- "Violence against women and girls is increasing globally as the COVID-19 pandemic combines with economic and social stresses and measures to restrict contact and movement." -UN
- Women have reduced access to information about COVID-19, economic, and social resources due to differences in cell phone ownership, internet access, level of education, etc. -UN

2020 at a glance: Scholarship Recipients

Due to disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Asherah Foundation focused its resources in 2020 on continuing to support the same women it had supported in 2019 so that they could continue their educational journeys with as little interruption as possible.

Maklin Al-Ahmadi, PhD in Economics Institute for Arab Research and Studies, Egypt

Maklin obtained her PhD at the end of 2020, successfully overcoming the difficulties brought by Covid-19 restrictions, which postponed her thesis defense for 4 months. In her thesis, Dr. Al-Ahmadi researched monetary policy instruments and their impact on the inflation rates of Egypt.

Maryline Jarbar, Environmental Health Science, Stella Maris Polytechnic University, Liberia

Maryline is dedicated to the development of her country and the increase of opportunities for disadvantaged children and women in Liberia, and plans to use her degree to empower these communities. Through her advocacy, she hopes to contribute to the progress of literacy for all, better health conditions, and clean drinking water.





Abeer Ghamdhan, Human Development and Techno Communication, Universiti Malaysia Perlis, Malaysia

Originally from Yemen, Abeer finalized her studies in Malaysia, at the end of 2020. Despite constant delays in her master's degree program due to Covid-19, she has successfully submitted her thesis and published two academic articles: one on <u>Malaysian students volunteering attitudes</u>, and another on <u>teaching quality in Yemeni universities</u>.
