Introduction from the Mayor of London

I am delighted to be introducing the London Music Fund's 2018 Impact Report.

This year has seen the Fund award 50 Scholarships to talented children from low income families across London, taking the total number of Scholarships awarded since the Fund was launched to almost 500. In addition, a further six Partnership projects were supported – inspiring collaborations with schools and Music Hubs and enabling young musicians to learn from and perform alongside professional musicians. In total, over £2m has been awarded in grant funding since the Fund was created.

As Mayor, I am committed to ensuring every young person in our city is able to experience the culture London has to offer. My Culture Strategy, *Culture for all Londoners*, is an ambitious vision, which aims to provide all young Londoners with access to cultural learning, inspiring them to grow their skills and to reach their full potential. In providing these opportunities for young people, we will inspire a new generation of creative Londoners, investing in a diverse creative workforce for the future.

The London Music Fund fully embodies this – it supports young people at the very early stages of their musical learning, during the often-difficult transition to secondary school, and gives them a solid grounding in music education. Its Partnership Fund supports a number of large-scale collaborations working with world-class professional musicians, offering opportunities to perform in venues across our city; raising aspirations and opening doors.

Music-making has a profound effect on children and young people. It helps to develop communication, concentration, literacy, numeracy and teamwork. It gives children the chance to make friendship groups outside their everyday lives. It inspires them to work hard and improve. It provides them with an emotional outlet, is a huge source of comfort and pride, and gives them skills to take with them in to the future, regardless of whether they choose to become professional musicians.

Learning music should be a right, not a privilege, and one that I believe every young person should be able to access. I am proud to be the Patron of the London Music Fund, and I hope you find this report as inspiring as I do.

Iris's story

Iris has always shown great potential and has enjoyed music from an early age. As a Scholar she has excelled in her studies and taken advantage of the many exciting opportunities offered to her.

Prior to starting her Scholarship Iris sang in her school choir and played in the recorder ensemble. She showed real promise through her enthusiasm for performing solo pieces at school concerts and dedication to learning the flute and piano. Her Headteacher and flute teacher fully endorsed her nomination for the Scholarship programme, emphasising that she could reach a high level of musicianship if her skills were properly nurtured.

Since starting her Scholarship in 2016, Iris has achieved a Distinction in her Grade 3 classical flute exam and is now trying out music from the jazz syllabus. She is always looking to challenge herself, and recently joined Southwark Youth Orchestra where everyone else in her section is Grade 7 and above!

Iris's Music Service Mentor told us that she is the model of what he believes a Scholar should be and praised her "insatiable desire to learn". We are very proud of all that Iris has achieved in her Scholarship so far. It is clear that she works incredibly hard and she is an inspiration to other London Music Fund Scholars.

Iris told us:



I feel really privileged to be part of the London Music **Fund and Southwark Music** Service. I feel my flute is part of me because it brings me happiness when I play it -I can't imagine not having flute at this stage. I have had very inspiring teachers that have encouraged me and given me great confidence to develop my playing. The Playing Days have allowed me to be part of an orchestra which I find equally scary and exciting.

Her mum told us:



I can't thank Iris's first flute teacher enough for putting Iris forward for this Scholarship. It has opened her eyes to a world that we were not familiar with. Her teachers at Southwark Music Service are inspiring and encouraging which allows Iris to grow as a musician. It is amazing to see her take on challenges and opportunities as it gives her confidence a great boost."



Established in 2011 the London Music Fund is an independent charity with the Mayor of London as Patron.

Since January 2011, the Fund has:

- ✓ Invested over £2m in music education in London;
- ✓ Worked in partnership with Music Services to award over 476 four-year scholarships across all 32 London boroughs; and
- Funded 36 inspirational Partnership projects with 48 different professional arts organisation, ensembles and venues.

These collaborations have directly reached over 10,000 young people, with almost 30,000 others benefitting through audiences, workshops, and taster sessions.

Our vision

Our vision is that every child who demonstrates significant musical ability, enthusiasm and commitment to learning an instrument is given the opportunity to develop their potential.

Our mission

- **To provide** 4-year instrumental Scholarships to children from low-income families to help progress their musical talent:
- **To provide** young musicians with opportunities to learn from and perform alongside professionals;
- **To empower** young musicians to explore and develop their capabilities to the fullest;
- **To enable** professional musicians and artists to become motivational role models.

Our programmes

Scholarships are awarded to children from low income families and cover the transition from primary to secondary school. Scholars are supported by their school and borough Music Service, have a dedicated mentor, and families are included wherever possible. The four-year award offers them the chance to play in weekly bands and ensembles, have intensive instrumental tuition, take part in inspirational projects and attend live music events.

Partnerships: These ambitious projects across a diverse range of music genres provide 7-18 year olds with outstanding opportunities to perform alongside top professional musicians in iconic venues. We are very proud of the impact our Partnership projects have had, as shown by the above statistics.



Progression & attainment

- 90% of all graduating Scholars in 2018 had improved by two grades or more throughout their Scholarship.
- 73% had improved by three grades or more, and 38% had advanced by four grades or more, during the four year period.
- 50% of all other Scholars currently on the programme have already improved by two grades or more since beginning their studies.

On average, Scholars progress at the rate of just over one grade per year, once they have moved beyond the beginner stage.

All graduating Scholars who wished to continue learning are doing so, with support from their school, Music Service or local trusts and charities. Former Scholars have gone on to achieve scholarships at top state and independent schools, places at junior music colleges and specialist music schools, and many high-profile performances across London including with the National Youth Orchestra, the National Children's Orchestra, Sir Simon Rattle's Orchestra for London and Chineke! Juniors.

Monitoring and evaluation

Our Music Education Consultant Annie Cartwright has conducted visits across the London boroughs to ensure the quality of the Scholarships and Partnership programmes. Annie has observed 15 sessions over the last academic year which have included a selection of initial introductory performances, in-schools or weekend-based workshops and end of project performances. She will be stepping down this year as our Consultant, but we are enormously grateful for all her work, and delighted that she will continue to be involved with our work as a member of the Music Education Committee.

Key observations

Since 2011, I have visited all 32 London Boroughs involved with London Music Fund for the Scholarship part of the programme. In addition, I have observed some 19 projects in their various stages of development and most project performances. It has been rewarding to see at first hand the impact that LMF funding has made in so many areas and to so many youngsters. There are now many success stories to celebrate in term of youngsters' progress which are well documented by LMF Newsletters and Scholars of the month updates. For me, the whole experience has been a total privilege. Long may the work continue.

Observations of 2018 Partnership Projects

- The overall success of the projects has rested with the high quality and inspirational teaching from the joint professional partners and tutors from the Music Services.
- Whilst many projects aim to provide a progression route, they are also creating opportunities at beginner level, to bridge the gap between 'first access' tuition and Music Service ensembles.
- The quality of the musical arrangements adapted for the young musicians has been impressive and has played a significant part in helping to include and involve young musicians of all abilities to participate confidently in the projects.
- Finding a project format that works and applying that model to different projects has been effective specifically noted in the Bromley 'Mind the Gap' project influenced by the 'Band on the Run' structure.
- There has been a noticeable balanced mixture of girls and boys and also mixed age ranges across the projects.
- It has been a particular bonus this year to see past music students from the Music Services now accomplished musicians tutoring on the projects.
- Once again, there have been positive aspirations for continued work stemming from the projects in almost all boroughs and it will be interesting to follow this up to see how this work develops.



Partnership projects

In addition to our Scholarship programme we provide funding for ambitious, inspirational projects across London. These ambitious projects, across a diverse range of music genres, provide 7-18 year olds with outstanding opportunities to perform alongside top professional musicians in iconic venues.

Previous projects include **Remix the Mix** in Barking & Dagenham which fused urban and classical music; **Haverstock Sinfonia** in Camden where students from the Royal Academy of Music mentored local pupils, **Strings for Royal Greenwich** which focused on expanding the scope of progression activities for string players at KS2 and 3 and **The Firebird**, an ambitious cross-genre project between youth orchestras in Richmond and Hounslow, local secondary schools in Feltham, and the Royal Ballet School, featuring Stravinsky's ground-breaking work for symphony orchestra.

Sound Out

Haringey & Enfield Music Services, London Sinfonietta February 2017 – March 2018

Sound Out was a creative collaboration between Haringey and Enfield Music Services and the London Sinfonietta. The project introduced and explored contemporary repertoire and techniques, using them as a springboard to produce brand new pieces.

Mind the Gap

Bromley Youth Music Trust, Keston Cobblers Club September 2017 – March 2018

Bromley Youth Music Trust (BYMT) ran a school based, Grass Roots, 'Rock School' Programme They took a group of 40 children and developed two new Rock Schools (aka Mind the Gap) from scratch. They then further developed the Debut and Senior Rock Schools run by BYMT.

Discovering Brass

Havering Music School, Brent Music Service, Barking & Dagenham Community Music Service, The Wallace Collection, Royal Academy of Music (3 pilot projects)

October 2017 - February 2018

These projects, running across three boroughs, aimed to develop an extended awareness and knowledge of, and engagement with brass instruments, enabling participants to have a better understanding of the whole brass family of instruments. In parallel with learning about the multi-cultural and long historical significance of brass lip-blown instruments, participants developed their playing skills on specially designed natural trumpets through a specially written programme.



We feel privileged that we have been able to participate in this programme. Having access to such amazing professional musicians who work so brilliantly with the children has been incredible.

KISS

Merton Music Foundation & Sutton Music Service, String Fever

October 2017 - April 2018

'KISS' (named after Motown's mantra "Keep it simple, stupid!"), engaged children from Merton Music Foundation and Sutton Music Service with Motown music. Almost 500 young musicians from local primary schools took part in the project focusing on song-writing and creative music-making with the group 'String Fever'. A further 100 musicians from Merton and Sutton's more advanced string, jazz and vocal ensembles received a series of masterclasses to explore Motown's distinctive composition, technical and performing characteristics.



This was a wonderful project, which the staff and children thoroughly enjoyed. The key point for me, is the professional outcomes from the pupils. They have differing abilities but were all encouraged to perform their best and work as a team.

World War One Schools' Project

Waltham Forest Music Service, East London Music Group April 2018 – November 2018

The WWI Schools' Project was devised to provide an exciting, unique, and high-profile performance opportunity for the children involved in Whole Class Ensemble Teaching lessons. It aimed to be relevant and engaging for all involved by using local themes and local performers to deliver the project. The performance consisted of an original story delivered by an actor in an interactive way, with featured musical numbers from the East London Music Group players and students throughout the performance.

Bromley Musical Theatre Orchestra

Bromley Youth Music Trust, Cameron Mackintosh Ltd, Langley Park School for Boys April 2018 – November 2018

Bromley Youth Music Trust created a Musical Theatre Orchestra (BYMT MTO) for the more advanced instrumentalists in the London Borough of Bromley. Students were selected from the Saturday Centre Orchestras and Bands from April 2018. As an initial project they formed a combo orchestra (around 20 musicians) to play in a production of Oliver, which was performed in May 2018. They then continued to train in the Saturday Orchestras/Bands.



In 2018 over 150 Scholars joined us for Playing Days throughout the year.

Aims of the Playing Days:

- ☐ To bring together all London Music Fund Scholars to make music together.
- To **enable** Scholars to meet, share experiences and make friends outside their Music Service.
- To **offer** additional and supportive ensemble activity, alongside their weekly provision, following a progressive route from the first awards day through to graduation.
- ☐ To explore and develop creative music making, improvisation and composition skills.
- ☐ To build confidence and develop musicianship.

We are delighted to have been able to continue our partnership with ABRSM during 2018 bringing our Scholars together for a series of workshops. These 'Playing Days' offer the opportunity for Scholars to meet other young musicians across London and take part in creative, challenging music-making.

ABRSM is the UK's largest music education body, one of its largest music publishers and the world's leading provider of music exams, offering assessments to more than 630,000 candidates in 93 countries every year. ABRSM's mission is to inspire achievement in music. In partnership with the Royal Schools of Music, they support high-quality music-making and learning around the world. They offer pathways and resources for learners and teachers that help build musical skills, provide goals and encourage progress.

ABRSM's financial support helps us to maintain our Scholarship programme, in addition to the three Playing Days we hold throughout the year.

New Scholars' Awards Day

Our Scholars' Awards Day, held at the beginning of the autumn term, welcomed our new cohort to City Hall for the first time where they met fellow Scholars who will be joining them in their four-year journey. The workshop, led by Lincoln Abbotts, explored the storytelling element of creating music with our young players, encouraging them to develop melodies and create a whole new piece together. The children's family and friends were invited to take part in the workshop, through singing, which made for an exciting musical performance at the end of the morning. We were delighted that our Ambassador, saxophonist and TV presenter Yolanda Brown was able to join us and give an inspiring speech to our young musicians.

At the end of their four years our Scholars return to City Hall to reflect on and celebrate all that they have achieved during the course of their award. The chance to get together with their fellow Scholars, many of whom have become friends over the four years, create and perform a new piece of music, marks an exciting day where we can congratulate and celebrate what they have achieved, and wish them well on their ongoing musical journey. We were joined by Ambassador, Julian Bliss, who has followed these Scholars' progress over the last four years, and awarded them with their Graduate Medals and a personal letter of congratulations from Sadiq Khan Mayor of London.

We are delighted that we continue to work with a number of our alumni, inviting them to events, offering support and advice, and inviting them take part in our Playing Days as Peer Mentors and following their ongoing progress.





ABRSM is proud to work alongside the London Music Fund, and has been a dedicated supporter since its launch. Charles Campbell-Peek gains place in National Youth Orchestra

In late 2018 we received the wonderful news that one of our 2012-16 Scholars, Charles Campbell-Peek, has been offered a place in the double bass section of the National Youth Orchestra. At just 13 years old Charles will be one of the youngest members of the UK's top youth orchestra.

We are incredibly proud that Charles is the first London Music Fund graduate to receive a place in this prestigious ensemble.

Charles was first nominated for a Scholarship in the summer of 2012 by his school through Havering Music Service. Even at that very early stage he was already showing huge promise on not just the double bass, but also the violin, piano and subsequently trombone!

His Head Teacher told us:

Charles is a very musical student; he plays the double bass, the violin and is also learning the piano at home. I believe he has the potential to make substantial progress in music and would benefit from all the activities a Scholarship can offer.

Outstanding development!

During his time as a London Music Fund Scholar, where he was generously supported by the Albert & Eugenie Frost Music Trust, Charles embraced every opportunity that came his way.

His musical CV at just aged 13 would put some professional musicians to shame! Alongside playing in ensembles and orchestras at Havering Music Service, he was accepted into the Junior Department at the Guildhall School of Music & Drama, he took part in the London Symphony Orchestra's "On Track" Programme (including performing at the opening ceremony of the 2012 Olympic Games to an audience of millions!), performed with Chineke! Juniors at the Royal Festival Hall and took part in Sir Simon Rattle's 'Young Orchestra for London' at the Barbican Centre.

Charles was working towards his Grade 8 exam when he graduated in 2016 and has since passed it with distinction.

A keen multi-instrumentalist, Charles also achieved distinctions in Grade 6 violin and Grade 5 trombone which led to him receiving our 'Scholar of The Year' award in 2015. His reports were always outstanding and emphasised his dedication to developing skills as a musician.

At Charles's first Playing Day here at City Hall, back in 2012, we were pleased to be able to introduce him to international double bassist and founder of Chineke!, Chi-chi Nwanoku, OBE, also a London Music Fund Ambassador and Trustee.

Chi-chi has been mentoring and supporting Charles ever since and told us: "It has been the most enormous privilege to watch Charles grow and develop as a musician over the last 6 years, performing with Chineke! Juniors and other top ensembles, and we are all delighted that he has been awarded a place in the National Youth Orchestra."

In Charles's final London Music Fund report in 2016 his double bass teacher said that:

Charles has displayed a continued commitment to his bass lessons with me, not least as he and his parents have been prepared to venture to the Havering Music School for a 7:40am lesson on a Saturday morning before travelling further onto the Guildhall School of Music & Drama!



We are incredibly proud of Charles and how he approached his entire Scholarship: with commitment, passion and true dedication.

We managed to grab five minutes with Charles to talk to him about his time as a London Music Fund Scholar, and how he feels about being in the National Youth Orchestra.



Why did you decide to play the double bass?

I decided on the double bass when watching a jazz documentary with my dad. I thought "wow what a wonderful instrument, you can spin it around and carry on playing it!" Amazing for such a large instrument.

What is your favourite memory of being a London Music Fund Scholar?

There are many, so I have listed two. The first one being awarded 'Scholar of the Year' and meeting the Mayor of London at the Roundhouse in 2015. The second one was playing at a Breakfast event with the Mayor at Mansion House. The building is so grand, and I was playing alongside Tom Goodman of the London Symphony Orchestra, my Olympic Mentor:

What have you been up to since your London Music Fund Scholarship ended in 2016?

I have been very busy since graduating. I was invited to play in France with the Essex Wind Orchestra, I have played at Kensington Palace, the Royal Festival Hall with Chineke! Junior Orchestra, Royal Albert Hall, Birmingham Music Festival with my school and Windsor Castle with Future Talent. I was also invited to play with Yorkshire Youth Symphony Orchestra with Ray Chen, where all the music score was on iPads, no page turning just a foot peddle.

How did your London Music Fund Scholarship help you get to where you are today?

With this funding I was able to attend Havering Music School where I was taught by Mr Mike Speed who showed me the best way to get around the double bass. He laid the ground work on the instrument and brought out the beautiful sound, guided me to Grade 8 ABRSM for which I achieved distinction. The Scholarship also gave me the chance to attend workshops and other opportunities.

Who is your biggest musical inspiration?

I should say my teachers Mr Speed or Mr Houghham but it is Rinat Ibragimov (Principal Double Bass of the LSO). I have chosen Rinat as he can make the most wonderful sound from the bass.

Where is the most exciting place you have played?

The 2012 London Olympic Games. It was very hard work but also very enjoyable; there was lots and lots of practice visiting Abbey Road where The Beatles recorded. I also got to see Mo Farah and Usain Bolt which topped the evening!

What are you most looking forward to now you have joined the National Youth Orchestra?

I am looking forward to playing in a large double bass section and better repertoire. Also, improving leadership skills and communication within the section. It will also be great for me to experience new venues.

What advice would you give to Scholars who will be graduating from their Scholarships next year?

Practise, practise, practise, this does really pay off. Work hard, enjoy playing your instrument, play different types of music, go out of your comfort zone and push yourself. Join an orchestra and take all opportunities offered by the London Music Fund.

What would you like to do with your music in the future?

I would like to be a professional double bass player in a world-famous orchestra and also to help young musicians with playing the double bass.



Finally, I would just like to thank the London Music Fund for giving me these opportunities. All I can say is that if the funding had not been there in the first place, I don't think I would have achieved what I have today. Thank you!




