
## **Anne Kay**

Strings of the Space of one Tree

Vision is the art of seeing things invisible Jonathan Swift

Through engagement with research methodologies and practices in the areas of art and science, my two year expedition into the space of the Red Bloodwood, E. gummifera, has enriched my perception of flora and fauna which are indigenous to the Western Sydney area. I have become aware of an intricate structural mechanism of fibres which are woven together, in specific patterns and colours, to form individual species. These are the strings of the space of gummifera.

Many of these strings have been altered. Gummifera's place has been over practiced, in the form of land clearance and rapid urban development, since European settlement, resulting in many members of its community becoming extinct or vulnerable to extinction. As humans, to continue separating ourselves from gummifera's community is ecologically unsound, as we are a part of its place also. To desecrate it is to desecrate ourselves. Whilst the Australian 'bush' may have been considered in need of cultivation, its apparent chaotic form is exceedingly ordered and vital to the ecological balance and survival of life.

The destruction of yesterday's forests, combined with the continued destruction of todays forests, is the destruction of tomorrows future - for all of us.



## Jacqueline Martin - Miller

Crepitation and Between

By experimentation with materials this year I have discovered and represented a metaphor for the precursor to the documented first stage of an asthma attack.

The movement of the drying skins seems to speak the same language as the sensation I experience on a daily basis. This artwork intuitively documents the minutely evident initial process of the severe asthma attack: before crepitation\*, inflammation and bronchoconstriction.

<sup>\*</sup> crepitation (n. of action): the name applied to certain sounds which occur along with the breath sounds, as heard by auscultation, in various diseases of the lungs. They are signs of the presence of moist exudations in the lungs or in the bronchial tubes. . . and resemble the sound made by bursting bubbles of various sizes.


