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

WHO, HOW, WHAT, AND WHY OF PARTNERSHIPS

Istarted to write out a list, off the top of my head, of the many different names of the unique partnerships that we join with in ministry here at The Chapel through Kingdom Come. You can see the complete list in our partner directory in the back of the magazine, or you can go to our website at thechapel.com/kingdomcome and hear more about them in their own voice on our podcasts. Many of the names will reflect some type of positive direction or optimistic goal: Every Child, Patch our Planet, Global Mission, Bridges, Journey, The Rock,

Hope Rising, Prince of Peace, and so on. These are good names, but I just started to reflect more about the "why" we partner with them, versus the "who" we partner with identity.

I stopped and started to write down **who** they really are to us. Here is what I came up with. They are: church planters, well diggers, Bible translators, culture changers, life exchange guides, disaster recovery specialists, strategy claimers, baby deliverers, food distributors, furniture providers, athlete challengers, independence

drivers, teachers' lifesavers, clothing distributors, bottle and can collectors, refugee representors, children mentors, academic advisors, heart counselors, garden growers, adventure leaders, covert influencers, just to name a few. And all are leading toward being a Community Engager, a Seed Planter, a Disciple Maker, and/or a Gospel Proclaimer.

These descriptors might not be accurate, but if you read deeper into what I'm trying to say and reflect on the daily experiences that our partners are invited into, I think you will see the "how" and "what" our partners do more than just their names listed in our *On Mission Review*.

In Acts 17:16, the Apostle Paul is waiting on his friends, Timothy and Silas, who are on a long walk to meet up with him. And while waiting in the city of Athens he is bothered by all the idols that are influencing the people. So as verse 17 states, Paul "reasoned" with the people. This meant he spent time with them, challenging them to think and live a different way than what they had been used to doing. Later in the same chapter, Paul lets those willing to listen know that "The God who made"

the world and everything in it is the Lord of heaven and earth..." and that "in him we live and move and have our being."

Our partners have been led into the unique life paths of others. Like Paul, they use what they know and see around them and "reason" with all those that God guides into their paths. As Paul took the initiative to invest in the lives of all who would listen, so do our partners, our friends who carry the Good News of Christ!

Thankfully, the mission that God has given His people remains unchanged. We are still pressing forward to ensure that every man, woman, and child in our region has a repeated opportunity to see, hear, and respond to the gospel of Jesus Christ. The way to reach every man, woman, and child in our region is for each man, woman, and child in the Body of Christ to do his/her part in the mission. This allows us to target ministry in each of these locations, and has given us an intentionality within those geographies that allows us to meet specific needs and impact those communities with the love and truth of Jesus. While we remain One Church in four locations, we can hold the same mission and vision while tailoring it to the communities we are called to serve.

In addition, we continue to resource the greater Body of Christ in our region, our nation, and around the world through our Kingdom Come partnerships. As you read through this *On Mission Review*, you will find story after story of God's activity in revealing the Kingdom of God among us. We are resourcing these partners through our financial giving, our volunteer service, and through our prayers and strategic counsel. And we are doing all of this TOGETHER! We

have been able to release millions of dollars over the last number of years to amplify the work of God happening all around us. Whether that is planting dozens and dozens of congregations in the greater WNY area, or partnering with families and services to provide homes for children, or providing material goods like food, clothes, school supplies, housing and building repairs, or even partnering globally to enhance Christian education, drill water wells, provide medical care, and create micro-finance opportunities, we are all doing this as we partner together to give, pray, and serve. We pray you have had the joy of joining God on this journey of kingdom generosity!

As we noted last year, we also wanted to see the debt in our ministry retired. Obviously, five years ago we were unable to foresee the world shutting down over a lengthy period of time. even more generous as a congregation to fuel the efforts of the kingdom here and around the world. What you have done in faithfulness to God and in overflowing generosity is to be commended – thank God for His kindness to us!

Finally, please know this: God will do His good pleasure among us as we submit ourselves fully to Him. If you aren't praying faithfully for this ministry and the partners we lock arms with, would you begin today? If you aren't serving the Lord somewhere - through our local church or maybe with one of our partner ministries - would you ask the Lord where He wants to use you? And if you aren't giving to the work of The Chapel as we release funds and people into the mission, would you begin today? WHO ARE WE?

The question, "Who am I?", sounds quite philosophical. At its root it can be. But Jesus gives His disciples a very practical, easy-to-identify answer.

"By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." John 13:35 (ESV)

To what kind of love is Jesus referring? The highly emotional feeling we experience all too often? Or perhaps the glib addition to the end of a phone call with a family member, "Love you"?

In the previous verse, Jesus has already answered the question. "Love as I have loved you." Love means loving as Jesus lived and loved. Love cannot be separated from living, from action. How did Jesus love them? Jesus' love, while filled with all kinds of truly human affections, is first and foremost quite distinctive. Biblical love is much more demonstrative than emotive. The disciples could see His love in action.

- 1. In John 8:28 and 14:24, Jesus showed them the Father. "When you have lifted up the Son of Man, then you will know that I am he, and that I do nothing on my own authority, but speak just as the Father taught me." This faithful representation of God the Father is connected to our love of the Father in 14:24. "Whoever does not love me does not keep my words. And the word that you hear is not mine but the Father's who sent me." Love urges us daily to keep the words of Jesus and the Father.
- 2. In John 14:10-24, *Jesus showed* them obedience. He concludes the passage, "If anyone loves me, he will keep my word... And the word that you hear is not mine but the Father's who sent me."
- 3. In Matthew 9:1-13, Jesus showed them sacrifice in action mercy! He concludes the challenge with, "Go and learn what this means: 'I desire mercy, and not sacrifice.' For I came not to call the righteous, but





sinners."

- 4. In John 10:7-18, *Jesus showed* them provision for the weaker. In verse 15, He emphasizes, "just as the Father knows me and I know the Father; and I lay down my life for the sheep."
- 5. In John 14:1-4, Jesus showed them a glimpse of eternity. "In my Father's house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you?"

Love in action conforms to its intended nature. Love is to be demonstrated! We demonstrate God's love for us, as seen in Jesus when we:

- let others see our Heavenly Father;
- obey the words of the Father;
- act in mercy, not just sacrifice;
- *lay down our lives* for the weaker, the unprotected;
- refresh our commitment to

eternity as our home, and do not allow ourselves to be fooled into giving too much authority to the world we live in.

We in the global SCP vision want to see every person in the world with an opportunity to be reconciled to God. And we realize that one of the most powerful elements in this vision is the demonstrative power of love in action through our daily lives. Our lives are more important than we think! Churches filled with this kind of distinctive people multiply themselves, and the gospel message is spread naturally across their communities.

Feeding hungry people, building homes for the needy, fighting for political justice, and protesting against the slaughter of unborn babies are all worthy actions. But as important as these things are, they pale in comparison to a life transformed from the inside out through death to sin and resurrection to new life in Jesus.

The promises made to us by God will

naturally compel a daily holiness to form in us. This is why Paul tells us in 2 Corinthians 6:17, "Therefore go out from their midst, and be separate from them..." Being the children of God, we are to live separate, distinct lives from the world out of which we were rescued but in which we still live. His people are His design.

God does use many other things to call people's attention to His Gospel. However, it is the shocking impact of a life transformed which calls most to those who are still without Jesus. A life that was once self-centered and unloving is changed. One which was as stingy, complaining, and manipulative as everyone else is now transformed. What other explanations can be given? The incarnation of growing holiness is a difficult reality to debate!

This brings us full circle back to my original contention: our lives are more important than we too often think. For they either corroborate or bring into question what we say!

We have a great need every day to cleanse the defilement of flesh and spirit. We need to guard our hearts and minds in such a way as to give the Spirit of God and the Word of God access to correction and maturing love in action.

This love was designed by the very nature of God, modeled by Jesus our Savior, and is empowered in us through the Holy Spirit. This love was made to be seen!

WHAT DID THE GRADUATES LEARN?

I was pondering this question not too long ago. Through the years, I have tweaked my discipleship method, always desiring to become more effective. I am often asked what materials I use to do discipleship. My answer is the same every time and it comes with a smile. I say, "The Bible." I'm not trying to be funny in spite of the silly grin on my face. Simply put, the Bible is all I need.

I know what many of you are going to say. "Look, that's not fair. You are in ministry fulltime. You have studied this book almost your whole life." Those are fair statements. It is a distinct advantage I have. The truth, though, is that the Scriptures are accessible to everyone. There is always something to gain even just reading through it.

This reminds me of one of the saddest conversations I had with one of my parishioners here in Buffalo. Here is what he said to me, "You are a good speaker, Pastor Paul, but there is nothing ever new to me here. I've gone to church all my life. I even went to Bible school. But I've heard everything before. I know all the stories. There is nothing new for me."

I have never had that experience. It seems to me that the more I study, the more gems I find. Often a student will hear me say, "I've never seen this before. This is the coolest thing ever!" It's not like I have never read or studied the passage before. It is just that knowledge builds on knowledge.

This happened recently when I was studying the book of Numbers with Chris. I know what you are thinking. Numbers? Yes, Numbers. The student chooses what book we will study and Chris chose Numbers. Admittedly, I never did a sermon series on Numbers, nor do I ever recall doing a Bible study on it. That being said, as he was reading it out loud, I was getting more and more excited, because I saw motifs that begin in Genesis and finish in Revelation.

One example of why I think I have the greatest job in the world is that I get to watch students become excited about studying God's Word, and then see them challenged to live it out in the secular environment. I asked one of



my former students, Rachel (Dorogi) Carbrey, about her experience in the one-on-ones we did together.

Paul: What do you remember about our first meetings?

Rachel: You would often start our meetings with a funny story you had just remembered, or something interesting that happened to you, usually ending with a pun. We'd laugh together, and then we dug into the deeper stuff. I really appreciated your willingness to laugh as well as your willingness to ask tough questions.

Paul: What did we study together?

Rachel: We studied Ruth, Esther, and 1 Samuel together.

Paul: What are some big life lessons you learned?

Rachel: You helped me realize I need to be more patient with myself. You helped me become more self-aware, and most importantly, to trust God in new and essential ways. Your confidence in Christ was instrumental in the building up of my faith.

Paul: Any conversation that was particularly memorable?

Rachel: You loved to retell how you saw my husband and me fall in love before we even knew ourselves. Your assurance and approval meant so much to us.

(Paul: I had the privilege of watching the light turn on when she realized marrying

Paul was the right thing to do and that it was what she wanted to do. There is more to this story, but trust me — it was a Holy Spirit moment.)

Paul: What is the long-term benefit of our one-on-one relationship?

Rachel: I do hope to, and have begun to mentor others as you cared for us as your students.

Doing one-on-ones was incredibly helpful for me during some difficult years in my life. I am thankful for your stability and honesty in helping to guide me through this crazy life. You saw us as your children and wanted the best for us, and it meant the world to me to know someone like that had my back. I hope one day to support others the way you mentored us and built us up in our faith.

Paul: Where are you now?

Rachel: Currently, I am happily married (for three years!) and teaching special education after graduating with a Master's degree. I am continuing to pursue God and love my neighbors daily.

(Paul: Rachel did her undergraduate degree at St. Bonaventure University and received her graduate degree at Buffalo State College in 2020.)

THE GOSPEL AND A CUP OF COFFEE

"Can we make a difference with how we consume the coffee we drink?" This question led to the creation of Three Stories Coffee company, a direct trade, locally roasted, not-for-profit company in 2017. On March 7, 2022, 716 Ministries expanded this original project by opening Three Stories Coffee and Café, a full-service coffee shop and café located in the historic Broadway-Fillmore district on Buffalo's East Side.

Three Stories Coffee and Café represents the latest social enterprise of 716 Ministries. Each business that we start is about redefining the bottom line: creating access to programs and services that make a real difference in the communities we serve. We don't hire people to sell coffee, we sell coffee to hire people.

General manager Herm Cooks says, "Our staff looks like the neighborhood, and the future will be bright for the members of our team." Cooks, a Buffalo native and trustee of True Bethel Baptist church, brings more than 30 years of culinary experience as well as an unwavering commitment to living out his faith in Christ through service to others.

716 Ministries' approach to living and sharing the gospel is multifaceted. In addition to Three Stories Coffee and Café, our social enterprise businesses also include BUILD 716, a licensed residential and commercial construction company, and SERVE 716, a facilities management company providing maintenance, landscaping, and janitorial services. These create employment and career building opportunities for people throughout 716 area code. Employees work with staff to gain skills and set career goals for opportunities within 716 Ministries and beyond. These social enterprise businesses not only provide employment, training, and career opportunities, they also help fund TRAIN 716, the workforce development component of 716 Ministries. Participants in our workforce development programs are primarily people from underserved communities, asylum refugees, and individuals recovering from addiction.



The heart of our workforce development program is TRAIN 716 Work Readiness, a life skills program that is rooted in Scripture and instructed by 716 Ministries staff and volunteer Christian instructors. All 716 staff, from directors to new hires, complete this program as it is central to what we do. Lessons include conflict resolution, time management. budgeting, communication, resume building, vocational/career planning, and mock interviewing. These lessons create an environment and space to build relationships and have important conversations. Each participant in the program works with a mentor who provides an extra layer of support. It is often in these relationships with mentors and instructors where people have the opportunity to see, hear, and respond to the gospel.

TRAIN 716 also runs credentialed programs in construction and customer service through which participants earn nationally recognized certifications and are connected with employers upon program completion. Beginning in October, Three Stories Coffee and Café will serve as the hands-on training site for participants in the customer service program. In addition, 716 Ministries hires directly from these programs and continues to provide training and mentoring.

So every cup of coffee, breakfast sandwich, or lunch panini that you buy at Three Stories Coffee and Café supports a coffee farmer, provides employment and training for a 716 employee, funds workforce development training, and helps create time and space for a mentor or instructor to live and share the gospel with native Buffalonians and new neighbors from around the world. Plus, the coffee is excellent, and the food is delicious!

There are multiple ways to get involved in this ministry. We are always looking for mentors and instructors to invest in the lives of our program participants and employees. We provide training for both instructors and mentors. It is a fantastic opportunity to live and share your faith. Our staff and volunteers learn, grow, gain wisdom, and build lasting relationships by spending time with the amazing people that go through our programs and by listening to their stories. You often gain as much or more than you give.

FROM DARKNESS TO GOD'S MARVELOUS LIGHT

About seven years ago, God gave me an opportunity to visit one of the red-light areas in West Bengal. The day I walked through the area broke my heart as I saw young girls who were sold to the flesh trade.

When I saw several children in the colony and inquired about them, I understood that they were the children of these workers. I started to interact

with these kids trying to find out what they wanted to become when they grew up. One of them was a pretty 12-year-old girl. I asked her about her future plans, and she told me that she wanted to become an English teacher. That truly encouraged me. But then I heard a few of the women that followed me laughing as this little girl gave her response.

I asked them the reason for their laughter and one of the women told me, "The girl thinks she is going to be a teacher, but next year she will



be enrolled into this trade and her mother will make the biggest money as this girl is a virgin."

It just broke my heart. I came back to our center with a lot of pain and tears, not knowing how to handle this grave situation. When I was praying to the Lord about this challenge, God laid on my heart to educate the children so that they can have a better future other than getting drawn into this ruinous and immoral trade.

God enabled the ministries of HBI to start a program for these children called "Drop In Center." Our center staff volunteered to teach these children to read, write, and do math. This then created an interest in them to go to school. At the Drop In Center, they are taught biblical values as well. What we started as a small initiative has now resulted in more than 250 children in attendance.

Praise God, now more than 70% of the children are enrolled in the local schools. They come to our center in the afternoon and stay until the evening. At the center, our staff shows them God's love, helps them to do their homework, and teaches them biblical values.

One girl's story: My name is Roshni. I never liked to go school and my mother never forced me to go because she was very happy that I stayed at home and did domestic work. But one day I was invited to the Drop In Center. When I attended the first class, I got a lot of interest to study. I started going to school regularly and to the Center also. Today, I have completed my 10th grade and whatever I am is because of the Drop In Center. I want to thank all of you who are helping me in my studies. I want to thank Jesus.

Through the work of the Drop In Center, we are seeing many lives transformed, and we give all the glory and honor to our living God! After seven years of our efforts, God has done tremendous work among these people:

 We have 250 children attend our Drop In Center on a regular basis.







- Almost 70% of the children in the slum are going to nearby government schools.
- Some of the children go to work but after work they come in for special tutoring in our Center.
- When they come to the Center, they come neatly dressed, clean, and properly groomed.
- Ten of the teenagers have personally understood the love of Christ and have accepted Christ. They regularly attend the church at our Center.
- About eight mothers have accepted Christ and are part of the church.
- We have started an adult literacy program for the mothers of these children and 32 mothers are attending the program.
- We have direct access to all the homes of these children. We visit regularly and pray with the family.
- We are invited to all their family

functions and community celebrations.

We continue to work with these children. Our desire is that none of the children go into that ruinous trade but instead be educated, grow in the Lord, and have a bright future.

ARABIC COFFEE



INGREDIENTS

2 cups + 2T water
3 T finely ground light roast coffee or 4 T beans to grind fresh
1 T cardamom pods (green), coarsely ground
1 clove, whole saffron, small pinch
1/2 tsp rose water (for cooking) sugar, as needed

Optional: add cream.

- Prewarm your serving coffee pot with hot water. (Note: Remember to empty it before filling with your Arabic coffee!)
- 2. In a small saucepan, bring the water to boil.
- 3. Add coffee and bring to a boil.

 Once boiling, lower heat and simmer for 10 minutes.
- 4. Add cardamom and clove and simmer for another 5 minutes.
- 5. Remove from heat and stir in rose water and saffron.
- 6. Strain the coffee through a sieve into the EMPTY coffee pot.
- 7. Serve immediately in small espresso-sized cups. Add cream and sugar to taste.

Bonus tip from Abby: Try it with baklava!

PIKLIZ

This bright and fiery Haitian condiment (pronounced "pick-lees") is traditionally served with other Haitian dishes such as griot (fried pork), poulet (chicken), tassot (goat or beef), or alongside plantains.

Pikliz plays a staple role at meal times.

Mix together in a bowl:

½ green cabbage, shredded
 ½ green bell pepper, thinly sliced
 2 carrots, grated
 ½ white onion, sliced in strips
 ½ purple onion, sliced in strips

Mix in a food processor or blender:

2-3 garlic cloves, minced
2 green shallots
1 habanero or scotch bonnet pepper,
remove stems
2 chicken bouillon cubes
1/4 cup vinegar
Juice of one large lime

Pour blender mixture over vegetables, and mix together. Refrigerate leftovers.

ALWAYS PRAY & NOT LOSE HEART

Jesus once told a parable in the hopes that His followers would "always pray and not lose heart" (Luke 18:1 ESV). As many of us know too well, however, it is easy to become discouraged in prayer. Heaven's cell service, as we perceive it, seems spotty. People we love suffer heartache and hardship. Members of our community appear unresponsive to the gospel.

Many years ago, David Wells wrote an article on the nature of prayer as rebellion – "rebellion against the world in its fallenness, the absolute and undying refusal to accept as normal what is pervasively abnormal." Covenant Church was planted with this "rebellious" DNA. We were unwilling to accept living in a community in Central New York with inadequate access to the Good News of Jesus Christ. Since planting, we have endeavored to be a people of prayer. One specific thing we have been praying for is "that God may open a door for the word, to declare the mystery of Christ" (Colossians 4:3). We have been praying that this would happen in the context of relationships at home, in our schools, and in the workplace. And God has been extraordinarily gracious.

Some months ago, Deb asked me and others to pray for her brother, Tim. He had attended a church many years ago but had ultimately



rejected Christ. The Lord gave Deb a recent opportunity to have another pointed gospel conversation with him, and for the last six weeks, Tim has been worshiping with Covenant. This past week he met me for coffee and shared that he was overwhelmed by the idea of the resurrection of Jesus. Through God's gracious encouragement, we have not lost heart and will continue to pray for Tim's salvation.

This past year, Jeremy and Tricia, one of the couples that were part of our core team, took a homeless high school student into their home. George has been regularly attending our worship services for the past eight weeks and people

in the congregation are building relationships with him. He was thrilled weeks ago when we gave him his own Bible. Once again, through God's gracious encouragement, we have not lost heart and will continue to pray for George to be reconciled to his Creator.

Tom and Doug, two members of Covenant, both work in the same office. They share space with Nicole. Nicole was raised as a nominal Catholic and, while she attended sporadically during childhood, she stopped going altogether in her teenage years. Tom and Doug frequently and openly have conversations about Christ and the church. She began attending after



a simple invite. Tom began to send her the songs that the congregation would sing the next Sunday because they were so unfamiliar to her. This enabled her to engage the gospel in song throughout the week. And again, through God's gracious encouragement, we have not lost heart and will continue to pray that Nicole might accept, receive, and rest in Christ Jesus alone.

Toward the end of his article David Wells wrote, "Petitionary prayer... flourishes where there is a twofold belief: first, that God's name is hallowed too irregularly, His kingdom has come too little, and His will is done too infrequently; second, that God Himself can change this situation." We have looked around at our community and have seen the fruit of unbelief. Although we live in a "put together" suburban community, we see families in turmoil, marriages splintering, and people in the cruel grip of substances. God's name is not set apart as holy in Baldwinsville. Many do not even acknowledge a Creator. We know a new congregation can't ultimately change that. The Holy Spirit alone can change the hearts of those mired in rebellion and the resulting ruin. And so, we pray. We pray knowing that God will "give justice to His elect, who cry to him day and night" (Luke 18:7). A wise old Scottish Bible teacher remarked, "The really vital question is not whether God will respond to



prayer, but whether there will be faithful people who have persisted in prayer."

May God's Spirit continue to strengthen us to be a people of prayer as we pray for Tim, George, Nicole, and others like them. And may God's Kingdom come in Baldwinsville, in Central New York, in these United States, and to the farthest reaches of the globe.

Covenant Church exists to glorify God by equipping all of Christ's people to live faithful lives of worship as we give every man, woman, and child in our community repeated opportunities to hear and respond to the gospel without coming or going anywhere.

HOPE IS ALIVE

Do you believe hope is alive? Have you heard the word so much that it has lost its meaning? Give us a few minutes to assure you that hope isn't just an overused term and that it is very much alive today.

The world defines hope as expecting something to happen. When we are hopeful, we desire for a certain need or dream to be met. As followers of Jesus, hope isn't just an expectation with an outcome to follow, it is much more than that.

"This **hope** we have as an anchor of the soul, a **hope** both sure and steadfast" (Hebrews 6:19 NASB).

At Eight Days of Hope, we are faced with many families that are expectant, desiring help after natural and human disasters. Many are at their lowest - desiring or dreaming isn't a reality anymore. Hope seems to have slipped away and has the potential of never returning.

"But since we are of the day, let us be sober, having put on the breastplate of faith and love, and as a helmet, the **hope** of salvation" (1 Thessalonians 5:8).

What do you do when you are standing in the doorway of a home that has been hit by an EF-4 tornado, or is dripping with flood waters from a hurricane? See, hope isn't something you or I can manufacture or create out of nothing. It has to be strong, unwavering, and sure. Families walking through the devastation of a storm or trauma that the human body has endured need a hope that doesn't just produce a result, but that has a heartbeat.

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who according to His great mercy has caused us to be born again to a **living hope** through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead" (1 Peter 1:3).

Hope is sure because Jesus is sure. **Hope** is strong because Jesus is strong. **Hope** matters because Jesus matters. **Hope** is alive because Jesus is alive.

Today and every day, we have to hope. We must believe that Jesus is the very definition of hope. A promise that He will never leave nor forsake us. An assurance that He is able to handle the burdens caused by wind, water, and people, as well as the situation you are walking through right now. A hope that doesn't move. An anchor. One that will never be shaken.

"Therefore, prepare your minds for action, keep sober in spirit, fix your hope completely on the grace to be brought to you at the revelation of Jesus Christ" (1 Peter 1:13).

SHORT-TERM MISSIONS HAS MANY FACES

C hort-term missions can look Overy different in diverse settings and cultures. I am talking about the method of missions. A generalized picture of short-term missions is when a group of people, often from the same church, travel together for a week or two to a different country. There they serve the missionaries and the nationals in proclaiming the gospel. These trips can be very important and effective if done properly. The leader can have many goals for the group such as proclaiming the gospel, sharing testimonies, assisting a ministry in outreach or construction, encouraging the missionaries, and bringing resources to meet various needs. All of these are good and show compassion, kindness, and love. But often this is done only from the perspective of the short-term traveler, which can lead to a "look what we did" attitude and mindset.

There must be more to short-term missions than just what we "DO." A short-term mission experience must include elements of teaching, education, discipleship, and relationship building. The groups must learn to question "Why are we doing this? What are









the effects of what we are doing? How is this experience changing me to be more like Christ?" We live in a culture where wealth, when compared to most of the world, is commonplace. We love when we can take money to poorer cultures and bless them with food, clothing, and other needs. But many times we don't ask the question, "Is this helping them or hurting them?" It comes back to learning from the missionaries and asking questions. I love to take people on all sorts of mission trips; for example, medical, construction, first responders, and serving with ministries who deal with human trafficking, orphans, and education. But if all we do is go and "DO," we have missed so much of what God wants to "DO" in us!

Recently I took a small group from WNY to Costa Rica. The missionaries showed us a video on poverty, and many in the group were moved. As we discussed what we learned from the missionaries, the group realized how they can serve within their own local community with a different perspective than they had before the trip.

On another recent trip with a group of high school seniors to the Dominican Republic, one of the students revealed he had been questioning his faith. After many discussions and hearing the testimony of a missionary, he renewed his relationship with Christ.

Short-term missions is a part of discipleship and our spiritual journey in becoming more and more like Jesus.

Any short-term mission experience should lead us into more missional living daily. If I am not moved to show compassion, kindness, gentleness, patience, and grace to the people I interact with daily after a trip, then I "missed the mark" in allowing the Holy Spirit to transform me.

Missions should not be associated only with travel. If I serve with my local city mission, my church, or food bank, I am doing missions. If I share my testimony with a co-worker, neighbor, or friend, I am doing missions. If I assist someone with special needs or the elderly, I am doing missions. If I sit with someone just to be with them, I am doing missions. We can learn so much about God and His love by serving, listening to, and loving others.

Are you living missionally? Maybe getting outside your comfort zone and doing a short-term mission trip will be what God uses to transform your heart to be more like His.

IT ONLY TAKES THREE CIRCLES

Have you ever wanted to share your faith with family or friends, but didn't know how? One way is to turn everyday conversations about our "broken world" into conversations about Christ. The goal of explaining the Three Circles to our friends and family is to help us share our faith easily and prayerfully, and to see them respond.

The Three Circles illustrates God's design, our brokenness, and the good news of the gospel. And all you need is just a pen and paper, or even a napkin!

how do vou start conversation? It could go something like this:

"I believe that we live in a broken world. full of hurting people who hurt each other. We try to escape brokenness by focusing on things like money, drugs, gambling, or other hurtful things. But all this just leads to greater brokenness. It can look like this."

Draw a circle label and "Brokenness." Draw a jagged line through the center showing a broken world.

RROKENNESS

Start a second circle on the left and write "God's Design" above it.






"But 'brokenness' was not God's original design. God's design was perfect, like Himself, with no brokenness present."


Then, draw a heart to symbolize God's love.

Next, draw an arrow from God's Design to Brokenness and label it "Sin."



"Each of us has rebelled against God and walked away from His perfect design. The Bible calls this rebellion sin, and this leaves us in brokenness. Are you familiar with the concept of sin? Have you seen this in your own life?"

Now, draw a third circle below and between the first two and write "Jesus" above it.



"God saw that we could not escape our brokenness on our own, so God demonstrated His love towards us!"

Draw a down-arrow below Jesus' name inside the circle.

"God sent Jesus to the earth. Jesus is perfect and lived a perfect life, because He is God."


Next draw a cross next to the down-arrow.

"He suffered a horrible death on a cross to take our sin upon Himself."

Then draw an up-arrow next to the cross.


"Then Jesus rose again proving that He has power over sin and death! He's alive!"

Now, draw a line from Brokenness to Jesus, draw a king's crown, and write "Turn and Believe."




"Jesus tells all people to repent and turn from their sins. He also tells us to believe that He died for your sins and that God raised Him from the dead. Jesus wants you to follow Him as king of your life. Jesus promises that if you do that, you will be forgiven and restored back to God's design!"

Draw a line from Jesus to God's Design and label it "Restored."



"If we turn and believe in Jesus, we leave this world of brokenness and are restored into a relationship with God to pursue His design."

Draw a line from God's Design to Brokenness and write "Go" above it.



"More than that, God then sends us back into this "Brokenness" to tell others about the Good News of Jesus Christ."

After the diagram is drawn ask: "Where do you see yourself? Are you in God's perfect design or are you currently in brokenness?"

Their answer to this will show you where they see themselves in relation to God and give them an opportunity to respond to follow Jesus. If ready, ask this question:

"Would you like to ask Jesus into your life right now? It's a faith step through prayer, and prayer is talking with God. God knows your heart and is not so concerned with your words as He is with the attitude of your heart. If you are ready, you can pray words something like this:

Lord Jesus I need You. Thank you for dying on the cross in my place for my sins. I believe in You. I open the door of my life and receive You as my Savior and Lord. Thank You for forgiving me of my sins and giving me eternal life. Take control of my life and make me the kind of person You want me to be.

The Bible tells us that, "Whoever has the Son has life; whoever does not have the Son of God does not have life. I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God so that you may know that you have eternal life" (1 John 5:12-13).

WHEN WE SAY NEVER, GOD SAYS "WATCH ME"

Have you ever said "no" or "never again" to God? Perhaps He wanted you to talk to that person that you just don't like, or perhaps He was nudging you to step out of your comfort zone and you just were not going to do it... again. How well did that work out for you?

This story is of God's unifying movement currently sweeping through the Church in Barcelona, Spain. But it surprisingly started with an "I am never doing that again, Lord" declaration. Alex and Sherri Belmar have lived and served all over the globe. They are on fire for the Lord and the pursuit of gospel saturation on a global scale. Passionate specifically for the Spanish-speaking church, the Belmars have spent the last several years of their ministry working to develop the Hispanic Church in South and Central America, as well as in the United States. In the 90's, they also spent some time in Spain. Alex, after he and Sherri felt called elsewhere by the Lord, claimed that he would never return to Spain for ministry. The Lord had different plans.

In 2019, Alex received a call from our own Pastor Jerry Gillis, inviting Alex to go on a trip to Spain with him to network, brainstorm, and dream about the Church there. Alex knew after that trip that God was on the move, specifically in Barcelona. Since then, a group of about 150 pastors from several denominations and backgrounds have come together under one goal: gospel saturation. The pastors in Barcelona are unifying in a way that the Church in Spain has never seen before.

Most of the pastors that Alex works with are bi-vocational. This means that they have a separate full-time job to pay the bills, and their ministry work is on the side. Many of them work full time in the secular world and are only able to devote two to three hours a day on ministry work. That doesn't even take into account the demands and expectations of being a husband or father. It is very difficult to be a full-time, funded

pastor without a formal theological education. For most, that goal is out of reach. Thus, juggling two jobs is necessary to survive. Using the Christ Together material that has successfully trained, equipped, and mobilized many pastors in the United States, Alex is working to bridge this education gap to disciple and build up better pastors, leaders, and missionaries for Christ.

One of the foundational tools he uses is Christ Together's Gospel Saturation Primer. This primer was "designed to be one such tool that works to understand God's mission through His church. We want to create a shared language for a shared culture sent on a shared mission" (pg. 3). The key word here is shared. We are all on one mission - whether we are looking at the Church of WNY or the Church in Barcelona, Spain. That mission is to advance the Kingdom of God through the gospel of Jesus Christ. This is the only thing that can truly unify the historically divided Church in Barcelona.


Marked by conflict, persecution, and nationalism, Spain has struggled with societal and cultural division for a very long time. This has contributed to a phenomenon that is similar to what we see in the States: resistance to the Church except in the rare seasons of partying for the sake of tradition (holidays and

festivals). This exploitative and, at times, heretical use of the gospel and the Bible is a great challenge to overcome for Christians in Spain. In many ways, Alex shared that they want to do things differently. Why not celebrate what the Lord has done today? We don't have to wait! We have something to celebrate every day. This authentic, daily celebration of what Christ has done for us is what pierces through division, hesitancy, and resistance.

If we believe that God's mission is for every man, woman, and child to be transformed by the gospel (i.e. gospel saturation), how is God going to accomplish this? The answer is through the mobilization of His Church, God mobilized Alex back to Spain to train, disciple, and mobilize pastors who can then do the same with their congregations. Addition quickly turns to multiplication. "We must believe that the church's greatest asset to seeing a movement of God rests not in the gifts and abilities of our current leaders, but the seed of the gospel that lies within every transformed follower of Jesus" (pg. 34-35 of Primer). We all have a part. Alex recognized this and moved forward in anticipation of what God was going to do. The pastors he continues to mentor and train are anticipating the same. Are vou?

THAT IS JUST WHAT I NEED!

Through prayer, mentoring, and ethical medical care, the Church through CompassCare faithfully served Lily, helping reorient her to a proper relationship with her Creator and her preborn baby.

After making an appointment with us, Lily* arrived at our CompassCare office in physical distress. The receptionist, seeing her suffering, quickly responded to her need by alerting her nurse, who gently guided her into an exam room, giving Lily a basin and some anti-nausea medication.

After her nurse got her as comfortable as possible, Lily shared that she suffered from severe nausea when pregnant. She thought she needed to abort because couldn't handle being so sick with no support. On top of this, Lily had just left her abusive boyfriend and was worried this pregnancy would prevent her from moving on with her life. She confessed that she just wanted this pregnancy behind her so she could feel better and move on with her life. As Lily talked, she visibly relaxed, confiding in her nurse that she felt better just having someone listen to her.

When her nurse performed an ultrasound exam, it revealed an eight-week-old baby with a strong heartbeat. Though visibly moved, Lily remained convinced she needed an abortion.

Lily's nurse offered her two things that got to the core of her true need. First, a right relationship with her Savior, Jesus Christ. When presented with the gospel, Lily leaped at the chance to have a relationship with God. She repented of her sins and surrendered her life to Jesus!

Second, Lily's nurse offered her a friend to support her, a MotherCare mentor. These mentors are mature Christian women. equipped alongside walk each mother through pregnancy and beyond. MotherCare is designed to connect women from local churches with CompassCare patients for ongoing care and support. Lily responded eagerly, "That is just what I need!" Before leaving, Lily set up another appointment. Shortly thereafter, the PrayerNet team was alerted through email to pray for Lily as she went home to finalize her decision about the pregnancy.

Lily connected with her MotherCare mentor, Valerie, who instantly took her under her wing, happily and generously serving this young mom. Yet Lily still struggled with her pregnancy decision and nearly canceled her return appointment with CompassCare. Valerie stepped up again by offering to give her a ride and watch her other kids during the appointment, which Lily gratefully accepted.









Lily was still stressed about the pregnancy, but again her nurse noticed her relaxing as she was given time to share her feelings. Her nurse told Lily she remained committed to helping her and giving her the support she needed. Lily confessed she had an abortion appointment set up for that week. Unwilling to give up, Lily's nurse offered to meet with her again beforehand, so Lily scheduled a third appointment.

For five long days, neither CompassCare nor her MotherCare mentor heard from Lily. Another PrayerNet went out asking for prayer on her behalf. Then Valerie received a text from Lily saying she had changed her mind about the abortion, that she was keeping her baby, and wanted to connect again!

Lily has since given birth and is joyfully parenting her baby girl, Janelle. Janelle would have been aborted if not for the love and care of the Church acting through CompassCare. Lily's ongoing friendship with her MotherCare mentor has proven critical to her ability to carry her baby to term and to parent. Valerie regularly visits with Lily. They study the Bible together, and she continues to be a

source of counsel and support for Lily and her family.

Lily is one of hundreds of stories of how the Church, through CompassCare, is standing strong on behalf of women and their preborn boys and girls, for God's glory.

CompassCare is a pro-life organization providing ethical medical care and comprehensive community support to women seriously considering abortion with the mission of "erasing the need for abortion by transforming a woman's fear into confidence."

THE GOSPEL WRAPPED IN A SANDWICH:

AN INTERVIEW WITH NICK CALANDRA, HEARTS FOR THE HOMELESS

Waking up each morning rain or shine without a roof over their head or a place to call home is a reality for literally thousands of people in Eric County. Homelessness knows no racial, ethnic, or gender limitations as it impacts men, women, and children of all ages. There are several remarkable ministries reaching into the homeless community to offer food, clothing, and other essentials while building relationships that can

lead others to meet Jesus as Savior and Lord.

For more than 30 years, Hearts for the Homeless has been wrapping the gospel in a sandwich and offering life-giving food to people who live on the streets of Buffalo, NY. We recently connected with Nicholas (Nick) Calandra, who serves at the helm of Hearts as president and CEO of the ministry. Nick is a husband and father of two boys. He has a special story and

insights to share, so please settle in and join us for the conversation.

On Mission (OM): It is great to have you with us, Nick. Could we begin with you sharing about your journey and how you were connected with Hearts for the Homeless (Hearts)?

Nick: I feel blessed to be leading Hearts, and am grateful for being motivated daily to learn and grow as a leader and person of faith. I appreciate more and more the opportunity to be involved in vocational ministry where I can serve God and lead others to significantly impact lives by nourishing them physically and spiritually. Now it is important to note I didn't always have such a conviction in my outlook. I've been involved with Hearts for well over 10 years now. Several years into my time, things changed significantly for me. Although I can point to the afternoon I accepted the free gift from God and gave my life to Jesus, not everything changed overnight. That moment was the start of my trust and belief that I couldn't do "it" alone but that I could only do "it" with Jesus - that I needed Him. The "it" being everything. From that moment on, trusting in God's timing versus my timing was the beginning of a lifelong journey to truly serve the Kingdom with the gifts God has given me. Interestingly, my salvation happened during an altar call by Pastor Eric Johns at the annual Christmas Eve dinner where Hearts

was feeding the homeless in the Forbes Theater located in the former Buffalo Christian Center. Because I had family members in ministry, I had been attending and helping with the event since I was a young child. It is amazing to see how God puts moments and experiences in our lives! To this day, the annual Christmas Eve dinner is my favorite event of the year. Without going on forever, because it is easy to do when such dramatic change occurs in one's life, I'd summarize my journey to salvation as the story of Hearts. It was through relationship ministry that I grew closer to God. It was not forced or in exchange for anything. It was not part of a societal process or expectation. Rather it was through experiencing first-hand faith and His love for us through seeing others express that faith and love for others through ministry.

OM: It is hard to believe that Hearts for the Homeless began more than 30 years ago. What were some of the steps that brought Hearts to where it is today?

Nick: When reflecting on the over three decades of ministry, it's hard for me not to think of all the small steps along the way. The day in and day out commitment that volunteers, donors, and staff members have had and still have for the organization; the faithfulness of God, the desire to serve and trust in Him, and the continual compassion for serving with dignity. Paired with thousands upon thousands

of hours of hard work and personal sacrifice by all of our stakeholders.... I remind myself and my team that we are here today because we are standing on the shoulders of giants. In 2012, a few years into my time with the ministry, the [Hearts] founder shared with me, "It is not possible to suddenly be faithful in big things if you have not already been faithful in the small things! ... Only then, will you be given responsibility for bigger and more important things."... Walking that out daily is a big part of the Hearts story and a significant part of what brought Hearts to where it is today.

OM: The mobile soup kitchen has been a consistent element of the Hearts ministry over the years. How did this all get started, and what does the feeding program look like today?

Nick: There are many reasons why individuals cannot or will not receive services in homeless shelters or sitdown dining settings. These reasons range from mental health challenges to substance abuse, and also include interpersonal skills. Sometimes individuals voluntarily choose be on the street, and other times behavior has resulted in the street being their only option. The Mobile Soup Kitchen started by going out on the streets of Buffalo looking for the chronically homeless who were living on the streets. The goal was to first feed people, because without this basic human need being met, it is next to impossible to connect with them on anything else. The act of providing food and other items with dignity is a way to show people Jesus' love for them: the gospel wrapped in a sandwich (C. Spurgeon). After meeting basic human needs, building a relationship with others is at the core of who we are – the same as back in 1990 as it is today.... Meeting the basic needs of food and water are now always paired with other items such as clothing, shoes, blankets, and toiletries....

OM: It seems Hearts is bursting at the seams with new opportunities. Could you share a little about the Harvest Food Pantry and why you decided to implement a "client choice" distribution method? What is this method and how is this approach helping shoppers at the pantry?

Nick: The Hearts Harvest Food Pantry is such a special program. For decades, our programs have largely been off-site, such as the longstanding Mobile Soup Kitchen. With the 2021 dedication of the Hearts Harvest Food Pantry, we are welcoming our neighbors in need to receive support and services at our own campus. Through this food pantry, we are able to build relationships with our neighbors in Riverside, both families and individuals. Riverside has one of the highest poverty rates in Buffalo. The neighborhood is diverse with a mix of long-time residents and



refugees. It is not uncommon to hear several languages throughout the day. We often hear children translating for their parents. As clients move through the pantry and select food items they enjoy cooking and eating, they are participating in "client choice" distribution. Simply put, there is dignity in choice. Choosing food, much of which is fresh and perishable versus just being given a bag or box of items, can be empowering and uplifting. It is our hope that someday a child looks back and asks the question, "That was a food pantry?" This client choice approach is helping aid people by providing them access to fresh items and to pick items they enjoy. We often see families and individuals in need coming back to our pantry and this creates that opportunity for us to minister to them and develop a relationship with them. The food serves as an opportunity to form a trusting relationship. Hearts provides a "hand up" to those in need by sharing the love of Christ.

OM: It must take a significant

number of people to keep everything in motion at Hearts and you're still growing! How do volunteers factor into what Hearts is able to do in the community, and what do you look for in volunteers?

Nick: Volunteers make our work in the community possible. It does take a significant number of people volunteering to keep everything in motion. Our volunteers have such amazing hearts. They are giving their time to serve the community and make a difference in the lives of others. We look for volunteers that have the desire to serve and are willing to be flexible. I was reminded years ago that the mission field is not just overseas but right here in our backyard, too. Volunteers come to us with all different backgrounds. This diversity creates an opportunity for everyone to experience new interactions with others, and the opportunity to grow relationally and spiritually. volunteer opportunities range from being very broad while some can be

specific to a skill set. But for the most part, we are able to find a role for almost everyone.

OM: What do you see that gets in the way of people serving the vulnerable? How can these roadblocks be removed?

Nick: Ourselves. We often get in our own way or we don't know how to do it on our own. And when I say "on our own," I don't mean we each have to start a new ministry. In fact, often that idea of us having to start something new becomes the roadblock.... Serving the vulnerable can be intimidating because sometimes we don't think we can relate.... Vulnerable people are still people, they are our brothers and sisters. Hearts is able to facilitate many opportunities to help you remove the roadblocks that get in the way of serving. As people of God, we are called to serve the hurting and broken. We want to invite you to join us in serving the vulnerable.

OM: How can we better understand who is our neighbor? Where do we start?

Nick: For me this answer is simple: we start by starting. Not by starting a conversation or starting an email but by starting to serve. Go outside, outside the church walls, outside our comfort zone, outside our communities - go outside and serve. Our doors are open to those who want to serve. Hearts is an extension of the church, and we are here to help you understand our

neighbors through serving them... Start something that will inevitably change your life as much as, and likely more than, those you are serving. Start. I hope we see you soon!


OM: What is next on the horizon for Hearts? How may we best pray for you and your team?

Nick: Earlier this year we announced an expansion of our work related to food insecurity. With the launch of Hearts Food Pantry Express, we will take the client choice food pantry distribution concept to neighborhoods outside of Buffalo. By using a large bus as a food pantry, Hearts will, for the first time in our history, consistently serve communities outside of Buffalo. Please pray for this program and the lives that will be touched because of it. Initially, we intend to serve two additional communities each week, 52 weeks per year. We pray that continues long into the future. Additionally, our board of directors are talking and praying over several ways Hearts can further support the homeless in Buffalo, as the need in our community is so great. Through existing and new relationships, we are hoping to build deeper partnerships and, if it is God's will for Hearts, we may see more new programs for the homeless in the near future.

Greetings from Sheridan Parkside Life Center!

God has been doing so much in our first year since the launch. In June of 2021, we opened the doors and officially had our grand opening on October 10. It has been a busy season that has continued to bring more and more people into our facility to learn of the hope of Christ as we serve dignity, value, and joy to the whole neighborhood.

Our focus is solely to reach the 1,000 homes of Sheridan Parkside. As a ministry, we have the free laundry open on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. We are expanding to Thursdays and possibly one Saturday a month as volunteers continue to come. The need is certainly there.

We have our free adult clothing pantry open at the same time as the laundry and have set ourselves up as a casual, self-serve café. Our partnerships with Olive Garden, Panera, Paula's Donuts, and the Goodness Project are helping to make that a reality.

Our Healthy Cooking Kitchen is now operating every other Tuesday with Chef Steve teaching practical and delicious menus for making in the home.

Our outreach to Holmes Elementary School is a strong element of our reach into the community. In May, we will host our second Teacher Appreciation Luncheon to serve all the staff and administration there. We are also meeting with the school social workers to consider where we might effectively touch the most needy families of Parkside and the Holmes' family community.

Our community church operates as a multi-denominational outreach. We have been open since June of 2021, holding a weekly service on Sundays at 4pm and a community dinner at 5pm. The service is largely relationship building. We hear the good things that God has been doing, teach each participant, and search the Scriptures to hear what God wants to say to our hearts.

Out of this community church, our first outreach to the Collins Correctional Facility developed. Through all of these efforts, we are looking to the future to see what servants and leaders God will be building in our midst.

We are very grateful for your partnership with us. It has been a very busy and fruitful year. It is time for us now to develop new leader positions, look for interns, and assess how we can provide for these servants during their work with us.

It was a very special day in the Greater Buffalo area as six church planters graduated from the Church Planting Initiative Residency Program on June 8, 2022! Participants in the program, along with their wives, the CPI Directional Team, supporters, and others filled the special event meeting room at Three Stories Coffee on Broadway in Buffalo, NY. Here, we celebrated what God is accomplishing through these church planters. This was the second graduating class from the Residency Program.

Residency The Program was launched in 2019 with main components of training for church planting and soul care coaching, where pastors learn to attend to the issues of the heart for themselves and others. Currently, CPI offers two tracks for applicants to the Residency Program. The first is for Residents: church planters who have either launched a church in the past 12 months or are planning to launch a church in the next 12 months. The second is for Auditors: pastors with previously established congregations which have been gathering as a church for more than a year. For auditors of the Residency, the training and community fellowship offered by the course is an opportunity to grow and connect with like-minded church planters.

The CPI Class of 2022 has four graduating residents who have launched, or will shortly begin, new expressions of the Body of Christ in our region! The two remaining graduates were auditing the program as they have pre-existing churches.

Here are a few updates from the graduates.

CAVE OF DAVID Jonathan Bokongole

Jonathan Bokongole is a relative newcomer to the USA, arriving to our shores from the continent of Africa. His heart language is French. Although he is still learning English, he disregarded the language barrier and joined the Residency Program.

Jonathan Bokongole's update:

By God's grace the church and I are doing well. Sometimes people are showing up, and other times the number decreases. But, we keep hoping God Himself will help us grow as the work belongs to Him. Please pray for our church as we ask God to provide our own place. The rent where we are now is a lot for us as a new church. If we had our own building, it would be better.



Until we enter into His glory, we also ask for prayer that God will give us strength and perseverance to continue to endure in this period of tribulations. Thank you and God bless you!

THE GARDEN CHURCH Frankie Andrews

We launched a Celebrate Recovery meeting officially at the beginning of the year. Now, we are preparing to roll out two Step Studies alongside our regular Sunday night recovery meetings – one for women and one for men. We also installed a community garden in the front yard of our facility in partnership with Imagine Community Gardens. We have 20 raised beds, 14 of which are being cultivated by a diverse group of neighbors from our community. Not only have

these families been able to grow food to eat for themselves, but also, in two weeks alone, we produced surplus that provided more than 400 pounds of fresh organic produce. We distributed this surplus neighbors throughout our community. In addition, we launched a deep dive book study where we are learning how to love like Iesus across dividing lines. We met two of the people involved in the study through the garden. We continue to partner with other ministries and churches such as Pastor Steve Johnson of Anchor Church Buffalo and RAWTools Buffalo, Pastor Stephen Kulu of New Generation Church (we have provided them space in the garden for their church to have a dedicated bed), Pastor Scott Lackey of New Story, Andre "Shep" Clark of New Direction, and many other pastors/ministries in our area and throughout Buffalo. We are looking forward to our next season as we continue to impact our community by being the Church, to then earn the right to invite them to church services.

Please pray for wisdom in our next steps as we begin planning and preparing for what and when a Sunday worship experience may look like. Also, please pray for continued finances to make all of the needed upgrades to the property, so that we can increase our opportunities to impact our community and expand the Kingdom.

The first birthday in Korean culture is an important one. In times of poverty and hardship, many children wouldn't survive the year. Families and communities celebrate a first birthday as a victory of life and hope for the many years to come. CROSSPOINT CAMPUS

The Chapel is one church in four locations. We believe that God has placed each of our campuses in specific communities in order to impact each of them with the gospel. Not only do we want our campuses to be places for those who live nearby to come to us, but we also want to mobilize into our communities to engage with people where they are at. We are praying continually that God would open doors for this and make it clear how we can be present in the community around us. At the CrossPoint campus, God has provided some wonderful opportunities for this in 2022.

Our team connected with some incredible people within the town of Amherst. These people are involved in supporting the daily needs of our community, and who lead efforts in areas like senior services, youth mentoring, and student support. Through our conversations, we were invited to participate in the shaping of a new Community Center just down the street from our CrossPoint campus.

Early this summer, the Donation Hub at the CrossPoint campus collected clothing for schoolaged children. King's World also encouraged children to school supplies. We took all of these items and partnered with the Sweet Home School District to facilitate "Pop-Up Clothing at the new Amherst Community Center in August. Families from surrounding neighborhood came and received items they needed for the fall. Our church was able to meet their needs, be present in our community, and forge a partnership with our town and a local school district!

In September, we held our second Serve Day event. In 2021, we amazed with how God opened doors for us to serve at Windermere Elementary School and the surrounding neighborhood. Building on the momentum from last year, we found open invitations and even excitement from our community at the idea of us doing this again! This year, we aimed to serve students, seniors, and a local community through the Serve Day mobilization effort. Having formed relationships with stakeholders in our community, we were invited to serve in three distinct areas. First, we served at a Community Center down the street. Teams of volunteers painted the interior and cleaned up the exterior space. Second, the local Senior Center provided us with the names of several senior citizens who needed assistance in their homes. Teams of volunteers visited homes to help move heavy items and helped out around the house. Third, we partnered with Heim Middle School to clean up and outfit their courtyard spaces so they could be used more effectively for the students. Then, finally, we hosted a neighborhood cookout near the Community Center and invited nearby residents to come and hang out with us. We do this while we prayerfully await the opportunity to resume our mission trips with MOH to Haiti. Locally, we have begun a really sweet community partnership with Buff-Sci Charter Middle School. located within a one-mile radius of The Chapel Cheektowaga Campus. That's owning your sphere of influence!

Captured below are two different stories on what it looks like to live out Colossians 3:12, "...clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience," in the context of two very different geographies and cultures.



MISSION OF HOPE: The DR is a country covering the eastern twothirds of the island of Hispaniola the Caribbean, while Haiti comprises the western third. MOH provides opportunities to serve the Haitian/Dominican communities from their Santiago campus. MOH seeks the same vision for both countries - life transformation for every man, woman, and child through the gospel message. They accomplish this by being the hands and feet of Jesus through tangible work.

There is a large Haitian population in the DR. Our mission engagement with both people groups has given us the opportunity to enlarge the Kingdom through various work projects: construction, mobile medical clinics, children's ministries, and relational ministry time in the local villages. We worship together, and are ministered to, through the joyful singing of the congregations and the teaching of local pastors.

Our serving with MOH has allowed us to express Christ's compassion and kindness to the Dominican and Haitian people, side-by-side with one another. God is allowing us to partner with Him as He uses us in the reconciliation and Kingdom expansion of both beautiful peoples.

We fell in love with the campus, but we fell more in love with the students, comprised of many different ethnicities. This serving opportunity consisted of tons of gardening, general clean up, and the assembling of school furniture

As a Chapel campus, we have adopted the school as a place of continued service and engagement. This past spring, we returned to Buff Sci and again did general clean up and yes, tons of gardening. What made this time even sweeter was the presence of not only students but Buff Sci staff members, block club members and families whose children attend school. It was a blast! We were able to share the gospel with a few of the families and began to form new relationships.

We had the privilege of serving several of these families at Christmas time with trees and gifts. It was through the delivery of these Christmas items that we met a downstairs neighbor of a Buff Sci family. They needed beds for their children. 


