Aiming to support all members to improve human rights transparency in their supply chains and contribute to the fulfillment of MSA reporting requirements

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Why a sector approach?

New Obligation

The *Modern Slavery Act 2018* (Cth) is applicable to most AUPN Member universities, and we wish to demonstrate leadership on this important issue

Efficiency

Working together will minimise the duplication of activities and associated costs across individual universities, including risk assessment, implementation of systems and remediation

Effectiveness

Leveraging our aggregated buying power should improve our capacity to identify and action any modern slavery risks, and drive more effective changes through our supply chains.

Cooperation

AUPN members are an engaged group of procurement professionals within publicly spirited organisations, operating in a uniquely collaborative sector

Modern Slavery Statement Mandatory Criteria

Statements are required to be lodged by each university annually by 30 June

- 1. Identify the reporting entity
- 2. Describe the reporting entity's structure, operations and supply chains
- 3. Describe the risks of modern slavery practices in the operations and supply chains of the reporting entity and any entities it owns or controls
- 4. Describe the actions taken by the reporting entity and any entities it owns or controls to assess and address these risks, including due diligence and remediation processes
- 5. Describe how the reporting entity assesses the effectiveness of these actions
- 6. Describe the process of consultation with any entities the reporting entity owns or controls
- 7. Any other relevant information





- FRDM (pronounced free•dom), is a supply chain technology company that will algorithmically identify modern slavery risks throughout universities' supply chains, enabling each university or the sector collectively to make informed decisions and take action to address modern slavery risk.
- In 2021, 34 participating universities engaged in the various components of the implementation phase: engaged in a Change Management Group and its activities and collated and categorised a collective \$16.2B of procurement spend (Jan 20 – Jun 21)
- AUPN aim for full go-live in February 2022.

CAF Engagement Cleaning Accountability Framework

"Our objective is to end exploitation in property services and improve work standards through education and advocacy" – https://www.cleaningaccountability.org.au/

AUPN re-engaged with CAF in February 2021 to assist with the development of a compliance framework to cover contract cleaning & security at University campuses.

Key components include:

- √ 3 Star Standard
- ✓ Compliance framework and assessment methodology
- ✓ Procurement tools include a CAF Pricing Schedule
- ✓ Associated policies, guidance, tools and resources
- ✓ PILOT 2023 and 2024, 3 university campuses
- CAF was invited on multiple occasions to present to the broader AUPN community
- The Modern Slavery Working Group (MSWG) assisted CAF in the creation and dissemination of project information & surveys
- The MSWG and Academic Advisory Board member assisted in discussions and engagement between CAF and interested universities
- The MSWG worked with CAF to facilitate interest and participation by universities in a pilot program for 2023
- CAF is currently working with around 10 universities on the development of a pilot framework for University campuses

STEP 1 Baseline Data Collection

- Anonymised baseline data on level of awareness and understanding of supply chain accountability collected via an online survey
- insights collected will help framework development

STEP 2 Contract & Tender Information

- CAF working on-on-one with procurement teams to gather information about contracts & tendering
- CAF will provide advice on areas whether labour compliance requirements can be integrated

STEP 3 Engage with University Suppliers

CAF to engage with University suppliers to introduce the model and answer any questions

STEP 4 Pilot & Framework Development

- Interested Universities to work with CAF on development of Pilot Project
- Working group created to consider pilot draft

2021 Meetings and insights



Board overview

- The Academic Advisory Board was established in July 2020. Meetings were held quarterly for 2021.
- The Board's aim is to enrich the AUPN sector approach through leveraging academic experience and learnings and embedding best practice recommendations and insights into program activities.
- Board members were provided updates on the AUPN's program and discussions were focused on specific themes/topics (e.g., AUPN Technology solution, modern slavery program priorities, University Modern Slavery Statement feedback, AUPN approach to grievance mechanisms and remediation).

• Session 1 (24/03/2021):

- AUPN Program & Technology solution update
- AAB recommended priorities for 2021- awareness, preparedness, learning & collaboration, technology implementation, risk addressing, and continuous learning
- ✓ Insights: Building awareness with decision makers, awareness outside procurement teams and to the wider community, and student lead advocacy would be most impactful

Session 2 (23/06/2021):

- AUPN program, CAF & Technology Solution Update
- University Modern Slavery Statement discussion and feedback
- ✓ Insights: Statements were a good first start. Suggestion to deeper dive in policies, documents and include case studies in future statements. Creating effective grievance mechanisms and remediation action is difficult, refer to reputable resources.

Session 3 (22/09/2021):

- Discussion and feedback on draft AUPN Guidance and Information on Grievance Mechanisms and Remediation sent to AAB
- Discussion and feedback on proposed response to media alerts received via FRDM tool
- ✓ Insights: Creating a step-by-step remediation action plan for all AUPN members is very difficult due to the complexity of the issue. Universities to work with their governance teams to incorporate modern slavery into existing reporting and remediation mechanisms. The AUPN should instead use its collaborative leverage to enact change and create high-level principles that guide a wide variety of issues.
