The Foundation provides a way to invest locally in your community for permanent impact. The unique demographics of the Woodside High School community demonstrate the power and advantage of diversity in education, as students from a broad range of socioeconomic, ethnic and academic backgrounds converge to form a single community. Their combined stories lay the groundwork for a deeper classroom experience and the development of empathy, understanding, and civic engagement. These values are critical drivers of personal well-being, and colleges admit our high school students precisely because they have the skills and experience necessary to build community in a diverse environment.

All students will continue to have access this year to a rich array of academic classes, including AP and honors classes, as well as a broad set of electives, taught by highly-rated teachers with small class sizes. Additionally, for the first time, greater funding is being provided for programming to further assist in the path to college, including essay bootcamps, standardized test preparation, and college campus visits. A third of our families qualify for free and reduced price lunch, and 32% of our students are firstgeneration college-bound, so the new Foundation support is critical to better prepare for post high school success.



We are particularly proud of our seniors' success in securing scholarships, including a number of prestigious multi-year scholarships. Woodside High School seniors achieve acceptance to a broad range of colleges. Acceptances last year included elite private institutions such as Harvard, Stanford, Brown, University of Pennsylvania, California Institute of Technology, Tufts, Vanderbilt, Boston University and Wake Forest University, all of the University of California and CSU campuses (with many students attending UCLA and UC Berkeley), and many out-of-state, public universities such as University of Washington and University of Georgia.

Class Size Matters

The Foundation is committed to keeping class sizes small and provides funding for 34 additional class periods across 16 core academic subjects. These class periods could not be offered without the support of the Foundation.


Electives Matter
