## THE VETERANS AND CITIZENS INITIATIVE

## RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

## General Population Survey

Results are shown as "US Average"
More in Common partnered with international polling company Morning Consult to conduct online survey interviews with $\mathrm{n}=2,004$ adult US citizens from October 28 to November 1, 2022. The data was weighted to be representative of American citizens using propensity scores, with score functions including gender, age, race, education, and region. The margin of error is $+/-2 \%$.

## American Military Veteran Survey

Results are shown as "Veterans"
More in Common also partnered with international polling company Morning Consult to conduct online survey interviews with $\mathrm{n}=500$ US military veterans from October 28 to November 1, 2022. The data was weighted to be representative of American veterans using propensity scores, with score functions including gender, age, race, education, and region. The margin of error is $+/-4 \%$ for the veteran sample.

## Trust and Warmth toward the Military

## Americans in general feel more warmly toward American service members than American military leaders.

## Gonfidence in Wartime Gapabilities

## An overwhelming majority of Americans across the political spectrum have confidence in the military's ability to perform well in wartime.

## Most Americans also express confidence in US senior military leaders to perform well in wartime

## Recruitment \& Military <br> Draft

Americans are divided on whether they would advise a close friend or the child of a close friend to join the military. Slightly more than one third say they would, whereas another one third feel unsure. Veterans are much more likely to say they would.


## Most Americans oppose returning to the military draft. Veterans are more in favor, though still close to half feel we should not return to a draft.

## Perception of the Military

## Most Americans think that members of the military are either about the same or more conservative than the rest of American society.

Compared to the rest of American society, do you think members of the US military as a group is more liberal, more conservative, or is it about the same?


Americans in general feel similarly towards US military leaders; however, there are notable shifts in the views of veterans and of Republicans relative to how they see members of the military more generally.


7 in 10 Americans, regardless of political affiliation, believe that the military should be separate from politics. Nearly 9 in 10 veterans agree with this statement.

## Views on the Military

## Two thirds of Americans, including veterans, believe that all combat roles in the military should be open to men and women.

## Only one third of Americans say that the military was more effective when only men served in combat roles. Around half disagree.



## Most Americans agree that the US military is stronger because people of all backgrounds can serve. Democrats and veterans are more likely than others to agree.

Americans are divided on whether they think the military is too involved in non-military affairs: almost half agree, while almost one third disagree and one quarter feel unsure.

6 in 10 Republicans, compared to 4 in 10 Democrats and Independents, agree that there is a tradeoff between a focus on diversity and a focus on preparing for war.

A plurality of Americans across the political spectrum think that the military places the right amount of resources on efforts to include women. One fifth feel unsure.

Americans are divided when it comes to the amount of resources dedicated to addressing racism in the military: one third of Americans thinks it is the right amount, whereas one third, including almost half of Democrats, believes that there is too little attention.

Americans also diverge on whether the military places the right amount or too little attention on addressing political extremism within its ranks. Democrats are more likely to say there is too little attention, while almost 4 in 10 Independents are unsure.

## Military Leaders, the Media, and Social Media

## Survey respondents were randomly assigned into two groups: Group 1 read a vignette in which an Army general responded to a conservative news anchor via social media, whereas Group 2 read a vignette in which an Army general responded to a liberal news anchor via social media.

## Group 1 Vignette

Please respond to the following hypothetical situation:

On live television to a national audience, a prominent conservative news anchor described the US military as being weak and too progressive, specifically saying that the prominence given to women in the military had made the institution soft.

In response to the news anchor, an active-duty Army general responded via social media and called out the news anchor by name, saying that the news anchor was "absolutely wrong" and that "women make the military stronger."

## Group 2 Vignette

Please respond to the following hypothetical situation:

On live television to a national audience, a prominent liberal news anchor described the US military as being "a tool for the militaryindustrial complex" and said that many in the military pushed for America to fight conflicts in order to advance the interests of defense contractors.

In response to the new anchor, an active-duty Army general responded via social media and called out the news anchor by name, saying that the news anchor was "absolutely wrong" and that "no one knows the cost of war more than the military."

Group 1 Vignette: Many Americans across the political spectrum believe that the general's response to the conservative anchor was appropriate. Their assessments of the general's response do not vary significantly by political ideology.

How would you describe the Army general's response? Select all that apply.


Group 1 Vignette: Almost 4 in 10 Americans believe that the general's response to the conservative anchor was not partisan, with Democrats slightly more likely than Republicans and Independents to say it was not partisan.

Group 2 Vignette: Similarly, many Americans across the political spectrum also believe that the general's response to the liberal anchor was appropriate. Their assessments of the general's response do not vary significantly by political ideology.

Group 2 Vignette: A plurality of Americans across the political spectrum believe that the general's behavior was not partisan. One third are not sure.
