ABOUT THE WORK

This artwork is a powerful advocacy for victims of Sexual Gender Based Violence (SGBV). It portrays the profiles of crying voices, the child of the victim, fear, anxiety, violence, struggle, stigmatization, regret, and rape—all harrowing experiences endured by sexually abused women that transcend words.

The colors in the artwork represent streams of emotions and storms of pain. These women exist everywhere—in homes, schools, markets, churches, and society at large. Some remain unseen and unheard, some are traumatized, and some are trying to move on. We see you, and no matter what others may say, WE BELIEVE YOU.

Chidera Confidence Uzoma is a versatile multidisciplinary artist from Urualla, Imo State. She earned her B.Sc. in Fine and Applied Arts from Nnamdi Azikiwe University, Awka, Anambra State, in 2019. Chidera is passionate about life sketching, abstract painting, graphic design, illustration, and coaching.

Her paintings often utilize lines and shapes to convey themes of life, culture, and personal experiences. Her unique "Cubic-abstract" style is inspired by Cubism, where she believes every line and color has a specific significance, and she meticulously incorporates them into her artwork.

Chidera's work has been showcased in 19 art exhibitions across various states, organized by both national and international bodies in Nigeria. She received the 3rd Award at the Art of Sports Exhibition 2022, was a Top 5 finalist for the Artist Residency Lagos-Hamburg Project, and a Top 100 finalist for the LIMCAF Exhibition 2023.


ABOUT THE WORK

It also emphasizes the right to healthy and affordable food for everyone, proper healthcare for all irrespective of economic status, and equal treatment for both the rich and the poor.

Additionally, the artwork advocates for the right to own land for all indigenous people and tribes, protected by laws and relevant agencies. It underscores the right to self-expression and freedom of information without fear of harassment and oppression.

At the center of my drawing, within a circle, is an ordinary African family symbolizing unity and peace. They represent a community living in a country free from crime, judgment, discrimination, and hatred—a home filled with joy and positivity. Master Class organized by the Nigerian-German Center in 2021; and the Upcycling Redefined Workshop organized by the U.S. Embassy in 2021.


She currently resides in Lagos, Nigeria, where she continues her artistic practice.





ABOUT THE WORK

The work depicts about child abuse which are child trafficking, child sexual exploitation, bullying, etc.

The rope: In the work, the child's right hand is in a protesting position which shows that something in her is against the abuse but the rope which is tied on her hand signifies the threat she's getting from the abuser.

The Pen and the left hand: The pen and the left hand that is loosed signifies some slight chances she has to tell on the abuser. It's not obvious but" HELP" is written upside down on her left fingers. The "HELP" written on her hand is not obvious because she is not yet very mature minded to stand

her ground against the abuser. Maybe when she goes to school, church, or mosque, when topics like that are being taught she knows in her mind she is supposed to tell on the abuser but is silent because of the threats she receives

The Zip: The zip on her mouth with a gift box as the zip head signifies element for silence. Instead of threatening the child or in addition to the threats the abuser offers the child enticing gifts to make the child silent.

The Wall: The wall signifies bondage spiritually and emotionally. It affects the child emotionally because as he/she grow the incident is always on the victim's mind

ABOUT THE WORK





The artwork depicts the hidden struggles of women facing gender-based violence, who must conceal their pain behind a smiling facade for societal acceptance. Domestic violence remains a widespread and troubling issue affecting countless women across Africa. Many endure physical, emotional, or psychological harm within abusive relationships, often feeling trapped and unable to escape. Through my mixed media art piece, I aim to visually convey the concept of scars hidden beneath a smile, symbolizing the internal suffering and resilience of these women.

ABOUT THE WORK

Upon encountering the call for artworks by the International Human Rights Art Movement, I was compelled to address the distressing phenomenon of children exploited as "zombie bombers" through indoctrination. My inspiration stemmed from a tragic event in June 2019 in Konduga village, Northern Eastern Borno state, Nigeria, where two girls and a boy were manipulated into carrying out a bombing outside a video hall. Children, as the future leaders of our world, deserve protection and education. Educating a child enriches a nation; they are vessels of knowledge, not

tools of destruction. Innocent and inherently good, children's minds are characterized by playfulness, openness, and an absence of worldly negativity. It is unfathomable to exploit such innocence and subject these beloved children to such heinous acts.

ABOUT THE WORK

The artwork "Gateway to Hell" draws inspiration from the entrenched and harmful practice of female genital mutilation (FGM), prevalent in Kenya, particularly among communities like the Borana and Maasai. The rusted razor blades depicted in the artwork symbolize the countless girls and women subjected to this practice over the years, normalized in some regions despite its severe health consequences. These include complications such as fistula, difficulties in childbirth, and tragically, death during labor.

Contrasting these rusty blades, the new razor blades in the artwork represent the women and girls who have been rescued from undergoing this traumatic experience, potentially saving them from the dire outcomes associated with FGM. The portrait within the artwork encapsulates the harrowing experiences endured by women who have undergone this practice.

ABOUT THE WORK

The painting titled "Consequences" is inspired by the detrimental impact of poor electoral choices, a prevalent issue in Kenya and across East Africa. People often vote based on tribal affiliations or other non-merit factors rather than the qualifications of the candidates. This leads to rampant corruption that hinders national progress, exacerbating poverty and widening disparities. In the artwork, the old, worn-out shoe symbolizes the widespread poverty affecting a significant portion of the population. The newspaper article depicted highlights the severity of the situation, underscoring the pressing issues faced by the country as a result.

ABOU THE ARTIST

Stanley Cheche is a visual artist born and raised in Nairobi, Kenya, boasting a career spanning over a decade. He has exhibited his artwork in a variety of prestigious venues, including the Affordable Art Show at the Kenya National Museum, Kenya Art Fair, East African Biennale, and Dusit Art Show. Stanley has also participated in numerous local and international art competitions, achieving victories in several, including online competitions in 2023.

Noteworthy among his accolades are winning the Kenya on Canvas Art Competition hosted by Safaricom, and the Environment Art Competition in Turkey. He was also a recipient in the Truth Vanquishes Lies Art Competition addressing the Russia-Ukraine conflict. Stanley's artistic repertoire is heavily influenced by his surroundings, covering a spectrum from political and economic themes to social issues. He works primarily in two mediums: mixed media abstracts on canvas and soft and oil pastels on textured paper. His artworks are prominently featured in private collections and corporate products such as diaries and calendars.
