- If you see a BIPOC person
in a confrontation w/ the cops:
- stay at a safe distance
 - clearly & obviously gather
the officers' names & badges
 - know your rights to record:
 - as long as you do not interfere
you are within your
1st amendment right.
 - do not break any laws
(like trespassing) while
recording
 - as long as you are
openly recording you
cannot be accused of
wiretapping.

What white people can do for reform:

- Call your federal legislators to
support the Smarter Sentencing Act
(S.2780), the Justice Safety Valve
Act (S.334, HR 1047), and the Second
Look Act to reduce mandatory minimum
sentencing in the federal level.
- Encourage your state legislators to
support criminal justice reform and to
abolish the death penalty.
- Ask your state council member to
support a ban on no-knock warrants.
- Demand that Mayor Fischer resign.
- Encourage institutions you are
associated with to break their
contracts with LAPD.
- Demand that funds for LAPD
be redirected into local communities.
