I have been a Belmont/San Carlos resident for 33 years and frequently hike Belmont Canyon and Waterdog trails. Due to overuse by mountain bikers, many trails have deep ruts, switchback cuts, and signs of erosion. On numerous occasions, I have been forced off the single-track trail by bikers riding very fast around blind corners. For these reasons, I support designating Waterdog Open Space as a Nature Preserve. In the new Master Plan, all Open Space policy decisions should prioritize conservation and habitat protection, including:

- Designate narrow natural surface trails for hiking only, consistent with best practices of other open spaces
- Close illegal Open Space trails, and restore damaged ecosystems and fragmented wildlife habitat

Dear Belmont Parks & Rec. Committee,

As a homeowner in Belmont, I feel greatly privileged to bike and hike in the open spaces here with my wife and children, and I am motivated to contribute how I can. In addition to attending P&R meetings and regularly communicating with mountain biker groups about responsible trail usage, I am writing this letter to provide evidence-based support from the Mountain Bikers of Santa Cruz Science Committee, who cite over 54 sources, for continued access by bikers to multiuse trails.

I would like to submit for your review the *Mountain Biking Impact Review Frequently Asked Questions*, provided by the Mountain Bikers of Santa Cruz Science Committee in 2019. It can be downloaded from https://mbosc.org/mtb-impact-faq/ by scrolling down to the button labelled "Download a PDF of All MTB Impact-Review FAQs and clicking on that button. Alternatively, you can request hard copies, or submit additional questions from the website.

For your convenience, I would like to quote a few of the points from this review, which seem most relevant to Waterdog and Belmont Open Spaces. My only changes to the content are [explanations of terminology in brackets]:

Hydrology & Geology

- 1) Does mountain biking generate more erosion and other trail damage than other types of recreational trail use? How do physical trail impacts differ based on user group?
 - In general, studies have shown that there is no statistically significant difference in induced soil erosion, excavation, incision (ruts), and trail widening between biking and hiking, and both are far less impactful than horse riding. [1][2][3][4] Erosion on trails depends more on trail design, water drainage, levels of use, and soil properties.[5]
 - The degree of physical impact related to trails is mostly dependent on trail maintenance regime rather than type of use.[4]
 - There are a handful of studies that have been conducted over the past couple of decades looking into the comparative physical impacts (e.g. trail compaction/incision, trail widening, soil displacement and erosion) on trails by different user groups. [1][2][3][4] The general conclusions of these studies are that:
 - On properly-built and well-maintained trails there is little to no measurable difference between the relative impacts caused by mountain bikes vs. hikers.
 - Although there are few quantitative studies on the topic, it is generally accepted that informal/user-built trails tend to experience dramatically elevated rates of degradation due to poor design, management, and construction practices.

 Additional research is needed to more accurately measure the variation of mountain bike impacts based on riding style (e.g. XC [normal trail riding, as in Waterdog], downhill [downhill only riding, as at chairlift access bicycle parks], dirt-jumps, etc.).

3) I frequently notice ruts in local trails. What causes these? Do they lead to more erosion? How can they be alleviated?

- Ruts, soil displacement, and compaction are unavoidable outcomes of trail use over time. Whether by foot, tire, or hoof, soil is being excavated and forms ruts over time. If left unattended, the path will continue to erode from precipitation events.[9][7][9]
- Rut creation is accelerated when trails are wet, which is why riding trails during and following rain events is highly discouraged.
- Proper trail construction and regular maintenance under the guidance of trail stewardship organizations (such as MBOSC) greatly alleviate the effects of regular use.

Plants & Wildlife

1) Generally speaking, what is the impact of mountain biking on wildlife?

- The short answer is that it's complicated. It largely depends on the species encountered, the characteristics of the trail, and the conduct of the trail user.
- The creation and presence of human created trails may lead to the fragmentation of a landscape that was once intact. The effects of fragmentation on wildlife vary depending on the species and the scale of analyses and impact. Fragmentation has been found to be more severe in areas where unsanctioned trails are common.
 - o For instance, Red-legged Frogs can be adversely impacted if a trail traverses within 100 meters of its habitat.^[5]
 - Research has found that some bird species have decreased nest survival, increased predation, or lower nest density in areas fragmented by trails.[9][7]
 - Other species, however, have been shown to use trails to their advantage for travel or foraging, demonstrating that the presence of trails can affect the local composition of species.^{ri}
- The trail user and that user's behavior also will dictate their impact on wildlife. Studies have shown that nesting birds may not be disturbed (e.g. the bird being startled from its nest/perch) by hikers or bikers quietly moving along a trail, but when trail users were noisy (e.g. talking) or when they stopped and/or approached the nest (e.g. birdwatchers), the likelihood of disturbance was significantly higher. Most birds and mammals will react more strongly (i.e., flee) to off-trail recreationists than to on-trail users.
- Research shows that noise can affect wildlife. Noise, however, is subjective and is perceived by different species in different ways.[13][14] Studies have show that bicyclists passing quickly may cause less noise disturbance than other recreationalist on the trail.[11][16][32]
- A number of papers have attempted to synthesize the existing research of recreational impacts on wildlife worldwide. Findings show that a majority (>60%) of the studies reviewed demonstrated some form of negative impact on wildlife from all types of trail use (mountain biking, hiking, horseback riding).[16][17][18]
 - However, these same studies suggest that while recreational trail use may impact individual or groups of animals, population-level impacts to a species are less well-studied and poorly known.

2) How do mountain bikes impact wildlife as compared to other trail users?

 Many studies examined the impacts of recreation on wildlife by user type(s). The majority of these studies however didn't specifically address mountain biking, nor do they distinguish between the wide variety of mountain bike riding types (e.g. cross-country [normal trail riding, as at Waterdog] vs. downhill [lift accessed resort riding]). The few studies that specifically addressed mountain biking have suggested the following:

- o Across a number of studies, researchers found that ungulates (such as deer and elk) are equally or less likely to be disturbed by mountain bikers than by hikers, joggers, or horseback riders.[19][12]
- o The negative effects of trail use on birds is equal across trail use types when users are quiet and continuously moving.[17] Birds tend to be more adversely affected when users stop along the trail, or when they make more noise.[8] [9] [10][19]
- o A study in a network of wildland reserves in Southern CA of disturbance to medium and large mammals found that all user types had negative effects, and that some types of human disturbance were more negative than others (from most to least impactful: pedestrian, bicycles, vehicles, dogs, equestrians).[∞]
 - This study's researchers refer to these impacts as a form of "mortality-free predation" due to the fact that these animals preferentially avoid habitat that humans are a part of.

I am a long time science teacher at Carlmont high school for 20 plus years, and a San Carlos resident. Throughout this time I have very much enjoyed biking and hiking at Waterdog and Hidden Canyon parks.

I have seen vast improvement of the trails driven by the mountain bike community over the past few years, and in my opinion the trails and conditions have improved dramatically since the early 2000s.

I know many students of Carlmont high school that ride several times a week in these parks as well. This is a great local outlet for them that they can access without getting a ride from parents or driving themselves. Though the Peninsula has many areas with trails, the number of bike accessible trails east of hwy 280 is extremely limited, most other mountain bike areas are a 30 minute drive away from Belmont. Waterdog/Hidden Canyon is one of the very few quality mountain bike areas that local adults and teens can access by bike, with no need for a car.

Very often I will bike to work in the morning at Carlmont high school and then finish my day with a ride on the trails of Waterdog/Hidden canyon in the afternoon.

I know that some community members have been lobbying to restrict bikes to only the fireroad portion of these parks. This would be a tragic reduction of available recreation space for our youth and adult residents. Additionally, I'm not sure how this could be enforced in any kind of practical way by the city of Belmont.

Here are some ideas for positive changes that I would like to share as well:

- 1. Bell use by mountain bikers. I currently use a \$3 "bear bell" and hikers appreciate it. There could even be "borrow a bell stations" at the popular trail heads.
- 2. Better signage indicating trail difficulty-easy, moderate, difficult.
- 3. Continued trail improvements done by knowledgeable trail builders. Many of the erosion poor trails have existed for over 20 years and are due to poor trail creation. The Elevator trail is a prime example of this.
- 4. Some one way traffic for bikes on some of the trails to promote safety and more established routes.
- 5. Explore how many US cities are promoting mountain biking as a way to improve the economic and overall appeal of the community.



Dear Belmont City Council and Parks and Recreation Commission,

As we embark upon the Master Open Space Planning processes, and as a Belmont resident, I write to encourage the City Council and Parks and Recreation Commission to reaffirm Waterdog Lake Park and Hidden Canyon's ongoing success as recreational open space.

Myself, wife, and two children (7 and 9) are Belmont residents, and we all use the Waterdog trail system. Our family from SF and San Mateo come to enjoy the park and all that Carlmont village has to offer. We hike and bike in the park weekly for exercise. My kids are learning to MTB on this awesome trail network. Waterdog/ Hidden Canyon park has played a major role in why we live in Belmont. Such a special space with inclusion for so many outdoor activities, and a wonderful sense of community.

Many of us refer to Waterdog as a "gem" of nature and recreation. It is a place to walk, jog, run, cycle, and exercise in a beautiful natural environment of trees, flowers, and wildlife. Recreational open space reduces stress, provides relaxation and revitalization, builds community, increases awareness of the natural environment, fosters environmentalism, and serves the public good.

From a land use point of view, Waterdog's best use is continued <u>recreational open space</u>. It is small – 200-300 acres depending on how you measure – and ringed with suburban development. Although some have proposed re-designation as a nature preserve, the truth is that Waterdog is far too small, and has far too many humans around, to seriously be considered for this purpose. Even if we removed every trail and tried to keep humans out, the animals in the park would still be impacted by the dogs, cats, and humans who live around the perimeter of the park. <u>Humans have a need for open space, too.</u> When you consider that we have already protected the SFPUC Peninsula Watershed's 23,000 acres of oak woodlands, coniferous forests, and serpentine grasslands as a preserve, it is reasonable for the public to allocate 300 acres, just 1% of what has been preserved already, for open space recreational use.

With current recreational use, the park abounds with finch, towhees, quail, deer, bobcats, wild turkeys, rabbits, lizards, woodrats, snakes, and, yes, waterdogs! I personally have seen each of these in the past 12 months alone. These animals have adapted to human uses of Waterdog for over 100 years. There is no crisis here; the ecosystem of the park has been in a steady state for decades. Don't fall for the false narrative of others

looking to weaponize environmentalism as a means to kick cyclists, runners, and other active users out of the park. These narratives serve only destroy community and pit neighbor against neighbor.

When I visit Waterdog, I see a community of hikers, dog-walkers, joggers, and cyclists enjoying the open space, respectful of one another and the wildlife that abounds. It is a place of joy. Waterdog is a testament to successful multi use open space serving the public good. Please support the continued open space recreational use of Waterdog Lake Park.

Dear Belmont City Council,

I am a long time resident of Belmont living and owning a home here for the past 35 years. My family and I have greatly enjoyed living in Belmont and have had much joy in being able to access Waterdog Open Space for recreational purposes including hiking and biking. It has served as a wonderful area for us as a community and spending time with family and friends of all ages connecting with nature. Our community has a need for this type of space, which Waterdog has served well for many years improving the quality of life in Belmont! I am reaching out to you as I understand that you are in process of developing a new Master Plan for this area.

As you develop the new Master Plan, I ask that you please consider to maintain the existing trails which are used for multiple purposes including exercising such as hiking, biking and dog walking, as well as community building and connecting with nature. These types of activities align with those of other Open Spaces in the area. I believe that the current volunteers and community groups who maintain the trails are doing an awesome job and the trails are in great shape.

I understand that there has been some discussion to change the park designation to be preserved as a wildlife preserve. I believe this would have negative impact on the overall Belmont community. Waterdog park is surrounded on all sides by residential development and the existing wildlife has adapted to the presence of people in this area. We are fortunate to already have a 23,000 acre wildlife preserve nearby on the other side of 280 (the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission Peninsula Watershed). Keeping the Waterdog Open Space as the recreational park it is today is one of the highlights that leads my family to desire to stay in this area.

One of the activities that I personally enjoy in Waterdog is being able to ride my mountain bike in a safe and natural environment which is easily accessible from my home. The alternative to this would be to ride in the city streets with much traffic where even an experienced biker such as myself does not feel safe; unfortunately there are few bike lanes in Belmont and the roads are not wide enough to be bike friendly. The only other option involves loading my bike and driving a distance to find another place to ride, which is not convenient nor good for the environment.

Just five years ago another Belmont institution, Belmont Iceland, closed operations suddenly and ended its long history of community recreation. Personally, I was involved with the hockey community there from 1978 until it closed in 2016. Needless to say, I was quite disappointed losing such an important part of our community. I had hoped that the city of Belmont could have kept the rink from closing permanently. Looking ahead to todays agenda and the possibility of not allowing mountain biking at Waterdog in Belmont, I stand strong in my convictions that this should not be allowed to happen for all the reasons stated above. For this 35 year resident of Belmont, I would very much like to see the Waterdog Open Space area remain the wonderful area it is serving the recreational needs of our community.

We're a family of 6 and have enjoyed a lifetime of the outdoors - open nature is our happy place. When we moved back to the area 10 years ago, we chose to live near Waterdog because of Waterdog and frequently cycle to, and through, the park for exercise. The children learned to ride mountain bikes safely in the park - first, up and down Lake Road and around the Lake Loop. As they've become better riders, we've expanded our routes to include all trails. They now frequently ride by themselves or with friends, and pre-Covid, we often picked them up in Carlmont Shopping center eating pizza or ice cream following a ride. We've taught them to be considerate cyclists the only way possible - by interacting with other trail users. We've encouraged volunteerism and community stewardship via trailwork days coordinated by the Waterdog Trailkeepers, a volunteer group that donates about 500 hours a year to the park for trail maintenance. We do all this out of a genuine love for the park and have instilled the same love and respect from my kids.

Personally, I enjoy Waterdog mostly by mountain bike because it is allowed there. I am an experienced cyclist having ridden thousands of miles in my 35+ years of riding. Dear Belmont City Council and Parks and Recreation Commission,

I've just learned that the City of Belmont is embarking upon a Master Open Space Planning process, and I wanted to give my input in support of keeping Waterdog Lake Park and Hidden Canyon designated as recreational open spaces.

This is a very personal issue for me: I'm 58 years old, and my wife and I have been Belmont homeowners for the last 14 years. We both hike, and I also mountain bike at Waterdog/Hidden Canyon. Access to this wonderful local park has helped to keep me sane through my wife's multiple cancer treatments, as well as during the current pandemic. Mountain biking on single track trails requires total concentration, and is my 'moving meditation.'

Bicycling on the road around here can be very scary. I remember reading about an accident when a cyclist was killed on Ralston Avenue by a driver who made an illegal left turn right in front of him, and then reading this: "Cars come first," Belmont City Council Member Coralin Feierbach declared in 2013. Feierbach acknowledged that "when you ride your bike on Ralston you take your life into your own hands." It made me very glad to have Waterdog as a place I could ride and be away from traffic. It's also when I started driving to Waterdog from my house near El Camino Real and Ralston, instead of riding. (I now periodically will ride over, time-of-day/traffic-depending, but it took me a long time to feel comfortable again after that.)

I attended a city council meeting on Zoom a couple of months back, and listened to a couple of people advocating to make Waterdog a nature preserve, claiming that mountain bikers are leading to its destruction and should be banned from the single track trails there.

One woman kept citing an environmental impact report prepared for the Crystal Springs Watershed and implied that it's considerations should apply to Waterdog. Afterwards, I called my father, Lawrence Klein, retired former General Manager of Hetch Hetchy Water and Power, which oversees the Crystal Springs Reservoir and Watershed and asked him about that. His response is that it is like comparing apples and oranges: The Crystal Springs Watershed has been protected for 100 years up to this point, whereas Waterdog has been a recreational open space for many years. The Crystal Springs watershed is protected both for water purity reasons, but also for endangered species found nowhere else, not issues

associated with Waterdog. He had other points as well, and would be happy to share them if any of you wish to contact him, please let me know and I'll put you in touch.

Another gentleman was claiming that riding bikes on single-track trails causes "channelizing" which leads to trail tread damage. I've taken trail design and maintenance classes, and my understanding is that, depending upon soil type and trail design and construction—especially gradient and drainage considerations—that it's primarily water flow that causes what he referred to as channelizing. He gave examples of local parks that don't allow bikes and do not have this issue. My wife and I then went for hikes at two local parks, Edgewood and Pulgas Ridge. I took extensive photos to illustrate trail design decisions, soil types and levels of compaction, drainage features, gradient variations, etc., and I can show you trails that have erosion channels created by water in parks where no bikes are allowed. It comes down to good design, correct construction, and regular maintenance. I'm happy to either share photos or go on hike(s) to look and discuss.

Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District and Arastradero Open Space and others are examples of open spaces that allow mountain biking on single track trails. They don't find it incompatible with other trail users or the fauna of the parks. They've found that with good trail design and maintenance, as well as signage and education about trail etiquette, that single track trails can be shared by all.

I was a part of the volunteer group that worked with the City of Belmont to build the Lake Loop. At that time I was just a volunteer laborer working to give back to the local park I love, but that experience made me curious about all the elements I detailed above, so when I learned that Mountain Bikers of Santa Cruz (MBOSC) had volunteer trail days as well, I started driving down to Santa Cruz to do volunteer trail maintenance down there. When MBOSC announced that they were putting together a Trail Crew Leader program I signed up immediately. It is a series of classes, both in the classroom and out in the field (or forest) that detail all the steps and considerations in trail design, construction, and maintenance.

Our 'final exam' was working on a hiking-only trail in Santa Cruz County (they work with the local land and park managers there) that needed to be rerouted to make it a sustainable trail: It was originally a 'fall line' trail. A fall line trail basically goes straight down a slope. It was channeled and rutted as water rushing down during wet weather eroded it every winter. The MBOSC trail design team rerouted it into a trail with switchbacks, so it crossed back and forth down the face of the slope, and we built drainage features into it: grade reversals, swales, etc. We then 're-naturalized the old trail, covering it with old branches and leaves and duff, so that it was hardly visible. It was a tremendous experience, and gave me a good appreciation for all of the elements involved. (For more info on that program, see: https://mbosc.org/crewleader/)

This note is sent in support for keeping Belmont's open space areas open to all users. During my time as Parks and Recreation Director, I gave a yearly updates on the state of the trail system and open space. We are very lucky to have this open space and it enhances our quality of life in Belmont. It is one of the defining features of the town and a reason that some choose to move here.

The trails should remain open to all users. There is no data or reasonable basis for eliminating mountain bikes. Talking to the Belmont Police Department, there were no reported incidents of conflicts between mountain bikers and other users. As Judy King would say "this is a solution looking for a problem."

Here is what I think the master planning for the open space should focus on:

- Fire prevention- we need to double our efforts to reduce the potential for a catastrophic wildfire from devastating the canyon and nearby neighborhoods. Funds should be set aside to target areas for thinning and fire breaks.
- Invasive species- Waterdog lake contains some quality habitat that should be preserved and protected from the invasive scotch broom and start thistle that are pervasive. This also helps reduce the fire potential.
- Restoring Belmont Creek- The creek daylights below the dam and needs attention. This section
 could be restored to improve wildlife habitat and a thoughtful trail could be built along the creek to
 provide a natural experience.

Once again, do not get caught in the trail use issue and miss the important stuff. The trails do need some erosion control and regrading that can be accomplished by volunteer trail crews supplemented with paid for nonprofits and park staff. We built the Lake Loop Trail completely with volunteer labor which was a three year effort.

Thanks for your time and service to the community. I am pleased to see all the parks and recreation planning that is occurring. Parks management is doing a great job.

I know they set a lot of limitations on additions they add, such as small jumps requiring a safe landing area and line of sight before and after it to know it's safe far before getting to this feature. Many of the riders use timber bell on their bikes as well. This is a fairly reasonably priced bell that is easy to turn on and off. The idea being any time you start a descend, you turn it on so anyone that may be along the trail knows far ahead of time that you are coming down that trail. This does not give the rider a excuse to travel at excessive speeds or to pass anyone they encounter. This is more about giving advance notice of them coming in that direction. Many riders focus on giving the pedestrian or dog the right away, but if they happen to hear the bell and decide to pull off to the side before we get there, they are always thanked. Many of the hikers and dog walkers I encounter thank me and my friends for using these bells to help keep everyone safe. Mountain biking and biking in general has really grown over the last year since the pandemic. It offers people a way to get outside, have a great workout, while also being fun. If nothing else, isn't this what we want right now more than anything? Ways for people to get outside and be healthy considering that we are going through a pandemic and the people who are most affected by it, are the ones who aren't in the best physical shape. I know I would be worried for my life right now if I didn't manage to lose the weight I did prior to Covid-19 being rampant. At one point I was just shy of 400 lbs. It took me over 2 years to lose that wait and biking helped me get to my goal weight of 185. It gave me something fun to do while getting myself healthy.

On top of all that, Waterdog is a destination spot for mountain bikers. People travel all over the bay area to ride here. These people are spending money at local businesses getting gas, buying food, going to bike shops, and shopping in general. There is many places to hike or take your dog in the bay area, but not nearly as many as there is to mountain bike. Losing this privilege would be a huge loss to the community. The people riding there make up a good majority of this community and feel like they have a right to it as much as anyone else. We don't want to be excluded from its use, nor do we want any other group to lose the use of it. I know many of our first responders, myself included, love having this outlet after a long day or week. Please I beg of you, please consider keeping this open space open to all groups as it currently is.

I have been a resident of San Mateo for over 10 years. My home is within walking/biking distance to Waterdog. I was deeply concerned when I learned about the potential changes in the Master Plan. Please allow me to share my thoughts.

I have been mountain biking at Waterdog for many years. Bikers get along well with hikers and the environment. I bike at Waterdog almost every other day if the ground is dry. From my conservations with other bikers. Many are from the local areas.

Biking at Waterdog is part of my life. Mountain biking has been a very important distraction for me, from work and other stresses in life. I enjoy coasting on the trails and keep my mind relaxed. In fact, I started mountain biking at Waterdog and I plan to start my son on mountain biking when he is ready.

I support preserving Waterdog and the wild life inhabitants. However, banning mountain biking from the multi-use single trails is NOT the way to do it. There are a few reasons:

- 1) Maintenance is the key: Either hiking or biking will have an impact on the trails. Proper maintenance keeps the trails in great form and prevents damage in other parts of the park. I have seen great maintenance work in the park over the years and the trails stayed the same year after years. If help is needed to maintain the trails, I would be more than happy to chip in. Either monetarily or physically.
- **2) Management can help:** People's behaviors matter a lot more than the specific type of activities they do. I have seen bad behaviors of people hiking off trail, picking on wild flowers, bullying wild animals etc. Mountain bikers on the other hand, most of them are very focused on riding and well behaved.
- **3) Co-existence:** Waterdog is completely surrounded by paved roads, houses and apartments. Preventing people from biking on the trails does not solve any problems. There is no evidence that mountain biking is more harmful to wild lives than hiking. I personally think the recreational value of allowing mountain biking on trails far outweight the negatives.
- **4)** Successful examples in other areas: There are other parks that allow mountain biking on the trails. The world famous <u>Flow Trail</u> is a good example. There are <u>unbiased reviews</u> there that are worth studying.

Finally, I would like to say that biking on the trails in Waterdog is extremely important for me, for my well being. Yes, there are other biking trails in other areas. Those are not convenient for a quick after-work relaxation ride. Waterdog, being local is too important. Please don't ban mountain biking from the Waterdog trails. As a Belmont resident and long-time biker/hiker of Waterdog Lake Park and Open Space, I urge the Parks and Recreations Open Space Master Plan to continue to serve the community's recreational needs by continuing multi-use access to Waterdog Lake Park.

Bikers, hikers, wildlife and other park users have co-existed at Waterdog for decades. I know that there is a continued effort by a group of activists to ban mountain biking from the park, which I personally think is illadvised and would do a disservice to the Belmont community. The mountain biking community has long supported the park by keeping the trails maintained and safe, as well as by promoting good trail etiquette (trail etiquette and wildlife education are my personal favourite contributions when participating in group rides.) With the proximity of Carlmont Plaza to the park, Waterdog Lake park users, including mountain bikers, bring economic benefits to the community. Removing Waterdog access from mountain bikers would service only a small vocal minority of the community whose objectives and questionable methods appear to be more personal than community-based. I have had some personal experience interacting with these individuals, and their confrontational methods were anything but educational and neighborly.

A small observation on wildlife and mountain biking: Banning mountain biking in Waterdog Lake Park to protect wildlife is a moot point. We Belmont residents are fortunate to live in a community where wildlife have integrated into our neighborhoods, and the wildlife in Waterdog lake park no doubt perceive humans as less of a threat than their natural predators. Conscientious wildlife-loving mountain bikers, like myself, are more likely to stop to appreciate critters, and safely coax them off the trails, than to harm them.



I understand there is an effort under way to limit or eliminate mountain bikes from the park, and I'd certainly voice my strenuous objection. It's a unique park on the Peninsula, and one which allows me to exercise outside in the longer days we get in the spring, summer, and fall.

Water Dog is certainly not the first park where hikers have tried to ban mountain bikers, and won't be the last, but solutions have worked in a great many other places. One solution is dividing traffic—Water Dog seems in good shape to do this, where there are some singletrack trails that are great for mountain biking and not really that useful for hiking. It's not perfect and never will be, but seems to make more sense than banning bikes. Would we consider banning hikers? I don't think anyone would, as it's the least common denominator for trail use, but other than that, but banning one type of trail use would seem like a last resort after other measures had been tried.

I am a resident of Belmont and I think we can all agree that we have a beautiful Open Space gem in Waterdog with scenic, lovely trails, incredible rare and endangered wildlife species, beautiful creeks and marsh ecosystems that allow plants and animals to interact and survive. We can also all agree that we love connecting with nature, love the exercise and revitalization that this natural environment gives us that improves our quality of life. We can also all agree that both hikers and bikers should be able to safely enjoy Waterdog.

When past City officials created the current Master Plan in 1992, they understood these concepts and put forth an action plan stressing Preservation of our Open Space as a most important City goal. I wanted to reach out and voice my opinion regarding mountain biking at Waterdog park.

I'd like to say that I've been a regular rider and hiker of Waterdog and Hidden Canyon since moving to the Bay Area over a decade ago. I will typically ride there 2-3 days a week when the weather permits. The availability of trails to ride in Belmont is why my wife and I bought a home here.

As you know, a great deal of the work on the trails is taken care of by people that ride there. I myself have done a great deal of work maintaining these trails over the years. I'll often remove fallen trees in the winter, fill ruts and fix erosion as well as trim overgrowth when needed. I would argue that a majority of the erosion seen on these trails is from a lack of drainage and not from bikes. I'd also argue that hikers have rarely pitched in on city sanctioned trail days.

Since the beginning of the pandemic, I have noticed more traffic on the trails as more hikers and runners have decided to use them. I know that before the pandemic started, there were very few confrontations between mountain bikers and hikers. I think that signage posted in the park explaining trail etiquette could be useful in making sure that people understand who has the right of way. The Belmont Open Space Master Plan process is making its way through the Parks & Recreation Commission and ultimately to City Council. The Master Plan is a strategic document that studies the existing park system, facilities and recreation programming, and identifies a planning blueprint for the next 15-20 years to improve, protect and expand the City's network of parks, facilities and recreational services for the future.

There is a small but aggressive group of anti-recreation activists in Belmont whose goal it is to ban mountain biking from the Waterdog open space area. They are waging a campaign to have Waterdog designated as a "nature preserve" in the Master Plan and severely limit recreational access to the trails. If they succeed, mountain bike access to Waterdog could be lost for the next 20 years. Unfortunately their viewpoints are being over-represented to the Council and Commission because they have a lot of time on their hands to show up to meetings and send emails. Question #4 - does not list Hidden Canyon Open Space nor John Brooks Preserve. Hidden Canyon Open Space is the largest open space in Belmont (260 acres) and it is DIFFERENT than "Hidden Canyon undeveloped PARK", both in zoning and in planned uses. John Brooks is the size of Waterdog but is a designated Preserve by legal contract, and thus must not be lumped in with Waterdog. Please list ALL four Open Space areas (John Brooks Preserve, Hidden Canyon, San Juan Canyon, and Waterdog Lake).

Question #9 - Open Space - lists only amenities and programs, and overlooks the General Plan Goals for Open Space. These are the only areas in the city residents can come to observe wildlife, find tranquility and solitude, smell the forest, hear birds and study diverse ecosystems. These diverse ecosystems are emphasized in the 2035 General Plan for Open Space and the General Plan Conservation Element (attached). Developed parks offer amenities; Open Space is intended to preserve areas to appreciate nature for natures' sake, not engage in sporting activities. Suggestions expanding human incursion and impact are inconsistent with General Plan Goals and Policies.

Please include the following items in the #9 ratings:

- Protections for endangered species and their habitat
- Programs to conserve native trees and plants, remove invasive plants
- Prevent speeding bikes and fine violators
- Trails reserved for nature study, prohibiting bikes

Please Remove suggestions that increase human impacts such as lighting and, wider trails.

Questions #8 and #9 conflate issues. They are supposed to differentiate "Recreation Facilities" from "Open Space". Recreation facilities do not have "trail work and restoration"; this item confuses the topic of the question. As someone who has previously develop opinion polls, surveys and worked on focus groups, I found the survey difficult to follow due to the lack of organization and, in some questions, inconsistent use of categories (parks, open spaces, recreation facilities). Additionally, in some questions, conflating different categories and inconsistent use of terminology creates a lack of understanding of respondents' intentions.

Confusing questions, leading options, and conflating categories make any survey ineffective by failing to yield an accurate understanding of respondents' intentions. Inconsistencies and lack of organization may lead to confusion which would further negate capturing respondents' true intentions. Lack of clarity creates confusion and results will be left to interpretations rather than yielding clear, understandable results.

Because people likely will not spend excessive time trying to understand the intention of the question(s) -- making things as clear as possible is desirable.

While I would be happy to provide detailed feedback, I have limited my comments to a few obvious clarifications that are needed:

1. #5 "What factors limit your ability to visits our parks and open spaces"

"ability" refers to the participants' "skills" or "capability" or "talent" - rather I think you seek the factors that limit visitors' use of the parks and open spaces.

Clearly conflating parks and open spaces means you will not know which answers apply to which area -- parks or open spaces.

2. #5 relates to parks & open spaces and "facilities"

[]Poor condition/maintenance of facility

[]The facilities-Does not accommodate my needs

The word "facilities" has somewhat consistently be used to address recreation facilities -- now you use the word "facilities" in relation to parks and open spaces which is inconsistent and confusing

3. #7 please clarify by adding bold text: "parks (not recreation facilities or open spaces)"

for clarification

4. #8 please clarify by adding bold text: "outdoor-recreation/athletic facilities (not open spaces or parks)"

for clarification

5. #9 please clarify by adding bold text: "open spaces (not recreation facilities or parks)"

for clarification

Again, the questions that conflate categories will not yield meaningful responses because the respondents' intention will be unknown. Ambiguous survey questions force an *interpretation* of the results; *interpretation* is usually not desired if capturing the respondents' true intentions is the goal.

Just because a machine makes it possible for man to do something, does not mean we should. Implementing ecosystem management best practices for habitat, vegetation and trail maintenance would certainly be a step in the right direction, but to survive, the area needs more than that. Prohibiting e-bikes is essential, as is closing all illegal trails.

In the new Master Plan, please designate Waterdog Open Space as a Nature Preserve, complete with the policing and policies that implies. I do put my money where my mouth is, being part of the community of 500 households who formed an assessment district to bu work from home and continue their pattern of heavy park use during the week.

Thank you for considering this plea. People will say we only have one plaet, or one Earth. It would be better to say that we need to mainrain one habitable Earth, a place which continues to be pleasant to inhabit.






This is just off the Somerset Gate, where you had blocked a cutoff with big logs, I showed you afterward that they just created a new trail



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

We're still amazed that we can have mountain biking adventures in our own backyard! They're full of shining moments, indelibly etched into our boys' hearts.




