# Mānuka

Leptospermum scoparium

Captain Cook called mānuka "tea tree"– he boiled the leaves to make a drink. Some types creep over the ground, and some are trees 10 metres tall.

# Māori use

Mānuka was a handy rongoā (medicine). Its ashes were rubbed on dandruff. Tea made from the leaves eased fevers.

# Where they are found

Mānuka's tough – it lives all over New Zealand, from wetlands to lower alpine areas.

#### **4 Facts**

- 1 Captain Cook used the twigs to make beer.
- 2 European settlers cleared forests, but then mānuka sprang up on their land instead!
- 3 You can tell mānuka from kānuka by its pointy-tipped leaves and flaky bark.
- Its honey and pollen are great for protecting us against bacteria and worms.

# Did you know

The flowers are important kai for native bees, flies, moths, beetles, and geckos.

# **Threats**

Sometimes mānuka is cleared to make farms, but there's still a lot around.

# How you can help

Plant a few mānuka together to start a nursery for other native plants.



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
