

What is Voter Intimidation?

Section 11(b) of the Voting Rights Act states that "no person ... shall **intimidate**, **threaten**, **coerce** ... any other person for the purpose of interfering with the right of [that] person to vote or to vote as he may choose."

Examples of Prohibited Behavior

- Actual or threatened violent or physical acts.
- Improperly following, monitoring, or surveilling voters at polling places.
- Displaying misinformation about voter fraud and related penalties.
- Spreading false information about voting requirements, including valid forms of identification.
- Actual or threatened criminal prosecution, arrest, or other legal actions.
- Actual or threatened dissemination of voters' personal information.
- Phone and physical canvassing campaigns that interrogate individuals about their voting status and history.
- Baseless voter challenges, particularly those that target voters and communities of color.

What Should I Do If I See or Experience Voter Intimidation?

- If you fear immediate violence, call 9-1-1.
- Notify your local election official at your polling place. Poll workers can help you determine who to speak with.
- **Document** what you saw or experienced: what happened, where, and when, and whether any voters were deterred from voting.
