Secretary Visits Rosedale

County Port awarded grant during Buttigieg's MS tour

In his first ever visit to Mississippi, Secretary of Transportation Pete Buttigieg came to Rosedale last Friday to officially announce The Rosedale Bolivar County Port being awarded \$8.7 million through USDOT's Port Infrastructure Development Program. The grant, first approved in October of last year, was made possible through President Joe Biden's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law.

Buttigieg was joined at the press conference, and on a subsequent bus tour of the port, by 2nd District Congressman

Bennie Thompson, Central Highway District Commissioner Willie Simmons and a number of Bolivar County public officials and business leaders.

Grocer Acquires Sullivan's Vinson currently owns **Piggly Wiggly**

Forrest Vinson, the owner and operator of the Piggly Wiggly in Rosedale, has recently acquired Sullivan's Grocery in Ruleville and will be opening the new store on July 2nd.

"I am from South Mississippi and grew up in the retail grocery store business," said Vinson. "My first taxpaying job at 16 years old was bagging and stocking groceries in Sunflower."

According to Vinson, he has experience in every department of the grocery store

facilities. Key allocations include:

- \$1 million for the renovation and upgrade of campus buildings. This investment will enhance the learning environment and ensure campus facilities meet the highest standards for Delta State students, faculty, and staff.
- \$6 million specifically designated for the renovation of Ward Hall and Cleveland Hall. These funds will be used to undertake essential renovation and related work to these historic buildings.
- \$4.02 million for repair and renovation projects allocated through the Capital Expense Fund. These funds, appropriated through Senate Bill 2468, Section 5, will support critical infrastructure improvements.
- \$2.5 million to construct and operate a preK-6th grade school for Bolivar County. DSU President, Dr. Daniel J. Ennis, expressed his gratitude for the legislative "We are immensely support, saying,

business.

"I helped my father when he purchased his first Piggy Wiggly and as his assistant manager, before moving to Louisiana Tech University in Ruston, Louisiana for school," said Vinson. "I graduated Louisiana Tech with a degree in Aviation Management."

Vinson said he joined the military to help pay for his college. He is a combat veteran and has been deployed in Afghanistan and handled disaster relief for six hurricanes, including Katrina.

Between 2010 and 2015, Vinson bought the Rosedale Piggly Wiggly from his father and partners after managing it for many years.

In 2016, he married his wife, Ginger Vinson. He has two step daughters, Lyndsi and Lanie Naron, and one daughter, Frances Vinson.

Henderson Announces Jackson Bid Cleveland native seeks capital city's highest office

Delta native and military veteran, Tim Henderson, is seeking to become the next mayor of Mississippi's capital city after launching his campaign during a speech at the Jackson Medical Mall on May 30.

The Democratic candidate, who is challenging incumbent Mayor Chokwe A. Lumumba in the party's primaries, promised to prioritize public safety and economic development, to invest in Jackson's young people and to maintain a clean city.

"My vision for this city is a safe, clean, vibrant city where all Jacksonians are partakers in a new economy," said Henderson

Henderson, a retired Air Force lieutenant colonel, graduated from Mississippi Valley State University with a Bachelor of Science degree in biology. He is currently a doctoral candidate at Jackson State University in Public Policy and Administration and the CEO of Henderson Strategic, LLC, which provides subject matter expertise in space and military operations to the United States Space Force.

He said he intends to work collaboratively with local, state and federal entities to "garner the resources that we need to move this city forward."

In a post-speech conversation with reporters, Henderson explained why he decided to run for office.
