2018 POINT IN TIME

Denver County Summary

This report summarizes the county level data for Denver County, Colorado.

The Point in Time is a snapshot of those experiencing homelessness in our community on a single night. This data was collected for the night of January 29th, 2018. The full Everyone Counts Metro Denver Homeless Initiative's 2018 Point in Time report¹ goes into detail explaining the methodology used while preparing for the count, executing the survey throughout the seven-county region, de-duplicating and cleaning the data, and extrapolation methods utilized. Refer directly to the regional report when interpreting the data contained in this county specific report.

Additionally, previous county level reports included information for either "all homeless" or "respondents" as noted in each section. If comparing data between years, this methodology change needs to be considered. The "respondents" were only the individuals taking the survey, which does not include other household members such as children or adults. Only respondent data was reported for several categories in past county reports, including: veteran status, unaccompanied youth, newly homeless, and chronically homeless. This 2018 report provides data for "all homeless" in every category.

Denver increased efforts to identify and survey persons experiencing homelessness during this Point

in Time count. There was a dedicated coordinator who managed efforts throughout the county, which supported increased and more comprehensive communication with agencies and sites throughout the area. Agency and site participation both improved from last year. Two magnet events were held to support identification of two populations: transition age youth and veterans. Denver also increased street outreach coordination in 2018. Denver's Street Outreach Collaborative supported planning efforts for the mapping and zoning of "hot spot" areas across Denver. These professional outreach team members led agency staff and volunteers in surveying each identified zone. Lastly, the large downtown Denver shelters continued to work with the CoC to improve surveying, sampling, and database use this year.

The Point in Time (PIT) data references those persons that meet the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development's definition of homelessness. Communities across the nation follow current [HUD methodology guidelines](#)² for the count and tailor the survey to the needs of their own localities and regions. Persons in temporary living situations or who are at risk of becoming homeless (such as those staying with friends or family or paying to stay in a motel) are not included in this count. The definitions below describe the guidance in more detail.

HUD PIT Homeless Definitions³: Continuums of Care (CoCs) must count all individuals or families who meet the criteria in paragraph (1)(ii) of the homeless definition in 24 CFR 578.3. This includes individuals and families:

Sheltered Count

“living in a supervised publicly or privately-operated shelter designated to provide temporary living arrangement (including congregate shelters, transitional housing, and hotels and motels paid for by charitable organizations or by federal, state, or local government programs for low-income individuals)”

Unsheltered Count

“with a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings, including a car, park, abandoned building, bus or train station, airport, or camping ground

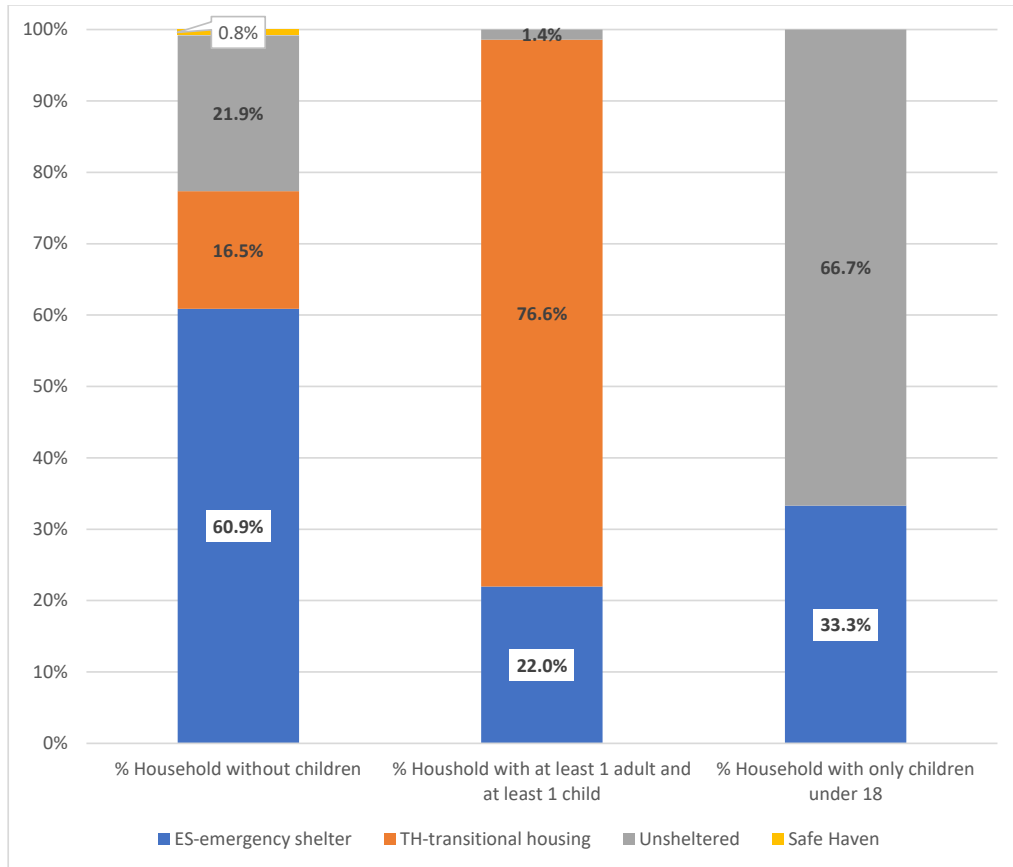
HUD HOUSEHOLD TYPE BY LIVING SITUATION

NUMBER OF PEOPLE IN EMERGENCY SHELTER, TRANSITIONAL HOUSING, AND UNSHELTERED LIVING SITUATIONS

The number of people staying in shelters (52.8%) is almost double the amount of people in transitional housing (28.9%). Adults without children represent nearly 80% of those experiencing homelessness who were surveyed. While families were most likely to be in transitional housing, adults without children were 91.4% of those in emergency shelter and 98% of those surveyed who were living unsheltered on the night of the Point in Time count.

CHRONIC HOMELESSNESS

HUD defines persons experiencing chronic homelessness as those who (a) are homeless, (b) are living in a place not meant for human habitation, in a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter, (c) have been homeless and living in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or an emergency shelter continuously for at least 1 year or on at least four separate occasions in the last 3 years where the combined length of time homeless across those occasions is at least 12 months, and (d) have a disability.
