Yours ... or mine?

Ours! Owning something, or a possession, is something we have always lived with, and always will - all around us are things we have accumulated or been given - and we are grateful.

But in this time of Lent, it's not only a matter of reviewing what we have or what we need, but what we share.

When Jesus was asked by His disciples to teach them how to pray following His example, as well as His cousin John and his followers they were amazed when He taught them to address God as "Father". This was new, different and unexpected! He was sharing with them access to His Father! Rarely is God called Father in the Old Testament – with which they were familiar as their scriptures. Even more, they were to speak to Him, pray to Him, listen to Him as "our Father".

So in most acts of worship, in most denominations today we are familiar with this act of sharing: "our Father". He is our heavenly Father, as well as all Christians, in all parts of the world, in all languages! And we are all His children, sisters and brothers of His Son, Jesus! When visiting Lee Abbey (where there can be many members of the community from overseas), or in acts of worship abroad, we are invited to pray the Lord's Prayer in our own language.

You will find the prayer in Matthew 6 and Luke 11. Do look it up in your own Bible and note the different translations. In all versions we identify, and have fellowship with, all other Christian believers, when either we live alone, in family, or in our local Church fellowship. The Lord is our Father – our Lord and God, friend and guide, comforter and healer – everything and all we would hope for in an earthly father. Our means He loves us and cares for us, and we share all that with our fellow-Christians!

Readings for this Week: 25th February 2024 Lent 2

COLLECT:

Almighty God, by the prayer and discipline of Lent may we enter into the mystery of Christ's sufferings, and by following in his Way come to share in his glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

AMEN.

PSALM 22:23-31

- 23. Praise the Lord, you that fear him;
 O seed of Jacob, glorify him; stand in awe of him, O seed of Israel.
- 24. For he has not despised nor abhorred the suffering of the poor; neither has he hidden his face from them;
 But when they cried to him he heard them.
- 25. From you comes my praise in the great congregation; I will perform my vows in the presence of those that fear you.
- 26. The poor shall eat and be satisfied;
 Those who seek the Lord shall praise him; their hearts shall live for ever.
- 27. All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the Lord, And all the families of the nations shall bow before him.
- 28. For the kingdom is the Lord's And he rules over the nations.
- 29. How can those who sleep in the earth bow down in worship, Or those who go down to the dust kneel before him?
- 30. He has saved my life for himself; my descendants shall serve him; This shall be told of the Lord for generations to come.
- 31. They shall come and make known his salvation to a people yet unborn, Declaring that he the Lord has done it.

A Reading from the Book of Romans

Romans 4:13-25

¹³For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. 14 If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. 15 For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. ¹⁶For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, 17 as it is written, "I have made you the father of many nations") —in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. ¹⁸Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become "the father of many nations," according to what was said, "So numerous shall your descendants be." 19He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. 20 No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, ²¹being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. ²²Therefore his faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness." Now the words, "it was reckoned to him," were written not for his sake alone, 24but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, 25 who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

Mark 8:31-38

Jesus tells his disciples that he will suffer, and tells us all that following him will involve sacrifice.

³¹ Jesus began to teach his disciples that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. ³² He said all this quite openly. And Peter took

him aside and began to rebuke him. ³³ But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.' ³⁴ He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. ³⁵ For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. ³⁶ For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? ³⁷ Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? ³⁸ Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.'

The **WORLD DAY OF PRAYER 2024** will be on **Friday I**st **March.** The service this year has been prepared by a group of Christian women from Palestine and will be held at Fordingbridge United Reform Church starting at 2pm. Please join us - everyone welcome.

The window in the North Chapel at St Mary's Fordingbridge will have the large panels removed during March 11th to March 13th inclusive for the stained glass to be re-leaded. This is necessary because when the window was made in the 1950s a composite material was used instead of lead and this window, along with many others in churches all over Britain are in danger of collapse because the composite material has deteriorated. Our window will be with Salisbury Cathedral Glass for approximately 10 weeks before it is replaced. The window will be made weatherproof during that time. Nigel Spratt
