

# PROGRAMS Human Trafficking

March 31, 2020 marked the end of our 5 year project funded by Department of Justice. Our project goal was to fill gaps in care and provide support 100 trafficked people in Ottawa and Eastern Ontario. The project was conceived by a survivor of domestic human trafficking who wanted other survivors to have the support she wished she'd had.

The project was a great success and in the end 204 people were supported. You can find our project evaluation report on our website under resources.





Almost half of the people we served were age 19 and under.

96% identified as female, 12% identified as indigenous and 3% identified as LGBTQ+

As the fiscal year ended we scrambled to accommodate the realities of the pandemic. **From April 1, 2020 to March 31, 2021**, an additional 35 survivors accessed our services through the Hope Found Project bringing the total number to 239.

Early 2021, we were delighted to learn that funding for this project would be continued through Public Safety Canada.



# PROGRAMS Human Trafficking

The Path Found program was officially completed at the end of June 2021. Funded by the Ontario Trillium Foundation, this 3 year program was developed to provide survivors of sex trafficking with skills, knowledge and confidence to rebuild their lives. **The key measure was to reduce isolation which ended up being very timely as the pandemic started.** 

Members of Path Found participated in four separate five-day long sessions that included skills and knowledge based training, individualized support and mentoring, and peer support as aspects of a continuum of care. Throughout the program, participants were encouraged to their hopes and and dreams before being trafficked and set goals within the program that helped them to realize those dreams.

The program was open to survivors in Northern and Eastern Ontario and with the support of Sudbury Victim Services and Kingston Victim Services, we had a total of 30 survivors who attended programs.

One of the biggest challenges was planning in-person weeks once Covid hit. The answer was to do some virtual workshops and with some great planning, we held in-person, physically distanced, in-person weeks during periods of reopening.

In the end, we achieved our goals - 30 survivors benefited from the program, built a community, and learned that they have what they need to build a new life.

"I am extremely grateful to be a part of this program because I feel genuinely cared for, protected, empowered, and safe. This program has been very helpful to me because I made strong connections to others, which healed me very much. This is teaching me to help myself as well as others. I also love that my culture feels truly respected because I had real trouble finding culturally sensitive programs/help/care for the past couple of years and that was hard because it felt way more traumatizing than helpful. Now, I feel like a large weight has been lifted off my shoulders because I could let my guard down long enough to feel safe and experience healing through Path Found."



# PROGRAMS Childhood Sexual Abuse

We've long recognized the need for barrier-free support to help adults who were sexually abused as children. Fortunately, a private family foundation supported our vision and in November of 2019, awarded us with 3 year funding to launch Strength Found.

Like all of our programs, this was designed through the lens of lived experience and addressed the gaps we saw in existing offerings - it supports all genders, there is no cost to participate, and we provide access to therapeutic support at no cost for those who meet the criteria.

Excitement built as we gathered stakeholder input, established a program office, planned our first year, and put together a 15-week program (thanks to The Gatehouse).

March 16, 2020 was to have been the first day of training group facilitators and we were ready! March 11th, the World Health Organization declared a pandemic.

Like many, the word 'pivot' became part of our every day vernacular. Despite the many challenges, we launched the program and became experts in facilitating virtual groups.

One of the highlights of the first year was our official launch event. Live-streamed from a campfire at Saunders Farm, Sean McCann performed and spoke of his recovery and healing through love and music.

By the end of March 2021, we provided support to 54 survivors and declared the first year a success.

# SERVICES

# Health Care

The clinic is a client centered "one stop shop" model offering multidisciplinary care. Due to survivors' chronic multiple morbidities the model includes primary care, psychiatric, trans health care, sexual health care, victim services support, crisis management, provision of basic needs and peer support from those with lived experience. provision of basic needs, and peer support services in a single location.

Over the fiscal year ended March 2020, we saw an increase from 129 to 223 individuals accessing services, demonstrating the need for this important service.

Based on our evaluation of services, changes in the organization, and the impact of COVID, we made some changes and in April of 2020, we rebranded from H.E.A.L.T.H. to become **The Clinic.** 

Significant changes include being open more hours, easier access to all Voice Found services, and bilingual care. With the pandemic, we moved to virtual care and adjusted to a hybrid model when safe to do so.

Our partnership with Ottawa Centre for Resilience, allowed us to continue provision of mental health services.

We are proud to say that our funding has been continued and appreciate the support of the Province of Ontario, Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services






#### Revenue FY 2019-2020




#### Expenses FY 2019-2020




#### Revenue FY 2020-2021

Our team successfully pivoted and continued excellent client care. We learned how to provide care virtually and by phone throughout these challenging times.

Our Path Found and Hope Found programs were busier than ever serving some of our most vulnerable clients who faced increasing struggles during the pandemic.

Voice Found redefined and rebranded our health clinic that serves clients with a traumainformed approach. Most people do not understand the special care and time that is needed to care for our clientele in a supportive manner after they have suffered traumatic events. We were able to introduce a brand-new program, Strength Found set to start just as the pandemic occurred. The responses from participants have been heart-warming and remind us why Voice Found needs to continue to exist long into the future.
