

Message from the Council

The work of the Child Nutrition Council of Manitoba continues to gain prominence and understanding as the issues of child poverty and food security are on the minds of many in our communities. As the Chair of the Council for the past several years, it has been my privilege to see this organization grow and become a trusted leader in Manitoba with respect to school meal programs.

In September of 2022, we were thrilled to be notified by the Provincial Government that we were going to receive an additional \$1.3 million in annual funding. This increase in funding comes after six long years of advocating with government as to the dire need for more support for schools.

With the addition of a very generous donation from an anonymous donor along with a substantial increase in corporate and individual donations, we were finally able to increase the funding allocation to schools by a significant amount. This additional funding also allowed us to hire one more dietitian to support our schools.

Our small, but mighty staff, Maxine, Clara, Janelle and Mae continue to amaze our Board with how hardworking and dedicated they are to ensuring that children in schools have access to high quality and nutritious food on a daily basis. This spring, we had to bid a fond farewell to both Janelle and Mae who decided to move on to different career options. In July, we welcomed Allison Austman and Tegann McNiven. Allison is a registered dietitian and will be working directly with schools, while Tegann will be providing administrative and fundraising support to the Council.

Our Board of Directors has also had a few changes. In October, we regretfully accepted the

resignation of Sam Turenne, our Vice Chair. In the fall, we also recruited three new board members to expand the size of our board and as of December welcomed Ian Joyce, Deborah Smith and Leanne Madder. In August, Leanne regretfully resigned from the Board as her family has relocated abroad for work.

Since joining the Council in 2015 and later becoming Chair, I have found that this is one of the most rewarding, but challenging experiences I've had in a non-profit organization. The rewards come through the day-to-day work when we see how appreciative schools, children and families are with the financial and program support we are able to provide. The challenges, however, are never ending — the need grows day by day as more schools are starting to deliver school meal programs and more and more children, everyday, are accessing those programs. With the cost of food continuing to rise, we must continually ask for more funding from government, corporations and individual donors. With your help we can succeed — for the children!



In addition to the support from the Council, school meal and snack programs reported they were able to get additional support from school divisions and community donors. This included: **21,268** hours of volunteer time, **68,274** hours of staff time and **over \$371K** of food, supply and service donations. In addition, **210** schools received coupons for eggs from a partnership between the Council & Manitoba Egg Farmers.

Program Types & Delivery Methods

Schools consider their unique circumstances to decide how to best deliver their programs to address the needs of their students. More than half of the schools supported by the Council chose to offer multiple programs throughout the day; a combination of breakfast, snack or lunch, in a variety of settings.


In 2022-23 the Council supported school meal and snack programs in every region of our province. Close to half of the programs are located within Winnipeg and just over half are located outside of Winnipeg.

Program Support

The Council's Registered Dietitians are continuously working with the school programs across Manitoba to provide a wide range of supports to meet the diverse needs of the meal and snack programs. Our goal is to ensure that school meal and snack programs have the professional support they require to be able to provide effective programs that offer a variety of foods that meet the nutrition requirements of their students.

Site Visits

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Our dietitians met with 90 schools in person and 114 over phone/video calls to answer questions, help solve problems, and share new ideas and resources.

Resource Development

In order to keep information relevant and to respond to the needs of school meal and snack programs, we are always developing and updating resources. In 2022-23 we developed 5 new resources and updated 13. **Receipt Reviews**

We completed a comprehensive receipt review for 168 schools to provide feedback on food purchases.

Educational Webinars

We facilitated three webinars for school staff and volunteers. In the fall, we provided an orientation webinar for new programs. In February, Nita Sharda, RD presented on "Incorporating plant-based eating into school meal and snack programs" and in April, Getty Stewart presented on "Food Waste Prevention".



Top Challenges Reported

Programs are continuously telling us about the positive impacts of CNCM's support and the lasting benefits it has on the students and families. We also want to hear about the barriers they are facing as this allows us to review how we support and advocate for our schools.

The Child Nutrition Council of Manitoba strives to develop important partnerships and was fortunate to have students support our work while gaining experience to complete their studies.

How Much Time Does it Take? - In April 2023, dietetic intern, Kiersten Buckert from the Manitoba Partnership Dietetic Education Program (MPP) analyzed the time it takes to operate a school meal and snack program in Manitoba. Kiersten collected data from 104 rural and urban schools in Manitoba and concluded that an investment in paid personnel is needed and is a critical component of school meal and snack programs' success.

From the 104 schools surveyed, on average it took 10 staff/volunteers 23 hours per week to run the program. Of the 23 hours, 15% were unpaid staff hours, while 26% were community or student volunteer hours.

Most ran the program 5 days per week, with multiple delivery types serving an average of 124 students per day.

Here's what schools are saying:

- "If we had more time, we could be providing more healthier options and increase variety."
- "There is never enough time! It has become its own entity in our school that could use a full-time person just for it."
- "Time constraints associated with running nutrition programs at school writing and finding grants for funding, recruiting volunteers, meal/menu planning, shopping, expense tracking/budgeting/, submitting receipts for reimbursement, scanning flyers for deals or negotiating potential deals with stores, exploring partnerships in the community to reduce food costs, etc."
- "Money needs to be allocated to staff."
- Website Redesign Kelsey Stanford, a Master of Public Health student at Memorial University, Newfoundland completed a practicum placement with CNCM. She was tasked with reviewing and collecting relevant information around school food and the role CNCM plays in health promotion. Through literature reviews and interviewing stakeholders, she was able to organize and disseminate this information, which will be included in the redesign of CNCM's website in the fall of 2023.

Financial

We continue to make meal and snack program grants and nutrition support a priority of our work. All funds raised stay in Manitoba, reaching children in all regions of the province.

In 2022-23, the Council granted **\$2.7M** to Manitoba schools. The grants were able to cover approximately **20%** of calculated food costs. The total calculated food costs were estimated to be **\$15M**

While the people coordinating programs are extremely dedicated and resourceful, with increased funding, programs would be able to increase the **variety**, **amount**, and **nutritional quality** of food offered.

There are **51 programs on our waitlist.** This does not include the many other schools in Manitoba who would benefit from a meal and snack program.

Stone Soup



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
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
