

The History of Caaroline & Penman Antiques Fairs

Caroline Penman (nee Filmer) was, at the age of 9, determined to be an antiques dealer. Her parents moved from a modern home in Reigate, to a Tudor house in Lindfield, W Sussex. They visited shops, auctions and houses open to the public, to furnish a period home. Caroline found that she could remember facts & dates, while her elders forgot them. At school, gradually double history lessons took over from sports & sciences, and her knowledge of social history and associated artefacts grew, concentrating on the 18th century.

In her school holidays she worked in the local antique shop in Lindfield, Sussex, then **Brighton Fair** came into Caroline's life, and she worked for Cultural Exhibitions Ltd, in 1959. Every July thereafter she was at the Brighton Fair (which was a very social event!), working for Reg Wilkinson (glass) for 3 years, before taking a stand of her own.

Caroline left school at 16 for a part time apprenticeship at Eric Seldon's Eastbourne antiques shop. She started buying, with the £2,000 left to her by her grandmother.

1962: Parents bought her a shop in Lindfield ,nr Haywars Heath and at the age of 18 Caroline opened her own "Lindfield Antiques" shop. 99 High Street. It's now a dress shop.

1967: Caroline's 1st fair, **Lindfield Antiques Fair**, in the local King Edward Hall. A 2-day event in August 1968: she launch of **the Mid Sussex Antiques Fair** at Martletts Hall, Burgess Hill.

1969 April: launch of the **Ardingly Antiques Trade Fair** at the South of England Showground. June: Caroline married a Royal Engineer, Richard Penman, who was rapidly bought out of the army, and became involved in dealing (in model engines & tin toys), and together they showed at varioys antiques fairs including Brighton and Kensington, Wilton House, South West fairs, Howison-Howorth Fairs and North West Fairs run by Noel Gibson and Sue Brownson - using an American RV as a base (great fun!)

When VAT started (1973) the prospect of special scheme book-keeping for the fast turnover in the shop and fairs was too daunting, so the shop was sold. Caroline & Richard still showed at fairs, travelling all over the UK, enjoying travel in an American camper van.

Gradually the organisation of the Fairs took centre stage.....especially after Richard's car accident in 1981, after which he was in a coma for 6 months, then gradually improved, but he never was quite himself again. 1983 bought a flat in Chelsea as 2 months a year spent in London Fairs – sold flat in 2006, for more profit than all the fairs in the interim! From about 1990 Caroline ceased all dealing, concentrating on organising Fairs.

There were Penman Fairs in the provinces and in London, from outdoor "boot fairs for dealers" up to standfitted, vetted multi-day fairs. From 2021, semi retired, Caroline only runs the Petersfield Fair.

Up to 2020 there were approx. 363 fairs run by Caroline, as Caroline Filmer, Penman Antiques Fairs, and Penman Fairs Ltd - 244 standfitted antiques fairs, 35 Art Fairs & 84 unfitted fairs.

Penman Antiques Fairs 1967 onwards

1967 – 1984 LINDFIELD ANTIQUES FAIR Annual 2 days, August Bank Holiday. After 1984, it was passed to Ron Beech who also took over Tony Keniston's fairs. Lapsed around 2004.



1968 - 1970 MID SUSSEX ANTIQUES FAIR Martlets Hall, Burgess Hill Annual 2 days

1969 – 1985 **SOUTH OF ENGLAND ANTIQUES TRADE FAIR**, Ardingly Showground

Initially 60 indoor stalls, some vetted. Outside pitches grew to 800, Eventually 5 times a year, with up to 1000 stalls+ Abergavenny and Pig & Sheep Building Sold 1985 to Geoff Witacker (owned Newark), whose son sold all to DMG

1979 - 1983 Various showground, aerodrome fairs were tried, to emulate Ardingly:

2 years: EPSOM RACECOURSE ANTIQUES FAIR 1 year: BIGGLESWADE Old Warden Aerodrome 2 years: CAMBERLEY AERODROME

1 year: THRUXTON AERODROME 1 year: NEWICK Village Hall, sussex 1 year: PETERBOROUGH Showground

1979 – 1982 SHEPTON MALLET FAIR, West of England Showground. Indoors and outside.

1982 Given to Dave & Anne Stroud as a wedding present. They sold to DMG in 1995 & emigrated to

Australia. DMG employed Sue Ede to run all the "IACF" fairs. Annual then twice a year

1973 – 1977 NATIONAL COLLECTORS' FAIR Cumberland Hotel, Marble Arch

bought from Eric Gamlin for £250, ran twice a year, 3 days, 50 stands

1978 – 2010 WEST LONDON ANTIQUES FAIR Kensington Town Hall. Originally Jan only,

August date added in 1984 but sold in 1997 to Clarion Events. 3 floors, up to 90 stands

1980 - 1991 **BRIGHTON ANTIQUES FAIR** Corn Exchange

taken over from Roger Heath Bullock, Cultural Exhibitions – 4 days up to 50 stands

1982 TUNBRIDGE WELLS ANTIQUES FAIR The Spa Hotel, Only ran one time following a burglary

(Sue Barton's silver being stolen overnight)

THAME ANTIQUES FAIR Spread Eagle Hotel, Oxfordshire (taken over from Eric Gamlin) 1982 - 1984

1983 – 2020 CHELSEA ANTIQUES FAIR, Chelsea Old Town Hall - Established 1950.

> taken over after the death of Josephine Graham-Ballin. Originally 10 days open, March & September 2000 the BADA Fair started, ½ a mile away in March, so Chelsea was September only (6 day duration) 2003 the March fair became "King's Road Antiques Fair", 4-day duration, to avoid competing with BADA. When LAPADA fair started in Berkeley Square," Chelsea" reverted to March running concurrent to BADA Fair 2020 The BADA fair was taken over by Open Art Fair, but Covid 19 stopped the fairs for a year....

1985 **CHARLESTON MANOR** Oak & Country Antiques Fair, E. Sussex

Only one edition as the single track drive proved too problematic to administer!

1985 GROSVENOR HOUSE Private Fair - Penmans were employed by the Junior League of London for the

entertainment of 400 guests after lunch. Exciting, hard work but only profitable for a few dealers!

WESTMINSTER ANTIQUES FAIR Horticultural Hall, Vincent Sq (taken over from Donald Newby) 1986 - 1995

45-50 stands, a happy and popular Spring fair.

1987 - 1989 CITY OF LONDON ANTIQUES FAIR, The Barbican, (started in partnership with Raymond Gubbay, 1989 David Walker & the City Art Fair joined, in the 2nd Barbican Hall. It was then sold to The Daily Mail

Group, who moved it to and sold it on to the Design Centre in Islington, where it lasted 3 years.

1989 - 2019	CHESTER ANTIQUES FAIR, County Grandstand, Chester Racecourse Started from scratch encouraged by Valerie Owen Hughes, local dealer at fairs. Originally February only, with October date added in 2000. 45-55 stands on 3 floors For 2 years a contemporary Art Fair was added next door, but this did not take off. 2019 Sold to Sue Ede of Cooper Events, who added "Decorative" to the name
1989	BRITAIN IN HONG KONG SHOW The new Exhibition Centre, HK Opened by Charles & Diana. 8 exhibitors shared a section. Great fun but financial disaster.
1989	CHELTENHAM PERIOD HOME SHOW, Pitville Pump Rooms Beautiful but nightmare building to standfit, did not take off. 40 stands.
1992 - 1993	THE LAPADA SHOW Royal College of Art, organising logistics for LADADA
1991 - 1998	SUSSEX OAK & COUNTRY ANTIQUES FAIR , Barkham Manor Vineyard, E Sussex. In a lovely Barn, relaxed lovely setting, the barn augmented by add-ons including an art fair (twice). 25-35 stands. The Vineyard was sold & new owners did not want us
1993 - 2000	KENSINGTON ANTIQUES FAIR Kensington Town Hall W8 Acquired from Roger Heath Bullock (t/a Cultural Exhibitions) In partnership with Terry Gasson (dealer) Originally November. Became confused with "West London"
1996	A new group of Contemporary ART FAIRS was established, Chelsea was the only success: 22 years: Chelsea Old Town Hall – 45 stands (B Cooper managed 2013-2017) 4 years: The HAC, Armoury House, City – annually, 35 stands 2 years: Mid-Sussex, Barkham Manor – in conjunction with antiques 1 year: Winchester Guildhall – looked wonderful, but very poorly attended. 1 year: Frogmill, A40 Nr Cheltenham – on 2 floors, but we were not asked back! 1 year: The Swan at Tetsworth – in a marquee alongside the antiques centre. 1 year: Kensington Town Hall
1998 - 1999	THE 20TH CENTURY SHOW Chelsea Old Town Hall Well-received, perhaps should have waited till 2000. As Deco etc was so popular, dealers didn't need to show at fairs to sell! Sad!
1998	CITY OF LONDON ANTIQUES FAIR, Honourable Artillery Co, (HAC) Wonderful building, but not as popular as the Art Fairs in the City. 40 stands
1999 - 2000	WEST OF ENGLAND ART FAIR, The Pavilion at Bath (with Duncan & Jacki Phillips)
1999	LINGFIELD PARK FAIR Lingfield Racecourse - non-standfitted, not very successful
2000 – presen	t PETERSFIELD ANTIQUES FAIR , Festival Hall Established 1973 by Eric Gamlin, taken over from widow, Heather Gamlin. February and September, (plus a June fair, dropped after 2002) 2020 Feb a success, Sept cancelled due to Covid 19
2001	BATH ANTIQUES FAIR The Pavilion, great expectations — but a flop! a one-off
2002	HOUGHTON TOWERS FAIR Nr Preston Too far from home, too small, so a one-off
2003 - 2005	DULWICH ART FAIR Dulwich College - contemporary
2004	TYTHE BARN FAIR Nr Bicester a one-off, 25 stands, not allowed to advertise!
2004 - 2007	BURY ST EDMUNDS ANTIQUES FAIR The Athenaeum, (no fair in 2006) Attempted upstairs, uneven floors. Downstairs only 28 stands.
2004 - 2005	UCKFIELD ANTIQUES FAIR Civic Centre Not popular nor profitable, so only two
2005 - 2012	ANGLIAN ART FAIR . Cressing Temple Essex – 2 beautiful medieval Barns Really beautiful setting, 3 years with antiques in 1 barn, art in the other
2006	New LINDFIELD ANTIQUES FAIR trying to add standfitting – too small! Not repeated

2006 - 2008	SUSSEX ANTIQUES FAIR, a new hotel venue: East Sussex National Golf Hotel June 2006, moved to October in 2007, added ART in 2008, but lack of visitors finished it.
2006	Celebrated CHELSEA's 100 th fair in Sept.
2006	SOLENT ART FAIR Gunwharf Quays, Portsmouth – in a marquee, one off
2010	TOWCESTER ANTIQUES FAIR, T Racecourse, venue could not offer same space again, one-off
2010	The last WEST LONDON ART & ANTIQUES FAIR in June, against Olympia & its American Director.
2012	CADA Fair at Blenheim Palace, working for the Cotswold Antique Dealers Association.
2012	GUILDFORD ANTIQUES FAIR, newly rebuilt Civic Centre, June & December.
2013 - 2017	CHELSEA ART FAIR now under Ben Cooper's Directorship – fewer higher priced stands
2014	Ben Cooper & Barbara Bell made co-directors of Penman Fairs Ltd with C Penman
2015	MALL GALLERIES ANTIQUES FAIR logistically difficult & too small – not repeated
2016 - 2017	FIRLE PLACE ANTIQUES FAIR in Tithe Barn, Lewes, Sx. Small not well supported
2016 - 2018	BURFORD ANTIQUES FAIR, B School – lower level 40 stands. Passed to 2Cs Fairs 2019
2018	WINDSOR ANTIQUES FAIR, Royal Windsor Racecourse. Eagerly anticipated, but a disappointment, 2019 date offered but no exhibitor support. Sad!
2019	Penman Fairs Limited closes, Caroline continuing as a sole trader. Running Petersfield Feb & Sept Chelsea Town Hall closed for major refurbishments so no fair Chester sold to Sue Ede of Cooper Events, Burford passed to TwoCs Fairs.
2020 Covid Year	Only ran Petersfield in Feb. Chelsea cancelled , just prior to lockdown. Chelsea offered to new organisers. Eventually found "2 Covet" who bought the fair
2021	Covid prevented Feb & April Petersfields. Sept Petersfield should go ahead OK.

Fairs that never quite happened:

1982	Guildford Antiques Drive-in, Rugby Club. Rained off, on the day!
1992	Great plans to move Chelsea to Royal Hospital Grounds, but failed to get permission.
1995	Great plans for City Antiques Fair at Hon. Artillery Co field, but could not get support
1997	Planned but Cancelled ASCOT Antiques Fair
2006	Planned but cancelled HOVE and SHERBORNE Antiques Fairs
2006	CAMBRIDGE ART Fair proved impractical, on first floor, insufficient parking.
2008	June CHESTER ART Fair planned in a different building – cancelled, insufficient support
2014	Planned CHILTERN Antiques fair, cancelled, lack of support.
