


Leadership Traits

- Idea Creative, free thinker, single-minded
- Start-up Energetic, multi-tasker, generalist
- Growth Dynamic, able to motivate people, able to plan and create systems
- Maturity Able to manage people and processes, sees value in stability
- **Decline/Regeneration** Willingness to shake things up, able to motivate
- Turnaround Take charge, doesn't take things personally, able to make quick decisions
- Terminal Good communicator and negotiator, organized and orderly, cares about clients




Food for thought

Benefits of taking a Lifecycle Approach

- Helps establish a starting point for developmental efforts
- Helps set realistic expectations for future stages
- Aids in recognizing behaviors that are typical, but also those that are out of synch
- Depersonalizes weaknesses
- Provides clearer understanding and assists us in becoming more effective advocates for our organizations

Speakman Life Cycle Matrix – Self-Assessment tool

- All organizations begin as an idea
- From that idea, a few grow to be very large while most remain small and serve a narrow geography or audience
- In general, organizations go through predictable stages from start up to growth and maturity the organizational life cycle.
- Different functions of an organization grow and strengthen at different rates but are intertwined in an organizations success
