We provide support through the areas of training, networking, advocacy, promotion and provide FBN led initiatives that benefit all our local business and community stakeholders. We launched the network one year ago and now have over 110 FBN members. We have the support and sponsorship for the FBN over the next 3 years from FQM, Galaxy, Maca and Medallion metals.

The website contains a local business directory, local job and volunteer opportunities page and tender opportunities that are available in the Fitzgerald biosphere region. Please take a look at the new website.



The FBN provides local business training to our FBN members at a reduced rate and we have free business after hours events held every quarter for our members either in Hopetoun or Ravensthorpe which are good networking and promotional opportunities.

The event was held at the Hopetoun Community Hall, lunch was catered by Wavecrest and drinks provided by Dawry's Bottlo, both of whom are current FBN members.

This information session provided a great opportunity for businesses and local community members to hear an update from the FBN, the mining companies and to have a network opportunity.

Cultural Awareness Training

The FBN recently arranged for Shandell Cummings from Awesome Aboriginal Consultancy come to Hopetoun on Thursday December 2nd to deliver cultural awareness training.

We had 40 people attend the training. During the training we learnt and discussed topics around Noongar Culture, History and Impact of Colonisation, Cultural Understanding & Consideration and Bush plants & foods.

Do you have an interest in history?

Ravensthorpe Historical Society

The following is the text of a letter recently sent to respondents of a survey conducted by this Society who indicated an interest in being involved in its future. It was felt it would be worth putting the letter out to the wider audience of Community Spirit readership.

Thank you for your participation in our recent survey to gauge support for a proposed extension. Eighty seven percent of 53 participants supported the proposal.

However, we are aware within our Management Committee of our dwindling numbers and their advancing years; some respondents also raised this issue as part of their response to the survey.

Accordingly, we have decided to defer the extension proposal in the immediate future and as a priority rebuild our membership to include younger and new members and then plan a more modest extension. The purpose of this letter then, is to invite you to consider being part of this process.

A question you may ask is 'why when I'm busy already should I be involved?' The answer may lie in listing some of our achievements noting also that in 2020 Ravensthorpe Historical Society (RHS) celebrated 50 years of endeavour.

- RHS displays a collection of an estimated 5,500 historical objects relevant to all aspects of life in and around Ravensthorpe/Hopetoun since the beginning of the twentieth century.
- RHS maintains a particularly fine collection of 5,600 historical photographs, 3,649 of which have been scanned and stored in a digital format.

• RHS maintains an extensive archive of written material on people, places and events diligently collected from print media and other sources over 50 years but going back to the beginning of the twentieth century. These data enabled Ann Williams to compile a Municipal Inventory of most of the historical sites in the Shire.

- RHS has published one book and 6 booklets on Ravensthorpe/Hopetoun historical topics. A new booklet on history of schooling on the Phillips River Goldfield is planned.
- RHS manages the Visitor Centre currently providing 36 hours per week of tourism services including information, maps, gifts and souvenirs and local crafts sales. At \$30 per hour this is an in kind contribution to our community valued at \$56,000 pa.
- RHS enables public interaction and recognition of our historical heritage by organising tours of, and signage, for significant sites.
- The Kukenarup Reconciliation Memorial which opened in 2015 recognises past injustices and paves the way for reconciliation with Noongar people.

None of these happened without a great deal of effort and commitment. Collectively they contribute significantly to the cultural life of our community and present a resource for historical research and queries about ancestry such as 'do you have any information on my grandfather who worked on the mines here in 1920?'

Jim McCulloch Park Sign Re-Instated



The new sign for Jim McCulloch Park at Hopetoun was installed during the week. On January 26, 2 of Jim's daughters, plus grand-daughters, a great grand-daughter, extended family and friends were present to take the opportunity to remember one of the great community members of the Shire of Ravensthorpe.



The original park sign was removed in 2015 due to safety issues with the deteriorating timber, which was sourced from the old jetty. When the Shire staff were alerted to the importance and significance of the sign to the Hopetoun community its replacement became a necessity. The upgrade works to the park really were incomplete without the sign.

Old Jim McCulloch Sign

Jim McCulloch's work in the community was honoured by having the playground in Hopetoun named

after him. But it is difficult to understand his mark on the community and the impact he has had in shaping the town of Hopetoun and the Shire of Ravensthorpe. This was acknowledged when he was presented with a 'Freeman of the Shire' certificate by the Shire Council for outstanding and meritorious service. However, his hats were many. He was a member of the Phillips River Road Board, and Ravensthorpe Shire Council. He was involved in the rifle club, Red Cross, Farmers Union, Bush Fire Brigade, Hospital Board and Historical Society. In 1979 he was presented with an MBE for his work in the community.

In 1996 he was awarded a 50 years of service certificate for his work as an ambulance man and driver. In 1969 when he moved to Hopetoun he helped repair the jetty, built the boat ramp and stonewall (that remains today), helped the CWA extend their building, dismantled part of the old train yard building which was then used for an extension to the Port hotel, and moved the old goal into the museum at Ravensthorpe.

Importantly, he was instrumental in convincing the Shire Clerk to build a better road line up Mt Barren, and in 1982, along with Win Chambers and others, started the Ravensthorpe Wildflower Show. He was a member of the Methodist and then Uniting Church and was a prominent fundraiser for the St Peter the Fisherman Church.

The sign itself was made by local Hopetoun steel artisans. It is a modern take on the old sign, but uses steel that will weather and patina and blend into its surroundings. It also has the eucalyptus leaves cut-outs which is a nod to Jim's love of the bush and time spent collecting wildflowers.

The Shire would like to thank Rod and Lyn Daw who assisted in bringing Jim's legacy to our attention and would like to acknowledge it has been a really enjoyable and satisfying project for all those involved.



The Life of John "Jack" Fitton

20.8.1923 - 16.1.2022

Obituary

The Early Years

Jack was born 20.8.1923, the second of 5 children, (Len, Jack, Alice, Ida and Elma). The quiet and calming genes must have been used up by the boys, Len and Jack, because all the girls sure could talk!

His father Jim arrived from Crompton in Lancashire via the steamboat 'Armadale' in 1912. He was aged 23. By 1920 he was in the Dongolocking Hall marrying Ethel Mellowship who had moved across from South Australia with her family.

According to the 1922 Electoral Roll, Ethel and Jim were farming on 'The Pastures' in Dumbleyung. It was here they raised their family and the land is still in the family today.

While the girls rode to North Moulyinning School (built about 1928) in a sulky, Jack usually rode a white pony called Dolly. She was extremely docile and Jack would also ride her while he shot foxes and rabbits, a roo dog came along as well. Apparently if you dropped her reins, Dolly would remain in the same spot and wouldn't move!

During WWII, Len and Jack were told they couldn't enlist for overseas deployment

as they were 'too young ie Jack was about 16 at the start' and required as 'essential manpower', they did cop some flack from people about not fighting. They were, however, in Army Citizen Military Forces. Jack was noted as Private W74157 Australian Army, 10 Battalion VDC.

Instead, they carted the wheat for the farmers in the area, really hard work by hand. 'Old Frank' Treloar designed and built a bag

loader which made their job a whole lot easier.

Jack and Len never seemed to argue between themselves or with Pop Fitton. All were good workers and just got on with the job, but each would contribute suggestions of tasks that needed to be done. Len was the machinery man, Pop had his horses and Jack loved the sheep and horses. He hated cows, reckoned they just ate the sheep feed!!

Food was always important to Jack. I remember him as being one of the fastest eaters I have ever known. As soon as he had finished, he was ready for the next project! I remember having a long discussion with him regarding Ida's legendary Christmas trifles. Jack would have the odd beer but those trifles were potent!!!

Jack loved his dancing, sport, rifle shooting, farming, fishing and prospecting.

Always jobs first, and then fishing. This was typical of Jack, calm and measured. I'm sure that he wasn't a pushover either, once his mind was set it was hard, if not impossible, to change it.

The Farm

Jim Fitton added more land to the farm in 1945, when the family bought a neighbouring farm called "Stockdale" and joined the two properties under that name.

Jack and his brother Len farmed in both Moulyinning and Tarin Rock. He saw the change from horses to tractors, the first purchase being a Cat 22.

In the 1950's, they bought a Cat D6, which was a big tractor for that time and used it to clear the block at Tarin Rock. Pedericks were developing a range of rippers and rakes at the time so Len and Jack had some input into the design and demonstrated them on the Mouly farm.

After clearing the land, they hooked 3 scarifiers together with a home-made hitch and used the D6 to pull them. It would have been about a 30 foot cut, which for the late 50's was huge!

Jack and Len loved their stock and had both sheep and Red Poll cattle. They probably had one of the first silage cutters in the district and also did silage bunkers.

In the early 60's the stock kept them so busy, they took on share farmers, beginning with Alan and Brian Prosser, then Murray Clarke, and from 1967 Johnno Cook.

Jack was a member of the Kukerin Rifle Club and there were many years of keen rifle shooting and friendly rivalry with Trevor Mycock.

The war on rabbits continued and Jack would often sit with his .22 Springfield and a box of bullets and easily shoot 50 odd rabbits.

Fishing was always on the agenda for Jack. The house that Pop Fitton had built in Hopetoun in 1955 became the Fitton holiday destination for many years. After seeding and harvest, there were regular family fishing trips to Hopetoun.

When Pop Fitton died in 1966, Jack moved over to the smaller house with his Mum. After she moved into Dumbleyung Hospital in 1970/71, Jack started having his meals with Len's family, which on one occasion caused a few giggles. Len's wife Doris had dished up a curry and Jack commented that it could do with a bit more kick - needless to say, next curry was kicking!!

Jack continued to go on family holidays to Hopey and went fishing on the jetty every night or trolling for pike, always taking home a decent haul.

Jack was always up for an adventure and loved his prospecting. He did a lot of caravanning and camping, travelling to various parts of Australia with Alice and later on, on his own.


When Jack's brother Len died in 1976, Jack stayed on the farm and helped his nephews Peter and Alan for a few years, making sure that things were running smoothly before he made the move to Hopey and started the next chapter of his life.

The Hopey Era

We all put our heads together and came up with 1980 as being about the time that Jack took up full time residence in Hopetoun. There was an open invitation to visit him in Hopey, which many of the family did over the next 36 years!! There are three things of immediate recall about Hopetoun–fishing, bowls and sandals.

Sandals - the footwear of choice for retired farmers and fishermen. Jack wore them continuously and they out performed thongs on all fronts.

Fishing - Jack had a bit of a different take on fishing - the fish never stood a chance. He had this bucket that use to hang in a tree out the front of his house. Anything that was edible to a fish went in it. The fish head and guts from the previous days fishing, bacon scraps, bones, bread, anything really. While he was cleaning his fish this bucket went on a little open fire and got a good bubble up, then back in the tree it



went. Next day around 4ish he'd wander down the jetty with his bucket and a fishing line. It could be dead quiet, no fish biting until the first ladle of brew went in. Then the whole jetty would light up - people would be catching fish up and down the jetty.

Bowls - There were some days Jack didn't go fishing. They were bowls days. Jack got into bowls. At one stage he was playing at least twice a week and became very good at it. He was a winner in the Mixed Doubles with P Cousins and the Men's Pairs K Brough in 1988-89. He also became very dedicated to maintaining the grass on the bowling rink, watering and mowing became "the job for him". Jack was often seen on his pushbike as he headed down to the Bowling Club twice a day!!

Hopetoun gradually took its place on the map. When we were first visiting Jack we used to leave messages (date

and time of arrival) at the General Store. He would get the details when he next visited the shop for supplies or the paper. Then he got the phone on. I'd call him as I was coming up to the Hopey turn off. "Jack, I will be heading into Hopey shortly, do you want anything from town". His stock answer was, "oh, you could bring some salad if you like". Always that was his stock answer, with me, he never missed. He ate healthily, fish and salad - may be that's the secret to seeing the 98-year-old counter come up.

Another Jack passion, now that he had a bit of time on his hands, was gold. He used to head north in his Nissan Patrol, with a tray back camper and metal detector in hand (note, Nissan Patrol - he was a Nissan man through and through). He also became quite good at gold detecting - Jack found and gifted numerous gold nuggets to members of the family. I could keep Jack talking for hours about the yellow stuff.

He was also very fond of local history. I can recall him setting off to retrace Hollands Track all the way through to Kalgoorlie. He knew all the local history of settlement and the surrounding farms. And of course, gold, historic mining sites and anything to do with yellow stuff was of great interest to Jack.

As the years ticked along things changed. The Hopey house had some upgrades verandah's were closed in, a kitchen reno was completed and the ablution block was connected to the house. The boat and the tractor disappeared (I bet the Pike were glad about that - a fish species that Jack used to target), then the Nissan disappeared to be replaced

by the first Gopher Cart. You had to be quick to beat Jack to store if you were walking, that Gopher used to whizz past. Jack lived by himself to age of 93 in Hopetoun. Jack remembered Hopetoun fondly and I'm sure a lot of people in Hopetoun remember Jack fondly.

Jack's Wagin Time

Now it's time to talk about Jack when he left Hopetoun and came to Wagin.

In 2016 Jack was talking about moving into care after one more summer in Hopey, but later that year, he had a bad fall and ended up in Albany Hospital for an extended period.

The doctor recommended he not go home-there was a room available at Waratah Lodge in Wagin, so he came to see if he liked it. I remember he commented that "he loved the food and could get used to having the girls looking after him" - so he stayed!

But Jack was still hell bent on keeping healthy, the staff were amazed when he started doing squats and standing push ups using the hand rail in the passage outside his room.

He also used to go down town on his gopher regularly - it was a beast of a machine that looked like a 3 wheel motorbike - and it was always on the fast speed setting!

In May 2017, I took Jack out to the farm for a visit, and we drove around just about every paddock, and he was pointing out things and giving Peter and Alan gentle advice just like the old days!

On the way back, we stopped in at Pussy Cat Hill so he could see the Dumbleyung Lake, which was full after the February floods that year. He really enjoyed that day but was tucked up sound asleep

in bed half an hour after I dropped him back at Waratah!

After a year at Waratah, Jack commented that "I am putting on a bit of pud, my pants are too tight, I will have to cut back on the morning and afternoon tea" so just like that, he did!

He enjoyed going on the outings that Waratah organised, even though he did comment that the bus seats could have been a bit comfier!

During 2018 Jack really became settled into his new way of life and the staff had come to know him quite well. One day, when I went to visit, one of the girls told me Jack was asleep, they all knew when he was napping, due to the loudness of his snoring - some things didn't change apparently!!

He was always keen to hear how his Hopey house was going and was happy to know that the family were using it, both Merisha and Bron stayed there and Evan even managed to park his monster of a caravan in the driveway on a few occasions, no mean feat I can tell you! In 2019, Jack started to lose a bit of his confidence with going out on the gopher, so he asked me if I would take it, reckoned I could use it to go shopping with - maybe a tad early for me, so it went into storage in the shed instead!!

2020 took its toll on Jack, losing Peter was very hard for him and he started to struggle physically.

The mind was still sharp as a tack though - he kept the staff on their toes and would tell me to be on my way if I fussed too much!

One thing he especially loved was when the girls gave him a back rub after his shower, it helped with his aches and pains - but if they were a bit too hard, he would say "steady on now" still in charge of things!! 2021 was a year of ups & downs.

Jack would have good days when he chatted, either about the farm, always wanting to know about the sheep and how Hopey was going, he quite often dreamt of going fishing or off on a road trip.

Other days he would just want to sleep and recharge, then he would be chirpy again and eat well, his favourite snack was vegemite on toast.

When Jack reached his 98th birthday in August, the staff made him a lovely cake and made a huge fuss of him!!

The following months were spent sleeping a lot, but he rallied for the Waratah Xmas Morning Tea - had a great time listening to the singing and devoured everything I put on his plate - and what was on mine as well!!

Jack saw out 2021, but he was getting weary. On one visit he did ask me how old he was and when I said 98, his response was "Are you sure, I feel like I have been 98 for a long time, reckon I have just about had enough!"

Jack peacefully left us at 6pm on January 16th, 2022. He went out on his terms, as he had lived his whole life, a man loved by many.
