RAVENSTHORPE RALLIES: Local businesses step up to keep essentials flowing

The local retail community has shown resilience, adaptability, and unity following the closure of FE Daw & Sons FoodWorks. Local businesses and the Shire of Ravensthorpe quickly rose to the challenge, working to ensure essential items remained available to residents.

The Cellar and Goods Store, which had already started supplying high-quality butcher's meat and a small range of gourmet goods, expanded their offerings to include dairy products and weekly fruit and vegetable boxes.

Keen's Mini Mart also stepped up, extending trading hours and a reliable supply of fresh fruit, vegetables, bread, milk, and grocery lines.

Ravensthorpe Agencies have focused on increasing their supply of pet food and household essentials, while Shell Ravensthorpe continues to stock grocery basics.

Hopetoun IGA is playing a role by offering home delivery to Ravensthorpe three days a week on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday and both Hopetoun Beachfront Chemist and Ravensthorpe Pharmacy continue to supply monthly specials on household items like soap, tissues and surface cleaners.

The Shire of Ravensthorpe has also remained actively involved, working behind the scenes to support both the community and local businesses. A Shire spokesperson said the Shire is "in constant communication with the broker who is selling the FoodWorks business in Ravensthorpe, with the aim of ensuring a good operator is up and running as soon as possible."

They added that while a temporary bus service was considered, "there does not seem to be the demand for it at this stage. This may change in the future."

A community survey conducted by the Ravensthorpe CRC immediately following FoodWorks' closure showed residents are eager to support local shopping.



Although the proportion of grocery spending had dropped significantly in recent years, survey responses indicated that, with better variety, pricing, and fresher produce, locals would shift up to 70 per cent of their grocery spend back into Ravensthorpe representing a significant opportunity for an incoming operator.

With the freehold and grocery business still on the market, Ravensthorpe has demonstrated it will not wait on the sidelines. Local businesses have responded swiftly to meet immediate needs, the Shire is actively working to secure the right operator, and the community has made its intentions clear: they want to shop local and are ready to back a well-run supermarket. The opportunity is there for an operator who can deliver variety, quality, and consistency - and they will find a town united, resilient,



and confident in its future.

Word of the Day

garble verb | GAR-bul

Definition:

To garble something, such as a word, name, message, etc., is to cause it to be unclear or distorted. This type of garbling can be the result of an accident, ignorance, or a transmission error. Garble can also mean "to so alter or distort as to create a wrong impression or change the meaning."

Did You Know?

Garble is a word with a spicy history, and we're not just saying that to curry favor with gastronomes. It is presumed that this word was passed from Arabic to Mediterranean Europe through trade in Eastern spices, and was first introduced into English from the Anglo-French verb garbeler, used for the action of sifting out impurities—such as dust, dirt, husks, etc.—from spices. In the 15th century, the English garble carried this same meaning as well as "to cull," i.e., to sort or pick out the best parts of something. If these origins seem curious given garble's now more common meanings of "to so alter or distort as to create a wrong impression" and "to cause to be unclear or confusing; to introduce error into," consider that one way of garbling someone's story is to take bits and pieces out of context.

Ravensthorpe Historical Society (Inc.) Annual Report for 2024 Presented to AGM March 22nd, 2025

I've just noted that I commenced my last Annual Report with the phrase 'it's been the most challenging year of my presidency so far'. Well it's fair to say nothing has changed, if anything the challenges are now even greater. Our lack of success in gaining Commonwealth Government funding for the extension project has indicated where we won't be going in the immediate future, but our engagement with consultant Cathy Day has indicated some directions we should be going in spite of that lack of success. I will return to these issues.

Before I go any further I would like to acknowledge the passing of Ian Goldfinch on April 14th, 2024. Goldie was our driving force when it came to the extension project; no one could have done more. In my view our lack of success was due to other priorities at the national level and political considerations rather than the quality of the submission.

I also acknowledge and thank Derek and Ann Williams as well as Jenny Lloyde who have re-located to Busselton and Albany respectively for their support over many years.

The 'stand out' event of the year was undoubtedly our engagement with Heritage Today consultant Cathy Day who spent November 25th-28th in Ravensthorpe/Hopetoun to make recommendations for future directions for RHS and spoke with RHS members, visitor centre volunteers, Shire CEO and Community Sport and Recreation manager and Shire President. Cathy also facilitated a public meeting on November 27th attended by 28 people. Cathy produced a report with recommendations, some of which have already been implemented; these are discussed as ordinary meeting business rather in detail than here. Cathy's participation was pro bono; a return flight from Perth was provided by Arcadium Lithium, accommodation and transport were provided by Sue Leighton and Colin Hughes.

The remaining activities for the year divide somewhat arbitrarily into the following groupings:

Facilities management, Digital access and technology, Events, Publicity, Curation, Security, Membership, Visitor Centre and Craftshop.

Facilities Management. We have begun re-arranging the visual entry statement in keeping with visitor focus recommendations from Cathy Day by making the Museum entry more eye catching, open and inviting by better use of the Chuditch/Echidna display. Only last week Colin Hughes removed the front counter high front for immediate eye contact with visitors as they come through the door. It has made a splendid difference. Colin provided his cabinet making (and unmaking) skills pro bono; I thank Colin for his generosity.

Digitial access and technology. We have dispensed with the Ilnet/Messaging Company fiasco for phone/internet/email/wi-fi in favour of Telstra by NBN delivery.

Events. We held a very successful Mystery History Tour based from Hopetoun on 19 May; 26 people with 10 vehicles attended. A highlight was lunch at Springdale Café. We also hosted a thank you lunch for visitor centre volunteers on October 5th attended by 18 people at Sue Leighton and Colin Hughes' Blue Vista property.

Publicity. We had eight articles in Community Spirit throughout the year as well as numerous Facebook postings thanks to Madeleine. In February alone there were 12,600 views reached 1,600 people of whom 707 were followers.

Curation. Enid Tink accessioned 59 objects and Chenda Goldfinch scanned 150 photographs. Chenda indicated at our last ordinary meeting that she had now scanned 4,000 photos and still had about 4,000 to go!

Security. Funded by Arcadium Lithium we have had installed eight motion sensitive floodlights in the Museum courtyard. They were installed by Mark Lloyde.

Membership. Our current total membership is 26 members. The greater majority of members are out of town supporters. While they are of course very welcome and valued we only have five local people actively involved in the management committee which by our constitution requires eight.

Visitor Centre and Craftshop. We had 4999 visitors in 2024. This is down on last year's figure which was 5780 which was our highest ever. Approximately one third of visitors also enter the Museum. As reported in Madeleine's annual statement entry fees and donations were \$3,904.05, shop gross takings were \$21,837.00, 80% of this went back to local vendors/suppliers.

RHS welcomes and thanks the following new Visitor Centre volunteers: Andreas Preisser, Jenny Chambers, Judy Harp, Gabriella Kastro, Anita Schuler and Claire Daniel.

I think that RHS has a sound rapport with the Shire of Ravensthorpe and I believe we should work to maintain that relationship.



BAITING TO PROTECT NATIVE WILDLIFE

.....

Under the Parks and Wildlife Service's Western Shield program, baiting to control foxes and feral cats occurs on more than three million hectares of conservation lands in Western Australia.

The baits used are toxic to introduced animals but not to native animals which have an evolved tolerance to the active compound (1080). All baited areas are signposted.

Baiting occurs on a regular and ongoing basis to protect endangered native animals including the numbat, western ground parrot and western swamp tortoise.



Attention pet owners: these baits will kill domestic dogs and cats. Baited areas must be considered dangerous for pet dogs and cats at all times.

School students shine at launch of Genestreaming Journey Sculpture

At the recent launch of Ravensthorpe's Genestreaming Journey Sculpture in the town's Cultural Precinct, a crowd of some 100 adults, students and children were delighted when Mrs Coralie Daw led the school choir in the song 'Kaya' – the Noongar word for 'Welcome'.

Ravensthorpe District High School's rich and vital involvement in this Gondwana Link project was also highlighted by student Miah Cox giving the Acknowledgement of Country.

An outstanding speech by Head Girl Pearl McManamon acknowledged Noongar Elder Aunty Carol Pettersen's guidance, and said "Through this project, we have explored Aboriginal art symbols and how they tell the stories of Country. These symbols are more than just drawings—they hold the history, culture, and spirit of the land.

They remind us that Country is not just where we live; it is alive, and it holds the stories of the past, the present, and the future. We also learned about songlines, which are ancient pathways of knowledge and connection. Just like these songlines weave through the land, our artwork weaves together our learning, our respect, and our appreciation for the First Nations ways that have cared for this land for thousands of years."

Pearl's words were an inspiring springboard for Noongar Elder Aunty Carol Pettersen to explain the significance of working with the local school students and staff to create eleven of the artworks that are displayed on the sculpture's exterior 'petals' (or bracts). Aunty Carol said, "We didn't have our Noongar artist in residence here, and so I engaged with the school, and it was the most wonderful experience."

Aunty Carol spoke to the gathering as the co-founder of the Genestreaming Journey Sculpture Project. She co-ordinated the artworks that describe and reinvigorate the cultural connection to Country conveyed in Noongar songlines.

On the theme of "journeys" and songlines, Aunty Carol explained that "Noongar people have reference points – we've got the mountains, we've got the hills, we've got the rivers, we've

got the flora, the fauna – that show us where our country is, and it helps us to maintain our belief system. And when our people walked, they really did sing. They sang with the land. But deep beneath that, when we talk about deep time, the land itself sings a song."

Understanding the "genestreaming journey"

Ravensthorpe's Genestreaming Journey Sculpture brings together culture, science and conservation. At the launch, artist and fellow Genestreaming co-founder Ben Beeton offered insights into what is meant by the words "genestreaming journey". If you think of a "gene pool" as all the genetic information present in a species' current population, it represents a snapshot in time of that species' genetic diversity, but if you add the gene pool of the next generation of that species, then the next generation, the next generation, and so on, you end up with a stream of genes flowing through time.

That's the "genestream" that is referred to in the sculpture. And the Tree of Life, which is represented in the sculpture, grows from the genestreams that underpin the evolution of each species.

It's very important to keep the genestreams flowing so our native species keep evolving as they have for millions of years. That's part of the messaging of this project: what can we do through conservation and ecological restoration to keep the genestreams flowing.

Ben explained to the audience that when you walk inside the sculpture, you're representing the whole of humanity within this evolutionary 'Tree of Life'. The orange line on the base plate represents the human species and you're walking back through time, over millions of years.

The evolutionary tree is by no means something that is peripheral to our daily lives. We're surrounded by it. It's everywhere. We should think of ourselves not as only as custodians of nature but as part of nature. So the sculpture is about the connectivity of nature.

The Ravensthorpe sculpture focuses on the species of this area—it's a unique thumbprint of this place, explained Ben. When you enter the sculpture, you're not only seeing the scientific illustrations of species (each one of the 'petals' on the sculpture represents a different family of plants) but also a giant map of the region.

As of January 2025 all class 3 local governments in Western Australia, including the Shire of Ravensthorpe, are now required to publish audio of council meetings online.

Members of the public who attend meetings and ask questions will be included in the recording.

The video of the most recent Ordinary Council Meeting held at the Hopetoun Community Centre on Tuesday 18 March 2025 is now available for viewing on the Shire website: ravensthorpe.wa.gov.au

Many, many, many millions of years of genestreaming have gone into the creation of that incredible evolutionary diversity that is in the Ravensthorpe Range—it's a very special place. "There's so much to learn in the sculpture, and I hope you'll keep coming back to it and build projects around it", said Ben.

The Ravensthorpe Regional Herbarium, Gary Muir of Walpole Wilderness Eco-Projects and landscape ecologist Nathan McQuoid were key information sources for the sculpture's internal elements. Working with information about the region's botany, ecology, geology and deep time history, scientific illustrator Mali Moir and artist Ben Beeton spent extensive time in Ravensthorpe and developed the Ravensthorpe Field Naturalist artwork which is installed in the interior of the sculpture. Illustrative input was provided by Chenda Goldfinch, eco-dyeing by Kier Douthie and Haiku Poems by Helen Taylor.

The local perspective

Shire President Tom Major said the sculpture is a great way for our community to celebrate First Nations culture and the rich biodiversity that we have right across our region here. The Shire was honoured to support this project, and it's fantastic to have such a highly visible and meaningful public art piece within Ravensthorpe's cultural precinct.

He commented that "One of the best parts of this sculpture is the way it involved the students from the Ravensthorpe District High School." Five places between Ravensthorpe and Northcliffe now have physical sculptures as part of the Gondwana Link Genestreaming Journey Sculpture Trail and Mr Major said "it's exciting to be part of this broader public art project".

Natalie Cordon gave a heartfelt account of the student's participation in the project. As the Noongar language teacher at the school, she embraced the opportunity to extend the student's knowledge through connecting with Aunty Carol.

Natalie said, "Noongar is an oral language, a very beautiful language. The words come from the sounds of Country, from the ocean, the waterways and the skies. Aunty Carol taught us about the songlines and with the help and support of our wonderful art and science teacher Nikki Crane, this project became a unique experience for our students, as they immersed themselves in learning the language of Country through art."

Natalie explained that Aunty Carol had guided the students to see and feel the land in a special, new way. The way she's engaged with our students has left a long-lasting impression on them, so much so that she's been adopted as our school's Aunty and a cultural ambassador for our school.

Another highlight of the launch event was acknowledging and gathering many of the people who have supported and contributed to Ravensthorpe's Genestreaming Journey Sculpture.

The support and involvement of many organisations, artists, individuals and businesses in this project is warmly acknowledged. Gondwana Link thanks major supporter Lotterywest, the Ravensthorpe Shire, Aunty Carol, Ben Beeton and Mali Moir, the staff and students at RDHS, and the Ravensthorpe Herbarium.

Potential for fungicide resistance detected

GRDC

Laboratory analysis of wheat powdery mildew samples collected from the Esperance district in Western Australia has revealed the presence of a gateway mutation that could lead to reduced sensitivity or resistance to azole/demethylase inhibitor (DMI) fungicides.

While there have been no reported incidents of reduced fungicide performance in the paddock linked to this mutation, growers should be careful to apply fungicides in rotation and mixture, and practice non-chemical disease management strategies to avoid creating favourable circumstances for resistance to develop.

How resistance was detected

Each season the WA Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) Crop Protection team in Esperance (Andrea Hills and Joel Kidd) submit wheat powdery mildew samples to the Centre for Crop and Disease Management (CCDM) at Curtin University for fungicide resistance testing.

Of the 13 samples submitted in 2024, ten contained a genetic mutation that is a forerunner of fungicide resistance. This type of mutation is called a gateway mutation. A gateway mutation could lead to further mutations. In this case, further mutations could impact the performance of Group 3 DMI fungicides such as cyproconazole, epoxiconazole, flutriafol, propiconazole, prothioconazole, tebuconazole and triadimefon.

Wheat powdery mildew is a constant factor in the Esperance district. Paddocks where disease levels were high in previous seasons are especially at risk.

Here we are standing, in a seatless bus shelter surrounded by cases and bags, sucking in foul fuel fumes from heavy traffic roaring through Mundaring township at well over the speed limit. The ceaseless racket of trucks, buses and cars rumble past barely two meters from us. Our young delivery driver grandson, now a P-plater, is having anxious moments, wondering what to do and is too scared to step out of the driver's seat in case of being wiped out. Along comes another geriatric passer-by, who notices my grandson's predicament and offers to help him break into the maze of traffic despite a stutter, deafness and failing eyesight. The next time I looked, my grandson's car had vanished.

I am thinking about the hundreds of trips my wife and I have made to Hopetoun since 1979 and how I now had been cajoled into riding on a comfortable and relaxing modern bus with few passengers, tilted seats, and TV. I could doze, read and enjoy the dry countryside.

The bus is here, and half an hour late! The driver is full of apologies; it is late because students are going home for the long weekend.

Five steps into the bus is confronting. The decibels of noise seem to crescendo with a hundred eyes of inquisitive piranhas studying their prey, us. This woman has pinched our seat, and the driver is removing her to another. Finally, he is taking off. It has been five minutes since take-off, and the bus power has gone!

We are now in Sawyer's Valley, and our friendly driver apologises again. He is going to fix the bus, taking him half an hour. We can get out and stretch our legs if we have any.

Coming down the aisle is a mass exodus of unruly kids stepping out, with many tearing into the bush nearby.

Our caring bus driver is on his intercom talking to the kids with a pleasant but stern warning. We are travelling to Kulin in silence. Kulin is only a drop-off point. Off we go again. Another five minutes pass. A passenger alerts the driver. An elderly couple alighted from the bus at Kulin to go to the toilet. They have not come back. We are turning around. There they are, standing, waiting for the bus. We have now arrived in Lake Grace. All the kids are departing. Peace be with us. It did!

I, the Geri, will do a thorough check before attempting another bus trip.

I take my hat off to the bus driver.

I take my hat off to ALL bus drivers who have to be mechanics, crowd controllers, psychologists, public speakers and probably sometimes medics as well.





FRRR seeks representatives for three advisory committees

FRRR (Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal) is currently seeking expressions of interest from suitably qualified people from remote, rural and regional Australia to sit on one of three bodies that advise the FRRR Board.

Two of the three are Program Advisory Committees seeking to refresh their membership and expand representation, while the third is a completely new Outback Advisory Board.

Natalie Egleton, FRRR CEO, said that each of these bodies plays a critical role in the effective governance of the nearly \$20 million that the Foundation, which is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year, awards annually.

"While our staff do very thorough and detailed initial assessments of applications, for the most part it is the Program Advisory Committees that recommend where our scarce funds are allocated. To ensure that we are directing grants where they are needed most, we have Program Advisory Committees comprising people with relevant lived experience sitting alongside FRRR Directors and our donor partners. Their insights and knowledge of the subject matter are critical to our decisions.

"Right now, we are seeking people with experience or interest in mental health and community wellbeing to join our In a Good Place Program Advisory Committee, and people with experience in climate and energy transitions to join our Community Led Climate Solutions advisory committee," Ms Egleton explained.

FRRR is also establishing an Outback Advisory Board, whose remit will be to advise the Board more broadly on issues and opportunities in remote and outback Australia.

"We have supported remote, rural and regional Australia for more than 25 years and it's become apparent that remote, very remote and outback Australia has specific challenges and needs. To ensure that our granting and capacity building support, and our advocacy, fully reflect this uniqueness, the Board has decided to appoint and Outback Advisory Board. Its remit will be to bring a national perspective, as well as local knowledge, to our granting programs, as well as to our advocacy activities, such as submissions to Senate inquiries and the development of policy and issues papers," Ms Egleton explained.

Detailed role descriptions, as well as Expression of Interest Forms are available on the Work With Us page on FRRR's website. EOIs close 5pm AEDT on Friday 11 April 2025.

Note, these roles are voluntary, but FRRR aims to have a diversity in membership, so the Foundation will consider supporting successful applicants to address barriers to participation in these primarily virtual meetings.


