
We need а few volunteers both students and parents are welcome - to paint the project. Please let us know if you are interested. The from display will be December 1. 2022. through January 4, 2023.

The Shri Workshop was a two-day workshop on October 29th and 30th featuring renowned artist **Mr. Drdha Vrata Gorrick**. He walked the participants through how to draw Goddess Lakshmi in a seated position using grids and proportions from the Shilpa Shastras, ancient manuals for art and sculpture based on precise proportion. The event was originally in person, but due to high demand and requests from attendees, Ms. Supraja Ganesh from Virginia held and co-hosted an online version.

Around 75 people joined from around the world including Canada, the US, India, Malaysia, Dubai, Germany, Amsterdam, the UK, Australia, Singapore, Egypt, and more!
