


## Successful MDFT Engagement, Retention and Completion


- ✓ Average length of treatment was 5 months.




## Who did we serve?

#### Age at Intake





# Interesting MDFT 2022 Facts



MDFT International has continued to update manuals, trainings and forms for a more user-friendly experience. In 2022 we completely revamped the Implementation and Sustainability Manual and delivered the first Introductory Training for Therapist Assistants.

#### **MDFT CLINICAL PORTAL**

Updates to the MDFT Clinical Portal continued. In 2022, we updated most of our data reports, including the *Fidelity and Outcomes Report*, that helps programs improve adherence and address implementation barriers.



#### **REFRESHERS**



We initiated our *MDFT Refresher* series in 2022. The general objectives of these 2-hour virtual sessions are to sharpen certified therapists' and supervisors' knowledge of the principles of MDFT and intervention strategies to promote change and to reinforance and further develop core competencies in MDFT. In 2022 we delivered **8 Refreshers** on topics such as: engaging and motivating youth and parents, transitional aged youth, therapist development, and opioid use and treatment. These sessions have been enthusiastically received by program staff!

#### **NEW RESEARCH PROJECT!**

In 2022, the Connecticut Department of Children and Families partnered with MDFT International and Chestnut Health System to apply for the Children's Bureau Regional Partnership Grant to Increase the Well-Being of, and to Improve the Permanency Outcomes for, Children and Families Affected by Opioids and Others Substance Abuse. This RPG has a strong research component as we will be designing and testing an integrated service system to improve outcomes for children ages 0-5, parents, and families affected by opioids or other substance use disorders. The new program model combines MDFT and MDFR for more comprehensive family-based services.
