THE LEARNING CENTER - 3025 BULL STREET

The Learning Center/Senior Citizens, Inc. is located at the intersection of Bull Street with Washington Avenue, three blocks south of Victory Drive across from the Ardsley Park neighborhood. TLC's entrance and parking are on Jasper Street (an extension of Washington, west of Bull Street). Look for the large, drive-under porte-cochère and big glass doors.

THE LEARNING CENTER AT SKIDAWAY ISLAND – 50 DIAMOND CAUSEWAY

TLC's Monday programs take place at the Skidaway Community Church, 50 Diamond Causeway. From Savannah, take Waters Avenue, which becomes Whitefield Avenue east of Montgomery Cross Road. Continue on Whitefield Avenue across bridges to Skidaway Island. On the Island, this road is called Diamond Causeway. At the first traffic light, you will see the church on the left. Turn left onto State Park Road, and left again into the church parking lot.

In fewer than 80 years, Russia (or at first, the Soviet Union) pivoted from Western ally in
the fight against Nazi Germany to harsh overseer of a Communist bloc behind the Iron
Curtain; from arbiter of post-war peace in Europe to perpetrator of a long, tense Cold
War; and from military superpower to has-been bully of former Soviet republics.

This series examines Russian history since 1945 through the lens of one leader at a time.

RUSSIA UNDER STALIN: 1945-1953

At the close of World War II, Josef Stalin established Communist regimes in eastern Europe, secured technology for the atomic bomb, and planned a second round of purges.



RUSSIA UNDER KHRUSHCHEV: 1953-1964

Nikita Khrushchev relaxed the worst features of Stalinism, yet built the Berlin Wall and perpetrated the Cuban Missile Crisis.


Vladimir Putin established his own authoritarian regime in Russia and engaged in military aggression in an attempt to reassert Russian relevance.

Thomas Jefferson. Scion of Virginia's planter class, he authored a fledgling nation's revolutionary words. A controversial politician and president, he became an enigma regarding religion and a sphynx on the riddles of race. He read and studied, questioned and quarreled, invented and designed—and left an indelible mark on Virginia and the nation.

Warren Heilman earned a BM in music education from Kent State University and holds an MS and EdS from Georgia Southern. A retired band director, he has been a musical director of Bay Street Theatre, Collective Face Performance Ensemble, Savannah Children's Theatre, and Armstrong State University.





Napoleon's fraught relations with Russia climaxed with the 1812 campaign. These dramatic events inspired artistic creations such as Tolstoy's *War and Peace* and Tchaikovsky's "1812 Overture." Feats of



military heroism, deprivations during alien intrusion, and explosions of victory and loss punctuate this multi-disciplinary exploration of history, music, and literature. REGISTER

WAR AND PEACE: A FORUM FOR READING AND DISCUSSION



Lyon: Unknown Treasure

When people think about France, they picture Paris. Or the glittering Riviera. Or the beaches of Normandy. They frequently ignore Lyon, France's third-largest city. Lyon boasts a history of ancient Roman and Gallic antecedents; it is the gateway to the Alps and rich alpine culture; and it remains vital in its contributions to modern French culture and society.

Avignon: Palace of the Popes

The Roman Church's greatest medieval monument stands on the Rhône in Avignon—the Palace of the Popes. A relic from the papacy's estrangement from Rome, the palace is the largest ever built in the Gothic

style. Imposing towers and grandiose halls—many filled with fourteenth-century frescoes—are emblematic of the Western Schism and the seven popes who resided at Avignon from 1309 to 1377.

Arles: Nan Gogh and Gauguin in the Yellow House

Dreaming of a studio of artists in Arles, Vincent Van Gogh invited Paul Gauguin to join him in his Yellow House. They shared costs, drank absinthe, and painted the same subjects. This is the story of nine tragic weeks when the course of art history changed forever.





Laura Davenport is the author of Dear Vulcan and the chapbook Little Hates. She received an MFA in poetry from Virginia Commonwealth University and teaches creative writing and composition. Her award-

winning poems have appeared in Boulevard Magazine, Best New Poets 2009, and Crab Orchard Review. She serves on the board of Seersucker Live, Inc., a nonprofit promoting literary events and community in Savannah.


