



Sold-Out Preaching Conference Highlights Summer at St. Augustine's

A highly successful two-day conference on Catholic preaching more than made up for a relatively quiet summer at the Seminary due to ongoing construction.

The conference on August 7-8 featured His Excellency Bishop Robert Barron, founder of Word on Fire Ministries and host of the award-winning PBS series *Catholicism*, as the keynote speaker. The other presenters were His Eminence Thomas Cardinal Collins, Fr. Peter Cameron O.P. and Fr. Jude Siciliano O.P. The conference was widely attended by deacons, diaconate candidates, seminarians, priests, bishops and some laity.

"It was an absolutely beautiful event," said Deacon Peter Lovrick, professor of homiletics at the Seminary, who coordinated the conference. "Despite the logistical problems related to construction, it is a testament to all at the Seminary that we were able to host an event of this size and stature and have it go so smoothly."

Each of the presenters approached the subject of preaching from a different perspective. Fr. Cameron spoke of the impor-

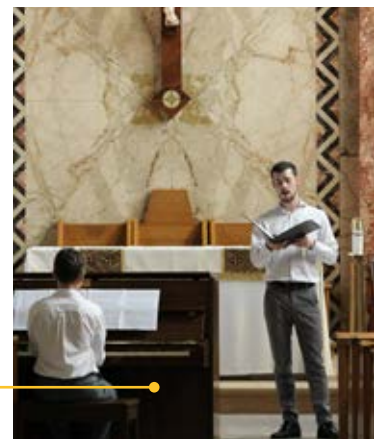
tance of clear structure, while Fr. Siciliano talked about a close meditative focus on the text before breaking it open. Cardinal Collins stressed the importance for preachers to spend adequate time to fully prepare their homilies.

In his keynote, Bishop Barron emphasised the importance of spending time in prayer – a point that resonated with St. Augustine's seminarian Josh Lobo.

"Bishop Barron gave a great example that really struck me," said Lobo. "Paraphrasing, he said, 'a preacher must allow himself to be seized by the Holy Spirit like a trumpet is seized and played by a musician to create beautiful music. This deep relationship with the Holy Spirit comes through prayer. To be a better preacher, therefore, we must become better pray-ers.' I really took that to heart."

Morning and evening prayer and daily mass were also held over the two days. In addition, St. Augustine's wonderful kitchen staff put on a gala dinner and there were musical performances from the Ho Deng Musical Ensemble; world-class organist William O'Meara; and baritone Matthew Snowdon, accompanied by Paul Jenkins.

After being appointed vice-rector of the Redemptoris Mater Missionary Seminary last May, Fr. Scollo joins St. Augustine's academic faculty as an Assistant Professor, Biblical Theology.

in Italy, he entered the Redemptoris Mater Missionary Seminary of Toronto at age 19. He obtained a Bachelor of Catholic Thought from St. Philip's Seminary and an Honours M.Div. from St. Augustine's and was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese of Toronto in 2007. He served as Associate Pastor at St. Marguerite d'Youville Parish in Brampton before going to Rome to complete his licentiate and doctoral studies.

St. Augustine's is delighted to have Fr. Abad join our faculty as Assistant Professor, Systematic and Historical Theology. Fr. Abad has a Ph.D. in Classics (Ancient history stream) from the Department of

Classics at the University of Toronto.

Before coming to Toronto, Fr. Abad studied in Rome and received a Licentiate degree in Theology from the Institutum Patristicum Augustinianum. He was ordained to the priesthood in 2000.

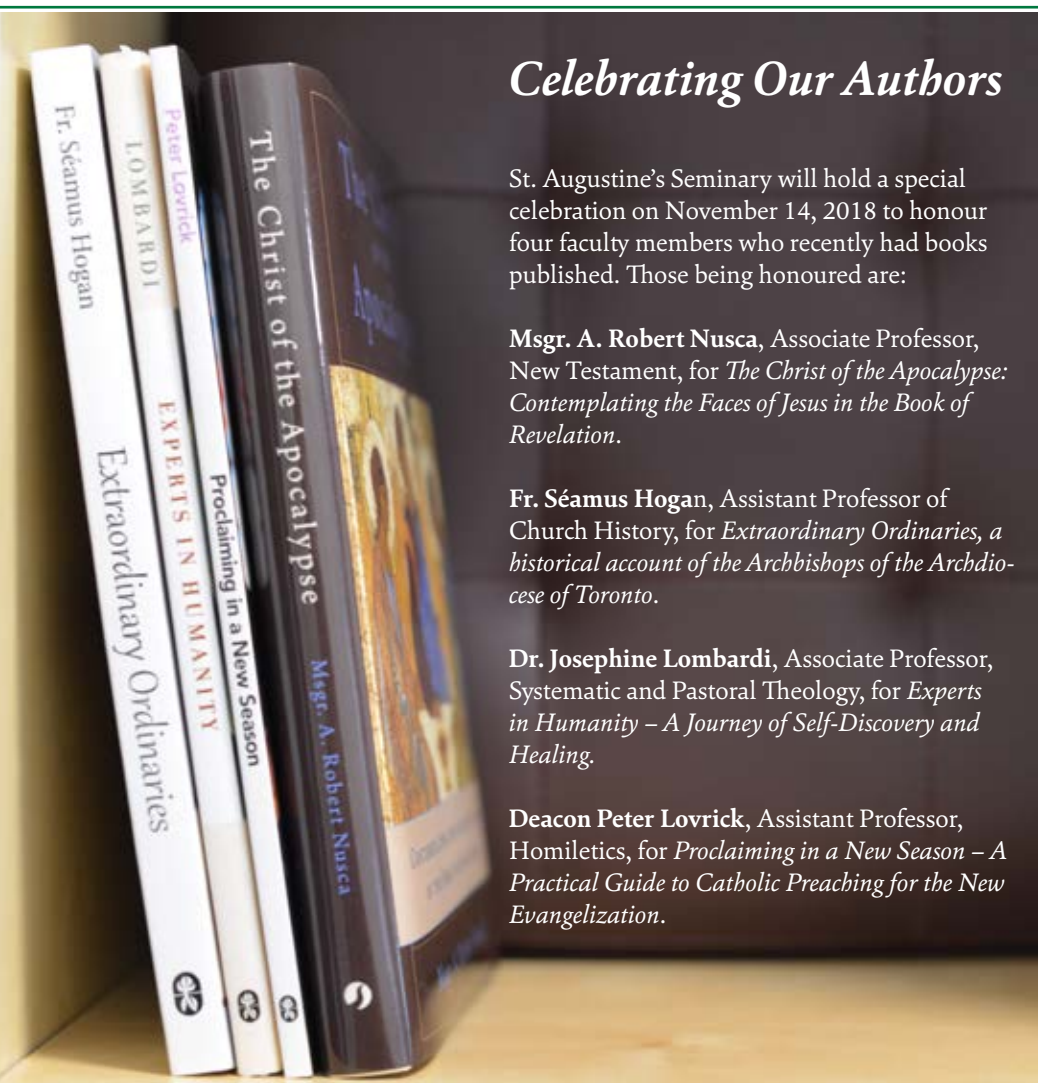

Board Approves Updated Policies On Sexual Violence and Harassment

In accordance with Ontario Bill 132, Sexual Violence and Harassment Action Plan Act, St. Augustine's has updated and created policies dealing with discrimination and harassment including sexual violence and sexual harassment.

The policies have been approved by the St. Augustine's Seminary Board of Governors. Training has been provided to faculty and staff of the Seminary to assist in the understanding of their rights and responsibilities under these policies. All students are covered by the University of Toronto's relevant policies, with the exception of ordained students who are covered by their respective Diocesan policies (i.e. the Archdiocese of Toronto Safe Environment Policy).



New Faces, New Academic and Formation Year

As the new academic year begins, St. Augustine's is pleased to welcome 14 new seminarians, including 8 for the Archdiocese of Toronto. Two others are from the Archdiocese of Kingston, one from the Archdiocese of Regina and one from the Diocese of Peterborough as well as two new seminarians from the religious community the Congregation of the Disciples of the Lord (CDD).

Overall, there are 84 seminarians in various years of formation, including 38 for Toronto. Once again, the Seminary has a national and international flavour with seminarians representing 10 dioceses across Canada, two from the U.S., one from the Archdiocese of Ha Noi, Vietnam, in addition to the two new seminarians from CDD. Seventeen of the 84 are from the Redemptoris Mater Missionary Seminary.

This also marks the beginning of the academic year for new and returning students to the Institute of Theology's diploma and degree programs as well as returning and new candidates for the Diaconate program.

Renovation work will resume next summer, upgrading the rooms in St. Joseph House (the former Sisters of St. Martha convent), and adding air conditioning to the main chapel, the dining room and Session Hall.

Reflections on the 30-Day Spiritual Year Silent Retreat

At the end of the Spiritual Year program this past spring, seminarians at St. Augustine's crowned the year with a 30-day silent retreat at Martyrs' Shrine in Midland.

"Apart from their daily one-on-one meetings with their spiritual directors (Fr. Philip Shano, SJ, and Br. Dan Leckman, SJ), seminarians spent their days in silence and contemplation," explains Fr. Frederick Chung, Director of the Spiritual Year. "It was a profound experience of discerning Jesus' call to discipleship, and surrendering themselves completely to the service of God at the initial stages of their priestly formation."

"Despite the fact that we were all in silence, at the end of the 30 days I think we (the Spiritual Year seminarians) were all much closer to each other than we were prior," recalls seminarian Cole Powers.

"That was really quite striking to realize that our fraternity didn't depend on talking a lot or spending lots of time with each other, but on walking the same path. I realized that silence is not an absence, but is actually a presence that fills you."

He recalls the intense feeling he had going into the first week of reflection on Sin, Hell and Death.

"When you hear those words, it's kind of frightening. However, for many of us, that was really an occasion of grace. It's not that we focused on our sins, but rather looking at our sins gave us a chance to better understand the mercy that God offers us. So all of us were bowled over when we stopped and reflected just how much and how deeply God's mercy had entered into our lives. That was certainly one of the greatest graces that I experienced."
