Simsbury Public Schools EQUITY STATEMENT

In the Simsbury Public Schools (SPS), an equitable system ensures that all members of our community can reach their full potential. For us, equity is the dismantling of racism and all forms of marginalization that impede growth and harm our community.

We believe:

- Growth toward the achievement of equity is everyone's responsibility.
- Silence supports the oppressors and prevents positive change.
- Expectations matter because we can rise to our own beliefs and the beliefs of others around us;
- Stories matter because they provide insight and understanding into who we are;
- Healthy connections matter because they promote safety, support and positive relationships; and
- Accountability matters. All adults have the responsibility to actively implement and maintain equitable practices to ensure students' positive experience.

In our relentless pursuit of equity:

- We will recognize and address the biases and inequities that exist within our school system.
- We will hold ourselves accountable to examine data and curriculum, create policies, and provide frequent training to adults and students.
- We will provide opportunities that guarantee access for all students to meet and exceed academic, social, and civic expectations.

BOE approval at 07/21/20 meeting







- 2017: the Center for School Change performed an equity audit on GPS, which revealed a significant performance gap between white students and minority students.
- 2018: concentrated in 4 key areas
 - Climate: Why are office referrals and in-school suspensions of black males so much higher than white males?
 - **Professional Capacity:** Increase and retain minority teachers
 - Special Education: Why are Black students recommended for special education twice as much as white students?
 - Achievement: Why are the AP, PSAT, and SAT achievements of black students lower than other students?
- The progress is "slow but deep and equity is now fully part of our educational culture"- Equity Team Member

Granby Public Schools EQUITY STATEMENT

Equity in the Granby Public Schools ensures practices that allow all students to achieve at high levels, and that outcomes are not predicted by race, religion, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, gender, gender identity, or sexual orientation; and barriers are removed to meet the needs of students of all abilities and backgrounds; thereby realizing the district missions for all students to become powerful thinkers, effective collaborators, and compassionate contributors.


